A-1002. MEDAL OF HONOR.—The act of August 7, 1942, amending the act of Febrary 4, 1919, provides in section 1: "That the President of the United States be, and he is hereby, authorized to present, in the name of Congress, a Medal of Honor to any person who, while in the naval service of the United States, shall, in action involving actual conflict with the enemy, or in the line of his profession, distinguish himself conspicuously by gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty and without detriment to the mission of his command or to the command to which attached: Provided, That the design of this medal shall be the same as that adopted pursuant to the act approved December 21, 1861 (12 Stat. 330)." However, for the information of those holding Medals of Honor previously authorized by law, the following information is pertinent:

The Medal of Honor for enlisted men was originally authorized in the act of December 21, 1861. This act was subsequently modified many times, and finally in the act of March 3, 1901, the following provision was made: "That any enlisted man of the Navy or Marine Corps who shall have distinguished himself in battle or displayed extraordinary heroism in the line of his profession shall, upon the recommendation of his commanding officer, approved by the flag officer and the Secretary of the Navy, receive a gratuity and Medal of Honor as provided for seamen in section 1407 of the Revised Statutes." This gratuity for enlisted men was set at \$100.

The Medal of Honor was originally authorized for officers of the Navy and Marine Corps in the act of March 3, 1915, which provides: "The President of the United States is hereby empowered to prepare a suitable Medal of Honor to be awarded to any officer of the Navy, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard who shall have distinguished himself in battle or displayed extraordinary heroism in the line of his profession."

A-1003. MEDAL OF HONOR (1917-18).—The act of February 4, 1919, provides: "That the President of the United States be, and is hereby authorized, to present in the name of Congress, a Medal of Honor to any person who, while in the naval service of the United States, shall, in action involving actual conflict with the enemy, distinguish himself conspicuously by gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty and without detriment to the mission of his command or the command to which attached."

(For service in actual combat with the enemy during World War I only.) For gratuity see table on page 1-13.

A-1004. MEDAL OF HONOR ROLL.—Public Act No. 56, approved April 27, 1916, established in the War Department and in the Navy Department, respectively, a roll, designated as "the Army and Navy medal of honor roll."

Upon written application made to the Secretary of the proper department, and subject to the conditions and requirements hereinafter contained, the name of each surviving person who has served in the military or naval service of the United States in any war, who has attained or shall attain the age of 65 years, and who has been awarded a Medal of Honor for having in action involving actual conflict with an enemy distinguished himself conspicuously by gallantry or intrepidity, at the risk of his life, above and beyond the call of duty, and who was honorably discharged from the service by muster out, resignation, or otherwise, shall be, by the Secretary of the proper department, entered and recorded on said roll. Applications for entry on said roll shall be made in such form and under such regulations as shall be prescribed by the War Department and Navy Department, respectively, and proper blanks and instructions shall be, by the proper Secretary, furnished without charge upon request made by any person claiming the benefits of this act.

It shall be the duty of the Secretary of War and of the Secretary of the Navy to carry this act into effect and to decide whether each applicant, under this act, in his department is entitled to the benefit of this act. If the official award of the Medal of Honor to the applicant, or the official notice to him thereof, shall appear to show that the Medal of Honor was awarded to the applicant for such an act as is required by the provisions of this act, it shall be deemed sufficient to entitle the applicant to such special pension without further investigation. Otherwise, all official correspondence, orders, reports, recommendations, requests, and other evidence now on file in any public office or department shall be considered. A certificate of service and of the act of heroism, gallantry, bravery, or intrepidity for which the Medal of Honor was awarded, and of enrollment under this act, and of the right of the special pensioner to be entitled to and to receive the special pension herein granted, shall be furnished each person whose name shall be so entered on said roll. The Secretary of War and the Secretary of the Navy shall deliver to the Commissioner of Pensions a certified copy of each of such said certificates as he may issue, as aforesaid, and the same shall be full and sufficient authority to the Commissioner of Pensions for the payment by him to the beneficiary named in each such certificate the special pension herein provided for.

Each such surviving person whose name shall have been entered on said roll in accordance with this act shall be entitled to and shall receive and be paid by the Commissioner of Pensions in the Department of the Interior, out of any moneys in the Treasury of the United States not otherwise appropriated, a special pension of \$10 per month for life, payable quarter yearly. The Commissioner of Pensions shall make all necessary rules and regulations for making payment of such special pensions to the beneficiaries thereof.

Such special pension shall begin on the day that such person shall file his application for enrollment on said roll in the office of the Secretary of War or of the Secretary of the Navy after the passage and approval of this act, and shall continue during the life of the beneficiary.

Such special pension shall not deprive any such special pensioner of any other pension or of any benefit, right, or privilege to which he is or may hereafter be entitled under any existing or subsequent law, but shall be in addition thereto.

The special pension allowed under this act shall not be subject to any attachment, execution, levy, tax, lien, or detention under any process whatever.

In case any person has been awarded two or more Medals of Honor, he shall not be entitled to and shall not receive more than one such special pension.

Men in the service shall not be considered in applications filed under this act.

A-1005. NAVY CROSS.—The act of August 7, 1942 (sec. 2), amending the act of February 4, 1919, provides: "That the President be, and he hereby is, further authorized to present, but not in the name of Congress, a Navy Cross of appropriate design and ribbon, together with a rosette or other device to be worn in lieu thereof, to any person who, while serving in any capacity with the naval service of the United States, distinguishes himself by extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy."

A-1006. DISTINGUISHED SERVICE MEDAL.—The act of August 7, 1942 (sec. 3), amending the act of February 4, 1919, provides: "That the President be, and he hereby is, further authorized to present, but not in the name of Congress, a Distinguished Service Medal of appropriate design and a ribbon, together with a rosette or other device to be worn in lieu thereof, to any person who, while serving in any capacity with the Navy of the United States, since the sixth day of April 1917 has distinguished, or who hereafter shall distinguish himself by exceptionally meritorious service to the Government in a duty of great responsibility."

A-1007. LEGION OF MERIT.—The act of July 20, 1942 (sec. 2 (1)), provides: "That there is hereby created a decoration to be known as the 'Legion of Merit', which shall have suitable appurtenances and devices and not more than four degrees, and which the President, under such rules and regulations as he shall prescribe, may award to—

- (a) Personnel of the armed forces of the United States and of the Government of the Philippines, and
- (b) Personnel of the armed forces of friendly foreign nations who, since the proclamation of an emergency by the President on September 8, 1939, shall have distinguished themselves by exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding services."

The following detailed regulations govern the award of the Legion of Merit, and the preparation and submission of recommendations therefor:

- (a) Personnel of armed forces of the United States and of the Government of the Philippines:
 - (1) The award of the Legion of Merit to personnel of the armed forces of the United States and of the Government of the Philippines shall be made as the "Legion of Merit" without reference to any degree, to such personnel who qualify therefor in accordance with the creating law.
 - (2) For this purpose, the medal and ribbon for the degree of Legionnaire as prescribed for award to foreign personnel will be used. For a second award of the Legion of Merit to an individual a Gold Star to be worn upon the ribbon will be awarded in lieu of a second medal.
 - (3) The Legion of Merit will take precedence next after the Distinguished Service Medal.
 - (4) Recommendations shall be made to the Secretary of the Navy, or to those Fleet Commanders to whom authority to make the award has been delegated, in accordance with instructions now in force for award of other decorations.
 - (5) No award of the Legion of Merit will be made to a civilian.



- (b) Personnel of the armed forces of friendly foreign nations:
 - (1) The award of the Legion of Merit to personnel of friendly foreign nations shall be made in the appropriate one of four degrees as follows:
 - a. Chief Commander.
 - b. Commander.
 - c. Officer.
 - d. Legionnaire.
 - (2) No award of the Legion of Merit in any degree will be made to a civilian.
 - (3) This award will be made to personnel of the armed forces of friendly foreign nations only with the approval of the President of the United States in each case.
 - (4) Each case will be submitted separately.
 - (5) Recommendations for this award of a specific degree, or of appropriate degree, via official channels, to the Secretary of the Navy may be made by an officer of the armed forces of the United States who has personal knowledge of the service performed. The service will be described specifically and in detail. When practicable, testimony of other individuals having personal knowledge of the service performed will be submitted with the recommendation. Each recommendation will contain a draft of an appropriate citation. The recommendation must show that the individual recommended has distinguished himself by exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding services. Each basic recommendation will show the exact status of the recommended individual at the time of the performance of the services upon which the recommendation is based. In recommendations based upon services covering an appreciable period of time, the exact period will be stated.
 - (6) No award of the same or of a lower degree will be made to an individual who has previously been awarded the Legion of Merit. A higher degree may be awarded if subsequent services warrant.

