



#### [Sundry civil act, June 25, 1910, 36 Stats., 703.]

\* \* \* and hereafter said Navy Yearbook shall be prepared and published for each calendar year and distributed as other public documents; and six thousand additional copies shall be printed and bound in cloth and distributed as follows: One thousand five hundred for the Senate, three thousand for the House of Representatives, one thousand for the Navy Department, and five hundred for the Committees on Naval Affairs of Senate and House.

#### PREFATORY NOTE.

This volume contains 35 annual naval appropriation acts, commencing with the act of March 3, 1883, the special war or deficiency appropriation acts of June 15 and October 6, 1917, and March 28, April 26, and June 4, 1918, the personnel law, the war personnel law (act of May 22, 1917), and the usual statistical tables.

To hold the Yearbook to one volume routine language repeated

To hold the Yearbook to one volume routine language repeated from year to year in successive naval appropriation acts is entirely omitted from the Yearbook for 1917 and 1918, except as hereafter stated. This also applies to the special or war deficiency appropria-

tion acts, supra.

The appropriation act of March 3, 1883, the temporary act of July 7, 1884, the special increase of Navy act of August 3, 1886, the special act of April 26, 1918, and the appropriation acts of March 4, 1917, and July 1, 1918, are printed in full—all new language in the two last-named acts being in italics. The act temporarily to increase the commissioned and warrant and enlisted strength of the Navy and Marine Corps, and for other purposes, approved May 22, 1917, also is printed in full.

A separate chapter is devoted to the personnel act of March 3,

1899, and changes authorized by various subsequent acts.

Of the appropriation acts from 1884 to 1916, inclusive, only so much is printed as is needed to show the changes from year to year.

To supplement this abbreviated text and to facilitate comparison of any particular year with any other as well as to give the total cost of the new Navy, there is appended a tabulated statement showing by individual appropriations under each bureau of the Navy Department all amounts carried by the regular naval acts and also

by the several deficiency acts from March 3, 1883, to date.

A separate edition of the Yearbook for 1917 was not gotten out because during the progress of the war it was not possible to get certain statistical data regarding foreign navies which it has been customary to publish in the Yearbook, and, moreover, it would not have been compatible with the public interests to have published certain parts of the statistical information concerning the United States Navy which it has been the practice for the Yearbook to contain. Consequently, the 1917 and 1918 editions are here printed in one volume.

#### INTRODUCTION.

The initial legislation for rebuilding the Navy commenced with the act of August 5, 1882 (Statutes, vol. 22, p. 291), which stipulated, under limitations, that no more money should be spent upon old wooden vessels and provided for the appointment of a Naval Advisory Board. The following are the important features of the act:

Provided. That no part of this sum [the regular annual appropriation for the Bureau of Construction and Repair] shall be applied to the repairs of any wooden ship when the estimated cost of such repairs shall exceed thirty per centum of the estimated cost of a new ship of the same size and like material: Provided, Nothing herein contained shall deprive the Secretary of the authority to order repairs of ships damaged in foreign waters or on the high seas, so far as may be necessary to bring them home. Any portion of said sum not required for the purposes aforesaid may be applied toward the construction of two steam cruising vessels of war, which are hereby authorized, at a total cost, when fully completed, not to exceed the amount estimated by the late Naval Advisory Board for such vessel, the same to be constructed of steel, of domestic manufacture, having as near as may be a tensile strength of not less than sixty-thousand pounds to the square inch, and a ductility in eight inches of not less than twenty-five per centum; said vessels to be provided with full sail-power and full steam-power. One of said vessels shall be of not less than five thousand nor more than six thousand tons displacement, and shall have the highest attainable speed, and shall be adapted to be armed with not more than four breech-loading rified cannon, of high power, of not less than eight-inch caliber, or two of ten-inch caliber, and not more than twenty-one breech-loading rified cannon, of high power, of not less than six-inch caliber; one of said vessels shall be of not less than four thousand three hundred nor more than four thousand seven hundred tons displacement, and shall have the highest attainable speed, and shall be adapted to be armed with four breech-loading rifled cannon, of high power, of not less than eight-inch caliber, or two of ten-inch caliber, and not more than fifteen breech-loading rified cannon, of high power, of not less than six-inch caliber. The Secretary of the Navy is hereby empowered and directed to organize a board of naval officers and experts for his advice and assistance, to be called the "Naval Advisory Board," to serve during the period required for the construction, armament, and trial of the vessels hereby authorized to be constructed, and no longer. Said board shall consists of five officers on the active list of the Navy in the line and the staff, to be detailed by the Secretary of the Navy, without reference to rank and with reference only to character, experience, knowledge, and skill, and two persons of established reputation and standing, as experts in naval or marine construction, to be selected from civil life, and employed for this sole duty by the Secretary of the Navy, and to be paid such sum, out of the appropriation hereby made, not exceeding eleven thousand dollars, as he may direct: Provided however, That no person shall be a member of said board who has any interest, direct or indirect, in any invention, device, or process, patented or otherwise, to be used in the construction of said vessels, their engines, boilers, or armament, nor in any contract for the same. It shall be the duty of said board to advise and assist the Secretary of the Navy, in his office or elsewhere, in all matters referred to them by him relative to the designs, models, plans, specifications, and contracts for said vessels in all their parts, and relative to the materials to be used therein and to the construction thereof, and especially relative to the harmonious adjustment, respectively, of their hulls, machinery, and armament; and they shall examine all materials to be used in said vessels, and inspect the work on the same as it progresses, and have general supervision thereof, under the direction of said Secretary. But said board shall have no power to make or enter into any contract, nor to direct or control any

officer of the Navy, the chief of any bureau of the Navy, or any contractor. Neither of the vessels hereby authorized to be built shall be contracted for or commenced until full and complete detail drawings and specifications thereof, in all its parts, including the hull, engines, and boilers, shall have been provided or adopted by the Navy Department, and shall have been approved, in writing, by said board, or by a majority of the members thereof, and by the Secretary of the Navy; and after said drawings and specifications have been provided, adopted, and approved as aforesaid, and the work has been commenced or a contract made for it, they shall not be changed in any respect, when the cost of such change shall in the construction exceed five hundred dollars, except upon the approval of said board, or a majority of the members thereof, in writing, and upon the written order of the Secretary of the Navy; and, if changes are thus made, the actual cost thereof and the damage caused thereby shall be ascertained, estimated, and determined by said board; and in any contract made pursuant to this act it shall be provided in the terms thereof that the contractor shall be bound by the determination of said board, or a majority thereof, as to the amount of the increased or diminished compensation said contractor shall be entitled to receive, if any, in consequence of such change or changes. The Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to cause the said cruising vessels of war aforesaid to be provided with interior deflective steel armor, if the same, upon full investigation, shall seem to be practicable and desirable, and if the same shall be approved by said board, or a majority thereof, in writing. Before any of the vessels hereby authorized shall be contracted for or commenced the Secretary of the Navy shall, by proper public advertisement and notice, invite all engineers and mechanics of established reputation, and all reputable manufacturers of vessels, steam-engines, boilers, and ordnance, having or controllingregular establishments, and being engaged in the business, all officers of the Navy, and especially all naval constructors, steam-engineers, and ordnance officers of the Navy, having plans, models, or designs of any vessels of the classes hereby authorized, or of any part thereof, within any given period, not less than sixty days, to submit the same to said board; and it shall be the duty of said board to carefully and fully examine the same and to hear any proper explanation thereof, and to report to the Secretary of the Navy, in writing, whether, in their opinion, any such plan, model, or design, or any suggestion therein, is worthy of adoption in the construction of said vessels, their engines, boilers, or armament; and if in such construction any such plan, model, design, or suggestion shall be adopted, for the use of which any citizen not an officer of the Navy would have a just claim for compensation, the contractor shall bind himself to discharge the government from all liability on account of such adoption and use: Provided, That said Naval Advisory Board herein provided for shall, under the direction of the Secretary of the Navy, prepare plans, drawings, and specifications for vessels, their machinery, and armament, recommended by the late Naval Advisory Board not herein authorized to be built.

AN ACT Making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and eighty-four, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the following sums be, and they are hereby, appropriated, to be paid out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the naval service of the government for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen

hundred and eighty-four, and for other purposes:

For the pay of the Navy, for the active-list, namely: Pay of the For one Admiral, one Vice-Admiral, ten rear-admirals, list. eight chiefs of bureaus, twenty-four commodores, fortyeight captains, ninety commanders, eighty lieutenantcommanders, two hundred and eighty lieutenants, one hundred masters, the title of which grade is hereby changed to that of lieutenants, and the masters now on ter changed to the list shall constitute a junior grade of and be commissioned as lieutenants, having the same rank and pay as now provided by law for masters, but promotion to and from said grade shall be by examination as provided by law for promotion to and from the grade of master, and nothing herein contained shall be so construed as to increase the pay now allowed by law to any officer in the line or staff; one hundred ensigns, ninety-one midshipmen, the title of which grade is hereby changed to that of Title of ensign, and the midshipmen now on the list shall constitute to ensign. tute a junior grade of, and be commissioned as, ensigns, sign. having the same rank and pay as now provided by law for midshipmen, but promotions to and from said grade shall be under the same regulations and requirements as now provided by law for promotion to and from the grade of midshipmen, and nothing herein contained shall be so construed as to increase the pay now allowed by law to any officer of said grade or of any officer of relative rank; fourteen medical directors, fifteen medical inspectors, fifty surgeons, eighty passed assistant surgeons, twelve assistant surgeons, two assistant surgeons not in the line of promotion who shall hereafter, after fifteen years' service, be entitled to receive, as annual pay, when at sea, two thousand one hundred dollars, when on shore duty, one thousand eight hundred dollars, and when on leave or waiting orders one thousand six hundred dollars, thirteen pay directors, twelve pay inspectors, fifty paymasters, thirty past assistant paymasters, twenty assistant paymasters, sixty-nine chief engineers, ninety-

nine past assistant engineers, sixty-two assistant engineers, sixty-two cadet engineers, twenty-three chaplains, eleven professors of mathematics, ten naval constructors, six assistant naval constructors, ten civil engineers, one hundred and ninety-five warrant officers, forty mates, three hundred and thirty-five naval cadets; in all, three million nine hundred and forty thousand eight hundred dollars: Hereafter only one-half of the vacancies in the various grades in the staff corps of the navy shall be filled by promotion until such grades shall be reduced to the numbers fixed for the several grades of the staff corps of the navy by the act of August fifth, eighteen hundred and eighty-two, making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and eighty three, and for other purposes.

Pay of re-tired officers.

For pay of the retired list, namely: For forty-six rearadmirals, twenty-one commodores, eleven captains, ten commanders, sixteen lieutenant-commanders, nine lieutenants, eleven masters, six ensigns, one midshipman, twenty-two medical directors, two medical inspectors, two surgeons, four passed assistant surgeons, seven assistant surgeons, seven pay-directors, two pay-inspectors, four paymasters, two passed assistant paymasters, one assistant paymaster, ten chief engineers, twenty-one passed assistant engineers, twenty-five assistant engineers, eight. chaplains, six professors of mathematics, one chief constructor, three civil engineers, eleven boatswains, nine gunners, eleven carpenters, and nine sailmakers; in all, seven hundred and three thousand one hundred and eighty dollars:

Pay of petty officers and en-listed force.

For pay to petty officers, seamen, ordinary seamen, landsmen, and boys, including men in the engineers' force, and for the Coast Survey Service, not exceeding eight thousand two hundred and fifty in all, two million

four hundred and ninety thousand dollars.

For two secretaries, one to the Admiral and one to the Vice-Admiral, clerks to paymasters, clerks at inspections, navy-yards, and stations, and extra pay to men enlisted under honorable discharge; commission and interest, transportation of funds, exchange, mileage to officers while traveling under orders in the United States, and for actual personal expenses of officers while traveling abroad Pay, miscel- under orders; and for actual and necessary traveling expenses of naval cadets while proceeding from their homes to the Naval Academy for examination and appointment as cadets and for the payment of any such officers as may be in service, either upon the active or retired list, during the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and eighty-four, in excess of the numbers of each class provided for in this act, and for any increase of pay arising from different duty, as the needs of the service may require, three hundred thousand dollars. And all officers of the Navy shall be credited with the actual time they

may have served as officers or enlisted men in the regular or volunteer Army or Navy, or both, and shall receive all the benefits of such actual service in all respects in the same manner as if all said service had been continuous and in the regular Navy in the lowest grade having graduated pay held by such officer since last entering the service: Provided, That nothing in this clause shall be so construed as to authorize any change in the dates of commission or in the relative rank of such officers: Provided further, That nothing herein contained shall be so construed as to give any additional pay to any such officer during the time of his service in the volunteer army or

navv.

For contingent expenses of the Navy, namely: For rent and furniture of buildings and offices not in navy-yards; expenses of courts-martial and courts of inquiry, boards of investigation, examining boards, with clerks' and witnesses' fees, and traveling expenses and costs; stationery and recording; expenses of purchasing-paymasters' offices at the various cities, including clerks, furniture, fuel, stationery, and incidental expenses; newspapers and advertising; foreign postage; telegraphing, foreign and domestic; telephones; copying; care of library; mail and express wagons, and livery and express fees; costs of suits; commissions, warrants, diplomas, and discharges; relief of vessels in distress, and pilotage; recovery of valuables from shipwrecks; quarantine expenses; care and transportation of the dead; for putting in order and preserving the grave of Paul Hamilton, a former Secretary of the Navy, the expenditure therefor not to exceed one hundred dollars; reports, professional investigation, cost of special instruction, and information abroad, and the collection and classification thereof; and all other emergencies and extraordinary expenses, arising at home or abroad, but impossible to be anticipated or classified, exclusive of personal services in the Navy Department or any of its subordinate bureaus or offices at Washington, District of Columbia, one hundred thousand dollars.

#### BUREAU OF NAVIGATION.

For foreign and local pilotage and towage of ships of war; services and materials in correcting compasses on board ship, and for adjusting and testing compasses on shore; nautical and astronomical instruments, nautical books, maps, charts, and sailing directions, and repairs of nautical instruments for ships of war; books for libraries for ships of war; naval signals and apparatus, namely, signal-lights, lanterns, rockets, running-lights, drawings, and engravings for signal-books; compass-fittings, including binnacles, tripods, and other appendages of ships' compasses; logs and other appliances for measuring the ship's ways, and leads and other appliances for

sounding: lanterns and lamps, and their appendages, for general use on board ship, including those for the cabin, ward-room, and steerage, for the holds and spirit-room, for decks and quartermasters' use; bunting and other materials for flags, and making and repairing flags of all kinds; oil for ships of war, other than that used for the engineer department; candles when used as a substitute for oil in binnacles and running-lights; for chimneys and wicks; and soap used in navigation department; stationery for commanders and navigators of vessels of war, and for use of courts-martial; musical instruments and music for vessels of war; steering-signals and indicators, and for speaking-tubes and gongs for signal communication on board vessels of war; and for introducing electric lights on board vessels of war, not exceeding five thousand dollars; in all, one hundred thousand dollars.

Ocean surveys.

For special ocean surveys and the publication thereof, ten thousand dollars.

Contingent.

For contingent expenses of the Bureau of Navigation, namely: For freight and transportation of navigation materials; postage and telegraphing on public business; advertising for proposals; packing-boxes and materials; and all other contingent expenses, four thousand dollars. For the civil establishment at navy-yards and stations,

five thousand dollars.

BUREAU OF ORDNANCE.

Ordnance Stores.

For procuring, producing, and preserving ordnance ordnance material; for the armament of ships, and for fuel, tools, materials and labor to be used in the general work of the Ordnance Department for these purposes, one hundred and fifty thousand dollars. And any balance of the appropriation made for commencing the manufacture of steel rifled breech-loading guns, with carriages and ammunition, that may be unexpended during the fiscal year eighteen hundred and eighty-three, is hereby re-appropriated and made available for continuing that service during the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and eighty-four.

Repairs, Bu-reau of Ord-nance.

For necessary repairs to ordnance buildings, magazines, gun parks, boats, lighters, wharves, machinery, and other objects of the like character, including breakwaters at the magazine, Ellis Island, New York, and the erection of a shell-filling house at the Bellevue magazine, Washington, fifteen thousand dollars.

Special board for locating Government foundry.

That the President of the United States is hereby authorized and requested to select from the Army and Navy six officers, who shall constitute a board for the purpose of examining and reporting to Congress which of the navy-yards or arsenals, owned by the government has the best location and is best adapted for the establishment of a government foundry, or what other method, if any, should be adopted for the manufacture of heavy ordnance adapted to modern warfare, for the use of the Army and Navy of the United States, the cost of all buildings, tools, and implements necessary to be used in the manufacture thereof, including the cost of a steamhammer or apparatus of sufficient size for the manufacture of the heaviest guns; and that the President is further requested to report to Congress the finding of said board at as early a date as possible: Provided, That no extra compensation shall be paid the officers serving on the board hereby created.

For miscellaneous items, namely: For freight to foreign and home stations, advertising and auctioneers' fees, cartage and express charges, repairs to fire-engines, gas and water pipes, gas and water tax at magazines, toll, ferriage, foreign postage, and telegrams, three thousand

dollars.

For the civil establishment at navy-yards and stations, Civil establishment. five thousand dollars.

For the torpedo corps, namely: For labor, material, and freight and express charges; general repairs to corps. grounds, buildings, and wharves; boats' instruction, instruments, tools, experiments, and general torpedo out-

fits, fifty thousand dollars.

For the purchase and manufacture, after full investigation and test in the United States under the direction of the Secretary of the Navy, of torpedoes adapted to naval warfare, or of the right to manufacture the same and for the fixtures and machinery necessary for operating the same, one hundred thousand dollars: Provided, That no part of said money shall be expended for the purchase or manufacture of any torpedo or of the right to manufacture the same until the same shall have been approved by the Secretary of the Navy, after a favorable report to be made to him by a board of naval officers to be created by him to examine and test said torpedoes and inventions.

#### BUREAU OF EQUIPMENT AND RECRUITING.

For equipment of vessels: For coal for steamers' and Equipment of ships' use, including expenses of transportation, storage, and handling; hemp, wire, hides, and other materials for the manufacture of rope and cordage; iron for manufacture of cables, anchors, galleys, and chains; canvas for the manufacture of sails, awnings, bags, and hammocks; heating apparatus for receiving-ships; and for the purchase of all other articles of equipment at home and abroad, and for the payment of labor in equipping vessels and manufacture of equipment articles in the several navy-yards, eight hundred thousand dollars; and the Secretary of the Navy is authorized and empowered, within his discretion, to constitute and introduce, as a

portion of the equipment of the Navy, the life saving dress adopted and approved by the Life Saving Service of the United States.

Transportation and recruiting. For expenses of recruiting: For expenses of recruiting, rent of rendezvous, and expenses of maintaining the same, advertising for men and boys, and all other expenses attending the recruiting for the naval service, and for the transportation of enlisted men and boys, at home and abroad, twenty-five thousand dollars.

Contingent.

For contingent expenses equipment and recruiting: For extra expenses of training-ships, freight and transportation of equipment stores, printing, advertising, telegraphing, books and models, postage, car-tickets, ferriage, ice, apprehension of deserters and stragglers, assistance to vessels in distress, continuous-service certificates and good-conduct badges for enlisted men, school books for training-ships, extra medals for boys, and emergencies arising under cognizance of Bureau of Equipment and Recruiting unforeseen and impossible to classify, ten thousand dollars.

Civil establishment.

For the civil establishment at navy-yards and stations, nine thousand dollars.

#### BUREAU OF YARDS AND DOCKS.

Maintenance.

For general maintenance of yards and docks, namely: For freight and transportation of materials and stores, books, models, maps, and drawings; purchase and repair of fire-engines; machinery, repairs on steam fire engines, and attendance on the same; purchase and maintenance of oxen and horses, and driving teams, carts, and timberwheels, and all vehicles for use in the navy-yards, and tools and repairs of the same; dredging; postage on letters and other mailable matter on public service and telegrams; furniture for government houses and offices in the navy-yards; coal and other fuel; candles, oil, and gas; cleaning and clearing up yards, and care of public buildings; attendance on fires; lights; fire engines and apparatus; for clerical and incidental labor at navy-yards; water-tax, and for toll and ferriages; rent of officers' quarters at League Island; pay of the watchmen in the navy-yards; and for awning and packing-boxes and advertising, two hundred and sixty-four thousand dollars, of which sum sixty-four thousand dollars shall be immediately available.

Contingent.

For contingent expenses that may arise at navy-yards and stations, twenty thousand dollars.

Civil establishment.

For the civil establishment at navy-yards and stations, twenty-four thousand dollars.

#### BUREAU OF MEDICINE AND SURGERY.

For support of the medical department: For surgeons' necessaries for vessels in commission, navy-yards, naval partment. stations, Marine Corps, and Coast Survey, forty thou-

And if the Secretary of the Navy shall not be able to maintain properly the whole number of naval hospitals now kept open on the amounts hereby appropriated for the maintenance of and civil establishment at naval hospitals, he shall close those which are least necessary to the service, and provide for the patients now cared for therein at such other

naval hospitals as may be most convenient.

For contingent expenses of the bureau: For freight on medical stores; transportation of insane patients to the government hospital; advertising; telegraphing; purchase of books; expenses attending the medical board of examiners; rent of rooms for naval dispensary, hygienic and sanitary investigation and illustration; purchase and repair of wagons and harness; purchase and feed of horses and cows; trees, garden tools, and seeds, twentyfive thousand dollars.

ity to construct the same shall take effect at once; and the Secretary of the Navy may, in addition to the appropriation hereby made, apply to the constructing and finishing of the vessels in this clause referred to any balance of the appropriation made to the Bureaus of Construction and Repair and Steam-Engineering for the current fiscal year or in the present act which may remain available for

AN ACT Making temporary provision for the naval service.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That for the purpose of providing for the expenses Expenses of of the naval service for the six months ending December for six months thirty first, eighteen hundred and eighty four, there is ending Dec. 81, hereby appropriated out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated one half or fifty per centum of the sums of money (and for the like purposes and continuing the same provisions relating thereto) as were appropriated for the service of the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and eighty four, by the act entitled "An act making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth eighteen hundred and eighty-four and for other purposes" approved March third eighteen hundred and eighty three (except as hereinafter declared), subject to all the limitations and conditions in respect to the disbursement of the appropriations hereby made that were imposed by said act and the other laws of the United States upon or in respect to the appropriations made by said act: Provided, That nothing is appropriated by this act "for special ocean surveys and the publication thereof" or "for the purchase and manufacture after full investigation and test in the United States under the direction of the Secretary of the Navy of torpedoes adapted to naval warfare or of the right to manufacture the same and for the fixtures and machinery necessary for operating the same"; That the clause under the heading "Bureau of Yards and Docks" commencing "For general maintenance of yards and docks" is amended so as to appropriate for the six months herein provided for the sum of one hundred and ten thousand dollars;

That under the heading "Increase of the Navy" in said act, in lieu of all the paragraphs thereunder and preceding the heading of "Naval Academy" there is hereby substituted the following:

For continuing work upon the three new steel cruisers Continuing and one dispatch boat authorized by act of Congress ap-new steel proved March third eighteen hundred and eighty-three as cruisers. follows: Chicago three hundred and forty nine thousand one hundred and thirty three dollars and forty five cents; Boston, two hundred and thirty one thousand eight hundred and fifty three dollars and twenty eight cents;

Atlanta two hundred and thirty one thousand eight hundred and fifty three dollars and twenty seven cents; Dolphin one hundred and eight thousand six hundred and sixty dollars, in all nine hundred and twenty one thousand five hundred dollars; the four pivot-guns of the Chicago to be mounted on Clark's deflective single-gun turrets or V shields, of the same weight as is now allowed for the mounting and armor protection of the guns: Provided, That it shall not change the contract entered into by the Government for the construction of said vessels.

"For completion of steam-machinery and boilers, with necessary fittings for sea-service, of steel cruisers and dispatch boat, under contract with John Roach, as per act approved March third, eighteen hundred and eightythree: United States steel cruiser Chicago, two hundred and twenty thousand dollars; United States steel cruiser Boston, one hundred and fifty five thousand dollars; United States steel cruiser Atlanta, one hundred and fifty five thousand dollars; United States dispatch-boat Dolphin, ninety thousand dollars; in all, six hundred and twenty thousand dollars.

"For completing equipment outfits of three new cruisers and one dispatch-boat, now in course of construction,

seventy eight thousand six hundred dollars."

"For navigation outfit of the four new steel cruisers, thirty thousand dollars."

"For ordnance outfit of the three new steel cruisers and one dispatch boat, five hundred thousand dollars."

Nothing herein contained shall be construed as appropriating money for or authorizing the continuation of Work on four work upon the double-turreted-monitors, Monadnock, pro Terror, Amphitrite, and Puritan, and any unexpended balance now remaining of the appropriation contained in said act approved March third, eighteen hundred and eighty three, for engines and machinery for the said double turreted monitors shall be covered into the Treasury, except such part thereof as may be required under existing contracts made for the engines and machinery of the three last named monitors.

# FORTY-EIGHTH CONGRESS, SECOND SESSION—JANUARY 30, 1885.

# [Public—No. 19.]

AN ACT making additional appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and eighty-five, and for other purposes.

[Only so much of this act is quoted as is new. Provision is made for the Naval Establishment and, under "Pay of the Navy," is added an item, "\* \* for traveling expenses of apothecaries, yeomen, and civilian employees, \* \* \*."

All the items under contingent expenses of the Navy for fiscal year 1884 have been transferred and included intact in the appropria-

tion "Pay, miscellaneous," 1885, except:

"For all emergencies and extraordinary expenses arising at home or abroad, but impossible to be anticipated or classified, exclusive of personal services in the Navy Department or any of its subordinate bureaus or offices at Washington, District of Columbia, seven thousand five hundred dollars."

#### BUREAU OF NAVIGATION.

Provision is made "for erection of compass-testing Compass-house."

#### BUREAU OF ORDNANCE.

Provision is made, under ordnance and ordnance stores, "\* \* \* for furniture at magazines, at the ordnance dock, New York, and at the naval experimental battery, . \* \* ."

#### BUREAU OF PROVISIONS AND CLOTHING.

It is "\* \* provided that all enlisted men and boys Ration or in the Navy, attached to any United States vessel or allowed. station and doing duty thereon, and naval cadets, shall be allowed a ration, or commutation thereof in money, under such limitations and regulations as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe."

#### BUREAU OF CONSTRUCTION AND REPAIR.

Provision is made for "\* \* telegrams, photographing, books, plans, stationery, and instruments for drawing-room, \* \* \*."

#### BUREAU OF STEAM ENGINEERING.

Provision appropriating "\* \* the unexpended balance of the appropriation of one million dollars made by the act approved March third, eighteen hundred and eighty-three, for engines and machinery for the doubleturreted iron-clads be, and the same is hereby, reappropriated and made available during the last half of the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and eightyfive. \* \* \*."

#### INCREASE OF THE NAVY.

Island Navy Yard, fifty thousand dollars.

"For care and safe-keeping of the iron-clad monitors now in the hands of the contractors, when they shall have been turned over to the Government by said contractors, five thousand dollars."

#### MARINE CORPS.

Limiting and provision "\* \* \* From and after the passage of this act there shall be no appointments, except by promotion, to fill vacancies occurring in the list of commissioned officers of the Marine Corps until the number of such officers shall have been reduced, by casualties or otherwise, below seventy-five as fixed by the act approved June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-six; and after the number of officers shall be reduced as above provided, the whole number of commissioned offi-

cers on the active list in the Marine Corps shall not exceed seventy-five."

A provision "\* \* \* That all appropriations made by the act of July seventh, eighteen hundred and eightyfour, making temporary provisions for the naval service for the six months ending December thirty-first, eighteen hundred and eighty-four, or any balances thereof that may be unexpended at that date, be, and they are hereby, reappropriated, continued, and made available for the remainder of the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and eighty-five.

Secretary of the Navy to report to Congress; civilian employees.

"\* \* That the Secretary of the Navy is hereby to Condifferent directed to report to Congress, at its next and each regular session thereafter, the amount expended during the prior fiscal year, from the appropriations for the pay of the Navy, Bureaus of Navigation, Ordnance, Equipment and Recruiting, Yards and Docks, Medicine and Surgery, Provisions and Clothing, Construction and Repair, and Steam-Engineering, for civilians employed on clerical duty, or in any other capacity than as ordinary mechanics and workingmen, and to submit, under the estimates for pay of the Navy and for the respective Bureaus enumerated above, specific estimates for such civilian employees for the fiscal year eighteen hundred and eighty-seven, and each fiscal year thereafter."

Approved, January 30, 1885.

# FORTY-EIGHTH CONGRESS, SECOND SESSION—MARCH 3, 1885.

# [Public-No. 90.]

AN ACT Making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and eighty-six, and for other purposes.

["Pay of the Navy" contains practically the same items as the act for the previous year, but after the paragraph "For pay to petty officers, seamen, ordinary seamen, landsmen, and boys, including men in the engineer's force and for the Coast Survey service, not exceeding eight thousand two hundred and fifty in all, two million four hundred and ninety thousand dollars," there is a division headed "Miscellaneous," which contains the remainder of the items formerly under "Pay of the Navy," beginning "For two secretaries, one to the Admiral and one to the Vice-Admiral, clerks to paymasters, clerks at inspections, navy-yards, and stations, and extra pay to men enlisted under honorable discharge;" and continuing with practically the same language as in previous act to the end of the paragraph.]

#### BUREAU OF ORDNANCE.

Wording is slightly changed. Practically the same items appropriated for as heretofore with some additions and, in altered form, as follows:

"For preserving and handling ordnance and ordnance material of the kinds now in service, for the armament of ships therewith, for the purchase or manufacture of ammunition therefor, for materials and labor to be used in the general work of the Ordnance Bureau for these purposes; for furniture at magazines, at the ordnance dock, New York, and at the naval ordnance proving-ground, \* \* ."

A provision "for the purchase or manufacture of steel of small callguns of small caliber for ships now in service, and for ber. testing the same at the naval ordnance proving ground,

"For the completion and public test of two breech-loading rifle cannon of the larger calibers now in course cannon."

of construction for the Navy, with carriages and ammunition for both, \* \* \*.

"For completing a six-inch wire-wound gun, \* \* \*. One six-inch wire-wound gun, "For testing American armor made of American mate-gun.

#### BUREAU OF MEDICINE AND SURGERY.

A provision "for contingent expenses of the bureau: Contingent For \* \* expressage on medical stores; toll, fer-

postage \* rent of telephones; and purchase of stamps for foreign service; rent of rooms for \* \* \* museum of hygiene; \* \* furniture and incidental articles for Naval labo- museum of hygiene, naval dispensary, Washington, navalratory. laboratory, sick-quarters at Naval Academy, and dispensaries at navy-yards; washing for medical department at museum of hygiene, naval dispensary, Washington, naval laboratory, sick-quarters at Naval Academy, dispensaries at navy-yards, and for receiving-ships and rendezvous, twenty-five thousand dollars."

#### BUREAU OF PROVISIONS AND CLOTHING.

"For provisions for the seamen and marines; commuted rations for \* \* \*, naval cadets, \* \*." Navy. A provision for expenses of naval clothing factory.

#### NAVAL ACADEMY.

Practically the same expenditures as in previous acts, provided for with slight changes.

#### INCREASE OF THE NAVY.

Under "Increase of the Navy" it is provided: "To enable the President to strengthen the naval establishment of the United States by additional vessels of the best and most modern design, having the highest attainable speed, the sum of one million eight hundred and ninety-five thousand dollars is hereby appropriated, to be expended as follows and under the following limitations:

Two additional cruisers.

"For the construction of two cruisers of not less than three thousand nor more than five thousand tons displacement, costing, exclusive of armament, not more than one million one hundred thousand dollars each; one heavily armed gunboat of about sixteen hundred tons displacement, costing, exclusive of armament, not more than Two addi-five hundred and twenty thousand dollars; and one light gunboat of about eight hundred tons displacement, costing, exclusive of armament, not more than two hundred and seventy five thousand dollars; and authority is hereby given for the construction of said four vessels, at not exceeding the total cost for each above specified, in accordance with such final plan as may be determined upon, after a revision and reconsideration of all designs which have been heretofore made, and in the manner and conformity to the conditions and limitations provided for the construction of the new cruisers in the acts of August fifth, eighteen hundred and eighty-two, and of March third, eighteen hundred and eighty-three, except so far as said acts provide for and define the duties of Naval Advisory Board.

"SEC. 2. That the President be, and he is hereby, authorized to return the Arctic steamer Alert to Her Maj-

esty's Government, with the thanks of the Government of the United States for the generous and graceful act of courtesy in so promptly tendering the gift of that vessel, and for the valuable service thereby rendered to

the cause of science and humanity.

"SEC. 3. That the Secretary of the Navy be, and he is hereby, directed to transfer to the Treasury Department, for use as a revenue-cutter in the waters of Alaska, the steamer Bear, of the late Greely relief expedition, and is hereby authorized to place the steamer Thetis for use in the Navy, as a surveying vessel or otherwise."

Provision: "For the pay of officers on sea-duty; offi-differentiated. cers on shore and other duty; officers on waiting orders; officers on the retired-list; Admiral's and Vice-Admiral's secretaries; clerks to commandants of yards and stations; clerks to paymasters at yards and stations; inspections; receiving-ships and other vessels; extra pay to men reenlisting under honorable discharge; pay of petty officers, seamen, landsmen, and boys, including men in the engineers' force, and for the Coast Survey service and Fish Commission, seven thousand five hundred men and seven hundred and fifty boys at the pay prescribed by

ferriage, tolls, \* \* \*; canal tolls \* \* \*; Canal tolls, tultion, etc. cost of special instruction at home or abroad, including maintenance of students, \* \* \* and other necessary incidental expenses,

Provision: "For the compensation of the two civilian Civilian exmembers of the Naval Advisory Board for the time they Advisory may serve after June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and Board, pay of. eighty-six, at the rate of two thousand five hundred dollars each for six months, and of two hundred and fifty dollars each for traveling and other expenses for six months, five thousand five hundred dollars: Provided, That the sum accepted by them under this act shall be in full of all services rendered after June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and eighty-six."

"For contingent expenses of the Bureau of Navigation, namely: For \* \* \* furniture, stationery, and fuel for navigation offices at navy-yards, \* \* \*.

Transit of Venus Com-

"For the completion and other expenses connected with the reduction of the observations of the transit of Venus, in eighteen hundred and seventy-four and eighteen hundred and eighty-two, to be expended under the direction of the Transit of Venus Commission: *Provided*, That said Commission shall deliver all the instruments and other public property in its possession into the custody of the Secretary of the Navy, three thousand dollars.

Civil establishment.

"For the civil establishment at navy-yards and stations, including master of tugs, storekeepers, clerks, writers, and all clerical work, \* \* \*; and no other fund appropriated by this act shall be used in payment for such services."

#### BUREAU OF ORDNANCE.

Test of rifled cannon.

