

INTRO

his issue of MILL arrives on the Day of the Dead — Dia De Los Muetros — a time to honor the spirits of those who have passed to the other world before us. As you may notice scanning these pages, the rest of November is fairly lively, thank you very much.Notably, the first two weekends offer us a chance to get inside the studios of a wide array of local artists through the Orange County Artists Guild Open Studio Tour. There are dozens of artists to see and although we encourage you to visit a few far flung, even a short jaunt through town puts you in contact with a good deal of art.

This month also brings us the Carrboro Film Festival — 27 local films in all, including intriguing titles such as *If the Fish Could Talk* and *Skip Rogerson, Extreme Walker* (full schedule is on page 10). That's Nov. 18 on the big screen at the Century Center — don't miss it.

Music and theater also pepper the don't-miss category with *Crimes of the Heart* continuing its run at Playmakers and the debut at the ArtsCenter of *Tupelo: To Elvis and the town he left behind*, the inaugural event of the Southern Writers in Performance Series. The show, written by by local playwright Paul Newell and directed by Paul Ferguson, has several special performances and events including a Gospel Night on Nov. 9, a tribute to the King by Keith Henderson Nov. 10 and a discussion on Elvis and academia at Bulls Head Bookshop on Nov. 11. Uhhuh-huh.

November concerts include record release parties by A.C. Bushnell and Randy Witt & The Grits at the ArtsCenter, and at the Cradle a Nov. 4 WCOM benefit and a Nov. 21 Helping Hands Mission benefit with seven great bands. As for the Day of the Dead, you can celebrate the dancing skeletons in style via Charanga Carolina with Eduardo de Souza's Holy Samba at the ArtsCenter.

RON LIBERTI

"I couldn't let go of these," he said of the clothes in the frame. Later he added: "I guess what I'm trying to say is that my life and my art are one and the same."

Liberti made his way here in late summer 1991 after getting his BFA in painting (minor in film) from Montclair State University in his native New Jersey. This was his second stop in the South. (He gave up a promising career as a garbage man in North Myrtle beach to join us.)

Known more for his music at first (Pipe, Ghost of Rock, Clok Lok), he built a collection of posters and silk screens that earned him a shelf in the Southern Folklife Collection and, through the Internet, a growing number of fans around the world. He's been getting out more, exhibiting at Flatstock in both Seattle and Austin at this year's South By Southwest. He spent three weeks in The Netherlands — Den Haag to be precisise — where he served as artist in residentce and poster collaborater for the club in the basement of the art collective where he stayed. His art is fluid, he notes, and the trip away from the daily grind in Carrboro left him time to draw and stretch out a bit.

Liberti's works, including the print which became this month's cover, will be on display at the first show at Johnny's Sporting Goods on Friday Nov. 12. He'll be joined by painter Dan Tate.

INSIDE COMMUNITY RADIO by DJ Doctor Tofu

WCOM LP FM 103.5 is a 100 watt FM station serving the Chapel Hill-Carrboro Community. Each week we present a brief view of the goings-on in the "100 watt wonder." Change is a constant at community radio, evidenced this week by the revamping of our daily local reporting on "The West End Report," from 6 to 6:30pm Monday to Friday. The new lineup has Kirk Ross of *The Carrboro Citizen* trying his hand at the Monday slot. Susan continues on Tuesdays, where a regular feature is a 6:20pm phone interview with Carrboro Mayor Mark Chilton. Local musician and WCOM founder e-Chris Frank rejoins the Report each Wednesday. I'm leaving the Thursday slot in favor of Linda Hill, with

her focus on local nonprofits (she switches from the Monday slot). And on Friday, the Report focuses on the arts scene as Jackie and Audrey liven up the scene.

In the context of these changes, Kirby and I are sad to report that the Chapel Hill Carrboro Gay Lesbian Bi Trans and All Gender Chorus (CHCGLBTAGC) will no longer be live in the studio each Thursday. But we do have them on tape, including the incredibly sensual sounds of our mysterious local conga player.