Presentation of the Legion of Merit will be made with ceremonies appropriate to the individual case and as practicable under the existing circumstances.

Awards of the Legion of Merit may be made posthumously and presented to such representative as may be designated.

All awards of the Legion of Merit shall be made in the name of the President of the United States.

A-1008. SILVER STAR MEDAL.—The act of August 7, 1942 (sec. 4), provides: "That the President be, and he hereby is, further authorized to present, but not in the name of Congress, a Silver Star Medal of appropriate design and a ribbon, together with a rosette or other device to be worn in lieu thereof, to any person who, while serving in any capacity with the Navy of the United States, since December 6, 1941, has distinguished himself or who hereafter shall distinguish himself conspicuously by gallantry and intrepidity in action, such gallantry and service not being sufficient to justify the award of a Medal of Honor or a Navy Cross."

The act of August 7, 1942 (sec. 10) provides: "That in cases of persons now in the naval service for whom the award of the Medal of Honor, Distinguished Service Medal, or Navy Cross, has been recommended in full compliance with then existing regulations, but on account of services which, though insufficient fully to justify the award of the Medal of Honor, the Distinguished Service Medal, or the Navy Cross, appears to have been such as to justify the award of the Silver Star Medal * * *, hereinbefore provided, such cases may be considered and acted upon under the provisions of this act authorizing the award of the Silver Star Medal * * *, notwithstanding that said services may have been rendered more than 5 years before said cases shall have been considered as authorized by this proviso, but all consideration or any action upon any of said cases shall be based exclusively upon official records now on file in the Navy Department."

A-1009. DISTINGUISHED FLYING CROSS.—Section 12 of the act of July 2, 1926, promulgated by Executive Order No. 4576 of January 28, 1927, amended by Executive Order No. 7786 of January 8, 1938, provides:

- (1) Distinguished Flying Cross is awarded to any person who while serving in any capacity with the Air Corps of the Army of the United States, including the National Guard and Organized Reserves, or with the United States Navy or the Coast Guard of the United States subsequent to April 6, 1917, has distinguished himself by heroism or extraordinary achievement while participating in aerial flight.
- (2) No person is eligible for the award of the Distinguished Flying Cross for an act performed prior to November 11, 1918, except—
 - (a) Officers or enlisted men who have heretofore been recommended for but have not received the Congressional Medal of Honor, the Distinguished Service Medal, or Navy Cross.
 - (b) Officers or enlisted men who displayed heroism while serving as instructors or students at flying schools.
- (3) Subject to other special conditions prescribed in the law, the following classes of persons are eligible for the award of the Distinguished Flying Cross:
 - (a) All members of the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, and the Coast Guard while participating in an aerial flight as part of the duties incident to such membership.
 - (b) All members of the National Guard not in Federal Service, the Organized Reserves, the Officers' Reserve Corps, the Enlisted Reserve Corps, the Naval Reserves, and the Marine Corps Reserves, not on active duty, while participating in an aerial flight as part of the duties incident to such membership.
 - (o) Members of the military, naval, or air forces of foreign governments while serving with the military or naval forces of the United States, while participating in an aerial flight.
- (4) Civilians are not eligible for the award of the Distinguished Flying Cross (Executive Order March 1, 1927).
- (5) For any act of heroism or extraordinary achievement performed subsequent to July 2, 1926, the Distinguished Flying Cross will not be awarded after more than 3 years from the date of the act or achievement, nor unless the recommendation therefor shall have been made at the time of the act or within 2 years thereafter.
- (6) Attention is invited to the fact that the medal is limited to awards in recognition of acts of heroism or of extraordinary achievement

during an aerial flight, and that it is not conferred in recognition of general service, or for research or development work in connection with aeronautics. Recommendations must, therefore, be based on acts of heroism or of extraordinary achievement during one particular flight. The recommendation should contain a specific statement setting forth the particular flight on which the recommendation is based.

A-1010. NAVY AND MARINE CORPS MEDAL.—The act of August 7, 1942 (sec. 5), provides: "That the President be, and he hereby is, further authorized to present, but not in the name of Congress, a medal to be known as the Navy and Marine Corps Medal, of appropriate design with accompanying ribbon, together with a rosette or other device to be worn in lieu thereof, to any person who while serving in any capacity with the United States Navy or Marine Corps, including the Naval Reserve or Marine Corps Reserve, shall have, since December 6, 1941, distinguished himself or herself by heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy, or to any person to whom the Secretary of the Navy has heretofore awarded a letter of commendation for heroism, regardless of the date of such act of heroism, who makes application for such medal. No additional pay shall be payable under section 6 for service rendered prior to the date of the enactment of this section by virtue of the award of a Navy and Marine Corps Medal based upon any act of heroism performed prior to December 7, 1941."

The act of August 7, 1942 (sec. 10), provides: "That in cases of persons now in the naval service for whom the award of the Medal of Honor, Distinguished Service Medal, or Navy Cross, has been recommended in full compliance with then existing regulations, but on account of services which, though insufficient fully to justify the award of the Medal of Honor, the Distinguished Service Medal, or the Navy Cross, appear to have been such as to justify the award of the * * Navy and Marine Corps Medal hereinbefore provided, such cases may be considered and acted upon under the provisions of this act authorizing the award of * * * the Navy and Marine Corps Medal, notwithstanding that said services may have been rendered more than 5 years before said cases shall have been considered as authorized by this proviso, but all consideration or any action upon any of said cases shall be based exclusively upon official records now on file in the Navy Department."

Holders of Letters of Commendation awarded by the Secretary of the Navy for heroism not involving combat, to become eligible for the award of the Navy and Marine Corps Medal, shall submit applications to the Secretary of the Navy for such award.

These applications, together with a copy of the Letter of Commendation awarded previously by the Secretary of the Navy, shall be reviewed by the Navy Department Permanent Board of Awards and submitted to the Secretary of the Navy for his action.

Upon receipt of the Secretary's approval in each case the Bureau of Naval Personnel or Marine Corps, as appropriate, will issue to such applicant a Navy and Marine Medal without citation.

A-1011. AIR MEDAL.—Executive Order No. 9158 of May 11, 1942, provides: "By virtue of the authority vested in me as President of the United States and as Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, it is hereby ordered that an Air Medal, with accompanying ribbons, be established for award to any person who, while serving in any capacity in or with the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard of the United States subsequent to September 8,

1939, distinguishes, or has distinguished, himself by meritorious achievement while participating in an aerial flight.

"The Air Medal and appurtenances thereto shall be of appropriate design approved by the Secretary of War, the Secretary of the Navy, and the Secretary of the Treasury, and, under such regulations as said Secretaries may prescribe, may be awarded by the Secretary of War, the Secretary of the Navy, or the Secretary of the Treasury, or by such commanding officers of the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard as the said Secretaries may respectively designate. Awards to personnel of the Coast Guard when serving under his jurisdiction shall be made by or under the direction of the Secretary of the Navy."