"One or more rifled cannon of each type constructed at the cost of the United States for the Navy shall be publicly subjected to the proper test for endurance, including such rapid firing as a like gun would be subjected to in battle. This test shall be under the direction and to the satisfaction of the Secretary of the Navy, and if such guns do not prove satisfactory, the type they represent shall not be put in use in the naval service.

Civil establishment.

"For the civil establishment at navy-yards and stations, including writers, clerks, foreman, draughtsmen, assistant draughtsman, and a chemist, twenty-three thousand two hundred and four dollars; and no other fund appropriated by this act shall be used in payment for such services.

Ferry launch.

"For new ferry-launch, in place of the one now in use, which shall be sold, and building fuse-room and coalshed. \* \* \*.

Armament, steam cruisers.

"Chicago, Boston, Atlanta, and Dolphin: To complete the armament of the three steam-cruisers, the Chicago, Boston, and Atlanta, and the dispatch boat Dolphin, \* \* \*."

# BUREAU OF EQUIPMENT AND RECRUITING.

Civil estab- "For the civil establishment at navy-yards and stations, including clerks, writers, and superintendent of rope-walk, \* \* \*."

#### BUREAU OF YARDS AND DOCKS.

"For the civil establishment at navy-yards and sta- Civil establishment. tions, consisting of writers, clerks, messengers, telegraph operators, draughtsmen, foreman laborers and foreman masons, quarterman brick and stone masons, and pilots, including the work of bell-ringing and lamp lighting, \* \* \*; and no other fund appropriated by this act shall be used in payment for such service."

#### BUREAU OF PROVISIONS AND CLOTHING.

"For \* \* .\* commuted rations stopped on account of sick in hospital and credited to the hospital fund; water for drinking and cooking purposes on board ships; and for labor and expenses of inspections, and the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars of the amount now standing to the credit of the clothing Credits of fund, and the further sum of seventy-five thousand dol-and small lars of the amount now standing to the credit of the small stores fund stores fund of the Bureau of Provisions and Clothing the Treasury. shall be forthwith covered into the Treasury.

"For the civil establishment, to include firemen, civil estab-writers, receivers, assistant receivers, messengers, leading men and pressmen in inspection office, superintendent of coffee and spice mill, box-maker, coffee-roaster, enginetender, teamster, telephone-operating, cutter, machineoperator, and two laborers, thirty-five thousand dollars; and no other fund appropriated by this act shall be used

in payment for such services."

## BUREAU OF CONSTRUCTION AND REPAIR.

Provided, That in the discretion of the Secretary of the Navy thirty thousand dollars of the amount hereby appropriated may be used to repair and furnish a suitable vessel, if in his judgment it can be done without injury to the service, said vessel to be used as a nautical school ship at the port of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, under the authority and provisions of the act of Congress of June twentieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-four; but the United States shall be put to no charge or expense and shall incur no liability in relation to said vessel while the same is in such use:

"Chicago, Boston, Atlanta, and Dolphin: To complete Completion the construction of the three steel cruisers the Chicago, cruisers and Boston, and Atlanta, and to pay the amount due on the one dispatch boat. dispatch-boat Dolphin, authorized by the act approved March third, eighteen hundred and eighty-three, ninetyfive thousand eight hundred and sixty-one dollars."

School ship.

#### BUREAU OF STEAM-ENGINEERING.

Civil estab- "For the civil establishment in the navy-yards, to include clerks, draughtsmen, assistant draughtsmen, messengers, writers, receivers, and weighers, \* \* \*.

"The duties of the several clerks, writers, and other employees at the navy-yards appropriated for in this act shall be designated by the Secretary of the Navy or under his direction."

#### NAVAL ACADEMY.

Special "For special course of study and training of naval course study, cadets, as authorized by act of Congress approved August fifth, eighteen hundred and eighty-two, five thousand dollars."

Board of "For expenses of the Board of Visitors to the Naval Academy, \* \* \* , being for mileage and five dollars per diem for each member for expenses during actual attendance at the Academy."

Huron dead. "For head-stones for the graves of sixty sailors and marines buried in the naval cemetery at the Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland, who lost their lives by being wrecked in the United States steamer Huron, five hundred dollars.

Naval Observatory.

"For commencing the erection of the new Naval Observatory on the site purchased under the act of Congress approved February fourth, eighteen hundred and eighty, fifty thousand dollars: Provided, That the construction of no building shall be commenced except an observatory proper, with necessary offices for observers and computers."

Balances turned into of the Navy or pay of the Marine Corps, for any year existing after the accounts for said year shall have been settled shall be covered into the Treasury."

# FORTY-NINTH CONGRESS. FIRST SESSION—AUGUST 3, 1886.

[Public—No. 167.]

AN ACT To increase the Naval establishment.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the President is hereby authorized to have constructed, as hereinafter provided—

First. Two sea-going double-bottomed armored vessels Armored vessels. of about six thousand tons displacement, designed for a speed of at least sixteen knots an hour, with engines having all necessary appliances for working under forced draught, and costing, including engines and machinery and excluding armament, not more than two million five hundred thousand dollars each. Said vessels shall have each a complete torpedo outfit and be armed in the most effective manner.

Cruiser.

Second. One protected double-bottomed cruiser of not less than three thousand five hundred nor more than five thousand tons displacement, designed to have the highest practicable speed and furnished with the best type of modern engines, furnished with necessary appliances for working under forced draught. Said vessel shall cost, including engines and machinery and excluding armament, not exceeding one million five hundred thousand dollars.

Third. One first class torpedo-boat, costing in the ag- boat.

gregate not more than one hundred thousand dollars.

Sec. 2. That the vessels hereinbefore authorized to be constructed shall be built of steel of domestic manufacture, having a tensile strength of not less than sixty thousand pounds per square inch, and an elongation in eight inches of not less than twenty-five per centum.

SEC. 3. That the President is hereby authorized to Completion monitors. direct the completion, as hereinafter provided, of the double-turreted monitors Puritan, Amphitrite, Monadnock, and Terror, at a total cost, exclusive of armament, not to exceed three million one hundred and seventy-

eight thousand and forty-six dollars.

SEC. 4. That the armor used in constructing said Armor of armored vessels and for completing said monitors shall facture. be of the best obtainable quality and of domestic manufacture, provided contracts for furnishing the same in a reasonable time, at a reasonable price, and of the required quality can be made with responsible parties. Such armor shall be accepted only after passing such tests as shall be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy and inserted in the contracts.

Completion in navy yard of one vessel.

Sec. 5. That the Secretary of the Navy shall cause one or more of the new vessels hereinbefore provided for to be constructed and one or more of the said monitors to be completed in one or more of the navy-yards of the United States; and if he shall be unable to contract with responsible parties to construct or complete, at reasonable prices, all or any of the vessels hereinbefore provided for, he shall cause the same to be constructed or completed in such of the navy-yards of the United States as may be best adapted thereto.

New vessels, machinery of, domestic manufacture.

Sec. 6. That the engines, boilers, and machinery of all the new vessels provided for by this act shall be of domestic manufacture and procured by contract, unless the Secretary of the Navy shall be unable to obtain the same at fair prices, in which case he may construct the same, or any portion thereof, in the navy-yards of the United States: Provided, That the Secretary of the Navy may purchase abroad only such shafting as it may be impossible to obtain in the United States in time for use in the construction of the vessels herein provided for.

Sec. 7. That the Secretary of the Navy shall not contract for the construction or completion of any of said vessels, or of their engines, machinery, or boilers, until drawings and specifications of the same shall have been provided or adopted by him; and after said drawings and specifications shall have been-provided, adopted, and approved as aforesaid, and work shall have been commenced on any contract made therefor, such plans and specifications shall not be changed in any respect when the cost of such change in the execution of the work exceeds five hundred dollars, except upon the written order of the Secretary or Acting Secretary of the Navy; and if changes are thus made, the actual cost thereof and the damage caused thereby shall be ascertained, estimated, and determined by a board of naval officers to be provided for in the contract; and in any contract made pursuant to this act it shall be provided in the terms thereof that the contractor shall be bound by the determination of said board, or a majority thereof, as to the amount of increase or diminished compensation said contractor shall be entitled to receive, if any, in consequence of such change or changes. In every contract to be made under this act there shall be prescribed a period within which the work provided for in said contract, or specified portions thereof, shall be completed, and the completion of such work within the periods prescribed shall be insured by penal provisions. For the construction or completion of such vessels hereinbefore provided for as the Secretary of the Navy shall propose to have constructed or completed by contract, as well as also for the engines, boilers, and machinery hereinbefore provided for, he shall invite Proposals proposals from every American shipbuilder and other person who shall show to the satisfaction of the Secre-

shipbuilders.

tary of the Navy that within three months from the date of the contract he will be possessed of the necessary plant for the performance of the work in the United States which he shall offer to undertake, and such contract shall be let to the lowest and best responsible bidder or bidders. after at least sixty days' advertisement, published in five leading papers of the United States, inviting proposals for the work proposed, which work shall be subject to all such rules, regulations, superintendence by naval officers during construction, and provisions as to bonds and security for the quality and due completion of the work as the Secretary of the Navy shall prescribe; and no vessel, boiler, engine, machinery, or portion thereof shall be accepted unless completed in strict conformity with the contract; and the authority given hereby shall take effect at once. The Secretary of the Navy shall have the power to reject any or all bids made under the provisions of this act.

SEC. 8. That the sum of one million dollars is hereby Armament of vessels authorappropriated towards the armament of the vessels au- ized. thorized by the act of March third, eighteen hundred and eighty-five, of the vessels authorized by section one of this act, and of the unfinished monitors hereinbefore mentioned, and of the Miantonomoh; and the Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to direct the application mon. of such portions of this sum as may be necessary to the manufacture or purchase of such tools and machinery or the erection of such structures as may be required for use in the manufacture of such armament, or any part thereof: Provided, That the Secretary of the Navy may contract with domestic manufacturers for the construction of such portion of the heavy guns herein provided for as may not be built by the Government.

Sec. 9. That the Secretary of the Navy is hereby au- Dynamite thorized to contract with the Pneumatic Dynamite-Gun authorized. Company of New York for one dynamite-gun cruiser, as Pneumatic follows: Said cruiser to be not less than two hundred and Company. thirty feet long, twenty-six feet breadth of beam, seven and one-half feet draught, three thousand two hundred horse-power, and guaranteed to attain a speed of twenty knots an hour, and to be equipped with three pneumatic dynamite-guns of ten and one-half inch caliber, and guaranteed to throw shells containing two hundred pounds of dynamite or other high explosives at least one mile, each gun to be capable of being discharged once in two minutes, at a price not to exceed three hundred and fifty thousand dollars; said contract to be made only on condition that there shall be a favorable report made by the existing Naval Board on the system; to be paid for as the work progresses, and upon the report of such board or boards of inspectors as the Secretary of the Navy may for that purpose appoint, reserving thirty per centum on

all such payments until the whole work is completed and

accepted by the Secretary of the Navy.

The Pneumatic Dynamite-Gun Company shall furnish bonds satisfactory to the Secretary of the Navy for the faithful performance of its contract, and for the refunding of the money paid hereunder in case of the nonperformance of the same, and shall further agree with the Secretary of the Navy upon a limit of price which shall not be exceeded in any future contracts which the Government may desire to enter into for the purchase of

the company's guns.

Sec. 10. That towards the construction and completion of the vessels hereinbefore mentioned, including the vessel and guns mentioned in section nine, the sum of two million five hundred thousand dollars is hereby appropriated, of which not more than seventy-five thou-Experiment sand dollars may be expended in manufacturing, purchasing, and experimenting with torpedoes of domestic manufacture and not exceeding one hundred and fifty thousand dollars may be expended, under the direction of the Secretary of the Navy, in improving the plant of such of the navy-yards as he may select.

# FORTY-NINTH CONGRESS, SECOND SESSION-MARCH 3, 1887.

AN ACT Making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and eighty-eight, and for other purposes.

[In this act the method of dealing with civil establishment at navy yards and stations differs from the plan hitherto followed, in that the positions and salaries of the several employees are specifically mentioned. Publishing the statutory positions of clerical, drafting, inspection and messenger service at navy yards and stations is not deemed to be of sufficient importance to refer to here. Accordingly provisions relating to civil establishment, in so far as they relate to individual positions, are omitted until such time as the subject is later treated generally.

Provision is made for the Naval Establishment, and under the

Sec. 2. That for the purpose of increasing the naval establishment of the United States the President is hereby authorized to have constructed by contract two steel gunboats each of about seventeen hundred tons displacement; of the type of gunboat number one; at a cost, exclusive of armament, of not more than five hundred and Two steel fifty thousand dollars each, two steel cruisers to be provided with such armament for each as the Navy Department may deem suitable. The cost of both of said cruisers

> in the aggregate, complete, exclusive of armament, and excluding any premiums that may be paid for speed for the same shall not be more than three million dollars. The sum of one million five hundred thousand dollars is

hereby appropriated out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated toward the construction of said vessels.

That in the construction of the aforesaid vessels all of the provisions of the act of August third, eighteen hundred and eighty-six, entitled "An act to increase the naval establishment," as to material for said vessels, their engines, boilers, and machinery, the contracts under which they are built, the notice of and proposals for the same, the plans, drawings, and specifications therefor, and the method of executing said contracts, shall be observed and followed, and said vessels shall be built in compliance with the terms of said act, so far as the same relate to vessels constructed under contract, save that in all their parts they shall be of domestic manufacture. The contracts for the construction of said cruisers shall contain provisions to the effect that the contractor guarantees that when completed and tested for speed, under condi-vided for. tions to be prescribed by the Navy Department, the vessel shall exhibit a maximum speed of at least nineteen knots per hour; and for every quarter knot of speed so exhibited above said guarantee the contractor shall receive a premium over and above his contract-price of fifty thousand dollars, and for every quarter knot that said vessel fails of reaching said guaranteed speed there shall be deducted from the contract-price the sum of fifty thousand dollars.

In making proposals for contracts for building the vessels authorized to be constructed under this act, it shall be required that one of such vessels shall be built on or near the coast of the Pacific Ocean, or the waters connecting therewith, one of them on or near the coast of the Gulf of Mexico, or the waters connecting therewith, and two of them on or near the coast of the Atlantic Ocean, or the waters connecting therewith, and at such places on or near such coasts or waters as the Secretary of the Navy shall approve.

If it shall appear to the satisfaction of the President of the United States, from the biddings for said contracts, when the same are opened and examined by him, that said vessels cannot be constructed at a fair cost on or near the coast of the Pacific Ocean or the Gulf of Mexico, he shall authorize the construction of said vessels or either of them elsewhere in the United States. And the Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to readvertise for the construction of cruiser number one, known as "The Newark," and the limit of cost of said vessel is hereby extended to one million three hundred thousand dolliars, exclusive of armament.

SEC. 3. That for the purpose of further increasing the naval establishment of the United States, the sums of money hereinafter named are hereby appropriated, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, Newark.

The contract for the construction of said cruising monitor, her boilers, engines, and machinery, shall contain provisions to the effect that, under conditions to be prescribed by the Navy Department, the contractor shall guarantee that the collective horse-power developed by the engines of said vessel shall equal seven thousand five hundred indicated horse-power, and that said vessel when completed and tested for speed, under conditions to be prescribed by the Navy Department, shall exhibit a maximum speed of not less than seventeen knots per hour; and the contract for said vessel shall contain a further provision that for every quarter of knot of speed so exhibited above said guaranty of seventeen knots the contractor shall receive a premium, over and above the contract price, of fifty thousand dollars, and for every quarter-knot that said vessel fails of reaching said guaranteed speed there shall be deducted from the contract price the sum of fifty thousand dollars. The material, boilers, engines, and machinery shall be of domestic manufacture and of the latest and most approved quality and

The act of August third, eighteen hundred and eightysix, entitled "An act to increase the Naval Establishment," so far as applicable, shall govern the construction

of said vessel.

And the President is also hereby further authorized to gun cruiser. contract with the Pneumatic Dynamite Gun Company for the construction of one additional cruiser of the Vesuvius type, of not less dimensions than that vessel, and to attain a speed under similar conditions as to trial, of twenty-one knots an hour, with an endurance of not less than fifteen days at ten knots an hour, to be armed with two pneumatic dynamite guns of fifteen inch caliber, and to be fitted for such other armament as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe: Provided, That the contractors shall guarantee a speed of twenty knots an hour, and that there shall be deducted from the contract price the sum of ten thousand dollars for every quarter knot that said vessel fails of reaching the further speed of twenty-one knots per hour: And provided further, That the Secretary of the Navy shall be satisfied, after official tests made with the Vesuvius and her guns, as to the

efficiency of the armament of that vessel; and the cost of said vessel shall not exceed the sum of four hundred and

fifty thousand dollars.

The act of August third, eighteen hundred and eightysix, entitled "An act to increase the Naval Establishment," so far as applicable, shall govern the construction of the two steel cruisers or gun-boats, and the ram herein authorized; and all of said vessels shall be of domestic

manufacture.

Rifled guns.

To enable the Secretary of the Navy to test, and if found satisfactory, to purchase three or more rapid-fire rapid-twist, one-pounder breech-loading rifled guns, and an equal number of the same type of three-pounder guns, and an equal number of the same type of thirty-twopounder guns, as the Secretary of the Navy may designate, said test to be made with the cartridge known as a reinforce cartridge, and for said purpose the sum of fifty thousand dollars is hereby appropriated: Provided, That no part of this money shall be expended until the owners of the patents for such guns and cartridges shall contract at such a price as shall be satisfactory to the Secretary of the Navy for the exclusive right on the part of the Government to manufacture, by contract or otherwise, such guns and cartridges without the payment of any royalty upon the same, the option of the Government to make such contract to be exercised within a period to be fixed by said contract.

Construction and steam machinery: Towards the construction and completion of the new vessels heretofore and herein authorized by Congress, with their engines, boilers, and machinery, and for the payment of premiums for increased speed or horse-power under contracts now existing and to be made under this and other acts providing for increase of the Navy, four million and fifty-five thousand dollars, of which sum fifty-five thousand dollars is hereby authorized to be expended by the Secretary of the Navy upon the electric lighting of the Miantonomah, Terror, Monadnock, Petrel, and Vesuvius, in addition to the amounts heretofore authorized to be expended on the said vessels.

AN ACT Making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and ninety-two, and for other purposes.

Provision is made for the Naval Establishment, and under the headings—1

## BUREAU OF NAVIGATION.

Provision for telegraphic cable surveys: "To enable cable cable the President to cause careful soundings to be made between San Francisco, California, and Honolulu, in the Kingdom of the Hawaiian Islands, for the purpose of determining the practicability of the laying of a telegraphic cable between those points, twenty-five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, and the President is hereby authorized to direct the use of any vessel or vessels belonging to United States in making such survey."

#### BUREAU OF ORDNANCE.

New magazine: For new magazine for naval purposes New magaat Sitka or Juneau, Alaska, ten thousand dollars.

Craney Island Magazine: For dredging on the chan-land. Craney Isnel to Craney Island Magazine, Norfolk Harbor, and for repairs to the wharves and buildings, fifteen thousand dollars.

Purchase of floating or tug crane: For the purchase crane. of a floating or tug crane for use in the transportation of material at the New York navy yard, thirty thousand dollars.

Armor tests: For the purpose of making ballistic tests and experiments in the development of American armor the Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to use one hundred thousand dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary out of the appropriation of one million

Naval Militia. Naval militia: For arms and equipment connected therewith for naval militia of various States under such regulations as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe, twenty-five thousand dollars.

Dry-Dock on Puget Sound: That the Secretary of the Dry-dock Navy be, and he hereby is, authorized to acquire for the purposes of a dry-dock a tract of land not exceeding two chard. hundred acres in extent on Puget Sound, at Port Orchard in the county of Kitsap, State of Washington, at such point as he may select, and a sum not exceeding ten thousand dollars to pay for said land is hereby appropriated; and the Secretary of the Navy is authorized to have constructed by contract, after public advertisement upon said land so selected, for naval and commercial purposes, a dry-dock, to be not less than six hundred feet in length, not less than seventy feet in width at bottom of entrance, and capable of admitting vessels drawing thirty feet of water; the cost of said dry-dock not to exceed seven hundred thousand dollars, of which the sum of two hundred thousand dollars is hereby appropriated for use during the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and ninety-two.

And the Secretary of the Navy be, and he is hereby, Purchase of empowered and directed to purchase said tract of land at such price as he may deem reasonable; and where he is unable to purchase the same at such price or where the

owner or owners of any of said tract of land may be unable for any reason to vest by voluntary conveyance a complete and valid title to any part of said tract of land hereinbefore described, then the same shall be acquired by condemnation, agreeably to the act of Congress of August first, eighteen hundred and eighty-eight, relative to such condemnations, and to the laws of the State of

Washington for the condemnation of land for public uses in that State: Provided, That no money to be appropriated for said dry dock shall be available until a valid title to the land constituting the site of the same is vested in the United States, nor until the State of Washington shall cede to the United States exclusive jurisdiction over said tract of land during the time the United States may be or remain the owner thereof for all purposes except

the administration of the criminal laws of said State and the service of any civil process thereon.

## INCREASE OF THE NAVY.

Speed.

Proposals.

That for the purpose of further increasing the Naval establishment of the United States the President is hereby One protect- authorized to have constructed by contract one protected cruiser of about seven thousand three hundred tons displacement, at a cost, exclusive of armament, not to exceed two million seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, to have a minimum speed of not less than twentyone knots, and in the construction of said vessel all of the provisions of the act of August third, eighteen hundred and eighty-six, entitled "An act to increase the Naval Establishment," as to materials for said vessel, its engines, boilers, and machinery, the contract under which it is built, the notice of any proposals for the same, the plans, drawings, specifications therefor, and the method of executing said contract, shall be observed and followed, and said vessel shall be built in compliance with the terms of said act, save that in all its parts said vessel shall be of domestic manufacture. And in the contract for the construction thereof such provisions for minimum speed and for premiums for increased speed and penalties for deficient speed may be made subject to the terms of this bill, as in the discretion of the Secretary of the Navy may be deemed advisable; and if the Secretary of the

Navy shall be unable to contract at reasonable prices for the construction of said vessel, then he may build the same in such navy yard as he may designate. And so much of the act approved March second, eighteen hundred and eighty-nine, as authorized the construction by contract of one armored steel cruising monitor of not less than three thousand tons displacement, at a cost not exceeding one million five hundred thousand dollars

exclusive of armament and any premium for increased speed, is hereby repealed.

## INCREASE OF THE NAVY.

That for the purpose of further increasing the Naval Establishment of the United States, the President is hereby authorized to have constructed, by contract, one One armored to displace. armored cruiser of about eight thousand tons displacement of the general type of armored cruiser numbered two (New York), to cost, exclusive of armament, not more than three million five hundred thousand dollars. excluding any premium that may be paid for increased speed and the cost of armament. The contract for the construction of said cruiser shall contain provisions to the effect that the contractor guarantees that when completed and tested for speed, under conditions to be prescribed by the Navy Department, it shall exhibit a speed of at least twenty knots per hour; and for every quarter knot of speed so exhibited above said guaranteed speed the contractor shall receive a premium over and above the contract price of fifty-thousand dollars; and for every quarter knot that such vessel fails of reaching said guaranteed speed there shall be deducted from the contract price the sum of fifty thousand dollars; In the construction of said vessel all the provisions of the act of August third, eighteen hundred and eighty-six, entitled "An act to increase the Naval Establishment," as to material for said vessel, its engines, boilers, and machinery, the contract under which it is built, the notice of and proposals for the same, the plans, drawings, specifications therefor, and the method of executing said contract, shall be observed and followed, and said vessel shall be built in compliance with the terms of said act, save that in all its parts said vessel shall be of domestic manufacture. If the Secretary of the Navy shall be unable to contract at reasonable prices for the building of said vessel, then he may build such vessel in such navyvard as he may designate.

Also one sea-going coast-line battle ship, designed to one ship. carry the heaviest armor and most powerful ordnance, with a displacement of about nine thousand tons, to have the highest practicable speed for vessels of its class, and to cost, exclusive of armament and of any premiums that may be paid for increased speed, not exceeding four million dolfars.

And in the construction of said battle ship, the provisions of the act of August third, eighteen hundred and eighty-six, entitled "An act to increase the Naval Establishment," shall be observed and followed in the same manner that the provisions of said act are applied to the construction of the armored cruiser herein authorized; and in the contracts for the construction of said battle ship, such provisions for minimum speed and for premiums for increased speed and penalties for deficient

speed may be made, subject to the terms of this act, as in the discretion of the Secretary of the Navy may be deemed advisable.

The contract for the construction of either of said gunboats shall contain such provisions as to speed and premiums and penalties affected by speed as may in the judgment of the Secretary of the Navy may be deemed proper and fitting. shall be built in compliance with the terms of said act, save that in all their parts said vessel shall be of domestic manufacture: Provided, however, That the Secretary of the Navy shall not receive or consider bids from any party or parties not provided with a plant suitable to do Proposals the work: And provided further, That in awarding the contract for any one of these ships, the Secretary of the Navy shall award the contract at the price of the lowest bid to that one of the parties bidding on any such ship which in his judgment it is in the interest of the Government to have to do the work. If the Secretary of the Navy shall be unable to contract at reasonable prices for the building of said vessels, then he may build such vessels in such navy-yard as he may designate.

## NAVAL ACADEMY.

ing each Member and Delegate of the House of Representatives of any vacancy that may exist in his district. "That every Member or Delegate of Congress whose district or territory is now unrepresented at the Naval Academy by a cadet who is not an actual resident of the district shall be permitted on or before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and ninety-four, to recommend a candidate for appointment as a cadet at the Naval Academy, and the Secretary of the Navy shall nominate such candidate for appointment to the Academy, subject to qualifications now prescribed by law. Such cadets when appointed to be in addition to the number of cadets now allowed, and the sum of five thousand five hundred dollars, or so much thereof as is necessary, is hereby appropriated for the additional number of cadets herein

authorized."

exceeding four per centum of the lowest accepted bid for the other battle ships or torpedo boats provided for in this act, and one torpedo boat on the Mississippi River, one torpedo boat on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico, and one torpedo boat on the Missouri River: Provided, That if it shall appear to the satisfaction of the President of the United States, from the biddings for such contracts when the same are opened and examined by him, that said vessels can not be constructed at a fair cost on or near the coast of the Pacific Ocean, on the Mississippi or Missouri River or the Gulf of Mexico, he shall authorize the construction of said vessels, or either of them, elsewhere in the United States, subject to the limitations as to cost hereinbefore provided: Provided further, That the contracts for the construction of the vessels herein provided for shall be made within one hundred and Armor plate, twenty days from the passage of this act: And provided further, That the Secretary of the Navy is hereby directed to examine into the actual cost of armor plate and the price of the same which should be equitably paid and shall report the result of his investigation to Congress at its next session at a date not later than January first, eighteen hundred and ninety-seven, and no contract for armor plate for the vessels authorized by this act shall be made till after such report is made to Congress for its action.

AN ACT Making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and ninety-nine, and for other purposes.

[Provision is made for the Naval Establishment, and under the headings---]

## PAY OF THE NAVY.

It is provided "Whenever, within the next twelve Officers from months, an exigency may exist which, in the judgment of pointment of. the President, renders their services necessary, he is hereby authorized to appoint from civil life and commission such officers of the line and staff, not above the rank or relative rank of commander, and warrant officers including warrant machinists, and such officers of the Marine Corps not above the rank of captain, to be appointed from the non-commissioned officers of the Corps and from civil life, as may be requisite: Provided, That such officers shall serve only during the continuance of the exigency under which their services are required in the existing war: And provided further, That such officers so appointed shall be assigned to duty with rank and pay of the grades established by existing law; and warrant machinists shall be paid at the rate of one thousand two hundred dollars per annum.

"To enable the Secretary of the Navy to enlist, at any Increased entime after the passage of this act, as many additional thority for." seamen, landsmen, and boys as he may deem necessary to man the ships of the Navy, or in use by the Navy, as a temporary force therefor during the existing war, and for pay of the same and of the temporary additional officers and warrant machinists hereinbefore authorized, eight million eight hundred and thirty thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary; and to enable the Secretary of the Navy to enlist, at any time after the passage of this act, the following additional force for the Marine Corps as a temporary force during the existing war, namely, not more than sixty gunnery sergeants in. Corps, increase with rank of first sergeants, not more than eighty corporals, and not more than one thousand five hundred privates, and for pay of the same, including the temporary additional officers hereinbefore authorized, and for provisions, clothing, fuel, military stores, transportation and recruiting, and for contingent expenses, on account of

and most powerful ordnance upon a displacement of about eleven thousand tons, to have the highest practicable speed for vessels of their class, and to cost, exclusive of armor and armament, not exceeding three million dollars each, one of said battle ships to be named the Maine; and four harbor-defense vessels of the monitor Four harbor-defense vessels, type, each having one or two turrets, and to cost, exclusive of armament, not exceeding one million two hundred Sixteen tor- and fifty thousand dollars each; and sixteen torpedo boat destroyers of about four hundred tons displacement. and twelve torpedo boats of about one hundred and fifty One gunboat tons displacement, to have the highest practicable speed, and to cost in all, exclusive of armament, not exceeding six million nine hundred thousand dollars; and one gunboat to take the place of the United States steamship Michigan, to cost, exclusive of armament, not more than two hundred and sixty thousand dollars, said gunboat to be constructed on the Great Lakes or their connecting waters: Provided, That said construction of said gunboat shall conform to all existing treaties and conventions. And not more than two of said battle ships, and not more than two of said harbor-defense vessels, and not more than five of said torpedo-boat destroyers, and not more than four of said torpedo boats shall be built in one yard or by one contracting party, and the contracts for the construction of each of said vessels shall be awarded by the Secretary of the Navy to the lowest best responsible bidder, having in view the best results and most expeditious delivery; and in the construction of all said vessels all of the provisions of the act of August third, eighteen hundred and eighty-six, entitled "An act to increase the naval establishment," and amendments subsequently made thereto as to materials for said vessels, their engines, boilers, and machinery, the contracts under which they are built, except as to premiums, which are not to be offered, the notice of any proposals for the same, the plans, drawings, and specifications therefor, and the method of executing said contracts, shall be observed and followed, and said vessels shall be built in compliance with the terms of said act, save that in all their parts said vessels shall be of domestic manufacture except that no proposal for the torpedo vessels shall be considered unless the bidder is already in possession of adequate plant, and that the advertisement relating to the proposals for such vessels may be published for three weeks only; and, subject to the provisions hereinafter made, one and not more than one of the aforesaid seagoing battle ships, and one and not more than one of the aforesaid harbor-defense vessels, shall be built on or near the coast of the Pacific Ocean or in the waters connecting Where to be therewith: Provided, That if it shall appear to the satisfaction of the President of the United States, from the biddings for such contracts when the same are opened and

examined by him, said vessel, or either of them, can not be constructed on or near the coast of the Pacific Ocean at a cost not exceeding four per centum above the lowest accepted bid for the other battle ships or harbor-defense vessels provided for in this act, he shall authorize the construction of said vessel, or either of them, elsewhere in the United States, subject to the limitations as to cost hereinbefore provided.

That hereafter all first-class battle ships and monitors owned by the United States shall be named for the States, No. 80 sels. and shall not be named for any city, place, or person until the names of the States, shall have been exhausted:

Railroad Company, said slip to be enlarged beyond its present width eighty feet upon the lands of the United States and twenty feet upon the lands of the Fitchburg Railroad Company, so that the same shall be one hundred and sixty feet in width, measured northerly from the land parallel to and twenty feet southerly from the boundary between the lands of the United States and lands of the Fitchburg Railroad Company, and to be increased in length to a total of five hundred and seventv feet, measured from the harbor commissioners' line as now established upon the front of the said railroad company's property; the said slip to be used by both the Fitchburg Railroad and the United States for the berthing of vessels at their respective wharves; and the Secretary of the Navy is empowered to make a contract with the said Fitchburg Railroad Company pursuant to the provisions of this act. That in consideration of the privileges granted by this act to the Fitchburg Railroad Company for the use of a portion of this slip extending northerly of the boundary line of the United States navyyard, said railroad company shall build suitable retaining walls upon the east side and at the head of the slip upon the Government lands, or if the United States shall so elect in lieu thereof shall pay to the United States such sums of money as may be determined by arbitration, and shall dredge the entire slip or basin to a depth of thirty feet at mean low water and maintain such depth as long as it enjoys the privileges above stated. It is further provided that the said railroad company shall use and occupy only sixty feet of the width of the said basin within the limits of the navy-yard property, and is to erect no construction of any kind within the limits of the said basin, either upon the lands of the Government or upon that portion of the said railroad company's lands included in the basin. That the right to use said dock or any part thereof by said railroad company may be temporarily suspended by the Secretary of the Navy whenever in case of war or other emergency it shall be necessary, in his judgment, for the United States Government to have the exclusive use of the same, and for any such suspension said company shall not be entitled to any compensation. The Secretary of the Navy shall notify the railroad company to that effect, and thereupon and during the continuance of such emergency the Government shall have the sole use of said dock. That the entire expense of the construction of the said slip or basin and all future repair thereof shall be borne by the said railroad company, including the excavation and removal of any wharves, piers, buildings, earth, or constructions of any kind that may be upon the said site, and said materials and constructions shall be disposed of in such a manner or deposited in such places as shall be designated, with the approval of the Secretary of the Navy, and the construction and improvement herein provided for shall be without any expense whatever to the United States. That the privileges hereby granted to the Fitchburg Railroad Company shall become null and void unless the improvements hereby authorized are begun within six calendar months from the date of the approval of this act, and completed in every respect in accordance with the terms hereof, and to the acceptance of the Secretary of the Navy, within eighteen calendar months from the same date.

That for the purpose of further increasing the naval establishment of the United States the President is hereby authorized to have constructed by contract three seagoing Three battle-coast line battle ships, carrying the heaviest armor and ships. most powerful ordnance for vessels of their class upon a trial displacement of about thirteen thousand five hundred tons, to be sheathed and coppered, and to have the highest practicable speed and great radius of action, and to cost, exclusive of armor and armament, not exceeding three million six hundred thousand dollars each; three mored cruisers, armored cruisers of about twelve thousand tons trial displacement, carrying the heaviest armor and most powerful ordnance for vessels of their class, to be sheathed and coppered, and to have the highest practicable speed and great radius of action, and to cost, exclusive of armor and armament, not exceeding four million dollars each; and six protected cruisers of about two thousand five hundred cruisers. tons trial displacement, to be sheathed and coppered, and to have the highest speed compatible with good cruising qualities, great radius of action, and to carry the most powerful ordnance suited to vessels of their class, and to cost, exclusive of armament, not exceeding one million one hundred and forty-one thousand eight hundred dollars each: and the contracts for the construction of each of said vessels shall be awarded by the Secretary of the Navy to the lowest best responsible bidder, having in view the best results and most expeditious delivery; and not more than two of the seagoing battle ships and not more than two of the armored cruisers herein provided for shall be built in one yard or by one contracting party; and in the construction of all said vessels all of the provisions of the act of May fourth, eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, entitled "An act making appropriations for the naval establishment for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and ninety-nine, and for other purposes," shall be observed and followed; and, subject to the provisions hereinafter made, one and not more than one of the aforesaid seagoing battle ships, and one and not more than one of the aforesaid armored cruisers shall be built on or near the coast of the Pacific Ocean or in the waters connecting therewith: Provided, That if it shall appear to the satisfaction of the President of the United States, from the biddings for such contracts when the same are opened and examined by him, said vessels, or either of them, can not be constructed on or near the coast of the Pacific Ocean at a cost not exceeding four per centum above the lowest accepted bid for the other battle ships or cruisers provided for in this act, he shall authorize the construction of said vessels, or either of them, elsewhere in the United States, subject to the limitations as to cost hereinbefore provided.

