## I. Erasable Load Procedure for Rotation about Y Stable Member (Orbital Rate)

Colossus Memo #143 outlined a procedure which effectively will produce orbital rate S/C rotation. The procedure outlined in this memo is longer but because it supplies more information to the DAP, will save RCS fuel. The exact saving will be dependent on the rotation rate commanded, the weight and configuration of the vehicle involved, and the presence of distrubance torques. It is expected that the longer procedure can cut fuel consumption by a factor of 4 in some cases.

The following assumptions have been made. In earth or moon orbit Y stable member is assumed to be aligned with  $V \times R$ . Desired middle gimble angle (CDUZ) is assumed to be zero. The desired rate about Y stable member will be called ORBRATE and is assumed to be 0.1 deg/sec or less in magnitude. If the above assumptions restrict mission profile, contact Joe Turnbull, MIT Ext. 1593, for tradeoffs involved in changing the assumptions.

The procedure is:

V49 E

Load gimbal angles that are to be the gimbal angles at the initiation of orbital rate rotation. (Middle gimbal angle should be zero.)

PROCEED on V06 N22

CMC MODE switch in AUTO

PROCEED on V50 N18

ENTER on V50 N18

It is not necessary that the above sequence result in physical motion of the S/C. In other words, it may be a trivial maneuver to present attitude. Nevertheless, the sequence of key strokes should be executed so that erasable memory is properly setup.

After the V49 maneuver, execute the following:

V24 N01 ENTER

3127 ENTER (address of high order part of WBODY1)

VVVVV ENTER

WWWWW ENTER

V24 ENTER
3131 ENTER (address of high order part WBODY2)
XXXXX ENTER
YYYYY ENTER

V21 ENTER
3200 ENTER (address of low order part of DELCDUY)
ZZZZZ ENTER

The maneuver will now be in progress.

The maneuver can be terminated by switching the CMC MODE switch to HOLD, keying V46E, or by RHC activity.

The numbers VVVVV through ZZZZZ are octal numbers and have the following significance.

VVVVV and WWWWW are the high and low order parts of the double precision representation of WBODY1, the Y control axis component of rotation rate.

XXXXX and YYYYY are the high and low order parts of the double precision representation of WBODY2, the Z control axis component of rotation rate.

ZZZZZ is the low order part of the double precision representation of DELCDUY, the incremental angle for CDUY. For rates less than 0.1 deg/sec the high order part is zero and need not be loaded.

Table 1 presents values to be loaded for XXXXX through ZZZZZ for a number of ORBRATEs and for four values of CDUXD. In order that no more non-zero digits be loaded than is necessary, values of WWWWW and YYYYY have been rounded to three significant digits. This yields representations of WBODY1 and WBODY2 accurate to within  $10^{-4}$  deg/sec.

The octal numbers can be generated as follows. Let ORBRATE be the desired rate in deg/sec about the Y stable member axis. This angular rate can be transformed into an angular velocity coordinitized in RCS control axes by a matrix transformation. For zero desired middle gimbal angle and constant desired outer gimbal angle, CDUX, the transformation is

$$\begin{pmatrix} \text{WBODY} \\ \text{WBODY1} \\ \text{WBODY2} \end{pmatrix} = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & \cos(\text{CDUX} - 7.25^{\circ}) & \sin(\text{CDUX} - 7.25^{\circ}) \\ 0 & -\sin(\text{CDUX} - 7.25^{\circ}) & \cos(\text{CDUX} - 7.25^{\circ}) \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} 0 \\ \text{ORBRATE} \\ 0 \end{bmatrix}$$

This implies that

At this point WBODY1 and WBODY2 are signed decimal numbers. The next step is to convert WBODY1 and WBODY2 to their octal machine representation. The procedure for both is the same so from this point everything that is said for WBODY1 applies equally to WBODY2.

In the computer, WBODY1 is a double precision quantity scaled at 450 deg/sec. To get its octal value multiply the magnitude of the decimal quantity WBODY1 by 596, 523 and round of the result to the nearest integer.