A-1012. PURPLE HEART.—General Order No. 186, of January 21, 1943, promulgating Executive Order No. 9277, of December 3, 1942, provides:

"EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 9277

"Award of the Purple Heart to Persons Serving with the Navy, Marine Corps or Coast Guard of the United States

"Whereas the decoration of the Purple Heart is awarded, as prescribed by Army Regulations of September 4, 1942, to persons serving with the Navy, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard of the United States:

"Now, therefore, by virtue of the authority vested in me as President of the United States, and as Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, it is hereby ordered as follows:

- "(1) The Secretary of the Navy is authorized and directed to award the Purple Heart in the name of the President of the United States to persons who, while heretofore or hereafter serving in any capacity with the Navy, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard of the United States, are wounded in action against an enemy of the United States, or as a result of an act of such enemy, provided such wound necessitates treatment by a medical officer.
- "(2) Except as authorized in paragraph 3 hereof, no more than one Purple Heart shall be awarded to any one person, but for each subsequent justification (different engagement) for such an award, a Gold Star, or other suitable device shall be awarded, to be worn with the Purple Heart, as prescribed by appropriate regulations.
- "(3) The Secretary of the Navy is further authorized and directed to award the Purple Heart posthumously, in the name of the President of the United States, to any persons who, while serving in any capacity with the Navy, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard of the United States, since December 6, 1941, are killed in action or who die as a direct result of wounds received in action with an enemy of the United States, or as a result of an act of such enemy. The Purple Heart will be forwarded to the nearest of kin of any person entitled to the posthumous award, regardless of whether a previous award has been made to such person.
- "(4) If so authorized by the Secretary of the Navy, the award of the Purple Heart may be made by the Commander in Chief of a fleet, or by such other appropriate officers as the Secretary of the Navy may designate.
- "(5) The Secretary of the Navy is authorized to promulgate such regulations as he may deem appropriate to effectuate the purposes hereof. The regulations of the Secretary of the Navy hereunder, and the regulations of the Secretary of War with respect to the award of the Purple Heart to persons serving in any capacity with the Army of the United States, shall, so far as practicable, be of uniform application.

Commanders in Chief of Fleets and Commander Southwest Pacific Force are authorized to make awards and present the Purple Heart in the name of the President. Commanders in Chief of Fleets only may delegate their authority to Task Force Commanders for designated periods when lack of adequate communications may prevent awards being made within a reasonable time.

One award (the Purple Heart for the first wound, the Gold Star thereafter) is authorized for each wound, except that one such award only is authorized for two or more wounds received contemporaneously from the same agent or missile, or from two or more agents or missiles. An award is not authorized for wounds in any case where medical treatment was not given.

When a person entitled to the award under the above paragraph is admitted to a hospital for treatment of a wound, or when any such person is treated for a wound without being admitted to a hospital, the Commanding Officer of the hospital or, in the latter case, the medical officer treating the wound will furnish the Commanding Officer of the wounded person with a report of the nature of the wound and certify as to the necessity for treatment. This information may be furnished to the commanders of higher units in the form of certified lists and will be transmitted by them to the officer having authority to make the award. Lists of such persons serving in units not under the command of an officer having such delegated authority will be forwarded to the Chief of Naval Personnel, the Commandant, United States Marine Corps or the Commandant, United States Coast Guard as appropriate.

Whenever a person in the Naval Service is awarded a Purple Heart, suitable report, setting forth the circumstances and nature of the injury, should be sent to the Navy Department for entry in his official record.

Persons entitled to the award of the Purple Heart by reason of wounds, who have been transferred to other commands prior to date of the order and who have not received the award, may make application to their respective commanding officers for the award. The commanding officers will substantiate, if possible, the basis for the award by health record, physical examination or other factual evidence and forward certified lists indicating evidence of basis of award in the manner described in above paragraph. In doubtful cases the evidence will be amplified in order that the awarding office or officer may determine the merits of the case.

Awards will be made by the officers to whom authority is delegated and by the Chief of Naval Personnel, the Commandant, United States Marine Corps, and the Commandant, United States Coast Guard as appropriate, each award to be accompanied by proper transmittal containing the phraseology "In the name of the President and by direction of the Secretary of the Navy."

Applications for the award of the Purple Heart for wounds received prior to December 7, 1941, will be forwarded to the Chief of Naval Personnel, the Commandant, United States Marine Corps, or the Commandant, United States Coast Guard, as appropriate.

The Purple Heart will be awarded posthumously by the Navy Department in accordance with paragraph 3 of Executive Order No. 9277. The Chief of Naval Personnel, the Commandant, United States Marine Corps, or the Commandant, United States Coast Guard will cause the Purple Heart, together with appropriate transmittal to be sent to the nearest of kin of persons entitled to the posthumous award as nearly coincidental as practicable with the receipt of the report of death, by the Bureau of Personnel, Headquarters, United States Marine Corps, or Headquarters, United States Coast Guard, regardless of the fact that the records may show that a previous award of this decoration has been made.

A-1013. SPECIALLY MERITORIOUS MEDAL—WAR WITH SPAIN.—The act of March 3, 1901, authorizes the award of bronze medals to officers and men of the

Navy and Marine Corps who rendered specially meritorious service, otherwise than in battle, during the War with Spain. The act further provides that any person entitled to receive recognition in more than one instance, shall, instead of a second medal, be presented with a bronze bar, appropriately inscribed, to be attached to the ribbon by which the medal is suspended. This medal is no longer issued.

A-1014. PRESIDENTIAL UNIT CITATION.—General Order No. 187 of February 3, 1943, promulgating Executive Order No. 9050 of February 6, 1942, provides:

1. Executive Order No. 9050, which authorizes and directs the Secretary of the Navy to issue a citation in the name of the President, to Navy and Marine Corps Units for outstanding performance in action, is quoted:

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 9050

"By virtue of the authority vested in me as President of the United States, and as Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, it is ordered as follows:

"1. The Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized and directed to issue a citation in the name of the President of the United States, as public evidence of deserved honor and distinction, to any ship, aircraft, or other naval unit and to any Marine Corps aircraft, detachment, or higher unit, for outstanding performance in action on or after October 16, 1941.

"2. Appropriate insignia of such form and design as may be determined by the Secretary of the Navy may be displayed by any ship, aircraft, naval unit, or any Marine Corps aircraft, detachment, or higher unit, to which such citation is issued.

"3. After any Naval or Marine Corps unit is so cited on two or more separate occasions for outstanding performance in action occurring on or after October 16, 1941, such insignia shall become a part of the uniform of such unit, and shall be issued to officers and men who may thereafter become members of such unit; and such insignia may be worn at all times by individuals who were attached to the unit so cited on one of the two or more occasions in connection with which the citation was issued, whether they thereafter serve with such unit or with a different unit.

- 2. Commanders of forces afloat will make recommendations to the Secretary of the Navy via official channels for the Presidential Unit Citation for such units of their commands as from time to time they deem worthy of such distinction. Recommendations will be confined to cases wherein the unit performs services in action above and beyond the high standard expected of our forces and is considered outstanding as compared to services of other comparable units engaged in the same or similar actions. Each recommendation will be submitted separately and will be accompanied by sufficient data forming the basis of the recommendation to enable the Navy Department Board of Decorations and Medals adequately to consider the case.
- 3. The insignia of the Unit Citation authorized by the above Executive Order shall be in the following form and design:
- (a) A burgee pennant design of blue, gold, and scarlet of 27 units on the hoist by 57 units on the fly, with the gold measuring 13 units on the hoist and 48 units on the fly centered between the blue above and the scarlet below.



- (b) For ships, aircraft units, tank units, etc., a bronze plaque is authorized to be displayed, such plaque to be of appropriate size and to have the Unit Citation Insignia centered in the upper part and the citation engraved below it. Individual planes, tanks, etc., of a cited unit are authorized to paint the design of appropriate size in a suitable place upon the plane, tank, etc.
- (c) For companies, battalions, regiments, etc., awarded the Unit Citation, a battle streamer of appropriate size with the citation engraved upon the standard is authorized.
- (d) Should a unit be cited more than once, for each citation in addition to the first for which the insignia is authorized, there shall be added one blue star up to a total of five stars. Stars will be displayed upon the gold part of the insignia. The additional citation for each star is authorized to be engraved upon the plaque.
- (e) In time of peace ships shall carry an additional display of pennant of the insignia design to be displayed at some place on the top hamper to be visible to other units.
- (f) Should a cited ship be lost, provision will be made for the display of the plaque by the namesake, if appropriate, with a notation of when and where the ship was lost; or in the event that no new ship is named for the one cited and lost, the plaque will be sent to the United States Naval Academy for appropriate display.
 - 4. The uniform insignia of the unit citation shall be as follows:
- (a) A ribbon bar similar to those worn for service medals except that the ribbon shall be 1½ by ½ inches. The ribbon shall consist of three horizontal stripes, the top stripe blue, the center stripe gold, and the lower stripe scarlet, the blue and scarlet stripes to be one-eighth inch in width and the gold stripe to be one-fourth inch in width. Citation stars one-fourth inch in diameter will be placed upon the gold stripe and will be blue. The citation ribbon shall be worn on the left breast between personal decoration ribbons and service medal ribbons.
- (b) When medals are worn on the uniform, the Presidential Unit Citation insigna will be worn on the right breast of the uniform. When so worn, the size of the ribbon shall be $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches in length, one-half inch in width, the blue and scarlet bars one-eight inch in width, the gold bar one-fourth inch in width, and the blue citation stars indicative of additional awards shall be one-fourth inch in diameter.
- (c) (1) When a unit has received the Presidential Unit Citation all personnel serving in that unit during the occasion for which cited, or any part thereof, shall wear the citation ribbon with one star permanently, regardless of where serving.
- (2) Personnel authorized to wear the citation ribbon with one star as above shall wear an additional star for each additional citation of the unit upon which they serve during the occasion for which the unit is cited, whether it be the same or another unit.
- (3) Personnel who subsequently join a unit which has been cited shall wear the plain citation ribbon without star and only while attached to that unit.
- (4) Flag officers and members of their staffs serving in a unit upon the occasion for which cited, or any part thereof, shall be included in the unit citation.

