
for, I expect we'll see sweaters in style a littler earlier than usual.



Art walking

Several openings are coming with this month's 2ndFriday Artwalk on, well, Friday, Sept. 10.

Among the highlights are the North Carolina Clay Invitational at FRANK Gallery, which features the works of more than 30 artists from around the state, including Nick Joerling, Leah Leitsen, Cynthia Bringle, Suze Lindsay, Mary Ann Prack and many others, as well as Chatham County's own Mark Hewitt. Also: "Local Motives," new paintings by Shannon Bueker of Not Now, Kato! Fine Art Studio in Pittsboro.

Hewitt Kiln opening

The works coming out of the 79th firing of Mark Hewitt's salt kiln have a local twist. According to Hewitt, a new glaze variation using Chapel Hill grit fired to a soft, shiny gray has yielded a perfect salt glaze.

The local grit, along with new vases inspired by classical Greek styles, is available this Saturday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Sunday from noon to 5 p.m.

Art glass and snapshots at the Ackland

The new Ackland exhibit "Flowers from Earth and Sand: Art Glass and Ceramics, 1880-1950" opens Sept. 12 and runs through Dec. 12.

The collection features a look at the bold innovations in decorative art that happened between the 1880s and the 1930s, including the glazes and ornament designs of artists like the Frenchman Clement Massier and the craftsmen of the Hungarian Zsolnay Factory. Nearly a hundred examples of luxury vases and other vessels with accompanying prints, posters and illustrated books show how the style expressed in these luxury objects also infused popular culture.

Later this month, the Ackland opens "Big Shots: Andy Warhol Polaroids," an exhibit featuring 250 Polaroids and 70 silver gelatin black-and-white prints taken by Warhol between 1970 and 1987, many of them on public view for the first time.



If you're lucky in life, you may someday realize your destiny. If you are very lucky, you may achieve it.

The Eater's old pal Andy McMillan is of the very lucky few. Andy, a Chapel Hill native and the son of Florence and the late Campbell "Dr. Mac" McMillan, owned and ran the fondly remembered Lizard & Snake, which featured southwestern cuisine.

Lately, he's been putting in a lot of miles hauling and setting up exhibits for Carrboro design firm Sitzer-Spuria Studios. In addition to being able to tell you everything you wanted to know about various convention centers, McMillan has become a discriminating enthusiast when it comes to Pad Thai.

A month or two back, he was eating a particularly tasty dish of the southeast Asian favorite, when it hit him.

"I said to myself, 'I could eat this every day'," he told The Eater in an exclusive interview. "So I did."

For a fortnight, McMillan sought out and consumed Pad Thai in 13 restaurants throughout the Chapel Hill-Carrboro metroplex.

The results of this intrepid, peanut-topped adventure are far too detailed to work into the space allotted. But Mc-Millan's findings have been verified since by not only this reporter but also a myriad of fellow Pad Thai fans.

In the top tier, all-alone,

says Andy, is Merlion in Southern Village, which serves up a balanced, complex and thoroughly enjoyable version.

In the next tier is Thai Palace – which could have ranked a tier higher, but was deemed a little pricey – and Penang.

Occupying the next tier are the two (apparently unrelated)

China Woks, in Timberlyne and Carrboro Plaza, and downtown Carrboro's Jade Palace, which is good, McMillan says, but untraditional in its flavorings. "It's a little weird."

Way down at the bottom of the list is Noodles and Company on Franklin Street. "They served me something that looked a little like Pad Thai, but it wasn't Pad Thai."

We commend McMillan on his valiant effort and are awaiting the next chapter in his culinary quests. His next exploit, no doubt cooked up over a long haul from Vegas or something, is a little worrisome in the cholesterol department.

"I've been thinking a lot about BLTs," he said.

The Eater, who out of sheer concern suggests splitting them with someone, stands ready to help.

BEST. FOOD. EVER.

The above title was intended just to get attention (we're all so busy these days). "Best of" lists are tedious and kind of pointless, and The Eater would never stoop so low as to have a "Best of" contest. When it comes to food, "the wisdom of the crowd" is more often "the reflex of the herd." Besides, why have a contest when you've already made up your mind?

So, with no fanfare other than the windy paragraph above, The

ater

Eater names Brinkley Farms field peas the Best Food Ever of 2010.

Cooked right with a little pork and served with some butter and salt they are over-the-top wonderful. They're available at many of the local farmers' markets in the shell or shelled and fresh frozen. Brinkley, which converted from growing mainly tobacco several years ago, is a heavy producer of the classic varieties of Southern field peas, which are among the most healthy and delicious foods you can add to your diet.

Eat some. Awesome. Not kidding.

DO'S AND DONUTS

Ok, you're going to have to admit that it is likely you're going to have a Krispy Kreme adventure at some point. As someone who just offered to help eat a dozen or so BLTs, The Eater is no one to preach. But if you must venture to East Franklin Street and do something you'll never admit to your cardiologist, at least wait till the "hot" sign comes on and those little wheels of wonder are at their most sublime.