A = ROUND 
$$\{596, 523 \text{ WBODY1}\}$$

Divide A by 16, 384

$$B = \frac{A}{16,384}$$

B will have the form C. DDD where C will be 0, 1, 2, or 3 if  $|RATE| \le 0.1 eg/sec$ 

If C = 0 set VVVVV = 00000

If  $C \neq 0$  and WBODY1 is positive set VVVVV = 0000C

If C  $\neq$  0 and WBODY1 is negative set VVVVV = 77777 - 0000C

Compute the number E as

$$E = A - C 16,384$$
.

E should be an integer between 0 and 16, 384

Convert the decimal integer E to its octal equivalent, EOCT. This will be an octal number between 0 and 37777.

If WBODY1 is positive set WWWWW = EOCT

If WBODY1 is negative set WWWWW = 77777 - EOCT.

The low order part of DELCDUY is computed as follows.

Multiply the magnitude of rate by 149, 131 and round the product to the nearest integer

$$F = round \{149, 131 RATE\}$$

Convert F to its octal equivalent, FOCT.

Since for orbital rate ORBRATE will be negative set ZZZZZ = 77777 - FOCT.

## II. Erasable Load Procedure for Rotation about Vehicle X Axis (PTC)

A procedure similar to that for ORBRATE can be used to produce an X axis rotation for Passive Thermal Control.

The procedure is as follows

V49 E

Load gimbal angles that are to be the gimbal angles at the initiation of PTC.

PROCEED on V06 N22

CMC MODE switch in AUTO

PROCEED on V50 N18

ENTER on V50 N18

It is not necessary that the above sequence result in physical motion of the S/C. In other words, it may be a trivial maneuver to present attitude, but nevertheless, the sequence of key strokes should be expected so that erasable memory is properly setup.

After V49 execute the following:

V24 N01 ENTER

3125 ENTER (address of WBODY)

SSSSS ENTER

TTTTT ENTER

V21 ENTER

3176 ENTER (address of low order part of DELCDUX)

UUUUU ENTER

The maneuver will now be in progress.

The maneuver can be terminated by switching the CMC MODE switch to HOLD, by keying V46E, or by RHC activity.

The numbers SSSSS through UUUUU are octal numbers and have the following significance:

SSSSS and TTTTT are the high and low order parts of the double precision representation of WBODY, the X axis rotation rate.

UUUUU is the low order part of the double precision representation of DELCDUX.

For a PTC rate of +0.1 deg/sec:

SSSSS = 00003

TTTTT = 24400

UUUUU = 35101

For a PTC rate of -0.1 deg/sec:

SSSSS = 77774

TTTTT = 53400

**UUUUU = 42676** 

Rates other than  $\pm$  0.1 deg/sec can just as easily be obtained by loading WBODY and DELCDUX with appropriate numbers. Rates greater than .11 deg/sec require loading the upper as well as lower part of DELCDUX which would be a simple modification of the above procedure.

## III. Some Comments on Fuel Consumption

The RCS DAP is designed so that in the absence of disturbance torques, it will approach minimum impulse limit cycle operation during attitude hold and low rate maneuvers. During minimum impulse limit cycle operation, disabling two adjacent quads will cut RCS fuel consumption by as much as a factor of four. The quads can be disabled by using R03 or by use of the 16 jet switches in the cockpit.

If there are no disturbance torques or there are to be no changes in maneuver rate then R03 need not be used. However, if disturbance torques are present or if manual or V49 maneuvering is to be done, then DAP performance will be more satisfactory if R03 is used either by itself or in addition to the 16 jet switches so that the DAP is informed of disabled jets.

In the presence of distrubance torques large enough so that limit cycling is against one side of the deadband only, RCS fuel consumption will be determined by the amount of jet firing needed to cancel the average disturbance torque.

For maximum fuel economy during ORBRATE and PTC control, it is our recommendation to use R03 to disable two adjacent quads. This is not the only alternative as evidenced by the discussion in the three preceding paragraphs, but it is a simple and effective alternative for all conditions.