Note.—A gold star is awarded in lieu of a second award of the same decoration. Each additional award, which carries a gratuity, shall entitle the recipient to further additional pay at the rate of \$2 per month from date of the distinguished act or service for which the award is made, and such additional pay shall continue throughout his active service, whether such service shall not be continuous.

A-1015. TIME LIMIT FOR RECOMMENDATION AND AWARDS.—Except as otherwise prescribed herein, no Medal of Honor, Navy Cross, Distinguished Service Medal, Silver Star Medal, Navy and Marine Corps Medal, or bar or other suitable emblem or insignia in lieu of either of said medals or of said cross, shall be issued to any person after more than 5 years from the date of the act or service justifying the awarding thereof, nor unless a specific statement or report distinctly setting forth the act or distinguished service and suggesting or recommending official recognition thereof shall have been made by his superior through official channels at the time of act or service or within 3 years thereafter (sec. 9, act of August 7, 1942).

A-1016. LIMITATION OF MEDALS.—No more than one decoration of the same type shall be awarded to any one person, but in lieu of a second award of any one decoration, a Gold Star will be awarded (sec. 12, act of July 2, 1926; Executive Order No. 9158, May 11, 1942; General Order No. 186, January 21, 1943; and sec. 7, act of August 7, 1942).

No medal or cross or no bar or other emblem or insignia shall be awarded or presented to any individual or to the representative of any individual whose entire service subsequent to the time he distinguished himself shall not have been honorable.

A-1017. REPLACEMENT OF MEDALS.—The act of August 7, 1942 (sec. 8), provides that the Secretary of the Navy expend from the appropriation "Pay, Subsistence, and Transportation, Navy" so much as may be necessary to defray the cost of the Medals of Honor, Navy Crosses, Distinguished Service Medals, Silver Star Medals, Navy and Marine Corps Medals, and bars, emblems, or insignia herein provided for, and so much as may be necessary to replace any medals, crosses, bars, emblems, or insignia as are herein or may hereafter have been provided for: *Provided*, That such replacement shall be made only in those cases where the Medal of Honor, Navy Cross, Distinguished Service Medal, Silver Star Medal, or a Navy and Marine Corps Medal, or bar, emblem, or insignia presented under the provisions of this or any other act shall have been lost, destroyed, or rendered unfit for use without fault or neglect on the part of the person to whom it was awarded and shall be made without charge therefor.

A-1018. DELEGATION OF AUTHORITY.—The act of August 7, 1942 (sec. 11), provides: "That the President be, and he hereby is, authorized to delegate, under such conditions, regulations, and limitations as he shall prescribe, to flag officers who are commanders in chief or commanding on important independent duty the power conferred upon him by this act to award the Navy Cross, the Distinguished Service Medal, Silver Star Medal, and the Navy and Marine Corps Medal, and he is further authorized to make from time to time any and all rules, regulations, and orders which he shall deem necessary to carry into effect the provisions of this act and to execute full purpose and intention thereof."

The same applies to the Legion of Merit, Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal, and the Purple Heart Medal.

The Secretary of the Navy has delegated his authority to specific commanders to award certain medals, which authority will remain in effect until further notice.

A-1019. PRESENTATION OF DECORATIONS.

If the recipient of a Medal of Honor is within reasonable distance he will be ordered to Washington and the Medal of Honor will be presented by the President of the United States, or if such is impracticable, by the Secretary of the Navy as his personal representative. If the recipient is not within reasonable distance of Washington the Medal of Honor will be presented by the senior officer present with suitable ceremony as directed.

All other decorations, with the exception of the Purple Heart, will be presented by the Secretary of the Navy in cases of persons located in or near the city of Washington, D. C. When the presentation occurs outside the city of Washington, it will be made by the senior officer present or unit commander designated by him unless the Secretary of the Navy, the Assistant Secretary of the Navy, the Assistant Secretary of the Navy for Aeronautics, or the Chief of Naval Operations is present, when it will be made by him. If the presentation occurs within a naval command, it should be made with appropriate ceremony. The Purple Heart may be presented by the Commanding Officer of the recipient.

A-1020. LIFE-SAVING MEDALS AWARDED BY THE TREASURY DEPARTMENT.

- (1) Gold life-saving medals may be awarded to those persons who, by extreme and heroic daring, have endangered their lives in saving or endeavoring to save lives from the perils of the sea in waters over which the United States has jurisdiction, or upon American vessels.
- (2) Silver life-saving medals may be awarded to those persons who, in cases not sufficiently distinguished to deserve the gold medal, have endangered their lives in saving or endeavoring to save lives from the perils of the sea in waters over which the United States has jurisdiction, or upon American vessels.
- (3) Service required.—The saving of life or giving of succor does not in itself entitle a person to a medal. The medals can be given in only those instances in which exceptional bravery has been displayed or in which unusual effort or some great personal sacrifice has been made. The saving of persons from drowning in waters wholly within a State and not forming a part of the navigable waters of the United States or in small inland streams, ponds, pools, etc., does not entitle the rescuer to medals.
- (4) Evidence required.—Satisfactory evidence of the services performed must be filed in each case. This evidence should be in the form of affidavits made by eyewitnesses of good repute and standing, testifying of their own knowledge. The opinion of witnesses that the person for whom an award is sought imperiled his life or made signal exertions is not sufficient, but the affidavits must set forth in detail all facts and occurrences tending to show clearly in what manner and to what extent life was risked or signal exertions made, so that the Department may judge for itself as to the degree of merit involved. The precise locality, whether within the waters over which the United States has jurisdiction or upon an American vessel, the date, time of day, nature of the weather, condition of the sea, the names of all persons present when practicable, the names of all persons rendering assistance, and every pertinent circumstance should be stated.

The affidavits should be made before an officer duly authorized to administer oaths and be accompanied by a certificate showing the affiants to be credible persons, certified by that officer or some United States officer of the district in which the affiants reside, such as judge or clerk of United States court, district attorney, or collector of customs. If the affidavits are taken before an officer without an official seal, his official character must be certified by the proper officer of a court of record under the seal thereof.

(5) To whom recommendations addressed.—Recommendations for life-saving medals to be awarded under the provisions of these regulations will be addressed to the Secretary of the Navy, who will take appropriate measures to cause their transmission to the Secretary of the Treasury. Recommendations and affidavits to be submitted in duplicate; the original to be forwarded by the Navy Department to the Secretary of the Treasury, and copy to be retained for the Navy Department files.

NOTE.—Persons performing acts of extreme heroism in saving or attempting to save lives from the perils of the sea, but whose act does not meet the require-

ments for a Treasury Department gold or silver life-saving medal, may apply for the Carnegie medal.

In 1904 a Carnegie hero fund was created for adequately rewarding such persons as should perform deeds of heroism which would otherwise receive no appreciation.

In establishing the fund it was the purpose to place in somewhat better pecuniary position than before those following peaceful vocations who have been injured in heroic efforts to save human life and, in case of their death, to provide for the widows and children as long as that should be necessary and advisable.

In all cases a medal made of gold, silver, or bronze, according to which the deed in question was believed by the commission to call for, was to accompany each grant and in cases where no monetary aid was called for, an appropriate medal was in any event to be awarded setting forth the heroic deed it commemorated.

The field embraced is United States, Dominion of Canada, the colony of Newfoundland and the waters thereof.

