COMPANY HISTORY MARCH 1945

- 1. Authority: (AR-345-105, as amended, and Sec. IV, Cir.34, Hq.Seventh Ar щу, 28 November 1944).
- 2. Operations during the period of the 1st of March to 31 March 1945, inclusive were as follows:

The first of the month found the company still in the rest area at Luneville, France. On the night of the 1st a dance was held for the EM of the company. Refreshments were served. The Division Band furnished the music and local French girls were guests. Lt. Clark was promoted to 1st Lieutenant. See Annex 1. Cpl. Jardieu left on TD to the U.K. Sgt. Faires and PFC's Pfeffer and Tatum left for Paris on two day passes.

On the 2nd Captain Moore reported to the hospital and Lt. Tacey became acting C.O. An inspection of personnel and equipment was held, with

Major Clark as the inspecting officer.

On the 3rd the company fired their weapons on the Division Special Troops Range. Lt. Paris and St.Sgt. Sam Martin went to Paris to attend the 7 day I & E school.

On the 5th the vehicles of the company were inspected by Mr. Gardner. Captain Wilson of the 7th Army Special Service g ave a talk on the problems of post-war Germany, as related to us. A small party for 20 couples was held in a local cafe and went off well. Several of the men were promoted to PFC and three Good Conduct Medals were awarded . See Annex 2.

. The Division Ordnance Officer inspected the company vehicles on the 6th. The I & E film "The Nazis Strike" was shown to the company at the theater near the company area. This theater had two showings daily for all troops.

On the 8th Sergeants Bryson, Giffin and Adair returned from TD to the United States. A training film was shown at the theater and a lecture on the peace plan was given.

Opl. Hayden had his appendix removed at the 51st Station Hospital on

the 9th.

On the 10th Cpl. Collins left on TD to the U.K. Sgt. George Martin

and Opls. Nolan and Stancoff left for Paris on two day passes.

On the 12th the advance group went to Sarreguemines, France and made the C.P. installations in preparation for the divisions re-entry into combat. Personnel from the 4th Signal Company came in and made preparations to take over our installations. Captain Frost, Lt. Vetters and Lt.Story, former members of the company as enlisted men visited old friends in the company. On the 13th the Repair Section moved to Sarreguemines. Wr.Fletcher

Sergeants Endress, Taylor and Brescia left for Brussels on two day passes. Mr. McLean, Sgt.Poznanski and PFC's Baumbach and Walling left for Paris on two day passes. PFC Curtis left on TD to the U.K.

On the 14th the company moved to Sarreguemines and set up near the C.P. in a former home for the insane. On the 16th Captain Moore, Sergeants Northrup and Warden, Opl. Warden

PFC's Salazar, Clemons and Gouge left for Paris on two day passes. Sgt.

On the 17th the division C.P. and the advance operations teams moved to Briefurt, inside Germany. This was the first time that the C.P. had set up inside Germany although the troops had been in Germany in December. Lt. Brandt, Sergeants Krupens ki and Soden, Cpl. Shelton and PFC's Mason, Haines, Blair, Schwartz, and Krum left for Brussels on two day passes.

On the 18th PFC's Burns and Suchadolski left on TD to the U.K. Sgt.

Fullam, Cpls. Ahearn and Kaplan and PFC Heyes also went to the U.K. on TD. On the 19th Lt. Clark, Lt. Paris, Sergeants Dixon, Hilbert, Shelite and McWilliams, Cpls. Divirgilio and Tressler and PFC's Liebowitz, Berkowitz, Cizewski and Powers left for Paris on two day passes.

The villages inside Germany were almost completely destroyed by bombing and artillery fire. The Siegfried line was breached and on the 21st the company moved to Homburg. There were many prisoners walking around trying to get someone to take them to the PW cages and a large crowd of freed slave labor enjoying their freedom although somewhat bewildered by the sudden change. Corporals Keiser, Gillen, Nicol and Wilson left on TD to the U.K.

On the 22nd there was another long move to Grunstadt, where civilians were required to move from their homes and the soldiers moved in. Most of the route was over the Autos trada, the German superhighway. A construction peep was run over by a tank while it was parked b eside the road. The long haul back to the signal dumps for signal supplies caused the trucks to break down from over use. The debris from wrecked German equipment caused a large n umber of flat tires. Sgt. Burk was made Mess Sergeant. There were a few other promotions. See Annex 3.

On the 23rd Cpl. McKenzie of Message Center captured five Germans and

turned them over to the PW cage.

On the 24th the company moved to Westhofen where the personnel were again quartered in vacated civilian houses. There was heavy air activity during the night. While none of it was near the company area, the flares, AA fire and planes shot down recalled to mind the days at Anzio.


On the 25th the company received a Dukw to be used in laying cable across the Rhine. Sgt. Henderson was placed in charge of a convoy to go to Luneville to return men arriving there by train, after being on pass to Paris and E ngland. Overshoes, Pacs and overcoats were turned in to the QM.

Early in the morning of the 26th the construction section laid two cables across the Rhine and the Telephone section crossed and established a switching central on the East side.

On the 27th the company moved across the Rhine and set up the normal C.P. communication system in Zwingenberg. Several prisoners surrendered to members of the company. Cpl. Palmer's peep threw a rod. The trucks were getting in bad shape due to old age and constant use.

On the 28th PFC Halpin captured 5 Germans. The company moved to Gros Ostheim and set up in a bre wery. Normal communications were installed. The messenger run to the Rear Echelon of the division was about 200 miles. One messenger peep went each day and came back the following day.

The month ended with the CP still at Gros Ostheim. The Germans were bitterly contesting the city of Aschaffenburg, with every person fighting from house to house.
