
CSM/LM LOAD UPLINK SEQUENCE












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


LM DCA TEST WORDS 1, 2, AND 3




MSFN STATION COMMAND SYSTEM FUNCTIONAL BLOCK DIAGRAM




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



MCC-H COMMAND UPLINK AND VERIFICATION DATA FLOW DIAGRAM



MCC - COMMAND DATA FLOW









ONE LOAD SEQUENCE


HIGH-SPEED TRANSMISSION SEQUENCE





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#### AVP--Address Verification Pulse

Part of the SLV telemetry downlink. Detection of a valid AVP indicates the onboard command decoder has successfully decoded the 14-bit decoder address included in every command word to the SLV. The remote site command computer strips these pulses from the telemetry downlink during the map waiting period following each SLV uplink word. A detection of four <u>1</u>'s, within a 60 ms period during the SLV map waiting period constitutes a valid AVP. An indication of this event is recorded for command history.

#### Buffer Compare

An uplink verification process used for CM and LM computer loads. No reference to maps is made. All words are uplinked with minimum spacing. When all words in the load have been transmitted, the RSCC waits a specified amount of time (Buffer Compare delay) to insure the state buffer contains the uplinked load. It then begins to collect state buffer data. One set of state buffer words contain the entire load. The computer collects up to 8 sets of state buffer words comparing each set to the retained uplink load data. When two favorable comparisons are made, the buffer compare is terminated. If no two comparisons are favorable out of a possible 8, the buffer compare process is terminated. Whenever the buffer compare is terminated, it results in two CAPS being transmitted to MCC conveying the results of the comparison process.

#### Buffer Compare Delay

Following uplink of a load for which a buffer compare is required, a delay will occur before collecting state buffer words. This delay insures that the downlink state buffer data is for the load that was previously uplinked. The delay is variable from 0 to 7 seconds. The minimum setting is dependent on range to the vehicle and buffering delays incurred in the telemetry scheme.

#### CAM--Computer Address Matrix

There are two CAM's at each remote site. One is associated with the RSCC and the other is related to the remote site telemetry computer. The command CAM may be used to select modes of operation for the RSCC and if MODE I is selected, it may be used to request an uplink.



#### CAP--Command Analysis Pattern

Part of the high speed telemetry output from the remote site telemetry computer to CCATS at MCC. The 40-bit pattern occupies 5 successive 8-bit word slots in the high speed format. The 40 bits include 14 bits of polynomial coding. The contents of each CAP is determined by the remote site command computer and is transferred to the telemetry computer via the inter-computer channel. The telemetry computer will output each CAP three times in successive telemetry blocks. The types of information conveyed by the CAP are as follows:

- A. acceptance or rejection by the RSCC of loads, ECR's, or PR's.
- B. verification by spacecraft that an uplinked word was received and decoded correctly.
- C. Status concerning results of an automatic or manual buffer compare made following uplink of a CMC or LGC load.
- D. Ground/spacecraft reject of an uplinked command.
- E. Site/carrier status information (UHF/USB ON-OFF; LD ENABLE-DISABLE; MODE 1 or 2; FC or M&O MODE)
- F. accomplishment of load clear
- G. accomplishment of command terminate

### CCATS--Command, Communications and Telemetry System

CCATS is a computer complex hubbed by 3 Univac computers. The computers are present by Univac 494 general purpose digital computers with a very large input/output peripheral complement. One of these computers will handle all of the required traffic for two missions simultaneously on one mission and one simulation. Another 494 serves as a dynamic standby. The CCATS complex handles all of the digital information flowing to or from the Mission Control Center. It serves as an input/output processor for MCC. In addition to input/output (communications processing), it serves very specific functions related to the MCC's capability to uplink digital data to the spacecrafts. It provides some degree of control over all of the remote sites' command computers. It maintains status tabulations of all RSCC's. It responds to manual inputs requesting an uplink and causes the appropriate RSCC to uplink the commands. It relays command loads from the Real Time computer complex to the appropriate RSCC's. In short, it controls a world wide network of command related equipments to fulfill the Mission Control Center's command requirements.