A provision: "\* \* Fifty thousand dollars is Officers, duty hereby made immediately available for pay of additional Philippines, men and warrant machinists: Provided, That officers of pay for. the Navy, and officers and enlisted men of the Marine Corps, who have been detailed, or may hereafter be detailed, for shore duty in Alaska, the Philippine Islands, Guam, or elsewhere beyond the continental limits of the United States, shall be considered as having been detailed for "shore duty beyond seas," and shall receive pay accordingly, with such additional pay as may be provided by law for service in island possessions of the United States.

"That the advancement in rank of officers of the Navy and Marine Corps, whensoever made, for service Advancement in rank rendered during the war with Spain, pursuant, respectively, to the provisions of sections fifteen hundred and six and sixteen hundred and five of the Revised Statutes, shall not interfere with the regular promotion of officers otherwise entitled to promotion, but officers so advanced, by reason of war service, shall, after they are promoted to higher grades, be carried thereafter as additional to the numbers of each grade to which they may at any time be promoted; and each such officer shall hereafter be promoted in due course, contemporaneously with and to take rank next after the officer immediately above him; and all advancements made by reason of war service shall be appropriately so designated upon the official Navy list: Provided, however, That no promotion shall be made to fill a vacancy occasioned by the promotion, retirement, death, resignation, or dismissal of any officer of romotions who, at the time of such promotion, retirement, death, resignation, or dismissal, is an additional member of his grade under the foregoing provisions."

The board of visistors shall make an annual visitation to the Observatory at a date to be determined by the Secretary of the Navy, and may make such other visitations not exceeding two in number annually by the full board or by a duly appointed committee as may be deemed needful or expedient by a majority of the board. The board of visitors shall report to the Secretary of the Navy at least once in each year the result of its examinations of the Naval Observatory as respects the condition of buildings, instruments, and apparatus, and the efficiency with which its scientific work is prosecuted, and shall also report as respects the expenditures in the administration of the Observatory. The board of visitors shall prepare and submit to the Secretary of the Navy regulations prescribing the scope of the astronomical and other researches of the Observatory and the duties of its staff with reference thereto. When an appointment or detail is to be made to the office of astronomical director, director of the Nautical Almanac, astronomer, or assistant astronomer, the board of visitors may recommend to the Secretary of the Navy a suitable person to fill such office, but such recommendation shall be determined only by the majority vote of the members present at a regularly called meeting of the board held in the city of Washington. CONTINGENT, NAVY: \* \* \* Provides "that the untransportation of the appropriation of ten thousand of officers and dollars made in the act approved June seventh, nineteen enlisted men. hundred, to enable the Secretary of the Navy, in his discretion, to cause to be transported to their homes the remains of officers and enlisted men of the Navy and Marine Corps who die or are killed in action, ashore or afloat, outside of the continental limits of the United States, be, and the same is hereby, made available until used.

## EMERGENCY FUND, NAVY DEPARTMENT.

Provided, That the accounting officers of the Treasury are hereby authorized and directed to allow, in ployees, pay of, in less pay of the settlement of the accounts of disbursing officers involved, payments made under the appropriation "Emergency fund" to civilian employees appointed by the Navy Department for duty in and serving at naval stations maintained in the island possessions during the fiscal year nineteen hundred and two, and until such time as Congress shall make specific appropriation for the pay of such employees.

One pound and a quarter salt or smoked meat, with three ounces of dried or six ounces of canned fruit, and three gills of beans or peas, or twelve ounces of flour; or one pound of preserved meat, with three ounces of dried or six ounces of canned fruit, and twelve ounces of rice or eight ounces of canned vegetables or four ounces of desiccated vegetables; together with one pound of biscuit, two ounces of butter, four ounces of sugar, two ounces of coffee or cocoa or one-half ounce of tea and one ounce of condensed milk or evaporated cream; and a weekly allowance of one-half pound of macaroni, four ounces of cheese, four ounces of tomatoes, one-half pint of vinegar, one-half pint of pickles, one-half pint of molasses, four ounces of salt, one-quarter ounce of pepper, and one-half ounce of dry mustard. Five pounds of lard or a suitable substitute shall be allowed for every hundred pounds of flour issued as bread, and such quantities of yeast as may be necessary."

That section fifteen hundred and eighty-one of the Revised Statutes of the United States be, and the same is

hereby, amended so as to read as follows:

"Sec. 1581. The following substitution for the components of the ration may be made when deemed neces-

sary by the senior officer present in command:

"For one and one-quarter pounds of salt or smoked meat or one pound of preserved meat, one and threequarters pounds of fresh meat; in lieu of the article usually issued with salt, smoked, or preserved meat, fresh vegetables of equal value; for one pound of biscuit, one and one-quarter pounds of soft bread, or eighteen ounces of flour; for three gills of beans or peas, twelve ounces of flour or rice or eight ounces of canned vegetables, and for twelve ounces of flour or rice or eight ounces of canned vegetables, three gills of beans or peas."

That an extra allowance of one ounce of coffee or cocoa. two ounces of sugar, four ounces of hard bread or its equivalent, and four ounces of preserved meat or its equivalent shall be allowed to enlisted men of the engineer and dynamo force when standing night watches between eight o'clock postmeridian and eight o'clock antemeridian under steam.

That section fifteen hundred and eighty-four of the Revised Statutes of the United States, and so much of the act of May third, eighteen hundred and eighty, "making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and eighty-one, and for other purposes," as authorizes the Secretary of the Navy to substitute desiccated tomatoes for desiccated potatoes, are hereby repealed.

That money accruing from the rations of enlisted men commuted for the benefit of any mess may be paid on public bills to the commissary officer by the pay officer

having their accounts.

That for the purpose of further increasing the naval establishment of the United States, the President is hereby authorized to have constructed by contract two firstclass battle ships carrying the heaviest armor and most powerful ordnance for vessels of their class upon a trial displacement of not more than sixteen thousand tons, and to have the highest practicable speed and great radius of action, and to cost, exclusive of armor and armament, not exceeding four million two hundred and twelve thousand dollars each; two first-class armored cruisers of not more than fourteen thousand five hundred tons trial displacement, carrying the heaviest armor and most powerful armament for vessels of their class, and to have the highest practicable speed and great radius of action, and to cost, exclusive of armor and armament, not exceeding four million six hundred and fifty-nine thousand dollars each; two gunboats of about one thousand tons trial displacement, to cost, when built, exclusive of armament, not exceeding three hundred and eighty-two thousand dollars each, and the contract for the construction of each of said vessels shall be awarded, by the Secretary of the Navy, to the lowest best responsible bidder, having in view the best results and most expeditious delivery; and in the construction of all of said vessels the provisions of the act of August third, eighteen hundred and eightysix, entitled "An act to increase the naval establishment," as to materials for said vessels, their engines, boilers, and award of. machinery, the contracts under which they are built, the notice of any proposals for the same, the plans, drawings, specifications therefor, and the method of executing said contracts shall be observed and followed, and, subject to the provisions of this act, all said vessels shall be built in compliance with the terms of said act, and in all their parts shall be of domestic machinery; and the steel ma- of domestic terial shall be of domestic manufacture and of the quality manufacture. and characteristics best adapted to the various purposes for which it may be used, in accordance with specifications approved by the Secretary of the Navy; and not more than two of the six battle ships, armored cruisers, and gunboats provided for in this act shall be built by one contracting party.

One battle ship or one armored cruiser herein provided for shall be built on or near the coast of the Pacific Ocean or the waters connecting therewith; but if it shall appear to the satisfaction of the President from the bidding for such contracts that said vessel can not be constructed on or near the coast of the Pacific Ocean at a cost not exceeding four per centum above the lowest accepted bid for the corresponding vessel provided for in this act, he shall authorize the construction of said vessel elsewhere in the United States, subject to the limitations as to cost hereinbefore provided: Provided, That the Secretary of the Navy shall build one of the battle ships authorized by this act in such navy-yard as he may designate: Provided, further, That the Secretary of the Navy shall build all the vessels herein authorized in such navyyards as he may designate, should it reasonably appear that the persons, firms or corporations or the agents thereof, bidding for the construction of any of said vessels, have entered into any combination, agreement or understanding, the effect, object or purpose of which is to deprive the Government of fair, open and unrestricted competition in letting contracts for the construction of any of said vessels.

Cost of in-spection and be reported to Congress.

The Secretary of the Navy is hereby instructed to keep ronstruction to an accurate account of the cost of inspection and construction of vessels provided for in this act, whether built in Government yards or by contract, and report thereon to Congress, at each session, the progress of work and cost thereof, including the inspection of all the material going into the construction of said vessels, and, upon the completion thereof, to report a full and detailed statement showing the relative cost of inspection and construction in Government yards and by contract. for the purpose of preparing and equipping such navyyard or navy-yards as may be so designated for the construction of any such vessels, the sum of one hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated for each of the navy-vards in which the Secretary of the Navy may direct any such vessels to be built.

Provided further, That members of the Fifty-seventh Congress who will not be members of the Fifty-eighth Congress, and in whose Districts or States appointments have not been made or vacancies filled in the Fifty-seventh Congress, may immediately upon the passage of this act make the additional appointments herein provided for.

The Secretary of the Navy shall as soon as practicable after the fifth day of March in each year notify in writing each Senator, Representative, and Delegate in Congress of any vacancy which may be regarded as existing in the State, District, or Territory which he represents, and the nomination of a candidate to fill such vacancy shall be made upon the recommendation of the Senator, Representative, or Delegate. Such recommendation shall be made by the first day of June of that year, and if not so made the Secretary of the Navy shall fill the vacancy by the appointment of an actual resident of the State, District, or Territory in which the vacancy exists, who shall have been for at least two years immediately preceding his appointment an actual bona fide resident of the State, District, or Territory in which the vacancy exists and shall have the qualifications otherwise prescribed by law: And provided further, That the superintendent of the Naval Academy shall make such rules, to be approved by the Secretary of the Navy, as will effectually prevent the practice of hazing; and any cadet found guilty of participating in or encouraging or

And that appointments to the grade of captain in any of the staff departments shall be made from officers on the active list of the Marine Corps not below the grade of first lieutenant.

thousand dollars each; two steel ships, to be used in Two to ling ships. training landsmen and apprentices, to be propelled by sail, and to cost, exclusive of armament, not exceeding three hundred and seventy thousand dollars each; one wooden brig, to be used for training landsmen and ap- on brig. prentices at stations, to be propelled by sail, and to cost, exclusive of armament, not exceeding fifty thousand dollars; and the contract for the construction of each of said vessels shall be awarded, by the Secretary of the Navy, to the lowest best responsible bidder, having in view the best results and most expeditious delivery; and in the construction of all of said vessels the provisions of the act of August third, eighteen hundred and eightysix, entitled "An act to increase the naval establishment," as to materials for said vessels, their engines, boilers, and machinery, the contracts under which they are built, the award of. notice of any proposals for the same, the plans, drawings, specifications therefor, and the method of executing said contracts shall be observed and followed, and, subject to the provisions of this act, all said vessels shall be built in compliance with the terms of said act, and in all their parts shall be of domestic machinery; and the steel ma-Material, of terial shall be of domestic manufacture, and of the manufacture. quality and characteristics best adapted to the various purposes for which it may be used, in accordance with specifications approved by the Secretary of the Navy; and not more than two of the five battle ships provided for in this act shall be built by one contracting party: Provided further, That the Secretary of the Navy may build any or all of the vessels herein authorized in such navy-yards as he may designate, and shall build any of the vessels herein authorized in such navy-vards as he may designate, should it reasonably appear that the persons, firms, or corporations, or the agents thereof, bidding for the construction of any of said vessels, have entered into any combination, agreement, or understanding, the Combination, effect, object, or purpose of which is to deprive the Gov-enter into. ernment of fair, open, and unrestricted competition in letting contracts for the construction of any of said vessels.

The Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized, in his sound for. discretion, to contract for or purchase subsurface or submarine torpedo boats in the aggregate of, but not exceeding, five hundred thousand dollars: Provided, That prior to said purchase or contract for said boats any American inventor or owner of a subsurface or submarine torpedo boat may give reasonable notice and have his, her, or its subsurface or submarine torpedo boat tested by comparison or competition, or both, with a Government subsurface or submarine torpedo boat or any private competitor, provided there be any such, and thereupon the board appointed for conducting such tests shall report the result of said competition or comparison, together with its

recommendations, to the Secretary of the Navy, who may purchase or contract for subsurface or submarine torpedo boats in a manner that will best advance the interests of the United States in submarine warfare: And provided further, That before any subsurface or submarine torpedo boat is purchased or contracted for it shall be accepted by the Navy Department as fulfilling all reasonable requirements for submarine warfare and shall have been fully tested to the satisfaction of the Secretary of the Navy. To carry out the purpose aforesaid the sum of five hundred thousand dollars is hereby appropriated out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated.

And the contract for the construction of said vessels award of. shall be awarded by the Secretary of the Navy to the lowest best responsible bidder, having in view the best results and most expeditious delivery; and in the construction of all of said vessels the provisions of the act of August third, eighteen hundred and eighty-six, entitled "An act to increase the naval establishment," as to materials for said vessels, their engines, boilers, and machinery, the contracts under which they are built, the notice of any proposals for the same, the plans, drawings, specifications therefor, and the method of executing said contracts shall be observed and followed, and, subject to the provisions of this act, all said vessels shall be built in compliance with the terms of said act, and in all their parts shall be of domestic manufacture; and the steel material shall be of domestic manufacture, and of the quality and characteristics best adapted to the various purposes for which it may be used, in accordance with specifications approved by the Secretary of the Navy; and not more than two of the vessels provided for in this act shall be built by one contracting party: Provided, That the Secretary of the Navy may build any or all of the vessels herein authorized in such navy-yards as he may designate, and shall build any of the vessels herein authorized in such navy-yards as he may designate. should it reasonably appear that the persons, firms, or corporations, or the agents thereof, bidding for the construction of any of said vessels have entered into any combination, agreement, or understanding the effect, object, or purpose of which is to deprive the Government of fair, open, and unrestricted competition in letting contracts for the construction of any of said vessels.



Two first-class battle ships, carrying the heaviest Two battleships. armor and most powerful armament for vessels of their class upon a maximum trial displacement of not more than sixteen thousand tons; to have the highest practicable speed and great radius of action, and to cost, exclusive of armor and armament, not exceeding four million four hundred thousand dollars each.

And the contract for the construction of said vessels Contract, shall be awarded by the Secretary of the Navy to the lowest best responsible bidder, having in view the best results and most expeditious delivery; and in the construction of all of said vessels the provisions of the act of August third, eighteen hundred and eighty-six, entitled "An act to increase the naval establishment," as to materials for said vessels, their engines, boilers, and machinery, the contracts under which they are built, the notice of any proposals for the same, the plans, drawings, specifications therefor, and the method of executing said contracts shall be observed and followed, and, subject to the provisions of this act, all said vessels shall be built in compliance with the terms of said act, and in all their parts shall be of domestic manufacture; and the steel material shall be of domestic manufacture, and of the quality and characteristics best adapted to the various purposes for which it may be used, in accordance with specifications approved by the Secretary of the Navy; and not more than one of the vessels provided for in this act shall be built by one contracting party: Provided, That the Secretary of the Navy may build any or all of the vessels herein authorized in such navy-yards as he may designate, and shall build any of the vessels herein authorized in such navy-yards as he may designate, should it reasonably appear that the persons, firms, or corporations, or the agents thereof, bidding for the construction of any of said vessels have entered into any combination, agreement, or understanding the effect, object, or purpose of which is to deprive the Government of fair, open, and unrestricted competition in letting contracts for the construction of any of said vessels: Provided, That the limit of cost, exclusive of armor and armament, of each of the scout cruisers authorized by the act making appropriations for the Naval Service, approved April twentyseventh, nineteen hundred and four, be one million nine hundred thousand dollars.

AN ACT Making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and seven, and for other purposes.

[Provision is made for the Naval Establishment, and under the headings—

## PAY OF THE NAVY..

\* \* "Provided, That the Secretary of the Bounty, fund of. Navy may, in his discretion, require the whole or a part of the bounty allowed upon enlistment to be refunded in cases where men are discharged during the first year of enlistment, by request, for inaptitude, as undesirable, or for disability not incurred in line of duty."

# PAY, MISCELLANEOUS.

To reimburse officers and enlisted men of the Navy and sonal effects re-Marine Corps who were on duty under orders in San imburse for. Francisco during the recent fire in that city for losses of clothing and other personal effects sustained by them through said fire, seven thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary: Provided, That such reimbursement shall be made under regulations to be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy and upon vouchers

to be approved by him in each case.

That any officer of the Marine Corps below the grade of brigadier-general who served with credit as an officer or as an enlisted man in the regular or volunteer forces during the civil war prior to April ninth, eighteen hundred and sixty-five, otherwise than as a cadet, and whose name is borne on the official register of the Marine Corps, and who has heretofore been, or may hereafter be, retired on account of wounds or disability incident to the service, or on account of age or after forty years' service, may, in the discretion of the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, be placed on the retired list of the Marine Corps with the rank and retired pay of one grade above that actually held by him at the time of retirement: Provided, That this act shall not apply to any officer who received an advance of grade since the date of his retirement or who has been restored to the Marine Corps and placed on the retired list by virtue of the provisions of a special act of Congress.

That the provision contained in section thirteen of an act approved March third, eighteen hundred and ninetynine, entitled "An act to reorganize and increase the efficiency of the personnel of the Navy and Marine Corps of on shore."

Officers. pay of the United States," reading as follows: "Provided, That such officers when on shore shall receive the allowances, but fifteen per centum less pay than when on sea duty; but this provision shall not apply to warrant officers commissioned under section twelve of this act," be,

and the same is hereby, repealed.

Chaplains, pay of.

That all chaplains now in the Navy above the grade of lieutenant shall receive the pay and allowances of lieutenant-commander in the Navy according to length of service under the provisions of law for that rank, and all chaplains now in the Navy in the grade of lieutenant shall receive their present sea pay when on shore duty: Provided, That naval chaplains hereafter appointed shall have the rank, pay, and allowances of lieutenant (junior grade) in the Navy until they shall have completed seven years of service, when they shall have the rank, pay, and allowances of lieutenant in the Navy; and lieutenants shall be promoted, whenever vacancies occur, to the grade of lieutenant-commander, which shall consist of five numbers, and when so promoted shall receive the rank, pay, and allowances of lieutenant-commander in the Navy: Provided further, That nothing herein contained shall be held or construed to increase the number of chaplains as now authorized by law or to reduce the rank or pay of any now serving.

That from and after the passage of this act the allowances of civil engineers and professors of mathematics in the Navy shall be the same as are or may be provided by or in pursuance of law for naval constructors, and the allowances of assistant civil engineers the same as for

""An extra allowance of one ounce of coffee or cocoa, two ounces of sugar, four ounces of hard bread or its equivalent, and four ounces of preserved meat or its equivalent shall be allowed to enlisted men of the engineer and dynamo force who stand night watches between eight o'clock postmeridian and eight o'clock antimeridian, under steam.""

## NAVAL ACADEMY.

Provides "No person shall be admitted for instruction Foreigners, at the Naval Academy at Annapolis from any foreign instruction of. country except upon authority of law hereafter enacted."

Midshipmen, appointment

Hereafter the Secretary of the Navy shall, as soon as possible after the first day of June of each year preceding the graduation of midshipmen in the succeeding year, notify in writing each Senator, Representative, and Delegate in Congress of any vacancy that will exist at the Naval Academy because of such graduation, or that may occur for other reasons and which he shall be entitled to fill by nomination of a candidate and one or more alternates therefor. The nomination of a candidate and alternate or alternates to fill said vacancy shall be made upon the recommendation of the Senator, Representative, or Delegate, if such recommendation is made by the fourth day of March of the year following that in which said notice in writing is given, but if it is not made by that time the Secretary of the Navy shall fill the vacancy by appointment of an actual resident of the State, Congressional district, or Territory, as the case may be, in which the vacancy will exist, who shall have been for at least two years immediately preceding the date of his appointment an actual and bona fide resident of the State, Congressional district, or Territory in which the vacancy will exist and of the legal qualification under the law as now provided. In cases where by reason of a vacancy in the membership of the Senate or House of Representatives, or by the death or declination of a candidate for admission to the academy there occurs or is about to occur at the academy a vacancy from any State, district, or Territory that can not be filled by nomination as herein provided, the same may be filled as soon thereafter and before the final entrance examination for the vear as the Secretary of the Navy may determine. candidates allowed for the District of Columbia and all the candidates appointed at large, together with alternates therefor, shall be selected by the President within the period herein prescribed for nomination of other candidates: Provided, That the President may select a candidate for the District of Columbia for the year nineteen hundred and eight.

That the President be authorized to appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, two additional professors of mathematics in the Navy, who shall be extra numbers in said list, and who shall take rank therein according to that held by them respectively when so appointed, if such appointees are officers of the Navy, otherwise at the foot of said list.

One first-class battle ship, carrying as heavy armor and as powerful armament as any known vessel of its ship. class, to have the highest practicable speed and greatest practicable radius of action, and to cost, exclusive of armament and armor, not exceeding six million dollars: Provided, That before approving any plans or specifications for the construction of such battle ship the Secretary of the Navy shall afford, by advertisement or otherwise, in his discretion, a reasonable opportunity to any competent constructor who may desire so to do, to submit plans and specifications for his consideration, for which said plans, should the same be used by the Department and be not submitted by or on behalf of a successful bidder for the contract, such compensation shall be paid as the Secretary of the Navy shall deem just and equitable out of the amount herein appropriated under the head "Contingent, Navy": Provided, That before any proposals for said battle ship shall be issued or any bids received and accepted the Secretary of the Navy shall report to Congress at its next session full details covering the type of such battle ship and the specifications for the same, including its displacement, draft, and dimensions,

And the contract for the construction of said vessels shall be awarded by the Secretary of the Navy to the lowest best responsible bidder, having in view the best results and most expeditious delivery: Provided, That any bid for the construction of any of said vessels upon

and the kind and extent of armor and armament therefor.

the Pacific coast shall have a differential of four per centum in its favor, which shall be considered by the Secretary of the Navy in awarding contracts for the construction of said vessels; and in the construction of all of said vessels the provisions of the act of August third, eighteen hundred and eighty-six, entitled "An act to increase the naval establishment," as to materials for said vessels, their engines, boilers, and machinery, the contracts under which they are built, the notice of any proposals for the same, the plans, drawings, specifications therefor, and the method of executing said contracts shall be observed and followed, and, subject to the provisions of this act, all said vessels shall be built in compliance with the terms of said act, and in all their parts shall be of domestic manufacture; and the steel material shall be of domestic manufacture, and of the quality and characteristics best adapted to the various purposes for which it may be used, in accordance with specifications approved by the Secretary of the Navy; and not more than one of the vessels provided for in this act shall be built by one contracting party: Provided, That the Secretary of the Navy may build any or all of the vessels herein authorized in such navy-yards as he may designate, and shall build any of the vessels herein authorized in such navy-yards as he may designate should it reasonably appear that the persons, firms, or corporations, or the agents thereof, bidding for the construction of any of said vessels have entered into any combination, agreement, or understanding the effect, object, or purpose of which is to deprive the Government of fair, open, and unrestricted competition in letting contracts for the construction of any of said vessels: Provided, That the limit of cost, ex-Connecticut. clusive of armor and armament, of the battle ship Connecticut, authorized by the act of Congress approved July first, nineteen hundred and two, be increased to four million six hundred thousand dollars, and that the limit of cost, exclusive of armor and armament, of each of the two training vessels authorized by the act of Congress approved March third, nineteen hundred and three, be increased to four hundred and ten thousand dollars: And provided further, That the limit of cost, exclusive of armor and armament, of each of the two colliers authorized by the act of Congress approved April twenty-seventh, nineteen hundred and four, be increased to one million five hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

Submarines, \$1,000,000 for.

The Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized, in his discretion, to contract for or purchase subsurface or submarine torpedo boats, to an amount not exceeding one million dollars, after such tests as he shall see fit to prescribe, to determine the comparative efficiency of the different boats for which bids may be submitted: Provided, That such tests shall take place within nine months from the date of the passage of this act; and for such purpose the sum of five hundred thousand dollars is

hereby appropriated.

CONSTRUCTION AND MACHINERY: On account of hulls, outfits, and machinery of vessels and steam machinery of vessels heretofore authorized, seventeen million eight hundred and thirty thousand eight hundred and twentynine dollars.

ARMOR AND ARMAMENT: Toward the armament and Armor and armor of domestic manufacture for vessels authorized, fifteen million one hundred and forty-five thousand dollars: Provided, That no part of this appropriation shall be expended for armor for vessels except upon contracts for such armor when awarded by the Secretary of the Navy, to the lowest responsible bidder, having in view the best results and most expeditious delivery. But this provision shall not apply to or interfere with contracts for such armor already entered into, signed and executed by the Secretary of the Navy.

And the contract for the construction of said vessels shall be awarded by the Secretary of the Navy to the lowest best responsible bidder, having in view the best results and most expeditious delivery; and in the construction of all of said vessels the provisions of the act of August third, eighteen hundred and eighty-six, entitled "An act to increase the naval establishment," as to materials for said vessels, their engines, boilers, and machinery, the contracts under which they are built, the notice of any proposals for the same; the plans, drawings, specifications therefor, and the method of executing said contracts shall be observed and followed, and, subject to the provisions of this act, all said vessels shall be built in compliance with the terms of said act, and in all their parts shall be of domestic manufacture; and the steel material shall be of domestic manufacture, and of the quality and characteristics best adapted to the various purposes for which it may be used, in accordance with specifications approved by the Secretary of the Navv: and of the vessels provided for in this act and the act making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and seven, and for other purposes, not more than one battle ship and one torpedo boat destroyer, or two torpedo boat destroyers, shall be built by one contracting party: Provided, That the Secretary of the Navy may build any or all of the vessels herein authorized in such navy-vards as he may designate, and shall build any of the vessels herein authorized in such navy-yards as he may designate should it reasonably appear that the persons, firms, or corporations, or the agents thereof, bidding for the construction of any of said vessels have entered into any combination, agreement, or understanding the effect, object, or purpose of which is to deprive the Government of fair, open, and unrestricted competition in letting contracts for the construction of any of said vessels.

Submarines.

That the provision in the Naval Appropriation Act approved June twenty-ninth, nineteen hundred and six, authorizing the Secretary of the Navy to contract for subsurface or submarine boats after certain tests to be completed by March twenty-ninth, nineteen hundred and seven, is hereby amended, in accordance with the recommendation of the Secretary of the Navy, so as to extend the test period until May twenty-ninth, nineteen hundred and seven; and the limit of cost provided for in the authorization aforesaid is hereby increased to three million dollars, and the sum of one million dollars, which includes the half million dollars heretofore appropriated, is hereby appropriated, and to remain available until expended, no part of this appropriation to be expended for any boat that does not in such test prove to be equal in the judgment of the Secretary of the Navy to the best boat now owned by the United States or under contract therefor, and no penalties under this limitation shall be imposed by reason of any delay in the delivery of said boat due to the submission or participation in the comparative trials aforesaid.

That no part of any sum appropriated by this act shall be used for any expense of the Navy Department at Washington unless specific authority be given for such expenditure.

AN ACT Making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and nine, and for other purposes.

[Provision is made for the Naval Establishment, and under the headings-]

PAY OF THE NAVY.

Is added: "Hereafter all commissioned officers of the officers of the active list of the Navy shall receive the same pay and Navy, active allowances according to rank and length of service, and the annual pay of each grade shall be as follows: For Admiral, thirteen thousand five hundred dollars; rearadmiral, first nine, eight thousand dollars; rear-admiral, second nine, or commodore, six thousand dollars; captain, four thousand dollars; commander, three thousand five hundred dollars; lieutenant-commander, three thousand dollars; lieutenant, two thousand four hundred dollars; lieutenant, junior grade, two thousand dollars; ensign, one thousand seven hundred dollars. There shall be allowed and paid to each commissioned officer below the rank of rear-admiral ten per centum of his current yearly pay for each term of five years service in the Army, Navy, and Marine Corps. The total amount of such increase for length of service shall in no case exceed forty per centum on the yearly pay of the grade as provided by law: Provided, That the annual pay of captain shall not exceed five thousand dollars per annum; of commander, four thousand five hundred dollars per annum: and of lieutenant-commander, four thousand dollars per annum. All officers on sea duty and all officers on shore duty beyond the continental limits of the United States shall while so serving receive ten per centum additional of their salaries and increase as above provided, and such increase shall commence from the date of reporting for duty on board ship or the date of sailing from the United States for shore duty beyond the seas or to join a ship in foreign waters. The pay of midshipmen shall hereafter be six hundred dollars per annum while at the Naval Academy, and one thousand four hundred dollars per annum after graduation from the Naval Academy.

<sup>&</sup>quot;In computing the pay of retired officers of the navy, the 10 per cent additional pay allowed for sea duty or for shore duty beyond the continental limits of the United States shall not be included, and the pay of commodore shall be the same in all respects as that of rear-admiral, second nine."—Deficiency act, May 30, 1908.

The pay of all warrant officers and mates is hereby in-

creased twenty-five per centum, and all paymasters' clerks shall, while on duty, receive the same pay and allowances as warrant officers of like length of service in the Navy. The pay of all active and retired enlisted men of the Navy is hereby increased ten per centum: Provided further, That the pay and allowances of chiefs of bureaus in the Navy Department shall be the highest pay of the grade to which they belong, and not below that of rearadmiral of the lower nine, and that the pay and allowances of chaplains in the Navy shall in no case exceed that provided for lieutenant-commanders. Aids to rearadmirals embraced in the nine lower numbers of that grade shall each receive one hundred and fifty dollars additional per annum, and aids to all other rear-admirals, two hundred dollars additional per annum each. an officer of the Navy has been thirty years in the service, he may, upon his own application, in the discretion of the President, be retired from active service and placed upon the retired list with three-fourths of the highest pay of his grade: And provided further, That any officer of the Navy who is now serving or shall hereafter serve as chief of a bureau in the Navy Department, and shall subsequently be retired, shall be retired with the rank, pay, and allowances authorized by law for the retirement of such bureau chief. The pay of all commissioned, warrant, and appointed officers and enlisted men of the Navy now on the retired list shall be based on the pay, as herein provided for, of commissioned, warrant, and appointed officers and enlisted men of corresponding rank and service on the active list; and all pay herein provided shall remain in force until changed by act of Congress. ing herein shall be construed so as to reduce the pay or allowances now authorized by law for any commissioned, warrant, or appointed officer or any enlisted man of the active or retired lists of the Navy, and all laws inconsistent with this provision are hereby repealed.

Six months' pay to benefi-claries of deceased officers men.

Retired list, rate of pay.

That hereafter immediately upon official notification of the death from wounds or disease contracted in line enlisted of duty of any officer or enlisted man on the active list of the Navy and Marine Corps the Paymaster-General of the Navy shall cause to be paid to the widow of such officer or enlisted man, or any person previously designated by him, an amount equal to six months' pay at the rate received by such officer or enlisted man at the date of his death, less seventy-five dollars in the case of an officer and thirty-five dollars in the case of an enlisted man, to defray expenses of interment, and the residue, if any, of the amount reserved shall be paid subsequently to the designated person. The Secretary of the Navy shall establish regulations requiring each officer and enlisted man to designate the proper person to whom this amount

shall be paid in case of death, and said amount shall be paid to that person from funds appropriated for the pay of the Navy and Marine Corps.

# PAY, MISCELLANEOUS.

The Secretary of the Navy shall send to Congress at the beginning of its next regular session a complete schedule or list showing the amount in money of all pay under the provisions of this act and for all allowances for each grade of officers in the Navy, including retired officers, and for all officers included in this act and for all enlisted men so included.

The estimates for the support of the Navy shall here-pay, officers after show, under the head of Pay of the Navy, the sums and enlisted allowed for pay of officers belonging to the line, to the men, how made. several departments of the staff, and to the retired list; the estimates to show under each head the amount allowed for pay proper, for increases due to longevity and foreign service, and for pay at sea rates to officers employed on shore; together with the total number of warrant and petty officers and seamen of the several grades and designations, including as to each class the amount allowed for pay proper and for longevity or service increases. The estimates shall include a list giving the rates of pay for all petty officers and other enlisted men of the Navy.

The nurse corps (Iemaie) of the Consist of one superintendent, to be appointed by the Secretary of the Navy, who shall be a graduate of a hospital training school having a course of instruction of not less than two years, whose term of office may be terminated at his discretion, and of as many chief nurses, nurses, and reserve nurses as may be needed: Provided, That all nurses in the nurse corps shall be appointed or removed by the Surgeon-General, with the approval of the Secretary of the Navy. and that they shall be graduates of hospital training schools having a course of instruction not less than two years. The appointment of superintendent, chief nurses, nurses, and reserve nurses shall be subject to an examination as to their professional, moral, mental, and physical fitness, and that they shall be eligible for duty at naval hospitals and on board of hospital and ambulance ships and for such special duty as may be deemed necessary by the Surgeon-General of the Navy. Reserve nurses may be assigned to active duty when the necessities of the service demand, and when on such duty shall receive the pay and allowances of nurses: Provided, That they shall receive no compensation except when on active duty. The superintendent, chief nurses, and nurses shall respectively receive the same pay, allowances, emoluments, and privileges as are now or may hereafter be provided by or in pursuance of law for the nurse corps (female) of the Army.

Hospital Corps, pay of.

And the contract for the construction of said vessels shall be awarded by the Secretary of the Navy to the lowest best responsible bidder, having in view the best results and most expeditious delivery; and in the construction of all of said vessels the provisions of the act of August third, eighteen hundred and eighty-six, entitled "An act to increase the naval establishment," as to materials for said vessels, their engines, boilers, and machinery, the contracts under which they are built, the notice of any proposals for the same; the plans, drawings, specifications therefor, and the method of executing said contracts shall be observed and followed, and, subject to the provisions of this act, all said vessels shall be built in compliance with the terms of said act, and in all their parts shall be of domestic manufacture; and the steel material shall be of domestic manufacture, and of the quality and characteristics best adapted to the various purposes for which it may be used, in accordance with specifications approved by the Secretary of the Navy.

Eight submarines.

For eight submarine torpedo boats, in an amount not exceeding in the aggregate three million five hundred thousand dollars, and the sum of three million dollars is hereby appropriated toward said purpose and for the completion of submarine boats heretofore authorized.