ROLLING EATS: A SURVEY OF LOCAL FOOD TRUCKS

We've been privy to the taco truck secret for some time now, but what no one predicted was mobile food's voracious expansion. It's not just taco trucks that pepper the town anymore: Food trucks are everywhere, with pasta, Indian, crepe, burger and juice offerings joining the ranks. We're fortunate to be at the heart of this mobile gastronomy, but you've gotta know where to look.

CAPTAIN PONCHO'S

The only truck to serve breakfast, Captain Poncho's offers the reliable and quick breakfast burrito. And for those looking for something more authentic, the chilaquiles, a traditional Mexican breakfast dish with fried tortilla strips (handmade tortilla, that is) topped with your choice of meat and salsa roja or mole. The pastor (pork) is a common favorite – it's spicy and contains chunks of grilled pineapple. Ask about the cabeza de puerco, a pork head steamed with marinade and spices.

OnlyBurger is unique to Durham, but an anxious clientele to the west is eagerly anticipating the truck's occasional visit around these parts. It offers no frills – burgers and fries made to order in less than 10 minutes – but it's hard to find a better burger. OnlyBurger is always on the move for lunch and dinner, so check Twitter before setting out to find it. And if you're going to the Durham Farmers' Market, the truck will be there – best not leave without having the breakfast burger, which comes with an egg or a fried green tomato.

No need to go to a fancy French restaurant: Sweet and savory delights a la française are served in trucks too. The savory La Fermière – fried egg, spinach, cheese and veggie or pork sausage wrapped in a warm crepe – is a foodie's dream, and there's always the old standby dessert crepe, nutella and banana. Vegans and vegetarians aren't left out either: For a savory crepe, you can choose from classic, buckwheat or vegan batter; and for a sweet one, the classic or chocolate batter. The menu is ever-changing at Parlez-Vous Crepe, but almost anything the French-educated chef cooks is delish.

COSTA SUR

For those living in town, this truck, which sits adjacent to downtown Carrboro, is one of the more convenient locations to grab grub on wheels. Tamales are a specialty, particularly tamales de pollo en salsa verde (chicken tamale with green salsa). If you're really hungry, get a torta, an enormous sandwich on thick Mexican-baked bread, and don't be afraid to order it with buche (beef belly). Wash it down with one of the melon juices (aguas frescas).

A GUY WITH A LITERARY HABIT

Rosencrans Baldwin

osecrans Baldwin describes writers as "big-time book addicts." For him, the addiction began early: As a kid, he was a regular at Barrett's Bookstore in Darien, Conn., where Michael, behind the counter, always had a new title to recommend. Baldwin was allowed to take one book home every time he visited; his parents weren't wealthy, but they valued reading.

Baldwin looks at reading as a gateway to writing, so it's not much of a leap to speculate that he also finds writing addictive. A story he wrote as a sixth-grader, about a knight and a dragon, won a state contest. (Baldwin points out that he arrived at the awards ceremony to find himself in the midst of 4,000 other winners – but still.)

He braved the seriously cold winters of Waterville, Maine to take advantage of Colby College's excellent English department, where he minored in creative writing and focused on poetry. And who else but a writing addict would finish two (as-yet-unpublished) novels in his 20s, while also co-founding an online magazine, *The Morning News*, and doing stints as a pizza deliveryman and an ambulance attendant?

If it is an addiction, it's one that's starting to pay off, and not just for Baldwin. The Aug. 12 launch party at Flyleaf Books for Baldwin's newest novel drew more than 110 people, and the lucky attendees who bought a copy of the book before it sold out have a great read in store for them. You Lost Me There is a finely crafted story of a 50-something Alzheimer's researcher, who, after his wife's death, grows concerned with his own memory, questioning his recollections of his marriage. The evocative setting - Mt. Desert Island, Maine, where Baldwin spent his childhood summers - and fascinating characters make You Lost Me There very hard to put down.


It probably also takes a true writing addict to maintain a schedule like Baldwin's. He's now working on both a novel set in Tijuana and a travelogue-essay about Paris, where he and his wife spent a year and a half before moving to North Carolina. He's involved with *The Morning News*, writing and editing as well as searching the Internet for interesting news items to link to the site. And there are all the promotional activities required of an author whose new book is generating a lot of attention – such as a trip to Barrett's in September for another launch party for *You Lost Me There*. Michael has already been sent a copy.

We were thrilled to learn that one of news reporting's superheroes, Nicolas Kristof, will be in Chapel Hill on Sept. 14 to discuss *Half the Sky: Turning Oppression into Opportunity for Women Worldwide*, the book he's written with his wife, Sheryl WuDunn. His talk, part of the Frank Porter Graham lecture series, is free to the public and begins at 7:30 p.m. in Memorial Hall on the UNC campus.