# CEF-Computer Execute Function

A message generated by CCATS in response to a manual input. CEF relates totall high speed data inputs to the RSCC except loads. The term CEF is found in the Remote Site documentation where CCATS documentation uses the terms Execute Command Requests (ECR) and Program Requests (PR) to refer to the same data.

## Command Spacing

The command spacing is the amount of time, in milliseconds, which must follow the last sub bit of a command word uplinked before the first sub bit of the following word may be uplinked. This time is variable from 50 MS to 300 MS. The minimum setting is dependent on spacecraft equipment delays (circuit recovery time).

#### CTE Bias

The RSCC may add a delay time to the computed GET prior to uplink of the CTE word. This time delay is added to compensate for the transmission time delays. The time is variable from 0 to 3 seconds.

# CRP-Computer Reset Pulse

Part of the SLV telemetry downlink. Sometimes referred to as MAP. Generated by the LVDC when it accepts a command word from the onboard command decoder. Detection of a valid CRP by the remote site command computer indicates successful completion of the uplink attempt for the previous word. Detection of four CRP bits, set to logical l's, within a 60 MS period during the SLV map waiting period constitutes a valid CRP. A valid CRP will terminate the retransmit sequence and will be included in the command history.

#### Data Bit Error

An error characterized by the transmission of the code for a data bit one instead of the code for a data bit zero (or vice versa). It is highly unlikely that this type of error could occur any place but the remote site command computer. A data bit error cannot be detected by the onboard equipments but can be detected during the uplink process by the remote site command computer. During the RF loop check, the remote site command computer accepts the demodulated verification receiver output, (a monitor of transmitted command) decodes the subbits, and checks the resulting data bits against the retained data bits which originally generated the outputted command. Detection of a data bit error results in immediate termination of the uplink process and an immediate ground reject. The early termination of the uplink sequence will result in an incomplete word being received by the spacecraft. The incomplete word will be rejected by the spacecraft.

### Downlink Validation Word

See MAP

## ECR-Execute Command Request

A message generated by CCATS in response to a manual input (usually by a flight controller). This type of message requests the RSCC to uplink a real-time command, a group of real-time commands, a load, or a correction for a previously transmitted load.

# FC/M&O Mode-Flight Control Maintenance and Operations

May refer to an RSCC mode or a CCATS mode. When used to refer to the RSCC, the mode selection is accomplished by use of the command CAM. The M&O mode enables the 1232 input/output console. The FC mode disables certain 1232 input/output console functions. If the term FC/M&O mode is used to refer to the CCATS mode, mode selections are accomplished by use of a pushbutton on the commando's console or by use of the manual entry device on the CCATS COMMAND CONTROLLER's console. There is a FC/M&O mode indicator at all of the MOCR flight controller positions having command panels. In the FC mode command uplinks may be initiated from the MOCR positions with command panels. In the M&O mode, the flight controllers cannot initiate a request for an uplink.

### GCA-Generalized Core Area

This is an RSCC term referring to a portion of main memory allocated to storage of command loads. The area will accomodate a maximum of 60 permanent loads of maximum anticipated length. One of these loads may be flagged as a temporary load rendering it unavailable for uplink. The RSCC will reject loads with the same type and sequence number as a load residing in memory but it will accept loads with the same type number but different sequence numbers. Any load stored in the generalized core area will remain there until cleared by remote site or CCATS operational personnel.

## Key Codes

A 5-bit character code used to interface the CMC with its DSKY. The same codes are used to interface the LGC with its DSKY. All commands from the network to either of these computers will be in the form of these keycodes. The keycodes are as follows:

All command loads are formatted into keycodes at CCATS prior to transmission to the remote site for storage. A complete set of keycodes are part of the remote site command computer program and are treated as real time commands by the computer.