Construction and machinery.

AN ACT Making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and ten, and for other purposes.

[Provision is made for the Naval Establishment, and under the headings-1

PAY OF THE NAVY.

Provides for "Pay of the Nurse Corps; rent of quarters for members of the Nurse Corps; prizes to be awarded to the engineer divisions of the ships in commission for general efficiency and for economy in coal consumption under such rules as the Secretary of the Navy may formulate,

Miscellane-ous items.

The provisions of the act approved June twenty-ninth, nineteen hundred and six, entitled "An act making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and seven, and for other purposes," providing for the retirement in the next higher grade of officers of the navy who served during the civil war, shall not operate to deprive any officer of the navy who has been, or may be, retired, since the passage of that act, of the right to increased rank and pay to which, but for the passage of said act, he would have been entitled.

Retirement.

The accounting officers of the Treasury are hereby authorized and directed to allow, in the settlement of accounts of disbursing officers involved, payments made to officers of the navy while on temporary leaves of absence since March third, eighteen hundred and ninetynine, not involving detachment from duty, and not in excess of leaves of absence allowed by law to officers of the army without reduction in pay.

For the purpose of further increasing the naval establishment of the United States, the President is hereby authorized to have constructed two first-class battle ships to cost, exclusive of armor and armament, not exceeding six million dollars each, similar in all essential characteristics to the battle ship authorized by the act making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and eight.

results and most expeditious delivery; and in the construction of all of said vessels the provisions of the act of August third, eighteen hundred and eighty-six, entitled "An act to increase the naval establishment," as to materials for said vessels, their engines, boilers, and machinery, the contracts under which they are built, the notice of any proposals for the same; the plans, drawings, specifications therefor, and the method of executing said contracts shall be observed and followed, and, subject to the provisions of this act, all said vessels shall be built in compliance with the terms of said act, and in all their parts shall be of domestic manufacture; and the steel material shall be of domestic manufacture, and of the quality and characteristics best adapted to the various purposes for which it may be used, in accordance with specifications approved by the Secretary of the Navy, provided contracts for furnishing the same in a reasonable time, at a reasonable price, and of the required quality can be made with responsible parties, and of the two first-class battle ships provided for in this act, not more than one shall be built by one contracting party.

Four submarines.

For four submarine torpedo boats, in an amount not exceeding in the aggregate two million dollars, and the sum of three million dollars is hereby appropriated toward said purpose and for the completion of submarine boats heretofore authorized: Provided, That the Secretary of the Navy may build any or all of the vessels authorized in this act in such navy-yards as he may designate, and shall build any of the vessels herein authorized in such navy-yards as he may designate, should it reasonably appear that the persons, firms, or corporations, or the agents thereof, bidding for the construction of any of said vessels, have entered into any combination, agreement, or understanding, the effect, object, or purpose of which is to deprive the Government of fair, open, and unrestricted competition in letting contracts for the construction of any of said vessels.

One destroyer. The Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized, in his discretion, to contract for or purchase one destroyer whose vitals are located below the normal load water line, such vessel to cost not to exceed four hundred thousand dollars and to have a speed not less than twenty-two knots; also two small vessels of similar construction having a speed of not less than sixteen knots and to cost not to exceed twenty-two thousand five hundred dollars each: *Provided*, That before any vessel provided for in this paragraph shall be purchased or contracted for a vessel of similar construction shall have been constructed complete and of full size for naval warfare and submitted to the Navy Department for such trial and tests as the Secretary of the Navy may, in his discretion, prescribe,

and as the result of such tests be demonstrated to have fulfilled all the reasonable requirements of naval warfare for such a vessel.

CONSTRUCTION AND MACHINERY: On account of hulls Construction and machinery and outfits of vessels and steam machinery of vessels heretofore authorized, twenty-two million seven hundred and sixty-six thousand eight hundred and twenty-three dollars: Provided, That no part of the above appropriation shall be used for the payment of the construction of any collier the total cost of which shall exceed nine hundred thousand dollars.

Armor and armament: Toward the armor and arma-armament. ment of domestic manufacture for vessels authorized. twelve million four hundred and fifty-two thousand seven hundred and seventy-two dollars: Provided, That no part of this appropriation shall be expended for armor for vessels except upon contracts for such armor when awarded by the Secretary of the Navy to the lowest responsible bidders, having in view the best results and most expeditious delivery: Provided also, That contracts for furnishing said armor in a reasonable time, at a reasonable price, and of the required quality can be made with responsible parties.

INCREASE OF THE NAVY, EQUIPMENT: Toward the completion of the equipment outfit of the new vessels authorized, six hundred thousand dollars.

Total increase of the navy, thirty-eight million eight hundred and nineteen thousand five hundred and ninetyfive dollars.

Provided, That no part of any sum hereby appropriated under "Increase of the navy" shall be used for the payment of any clerical, drafting, inspection, and messenger service, or for pay of any of the other classified force, under the various bureaus of the Navy Department in Washington, District of Columbia.

That no part of any sum appropriated by this act shall be used for any expense of the Navy Department at Washington unless specific authority is given by law for such expenditure, except that draftsmen and other technical employees heretofore paid from "Public works" and "Increase of the navy" and employed in the Navy Department at Washington may be continued in employment in the Navy Department at Washington and paid from appropriations "Maintenance," "Construction and repair," "Steam machinery," "Ordnance and ordnance stores," and "Equipment of vessels," respectively.

AN ACT Making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending-June thirtleth, nineteen hundred and eleven, and for other purposes.

[Provision is made for the Naval Establishment, and under the headings—1

PAY OF THE NAVY.

The provision of the act approved May thirteenth, nineteen hundred and eight, entitled "An act making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and nine," relating to the pay of paymasters' clerks, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"All paymasters' clerks shall, while holding appoint-"All paymasters' clerks shall, while holding appoint- Paymasters' ment in accordance with law, receive the same pay and retirement of. allowances and have the same rights of retirement as warrant officers of like length of service in the navy."

The Secretary of the Navy is authorized, in his discommutation cretion, to allow members of the Nurse Corps (female) of quarters for. of the navy fifteen dollars per month in lieu of quarters when government quarters are not available, and that the accounting officers of the Treasury are hereby authorized and directed to allow in the accounts of disbursing officers of the navy all payments heretofore made by them in accordance with orders of the Secretary of the Navy for commutation of quarters to members of the Nurse Corps (female) of the navy at the rate herein specified.

CONTINGENT, NAVY: \* \* Provided further, That thirty thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be lishment of. necessary of this appropriation, shall be used for the hire of expert accountants for establishing accounting and cost of work offices at navy-yards and stations according to the plan and methods established at the Boston Navy-Yard: Provided further, That in fixing the cost of work Cost of work under the various naval appropriations, the direct and pense incident indirect charges incident thereto shall be included in such to. cost: And provided further, That the Bureau of Supplies and Accounts shall keep the money accounts of the naval establishment in such manner as to show such charges and shall report the same annually for the information of Congress, and for no other purposes.

Damages from collisions, claims for.

The Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to consider, ascertain, adjust and determine the amounts due on all claims for damages, where the amount of the claim does not exceed the sum of five hundred dollars, hereafter occasioned by collision, for which collisions vessels of the navy shall be found to be responsible, and report the amounts so ascertained and determined to be due the claimants to Congress at each session thereof through the Treasury Department for payment as legal claims out of appropriations that may be made by Congress therefor.

The pay and allowances of chiefs of bureaus of the reaus, compensation of and Navy Department shall be the highest shore-duty pay retirement of and allowances of the rear-admiral of the lower nine: and allowances of the rear-admiral of the lower nine: and all officers of the navy who are now serving or shall hereafter serve as chief of bureau in the Navy Department and are eligible for retirement after thirty years' service, shall have, while on the active list, the rank, title, and emoluments of a chief of bureau, in the same manner as is already provided by statute law for such officers upon retirement by reason of age or length of service, and such officers, after thirty years' service, shall be entitled to and shall receive new commissions in accordance with the rank and title hereby conferred.

#### BUREAU OF NAVIGATION.

Recruiting: except in cases where certificate is unobtainable, enlistment may be made when the recruiting officer is convinced that oath of applicant as to age is credible; but when it is afterwards found upon evidence satisfactory to the Navy Department that recruit has sworn falsely as to age, and is under eighteen years of age at the time of enlistment, he shall, upon request of either parent, be released from service in the navy, upon payment of full cost of first outfit, unless, in any given case, the Secretary, in his discretion, shall relieve said recruit of such payment.

Prizes, steaming exercises.

Steaming exercises: Prizes, trophies, and badges for excellence in steaming exercises to be awarded to the ships in commission for general efficiency and for economy in coal consumption, under such rules as the Secretary of the Navy may formulate; and for the purpose of classifying, compiling, and publishing the results of the competition, ten thousand dollars.

Foley, mechanic, fourteen days, at four dollars per diem, fifty-six dollars; Joseph S. Mohler, store laborer, one-half month, at forty dollars per month, twenty dollars.

Upon the execution of the agreement above provided for, the Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized and directed to acquire any part of the land or property necessary for yardage or right of way, by purchase or condemnation, and to construct the connections, side-tracks, turn-outs and switches necessary to the proper operation of the yard system in connection with said branch track, and for such purpose the sum of one hundred and thirty-six thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any money in the Treasury of the United States not otherwise appropriated.

The work of constructing the track connection between the points above specified shall be begun by the Philadelphia, Baltimore and Washington Railroad Company within two months after the right of way necessary therefor shall have been acquired and provided, and the track connection shall be completed and put in operation within fifteen months from the beginning of its construction, provided that said Philadelphia, Baltimore and Washington Railroad Company shall not be required to expend in the construction of said track connection any sum in excess of ninety-two thousand five hundred dollars, being the present estimated cost of such construction.

That, for the purpose of further increasing the naval establishment of the United States, the President is hereby authorized to have constructed two first-class battle ships to cost, exclusive of armor and armament, not exceeding six million dollars each, similar to the battle ship authorized by the act making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and nine.

Two colliers.

Two fleet colliers of fourteen knots trial speed, when carrying not less than twelve thousand five hundred tons of cargo and bunker coal, to cost not exceeding one million dollars each.

And the contract for the construction of said vessels shall contain a provision requiring said vessels to be built in accordance with the provisions of an act entitled "An

act relating to the limitation of the hours of daily service of laborers and mechanics employed upon the public works of the United States and of the District of Columbia," approved August first, eighteen hundred and ninety-two, and shall be awarded by the Secretary of the Navy to the lowest best responsible bidder, having in view the best results and most expeditious delivery; and in the construction of all of said vessels the provisions of the act of August third, eighteen hundred and eightysix, entitled "An act to increase the naval establishment." as to materials for said vessels, their engines, boilers, and machinery, the contracts under which they are built, the notice of any proposals for the same; the plans, drawings, specifications therefor, and the method of executing said contracts shall be observed and followed, and, subject to the provisions of this act, except that the Secretary of the Navy may accept, in lieu of an indemnity bond, the deposit by contractors of United States Government or State bonds, under such conditions and in such manner as the Secretary may prescribe, having due regard for the rights and protection of the United States, all said vessels shall be built in compliance with the terms of said act, and in all their parts shall be of domestic manufacture; and the steel materials shall be of domestic manufacture, and of the quality and characteristics best adapted to the various purposes for which it may be used, in accordance with specifications approved by the Secretary of the Navy, provided contracts for furnishing the same in a reasonable time, at a reasonable price, and of the required quality can be made with responsible parties: Provided, That not more than one of the battle ships provided for in this act shall be built by the same contracting party: Provided always, That one of the battle ships herein authorized shall be constructed in one of the navy-yards.

For four submarine torpedo boats in an amount not rines. exceeding in the aggregate two million dollars, and the sum of eight hundred thousand dollars is hereby appro-

priated toward said purpose.

For six torpedo-boat destroyers, to have the highest boat destroyers practicable speed, and to cost in all not to exceed seven ers. hundred and fifty thousand dollars each, and toward the construction of said torpedo-boat destroyers the sum of two million two hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars is hereby appropriated.

The Secretary of the Navy may build any or all of the vessels authorized in this act in such navy-yards as he may designate, and shall build any of the vessels herein authorized in such navy-yards as he may designate, should it reasonably appear that the persons, firms, or corporations, or the agents thereof, bidding for the construction of any of said vessels, have entered into any combination, agreement, or understanding, the effect,



object, or purpose of which is to deprive the Government of fair, open, and unrestricted competition in letting contracts for the construction of any of said vessels.

Construction and machinery.

Construction and machinery: On account of hulls and outfits of vessels and steam machinery of vessels here-tofore and herein authorized, seventeen million one hundred seventy-five thousand seven hundred and fifty three dollars: *Provided*, That no part of the above appropriation shall be used for the payment of the construction of any collier the total cost of which shall exceed one million dollars.

Submarines.

INCREASE OF THE NAVY; TORPEDO BOATS: On account of submarine torpedo boats, heretofore authorized, eight hundred and fifty-nine thousand nine hundred and seventy-one dollars.

Torpedo boats.

Increase of the Navy; torpedo boats: On account of torpedo vessels whose vitals are located below the normal load water line, upon condition of compliance with the authorization in the act entitled "An act making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and ten, and for other purposes," four hundred and forty-five thousand dollars: Provided, That the Secretary of the Navy may, in his discretion, expend any part of the amount hereby appropriated, for small vessels of this type having a speed exceeding nineteen knots at a cost not to exceed thirty thousand dollars each: Provided, That nothing herein contained shall be construed as mandatory upon the Secretary of the Navy to purchase said vessels.

Colliers, to

Increase of the NAVY; colliers: On account of two fleet colliers, heretofore authorized, three hundred thousand dollars: *Provided*, That the unexpended balance of the sum of one million five hundred thousand dollars appropriated toward the construction of two fleet colliers authorized by the naval appropriation act approved May thirteenth, nineteen hundred and eight, is hereby reappropriated and made available for the construction of the collier therein designated to be built on the Pacific coast in such government yard as the Secretary of the Navy shall direct: *Provided further*, That the cost of said collier shall not exceed the sum of one million dollars.

Armor and armament.

Armor and armament: Toward the armor and armament of domestic manufacture for vessels authorized, eleven million five hundred and sixty-five thousand one hundred and twenty-two dollars: *Provided*, That no part of this appropriation shall be expended for armor for vessels except upon contracts for such armor when awarded by the Secretary of the Navy to the lowest responsible bidders, having in view the best results and most expeditious delivery.

Equipment.

INCREASE OF THE NAVY; EQUIPMENT: Toward the completion of the equipment outfit of the new vessels author-

ized, three hundred and ninety-nine thousand five hundred dollars.

Total increase of the navy, thirty-three million seven hundred and seventy thousand three hundred and fortysix dollars.

Provided, That no part of any sum hereby appropriated under "Increase of the navy" shall be used for the payment of any clerical, drafting, inspection, and messenger service, or for pay of any of the other classified force, under the various bureaus of the Navy Department in Washington, District of Columbia.

That no part of any sum appropriated by this act shall be used for any expense of the Navy Department at Washington unless specific authority is given by law for

such expenditure.

By a joint resolution of Congress the President of the Panama Ca-United States has been authorized and respectfully requested, by a proclamation or in such manner as he may deem proper, to invite all foreign countries and nations to attend and participate in an exposition at the city and county of San Francisco, California, on or about the first day of January, nineteen hundred and fifteen, to celebrate the completion and opening of the Panama Canal, and also the four hundredth anniversary of the

discovery of the Pacific Ocean.

The President is further authorized and respectively for fleets. requested, in extending his invitation to the foreign nations in pursuance of the aforesaid joint resolution of Congress, to invite their representatives and their fleets to assemble at Hampton Roads, Virginia, and from thence come to the city of Washington, there to be formally welcomed by the President; and, at the conclusion of the ceremonies at Washington, the President is requested to proceed to Hampton Roads and there review the assembled fleets as they start on their voyage to the city of San Francisco.

# PAY OF THE NAVY.

Is added: "The grades of the active list of the Pay Pay Corps. Corps of the Navy are hereby increased by ten additional number in. paymasters, in all eighty-six paymasters, and by twenty additional passed assistant and assistant paymasters, in all one hundred and sixteen passed assistant and assistant paymsters: Provided, That the total increae of the Pay Corps of the Navy shall not exceed twenty during the first fiscal year."

The Auditor for the Navy Department is directed to allow payments made to hospital stewards who were granted permanent appointments as of date of May thirteenth, nineteen hundred and eight, which have heretofore been disallowed by reason of a decision of the Assistant Comptroller of the Treasury dated December twentyninth, nineteen hundred and ten, and to pay them out of

the appropriations for "Pay of the Navy."

That hereafter any officer retired under the provisions of sections eight and nine of the act approved March tirement. third, eighteen hundred and ninety-nine, an act to reorganize and increase the efficiency of the personnel of the Navy and Marine Corps of the United States, shall be retired with the rank and three-fourths the sea pay of the grade from which he is retired.

That the act approved May thirteenth, nineteen hundred and eight, making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and nine, and for other purposes, in so far as it relates to the payment of six months' pay to the widow of an officer or enlisted man and so forth, be amended to

"The pay and allowances of chiefs of bureaus of the Navy Department shall be the highest shore-duty pay and allowances of the rear admiral of the lower nine, and all officers of the Navy who are now serving or who shall hereafter serve as chief of bureau in the Navy Department, and are eligible for retirement after thirty years' service, shall have, while on the active list, the rank, title, and emoluments of a chief of bureau, in the same manner as is already provided by statute law for such officers upon retirement by reason of age or length of service. and such officers, after thirty years' service, shall be entitled to and shall receive new commissions in accordance with the rank and title hereby conferred," be, and the same is hereby, repealed: Provided, That no officer who has received his commission under the provisions of said act shall be deprived of said commission or the rank, title, and emoluments thereof by virtue of this repeal.

That a Medical Reserve Corps, to be a constituent part of the Medical Department of the Navy, is hereby established under the same provisions, in all respects (except as may be necessary to adapt the said provisions to the Navy), as those providing a Medical Reserve Corps for the Army, and as set forth in the act to increase the efficiency of the Medical Department of the United States Army, approved April twenty-third, nineteen hundred and eight.

That the appointment of not more than thirty assistant dental surgeons be, and the same is hereby, authorized, said assistant dental surgeons to be a part of the Medical Department of the United States Navy, to serve professionally the personnel of the naval service, and to perform such other duties as may be prescribed by competent authority.

That all original appointments herein authorized shall sistant dental be made by the Secretary of the Navy in the grade of act-surgeons, aping assistant dental surgeon, and all appointees to such pointment of. grade shall be citizens of the United States, between twenty-four and thirty-two years of age, and shall be graduates of standard medical or dental colleges trained in the several branches of dentistry, of good moral character, of unquestionable professional repute, and before appointment shall pass satisfactory physical and professional examinations, including tests of skill in practical dentistry, of proficiency in the several usual subjects in a standard dental college course, and in such other subjects of general education as are now or may hereafter be required for admission to the Medical Corps of the Navy.

That at the end of three years from the passage of this of Commissions act all acting assistant dental surgeons who have had two or more years' service under their original appointment, as herein provided, shall undergo such physical and competitive professional examinations as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe to determine their fitness to receive commissions in the Navy, and if found qualified they shall be appointed assistant dental surgeons, with the rank of lieutenant (junior grade), in the order of standing as determined by the professional examinations provided for

in this act.

That after the competitive examinations provided for in section three of this act have been held, acting assistant dental surgeons thereafter appointed shall serve a probationary period of three years, and upon the completion of such period shall undergo such examinations as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe to determine their fitness to receive commissions in the Navy, and, if found qualified, they shall be appointed assistant dental surgeons, with the rank of lieutenant (junior grade).

That if any acting assistant dental surgeon shall fail upon the examinations prescribed in this act he shall be honorably discharged from the naval service, and the appointment of an acting dental surgeons may be revoked at any time in the discretion of the Secretary of the

That all appointees authorized by this act shall take rank and precedence in the same manner in all respects precedence. as in the case of appointees to the Medical Corps of the Navy, and shall not exercise command over persons in the Navy other than dental surgeons and such enlisted men as may be detailed to assist them by competent authority.

That all officers of the dental corps authorized by this con act shall receive the same pay and allowances as officers of corresponding rank and length of service in the Med-

ical Corps of the Navy.

That all officers of the dental corps authorized by this act shall be eligible to retirement in the same manner and under the same conditions as officers of the Medical Corps of the Navy: Provided, That section fourteen hundred and forty-five of the Revised Statutes of the United States shall not be applicable to the officers herein authorized: And provided further, That the dentist now employed at the Naval Academy shall not be displaced by the operation of this act and he shall have the same official status, pay, and allowances as may be provided for the senior dental surgeon at the Military Academy.

That the Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to appoint, for temporary service, suitably qualified acting dental surgeons when necessary to the health and efficiency of the personnel of the Naval Service: Provided, That the total strength of the dental corps, including those appointed for temporary service under this act, shall not exceed the proportion of one to each thousand of the authorized enlisted strength of the Navy and Marine Corps: Provided further, That appointments issued under authority of this act may be revoked at any time, shall have no legal force or effect except for the time the temporary appointee is in active service, and shall include no right of retirement.

That all appointments authorized by this act, except the appointment of acting dental surgeons, shall be made by the President, by and with the advice and consent of

the Senate.

Tests of qualifications of.

That all laws and parts of laws inconsistent with the provisions of this act be, and the same are hereby, repealed: Provided, That the tests of qualifications for appointment to the said reserve corps and to the dental corps may be varied to suit the subjects of such branch of the healing art or specialty of surgery of which specialists may be required and in the discretion of the Secretary of the Navy such specialists may be grouped separately: Provided further, That of the dental surgeons hereby authorized to be appointed to said Medical Reserve Corps and to the said Dental Corps, the whole number ordered to active duty shall not exceed the number the Secretary of the Navy may deem actually necessary to the health and efficiency of the personnel of the Navy and Marine Corps and, in time of peace, the number shall not exceed the proportion of one dental officer to one thousand of said personnel.

Eight submarine torpedo boats in an amount not exceeding in the aggregate four million four hundred and eighty thousand dollars; and the sum of one million six hundred thousand dollars is hereby appropriated for said purpose, and the Secretary of the Navy is directed to consider the advisability of stationing four of said submarine torpedo boats at or near the mouth of the Mississippi River and the United States seaports of the Gulf of Mexico as a proper naval defense thereof and the other four upon the Pacific coast.

AN ACT Making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and fourteen, and for other purposes.

Provision is made for the Naval Establishment, and under the headings--1

## PAY OF THE NAVY.

Is added an item for "not exceeding ten clerks to accounting officers at yards and stations; dental surgeon Academy. at Naval Academy: Provided, That the President is hereby authorized, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to appoint the dentist now at the United States Naval Academy a dental surgeon in the Navy for duty at the United States Naval Academy, to have the corresponding rank, pay, and allowances as the senior dental surgeon now at the United States Military Academy: And provided further, That he shall not be eligible for retirement before he has reached the age of seventy years except for physical disability incurred in the line of duty; \*

Hereafter the service of a midshipman at the United time as, not to States Naval Academy, or that of a cadet at the United be counted as States Military Academy, who may hereafter be appointed officer service. to the United States Naval Academy, or to the United States Military Academy, shall not be counted in computing for any purpose the length of service of any officer

in the Navy or in the Marine Corps.

The Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized and empowered to define and establish suitable anchorage grounds in Hampton Roads, Virginia, and the adjacent waters for the combined fleets of the United States and foreign Governments which may rendezvous there prior to proceeding to the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, to be held at the city and county of San Francisco, California, in the year nineteen hundred and fifteen, as Anchorage, well as to define and establish suitable anchorage grounds in the Bay of San Francisco and the approaches and waters adjacent thereto during the continuance of the said Panama-Pacific International Exposition, and the Secretary of the Navy is hereby further authorized to make such rules and regulations regarding the movements of all vessels in all of the waters named as may be necessary in order to insure the proper and orderly conduct of such features as may be planned for the combined fleets and to provide for the safety of the vessels participating therein; and such rules and regulations when so issued and published shall have the force and effect of law.

Shore duty. That officers who now personn engineering duty on former engineers shore only and officers of the Construction Corps shall be and naval con-structors eligible for any shore duty compatible with their rank ble for any as and grade to which the Secretary of the Navy may assign them.

### BUREAU OF NAVIGATION.

Naturalisation.

Any alien of the age of twenty-one years and upward who may, under existing law, become a citizen of the United States, who has served or may hereafter serve for one enlistment of not less than four years in the United States Navy or Marine Corps, and who has received therefrom an honorable discharge or an ordinary discharge, with recommendation for reenlistment, or who has completed four years in the Revenue-Cutter Service and received therefrom an honorable discharge or an ordinary discharge with recommendation for reenlistment, or who has completed four years of honorable service in the naval auxiliary service, shall be admitted to become a citizen of the United States upon his petition without any previous declaration of his intention to become such, and without proof of residence on shore, and the court admitting such alien shall, in addition to proof of good moral character, be satisfied by competent proof from naval or revenue-cutter sources of such service:

Provided, That an honorable discharge from the Navy, Marine Corps, Revenue-Cutter Service, or the naval auxiliary service, or an ordinary discharge with recommendation for reenlistment, shall be accepted as proof of good moral character: Provided further, That any court which now has or may hereafter be given jurisdiction to naturalize aliens as citizens of the United States may immediately naturalize any alien applying under and furnishing the proof prescribed by the foregoing provisions.

OUTFITS ON FIRST ENLISTMENT: \* \* \* Provided, Clothing out-That the Secretary of the Navy is authorized to issue a tled to, on sec-clothing outfit to all enlisted men serving in their second ond enlistment. enlistment who failed to receive an outfit of the value authorized by law on their first enlistment, or who, having received such outfit, were required to refund its value on account of discharge prior to expiration of enlistment: Provided further, That the net cost to the Government of clothing outfits furnished any one enlisted man shall not exceed \$60.

Ocean and lake surveys.—It is provided, "That the office, detail of Secretary of the Navy is authorized to detail such naval officers to. officers not exceeding four as may be necessary to the Hydrographic Office.

Naval Home, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, MAINTENANCE: \* \* \* Provided, That all moneys design fund, prorived from the sale of material at the Naval Home, which ceeds of sales, etc., to be was originally purchased from moneys appropriated etc., to from the income from the naval pension fund, and all moneys derived from the rental of Naval Home property, shall be turned into the naval pension fund: And provided further, That hereafter all moneys belonging to a deceased beneficiary of the Naval Home or derived from the sale of his personal effects, not claimed by his legal heirs or next of kin, shall be deposited with the pay officer of the Naval Home, and if any sum so deposited has been or shall hereafter be unclaimed for a period of two years from the death of such beneficiary it shall be deposited in the Treasury to the credit of the naval pension fund: And provided further, That the governor of the Naval Home is hereby authorized and directed, under such regulations as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy, to make diligent inquiry in every instance after the death of an inmate to ascertain the whereabouts of his heirs or next of kin: And provided further, That claims may be presented hereunder at any time within five years after moneys have been so deposited in the Treasury, and, when supported by competent proof in any case after such deposit in the Treasury, shall be certified to Congress for consideration: And provided



further, That the pensions of beneficiaries of the Naval Home shall be disposed of in the same manner as prescribed for inmates of the Soldiers' Home, as provided for in section four of the act approved March third, eighteen hundred and eighty-three, under such regulations as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe, except that in the case of death of any beneficiary leaving no heirs at law nor next of kin any pension due him shall, subject to the foregoing provisions, escheat to the naval pension fund.

AN ACT Making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and sixteen, and for other purposes.

Provision is made for the Naval Establishment, and under the headings.]

PAY, MISCELLANEOUS.

Provides for expenses of purchasing paymasters' offices Miscellaneof the various cities, including clerks, furniture, fuel, ous. stationery, and incidental expenses (hereafter subscriptions may be paid for in advance); care of library, including the purchase of books, photographs, prints, manu-

scripts, and periodicals.

There shall be a Chief of Naval Operations, who shall chief of nabe an officer on the active list of the Navy appointed by created and the President, by and with the advice and consent of the duties defined. Senate, from among the officers of the line of the Navy not below the grade of captain for a period of four years, who shall, under the direction of the Secretary of the Navy, be charged with the operations of the fleet, and with the preparation and readiness of plans for its use in war.

During the temporary absence of the Secretary and the Assistant Secretary of the Navy, the Chief of Naval Operations shall be next in succession to act as Secretary

of the Navy.

Provided, That the act "To authorize and provide for Useless direction of the pers, directi the disposal of useless papers in the executive depart-of. ments," approved February sixteenth, eighteen hundred and eighty-nine, is hereby amended so that accumulations in the files of navy yards and naval stations that, in the judgment of the Secretary of the Navy, are not needed or useful in the transaction of current business and have no permanent value or historical interest may be disposed of by the Secretary of the Navy by sale, after advertisement for proposals as waste paper if practicable, or if not practicable then otherwise as may appear best for the interests of the Government, the said Secretary to make detailed report to the Congress in every case of the papers destroyed: *Provided always*, That no papers less than two years old from the date of the last indorsement thereon shall be destroyed or disposed of by the Secre-

tary of the Navy, except in the manner provided in said act of February sixteenth, eighteen hundred and eightynine.

Hereafter officers who now perform engineering duty on shore only and officers of the Construction Corps shall be eligible for any shore duty compatible with their rank and grade to which the Secretary of the Navy may assign them.

Aeronautics.

Aeronautics: The sum of \$1,000,000 is hereby reappropriated out of the unobligated balances of the appropriations "Construction and repair of vessels and steam machinery" for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and fourteen, and made available for aeronautics, to be expended under the direction of the Secretary of the Navy.

Advisory An Advisory Committee for Aeronautics is hereby escendenties for tablished, and the President is authorized to appoint not An Advisory Committee for Aeronautics is hereby esto exceed twelve members, to consist of two members from the War Department, from the office in charge of military aeronautics; two members from the Navy Department, from the office in charge of naval aeronautics; a representative each of the Smithsonian Institution, of the United States Weather Bureau, and of the United States Bureau of Standards; together with not more than five additional persons who shall be acquainted with the needs of aeronautical science, either civil or military, or skilled in aeronautical engineering or its allied sciences: Provided, That the members of the Advisory Committee for Aeronautics, as such, shall serve without compensation: Provided further, That it shall be the duty of the Advisory Committee for Aeronautics to supervise and direct the scientific study of the problems of flight, with a view to their practical solution, and to determine the problems which should be experimentally attacked, and to discuss their solution and their application to practical questions. In the event of a laboratory or laboratories. either in whole or in part, being placed under the direction of the committee, the committee may direct and conduct research and experiment in aeronautics in such laboratory or laboratories: And provided further, That rules and regulations for the conduct of the work of the committee shall be formulated by the committee and approved by the President.

That the sum of \$5,000 a year, or so much thereof as may be necessary, for five years is hereby appropriated, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to be immediately available, for experimental work and investigations undertaken by the committee, clerical expenses and supplies, and necessary expenses of members of the committee in going to, returning from, and while attending, meetings of the committee; Provided. That an annual report to the Congress shall be submitted through the President, including an itemized

statement of expenditures.

appropriation for the naval service shall be expended in recruiting seamen, ordinary seamen, or apprentice seamen unless, in case of minors, a certificate of birth or a verified written statement by the parents, or either of them, or in case of their death a verified written statement by the legal guardian, be first furnished to the recruiting officer, showing applicant to be of age required by naval regulations, which shall be presented with the application for enlistment; except in cases where such certificate is unobtainable, enlistment may be made when the recruiting officer is convinced that oath of applicant as to age is credible; but when it is afterwards found, upon evidence satisfactory to the Navy Department, that recruit has sworn falsely as to age, and is under eighteen years of age at the time of enlistment, he shall, upon request of either parent, or, in case of their death, by the legal guardian, be released from service in the Navy, upon payment of full cost of first outfit, unless, in any given case, the Secretary, in his discretion, shall relieve said recruit of such payment.

Transfers from retired to active list.

That the President be, and he is hereby, authorized, within two years of the date of the approval of this act, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to transfer to the active list of the Navy or Marine Corps any officer who may have been transferred from the active to the retired list of the Navy under the provisions of section nine of said personnel act: Provided, That such officer shall be transferred to the place on the active list which he would have held if he had not been retired and shall be carried as an additional number in the grade to which he may be transferred or at any time thereafter promoted: Provided further, That such officer shall stand a satisfactory physical and professional examination as now prescribed by law: And provided further, That any officer transferred to the active list shall not by the passage of this act be entitled to back pay or allowances of any kind.

Hereafter officers of the Navy and Marine Corps ap- Aviators. pointed student naval aviators, while lawfully detailed for duty involving actual flying in air craft, including balloons, dirigibles, and aeroplanes, shall receive the pay and allowances of their rank and service plus thirty-five per centum increase thereof; and those officers who have heretofore qualified, or may hereafter qualify, as naval aviators, under such rules and regulations as have been or may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy, shall, while lawfully detailed for duty involving actual flying in air craft, receive the pay and allowances of their rank and service plus fifty per centum increase thereof. Hereafter enlisted men of the Navy or Marine Corps, while detailed for duty involving actual flying in air craft, shall receive the pay, and the permanent additions thereto, including allowances, of their rating and service, or rank and service, as the case may be, plus fifty per centum increase thereof: Provided, That not more than a yearly average of forty-eight officers and ninety-six enlisted men of the Navy and twelve officers and twenty-four enlisted men of the Marine Corps, detailed for duty involving actual flying in air craft, shall receive any increase in pay while on duty involving actual flying in air craft, nor shall any officer in the Navy senior in rank to commander, nor any officer in the Marine Corps senior in rank to major, receive any increase in pay or allowances by reason of such detail or duty.

All acts or parts of acts in so far as they are inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed.

The Paymaster General of the Navy shall cause to be paid to Mrs. Connie Billingsley, mother of the late William D. Billingsley, ensign, United States Navy, an amount equal to six months' pay at the rate received by that officer at the date of his death, less not exceeding \$75, expenses of interment.

There is hereby established a United States naval re- Naval Reserve, which shall consist of citizens of the United States of who have been or may be entitled to be honorably discharged from the Navy after not less than one four-year term of enlistment or after a term of enlistment during minority. The naval reserve shall be organized under the Bureau of Navigation and shall be governed by the Articles for the Government of the Navy and by the

Naval Re-Naval Regulations and Instructions. Whenever actively of members of employed with the Navy, or whenever employed in author-

ized travel to and from prescribed active duty with the Navy, its members shall be employed as members of the naval reserve and shall while so employed be held and considered to be in all respects in the same status as enlisted men of the Navy on active duty, except that they shall not be advanced in rating in time of peace. When not actively employed with the Navy, members of the naval reserve shall not be entitled to any pay, bounty, gratuity, or pension except the pay expressly provided for members of the naval reserve by the provisions of this act, nor shall they be entitled to retirement by reason of such service in the naval reserve.

Naval Reserve, enlistments in.