Such acts must have been performed on or after April 15, 1904, and brought to the attention of the commission by letter addressed to the manager, Oliver Building, Pittsburgh, Pa., within 3 years of the date of the act.

A-1021, DECORATIONS AWARDED BY FOREIGN GOVERNMENTS.

(1) May not be accepted without consent of Congress.—No person holding any office of profit or trust under them (the United States) shall, without the consent of Congress, accept of any present, emolument, office, or title of any kind whatever from any king, prince, or foreign state. (See Constitution, art. I, sec. 9, cl. 8.)

Note.—Section (1) of the act of July 20, 1942 provides: "That officers and enlisted men of the armed forces of the United States be, and they are hereby, authorized during the present war and for a year thereafter to accept from the governments of cobelligerent nations or the other American republics such decorations, orders, medals, and emblems, as may be tendered them, and which are conferred by such governments upon members of their own military forces, hereby expressly granting the consent of Congress required for this purpose by cl. 8 of section 9, article I, of the Constitution: *Provided*, That any such officer or enlisted man is hereby authorized to accept and wear any decoration, order, medal, or emblem heretofore bestowed upon such person by the government of a cobelligerent nation or of an American republic."

- (2) To be tendered through Department of State, not to be delivered without authority from Congress.—Any present, decoration, or other thing, including citation, which shall be conferred or presented by any foreign government to any officer or enlisted man of the United States, civil, naval, or military, shall be tendered through the Department of State, and not to the individual in person, but such present, decoration, or other thing shall not be delivered by the Department of State unless so authorized by act of Congress. (See sec. 3, act. of January 31, 1881.)
- (3) When the bestowal of a foreign decoration is made under such circumstances that its refusal would prove embarrassing to the power conferring it, the individual may accept it. He should, at the same time, inform the donor that he is accepting it subject to the approval of Congress, and forward the decoration and diploma or other thing to the Bureau for further transmittal to the Department of State. He should not obligate himself or the United States in any way.

COMMEMORATIVE MEDALS

A-1022. DEWEY MEDAL (COMMEMORATING THE BATTLE OF MANILA BAY).—The act of Copgress approved June 3, 1898, provides: "That the Secre-



tary of the Navy be, and he hereby is, authorized to present a sword of honor to Commodore George Dewey, and cause to be struck bronze medals commemorating the Battle of Manila Bay, and to distribute such medals to the officers and men of the ships of the Asiatic Squadron of the United States under the command of Commodore George Dewey on May 1, 1898," etc.

Any person who was attached to one of the following ships on May 1, 1898, is eligible for this medal:

Olympia. Baltimore. McCulloch. Boston. Concord. Petrel.

Raleigh.

A-1023. SAMPSON MEDAL (COMMEMORATING NAVAL ENGAGEMENTS IN THE WEST INDIES).—The act of March 3, 1901, provides: "That the Secretary of the Navy be, and he is hereby, authorized to cause to be struck bronze medals commemorative of the naval and other engagements in the waters of the West Indies and on the shores of Cuba during the War with Spain, and to distribute the same to the officers and men of the Navy and Marine Corps who participated in any of said engagements deemed by him of sufficient importance to deserve commemoration."

A-1024. NC-4 MEDAL (COMMEMORATING THE FIRST TRANSATLANTIC FLIGHT IN THE U.S. NAVAL FLYING BOAT "NC-4" IN MAY 1919).—The act of Congress approved February 9, 1929, provides: "That the President be, and is hereby, authorized to award, in the name of Congress, gold medals of appropriate design to members of the NC-4 for the extraordinary achievement in making the first successful transatlantic flight in the United States naval flying boat NC-4 in May 1919.".

A-1025. BYRD ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION MEDAL (COMMEMORATING THE BYRD ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION OF 1928-30).—The act of Congress, approved May 23, 1930, provides: "That the Secretary of the Navy be, and he is hereby. empowered and directed to cause to be made at the United States Mint such number of gold, silver, and bronze medals as he may deem appropriate and necessary, respectively, to be presented to the officers and men of the Byrd Antarctic expedition to express the high admiration in which Congress and the American people hold their heroic and undaunted services in connection with the scientific investigations and extraordinary aerial explorations of the Antarctic Continent."

A-1026. SECOND BYRD ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION MEDAL (COMMEMORATING THE SECOND BYRD ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION OF 1933-1935).—The act of Congress, approved June 2, 1936, provides: "That the Secretary of the Navy be, and hereby is, directed to cause to be made at the United States Mint such number of silver medals as he may deem appropriate and necessary, respectively, to be presented to the deserving personnel of the Second Byrd Antarctic Expedition that spent the winter night at Little America or who commanded either one of the expedition ships throughout the expedition, to express the high admiration in which the Congress and the American people hold their heroic and undaunted accomplishments for science, unequaled in the history of polar exploration."

A-1027. CIVIL WAR MEDAL.—This medal is issued to officers and enlisted men of the Navy who served in the Navy during the Civil War, between April 15, 1861 and April 9, 1865.

A-1028. EXPEDITIONARY MEDAL (Navy and Marine Corps, initial award 1874).

(1) The medal will be awarded to the officers and enlisted men of the Navy and Marine Corps who shall have actually landed on foreign territory and engaged in operations against armed opposition, or operated under circumstances

which, after full consideration, shall be deemed to merit special recognition and for which service no campaign medal has been awarded.

- (2) No person in the Navy or Marine Corps service is entitled to more than one Expeditionary Medal (either Navy or Marine Corps). Participation in more than one expedition will be recognized by the issue of bronze stars (one star for each expedition in excess of one), to be worn on the ribbon of the Expeditionary Medal.
- (3) At present, there is a supply of Marine Corps Expeditionary Medals on hand which will be awarded to Marine Corps personnel participating in authorized expeditions. After this supply is exhausted, the Navy Expeditionary Medal will be the only medal awarded to either Navy or Marine Corps personnel for participation in expeditions.
- (4) All marine personnel now entitled to receive the Marine Expeditionary Medal will retain that medal. Navy personnel who have been awarded the Marine Corps Expeditionary Medal may retain that medal or exchange it for the Navy Expeditionary Medal.
- (5) All officers and men of the Navy and Marine Corps who, under the above-mentioned conditions, took part in an operation listed below may submit to the Chief of Naval Personnel or the Commandant, United States Marine Corps, respectively, through official channels, applications for the above medal. The applications should include the names and dates of the expeditions and a statement to the effect that the applicant actually served ashore as a member of a landing party during the period for which the medal is claimed.
- (6) The medal may be awarded to officers and enlisted men who have become separated from the service under honorable conditions.
- (7) Navy and Marine Corps personnel who served in the defense of Wake Island, December 7 to 22, 1941, will wear a silver "W" on the suspension ribbon or service ribbon bar of the appropriate Expeditionary Medal.

A-1037. VICTORY MEDAL (WORLD WAR SERVICE MEDAL).

- (1) A war service medal to be known as a Victory medal will be awarded to all persons in the naval service who served on active duty between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918, or who entered the naval service on or after November 12, 1918, and prior to March 30, 1920, and served not less than 10 days on shore in Northern Russia or Siberia or who were attached to one of the following vessels: Albany, Brooklyn, Des Moines, Eagle No. 1, Eagle No. 2, Eagle No. 3, New Orleans, Sacramento, South Dakota, or Yankton.
- (2) A service clasp with the duty inscribed thereon to be worn on the ribbon of the medal will be authorized for each person who performed any of the duties designated below. No one will be entitled to more than one service clasp.
 - (a) Transport.—Regularly attached to a transport or cargo vessel for one voyage across the North Atlantic between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918.
 - (b) Escort.—Same as (a) above.
 - (v) Armed guard.—Same as (a) above.
 - (d) Grand Fleet.—Regularly attached to any vessel forming part of the Grand fleet between December 9, 1917, and November 11, 1918.
 - (e) Patrol.—For service on the high seas on such duty east of the thirty-seventh meridian and north of the Equator, between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918, and on the high seas of the Atlantic Ocean north of the Equator between May 25, 1918, and November 11, 1918.
 - (1) Submarine.-Same as (e) above.
 - (g) Destroyer.—Same as (e) above.
 - (h) Aviation.—Same as (e) above.
 - (i) Naval battery.—For service on such duty from July 10, 1918, to November 11, 1918.