## Load Enable/Disable

A mode of the RSCC. When the load enable function is active (load enable mode or simply load mode) loads from CCATS are checked by the RSCC and if found valid, are placed in the generalized core area. When the load enable function is inactive (load disable) a load from CCATS is checked by the RSCC and if found valid, placed in the generalized core area and flagged as a temporary load. Until the temporary flag is removed, the load may not be uplinked. Only one load may be flagged as temporary. When the load enable mode is entered with a temporary load in memory, the temporary flag is then removed. Load enable/disable is selected by the CAM.

## Load Record

A log (in main memory) maintained by CCATS. It lists all loads validly loaded at each site (by site).

## MAP

Message acceptance pattern. More correctly known as the Downlink validity word. An 8-bit telemetry word from the CSM and LM (only 4 bits are used). Generated by the onboard command decoder. Five different patterns are used by the CSM and four different patterns are used by the LM. This telemetry word is stripped from the telemetry downlink during the MAP waiting period following each CSM or LM uplink word which is subject to the MAP method of verification. An example of message acceptance patterns follows; l0l0XXXX indicates the onboard command decoder is powered but has not received an acceptable command word. Ol0lXXXX indicates the onboard decoder has received and accepted a command word. Detection of the latter pattern will terminate the uplink retransmission sequence. The term "MAP" is sometimes used in lieu of CRP.

#### MAP Method

An uplink verification process used by the remote site command computer. The computer strips downlink validity words from the CSM or LM telemetry or computer reset pulses from the IU telemetry. This TM decommutation occurs during the MAP waiting time after transmission of the uplinked command word. If the decommutated TM indicates the word has been accepted by the spacecraft, it terminates the uplink sequence. If TM does not verify the uplink, the computer will retransmit the command and wait for a MAP. The number of retransmissions is variable from 0 to 7. The detection of a map during the waiting period following any one of the retransmissions will terminate the transmission sequence. The map method of verification is optionally used on all SLV commands, CSM and LM RTC's and CSM CTE words. These commands may also be transmitted with the map override method of verification.

# MAP Override

An option provided the flight controller where he may initiate an uplink of any command normally requiring MAP verification but when this option is exercised, the remote site command computer will make no reference to MAPs and will uplink all words of the command with minimum spacing. As soon as the command has been outputted, the computer will assume verification.

# MAP Waiting Period

A period of time in which the RSCC will look for maps (CRP's) downlinked from a vehicle in response to a command word uplinked. The time period begins following uplink of the last subbit of the command word. This period is variable from 50 MS to 4 seconds. The minimum time setting is dependant on range to the vehicle.

# Mode I/II

Refers to operation of the RSCC. May be selected by the command CAM on the station controller's console. (Remote site) The most significant effect selection of the modes have is to control the source of execute command requests. In mode I, only remote site requests for uplink will be honored. This mode is used on a backup basis. Mode I uplinks may be initiated by use of the command CAM. In mode II, only high speed ECR's will be accepted by the RSCC. This is the normal mode of operation.

## Polynomial Encoding

An error protection scheme used in ground communications by the MSFN. All command related information exchanged between CCATS and the remote site command computer is protected by this encoding scheme. Also known as the Base-Chauduri error encoding scheme.

## PR-Program Request

A message generated by CCATS in response to a manual input from the program request module. (Command Load Controller and Telemetry Instrumentation Controller (CCATS)) The message is routed to a remote site command computer and requests the RSCC to accomplish some task that does not involve uplinking data to the spacecraft. RSCC functions which are requested by PR's include:

- A. Command History Summary Request
- B. Load Inventory Summary Request
- C. Load Clear Request

The term CEF (computer execute function) collects the terms ECR (execute command request) and PR.

# Priority Command

A priority command is a real time command designated priority so that it will receive special treatment during the uplink process. When a priority command is uplinked, it is not subject to the retransmission setting. It will be transmitted continuously, waiting for a map after each transmission, until the proper map is received or until the command transmission is terminated. The command transmission may be terminated by reception of a PR from CCATS (command terminate). Even though the transmission sequence is not subject to the retransmission setting, if the command is transmitted a number of times equal to this setting and no ground reject has been generated and no map has been received, the RSCC will generate a spacecraft reject CAP which when received by CCATS will result in a spacecraft reject light on the command panel of the flight controller that requested the uplink. The RSCC transmission sequence will continue until the command is verified or terminated.