Enlistments in the naval reserve shall be made in the rating in which last honorably discharged from the Navy for a period of four years unless sooner discharged by competent authority. No man shall be first enlisted in the naval reserve after eight years from the date of his last discharge from the Navy nor unless he be found to be physically fit to perform the duties of the rating in which last discharged, nor shall any man whose last service in the Navy was terminated by any means other than by an honorable discharge be eligible for enlistment in the naval reserve. Reenlistments in the naval reserve shall be made under such regulations as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy.

Enlistments in the naval reserve shall be made in two classes. Class one shall consist of those men who enlist in the naval reserve within four months from the date of their last honorable discharge from the Navy. Class two shall consist of those men who enlist in the naval reserve after four months and within eight years from the date

of their last honorable discharge from the Navy.

Naval Reserve, transfers to.

In addition to the enlistments in the naval reserve above provided, the Secretary of the Navy is authorized to transfer to the naval reserve at the expiration of an enlistment any enlisted man of the Navy who may, after two years from the date of approval of this act, complete service in the Navy of sixteen, or twenty or more years and be entitled at the expiration of his enlistment to an honorable discharge. Such transfers shall only be made upon voluntary application and in the rating in which then serving, and the men so transferred shall be continued in the naval reserve until discharged by competent authority.

Naval Reserve, badge of.

Members of the naval reserve of class one and men transferred to the naval reserve shall be required to keep on hand such part of the uniform clothing outfit as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy, and all members of the naval reserve shall be issued a distinctive badge or button which may be worn with civilian dress.

Na val Reserve, pay of years in the Navy shall be paid at the rate of \$30 per

annum, and those who have served eight or more years and less than twelve years in the Navy shall be paid at the rate of \$60 per annum and those who have served twelve or more years in the Navy, \$100 per annum. All members of the naval reserve of class two shall be paid at the rate of \$12 per annum, and when first called into active service on board a vessel of the Navy shall receive an allowance for an outfit of clothing not exceeding \$30 in value, to be expended under regulations prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy.

Members of the naval reserve who have when transferred to the naval reserve, completed service in the Navy of sixteen, or twenty or more years shall be paid at the rate of one-third, and one-half, respectively, of the base pay, plus permanent additions thereto, which they were receiving at the close of their last service in the Navy.

Members of the naval reserve may, in time of peace, be serve, service required to perform not less than one month's active serve required of members of. ice on board a vessel of the Navy, during each year of service in the naval reserve, and such active service shall not exceed two months in any one year: Provided, That the aforesaid active service with the Navy may be required at any time after entrance in the naval reserve. In time of war they may be required to perform active service with the Navy throughout the war, not to exceed the term of enlistment in the case of those enlisted in the naval reserve. Any pay which may be due any member of the naval reserve shall be forfeited when so ordered by the Secretary of the Navy upon the failure, under such conditions as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy, of such man to report for muster and inspec-

Those members of the naval reserve of class one, and those members who have been transferred to the naval reserve, who reenlist in the Navy within four months from the date of their discharge from the naval reserve, shall not be entitled to a gratuity of four months' pay, but their reenlistment in the Navy shall be held and considered to have been made within four months from the date of discharge from the Navy for the purpose of continuous-service pay. The period of time during which members of the naval reserve were actively employed with the Navy while enlisted in the naval reserve shall, for the purposes of retirement, be counted as active service in the Navy in the case of those who reenlist in the Navy after service in the naval reserve.

The Secretary of the Navy is authorized in time of war, Naval Re-or when, in the opinion of the President, war is threat-men on retired ened, to call any enlisted man on the retired list into active service. active service for such duty as he may be able to perform. While so employed such enlisted men shall receive the same pay and allowances they were receiving when placed on the retired list: Provided, That enlisted men on the

retired list shall not be eligible for enlistment in or transfer to the naval reserve.

The sum of \$130,000 is hereby appropriated to carry into effect the foregoing provisions relating to a naval reserve.

Hereafter the authorized strength of the Hospital Corps of the Navy shall equal three and one-half per centum of the authorized enlisted strength of the Navy and Marine Corps, and shall be in addition thereto, and as soon as the necessary transfers or appointments may be effected the Hospital Corps of the United States Navy shall consist of the following grades and ratings: Chief ratings. pharmacists, pharmacists, and enlisted men classified as chief pharmacists' mates; pharmacists' mates, first class; pharmacists' mates, second class; pharmacists' mates, third class; hospital apprentices, first class; and hospital apprentices, second class; such classifications in enlisted ratings to correspond respectively to the enlisted ratings, seaman branch, of chief petty officers; petty officers, first class; petty officers, second class; petty officers, third class: seemen, first class; and seamen, second class: Provided. That enlisted men of other ratings in the Navy and in the Marine Corps shall be eligible for transfer to the Hospital Corps, and men of that corps to other ratings in the Navy and the Marine Corps.

The President may hereafter, from time to time, ap- Pharmacists. point as many pharmacists as may be deemed necessary, from the rating of chief pharmacist's mate, subject to such moral, physical, and professional examinations and requirements as to length of service as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe: Provided, That the pharmacists now in the Hospital Corps of the United States Navy or hereafter appointed therein in accordance with the provisions of this Act shall have the same rank, pay, and allowances as are now or may hereafter be allowed other

warrant officers. Pharmacists shall, after six years from the date of warrant, be commissioned chief pharmacists after passing satisfactorily such examinations as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe, and shall, when so commissioned, have the same rank, pay, and allowances as now or may hereafter be allowed other commissioned warrant officers: Provided. That the pharmacists at present in the service who have served or may hereafter serve six or more years in that grade shall be eligible for promotion to the grade of chief pharmacist upon satisfactorily passing the examinations provided for in this Act.

The Secretary of the Navy is hereby empowered to limit and fix the numbers in the various ratings.

Section three of an Act entitled "An Act to organize a Hospital Corps of the Navy of the United States; to define its duties and regulate its pay," approved June seventeenth, eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, be, and the same is hereby, repealed, and the pay, allowances, and emoluments of the enlisted men of the Hospital Corps shall be the same as are now, or may hereafter be, allowed for respective corresponding ratings, except the rating of turret captain of the first class in the seaman branch of the Navy: *Provided*, That the pay of the rating of the chief pharmacist's mate shall be the same as that now allowed for the existing rating of hospital steward.

Hospital and ambulance service with such commands and at such places as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy, shall be performed by members of said corps, and the corps shall be a constituent part of the Medical Department of the Navy; and the enlisted men thereof shall be a part of the enlisted force provided by

law for the Navy.

Officers and enlisted men of the Medical Department of the Navy, serving with a body of marines detached for service with the Army in accordance with the provisions of section sixteen hundred and twenty-one of the Revised Statutes, shall, while so serving, be subject to the rules and articles of war prescribed for the government of the Army in the same manner as the officers and men of the Marine Corps while so serving.

# NAVAL DENTAL CORPS.

Dental Corps.

That the President of the United States is hereby authorized to appoint and commission, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, dental surgeons in the Navy at the rate of one for each one thousand of the authorized enlisted strength of the Navy and Marine Corps, who shall constitute the Naval Dental Corps, and shall be a part of the Medical Department of the Navy. Original appointments to the Naval Dental Corps shall be probationary for a period of two years and may be revoked at any time during the probationary period by the President: Provided, That the rank of such officers of the same date of appointment among themselves at the end of said probationary period shall be determined by the recommendations of an examining board appointed by the Secretary of the Navy, which board shall conduct a competitive examination, based upon both service record and professional attainments, in accordance with such regulations as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy, and the rank of such officers so determined shall be as of date of original appointment with reference to other appointments to the naval service: Provided further, That all appointees to the grade of dental surgeon shall be citizens of the United States between twenty-four and thirty years of age, and shall be graduates of standard medical or dental colleges and trained in the several branches of dentistry, and who shall, before appointment, have successfully passed moral, physical, and professional examinations before medical and professional examining boards appointed by the Secretary of the Navy, and have been recom-

mended for appointment by such boards.

Dental surgeons shall have the rank, pay, and allowances of lieutenants (junior grade) until they shall have completed five years' service. Dental surgeons of more than five but less than twenty years' service shall, subject to such examinations as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe, have the rank, pay, and allowances of lieutenant. Dental surgeons of more than twenty years' service shall, subject to such examinations as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe, have the rank, pay, and allowances of lieutenant commander: *Provided*, That the total number of dental surgeons with the rank, pay, and allowances of lieutenant commander shall not at any time exceed ten.

All officers now in the Dental Corps (including the officers appointed for temporary service) appointed under the provisions of the Act of August twenty-second, nineteen hundred and twelve, entitled "An Act making appropriations for the Naval Service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and thirteen, and for other purposes," and all officers now in active service appointed under the provisions of the Act of March fourth, nineteen hundred and thirteen, who were eligible for appointment to the Dental Corps under the provisions of said Act, shall be appointed dental surgeons in the Dental Corps without further examination and without regard to the age qualifications herein prescribed: Provided, That the officers so appointed shall not be subject to the provisions herein prescribed for probationary service for a period of two years: Provided further, That such officers shall, after appointment as herein prescribed, rank from date of commission and take seniority among themselves in the order of their original appointment by the Secretary of the Navy as shown on the Navy list on the date of approval of this Act: And provided further, That no dental surgeon appointed in accordance with the provisions of this Act who on original appointment to the Dental Corps was over forty years of age shall be eligible for retirement before he has reached the age of seventy years, except for physical disability incurred in the line of duty.

Dental surgeons who shall have lost numbers on the Navy list by sentence of court-martial or by failure upon examination for promotion shall be considered to have lost service accordingly for purposes of advancement in

rank with increased pay and allowances.

## DENTAL RESERVE CORPS.

Dental Reserve Corps. That a Navy Dental Reserve Corps is hereby authorized to be organized and operated under the provisions of the Act approved August twenty-second, nineteen hundred and twelve, providing for the organization and operation of a Navy Medical Reserve Corps, and differing therefrom in no respect other than that the qualification requirements of the appointees shall be dental surgeons and graduates of reputable schools of medicine or dentistry instead of "reputable schools of medicine," and so many of said appointees may be ordered to temporary active service as the Secretary of the Navy may deem necessary to the health and efficiency of the personnel of the Navy and Marine Corps, provided the whole number of both Naval Dental Corps and Naval Dental Reserve Corps officers in active service shall not exceed in time of peace one to one thousand of the officers and enlisted men of the Navy and Marine Corps: Provided, That all officers now in the Navy Dental Reserve Corps shall be recommissioned in the Navy Dental Reserve Corps provided in this Act, in the order of their original appointment in said Corps, and hereafter when ordered to active duty officers of the Medical Reserve Corps and officers of the Dental Reserve Corps shall receive promotion in rank in the respective Reserve Corps under the same relative conditions and provisions of active service as is provided in this Act for the Naval Dental Corps.

# BUREAU OF SUPPLIES AND ACCOUNTS. PAY OF THE NAVY: \* \* \* commutation of quarters

for officers on shore not occupying public quarters, including \* \* \* pay clerks, \* \* \* and hire of cluding \* \* \* pay clerks, quarters for officers and enlisted men on sea duty at such times as they may be deprived of their quarters on board ship due to repairs or other conditions which may render them uninhabitable, \$3,000; \* \* \* on deposits by men, \$12,000; pay of petty officers, seamen, landsmen, and apprentice seamen, including men in the engineers' force and men detailed for duty with the Fish Commission, sixty-eight thousand seven hundred Authorized men, and the President is hereafter authorized, whenever strength. in his judgment a sufficient national emergency exists, to increase the authorized enlisted strength of the Navy to eighty-seven thousand men; and pay of enlisted men of the Hospital Corps, and for the pay of enlisted men detailed for duty with the Naval Militia, \$30,655,704.29; pay of enlisted men undergoing sentence of court-martial, \$225,000, and hereafter the number of enlisted men of the Navy shall be exclusive of those sentenced by court-martial to discharge; \* \* \* and six thousand ap-prentice seamen \* \* \* Provided, That the enlisted strength of the Navy authorized in this Act shall be

deemed to include all enlistments heretofore made during the calendar year which may have been in excess of the number authorized by law at the time: Provided further, That the designation of the rating of coal passer be changed to fireman, third class, and that of ordinary seaman to seaman, second class, without change of pay; and that the Bureau of Navigation be authorized under rules established for the advancement of other enlisted men, to advance printers to the ratings of printers, first class, and chief printer, which ratings are hereby authorized with same pay and increases allowed to yeomen, first class, and chief yeomen, respectively: And provided further, That the rating of storekeeper is hereby established in the artificer branch with the following rates of pay per month: Chief petty officer, \$50; petty officer, first class, \$40; petty officer, second class, \$35; petty officer, third class, \$30, subject to such increases of pay and allowances as are or may hereafter be authorized by law for the enlisted men of the Navy.

Hereafter in addition to the appointment of midship-Midship men, appointment of, men to the United States Naval Academy, as now pre-by President, men to the United States Naval Academy, as now pre-by President, allowed fifteen By Secretary scribed by law, the President is hereby allowed fifteen of Navy. appointments annually instead of ten as now prescribed by law, and the Secretary of the Navy is allowed twentyfive appointments annually, instead of fifteen as now prescribed by law, the latter to be appointed from the enlisted men of the Navy who are citizens of the United States, and not more than twenty years of age on the date of entrance to the Naval Academy, and who shall have served not less than one year as enlisted men on the date of entrance: Provided, That such appointments shall be made in the order of merit from candidates who have in competition with each other passed the mental examination now or hereafter required by law for entrance to the Naval Academy, and who passed the physical examinations required before entrance under existing laws.

That hereafter the Secretary of the Navy is authorized to permit not exceeding four Filipinos, to be designated, one for each class, by the Governor General of the Philippine Islands, to receive instruction at the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland: Provided, That the Filipinos undergoing instruction, as herein authorized, shall receive the same pay, allowances, and emoluments, to be paid out of the same appropriations, and shall be subject to the same rules and regulations governing admission, attendance, discipline, resignation, discharge, dismissal, and graduation as are authorized by law and regulation for midshipmen appointed from the United States, but the Filipino midshipmen herein authorized shall not be entitled to appointment to any commissioned office in the United States Navy by reason of their graduation from the Naval Academy.

#### COMMISSIONED PERSONNEL.

Hereafter the total number of commissioned officers of the active list of the line of the Navy, exclusive of commissioned warrant officers, shall be four per centum of the total authorized enlisted strength of the active list, exclusive of the Hospital Corps, prisoners undergoing sentence of discharge, enlisted men detailed for duty with the Naval Militia, and the Flying Corps: Provided, That the total number of commissioned line officers on the active list at any one time, exclusive of commissioned warrant officers, shall be distributed in the proportion of one of the grade of rear admiral to four in the grade of captain, to seven in the grade of commander, to fourteen in the grade of lieutenant commander, to thirty-two and one-half in the grade of lieutenant, to forty-one and one-half in the grades of lieutenant (junior grade) and ensign, inclusive: Provided further, That lieutenants (junior grade) shall have had not less than three years' service in that grade before being eligible for promotion to the grade of lieutenant.

Commission e d officers of Staff Corps.

The total authorized number of commissioned officers of the active list of the following staff corps, exclusive of commissioned warrant officers, shall be based on percentages of the total number of commissioned officers of

the active list of the line of the Navy as follows:

Pay Corps, twelve per centum; Construction Corps, five per centum; Corps of Civil Engineers, two per centum; and that the total authorized number of commissioned officers of the Medical Corps shall be sixty-five one hundredths of one per centum of the total authorized number of the officers and enlisted men of the Navy and Marine Corps, including midshipmen, Hospital Corps, prisoners undergoing sentence of discharge, enlisted men detailed for duty with the Naval Militia, and the Flying Corps. Officers of the lower grades of the Medical Corps, Pay Corps, Construction Corps, and Corps of Civil Engineers shall be advanced in rank up to and including the rank of lieutenant commander with the officers of the line with whom or next after whom they take precedence under existing law: Provided, That all assistant surgeons shall from date of their original appointment take rank and precedence with lieutenants (junior Secretary to de grade): Provided further, That to determine the author-termine authorized number of officers in the various grades and ranks officers. of the line and of the staff corps as herein provided, computations shall be made by the Secretary of the Navy semiannually, as of July first and January first of each year, and the resulting numbers in the various grades and ranks, as so computed, shall be held and considered for all purposes as the authorized number of officers in such various grades and ranks and shall not be varied between

such dates.

The total number of commissioned officers of the active list of the following mentioned staff corps at any one time, exclusive of commissioned warrant officers, shall be distributed in the various grades of the respective corps

as follows:

Medical Corps: One-half medical directors with the officers, Medirank of rear admiral to four medical directors with the rank of captain, to eight medical inspectors with rank of commander, to eighty-seven and one-half in the grades below medical inspector: Provided, That hereafter appointees to the grade of assistant surgeon shall be between the ages of twenty-one and thirty-two at the time of appointment.

Pay Corps: One-half pay directors with the rank of Pay Corps. rear admiral to four pay directors with the rank of captain, to eight pay inspectors with the rank of commander, to eighty-seven and one-half in the grades below pay

inspector.

Construction Corps: One-half naval constructors with Corps. the rank of rear admiral to eight and one-half naval constructors with the rank of captain, to fourteen naval constructors with the rank of commander, to seventy-seven naval constructors and assistant naval constructors with rank below commander: Provided, That vacancies in the Construction Corps shall be filled in the manner now prescribed by law, at such annual rate as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe: Provided further, That hereafter ensigns of not less than one year's service as such shall be eligible for transfer to the Construction Corps.

Corps of Civil Engineers: One-half civil engineers with Engineers. the rank of rear admiral to five and one-half civil engineers with the rank of captain, to fourteen civil engineers with the rank of commander, to eighty civil engineers and assistant civil engineers with the rank below

commander.

Hereafter no further appointments shall be made to the Corps of Professors of Mathematics, and that corps shall cease to exist upon the death, resignation, or dismissal of the officers now carried in that corps on the active and retired lists of the Navy.

When there is an odd number of officers in the grade or rank of rear admiral in the line or in each corps, the lower division thereof shall include the excess in number,

except where there is but one.

Whenever a final fraction occurs in computing the authorized number of any corps, grade or rank in the naval service, the nearest whole number shall be regarded as the authorized number: Provided, That at least one officer shall be allowed in each grade or rank.

For the purpose of determining the authorized number of officers in any grade or rank of the line or of the staff corps, there shall be excluded from consideration those officers carried by law as additional numbers, including staff officers heretofore permanently commis-

sioned with the rank of rear admiral, and nothing contained herein shall be held to reduce below that heretofore authorized by law the number of officers in any grade or rank in the staff corps.

Pay and allowances of officers.

Hereafter pay and allowances of officers in the upper half of the grade or rank of rear admiral, including the staff corps and including staff officers heretofore permanently commissioned with the rank of rear admiral, shall be that now allowed by law for the first nine rear admirals, and the pay and allowances of officers in the lower half of the grade or rank of rear admiral, including the staff corps, shall be that now allowed by law for the second nine rear admirals: *Provided*, That officers shall take rank in each staff corps according to the dates of commission in the several grades, excepting in cases

where they have gained or lost numbers.

Hereafter chief boatswains, chief gunners, chief machinists, chief carpenters, chief sail makers, chief pharmacists, and chief pay clerks, on the active list with creditable records, shall, after six years from date of commission, receive the pay and allowances that are now or may hereafter be allowed a lieutenant (junior grade), United States Navy: *Provided*, That chief boatswains, chief gunners, chief machinists, chief carpenters, chief sail makers, chief pharmacists, and chief pay clerks, on the active list with creditable records, shall, after twelve years from date of commission, receive the pay and allowances that are now or may hereafter be allowed a lieutenant, United States Navy.

Warrant officers shall receive the same allowances of heat and light as are now or may hereafter be allowed an

ensign, United States Navy.

Warrant officers shall be allowed such leave of absence, with full pay, as is now or may hereafter be allowed other

officers of the United States Navy.

Promotions by

Hereafter all promotions to the grades of commander, captain, and rear admiral of the line of the Navy, including the promotion of those captains, commanders, and lieutenant commanders who are, or may be, carried on the Navy list as additional to the numbers of such grades, shall be by selection only from the next lower respective grade upon the recommendation of a board of naval officers as herein provided.

The board shall consist of nine rear admirals on the active list of the line of the Navy not restricted by law to the performance of shore duty only, and shall be appointed by the Secretary of the Navy and convened during the month of December of each year and as soon

after the first day of the month as practicable.

Each member of said board shall swear, or affirm, that he will, without prejudice or partiality, and having in view solely the special fitness of officers and the efficiency of the naval service, perform the duties imposed upon him as herein provided.

The board shall be furnished by the Secretary of the Navy with the number of vacancies in the grades of rear admiral, captain, and commander to be filled during the following calendar year, including the vacancies existing. at the time of the convening of the board and those that will occur by operation of law from the date of convening until the end of the next calendar year, and with the names of all officers who are eligible for consideration for selection as herein authorized, together with the record of each officer: Provided, That any officer eligible for consideration for selection shall have the right to forward through official channels at any time not later than ten days after the convening of said board a written communication inviting attention to any matter of record in the Navy Department concerning himself which he deems important in the consideration of his case: Provided, That such communication shall not contain any reflection upon the character, conduct, or motives of or criticism of any officer: Provided further, That no captains, commanders, or lieutenant commanders who shall have had less than four years' service in the grade in which he is serving on November the thirtieth of the year of the convening of the board shall be eligible for consideration by the board: Provided further, That the recommendation of the board in the case of officers of the former Engineer Corps who are restricted by law to the performance of shore duty only and in that of officers who may hereafter be assigned to engineering duty only shall be based upon their comparative fitness for the duties prescribed for them by law. Upon promotion they shall be carried as additional numbers in grade.

The board shall recommend for promotion a number of officers in each grade equal to the number of vacancies to be filled in the next higher grade during the following calendar year: Provided, That no officer shall be recommended for promotion unless he shall have received the recommendation of not less than six members of said board: Provided further, That the increase in the number of captains herein authorized shall be made at the rate

of not more than ten captains in any one year.

The report of the board shall be in writing signed by all of the members and shall certify that the board has carefully considered the case of every officer eligible for consideration under the provisions of this law, and that in the opinion of at least six of the members, the officers therein recommended are the best fitted of all those under consideration to assume the duties of the next higher grade, except that the recommendation of the board in the case of officers of the former Engineer Corps who are restricted by law to the performance of shore duty only, and in that of officers who may hereafter be assigned to engineering duty only, shall be based upon their comparative fitness for the duties prescribed for them by law.

Report to President.

The report of the board shall be submitted to the President for approval or disapproval. In case any officer or officers recommended by the board are not acceptable to the President, the beard shall be informed of the name of such officer or officers, and shall recommend a number of officers equal to the number of those found not acceptable to the President and if necessary shall be reconvened for this purpose. When the report of the board shall have been approved by the President, the officers recommended therein shall be deemed eligible for selection, and if promoted shall take rank with one another in accordance with their seniority in the grade from which promoted: Provided. That any officers so selected shall prior to promotion be subject in all respects to the examinations prescribed by law for officers promoted by seniority, and in case of failure to pass the required professional examination such officer shall thereafter be ineligible for selection and promotion. And should any such officer fail to pass the required physical examination he shall not be considered, in the event of retirement, entitled to the rank of the next higher grade.

On and after June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and twenty, no captain, commander, or lieutenant commander shall be premoted unless he has had not less than two years' actual sea service on seagoing ships in the grade in which serving or who is more than fifty-six, fifty, or forty-five years of age, respectively: Provided, That the qualification of sea service shall not apply to officers restricted to the performance of engineering duty only: Provided further, That captains, commanders, and lieutenant commanders who become ineligible for promotion on account of age shall be retired on a percentage of pay equal to two and one-half per centum of their shore-duty pay for each year of service: Provided further, That the total retired pay shall not exceed seventy-five per centum of the shore-duty pay they were entitled to receive while

on the active list.

Age of retirement.

Except as herein otherwise provided, hereafter the age for retirement of all officers of the Navy shall be sixtyfour years instead of sixty-two years as now prescribed by law.

Nothing contained in this Act shall be construed to reduce the rank, pay, or allowances of any officer of the

Navy or Marine Corps as now provided by law.

# OFFICERS FOR ENGINEERING DUTY ONLY.

Officers for engineering duty.

Officers of the line of the Navy not below the grade of lieutenant may, upon application, and with the approval of the Secretary of the Navy, be assigned to engineering duty only, and that when so assigned and until they reach the grade of commander, they shall perform duty as prescribed in section four of the Personnel Act approved March third, eighteen hundred and ninety-nine, and there-

after shore duty only as now prescribed for officers transferred to the line from the former engineer corps, except that commanders may be assigned to duty as fleet and squadron engineers: Provided, That when so assigned they shall retain their place with respect to other line officers in the grades they now or may hereafter occupy, and also the right to succession to command on shore in accordance with their seniority, and shall be promoted as vacancies occur subject to physical examination and to such examination in engineering as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe: Provided further, That the number of officers so assigned in any one year shall be in accordance with the requirements of the service as determined by the Secretary of the Navy: And provided further, That the Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to appoint annually in the line of the Navy for a period of point ensures for ten years following the passage of this Act, in the order engineering duty. of merit determined by such competitive examination as he may prescribe, thirty acting ensigns for the performance of engineering duties only. Persons so appointed must have received a degree of mechanical or electrical engineer from a college or university of high standing or be graduates of technical schools approved by the Secretary of the Navy, must have been found physically qualified by a board of medical officers of the Navy for the performance of the duties required, and must at the time of appointment be not less than twenty nor more than twenty-six years of age. Such appointments shall be for a probationary period of three years, and may be revoked at any time by the Secretary of the Navy.

Such acting ensigns shall, upon the completion of the probationary period of three years, of which two years shall have been spent on board cruising vessels and one year pursuing a course of instruction at the Naval Academy prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy, be commissioned in the grade of lieutenant of the junior grade after satisfactorily passing such examination as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy, and having been recommended for promotion by the examining board and found physically qualified by a board of medical officers

of the Navy.

Such officers shall thereafter be required to perform engineering duties only, and shall be eligible for advancement to the higher grades in the manner herein provided for line officers assigned to engineering duty only.

Hereafter no officer or enlisted man in the Navy or Marine Corps in active service who shall be absent from duty on account of sickness or disease resulting from his own intemperate use of drugs or alcoholic liquors, or other misconduct, shall receive pay for the period of such absence, the time so absent and the cause thereof to be ascertained under such procedure and regulations as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy: Provided, That an enlistment shall not be regarded as com-

plete until the enlisted man shall have made good any time in excess of one day lost on account of sickness or disease resulting from his own intemperate use of drugs

or alcoholic liquors, or other misconduct.

The Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to grant furlough without pay to enlisted men for a period covering the unexpired portion of their enlistment: Provided, That such furlough be granted under the same conditions and in lieu of discharge by purchase or by special order of the department. Enlisted men so furloughed shall be subject to recall in time of war or national emergency to complete the unexpired portion of their enlistment, and shall be in addition to the authorized number of enlisted men of the Navy.

Duty with Red Cross.

Hereafter the authorized number of surgeons in the United States Navy be, and it is hereby, increased by one; and that hereafter the Secretary of the Navy be, and he is hereby, authorized to detail one or more officers of the Medical Corps of the United States Navy for duty with the Military Relief Division of the American National Red Cross.

The Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to cause to be paid to Mrs. Sophia Gompers, mother of the late William Gompers, seaman, United States Navy, \$176.40, being the amount equal to six months' pay at the rate received by that seaman at the date of his death, less expenses of interment.

That the Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized and directed to cause to be paid to Mrs. Eliza Orr, mother of the late William Orr, fireman, United States Navy, an amount equal to six months' pay at the rate received by him at the date of his death, less expenses of interment.

No officer who, after having commanded a fleet in active commission, has been retired for age and whom, in the judgment of the Secretary of the Navy, the public interests make it necessary to retain for a time after said retirement and who is performing active duty as chairman of the executive committee of the General Board, shall, for the period so retained, suffer any reduction in the emoluments he was receiving at the time of his retirement: Provided. That hereafter any retired officer of the naval service who shall be detailed on active duty shall, while so serving, receive the active duty pay and allowances of the grade, not above that of lieutenant commander in the Navy or of major in the Marine Corps, that he would have attained in due course of promotion if he had remained on the active list for a period beyond the date of his retirement equal to the total amount of time during which he has been detailed on active duty since his retirement: Provided, That nothing herein shall be construed to reduce the pay of any retired officer on active duty whose retired pay exceeds the active duty pay and allowances for the grade of lieutenant commander.

Hereafter all commissioned officers of the active list of the Navy shall receive the same pay and allowances according to rank and length of service: *Provided*, That this provision shall not be construed to reduce the pay and allowances of commissioned warrant officers as herein authorized.

That the accounting officers of the United States Treasury are hereby authorized and directed to allow in the accounts of disbursing officers of the Navy all payments for telephones in Government quarters which have been disallowed under section seven of the Act of August twenty-third, nineteen hundred and twelve (Thirty-seventh Statutes, pages one and four hundred and fourteen), by decision of the Comptroller.

That the accounting officers of the United States Treasury are hereby authorized to credit to the account of Paymaster George R. Crapo, United States Navy, the sum of \$360, which amount was paid by the said Paymaster Crapo for a passenger-carrying vehicle for official use at the Naval Station, Key West, Florida, on September twenty-second, nineteen hundred and fourteen, under a

mistake of law.

The Secretary of the Treasury is hereby authorized and directed to credit in the accounts of Passed Assistant Paymaster James C. Hilton, United States Navy, the sum of \$6,033.61, being the amount stolen from United States funds by a person or persons unknown and charged against the accounts of the said James C. Hilton, passed assistant paymaster, on the books of the Treasury De-

partment.

The accounting officers of the Treasury are hereby authorized and directed to allow in the accounts of Paymaster T. D. Harris, United States Navy, credit for the full payment of the contract price made by him to James Morrow under contract of May twenty-ninth, nineteen hundred and nine, and to Carson, Pirie, Scott and Company, James Corse, N. H. Dow Manufacturing Company, The Snead and Company Iron Works, and Original Cabinet Company under contracts of March, nineteen hundred and eleven, pertaining to the naval training station, Great Lakes, Illinois.

That the President of the United States is hereby authorized to cause Ensign Harold Harrison Little, United States Navy, to be examined for promotion to the grade of lieutenant (junior grade), United States Navy, and subject to his successfully passing such reexamination to promote him to the grade of lieutenant (junior grade), to take place on the Navy list in such grade next after Lieutenant (Junior Grade) William G. Greenman, United States Navy, who was the officer immediately above the said Harold Harrison Little in the list of lieutenants (junior grade) at the date said Harold Harrison Little became due for promotion to the grade of lieutenant (junior grade), United States Navy: Provided, That

no back pay, allowances, or emoluments shall accrue by

reason of the passage of this Act.

Hereafter Assistant Paymaster John D. P. Hodapp, United States Navy, shall be regarded as having been appointed as an assistant paymaster in the United States Navy on the same date as the officer now next above him in grade: *Provided*, That nothing herein shall be construed to entitle the said Assistant Paymaster John D. P. Hodapp, United States Navy, to any back pay, allowances, or other emoluments.

Section six of an Act entitled "An Act making appropriations for the legislative, executive, and judicial expenses of the Government for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and seventeen, namely:" approved May tenth, nineteen hundred and sixteen, is

hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Sec. 6. That unless otherwise specially authorized by law, no money appropriated by this or any other Act shall be available for payment to any person receiving more than one salary when the combined amount of said salaries exceeds the sum of \$2,000 per annum, but this shall not apply to retired officers or enlisted men of the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard, or to officers and enlisted men of the Organized Militia and Naval Militia in the several States, Territories, and the District of Columbia: Provided, That no such retired officer, officer, or enlisted man shall be denied or deprived of any of his pay, salary, or compensation as such, or of any other salary or compensation for services heretofore rendered, by reason of any decision or construction of said section six."

#### NAVAL FLYING CORPS.

Navai Flying Corps.

The Naval Flying Corps shall be composed of one hundred and fifty officers and three hundred and fifty enlisted men, detailed, appointed, commissioned, enlisted, and distributed in the various grades, ranks, and ratings of the Navy and Marine Corps as hereafter provided. The said number of officers, student flyers, and enlisted men shall be in addition to the total number of officers and enlisted men which is now or may hereafter be provided by law for the other branches of the naval service.

The number of officers detailed to duty in aircraft involving actual flying in any one year shall be in accordance with the requirements of the Air Service as determined by the Secretary of the Navy: Provided, That the officers so detailed from the line of the Navy and from the Marine Corps shall not exceed the total number herein prescribed for the Naval Flying Corps: Provided further, That the proportion of line officers of the Navy and of the Marine Corps thus detailed shall be the same as the proportion established for the regular services: And provided further, That the student flyers hereinafter provided

for shall be in addition to the officers and enlisted men

comprising the Naval Flying Corps.

The officers detailed and the emlisted men of the Naval lowances of.
Flying Corps shall receive the same pay and allowances of that are now provided by law for officers and emlisted men of the same grade or rank and rating in the Navy and Marine Corps detailed to duty with aircraft involving actual flying.

The Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to ap-Secretary to point annually in the line of the Navy and the Marine ensigns. Corps for a period of two years following the passage of this Act, in order of merit as determined by such competitive examinations as he may prescribe, fifteen acting ensigns or acting second lieutenants for the performance of aeronautic duties only. Persons so appointed must be citizens of the United States, and may be appointed from warrant officers or enlisted men of the naval service or from civil life, and must, at the time of appointment, be not less than eighteen or more than twenty-four years of age: Provided, That no person shall be so appointed until he has been found physically qualified by a board of medical officers of the Navy for the performance of the duties required: Provided further, That the number of such appointments to the line of the Navy and of the Marine Corps shall be in the proportion decided for the regular services. Such appointments shall be for a probationary period of three years and may be revoked at any time by the Secretary of the Navy.

Such acting ensigns and acting second lieutenants shall be detailed to duty in the Naval Flying Corps in aircraft

involving actual flying.

Such acting ensigns of the Navy and acting second lieutenants of the Marine Corps shall, upon completion of the Corps.

probationary period of three years, be appointed acting
lieutenants of the junior grade, or acting first lieutenants,
respectively, by the Secretary of the Navy for the performance of aeronautic duties only, after satisfactorily
passing such examinations as he may prescribe, and after
having been recommended for promotion by the examining board and found physically qualified by a board of
medical officers of the Navy. Such appointments shall
be for a probationary period of four years and may be
revoked at any time by the Secretary of the Navy.

Such acting lieutenants (junior grade) and acting first lieutenants may elect to qualify for aeronautic duty only or to qualify for all the duties of officers of the same grade in the Navy and in the Marine Corps, respectively. Those officers who elect to qualify for aeronautic duty only shall be detailed to duty in the Naval Flying Corps involving actual flying in aircraft. Those officers who elect to qualify for the regular duties of their grade shall be detailed to duty in the regular service for at least two years to allow them to prepare for such qualification.