- (j) White Sea.—For service on any vessel which made a Russian port during such service from April 6, 1917, to November 11, 1918, or any combatant ship in a Russian port on the White Sea not less than 10 days from November 12, 1918, to July 31, 1919.
- (k) Asiatic.—For service on any vessel which made a Siberian port during such service from April 6, 1917, to November 11, 1918, or any combatant ship in a Siberian port not less than 10 days from November 12, 1918, to March 30, 1920.
- Mine laying.—For service on such duty from May 26, 1918, to November 11, 1918.
- (m) Mine sweeping.—For service on such duty from April 6, 1917, until mine sweeping was completed.
- (n) Salvage.—For service on such duty from April 6, 1917, to November 11, 1918.
- (o) Atlantic Fleet.—For service on such duty from May 25, 1918, to November 11, 1918.
- (p) Overseas.—For service on shore in allied or enemy countries of Europe from April 6, 1917, to November 11, 1918.
- (q) Mobile base.—For service on tenders and repair vessels on such duty east of the Thirty-seventh meridian and north of the Equator between April 6, 1917, to November 11, 1918.
- (r) Submarine chasers.—For service on the high seas on such duty east of the thirty-seventh meridian and north of the Equator between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918, and on the high seas of the Atlantic Ocean north of the Equator between May 25, 1918, and November 11, 1918.
- (3) Battle clasps.—For service in the following specified major operations, one for service in each such operation:
 - (1) Aisne, June 1, 1918, to June 5, 1918.
 - (2) Aisne-Marne, July 18, 1918, to July 20, 1918.
 - (3) St. Mihiel, September 12, 1918, to September 16, 1918.
 - (4) Meuse-Argonne, September 29, 1918, to October 10, 1918; October 21, 1918, to October 22, 1918; October 25, 1918, to November 11, 1918. (Only one Meuse-Argonne battle clasp to an individual.)

Defensive-sector clasp.—For service, irrespective of awards for major operations, one only being awarded, notwithstanding that service may have been rendered in more than one defensive sector:

- Toulon-Troyon sector (Lorraine), March 18, 1918, to May 13, 1918.
- (2) Chateau-Thierry sector (He de France), June 6, 1918, to July 16, 1918.
- (3) Marbache sector (Lorraine), August 6, 1918, to August 16, 1918.
- (4) Limey sector (Lorraine), September 10, 1918, September 11, 1918.
- (t) West Indies.—A clasp inscribed "West Indies" is authorized to be worn on the ribbon of the Victory Medal by all persons in the naval service who served in Haiti, Santo Domingo, Cuba, or the Virgin Islands between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918, both dates inclusive. This does not modify the existing order that no one will be entitled to more than one clasp issues by the Navy Department for the Victory Medal.

- (u) Russia.—For service on shore in Northern Russia from November 12, 1918, to July 31, 1919.
- (v) Siberia.—For service on shore in Siberia from November 12, 1918, to March 30, 1920.
- (w) France.—Personnel of the Navy and Marine Corps who sailed from the United States prior to November 11, 1918, enroute to France, regardless of the date of arrival in that country, or the fact that they returned to the United States without disembarking, are eligible for the Service Clasp of that country. (Approved SecNav 10-5-40.)
- (x) England.—Personnel of the Navy and Marine Corps who sailed from the United States prior to November 11, 1918, enroute to England, regardless of the date of arrival in that country, or the fact that they returned to the United States without disembarking, are eligible for the Service Clasp of that country. (Approved SecNav 10-5-40.)
- (y) Italy.—Personnel of the Navy and Marine Corps who sailed from the United States prior to November 11, 1918, enroute to Italy, regardless of the date of arrival in that country, or the fact that they reurned to the United States without disembarking, are eligible for the Service Clasp of that country. (Approved SecNav 10-5-40.)
- (3) A bronze star, three-sixteenths of an inch in diameter, will be placed on the service ribbon in lieu of clasp authorized. When any person has been commended as the result of the recommendation of the board of awards by the Secretary of the Navy for performance of duty during World War I not justifying the award of a Medal of Honor, a Distinguished Service Medal, or a Navy Cross, he shall wear a silver star for each such citation.
- (4) A bronze Maltese cross, three-sixteenths of an inch in diameter, will be placed on the service ribbon for those officers and men of the Marine Corps and Medical Corps, United States Navy, who were attached to the American Expeditionary Forces in France any time between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918, and who are not entitled to any battle clasp provided for by General Order No. 83, War Department, June 30, 1919.
- (5) The clasps for the Victory Medal designated in paragraph (2) for service on ships will be awarded as shown in the following list. Service on any ship listed, between the limiting dates given, will entitle a person to the clasp designated.

ARMY OF OCCUPATION OF GERMANY MEDAL (1918-23).—The act of November 21, 1941, provides: "That the Secretary of War is hereby authorized and directed to procure and issue an Army of Occupation of Germany Medal of appropriate design, including suitable appurtenances, to be issued to each officer and enlisted man of the armed forces, or to the nearest of kin surviving of those deceased, who served in Germany or Austria-Hungary during the period of occupation at any time during the inclusive period from November 12, 1918, to July 11, 1923: Provided, That such medals and appurtenances shall not be issued in cases where the person has, during or subsequent to such service been dismissed or discharged other than honorably from the service, or deserted."

The issuance of the Army of Occupation of Germany Medal is authorized for officers, Army nurses, warrant officers, and enlisted men of the armed forces who served in Germany or Austria-Hungary during the period of occupation at any time during the inclusive period mentioned above.

Not more than one Army of Occupation of Germany Medal will be awarded to any individual.

Original issue of this medal, accompanying ribbon, and lapel button will be made gratuitously.

These medals will be furnished only to members and former members of the armed forces who have rendered the required service, and to the nearest of kin surviving of deceased persons who would have been eligible if living. By nearest of kin is meant the first of the following who are living: widow (if not remarried), eldest son, eldest daughter, father, mother, eldest brother, eldest sister, eldest grandchild.

Officers and enlisted men of the Navy and Marine Corps, also Navy nurses who have had the necessary service may make application to the Chief of Naval Personnel or the Commandant, United States Marine Corps, as appropriate.

A member of the naval service attached to and serving on board a vessel of the United States Navy in a port of Germany or Austria-Hungary is not entitled to this medal unless he was detached from the ship for temporary duty ashore by competent authority.

A-1039. SECOND NICARAGUAN CAMPAIGN MEDAL.

- (1) To commemorate the services performed by the personnel of the Navy and Marine Corps during the operations in Nicaragua between August 27, 1926, and January 2, 1933, a campaign medal to be known as the second Nicaraguan campaign medal will be issued to the officers and enlisted men who participated in those operations.
- (2) The award will be made to the officers and enlisted men of the Navy and Marine Corps who served on shore in Nicaragua between the dates mentioned, and to the officers and enlisted men who were attached to and serving on board the vessels mentioned in the following list, between the dates set opposite each vessel. No officer or enlisted man is entitled to more than one such campaign medal.

A-1040. YANGTZE SERVICE MEDAL.

- (1) To commemorate the services performed by the personnel of the Navy and Marine Corps during the operations in the valley of the Yangtze River, China, in 1926 and 1927, and 1930 and 1932, a medal to be known as the Yangtze service medal will be issued to the officers and enlisted men who participated in those operations.
- (2) The period for which these medals will be issued is from September 3, 1926, to October 21, 1927, and from March 1, 1930, to December 31, 1932, and any officer or enlisted man of the Navy or Marine Corps who served on shore at Shanghai or in the valley of the Yangtze River, China, with a landing force during these periods or part of such periods, is entitled to this medal, as are the officers and enlisted men who were attached to the vessels mentioned in the following list between the dates appearing opposite each vessel. No officer or enlisted man is entitled to more than one such medal.

A-1041. CHINA SERVICE MEDAL.

- (1) To commemorate the services performed by the personnel of the Navy and Marine Corps during operations in China from July 7, 1937, to September 7, 1939, a service medal to be known as the China Service Medal will be issued to the officers and enlisted men who participated in these operations.
- (2) The award will be made to the officers and enlisted men of the Navy and Marine Corps who served on shore in China during the period from July 7, 1937, to September 7, 1939, and to the officers and enlisted men who were attached to and serving on board any of the vessels mentioned in the following list between the dates appearing opposite each vessel.
- (3) Former members of the Navy and Marine Corps, whose separations from the service have been under honorable conditions and who are eligible for the medal, may apply to the Chief of Naval Personnel or the Commandant, United States Marine Corps, respectively.
- (4) No person is entitled to more than one medal for service during these operations.