#### Priority ECR

A priority ECR is an ECR generated by CCATS and designated priority so that it will receive special handling when being output from CCATS. Priority ECR's are output continuously at 250 MS intervals from CCATS until it is validated (receipt of a validation CAP from the RSCC). This contrasts with non-priority ECR's which are output only one time. Priority ECR's identify priority commands to be uplinked by the RSCC. The commands are subject to the uplink sequence described under "priority commands". Priority ECR's are generated in response to manual inputs from special command panels on the Flight Director's, Flight Dynamics officer's, and Booster Systems engineer's consoles. Each panel is associated with two discrete locations in a table of 20 maintained by CCATS. This table defines the hierarchy for manual inputs requesting priority (A priority ECR will interrupt anotherpriority ECR of lesser ECR's. priority) Any priority ECR will interrupt the transmission of a load being transmitted from CCATS. A priority ECR will not interrupt a non-priority ECR because these ECR's are only transmitted one time. However, the RSCC






will interrupt the transmission of a multiple word non-priority command in favor of a priority command (at the end of the word being uplinked). The command panels capable of initiating a priority ECR are referred to as toggle command panels. A priority ECR is sometimes referred to as a unique priority ECR.

# PSK - Phase Shift Key Modulation

A modulation technique used in project Apollo for uplink commands. The subbits to be transmitted are used to phase modulate a 2KHZ sine wave so that a subbit one is represented by 2 cycles of the sine wave and a subbit zero is represented by 2 cycles of the same signal but opposite



The composite waveform is used to modulate the 70KHZ subcarrier in the USB system. The modulated subcarrier then modulates the S-Band carrier. The transmitted command is PSK/PM/PM.

#### RF-Loop Check

A check performed by the RSCC during the uplink process. The outputted command is retained for subsequent checks. The transmitted command is monitored by the verification receiver and returned to the RSCC via the updata buffer. The monitored command is checked for proper subbit codes against the stored codes. The decoded command is then checked against the original command. The outputs of this check are subbit errors and data bit errors (if any). The presence (or absence) of these errors are used as logical inputs for:

controlling the uplink sequence generating verification caps generating S/C reject caps generating ground reject caps

#### RSCC-Remote Site Command Computer

The univac computer at all remote sites. It is a modified 642B otherwise known as univac 1230. The general purpose digital computer has a main memory capacity of 32,608 addressable 30-bit words. The RSCC provides storage for all commands awaiting uplink. When requested, the RSCC will take the identified command from storage, prefix it with the appropriate addresses and otherwise format it properly. It will then subbit encode the command and control the uplink. It attempts to verify each uplink by using the telemetry downlink. It is in constant communications with CCATS and relays status information dating to uplinks, equipments, or modes of operation. In short, it is the remote site's command control system.

# RTCC-Real Time Computer Complex

The RTCC is a large scale computer complex. It presently uses 5 IBM 360/75 computers. One of these computers serves all of MCC's computational requirements for one mission or simulation. Another serves as a dynamic standby. If two missions are running simultaneously, four computers are operating. The fifth computer is off-line. The RTCC provides the display and control system with the dynamic data for most of the displays used at MCC. It also uses tracking and telemetry data from the network to compute trajectory data. This trajectory data is used for many guidance and navigational functions and sometimes serve as primary source when relayed to the spacecraft. The RTCC is capable of generating a number of command loads. The purpose of these loads vary considerably. A typical purpose would be to define required parameters for maneuvering the spacecraft. A somewhat less dramatic purpose would be to correct the spacecraft's computer's ephemeris (ephemeris is a table of predicted position and velocity at given times). In summary, the RTCC provides MCC the capability of generating command loads automatically.