•



Such acting lieutenants (junior grade) and acting first lieutenants who have elected to qualify for aeronautic duty only shall, upon completion of the probationary period of four years, be commissioned in the grade of lieutenant of the line of the Navy or captain of the Marine Corps for aeronautic duties only, after satisfactorily passing such competitive examination as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy to determine their moral, physical, and professional qualifications for such commissions and the order of rank in which they shall be commissioned. Such lieutenants for aeronautic duty only shall be borne on the lists as extra numbers, taking rank with and next after officers of the same date of commission.

Such acting lieutenants (junior grade) and acting first lieutenants who have elected to qualify for the regular duties of the line of the Navy and of the Marine Corps. respectively, shall, upon completion of the probationary period of four years, two years of which shall have been on such regular duties, be commissioned in the grade of the line of the Navy or Marine Corps according to his length of service, after passing satisfactorily such competitive examinations as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy to determine their moral, physical, and professional qualifications for such commissions and to determine the order of rank in which they shall be commissioned. Such officers of the line of the Navy and Marine Corps will be borne upon the lists of their respective corps as extra numbers, taking rank with and next after officers of the regular services of the same date of commissions.

Acting lieutenants (junior grade) of the line of the Navy for aeronautic duties only and acting first lieutenants of the Marine Corps for aeronautic duty only who have completed the probationary period of four years may, upon examination for commissions to the next higher grade, if recommended by the board of examination, be transferred to the Naval Reserve Flying Corps and commissioned in the same grade or the next higher grade as may be recommended in accordance with their qualifications as determined by the examination: Provided, That at any time during such probationary period any such officer can, upon his own request, if his record warrants it, be transferred to the Naval Reserve Flying Corps and commissioned in the acting grade he then holds. Any officer of the Naval Flying Corps holding an appointment of student flyer or acting ensign, second lieutenant, lieutenant (junior grade), or first lieutenant, who, upon examination for promotion, is found not qualified shall, if not recommended by the examining board for transfer to the Naval Reserve Flying Corps, be honorably discharged from the naval service.

Officers commissioned for aeronautic duty only shall be eligible for advancement to the higher grades, not above

captain in the Navy or colonel in the Marine Corps, in the same manner as other officers whose employment is not so restricted, except that they shall be eligible to promotion without restriction as to sea duty, and their professional examinations shall be restricted to the duty to which personally assigned: Provided, That any such officer must serve at least three years in any grade before being eligible to promotion to the next higher grade.

Nothing in this Act shall be so construed as to prevent the detail of officers and enlisted men of other branches of the Navy as student aviators or student airmen in such

numbers as the needs of the service may require.

Such officers and enlisted men, while detailed as student aviators and student airmen involving actual flying in aircraft, shall receive the same pay and allowances that Pay of airmen. are now provided by law for officers and enlisted men of the same grade or rank and rating in the Navy detailed

for duty with aircraft.

The Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to appoint annually for a period of four years, from enlisted men of the naval service, or from citizens of the United States in civil life, not to exceed thirty student flyers student flyers. for instruction and training in aeronautics who shall receive the same pay and allowances as midshipmen at the United States Naval Academy: Provided, That persons so appointed must, at the time of appointment, be not less than seventeen or more than twenty-one years of age: Provided further, That no person shall be appointed a student flyer until he shall have qualified therefor by such examination as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy.

The appointment of student flyers shall continue in force for two years, unless sooner revoked by the Secretary of the Navy, in his discretion, and at the end of such period student flyers shall be examined for qualification as qualified aviators: Provided, That if such student flyers are not qualified, their appointment will be revoked, or, if recommended by the examining board, they shall be transferred to the Naval Reserve Flying

Corps and commissioned as ensigns therein.

Student flyers shall, after receiving a certificate of qualification as an aviator for actual flying in aircraft, rank with midshipmen and shall receive the same pay and allowances as midshipmen, plus fifty per centum thereof: Provided, That student flyers who have qualified as aviators under the provisions of this Act shall be commissioned acting ensigns for aeronautic duties only, after three years' service: Provided further, That they shall have been examined by a board of officers of the Naval Flying Corps to determine by a competitive examination prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy theimoral, physical, and professional fitness and the order of rank in which they shall be commissioned: And provided further, That any student flyer qualified as an aviator

may at any time, in the discretion of the Secretary of the Navy, if his record warrants it, at his own request, be transferred to the Naval Reserve Flying Corps and be commissioned as easign therein: And provided further, That student flyers not considered qualified for commissions as acting easigns for aeronautic duties only may, upon recommendation of the examining board, be transferred to the Naval Reserve Flying Corps and be commissioned as easigns therein.

Aeronautic schools.

The Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to establish aeronautic schools for the instruction and training of student flyers and prescribe the course of instruction and qualifications for certificate of graduation as a qualified aviator.

Nothing in this or any other Act shall be so construed as to prevent the temporary detail of officers and enlisted men of any branch of the Navy for duty with aircraft.

Pay in case of accident or death.

In the event of the death of an officer or enlisted man or student flyer of the Naval Flying Corps from wounds or disease, the result of an aviation accident, not the result of his own misconduct, received while engaged in actual flying in or in handling aircraft, the gratuity to be paid under the provisions of the Act approved August twenty-second, nineteen hundred and twelve, entitled "An Act making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and thirteen, and for other purposes," shall be an amount equal to one year's pay at the rate received by such officer or enlisted man or student fiver at the time of the accident resulting in his death. In all cases where an officer or enlisted man or student flyer of the Navy or Marine Corps dies, or where a student flyer or an enlisted man of the Navy or Marine Corps is disabled by reason of any injury received or disease contracted in line of duty, the result of an aviation accident, received while employed in actual flying in or in handling aircraft, the amount of pension allowed shall be double that authorized to be paid should death or the disability have occurred by reason of an injury received or disease contracted in line of duty not the result of an aviation accident.

Student fivers and the acting ensigns and acting lieutenants (junior grade) and acting second and first lieutenants for aeronautic duties only provided for herein shall be subject to the laws and regulations and orders for the government of the Navy, but shall not be entitled to retirement or retired pay.

The enlisted personnel of the Naval Flying Corps shall be distributed by the Secretary of the Navy in the various ratings as now obtain in the Navy in so far as such ratings are applicable to duties connected with aircraft.

Within the first two years after the approval of this Act enlisted men may be transferred from other branches of the Naval Service to the Naval Flying Corps, under regulations established by the Secretary of the Navy gov-

erning such transfer and the qualifications for this corps: Provided, That the number so transferred shall not exceed one-half the total number of enlisted men allowed by this Act.

The Secretary of the Navy shall establish regulations governing the term of enlistment, the qualifications, and advancement of the enlisted men of the Flying Corps.

Any enlisted man who passes satisfactorily the prescribed examination and is recommended by a board of officers may be appointed a student flyer as herein provided.

## ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE.

Hereafter all officers of the Navy and Marine Corps who are authorized to order either general or summary courts-martial may order deck courts upon enlisted men Deck courts. under their command, and shall have the same authority to inflict minor punishments as is conferred by law upon

the commander of a naval vessel.

Summary courts-martial may be ordered upon enlisted Court-martial. men in the naval service under his command by the commanding officer of any brigade, regiment, or separate or detached battalion, or other separate or detached command, and, when empowered by the Secretary of the Navy, by the commanding officer or officer in charge of any command not specifically mentioned in the foregoing: Provided, That when so empowered by the Secretary of the Navy to order summary courts-martial, the commanding officer of a naval hospital or hospital ship shall be empowered to order such courts and deck courts, and inflict the punishments which the commander of a naval vessel is authorized by law to inflict, upon all enlisted men of the naval service attached thereto, whether for duty or as patients.

No sentence of a summary court-martial shall be carried into execution until the proceedings and sentence have been approved by the officer ordering the court, or his successor in office, and by his immediate superior in command: Provided, That if the officer ordering the court, or his successor in office, be the senior officer present, such sentence may be carried into execution upon his

approval thereof.

When empowered by the Secretary of the Navy, general courts-martial may be convened by the commanding officer of a squadron, of a division, of a flotilla, or of a larger naval force afloat, and of a brigade or larger force of the naval service on shore beyond the continental limits of the United States: Provided, That in time of war, if then so empowered by the Secretary of the Navy, general courts-martial may be convened by the commandant of any navy yard or naval station, and by the commanding officer of a brigade or larger force of the Navy or Marine Corps on shore not attached to a navy yard or naval station.



Courts of inquiry may be convened by any officer of the naval service authorized by law to convene general courts-martial.

When a force of marines is embarked on a naval vessel, or vessels, as a separate organization, not a part of the authorized complement thereof, the authority and powers of the officers of such separate organization of marines shall be the same as though such organization were serving at a navy yard on shore, but nothing herein shall be construed as impairing the paramount authority of the commanding officer of any naval vessel over the vessel under his command and all persons embarked thereon.

#### NAVAL RESERVE FORCE.

Naval reserves.

There is hereby established, under the Department of the Navy, a Naval Reserve Force, to consist of six classes, designated as follows and as hereinafter described:

First. The Fleet Naval Reserve.

Second. The Naval Reserve.

Third. The Naval Auxiliary Reserve.

Fourth. The Naval Coast Defense Reserve.

Fifth. The Volunteer Naval Reserve.

Sixth. Naval Reserve Flying Corps.

The Naval Reserve Force shall be composed of citizens of the United States who, by enrolling under regulations prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy or by transfer thereto as in this Act provided, obligate themselves to serve in the Navy in time of war or during the existence of a national emergency, declared by the President: *Provided*, That citizens of the insular possessions of the United States may enroll in the Naval Auxiliary Reserve.

The Secretary of the Navy shall make all necessary and proper regulations not inconsistent with law for the administration of the provisions of this Act which relate

to the Naval Reserve Force.

Service.

Members of the Naval Reserve Force may be ordered into active service in the Navy by the President in time of war or when, in his opinion, a national emergency exists.

Ranks and T

There shall be allowed in the Naval Reserve Force the various ratings, grades, and ranks, not above the rank of lieutenant commander, corresponding to those in the Navy. Officers of the line may be appointed for deck

or engineering duties, as they may elect.

Members of the Naval Reserve Force appointed to commissioned grades shall be commissioned by the President alone, and members of such force appointed to warrant grades shall be warranted by the Secretary of the Navy: Provided, That officers so warranted or commissioned shall not be deprived of the retainer pay, allowances, or gratuities to which they would otherwise be entitled. Officers of the Naval Reserve Force shall rank with but after officers of corresponding rank in the Navy.

Enrollment.

Enrollment and reenrollment shall be for terms of four years, but members shall in time of peace, when no national emergency exists, be discharged upon their own request upon reimbursing the Government for any clothing gratuity that may have been furnished them during their current enrollment.

Persons enrolling shall be required to take the oath of

allegiance to the United States.

When first enrolled members of the Naval Reserve Force, except those in the Fleet Naval Reserve, shall be given a provisional grade, rank or rating in accordance with their qualifications determined by examination. They may thereafter, upon application, be assigned to active service in the Navy for such periods of instruction and training as may enable them to qualify for and be confirmed in such grade, rank or rating.

No member shall be confirmed in his provisional grade, rank or rating until he shall have performed the minimum amount of active service required for the class in which he is enrolled, nor until he has duly qualified by examination for such rank or rating under regulations

prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy.

No person shall be appointed or commissioned as an for appointment. officer in any rank in any class of the Naval Reserve Force, or promoted to a higher rank therein, unless he shall have been examined and recommended for such appointment, commission, or promotion by a board of three naval officers not below the rank of lieutenant commander, nor until he shall have been found physically qualified by a board of medical officers to perform the duties required in time of war, except that former officers and midshipmen of the Navy, who shall have left the service under honorable conditions and who shall have enrolled in the Naval Reserve Force, may be appointed in the grade and rank last held by them without examination other than the physical examination above prescribed.

The retainer pay of all members of the Naval Reserve Force, except the Volunteer Naval Reserve, while enrolled in a provisional rank or rating, and until such time as they shall have been confirmed in such rank or rating, shall be \$12 per annum. Thereafter, the retainer pay shall be that prescribed for members in the various

Retainer pay shall be in addition to any pay to which a member may be entitled by reason of active service.

Retainer pay shall only be paid to members of the Naval Reserve Force upon their making such reports concerning their movements and occupations as may be required by the Secretary of the Navy.

Members of the Naval Reserve Force who reenroll for a term of four years within four months from the date of the termination of their last term of enrollment, and

who shall have performed the minimum amount of active service required during the preceding term of enrollment. shall, for each such reenrollment, receive an increase of twenty-five per centum of their base retainer pay: Provided. That enrolled members who shall have completed twenty years of service in the Naval Reserve Force, and who shall have performed the minimum amount of active service required in their class for maintaining efficiency during each term of enrollment, shall, upon their own application, be retired with the rank or rating held by them at the time, and shall receive in lieu of any pay, a cash gratuity equal to the total amount of their retainer pay during the last term of their enrollment.

Retainer pay shall be paid annually or at shorter intervals, as the Secretary of the Navy, in his discretion.

may direct.

No existing law shall be construed to prevent any member of the Naval Reserve Force from accepting employment in any branch of the public service, except as an officer or enlisted man in any branch of the military service of the United States or any State thereof, nor from receiving the pay and allowances incident to such em-

ployment in addition to his retainer pay.

Enrolled members of the Naval Reserve Force shall be subject to the laws, regulations, and orders for the government of the Regular Navy only during such time as they may by law be required to serve in the Navy, in accordance with their obligations, and when on active service at their own request as herein provided, and when employed in authorized travel to and from such active service in the Navy. Members of the Naval Reserve Force shall be issued a distinctive badge or button which may be worn with civilian dress, and whoever, not being a member of the Naval Reserve Force of the United States and not entitled under the law to wear the same. willfully wears or uses the badge or button or who uses or wears the same to obtain aid or assistance thereby. shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$20 or by imprisonment for not more than thirty days or by both such fine and imprisonment.

All members of the Naval Reserve Force shall, when actively employed as set forth in this Act, be entitled to the same pay, allowances, gratuities, and other emoluments as officers and enlisted men of the naval service on active duty of corresponding rank or rating and of the same length of service. When not actively employed in the Navy, members of the Naval Reserve Force shall not be entitled to any pay, bounty, gratuity, or pension except as expressly provided for members of the Naval

Reserve Force by the provisions of this Act.

Enrolled members of the Naval Reserve Force may, in time of war or national emergency, be required to perform active service in the Navy throughout the war or until the national emergency ceases to exist.

Members of the Naval Reserve Force shall, upon first reporting for active service for training during each period of enrollment, be credited with a uniform gratuity

of \$50 for officers and of \$30 for men.

Upon reporting for active service in time of war or Uniform national emergency the uniform gratuity shall be \$150 for officers and \$60 for men, or the difference between these amounts and any amounts that may have been credited as a uniform gratuity during the current enrollment: Provided, That should any member of the Naval Reserve Force sever his connection with the service without compulsion on part of the Government before the expiration of his term of enrollment, the amount so credited shall be deducted from any money that may be or may become due him.

Hereafter, in shipping officers and men for service on board United States auxiliary vessel, preference shall be given to members of the Naval Reserve Force, and, after two years from the date of approval of this Act, no person shall be shipped for such service who is not a member

of the Naval Reserve Force herein provided.

Members of the Naval Reserve Force may, upon application, be transferred from one class to another class for which qualified under the provisions of this Act; and may in time of war volunteer for and be assigned to duties prescribed for any class which they may be deemed competent to perform.

The Secretary of the Navy shall prescribe a suitable rise of flag, or pennant, that may be flown as an insignia on private vessels or vessels of the merchant service commanded by officers of the Naval Reserve Force: Provided, That it shall not be flown in lieu of the National ensign.

The Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to Schools or establish schools or camps of instruction at such times struction. and in such localities as he may deem advisable for the purpose of instructing members and applicants for membership in the Naval Reserve Force. No applicant shall be accepted for instruction unless he agrees to abide by the regulations of the school and pursue the course prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy. Persons who satisfactorily complete the course will be given certificates of qualification for the rank or rating for which duly qualified, and may be permitted to enroll in the proper class of the reserve in such rank or rating. For the purpose of carrying into effect this paragraph of the Act there is hereby appropriated, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, \$30,000, which is hereby made available to be expended as the Secretary of the Navy may direct in the necessary equipment and maintenance of such schools and camps.



#### FLEET NAVAL RESERVE.

Fleet naval re-

All former officers of the United States naval service, including midshipmen, who have left that service under honorable conditions, and those citizens of the United States who have been, or may be entitled to be, honorably discharged from the naval service after not less than one four-year term of enlistment or after a term of enlistment during minority, and who shall have enrolled in the Naval Reserve Force shall be eligible for membership in the Fleet Naval Reserve.

Enlisted men, transfer to Fleet Naval Reserves.

In addition to the enrollments in the Fleet Naval Reserve above provided, the Secretary of the Navy is authorized to transfer to the Fleet Naval Reserve at any time within his discretion any enlisted man of the naval service with twenty or more years' naval service, and any enlisted man, at the expiration of a term of enlistment who may be then entitled to an honorable discharge, after sixteen years' naval service: *Provided*, That such transfers shall only be made upon voluntary application and in the rating in which then serving, and the men so transferred shall be continued in the Fleet Naval Reserve until discharged by competent authority.

To active duty.

The Secretary of the Navy is authorized to assign any member of the Fleet Naval Reserve to active duty for training on board ship, upon the application of such member, but any member who has failed to perform three months' active service with the Navy in any term of enrollment shall, on the next reenrollment, receive retainer pay at the rate of \$12 per annum until such time as he shall have completed three months' active service. The three months' active service with the Navy may be taken in one or more periods, at the election of the member: Provided, That no member shall be entitled to travel allowance unless the period of such active service is for not less than one month, or unless specifically provided for by such regulations as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy.

Pay of Fleet Naval Reserve.

Men enrolled in the Fleet Naval Reserve with less than eight years' naval service shall be paid at the rate of \$50 per annum; those with eight or more years and less than twelve years' naval service shall be paid at the rate of \$72 per annum; and those with twelve or more years' naval service shall be paid at the rate of \$100 per annum, such pay to be considered as retainer pay for the obligation on the part of such members to serve in the Navy in time of war or national emergency: Provided, That for all purposes of this Act a complete enlistment during minority and any enlistment terminated within three months prior to the expiration of the term of enlistment by special order of the Secretary of the Navy shall be considered as The annual retainer pay of officers of four years' service. the Fleet Naval Reserve shall be two months' base pay of the corresponding rank in the Navy.

Reenrollments in the Fleet Naval Reserve shall be for Reenrollment four years. Officers and men enrolling in the Fleet Naval serve. Reserve within four months of the date of the termination of their last naval service or reenrolling within four months of the date of the termination of their last term of enrollment shall receive an increase of twenty-five per centum of their retainer pay for each such enrollment: Provided. That men who have enrolled in the Fleet Naval Reserve within four months of the date of their discharge from the regular naval service shall, upon reenlistment in the regular naval service within four months of the date of discharge from the Fleet Naval Reserve, be entitled to the same gratuity and additional pay as if they had reenlisted in the regular naval service within four months of discharge therefrom.

Members of the Fleet Naval Reserve who have, when Retainer pay. transferred to the Fleet Naval Reserve, completed naval service of sixteen or twenty or more years shall be paid a retainer at the rate of one-third and one-half, respectively, of the base pay they were receiving at the close of their last naval service plus all permanent additions thereto: Provided, That the pay authorized in this paragraph as a retainer shall be increased ten per centum for all men who may be credited with extraordinary heroism in the line of duty or whose average marks in conduct for twenty years or more shall not be less than ninety-five per centum of the maximum.

Any pay which may be due any member of the Fleet Naval Reserve shall be forfeited when so ordered by the Secretary of the Navy upon the failure, under such conditions as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy,

of such man to report for inspection.

Members of the Fleet Naval Reserve who have established their qualifications by examination to the satisfaction of the Secretary of the Navy may be given warrants or commissions in the Fleet Naval Reserve in the grades of boatswain, gunner, carpenter, machinist, pharmacist, pay clerk, ensign for deck or engineering duties, or in the lowest grades of the staff corps: Provided further, That those so warranted or commissioned shall not be deprived of the retainer pay, allowances, or gratuities to which they would be otherwise entitled.

Men transferred to the Fleet Naval Reserve shall be Naval laws and governed by the laws and regulations for the government govern. of the Navy and shall not be discharged from the Naval Reserve Force without their consent, except by sentence of a court-martial. They may, upon their own request, upon completing thirty years' service, including naval and fleet naval reserve service, be placed on the retired list of the Navy with the pay they were then receiving plus the allowances to which enlisted men of the same rating are entitled on retirement after thirty years' naval service. They shall be required to keep on hand such

part of the uniform-clothing outfit as may be prescribed

by the Secretary of the Navy.

The Secretary of the Navy is authorized in time of war or when a national emergency exists to call any enlisted man on the retired list into active service for such duty as he may be able to perform. While so employed such enlisted men shall receive the same pay and allowances they were receiving when placed on the retired list.

#### NAVAL RESERVE.

Naval Reserve.

Members of the Naval Reserve Force who have been or may be engaged in the seagoing profession, and who have enrolled for general service, shall be eligible for membership in the Naval Reserve. No person shall be first enrolled in this class who is less than eighteen or more than thirty-five years of age, nor unless he furnishes satisfactory evidence as to his ability and character; nor shall any person be appointed an officer in this class unless he shall have had not less than two years' experience as an officer on board of lake or ocean going vessels.

The minimum active service required of members to qualify for confirmation in their rank or rating in this

class shall be three months.

The minimum active service required for maintaining the efficiency of a member of this class is three months during each term of enrollment. This active service may be in one period or in periods of not less than three

weeks each year.

Pay of.

The annual retainer pay of members in this class after confirmation in rank or rating shall be two months' base pay of the corresponding rank or rating in the Navy.

#### NAVAL AUXILIARY RESERVE.

Naval Auxiliary Reserve.

Members of the Naval Reserve Force of the seagoing profession who shall have been or may be employed on American vessels of the merchant marine of suitable type for use as naval auxiliaries and which shall have been listed as such by the Navy Department for use in war, shall be eligible for membership in the Naval Auxiliary  $\mathbf{Reserve}.$ 

In time of war or during the existence of a national emergency, persons in this class shall be required to serve only in vessels of the merchant ship type, except in cases of emergency, to be determined by the senior officer present, when said officer may, in his discretion, detail them for temporary duty elsewhere as the exigencies of the service may require.

The requirement as to qualifications of officers and men for confirmation in rank or rating, and as to the maintenance of efficiency in rank or rating, shall be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy and shall be limited to the requirements for the proper organization, discipline,

maneuvering, navigation, and operation of vessels of the merchant ship type while performing auxiliary service to the fleet in time of war, and length of time of employment on board such vessels in the merchant service.

Officers in the Naval Auxiliary Reserve shall exercise military command only on board the ships to which they

are attached and in the naval auxiliary service.

The annual retainer pay of members in this class after Pay of. confirmation in rank or rating shall be for officers, one month's base pay of the corresponding rank in the Navy. and for men, two months' base pay of the corresponding rating in the Navy.

## NAVAL COAST DEFENSE RESERVE.

Members of the Naval Reserve Force who may be Naval Coast capable of performing special useful service in the Navv or in connection with the Navy in defense of the coast, shall be eligible for membership in the Naval Coast Defense Reserve.

Persons may enroll in this class for service in connec- Enrollment of. tion with the naval defense of the coast, such as service with coast-defense vessels, torpedo craft, mining vessels, patrol vessels or as radio operators, in various ranks or ratings corresponding to those of the Navy for which they shall have qualified under regulations prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy: Provided, That the Secretary of the Navy may permit the enrollment in this class of owners and operators of yachts and motor power boats suitable for naval purposes in the naval defense of the coast; and is hereby authorized to enter into contract with the owners of such power boats and other craft suitable for war purposes to take over the same in time of war or national emergency upon payment of a reasonable indemnity.

The amount of active service required for confirmation in rank and rating and for maintaining efficiency in rank and rating shall be the same as that required for members

of the Naval Reserve.

The annual retainer pay of members of this class shall Pay of be the same as that of members of the Naval Reserve.

# VOLUNTEER NAVAL RESERVE.

The Volunteer Naval Reserve shall be composed of val Reserve. Nathose members of the Naval Reserve Force who are eligible for membership in any one of the other classes of the Naval Reserve Force, and who obligate themselves to serve in the Navy in any one of said classes without retainer pay and uniform gratuity in time of peace.

#### NAVAL RESERVE FLYING CORPS.

Naval Reserve Flying Corps.

The Naval Reserve Flying Corps shall be composed of officers and student flyers who have been transferred from the Naval Flying Corps to the Naval Reserve Flying Corps and of enlisted men who shall have been so transferred under the same conditions as those provided by law for enlisted men of the Navy transferred to the Fleet Naval Reserve: Provided, That surplus graduates of the aeronautic school may be commissioned as ensigns in the Naval Reserve Flying Corps and promoted therein under such regulations as may be prescribed by the President. Members of the Naval Reserve Force skilled in the flying of aircraft or in their design, building, or operation, shall be eligible for membership in the Naval Reserve Flying Corps. The amount of active service required for confirmation in grade, rank, or rating, and for maintaining efficiency therein, shall be the same as that required for members of the Naval Reserve. The retainer pay of members of the Naval Reserve Flying Corps shall be the same as that of members of the Naval Reserve.

#### MARINE CORPS RESERVE.

Marine Corps

A United States Marine Corps Reserve, to be a constituent part of the Marine Corps and in addition to the authorized strength thereof, is hereby established under the same provisions in all respects (except as may be necessary to adapt the said provisions to the Marine Corps) as those providing for the Naval Reserve Force in this Act: Provided, That the Marine Corps Reserve may consist of not more than five classes, corresponding, as near as may be, to the Fleet Naval Reserve, the Naval Reserve, the Naval Coast Defense Reserve, the Volunteer Naval Reserve, and the Naval Reserve Flying Corps, Naval Reserve respectively.

All Acts or parts of Acts relating to the Naval Reserve which are inconsistent with the provisions of this Act relating to the Naval Reserve Force are hereby repealed.

Naval Reserve Force: For the authorized expenses of organizing the Naval Reserve Force, \$130,000, and the unexpended balance of the appropriation for carrying into effect the provisions of the Act of March third, nineteen hundred and fifteen, relating to a Naval Reserve, be, and it is hereby, made immediately available to carry into effect the foregoing provisions relating to a Naval Reserve Force. The retainer pay and active service pay of members of the Naval Reserve Force shall be paid from the appropriation "Pay-the Navy," and the retainer pay and active service pay of the Marine Corps Reserve shall be paid from the appropriation "Pay, Marine Corps."

Compensation.

#### NAVAL MILITIA AND NATIONAL NAVAL VOLUNTEERS.

Each commissioned and warrant officer on the active list of the Naval Militia shall receive compensation for his services, referred to hereinafter as retainer pay, except during periods of service for which he may become lawfully entitled to the same pay as an officer of corresponding grade of the United States Navy or Marine Corps, at the following rates per annum, namely:

To officers of or above the naval rank or equivalent

rank of lieutenant, \$500;

To officers of the naval rank or equivalent rank of lieutenant (junior grade), \$240;

To officers of the naval rank or equivalent rank of ensign, \$200;

To warrant officers, \$120:

Provided, That no commissioned or warrant officer of the Naval Militia shall be entitled to any retainer pay for any period during which he has not attended the minimum number of drills prescribed in section fifteen of an Act entitled "An Act to promote the efficiency of the Naval Militia, and for other purposes," approved February sixteenth, nineteen hundred and fourteen, or equivalent official duty duly authorized in lieu thereof in accordance with such regulations as may be issued by the Secretary of the Navy.

That each enlisted man on the active list of the Naval Militia shall receive compensation for his services, referred to hereinafter as retainer pay, except during periods of service for which he may become lawfully entitled to the same pay as an enlisted man of corresponding rate or rank of the United States Navy or Marine Corps, at a rate equal to twenty-five per centum of the base pay now, or as may be hereafter, provided by law for an enlisted man of corresponding rate or rank in the United States Navy or Marine Corps, but not to exceed \$120 per annum: Provided, That such enlisted man shall receive the full retainer pay represented by said twenty-five per centum of said base pay only if he shall have attended, during any one year, the maximum number of assemblies for drill, instruction, and target practice, but for the purpose of computing pay not to exceed fortyeight (or equivalent official duty), which he shall have been duly required to attend, and a proportionate amount for attendance at a lesser number of the same, being in no case less than fifty per centum of said maximum, nor less than the minimum total number of assemblies for drill, instruction, and target practice provided for by section fifteen of an Act entitled "An Act to promote the efficiency of the Naval Militia, and for other purposes," approved February sixteenth, nineteen hundred and fourteen, or duly authorized equivalent official duty.

That no member of the Naval Militia shall be entitled to the retainer pay herein provided for until he has been

found qualified, both physically and professionally, in accordance with the standard prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy, and until he has enrolled in the National

Naval Volunteers hereinafter provided for.

That the compensation provided for herein shall be computed for quarterly periods under such regulations as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe, beginning the first days of January, April, July, and October, respectively, of each year, in proportion to the number of said assemblies attended, and no compensation shall be paid to any enlisted man during the first semiannual period of any year unless he shall have attended during said period at least fifty per centum of said minimum of assemblies: but attendance at any lesser number of said assemblies during said period shall be reckoned with the said assemblies attended during the second, third, and fourth quarterly periods in computing the compensation, if any, due him for that year: Provided. That when any enlisted man enters into an enlistment he shall be entitled to proportional compensation for that year if during the remainder of the year he shall attend a number of said assemblies whose ratio to said minimum is not less than the ratio of the part of the year so served to the whole year; and when the enlistment of any man shall expire the compensation, if any, to which he may be entitled shall be determined in like manner: And provided further, That periods of any actual military duty equivalent to the assemblies hereinabove particularly referred to, except those periods of service for which, under existing or future laws, members of the Naval Militia may become entitled to the same pay as officers and enlisted men of the corresponding ranks, grades, or rates in the United States Navy and Marine Corps, may be accepted as service in lieu of such drills, when approved by the Secratary of the Navy.

Whenever a member of the Naval Militia who is employed under a department of the Government of the United States attends drills, cruises, or other ordered duty of the Naval Militia, he shall receive the amount of the salary or wages he would have earned when so employed, in addition to the amount provided for by law as a member of the said Naval Militia: Provided, however, That such attendance shall not affect his efficiency rating in said department, nor shall he suffer demotion or loss of position during or at the termination of any naval or military service when ordered upon special or

active duty of any kind.

That the retainer pay provided above shall be paid quarterly, except as otherwise above provided, to officers and enlisted men of the Naval Militia through the disbursing officer provided for under section eleven of an Act to promote the efficiency of the Naval Militia, and for other purposes, approved February sixteenth, nineteen hundred and fourteen, who shall be an officer of the

pay corps of the Naval Militia. The Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to pay to such disbursing officer so much of the amount appropriated to carry out the provisions of this Act as shall be necessary for the above purposes. When disbursing officers are traveling in the performance of their official duties under orders issued by the Secretary of the Navy they shall be reimbursed for their actual and necessary traveling expenses, the same to be made a charge against the appropriation

'Arming and equipping Naval Militia."

The governor of each State and Territory, and the Accounting commanding general of the District of Columbia Militia, shall appoint either the above-described disbursing officer or such other officer of the pay corps of the Naval Militia as he may elect as accounting officer for each battalion thereof, or, at his option, for each larger unit or combination of units of the same, who shall be responsible for the proper accounting for all property belonging to the United States issued to and for the use of such battalion,

or larger unit or combination of units.

Accounting officers shall render accounts as prescribed Accounting. by the Secretary of the Navy and shall be required to give good and sufficient bonds to the United States in such sums as the Secretary of the Navy may direct, conditioned upon the faithful accounting for all property belonging to the United States and for the safekeeping of such part thereof as may be in the personal custody of such officer. Accounting officers may issue any or all such property to other officers or enlisted men of the Naval Militia under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed: And provided further, That the Secretary of the Navy shall cause an inspection of the accounts and records of the accounting officers to be made by an officer of the Navy at least once each year.

When accounting officers are traveling in the performance of their official duties under orders issued by the Secretary of the Navy they shall be reimbursed for their actual and necessary traveling expenses, the same to be made a charge against the appropriation "Arming and equipping Naval Militia."

That officers and enlisted men of the Naval Militia to whom property has been issued as herein provided for shall be responsible for the safe-keeping and return thereof. Stoppages may be made against the compensation payable to any officer or enlisted man of the Naval Militia to cover the cost of public property lost or destroyed by and chargeable to such officer or enlisted man.

That no part of the Naval Militia which is entitled to compensation under the provisions of this Act shall be

disbanded without the consent of the President.

That to provide a force for use in any emergency, in- National Naval cluding that of actual or imminent war, requiring the Volunteers. use of naval forces in addition to those of the Regular Navy, of which emergency the President shall be, for the

purposes of this Act, the sole judge, there is hereby created a force, to be known as the "National Naval Volunteers," into which the President alone is authorized, under such regulations as he may prescribe, to at any time enroll, by commission, warrant, and enlistment, respectively, and without examination, such number of the officers and men of the various branches of the Naval Militia as he may decide to so enroll from among those of the Naval Militia who have theretofore confirmed to the standard of professional and physical examination prescribed for such officers and men under section five of an Act entitled "An Act to promote the efficiency of the Naval Militia, and for other purposes," approved February sixteenth, nineteen hundred and fourteen, and who may volunteer for such enrollment; and may also similarly enroll, immediately upon the occurrence of any such emergency (subject to their first or subsequent passing examinations satisfactory to him, or may, if he shall think best, enroll without any examination), such further number of the officers and men of the Naval Militia as may so volunteer from among those of the Naval Militia who have not theretofore conformed to said standards. Such officers and men, so enrolled by commission, warrant, or enlistment, shall be eligible and liable for call for immediate service in the event of any such emergency.

That the President may also, in the event of such emergency, draft into the naval service of the United States and enroll as members of the said Volunteers as many officers and men of the Naval Militia as he may think best, and with or without examination, as he may decide, from among those of the Naval Militia who shall not therefore have volunteered and been enrolled in said Volunteers: Provided, That no commissioned or warrant officer drafted or otherwise enrolled shall be compelled to serve in said Volunteers in a lower rank or grade than that which he held in the Naval Militia at the time of being drafted or otherwise enrolled: Provided further, That the President may commission, warrant, or rate in said Volunteers any person who shall be so enrolled as above.

That when the National Naval Volunteers are ordered by the President into the active service they will, from the date such orders are issued until such time as they may be discharged from such service, be subject to the laws for the government of the Navy in so far as those laws may properly be applied to persons not in the regu-

lar permanent naval service.

That all persons so enrolled shall be held to service in said Volunteers during the continuance of any such emergency and during the period of any existing or thereafter ensuing war, unless sooner relieved by order of the President or until reaching the age of sixty-two years for those in the naval branch and the age of sixty-four years for those in the Marine Corps branch, upon attaining

which ages such persons, respectively, shall be relieved from such enrollment: *Provided*, That during the continuance of any such emergency or war any enrolled person who shall fail to obey the call to service of the President may be arrested and compelled to serve, and, in addition thereto, may be tried by court-martial as a deserter and punished as such in such manner as said court-

martial may lawfully direct.