A-1042. AMERICAN DEFENSE SERVICE MEDAL.

- (1) The American Defense Service Medal will be awarded to all persons in the naval service who served on active duty between September 8, 1939, and December 7, 1941, both dates inclusive.
- (2) A service clasp, "Fleet" or "Base," is authorized to be worn on the ribbon of the medal by each person who performed duties as set forth below. No person is entitled to more than one such clasp.
- (a) Fleet.—For service on the high seas while regularly attached to any vessel or aircraft squadron of the Atlantic, Pacific, or Asiatic Fleets; to include vessels of the Naval Transportation Service and vessels operating directly under the Chief of Naval Operations.
- (b) Base.—For service on shore at bases and naval stations outside the continental limits of the United States.
- (3) A bronze star, three-sixteenths of an inch in diameter, will be worn on the service ribbon in lieu of any clasp authorized.
- (4) Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard personnel, who served on the following vessels operating in actual or potential belligerent contact with the Axis Forces in the Atlantic Ocean between the dates set opposite the ship in the table below are authorized to wear upon the American Defense Medal service ribbon, a bronze letter "A" in lieu of the bronze star. Such letter shall be

- (5) Naval Reserve personnel on training duty under orders must have served at least 10 days in such duty. Persons ordered to active duty for physical examination and subsequently disqualified are not entitled to this award. Reserve officers ordered to ships of the fleet for training duty (cruise) and officers serving on board ships for temporary additional duty from shore stations are not considered "regularly attached" and are not entitled to the fleet clasp.
- (6) Duty in Alaska is considered outside the continental limits of the United States.
- (7) Except as set forth in the above, no length of active duty performed during the period September 8, 1939, and December 7, 1941, has been stipulated to qualify any person in the naval service for this award.

AREA CAMPAIGN MEDALS

A-1043. AMERICAN, EUROPEAN-AFRICAN-MIDDLE EASTERN, AND ASIATIC-PACIFIC CAMPAIGN MEDALS.

(1) To commemorate the services performed by personnel of the Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard who, during any period between December 7, 1941, inclusive, and a date 6 months subsequent to the termination of the present war, shall have served outside of the continental limits of the United States in any of the areas mentioned below, the American, European-African-Middle Eastern, and Asiatic-Pacific campaign medals will be issued. The Territory of Alaska shall be considered as outside the continental limits of the United States.

AMERICAN AREA

East boundary.—From the North Pole, south along the 75th meridian west longitude to the 77th parallel north latitude, thence southeast through Davis Strait to the intersection of the 40th parallel north latitude and the 35th meridian west longitude, thence south along that meridian to the 10th parallel north latitude, thence southeast to the intersection of the equator and the 20th meridian west longitude, thence along the 20th meridian west longitude to the South Pole.

West boundary.—From the North Pole, south along the 141st meridian west longitude to the east boundary of Alaska, thence south and southeast along the Alaskan boundary to the Pacific Ocean, thence south along the 130th meridian to its intersection with the 30th parallel north latitude, thence southeast to the

intersection of the equator and the 100th meridian west longitude, thence south along the 100th meridian west longitude to the South Pole.

EUROPEAN-AFRICAN-MIDDLE EASTERN AREA


East boundary.—From the North Pole, south along the 60th meridian east longitude to its intersection with the eastern border of Iran, thence south along that border to the Gulf of Oman and the intersection of the 60th meridian east longitude, thence south along the 60th meridian east longitude to the South Pole.

West boundary.-Coincident with the east boundary of the American Area.

ASIATIC-PACIFIC AREA

East boundary.—Coincident with the west boundary of the American Area.

West boundary.—Coincident with the east boundary of the European-African-Middle Eastern Area.



- 3. Appropriate area campaign medals as defined above are authorized under any one of the following conditions:
- (a) Sea duty.—Attached to and serving on board a vessel of the Navy or Coast Guard, or upon other vessel to which regularly assigned for duty, in the designated area, or as a member of an organization being transported for duty in an area aboard such vessels, for a period of 30 days. This service need not be continuous nor in the same vessel.
- (b) Shore duty.—Attached to and regularly serving on shore in a designated area for a period of 30 days. Such service need not be continuous nor in the same locality but must be within the designated area.
- (c) Any combination of (a) and (b) above that will aggregate 30 days in a designated area.
- (d) Patrols.—Service in patrol vessels or aircraft operating in or above ocean waters, provided the individual has been attached to such units for a period of 30 days and has performed regularly required patrols. This provision is applicable even though the base from which such vessels or aircraft operate is within the continental limits of the United States.
- (e) Combat.—In all cases wherein a vessel, aircraft or other unit engages in combat with, attacks, or is attacked by enemy forces, all personnel serving in the vessel, aircraft, or other unit shall immediately become eligible for the appro-

priate campaign medal without reference to the 30-day provision above. However, the certain presence of enemy forces, especially in the case of enemy submarines, shall be established before this provision shall apply.

- (f) Hazardous duty.—The engagement in any service in a designated area which, in the opinion of the appropriate Fleet or Frontier Commander or Commandant, United States Marine Corps, is equally as hazardous as combat duty shall render the individuals concerned immediately eligible for the appropriate area medal without reference to any time limitation. This provision shall apply to such operations as mine recovery and disposal, bomb disposal, etc., or equally hazardous operations.
- (g) Passengers.—No individual en route in a purely passenger status shall become eligible for any area campaign medal unless he or the means of conveyance on which he is traveling is attacked by or engages in combat with the enemy. In the latter case, he shall immediately become eligible for the appropriate medal upon the occasion of the attack or combat. In this provision passage as a patient in a hospital ship shall be considered as attached to the ship and not in a passenger status.
- (h) Temporary or temporary additional duty.—No individual engaged on temporary or temporary additional duty shall become eligible unless such duty includes a period of at least 30 days in a designated area or unless he engages in combat with or is subjected to attack by enemy forces. In the latter case, he will immediately become eligible, upon the occasion of the attack or combat, without reference to time limit.
- (j) In any case, service which entitled an individual to a clasp or star as defined in existing orders shall also entitle him to the ribbon of the area in which the service is rendered.
- 4. The Chief of Naval Personnel, Commandant, United States Marine Corps, and Commandant, United States Coast Guard, shall issue the necessary orders for appropriate entries to be made in the records of personnel entitled to the area campaign medals, for other required reports and records, and for procedure in case records are lost or destroyed.
- 5. Appropriate clasps will be authorized from time to time indicating actual combat service in the several campaigns or engagements of the war. Campaigns or engagements considered to be worthy of such commemoration will be designated by the Commander in Chief, United States Fleet, and the Chief of Naval Operations.
- 6. Pending issue of the medals, the service ribbons are authorized to be worn in lieu thereof. For participation in each campaign or engagement for which a clasp is authorized, a bronze star shall be worn. For five or more campaigns or engagements, a silver star shall be worn on the ribbon in lieu of each five bronze stars.

GUNNERY MEDALS

A-1044. EDWARD TRENCHARD SECTION NAVY LEAGUE MEDAL.—The medal is awarded annually July 1 to the set of three turret pointers attaining the highest merit for turret guns at short-range battle practice.

A-1045. KNOX GUN-POINTER MEDAL.—The Knox gun-pointer medals are awarded annually by the Knox Trophy Foundation to the set of gun pointers making the highest merit for guns at short-range battle practice.

GOOD-CONDUCT MEDALS

A-1046. (1) Good-conduct medals and pins will be issued by the Bureau. A medal will be issued as the first award to an individual and a pin for each subsequent award. An enlisted man shall not be deprived of a good-conduct medal or pin except by conviction for an offense committed in a prior enlistment in

which a good-conduct medal or pin had been previously held to have been earned but not bestowed. Men with clear records (no offense or qualifying remarks entered in service record), and with a final average of 3.5 in proficiency in rating, are eligible to receive good-conduct awards for service terminating on or after July 1, 1931, as follows:

- (a) For first enlistment or minority enlistment, and if extended for 2 years, the last 4 years in lieu thereof, may be considered, provided first period of service would have terminated with an honorable discharge.
- (b) For second or subsequent enlistment or extensions of 3 or 4 years.
- (c) For a total of 4 years served in extensions of an enlistment.
- (d) In a 6-year enlistment, for first 3 years and also for remaining period of the enlistment, provided enlistment terminates with an honorable discharge.