# SLV Decoder Address

All SLV command words are formatted with a fixed 14-bit decoder address. The bit structure is as follows:

Bit number 4 5 6 11 15 16 17 18 25 31 32 33 34 35 value 1010 1 0 1 1 1 1 0 1 1 1





#### Subbit Code

A Command encoding scheme used by Project Apollo to insure that no invalid commands are accepted by the spacecraft. An example follows: Each logical <u>1</u> to be uplinked is replaced with the discrete 5-bit pattern, i.e.; 10101. Each logical 0 is replaced with the complement of that pattern.

> 1 = 101010 = 01010

Only these two patterns would be accepted by the onboard equipment. The loss or gain of a subbit during transmission would generate a pattern which would not be acceptable by the onboard equipment. Additional protection is afforded by using one subbit code for the vehicle address and a different subbit code for the remainder of the command word.

## Subbit Error -

An error formed by dropping or adding a subbit so that the resulting code is invalid. Usually occurs in the transmitting media. This type of error is detected during the RF loop check performed by the remote site command computer. The error is detected by comparing the input to the computer from the verification receiver (a monitor of the transmitted command) and stored subbit codes from memory. This type of error will not cause termination of the uplink sequence nor a ground reject unless the retransmit sequence has been completed and no map has been received. Note that the subbit error may have been caused by the verification receiver and if that is the case, the erroneous code would not have been transmitted. This type of error will be detected by the onboard decoder and will result in the rejection of the entire word.

### Systems Addresses

All CSM and LM command words are prefixed with a three-data bit code denoting the vehicle system to which the command will ultimately be routed. The codes are as follows:

These codes are prefixed to the data during the formatting process in the RSCC just prior to the uplink.

## Unique Priority Commands

Those commands identified by priority ECR's.

## VAL-Validation CAP

A class of command analysis patterns. When the RSCC receives data (or requests) from CCATS, it generates a VAL CAP to indicate its acceptance or rejection of the data or request. The RSCC may reject the request or data on the basis of checks made which identify transmission errors. It may also reject a request in the event the request processing would conflict with RSCC activities already in process. For example: if it receives a request for uplink while another uplink is in process, it will reject the request and generate a VAL CAP to inform MCC. This type VAL CAP is sometimes called a NON VAL CAP. The different types of VAL CAPS are listed below:

- 1. Load validation or non validation
- 2. RTC Execute command request, validation or non validation
- 3. Load Execute command request validation or non validation
- 4. Program Request validation or non validation.

#### Vehicle Addresses

All command words are prefixed with a three-data bit code denoting the vehicle to which the command is directed. The codes are as follows:

000 - spare 001 - spare 010 - spare 011 - LM 100 - CSM 101 - spare 110 - spare 111 - SIVB/IU

The codes are prefixed to the data during the formatting process in the RSCC just prior to the uplink.

#### VER-Verification CAP

A class of command analysis patterns. When the RSCC receives, accepts, and processes a request from CCATS, the RSCC generates a VER CAP to

inform MCC of the completion of the process. For example: the RSCC receives a request for uplink, it accepts the request and generates a VAL CAP (see VAL), it then processes the request and performs the uplink. In the uplink process, it makes use of the telemetry downlink to assure itself of a satisfactory uplink. When the uplink is completely finished and verified, it generates a VER CAP to inform MCC of the successful completion of the uplink. The VER CAP may also inform MCC of the unsuccessful completion of an uplink. If that is the case, information relating to WHY the uplink was unsuccessful is included. In summary, the VER CAP relates the end results of the request received by the RSCC. Different types of verifications are listed below:

Execute command request for an RTC - S/C VER
 Execute command request for an RTC - ground reject
 Execute command request for an RTC - S/C reject
 Execute command request for a LOAD - S/C VER
 Execute command request for a LOAD - ground reject
 Execute command request for a LOAD - S/C reject
 Comparison error words 1 and 2
 Load clear accomplished

9. Command terminate accomplished