That any person so enrolled may tender his resignation to, or request his discharge from, the President, who may, in his discretion, accept such resignation or grant such discharge and disenroll such person, and any person so enrolled may be disenrolled by the President for any cause: Provided, That no person so enrolled shall be held against his will to such enrollment for a longer continuous period than three years, except during the pendency or duration of the emergency or of war hereinabove referred to. Any person enrolled may subsequently, upon his own application while so enrolled and if still a member of the Naval Militia, be reenrolled in any rank, grade, or rating for which he shall have been found qualified under the provisions of section five of an Act entitled "An Act to promote the efficiency of the Naval Militia, and for other purposes," approved February sixteenth, nineteen hundred and fourteen, and for which he shall also have been duly commissioned, warranted, enlisted, or rated, as the case may be, in the Naval Militia.

That every person enrolled in said Volunteers shall, from the date of the call of the President, and during the continuance of his active service under said call, stand relieved from all duty as a member of the Naval Militia, and shall, during said period, have in said Volunteers all the authority and obligations of a person of similar rank, grade, or rate in the United States Navy or Marine Corps, shall be governed by the laws and regulations for the government of the Navy, and shall, during his time of active service, be entitled to the same pay and allowances as are, or may be hereafter, provided by law for a person of similar rank, grade, or rate in the United States

Navy and Marine Corps, respectively.

That the members of the said Volunteers may be ordered to duty with the Navy or separately, and either within or without the territorial limits of the United States, and when so serving shall rank with but after those of corresponding rank, grades, or rates in the United States Navy or Marine Corps, except that for the purpose of determining who shall exercise command over a combined force, composed of vessels commanded by officers of said Volunteers, and of vessels commanded by officers of the United States Navy, acting in conjunction, and for the purpose of determining who shall exercise command on shore over a combined force composed of military units commanded by officers of said Volunteers and officers of the United States Navy or Marine Corps, acting in con-

junction, all officers of said Volunteers of or above the rank of lieutenant commander (naval branch) or major (Marine Corps branch) will be regarded as junior to lieutenant commanders of the Navy and majors of the United States Marine Corps, respectively, and provided that as between themselves officers of the said Volunteers shall take rank and precedence as of the dates of the commissions in the Naval Militia under which enrolled in said Volunteers.

That when serving under the call of the President, efficers of said Volunteers may serve on courts-martial for the trial of efficers and men of the United States naval or Naval Militia service, or of said Volunteers, but in the cases of courts-martial convened for the trial of efficers or enlisted men of the United States Navy or Marine Corps, the majority of the members shall be efficers of the regular naval service, and efficers and enlisted men of the said Volunteers may be tried by courts-martial, the members of which are members of the regular naval service, or of said Volunteers, or any or all of the same.

That when any officer or enlisted man of the said Volunteers is disabled by reason of wounds or disabilities received in the active service of the United States, when called to duty under the provisions of this Act, he shall be entitled to all the benefits of the pension laws existing at the time of his service for the benefit of members of the United States Navy or Marine Corps, respectively, and in case such officer or enlisted man dies in the active service of the United States, or in returning to his place of residence after being relieved from such active service, or at any time in consequence of wounds or disabilities received in such active service, his widow and children, or previously designated dependent relative, if any, shall be entitled to all the benefits of such pension laws.

That the President may relieve any and all persons in the National Naval Volunteers from active service when

their services are no longer needed.

That no distinction shall be made between the regular naval service and the National Naval Volunteers when in active service under the call of the President, in respect to promotions or rewards for valorous conduct, or to the conferring upon officers or enlisted men of brevet rank, medals of honor, or other rewards for distinguished conduct.

That the Naval Militia shall consist of the regularly enlisted militia between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years, organized as prescribed for the Naval Militia by law, and commissioned officers between the ages of twenty-one and sixty-two years (naval branch), and twenty-one and sixty-four years (Marine Corps branch): Provided, however, That enlisted men may continue in service after the age of forty-five years, and until the age of sixty-two years (naval branch), or sixty-four years (Marine Corps branch), provided the service is continuous.

Benefits of pen-

That hereafter the period of enlistment in the Naval Period of en-Militia shall be three years. An enlisted man who has served honorably for the full term of his enlistment may reenlist for a term of one, two, or three years, as he may elect. When a man reenlists within thirty days from the date of the expiration of his prior enlistment his term of service shall be considered as continuous, and shall be so dated.

That courts-martial in the Naval Militia of the several States and Territories and in the District of Columbia shall, except when the Naval Militia shall have been called into the service of the United States, consist of general courts-martial, summary courts-martial, and deck

courts. That general courts-martial shall consist of not less than three nor more than thirteen officers, and may be convened by order of the governor of a State or Territory, or the commanding general of the District of

Columbia Militia.

That summary courts-martial may be ordered by the governor of a State, or Territory or by the commanding general of the District of Columbia Militia, or by the commanding officer of a Naval Militia battalion or brigade.

That deck courts may be ordered by the commanding officer of a Naval Militia battalion or brigade, or by a Naval Militia officer in command of Naval Militia forces on shore or on any vessel loaned to a State, Territory, or the District of Columbia, or on any vessel on which said

forces may be serving.

That the above courts-martial and deck courts herein provided for shall be constituted and have congnizance of the same subjects, and possess like powers, except as to punishments, as similar courts provided for in the Navy of the United States, and the proceedings of courts-martial of the Naval Militia shall follow the forms and modes of procedure prescribed for such courts in the Navy of the United States.

That every precept or order for the convening of any such court may authorize said court to sit at any place or places within the territorial limits of the State, Territory, or District where such Naval Militia may be located, or organized, as the convening authority may designate, and may further provide that any such court may be convened and sit on board any such naval or other vessel, wherever the same may from time to time happen to be, or at such place or places ashore, outside the territorial limits referred to above, as, in the judgment of the said convening authority, may be convenient or desirable for the purposes of such courts-martial.

That general courts-martial shall have power to impose Punishments. fines not exceeding \$200, to sentence to forfeiture of pay and allowances, to a reprimand, to dismissal or dishonorable discharge from the service, to reduction in

Courts-martial.

rank or rating; or any two or more of such punishments may be combined in the sentences imposed by such courts.

That summary courts-martial shall have the same powers of punishment as general courts-martial, except that fines imposed by summary courts-martial shall not exceed \$100.

That deck courts may impose fines not exceeding \$50 for any single offense, may sentence enlisted men to reduction in rank or rating, to forfeiture of pay and allowances, to a reprimand, to discharge with other than dishonorable discharge, or to a fine in addition to any one of the other sentences specified.

That all courts-martial of the Naval Militia, including deck courts, shall have the power to sentence to confinement in lieu of fines authorized to be imposed: *Provided*, That such sentences shall not exceed one day for each

dollar of fine authorized.

That no sentence of dismissal or dishonorable discharge from the Naval Militia shall, except when the Naval Militia shall have been called into the service of the United States, be executed without the approval of the governor of the State or Territory or the commanding

general of the District of Columbia Militia.

That presidents of general courts-martial, senior members of summary courts-martial, and deck-court officers of the Naval Militia shall have the power to issue warrants to arrest accused persons and to bring them before the court for trial whenever such persons have disobeyed an order in writing from the convening authority to appear before such court, a copy of the charge or charges having been delivered to the accused with such order, and to issue subpænas and subpænas duces tecum, and to enforce by attachment attendance of witnesses and the production of books and papers, and to sentence for a refusal to be sworn or to answer, all as authorized for similar proceedings for courts-martial in the Navy of the United States.

That all processes and sentences of said courts-martial shall be executed by such civil or other officers as may be prescribed by the laws of the several States and Territories, except as hereinafter alternatively provided, and in any State where no provisions have been made for such action and in the Territories and the District of Columbia the same shall be executed by a United States marshal, or by his duly appointed deputy, and it shall further be the duty in any case of any United States marshal, when so required by the convening authority of any such courtmartial, to execute all such processes and sentences and make return thereof to the officer issuing or imposing the same.

That the Naval Militia shall be subject to the system of discipline prescribed for the United States Navy and Marine Corps, and the commanding officer of a Naval Militia battalion or brigade, and the Naval Militia officer in command of Naval Militia forces on shore or on any vessel of the Navy loaned to the States, Territories, and the District of Columbia, or on any vessel on which such forces are training, shall have the power, without trial by courts-martial, to impose upon members of the Naval Militia the punishments which the commanding officer of a vessel of the Navy is authorized by law to impose.

That the amount of any fine imposed under sentence of the courts heretofore named on any member of the Naval Militia may be collected from him, or may be deducted from any amount due said member as accrued pay or retainer pay under the provisions of this Act, or otherwise.

That all fines assessed under the provisions of this Act and collected or withheld shall be paid to the commanding officer of the Naval Militia brigade, battalion, or separate unassigned unit of which the person against whom such fine shal have been assessed is a member, to be used by said commanding officer to replace lost or damaged property or for such other purposes of his Naval Militia organization as he may decide, subject to such regulations as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy. Upon the receipt of a certificate from the authority convening the court as to any fine assessed by it, any United States disbursing officer concerned shall pay over any funds due the said member not exceeding the amount of such fine to said commanding officer upon the sole receipt of said commanding officer.

That courts of inquiry in the Naval Militia shall be instituted, constituted, and conducted in the same manner and shall have like powers and duties as similar courts in the Navy of the United States, except that in the Naval Militia courts of inquiry shall be ordered by the governor of the State or Territory, the commanding general of the District of Columbia Militia, or the commanding officer

of a Naval Militia brigade or battalion.

That officers of the United States Navy and Marine Corps may, with the approval of the Secretary of the Navy, be elected or appointed and commissioned as officers of the Naval Militia without prejudice to their position or status in the regular service: Provided. That such officers so commissioned shall, when directed by the Secretary of the Navy, tender their resignations of such State commissions: And provided further, That nothing herein contained shall limit the authority of the Secretary of the Navy over such officers so commissioned.

That line officers of the Naval Militia may be for line duties only, for engineering duties only, or for aeronautic

duties only.

That, under such regulations as the President may preice schools scribe, the Secretary of the Navy may, upon the recommendation of the governor of any State or Territory, or the commanding general of the National Guard of the District of Columbia, authorize a limited number of selected officers or enlisted man of the Naval Militia to



attend and pursue a regular course of study at any Navy or Marine Corps service school of the United States, except the United States Naval Academy; or to be attached to any Navy or Marine Corps command for routine practical instruction; and such officer or enlisted man shall receive, out of any Naval Militia allotment of funds available for the purpose, the same travel allowances and quarters, or commutation of quarters, and the same pay, allowances, and subsistence to which an officer or enlisted man of the naval service would be entitled for attending such school, college, or practical course of instruction under orders from proper naval authority, while in actual attendance at such school, college, or practical course of instruction: *Provided*, That in no case shall the pay and allowances authorized by this section exceed those of a lieutenant in the Navy.

That the Secretary of the Navy shall cause to be estimated annually the amount necessary for carrying out the provisions of this Act, and no money shall be expended under said provisions, except as shall, from time

to time, be appropriated for carrying them out.

That the Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to sell at cost and issue lubricating oil and gasoline to vessels of the Volunteer Patrol Squadrons duly enrolled in the several naval districts; and that during maneuvers or practice drills when any of the vessels of said Patrol Boat Squadrons shall be acting singly or as squadrons under the direct command or control of an officer or officers of the United States Navy, gasoline fuel shall be supplied to them free of charge.

# COAST GUARD.

Coast Guard.

Whenever, in time of war, the Coast Guard operates as a part of the Navy in accordance with law, the personnel of that service shall be subject to the laws prescribed for the government of the Navy: Provided, That in the initiation, prosecution, and completion of disciplinary action, including remission and mitigation of punishments for any offense committed by any officer or enlisted man of the Coast Guard, the jurisdiction shall hereafter depend upon and be in accordance with the laws and regulations of the department having jurisdiction of the person of such offender at the various stages of such action: Provided, further, That any punishment imposed and executed in accordance with the provisions of this section shall not exceed that to which the offender was liable at the time of the commission of his offense.

How paid.

Hereafter whenever, in accordance with law, the expenses of the Coast Guard are paid by the Navy Department, any naval appropriations from which payments are so made shall be reimbursed from available appropriations made by Congress for the expenses of the Coast Guard.

Whenever the personnel of the Coast Guard, or any part thereof, is operating with the personnel of the Navy in accordance with law, precedence between commissioned officers of corresponding grades in the two services shall be determined by the date of commissions in those

grades.

Any commissioned or warrant officer, petty officer, or other enlisted man in the Coast Guard may be assigned to any duty which may be necessary for the proper conduct of the Coast Guard; and the Secretary of the Treasury in time of peace and the Secretary of the Navy in time of war may, in his discretion, man any Coast Guard station during the entire year, or any portion thereof, maintain any house of refuge as a Coast Guard station, and change, establish, and fix the limits of Coast Guard districts and divisions.

Cutters

That the Secretary of the Treasury is hereby authorized and directed to construct and equip two steam Coast Guard cutters for service on the Pacific coast and in Alaskan waters, at a total cost not to exceed the sum of \$700,000; one steam Coast Guard cutter for service as an anchorage patrol boat in New York Harbor, at a cost not to exceed the sum of \$125,000, such vessel to be especially constructed for ice breaking; to purchase or construct and equip two or more cutters for service in harbors and shaol waters, at a total cost not to exceed \$50,000; to purchase or construct and equip three light-draft river steamboats, including lifeboats and such other life-saving appliances and equipment as may be necessary, to be used in rescuing lives and property and in distributing food and clothing to marooned people during flood times on the Mississippi and Ohio Rivers and their tributaries, for partrolling said waters for the enforcement of navination and motor-boat laws, and for rendering aid to vessels in distress, at a total cost not to exceed \$240,000. On account of Coast Guard vessels herein authorized, to be available until expended, \$400,000: Provided, That the Secretary of the Navy, at the request of the Secretary of the Treasury, is hereby authorized to build the vessels herein authorized, or any Coast Guard vessels hereafter authorized, at such navy yards as the Secretary of the Navy may designate.

Steamboats. Life boats.

That for the purpose of saving life and property along the coasts of the United States and at sea contiguous thereto, and to assist in the national defense, the Secretary of the Treasury is authorized to establish, equip, and maintain aviation stations, not exceeding ten in number, at such points on the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, the tions. Gulf of Mexico, and the Great Lakes as he may deem advisable, and to detail for aviation duty in connection therewith officers and enlisted men of the United States Coast Guard. At one of these stations there may be instituted a school for the purpose of special instruction in aeronautics, and the Secretary of the Treasury is hereby

School of sero- authorized to employ one expert instructor in aeronautics. at a salary of \$4,000 per annum, and one assistant instructor, also skilled in aeronautics, at a salary of \$3,000

per annum.

At the request of the Secretary of the Treasury the Secretaries of War and Navy are authorized to receive officers and enlisted men of the Coast Guard for instruction in aviation at any aviation school maintained by the Army and Navy, and such officers and enlisted men shall be subject to the regulations governing such schools.

Coast Guard detailed for aviation duty.

Hereafter officers and enlisted men of the Coast Guard. when detailed for aviation duty, shall receive the same percentages of increases in pay and allowances as are now or may hereafter be prescribed by law for officers and men of the Navy detailed for aviation duty: Provided, That no more than a yearly average of fifteen commissioned officers and a total of forty warrant officers and enlisted men of the Coast Guard detailed for duty involving actual flying in aircraft shall receive any increase in pay or allowances by reason of such detail or duty: Provided further, That the number of third lieutenants and third lieutenants of engineers now authorized by law for the Coast Guard is hereby increased ten and five, respectively, and such portion of the Act approved August twenty-fourth, nineteen hundred and twelve, which provides that no additional appointments as cadets or cadet engineers shall be made in the Revenue-Cutter Service unless hereafter authorized by Congress is hereby revoked.

United States is not contemplated by law.

enlisted strength of the active list of the Marine Corps, exclusive of the Marine Band, and of men under sentence of discharge by court-martial, distributed in the proportion of one officer with rank senior to colonel to four with the rank of colonel, to five with the rank of lieutenant colonel, to fourteen with the rank of major, to thirty-seven with the rank of captain, to thirty-one with the rank of first lieutenant, to thirty-one with the rank of second lieutenant: Provided further, That brigadier generals shall be appointed from officers of the Marine Corps senior in rank to lieutenant colonel: Provided further, That the promotion to the grade of brigadier general of any officer now or hereafter carried as an additional number in the grade or with the rank of colonel shall be held to fill a vacancy in the grade of brigadier general: Provided further, That in determining the officers with rank senior to colonel there shall be included the officer serving as major general commandant: And provided further, That appointments hereafter made to the position of major general commandant under the provisions of the Act approved December nineteenth, nineteen hundred and thirteen, entitled "An Act to make the tenure of office of the major general commandant of the Marine Corps for a term of four years," shall be made from officers of the active list of the Marine Corps not below the rank of colonel: Provided further, That the officers serving in the senior grade of the Adjutant and Inspector's, Quartermaster's, and Paymaster's Departments shall, while serving therein, have the rank, pay, and allowances of a brigadier general: And provided further, That for the purpose of determining the number of officers in the various ranks as herein provided such staff officers shall be counted as being of the rank of colonel: And provided further, That officers holding permanent appointments in the staff departments shall not be eligible for appointment to the grade of brigadier general of the line as hereinbefore provided.

Percentage of commissioned staff officers.

The total commissioned personnel of the active list of the staff departments, whether serving therein under permanent appointments or under temporary detail, as herein provided, shall be eight per centum of the authorized commissioned strength of the Marine Corps, and of this total one-fifth shall constitute the adjutant and inspector's department, one-fifth the paymaster's department, and three-fifths the quartermaster's department.

No further permanent appointments shall be made in any grade in any staff department. Any vacancy hereafter occurring in the lower grade of any staff department shall be filled by the detail of an officer of the line for a period of four years unless sooner relieved; any vacancy hereafter occurring in the upper grade of any staff department shall be filled by the appointment of an officer with the rank of colonel holding a permanent appointment in the staff department in which the vacancy

exists, or of some other officer holding a permanent appointment in such staff department in which the vacancy exists, or in case there be no permanent staff officer with the rank of colonel in that department, or of a colonel of the line in case there be no officer holding a permanent appointment in such staff department. Such appointments shall be made by the President and be for a term of four years, and the officer so appointed shall be recommissioned in the grade to which appointed.

That prior to June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and eighteen, an officer holding a permanent appointment in any staff department may, upon his own application, with the approval of the President, be reappointed in the line of the Marine Corps in the grade and with the rank he would hold on the date of his reappointment if he had remained continuously in the line: Provided, That no officer holding a permanent appointment in any staff department shall be recommissioned in the line with the rank of colonel or lieutenant colonel: Provided further. That such staff officer shall, before being reappointed in the line of the Marine Corps as above provided, perform line duties for one year, at the expiration of which time he shall as a prerequisite to reappointment in the line be required to establish to the satisfaction of an examining board consisting of line officers of the Marine Corps his physical, mental, and professional fitness for the performance of line duty.

That for the purpose of advancement in rank to and including the grade of colonel, all commissioned officers of the line and staff of the Marine Corps shall be placed on a common list in the order of seniority each would hold had he remained continuously in the line. All advancements in rank to captain, major, lieutenant colonel, and colonel shall, subject to the usual examinations, be made from officers with the next junior respective rank, whether of the line or staff, in the order in which their

names appear on said list.

Appointees to the grade of second lieutenant, if ap-second lieutenant, twenty and twenty-five years, and before receiving a commission in the Marine Corps, each appointee shall establish to the satisfaction of the Secretary of the Navy his mental, physical, moral, and professional qualifica-tions for such commission: Provided, The President of the United States be, and hereby is, authorized, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to appoint as second lieutenants on the active list in the United States Marine Corps, to take rank at the foot of the list of second lieutenants as it stands at the date of reinstatement, former officers of the Marine Corps who resigned from the naval service in good standing: Provided, That they shall establish their moral, physical, mental, and professional qualifications to perform the duties of that grade to the satisfaction of the Secretary of the Navy:

his discretion, may waive the age limit in favor of the aforesaid former officers of the Marine Corps: Provided further, That the prior service of such officers and the service after reinstatement shall be not less than thirty Probationary years before the age of retirement. The President is hereby authorized, within two years after the approval of this Act, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to transfer to the active list of the Marine Corps or Navy Pay Corps any officer under fifty years of age who may have been transferred from the active list to the retired list of the Marine Corps or Navy Pay Corps by the action of any retiring board for physical disability incurred in the line of duty: Provided. That such officer shall be transferred to the place on the active list which he would have had if he had not

been retired, and shall be carried as an additional number in the grade to which he may be transferred or at any time thereafter promoted: Provided further, That such officer shall establish to the satisfaction of the Secretary of the Navy his mental, moral, professional, and physical qualifications to perform the duties on the active list of the grade to which he is transferred. The provisions of sections fourteen hundred and ninety-three and fourteen hundred and ninety-four of the Revised Statutes of the United States shall apply to the Marine

The Quartermaster's Department, United States Marine Corps, is authorized to sell such articles of uniform clothing as may be prescribed at cost price to the volunteer citizens who are designated to participate in these instructions: Provided, That these citizens shall be required to furnish at their own expense transportation and subsistence to and from these camps, and subsistence while undergoing training therein. The sum of \$31,000 is hereby appropriated to carry into effect the foregoing provisions.

### INCREASE OF THE NAVY.

For the purpose of further increasing the Naval Estab-Increase of the lishment of the United States, the President of the United States is hereby authorized to undertake prior to July first, nineteen hundred and nineteen, the construction of the vessels enumerated below:

Ten first-class battleships, carrying as heavy armor and Ten battle-as powerful armament as any vessels of their class, to have the highest practicable speed and greatest desirable radius of action; four of these at a cost, exclusive of armor and armament, not to exceed \$11,500,000 each, to be begun as soon as practicable.

Six hattle cruisers, carrying suitable armor and as six battle powerful armament as any vessels of their class, to have cruisers. the highest practicable speed and greatest desirable radius

of action; four of these to cost, exclusive of armor and armament, not to exceed \$16,500,000 each, to be begun as soon as practicable.

Ten scout

Ten scout cruisers, carrying suitable protection and armament suited to their size and type, to have the highest practicable speed and greatest desirable radius of action; four to cost, exclusive of armor and armament, not to exceed \$5,000,000 each, to be begun as soon as practicable.

Fifty torpedo-boat destroyers.

Fifty torpedo-boat destroyers, to have the highest practicable speed and greatest desirable radius of action; twenty to cost, exclusive of armor and armament, not to exceed \$1,200,000 each, to be begun as soon as practicable: Provided. That not less than four of these shall be built on the Pacific coast: Provided further, That the cost of construction on the Pacific coast does not exceed the cost of construction on the Atlantic coast, plus the cost of transportation from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

Nine fleet submarines.

Mine fleet submarines.

Fifty-eight coast submarines, of which number three coastsubmarines. to have a surface displacement of about eight hundred to coast exclusive of armor and armament, not to exceed \$1,200,000 each, and twenty-seven, which shall be the best and most desirable and useful type of submarine which can be procured at a cost, exclusive of armor and armament, not to exceed \$700,000 each, shall be begun as soon as practicable; and the sum of \$8,217,000 is hereby appropriated for the construction of said submarines, to be available until expended. Not less than twelve of the submarines herein authorized to be begun as soon as practicable shall be built on the Pacific coast: Provided, That the cost of construction on the Pacific coast does not exceed the cost of construction on the Atlantic coast, plus the cost of transportation from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

One submarine, equipped with the Neff system of submarine propulsion, exclusive of armor and armament, \$250,000: Provided, That the owners of the Neff system of submarine propulsion will construct, in accordance with drawings, plans, and specifications provided by them, one coast-defense submarine of about one hundred and fifty tons displacement when submerged, carrying armor and armament similar and equal to that of the "C" class of submarines, with fittings, equipment, machinery, devices, appliances, and appurtenances of every kind with latest improvements, complete in all respects, and suitable for naval purposes: Provided further, That the money appropriated for this purpose shall not be paid to the builders of said boat until the same has been completed, passed satisfactory service tests, and been accepted by the Secretary of the Navy; but upon such completion, tests, and acceptance by the Secretary of the Navy the sum appropriated shall be paid.

Total increase of the Navy heretofore and herein au-

thorized, \$139,345,287.

To provide for the speedy construction of the vessels herein authorized and for the additional cost incident thereto, including the employment of more than one shift of labor per day, overtime work, and the speedy delivery of material, the Secretary of the Navy in his discretion is hereby authorized to increase the total cost of each of said vessels, including armor and armament, not to exceed twenty per centum thereof if any of said vessels be constructed in Government navy yards; and if any of said vessels or the armor or armament for same be constructed by private contract, the Secretary of the Navy in his discretion is hereby authorized to prescribe in the contracts for same provisions for the payment of premiums over and above the contract price, not to exceed twenty per centum thereof, for the most expeditious delivery of same, and further provisions for penalties for delays and failure to complete within the contract time: Provided, That if, in the judgment of the Secretary of the Navy, the most rapid and economical construction of the battle cruisers authorized herein can be obtained thereby, he may contract for the construction of any or all of them upon the basis of actual cost, plus a reasonable profit to be determined by him. That each and every employee of the navy yards, gun factories, naval stations, and arsenals of the United States Government is hereby granted thirty days' leave of absence each year, without forfeiture of pay during such leave: Provided further, That it shall be lawful to allow pro rata leave only to those serving twelve consecutive months or

more: And provided further, That in all cases the heads of divisions shall have discretion as to the time when the leave can best be allowed: And provided further, That not more than thirty days' leave with pay shall be allowed any such employee in one year: Provided further, That this provision shall not be construed to deprive employees of any sick leave or legal holidays to which they may now be entitled under existing law.

Improve and equip navy yards.

The Secretary of the Navy is authorized to improve and equip the navy yards at Puget Sound, Philadelphia, Norfolk, New York, Boston, Portsmouth, Charleston, and New Orleans for the construction of such ships herein or as may be hereafter authorized as may be assigned to such yards for construction, and the sum of \$6,000,000. or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated for this purpose: Provided, That the Secretary of the Navy is authorized to equip the navy yards at Norfolk, Philadelphia, Boston, and Puget Sound for the construction of capital ships.

The Secretary of War and the Secretary of the Navy are authorized and directed to report to Congress at the

earliest practicable date:

First. Specific plans for improvement of the harbors and canals and connecting channels which, in their judgment, will best provide adequate facilities for operations of the fleet for defense of the harbors on the Atlantic. Gulf, and Pacific coasts of the United States.

Second. The feasible extensions requisite to make existing approved projects for improvement of the aforementioned harbors, canals, and channels available for

the purposes stated in the foregoing paragraph.

Third. The cost of each such several improvements calculated upon the basis of completion thereof under con-

tract within five years.

It is hereby declared to be the policy of the United States to adjust and settle its international disputes through mediation or arbitration, to the end that war may be honorably avoided. It looks with apprehension and disfavor upon a general increase of armament throughout the world, but it realizes that no single nation can disarm, and that without a common agreement upon the subject every considerable power must maintain a relative standing in military strength.

President to In view of the premises, the President is authorized ments to send and requested to invite, at an appropriate time, not later representatives than the close of the war in Europe, all the great Govern-to formulate than the close of the war in Europe, all the great Govern-plan of arbitraments of the world to send representatives to a conference tion in future. which shall be charged with the duty of formulating a plan for a court of arbitration or other tribunal, to which disputed questions between nations shall be referred for adjudication and peaceful settlement, and to consider the question of disarmament and submit their recommendation to their respective Governments for approval. President is hereby authorized to appoint nine citizens

of the United States, who, in his judgment, shall be qualified for the mission by eminence in the law and by devotion to the cause of peace, to be representatives of the United States in such a conference. The President shall fix the compensation of said representatives, and such secretaries and other employees as may be needed. hundred thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated and set aside and placed at the disposal of the President to carry into effect the provisions of this paragraph.

If at any time before the construction authorized by this Act shall have been contracted for there shall have been established, with the cooperation of the United States of America, an international tribunal or tribunals competent to secure peaceful determinations of all international disputes, and which shall render unnecessary the maintenance of competitive armaments, then and in that case such naval expenditures as may be inconsistent with the engagements made in the establishment of such tribunal or tribunals may be suspended, when so ordered by

the President of the United States.

That no part of any sum herein appropriated shall be expended for the purchase of structural steel, ship plates, armor, armament, or machinery from any persons, firms, or corporations who are parties to any existing combination or conspiracy to monopolize the interstate or foreign commerce or trade of the United States, or the commerce or trade between the United States and any Territory or the District of Columbia, in any of the articles aforesaid, and no purchase of structural steel, ship plates, or machinery shall be made at a price in excess of a reasonable profit above the actual cost of manufacture. But this limitation shall in no case apply to any existing contract.

AN ACT Making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and eighteen, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the following sums be, and they are hereby, appropriated, to be paid out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the naval service of the Government for the year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and eighteen, and for other purposes:

### PAY, MISCELLANEOUS.

The Secretary of the Navy shall send to Congress at the schedule of all beginning of its next regular session a complete schedule arces to be sent or list showing the amount of money of all pay and for all to Congress. allowances for each grade of officers in the Navy, including retired officers, and for all officers included in this Act

#### AVIATION.

AVIATION: For aviation, including not to exceed \$150,000 for the purchase of land, \* \* \$11,000,000

#### BUREAU OF NAVIGATION.

MAINTENANCE OF NAVAL AUXILIARIES: The sum appropriated for "Maintenance of Baval auxiliaries" in the naval Act approved March fourth, nineteen hundred and seventeen, shall be transferred to other appropriations as follows: "Transportation, Bureau of Navigation," \$11,-500; "Pay of the Navy," \$846,890, and "Provisions, Navy," \$286,000.

Schools or camps of instruction for recruits and Naval Reserve forces: For rental of necessary land and for providing quarters and the maintenance and equipment thereof, for assembling, training, and instructing recruits and reserves of all classes, including the crews of section patrols, harbor patrols, submarines and submarine chasers, and beach patrols, and for all purposes connected therewith, \$2,655,360.

# PUBLIC WORKS, BUREAU OF YARDS AND DOCKS.

Quarters for marine guards: For temporary quarters for marine guards at naval magazines, \$100,000.

Submarine facilities: For submarine facilities, navy

yards and stations, \$1,500,000.

Power plants and distributing systems: For improvements, central power plants and distributing systems, navy yards and stations, \$750,000.

Depots for coal and other fuel: Toward fuel-oil storage, including not to exceed \$100,000 for the purchase of land, \$1,500,000.

Ordnance storage: For storage of ammunition, mines,

torpedoes, and other ordnance material, \$3,000,000.

Naval operating base, Hampton Roads, Virginia: The President is hereby authorized and empowered to take over for the United States the immediate possession and title, including all easements, rights of way, riparian and other rights appurtenant thereto, and including all the rights and properties of railway, electric light, power, telephone, telegraph, water, and sewer companies, of the tract of land known as the Jamestown Exposition site, on Hampton Roads, Virginia, and of such lands adjacent thereto as lie north of Ninety-ninth Street and Algonquin Street, the entire property being bounded on the north and west by Hampton Roads and Willoughby Bay, on the east by Boush Creek, and on the south by Ninety-ninth and Algonquin Streets.

That if said lands and appurtenances and improvements thereof shall be taken over as aforesaid, the United States shall make just compensation therefor, to be determined by the President, and if the amount thereof, so determined by the President, is unsatisfactory to the person entitled to receive the same such person shall be paid seventy-five per centum of the amount so determined by the President and shall be entitled to sue the United States to recover such further sum, as added to said seventy-five per centum will make up such amount as will be just compensation therefor, in the manner provided for by section twenty-four, paragraph twenty, and section one hundred and forty-five of the Judicial Code.

Upon the taking over of said property by the President as aforesaid, the title to all property so taken over shall

immediately vest in the United States.

For the payment of compensation for said property so taken over, \$1,200,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary; and toward the equipment of the same as a naval operating base, including piers, store houses, oilfuel storage, training station and recreation grounds for the fleet and other purposes, \$1,600,000, in all, \$2,800,000: Provided, That the appropriation herein shall be available only for the acquisition of the entire property bounded on the north and west by Hampton Roads and Willoughby Bay, on the east by Boush Creek, and on the south by Ninety-ninth and Algonquin Streets, together with all easements, rights of way, riparian and other rights appurtenant thereto, and all the rights and properties of railway, electric light, power, telephone, telegraph, cable, water, and sewer companies: Provided further, That the Secretary of the Navy is authorized to expend public money in the development of said tract of land without reference to the requirements of section three hundred and fifty-five of the Revised Statutes.

Hospital construction: For temporary hospital construction, \$1,000,000; and for the establishment of naval medical supply depots at Brooklyn, New York, and Mare Island, California, by purchase or construction, \$350,000;

in all, \$1,350,000.

Naval magazine, Saint Juliens Creek, Virginia: The Secretary of the Navy is authorized to expend public money in the development of the tract of land to be added to the naval reservation at the naval ammunition depot, Saint Juliens Creek, Virginia, without reference to the requirements of section three hundred and fifty-five of the Revised Statutes, and the provision in the naval appropriation Act approved August twenty-ninth, nineteen hundred and sixteen (Thirty-ninth Statutes at Large, page five hundred and seventy), authorizing the purchase of additional land under the heading "Naval magazine, Saint Juliens Creek, Virginia," is hereby amended to read as follows: "For additional land, to be secured by purchase or condemnation or otherwise, as the Secretary of the Navy may direct, \$60,000."

Puget Sound, Washington, Navy Yard: The Secretary of the Navy is authorized to acquire by gift, purchase, or condemnation, easements over private land where necessary for the installation of a telephone, power and distant control line for the radio station at Keyport, Washington, between said station and the navy yard, Puget Sound, Washington, \$3,500, which sum is hereby appropriated.

#### BUREAU OF MEDICINE AND SURGERY.

HOSPITAL EXPENSES: For the care, maintenance, and treatment of patients in naval and in other than naval hospitals, and for the rental of land, \$3,000,000.

#### BUREAU OF SUPPLIES AND ACCOUNTS.

CLOTHING and SMALL-STORES FUND: For purchase of clothing and small-stores for issue to the naval service, to be added to the "Clothing and small-stores fund," \$9,571,000.

RESERVE MATERIAL, NAVY: For procuring apparatus and materials (other than ordnance materials and medical stores), as a war reserve necessary to be carried in the supply departments for the purpose of fitting out vessels of the fleet and merchant auxiliaries in time of war or when, in the opinion of the President, a national emergency exists, \$2,000,000: Provided, That, to prevent deterioration materials purchased under the reserve material Navy fund shall be used as required in time of peace, and when so used reimbursement shall be made to this appropriation from current naval appropriations in order that additional stocks may be procured.