The West End Report has been noted for incisive political coverage and local controversy. I am hesitant to put in print all these events. But I would like to point out that the show was the first radio station to ever do a live broadcast from the Carrboro Board of Aldermen. And across the way in Chapel Hill, the station's first-ever live remote was at the dedication of Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard (renaming from Airport). Each of these did cause some controversy, notably on the OrangePolitics blog, at the time.

This short update is the first in a weekly series peeking behind the control board into YOUR community radio station. If you'd like to volunteer, or simply want a program schedule or more info, be sure to check out the station website or better yet, listen to 103.5 LP FM, on the airwaves or on the internet!







BUSHNELL'S WATER DANCE

.C. Bushnell has a story to tell and he is not inclined to wait. That's been evident as he's made the rounds talking to media and promoting a new record and a big show to celebrate it.

Yes, he's proud of the new work and excited about the show, but what he really wants to get across is for you, too, to not wait around for life to happen.

The longtime fiddler, who has played with the Red Clay Ramblers and formed the Stillhouse Bottom Band, was faced with the prospect of a life cut short a couple of years back when he was diagnosed with liver cancer. He fought it and won, but knows, as so many cancer survivors know, that life is fragile, precious and brief. For A.C., even a moment on idle is too long.

Given a chance, thanks to a successful operation, he resolved to take up the projects he's always wanted to try and to expand his music and horizons. Some of the results of that resolve can be witnessed on Saturday, Nov. 3, when Bushnell is joined by 16 fellow musicians for a

party at the ArtsCenter to celebrate the release of Dancing on the Water — a CD of wide-ranging collaborations. He'll be joined on stage by The Stillhouse Bottom Band, his longtime bluegrass and old-time bandmates (Bushnell's home overlooks Stillhouse Bottom), as well as a powerhouse called the Happyjoy Band, which features Robert Sledge (of Ben Folds Five fame), guitarist Will McFarlane, drummer Kevin Brock and Bland Simpson, who's been a friend since the two met in the Greenwich Village folk scene in the '60s. In fact, it was Simpson's decision to head back to North Carolina that brought Bushnell to the area, and the longtime Red Clay Rambler will emcee the ArtsCenter show.

And while there will be plenty of old-time sounds at the show as well as rock and folk tunes, Bushnell and friends will reach even further back, adding ancient chants to the strings.

Dancing on the Water is more than a record, it is a promise fulfilled, and the lessons are woven in it by a man who has had a second chance. A.C. Bushnell has a story to tell, and he is not inclined to wait. *

"Jimi Hendrix of the fiddle" Bushnell lets go of "Dancing On the Water" with a whole load of other performers the very next day. And while it's not strictly music, it is a play about Elvis, or at least his hometown. Tupelo: to Elvis and the Town He Left Behind opens on the 8th.

Cat's Cradle and WXYC are bringing back the ever-stylish '80s with the '80s dance party on the 2nd. Michael Jackson will be in attendance — the old one, not the new guy.

Only two days later, the Cradle teams up with the town's government-funded radio station. Joe Romeo & The Orange County Volunteers take the stage with four more to raise money for WCOM. Later that month: The Polyphonic Spree. Why polyphonic? Because there are a lot of them, and that's how you make "symphonic rock."

And Thanksgiving is about sharing, like the elementary school pictures of Pilgrims and Indians sharing turkeys and corn (presumably this is pre-Trail of Tears). So help someone else at the Pre-Turkey Day Jam. It is seriously American music. Proceeds go to the Helping Hand Mission. Ten bucks buys you six acts and a warm fuzzy feeling.

And on the 24th, musicians will (I'm assuming) prostrate themselves for your approval at the Gorilla Productions Battle of the Bands. So that's a nice change.

See the Red Hot Poker Dots at The Cave on the 9th. These Australian musicians are celebrated internationally for their high-energy performances and unique brand of "Swampy-tonk." Also internationally known and spelunking this month: The Ramblers on the 24th.

Keep an eye out towards the end of the month for Reproductive Rights. Open Eye hosts "Choice" on the 29th, which could be considered a primer for Ipas' Rock for Reproductive Rights on the first of December.