Service in extensions of 1 or 2 years (except as indicated in (a) and (c) above) or for enlistments terminated prior to expiration (except when discharged for convenience of the Government within 3 months of expiration of enlistment) will not be considered for good-conduct awards.

- (2) Enlisted men of the Naval Reserve whose records and marks fulfill the requirements prescribed herein for the regular Navy are eligible and may be recommended for good-conduct awards after each 3-year period of continuous active service in time of national emergency and/or war.
- (3) Good-conduct pins will be worn on the ribbon of the medal. One bronze star three-sixteenths of an inch in diameter shall be worn on the service ribbon for each good-conduct pin received by any person.
- (4) For service terminating prior to July 1, 1931, good-conduct awards will be made in accordance with the requirements as to marks and recommendations in effect at the time of the period of service under consideration and in accordance with service requirements as follows:
 - (a) Prior to March 3, 1899; for second enlistment under continuous service.
 - (b) From March 3, 1899, to September 28, 1914, both dates inclusive; for 8 years' continuous service. From August 27, 1912, to September 29, 1914, first enlistments terminating during this period.
 - (c) From September 29, 1914, through June 30, 1921:
 - (1) For a second or subsequent enlistment, provided a prior enlistment was terminated with honorable discharge by reason of expiration of enlistment. Continuous service is not required.
 - (2) For a second enlistment changed to duration of war; and for an extension of 4 years (or extensions aggregating 4 years) changed to duration of war under Alnav 196 of July 11, 1919, provided that a prior enlistment shall have been terminated with honorable discharge, and further provided that said extension shall have been an extension of an enlistment ending between February 3, 1917, and November 11, 1918.
 - (3) For honorable discharge from not less than 2 years' service in the Regular Navy, following transfer from the United States Naval Reserve Force, under Alnav 196 of July 11, 1919, for the purpose of completion in the Regular Navy of the period of enrollment, provided that a prior enlistment shall have been terminated with honorable discharge. Continuous service is not required.

- (4) For an extension of 4 years or extensions aggregating 4 years, provided basic enlistment would have been terminated with honorable discharge.
- (d) For service terminating on or after July 1, 1921:
 - For first enlistment or for minority enlistment, provided the enlistment is extended or upon reenlistment within 3 months.
 - (2) For first enlistment if honorably discharged from service begun in the Naval Reserve Force, and continued in the Regular Navy by transfer, provided that the service in the Navy is of not less than 2 years' duration and that reenlistment is under continuous service.
 - (3) For a second or subsequent enlistment, previous enlistment having terminated with honorable discharge. Continuous service is not necessary.
 - (4) Upon discharge from an extension of 4 years (or a total of 4 years) of a first or or other enlistment, provided that basic enlistment would have terminated with an honorable discharge.
 - (5) For a constructive enlistment of 4 years (or 3 years and 9 months) active duty begun in the Regular Navy and continued in the Naval Reserve (classes F3, F4, or F5), or where a retired man is recalled and completes not less than 3 years and 9 months active duty.
- (e) Good-conduct awards are made to those who enlisted or who reenlisted on or after April 7, 1917: Upon the date of the execution of oath of first permanent commission or warrant in the Navy of those officers who shall have served a total of not less than 3 years and 9 months in enlisted and either commissioned or warrant status.

A-1047. BAILEY MEDAL.—This medal was instituted by the late Rear Admiral Theodorus Bailey for the purpose of inciting the apprentices of the United States Navy to greater effort in acquiring proficiency in their duties.

A-1048. QUALIFICATION MEDALS AND BADGES.—These badges are awarded in accordance with regulations issued by Operations (Division of Fleet Training), and the Commandant, United States Marine Corps. (See Small-Arms Firing Regulations for the Navy, and Marine Corps Manual for the Marine Corps.)

A-1049. NAVAL RESERVE MEDAL.

- (1) This medal may be awarded by the Chief of Naval Personnel to any officer or enlisted man of the Naval Reserve who completes, or has completed, 10 years' honorable service in the Naval Reserve, Naval Reserve Force, National Naval Volunteers, or federally recognized Naval Militia in an active-duty or inactive-duty status; and for each additional 10 years of such honorable service, a bronze star may be worn on the ribbon.
- (2) In time of war or national emergency, members of the Naval Reserve shall not become eligible for award of a Naval Reserve Medal until they report for active duty.
- (3) Application for the medal shall be submitted via the applicant's commanding officer. The application, in letter form, must state the period or periods of service upon which the application for the medal and the authority to wear the bronze star (if entitled) are based. The Commanding Officer shall state in his forwarding endorsement whether or not the applicant's service has been honorable in his present assignment.
- (4) Present holders of the Naval Reserve Medal are authorized to wear bronze stars, to which entitled, without specific authorization.

A-1050. MEDAL FOR MERIT.—The act of July 20, 1942 (sec. 2 (2)), provides: "That there is hereby created a decoration to be known as the 'Medal for Merit,' which shall have distinctive appurtenances and devices and only one degree, and which the President, under such rules and regulations as he shall prescribe, may award to such civilians of the nations prosecuting the war under the joint declaration of the United Nations and of other friendly foreign nations as have, since the proclamation of an emergency by the President on September 8, 1939, distinguished themselves by exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding services: Provided, That awards to civilians of foreign nations shall be only for the performance of an exceptionally meritorious or courageous act or acts in furtherance of the war efforts of the United Nations."

A-1051. BRONZE STAR MEDAL.—Executive Order 9419 of February 4, 1944, provides: "There is hereby established the Bronze Star Medal, with accompanying ribbons and appurtenances, for award to any person who, while serving in any capacity in or with the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard of the United States on or after December 7, 1941, distinguishes, or has distinguished, himself by heroic or meritorious achievement or service, not involving participation in aerial flight, in connection with military or naval operations against an enemy of the United States."

The Bronze Star Medal shall take precedence next after the Navy and Marine Corps Medal and next before the Air Medal.

The required achievement or service for award of the Bronze Star is less than that required for award of the Silver Star or the Legion of Merit but must nevertheless be accomplished or performed in a manner above that normally to be expected and sufficient to distinguish him among those performing comparable duties. The Bronze Star may be awarded to recognize minor acts of heroism in actual combat or single acts of merit, or meritorious service either in sustained operational activities against an enemy or in direct support of such operations.

No more than one Bronze Star Medal shall be issued to any one person, but for each succeeding heroic or meritorious achievement or service justifying such an award a Gold Star may be awarded in lieu of the Bronze Star Medal to be worn upon the ribbon of the Medal as now prescribed for any other Navy Decorations.

The Bronze Star Medal, or the Gold Star in lieu thereof may be awarded posthumously and, when so awarded, may be presented to the nearest of kin or such other representative as may be designated.

A-1052. COMMENDATION RIBBON.—The Secretary of the Navy on January 11, 1944, authorized a ribbon to be known as the Commendation Ribbon (no medal involved) to be worn by authorized personnel in the same manner as prescribed for other decoration or service ribbons. The Commendation Ribbon will take precedence next after that representing the Air Medal. All personnel of the Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard who have received an individual Letter of Commendation signed by the Secretary of the Navy; the Commander in Chief, United States Fleet; Commander in Chief, United States Pacific Fleet; or the Commander in Chief, United States Atlantic Fleet, for an act of heroism or service performed between 6 December 1941 and 11 January 1944, are hereby authorized to wear the Commendation Ribbon.

All personnel of the above services who shall hereafter receive such a Letter of Commendation, signed by the Secretary of the Navy or one of the above-named commanders in chief, are authorized to wear the Commendation Ribbon, provided such Letter of Commendation contains in the text such authorization, signifying the desire of the issuing officer to accord this privilege. A second and each succeeding authorization will be represented by a bronze star on the ribbon. Subordinate commanders may make recommendation for such letters to the Secretary of the Navy or appropriate commander in chief via official channels.