#### BUREAU OF CONSTRUCTION AND REPAIR.

\* \* \* Provided, That the limitations imposed by existing law relative to repairs to vessels of the Navy shall not apply to the expenditure of funds made available in this Act \* \* \*.

#### BUREAU OF STEAM ENGINEERING.

The foregoing appropriations for the Naval Establishment shall be available for similar expenses of the Coast Guard and Lighthouse Services while cooperating with the Navy in so far as the regular appropriations for these services are insufficient therefor; and, when expenditures are thus made, naval appropriations need not be reimbursed from the appropriations of the Coast Guard and Lighthouse Services.

Buildings: For an addition to Isherwood Hall, \$300,000.

M. Shay Fertilizer Company, in the immediate vicinity of the property now owned and occupied by the United States as a submarine base at New London, Connecticut, including all easements, rights of way, riparian and other rights appurtenant thereto, \$90,000.

The President is hereby authorized and empowered, within the amount hereinbefore authorized, to acquire or provide facilities additional to those now in existence for

the construction of torpedo-boat destroyers, their hulls, machinery, and appurtenances, including the immediate taking over for the United States of the possession of and title to land, its appurtenances and improvements, which

he may find necessary in this connection.

That if said lands and appurtenances and improvements shall be taken over as aforesaid, the United States shall make just compensation therefor, to be determined by the President, and if the amount thereof, so determined by the President, is unsatisfactory to the person entitled to receive the same, such person shall be paid seventy-five per centum of the amount so determined by the President and shall be entitled to sue the United States to recover such further sum as added to said seventy-five per centum will make up such amount as will be just compensation therefor, in the manner provided for by section twenty-four, paragraph twenty, section one hundred and forty-five of the Judicial Code.

Upon the taking over of said property by the President as aforesaid the title to all property so taken over shall

immediately vest in the United States.

Midshipmen's store fund (reimbursable): The Secretary of the Navy is authorized to advance to the midshipmen's store fund at the Naval Academy the sum of \$50,000 under "General account of advances," said sum to be used for the purchase of stores and to be accounted for in the same manner as is provided for the midshipmen's store fund in the Act approved May thirteenth, nineteen hundred and eight, and to be repaid into the Treasury not later than December thirty-first, nineteen hundred and nineteen.

Upon the taking over of said property by the President as aforesaid, the title to all such property so taken over shall immediately vest in the United States. For the purposes of this Act there is hereby appropriated out of any money in the Treasury of the United States not otherwise appropriated the sum of \$1,000,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary: Provided, That no railroad shall be built in the District of Columbia under this Act, until Congress has approved the point from which such road may start and also the route to be followed in the District of Columbia.

That the authorized enlisted strength of the Marine Corps. active list of the Marine Corps is hereby temporarily strength tempomereased from seventeen thousand four hundred to rarily increased. thirty thousand, this authorized strength being distributed in the various grades of the enlisted force in the same proportion as those authorized at the date of the approval of this Act.

AN ACT To reorganize and increase the efficiency of the personnel of the Navy and Marine Corps of the United States.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the officers constituting the Engineer Corps of the Engineer Corps Navy be, and are hereby, transferred to the line of the line. Navy, and shall be commissioned accordingly.

<sup>1</sup> [Officers for engineering duty only. [On and after June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and twenty, no captain, commander, or lieutenant commander shall be promoted unless he has had not less than two years' actual sea service on sea-going ships in the grade in which serving or who is more than fifty-six, fifty, or forty-five years of age, respectively: Provided, That in exceptional cases where officers are specifically designated during the war or national emergency declared by the President by the Secretary of the Navy as performing, or as having performed, such highly important duties on shore that their services can not be or could not have been spared from such assignment without serious prejudice to the successful prosecution of the war, the qualification of sea service in the cases of those officers so specifically designated shall not apply while the United States is at war, or during a national emergency declared by the President, or within two and one-half years subsequent to the ending of such war or national emergency: *Provided*, That the qualification of sea service shall not apply to officers restricted to the performance of engineering duty only.—Acts August 29, 1916, July 1, 1918.]

[Promotion of staff officers by selection.—The provisions of existing laws with reference to promotion by selection in the line of the Navy are hereby extended to include and authorize advancement to the ranks of commander, captain, and rear admiral in the Staff Corps of the Navy under the same conditions in all respects except as may be necessary to adapt the said provisions to such Staff Corps: Provided, That boards of selection shall in each case be composed, when practicable, of not less than five members of the corps concerned and promotions shall be made on the basis of fitness alone by selection from among the officers of the rank next below: Provided further, That the requirements for sea service in grade, length of service in grade and maximum age in grade for promotion shall not

apply.—Act July 1, 1918.]

[Number and rank of staff officers.—The total authorized number of commissioned officers of the active list of the following staff corps, exclusive of commissioned warrant officers, shall be based on percentages of the total number of commissioned officers of the active

list of the line of the Navy as follows:

[Pay Corps, twelve per centum; Construction Corps, five per centum; Corps of Civil Engineers, two percentum; and that the total authorized number of commissioned officers of the Medical Corps shall be sixty-five one hundredths of one per centum of the total authorized number of the officers and enlisted men of the

Navy and Marine Corps, including midshipmen, Hospital Corps, prisoners undergoing sentence of discharge, enlisted men detailed for duty with the Naval Militia, and the Flying Corps. \* \* \*

and the Flying Corps.

The total number of commissioned officers of the active list of the following mentioned staff corps at any one time, exclusive of commissioned warrant officers, shall be distributed in the various grades of the respec-

tive corps as follows:

Medical Corps: One-half medical directors with the rank of rear admiral to four medical directors with the rank of captain, to eight medical inspectors with rank of commander, to eighty-seven and one-half in the grades below medical inspector: Provided, That hereafter appointees to the grade of assistant surgeon shall be between the ages of twenty-one and thirty-two at the time of appointment.

Pay Corps: One-half pay directors with the rank of rear admiral to four pay directors with the rank of captain, to eight pay inspectors with the rank of commander, to eighty-seven and one-half in the grades below pay

inspector.

Construction Corps: One-half naval constructors with the rank of rear admiral to eight and one-half naval constructors with the rank of captain, to fourteen naval constructors with the rank of commander, to seventy-seven naval constructors and assistant naval constructors with rank below commander: Provided, That vacancies in the Construction Corps shall be filled in the manner now prescribed by law, at such annual rate as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe: Provided further, That hereafter ensigns of not less than one year's service as such shall be eligible for transfer to the Construction Corps.

[Corps of Civil Engineers: One-half civil engineers with the rank of rear admiral to five and one-half civil engineers with the rank of captain, to fourteen civil engineers with the rank of commander, to eighty civil enengineers and assistant civil engineers with the rank below

commander.

[Hereafter no further appointments shall be made to the Corps of Professors of Mathematics, and that corps shall cease to exist upon the death, resignation, or dismissal of the officers now carried in that corps on the \* \* \* active and retired list of the Navy. That officers shall take rank in each staff corps according to the dates of commission in the several grades, excepting in cases where they have gained or lost numbers.

[Hereafter the authorized number of surgeons in the United States Navy be, and it is hereby, increased by one; and that hereafter the Secretary of the Navy be, and he is hereby, authorized to detail one or more officers of the Medical Corps of the United States Navy for duty

with the Military Relief Division of the American Na-

tional Red Cross.—Act August 29, 1916.]

[That nothing contained in the Act of August twentyninth, nineteen hundred and sixteen, shall operate to disturb the relative position of officers in the Medical Corps with reference to precedence or promotion, but all such officers otherwise qualified shall be advanced in rank with or ahead of officers in said corps who were their juniors on the date of said Act.—Act May 22, 1917.]

CORPS OF CHAPLAINS.—The grade of acting chaplain in the Navy is hereby authorized and created, and hereafter original appointments shall be made by the Secretary of the Navy, not to exceed the number hereinafter provided, in the grade of acting chaplains in the Navy after such examination as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy, and while so serving acting chaplains shall have the rank, pay, and allowances of lieutenant, junior grade, in the Navy. After three years' sea service on board ship each acting chaplain before receiving a commission in the Navy shall establish to the satisfaction the Secretary of the Navy by examination by a board of chaplains and medical officers of the Navy his physical, mental, moral, and professional fitness to perform the duties of chaplain in the Navy, and if found so qualified. shall be commissioned a chaplain in the Navy with the rank of lieutenant, junior grade. If any acting chaplain shall fail on the examinations herein prescribed he shall be honorably discharged from the naval service, and the appointment of any acting chaplain may be revoked at any time in the discretion of the Secretary of the Navy.

[Hereafter the total number of chaplains and acting chaplains in the Navy shall be one to each twelve hundred and fifty of the total personnel of the Navy and Marine Corps as fixed by law, including midshipmen, apprentice seamen, and naval prisoners, and of the total number of chaplains and acting chaplains herein authorized ten per centum thereof shall have the rank of captain in the Navy, twenty per centum the rank of lieutenant commander, twenty per centum the rank of lieutenants and lieutenants,

junior grade.

[Naval chaplains hereafter commissioned from acting chaplains shall have the rank, pay, and allowances of lieutenants, junior grade, in the Navy until they shall have completed four years' service in that grade, when, subject to examination as above prescribed, they shall have the rank, pay, and allowances of lieutenant in the Navy, and chaplains with the rank of lieutenant shall have at least four years' service in that grade before promotion to the grade of lieutenant commander, after which service, chaplains shall be promoted as vacancies occur to the grades of lieutenant commander, commander, and captain: *Provided*, That not more than seven acting chap-

lains shall be commissioned chaplains in any one year: And provided further, That no provision of this section shall operate to reduce the rank, pay, or allowances that would have been received by any person in the Navy except for the passage of this section, and that all laws or parts of laws inconsistent with the provisions of this section be, and the same are hereby, repealed.—Act June 30, 1916.]

[Naval Dental Corps.—That the Act approved August twenty-ninth, nineteen hundred and sixteen, entitled "An Act making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and seventeen, and for other purposes" (Statutes at Large, volume thirty-nine, chapter four hundred and seventeen, pages five hundred and seventy-three and five hundred and seventy-four), be, and the same is hereby, amended by striking out all of said Act following the caption "Naval Dental Corps" on page five hundred and seventy-three, but preceding the caption "Dental Reserve Corps", on page five hundred and seventy-four.

and by substituting therefor the following:

["That the President of the United States is hereby authorized to appoint and commission, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, dental officers in the Navy at the rate of one for each thousand of the total authorized number of officers and enlisted men of the Navy and Marine Corps, in the grades of assistant dental surgeon, passed assistant dental surgeon and dental surgeon, who shall constitute the Naval Dental Corps, and shall be a part of the Medical Department of the Navy. Original appointments to the Naval Dental Corps shall be made in the grade of assistant dental surgeon with the rank of lieutenant (junior grade), and all dental officers now in the Dental Corps appointed under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved August twenty-second, nineteen hundred and twelve (Statutes at Large, volume thirty-seven, page three hundred and forty-five), or under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved August twenty-ninth, nineteen hundred and sixteen (Statutes at Large, volume thirty-nine, page five hundred and seventythree), or who may hereafter be appointed, shall take rank and precedence with officers of the Naval Medical Corps of the same rank according to the dates of their respective commissions or original appointments, and all such dental officers shall be eligible for advancement in grade and rank in the same manner and under the same conditions as officers of the Naval Medical Corps with or next after whom they take precedence, and shall receive the same pay and allowances as officers of corresponding rank and length of service in the Naval Medical Corps up to and including the rank of lieutenant commander: Provided, That dental surgeons shall be eligible for advancement in pay and allowances, but not in rank, to and including the pay and allowances of commander and captain, subject to such examinations as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe, except that the number of dental surgeons with the pay and allowances of captain shall not exceed four and one-half per centum and the number of dental surgeons with the pay and allowances of commander shall not exceed eight per centum of the total authorized number of dental officers: Provided further, That dental surgeons shall be eligible for advancement to the pay and allowances of commander and captain when their total active service as dental officers in the Navy is such that if rendered as officers of the Naval Medical Corps, it would place them in the list of medical officers with the pay and allowances of commander or captain, as the case may be: And provided further, That dental officers who shall have gained or lost numbers on the Navy list shall be considered to have gained or lost service accordingly; and the time served by dental officers on active duty as acting assistant dental surgeons and assistant dental surgeons under provisions of law existing prior to the passage of this Act shall be reckoned in computing the increased service pay and service for precedence and promotion of dental officers herein authorized or heretofore appointed.

["All appointees authorized by this Act shall be citizens of the United States between twenty-one and thirty-two years of age, and shall be graduates of standard medical or dental colleges and trained in the several branches of dentistry, and shall, before appointment, have successfully passed mental, moral, physical, and professional examinations before medical and professional examining boards appointed by the Secretary of the Navy, and have been recommended for appointment by such boards: Provided, That hereafter no person shall be appointed as assistant dental surgeon in the Navy who is not a graduate of a standard medical or dental college.

["Officers of the Naval Dental Corps shall become eligible for retirement in the same manner and under the same conditions as now prescribed by law for officers of the Naval Medical Corps, except that section fourteen hundred and forty-five of the Revised Statutes of the United States shall not be applicable to dental officers, and they shall not be entitled to rank above lieutenant commander on the retired list, or to retired pay above that of captain.

["All dental officers now serving under probationary appointments shall become immediately eligible for permanent appointment under the provisions of this Act, subject to the examinations prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy for original appointment as dental officers, and may be appointed assistant dental surgeon with the rank of lieutenant (junior grade) to rank from the date of their probationary appointments: *Provided*, That the senior dental officer now at the United States Naval Academy shall not be displaced by the provisions of this Act, and he shall hereafter have the grade of dental sur-

geon and the rank, pay, and allowances of lieutenant commander, and he shall not be eligible for retirement before he has reached the age of seventy years, except for physical disability incurred in the line of duty: Provided further, That no dental officer in the Navy who on original appointment as dental officer was over forty years of age shall be eligible for retirement before he has reached the age of seventy years, except for physical disability incurred in line of duty.

["All Acts or parts of Acts inconsistent with the provisions of this Act relating to the Dental Corps of the Navy are hereby repealed: *Provided*, That nothing herein contained shall be construed to legislate out of the service any officer now in the Medical Department of the Navy or to reduce the rank, pay, or allowances now authorized by law for any officer of the Navy."—Act July 1, 1918.]

[Naval Flying Corps shall be composed of one hundred and fifty officers and three hundred and fifty enlisted men, detailed, appointed, commissioned, enlisted, and distributed in the various grades, ranks, and ratings of the Navy and Marine Corps as hereafter provided. The said number of officers, student flyers, and enlisted men shall be in addition to the total number of officers and enlisted men which is now or may hereafter be provided by law for the other branches of the naval service.

[The number of officers detailed to duty in aircraft involving actual flying in any one year shall be in accordance with the requirements of the Air Service as determined by the Secretary of the Navy: Provided, That the officers so detailed from the line of the Navy and from the Marine Corps shall not exceed the total number herein prescribed for the Naval Flying Corps: Provided further, That the proportion of line officers of the Navy and of the Marine Corps thus detailed shall be the same as the proportion established for the regular services: And provided further, That the student flyers hereinafter provided for shall be in addition to the officers and enlisted men comprising he Naval Flying Corps.

[The officers detailed and the enlisted men of the Naval Flying Corps shall receive the same pay and allowances that are now provided by law for officers and enlisted men of the same grade or rank and rating in the Navy and Marine Corps detailed to duty with aircraft involv-

ing actual flying.

[The Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to appoint annually in the line of the Navy and the Marine Corps for a period of two years following the passage of this Act, in order of merit as determined by such competitive examinations as he may prescribe, fifteen acting ensigns or acting second lieutenants for the performance of aeronautic duties only. Persons so appointed must be citizens of the United States, and may be appointed from warrant officers or enlisted men of the naval service

or from civil life, and must, at the time of appointment, be not less than eighteen or more than twenty-four years of age: Provided, That no person shall be so appointed until he has been found physically qualified by a board of medical officers of the Navy for the performance of the duties required: Provided further, That the number of such appointments to the line of the Navy and of the Marine Corps shall be in the proportion decided for the regular services. Such appointments shall be for a probationary period of three years and may be revoked at any time by the Secretary of the Navy.

[Such acting ensigns and acting second lieutenants shall be detailed to duty in the Naval Flying Corps in

aircraft involving actual flying.

[Such acting ensigns of the Navy and acting second lieutenants of the Marine Corps shall, upon completion of the probationary period of three years, be appointed acting lieutenants of the junior grade, or acting first lieutenants, respectively, by the Secretary of the Navy for the performance of aeronautic duties only after satisfactorily passing such examinations as he may prescribe, and after having been recommended for promotion by the examining board and found physically qualified by a board of medical officers of the Navy. Such appointments shall be for a probationary period of four years and may be revoked at any time by the Secretary of the Navy.

[Such acting lieutenants (junior grade) and acting first lieutenants may elect to qualify for aeronautic duty only or to qualify for all the duties of officers of the same grade in the Navy and in the Marine Corps, respectively. Those officers who elect to qualify for aeronautic duty only shall be detailed to duty in the Naval Flying Corps involving actualy flying in aircraft. Those officers who elect to qualify for the regular duties of their grade shall be detailed to duty in the regular service for at least two years to allow them to prepare for such qualifi-

cation.

[Such acting lieutenants (junior grade) and acting first lieutenants who have elected to qualify for aeronautic duty only shall, upon completion of the probationary period of four years, be commissioned in the grade of lieutenant of the line of the Navy or captain of the Marine Corps for aeronautic duties only, after satisfactorily passing such competitive examination as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy to determine their moral, physical, and professional qualifications for such commissions and the order of rank in which they shall be commissioned. Such lieutenants for aeronautic duty only shall be borne on the list as extra numbers, taking rank with and next after officers of the same date commission.

[Such acting lieutenants (junior grade) and acting first lieutenants who have elected to qualify for the regular duties of the line of the Navy and of the Marine Corps, respectively, shall, upon completion of the probationary period of four years, two years of which shall have been on such regular duties, be commissioned in the grade of the line of the Navy or Marine Corps according to his length of service, after passing satisfactorily such competitive examinations as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy to determine their moral, physical, and professional qualifications for such commissions and to determine the order of rank in which they shall be commissioned. Such officers of the line of the Navy and Marine Corps will be borne upon the lists of their respective corps as extra numbers, taking rank with and next after officers of the regular services of the same date of commissions.

[Acting lieutenants (junior grade) of the line of the Navy for aeronautic duties only and acting first lieutenants of the Marine Corps for aeronautic duty only who have completed the probationary period of four years may, upon examination for commissions to the next higher grade, if recommended by the board of examination, be transferred to the Naval Reserve Flying Corps and commissioned in the same grade or the next higher grade as may be recommended in accordance with their qualifications as determined by the examination: Provided, That at any time during such probationary period any such officer can, upon his own request, if his record warrants it, be transferred to the Naval Reserve Flying Corps and commissioned in the acting grade he then holds. Any officer of the Naval Flying Corps holding an appointment of student flyer or acting ensign, second lieutenant, lieutenant (junior grade), or first lieutenant, who, upon examination for promotion, is found not qualified shall, if not recommended by the examining board for transfer to the Naval Reserve Flying Corps, be honorably discharged from the naval service.

[Officers commissioned for aeronautic duty only shall be eligible for advancement to the higher grades, not above captain in the Navy or colonel in the Marine Corps, in the same manner as other officers whose employment is not so restricted, except that they shall be eligible to promotion without restriction as to sea duty, and their professional examinations shall be restricted to the duty to which personally assigned: *Provided*, That any such officer must serve at least three years in any grade before being eligible to promotion to the next higher grade.

[Nothing in this Act shall be so construed as to prevent the detail of officers and enlisted men of other branches of the Navy as student aviators or student airmen in such numbers as the needs of the service may require.

[Such officers and enlisted men, while detailed as student aviators and student airmen involving actually flying in aircraft, shall receive the same pay and allowances that are now provided by law for officers and enlisted men of the same grade or rank and rating in the

Navy detailed for duty with aircraft.


[The Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to appoint annually for a period of four years, from enlisted men of the naval service, or from citizens of the United States in civil life, not to exceed thirty student flyers for instruction and training in aeronautices who shall receive the same pay and allowances as midshipmen at the United States Naval Academy: Provided, That persons so appointed must, at the time of appointment, be not less than seventeen or more than twenty-one years of age: Provided further, That no person shall be appointed a student flyer until he shall have qualified therefor by such examination as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy.

[The appointment of student flyers shall continue in force for two years, unless sooner revoked by the Secretary of the Navy, in his discretion, and at the end of such period student flyers shall be examined for qualification as qualified aviators: *Provided*, That if such student flyers are not qualified, their appointment will be revoked, or, if recommended by the examining board, they shall be transferred to the Naval Reserve Flying

Corps and commissioned as ensigns therein.

[Student flyers shall, after receiving a certificate of qualification as an aviator for actual flying in aircraft, rank with midshipmen, and shall receive the same pay and allowances as midshipmen, plus fifty per centum thereof: Provided, That student flyers who have qualified as aviators under the provisions of the Act shall be commissioned acting ensigns for aeronautic duties only, after three years' service: Provided further, That they shall have been examined by a board of officers of the Naval Flying Corps to determine by a competitive examination prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy their moral, physical, and professional fitness and the order of rank in which they shall be commissioned: And provided further, That any student flyer qualified as an aviator may at any time, in the discretion of the Secretary of the Navy, if his record warrants it, at his own request, be transferred to the Naval Reserve Flying Corps and be commissioned as ensign therein: And provided further, That student flyers not considered qualified for commissions as acting ensigns for aeronautic duties only may, upon recommendation of the examining board, be transferred to the Naval Reserve Flying Corps and be commissioned as ensigns therein.

[The Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to establish aeronautic schools for the instruction and training of student flyers and prescribe the course of instruc-



tion and qualifications for certificate of graduation as a

qualified aviator.

[Nothing in this or any other Act shall be so construed as to prevent the temporary detail of officers and enlisted men of any branch of the Navy for duty with aircraft.

In the event of the death of an officer or enlisted man. or student flyer of the Naval Flying Corps from wounds or disease, the result of an aviation accident, not the result of his own misconduct, received while engaged in actual flying in or in handling aircraft, the gratuity to be paid under the provisions of the Act approved August twenty-second, nineteen hundred and twelve, entitled "An Act making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and thirteen, and for other purposes," shall be an amount equal to one year's pay at the rate received by such officer or enlisted man or student flyer at the time of the accident resulting in his death. In all cases where an officer or enlisted man or student flyer of the Navy or Marine Corps dies, or where a student flyer or an enlisted man of the Navy or Marine Corps is disabled by reason of any injury received or disease contracted in line of duty, the result of an aviation accident, received while employed in actual flying in or in handling aircraft, the amount of pension allowed shall be double that authorized to be paid should death or the disability have occurred by reason of an injury received or disease contracted in line of duty not the result of an aviation accident.

[Student flyers and the acting ensigns and acting lieutenants (junior grade) and acting second and first lieutenants for aeronautic duties only provided for herein shall be subject to the laws and regulations and orders for the government of the Navy, but shall not be

entitled to retirement or retired pay.

[The enlisted personnel of the Naval Flying Corps shall be distributed by the Secretary of the Navy in the various ratings as now obtain in the Navy in so far as such ratings are applicable to duties connected with

aircraft.

[Within the first two years after the approval of this Act enlisted men may be transferred from other branches of the Naval Service to the Naval Flying Corps, under regulations established by the Secretary of the Navy governing such transfer and the qualifications for this corps: *Provided*, That the number so transferred shall not exceed one-half the total number of enlisted men allowed by this Act.

[The Secretary of the Navy shall establish regulations governing the term of enlistment, the qualifications, and advancement of the enlisted men of the Flying Corps.

[Any enlisted man who passes satisfactorily the prescribed examination and is recommended by a board of officers may be appointed a student flyer as herein pro-

vided.—Act August 29, 1916.]

[Hospital Corps.—Hereafter the authorized strength of the Hospital Corps of the Navy shall equal three and one-half per centum of the authorized enlisted strength of the Navy and Marine Corps, and shall be in addition thereto, and as soon as the necessary transfers or appointments may be effected the Hospital Corps of the United States Navy shall consist of the following grades and ratings: Chief pharmacists, pharmacists, and enlisted men classified as chief pharmacists' mates; pharmacists' mates, first class; pharmacists' mates, second class; pharmacists' mates, third class; hospital apprentices, first class; and hospital apprentices, second class; such classifications in enlisted ratings to correspond respectively to the enlisted ratings, seamen branch, of chief petty officers; petty officers, first class; petty officers, second class; petty officers, third class; seamen, first class; and seamen, second class: Provided, That enlisted men of other ratings in the Navy and in the Marine Corps shall be eligible for transfer to the Hospital Corps, and men of that corps to other ratings in the Navy and the Marine Corps.

[The President may hereafter, from time to time, appoint as many pharmacists as may be deemed necessary, from the rating of chief pharmacist's mate, subject to such moral, physical, and professional examinations and requirements as to length of service as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe: Provided, That the pharmacists now in the Hospital Corps of the United States Navy or hereafter appointed therein in accordance with the provisions of this Act shall have the same rank, pay, and allowances as are now or may hereafter be allowed

other warrant officers.

[Pharmacists shall, after six years from the date of warrant, be commissioned chief pharmacists after passing satisfactorily such examinations as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe, and shall, when so commissioned, have the same rank, pay, and allowances as now or may hereafter be allowed other commissioned warrant officers: Provided, That the pharmacists at present in the service who have served or may hereafter serve six or more years in that grade shall be eligible for promotion to the grade of chief pharmacist upon satisfactorily passing the examinations provided for in this Act.

[The Secretary of the Navy is hereby empowered to

limit and fix the numbers in the various ratings.

[Section three of an Act entitled "An Act to organize a Hospital Corps of the Navy of the United States; to define its duties and regulate its pay," approved June seventeenth, eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, be, and the same is hereby, repealed, and the pay, allowances, and emoluments of the enlisted men of the Hospital Corps shall be the same as are now, or may hereafter be,

allowed for respective corresponding ratings, except the rating of turret captain of the first class in the seaman branch of the Navy: *Provided*, That the pay of the rating of the chief pharmacist's mate shall be the same as that now allowed for the existing rating of hospital steward.

[Hospital and ambulance service with such commands and at such places as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy, shall be performed by members of said corps, and the corps shall be a constituent part of the Medical Department of the Navy; and the enlisted men thereof shall be a part of the enlisted force provided by law for

the Navy.

[Officers and enlisted men of the Medical Department of the Navy, serving with a body of marines detached for service with the Army in accordance with the provisions of section sixteen hundred and twenty-one of the Revised Statutes, shall, while so serving, be subject to the rules and articles of war prescribed for the government of the Army in the same manner as the officers and men of the Marine Corps while so serving.—Act August 29, 1916.]
[Medical Reserve Corps.—That a Medical Reserve

[MEDICAL RESERVE CORPS.—That a Medical Reserve Corps, to be a constituent part of the Medical Department of the Navy, is hereby established under the same provisions, in all respects (except as may be necessary to adapt the said provisions to the Navy), as those providing a Medical Reserve Corps for the Army, and as set forth in the act to increase the efficiency of the Medical Department of the United States Army, approved April twenty-third, nineteen hundred and eight.—Act

August 22, 1912.]

[Dental Reserve Corps.—That a Navy Dental Reserve Corps is hereby authorized to be organized and operated under the provisions of the Act approved August twenty-second, nineteen hundred and twelve, providing for the organization and operation of a Navy Medical Reserve Corps, and differing therefrom in no respect other than that the qualification requirements of the appointees shall be dental surgeons and graduates of reputable schools of medicine or dentistry instead of "reputable schools of medicine," and so many of said appointees may be ordered to temporary active service as the Secretary of the Navy may deem necessary to the health and efficiency of the personnel of the Navy and Marine Corps, provided the whole number of both Naval Dental Corps and Naval Dental Reserve Corps officers in active service shall not exceed in time of peace one to one thousand of the officers and enlisted men of the Navy and Marine Corps: Provided, That all officers now in the Navy Dental Reserve Corps shall be recommissioned in the Navy Dental Reserve Corps provided in this Act, in the order of their original appointment in said Corps, and hereafter when ordered to active duty officers of the Medical Reserve Corps and officers of the Dental Reserve Corps shall receive promotion in rank in the respective Reserve Corps under the same relative conditions and provisions of active service as is provided in this Act for the Naval

Dental Corps.—Act August 29, 1916.]

[Rules for computing number of staff officers.—That to determine the authorized number of officers in the various grades and ranks of the line and of the staff corps as herein provided, computations shall be made by the Secretary of the Navy semiannually, as of July first and January first of each year, and the resulting numbers in the various grades and ranks, as so computed, shall be held and considered for all purposes as the authorized number of officers in such various grades and ranks and shall not be varied between such dates. \* \* \*

[When there is an odd number of officers in the grade or rank of rear admiral in the line or in each corps, the lower division thereof shall include the excess in number,

except where there is but one.

[Whenever a final fraction occurs in computing the authorized number of any corps, grade or rank in the naval service, the nearest whole number shall be regarded as the authorized number: *Provided*, That at least one

officer shall be allowed in each grade or rank.

[For the purpose of determining the authorized number of officers in any grade or rank of the line or of the staff corps, there shall be excluded from consideration those officers carried by law as additional numbers, including staff officers heretofore permanently commissioned with the rank of rear admiral, and nothing contained herein shall be held to reduce below that heretofore authorized by law the number of officers in any grade or rank in the staff corps.—Act August 29, 1916.]

[ADVANCEMENT IN RANK OF STAFF OFFICERS.—Officers of the lower grades of the Medical Corps, Pay Corps, Construction Corps, and Corps of Civil Engineers shall be advanced in rank up to and including the rank of lieutenant commander with the officers of the line with whom or next after whom they take precedence under existing law: Provided, That all assistant surgeons shall from date of their original appointment take rank and precedence with lieutenants (junior grade).—Act August 29, 1916.]

[Hereafter all laws relating to the examination of officers of the Navy for promotion shall be construed to apply to the regular advancement of staff officers to higher ranks on the active list, the same as though such advancements in rank were promotions to higher grades: Provided, That nothing in this paragraph shall be construed as in any way affecting the original appointment of officers to the Dental Corps as provided in the Act approved August twenty-ninth, nineteen hundred and sixteen, making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and seventeen, and for other purposes, and the time

served by dental surgeons as acting or acting assistant dental surgeons shall be reckoned in computing the increased service pay and service for promotion of such as are commissioned under said Act.—Act March 4,

1917.]

[That hereafter all laws relating to the examination of officers of the Navy for promotion shall be construed to apply to the regular advancement of staff officers to higher ranks on the active list the same as though such advancements in rank were promotions to higher grades: Provided, That examinations for such staff officers shall not be required except for such regular advancements in rank: Provided further, That the President be, and he is hereby, authorized to direct the Secretary of the Navy to take such action on the records of proceedings of naval examining boards and boards of naval surgeons for the promotion of officers of the Navy as is now required by law to be taken by the President.—Act May 22, 1917.]

RETIREMENT OF LINE AND STAFF OFFICERS.—When an officer of the Navy has been thirty years in the service, he may, upon his own application, in the discretion of the President, be retired from active service and placed upon the retired list with three-fourths of the highest

pay of his grade.—Act May 13, 1908.]

[Same.—That captains, commanders, and lieutenant commanders who become ineligible for promotion on account of age shall be retired on a percentage of pay equal to two and one-half per centum of their shore-duty pay for each year of service: Provided further, That the total retired pay shall not exceed seventy-five per centum of the shore-duty pay they were entitled to receive while on the active list.

[Except as herein otherwise provided, hereafter the age of retirement of all officers of the Navy shall be sixtyfour years instead of sixty-two years as now prescribed

by law.—Act August 29, 1916.]

[SAME—RETIREMENT WITH INCREASED RANK.—Hereafter, if any officer of the United States Navy shall fail in his physical examination for promotion and be found incapacitated for service by reason of physical disability contracted in the line of duty, he shall be retired with the rank to which his seniority entitled him to be

promoted.—Act March 4, 1911.]

[Same—Retirement of officers selected shall prior to promotion be subject in all respects to the examinations prescribed by law for officers promoted by seniority, and in case of failure to pass the required professional examination such officer shall thereafter be ineligible for selection and promotion. And should any such officer fail to pass the required physical examination he shall not be considered, in the event of retirement, entitled to the rank of the next higher grade.—Act August 29, 1916.]

SAME—Active duty.—Hereafter any naval officer on the retired list may, with his consent, in the discretion of the Secretary of the Navy, be ordered to such duty as he may be able to perform at sea or on shore, and while so employed in time of peace shall receive the pay and allowances of an officer of the active list of the same rank: Provided, That no such retired officer so employed on active duty shall receive in time of peace, any greater pay and allowances than the pay and allowances which are now or may hereafter be provided by law for a lieutenant senior grade on the active list of like length of service: And provided further, That any such officer whose retired pay exceeds the highest pay and allowances of the grade of lieutenant senior grade, shall, while so employed in time of peace, receive his retired pay only, in lieu of all other pay and allowances.—Act August 22, 1912.]

[Same.—No officer who, after having commanded a fleet in active commission, has been retired for age and whom, in the judgment of the Secretary of the Navy, the public interests make it necessary to retain for a time after said retirement and who is performing active duty as chairman of the executive committee of the General Board, shall, for the period so retained, suffer any reduction in the emoluments he was receiving at the time of his retirement: Provided, That hereafter any retired officer of the naval service who shall be detailed on active duty shall, while so serving, receive the active duty pay and allowances of the grade, not above that of lieutenant commander in the Navy or of major in the Marine Corps, that he would have attained in due course of promotion if he had remained on the active list for a period beyond the date of his retirement equal to the total amount of time during which he has been detailed on active duty since his retirement: Provided, That nothing herein shall be construed to reduce the pay of any retired officer on active duty whose retired pay exceeds the active duty pay and allowances for the grade of lieutenant commander.—Act August 29, 1916.]

[RESTORATION TO ACTIVE LIST OF RETIRED OFFICERS.—

See note to section 9.]

[PAY AND ALLOWANCES OF BEAR ADMIRALS.—Hereafter pay and allowances of officers in the upper half of the grade or rank of rear admiral, including the staff corps and including staff officers heretofore permanently commissioned with the rank of rear admiral, shall be that now allowed by law for the first nine rear admirals, and the pay and allowances of officers in the lower half of the grade or rank of rear admiral, including the staff corps, shall be that now allowed by law for the second nine rear admirals.—Act August 29, 1916.]

[PROMOTION OF LIEUTENANTS (JUNIOR GRADE).—That lieutenants (junior grade) shall have had not less than three years' service in that grade before being eligible for

promotion to the grade of lieutenant.—Act August 29,

1916.1

[Pay and retirement of chiefs of bureaus in the Navy Department shall be the highest pay of the grade to which they belong, and not below that of rear admiral of the lower nine, \* \* \* That any officer of the Navy who is now serving or shall hereafter serve as chief of a bureau in the Navy Department, and shall subsequently be retired, shall be retired with the rank, pay, and allowances authorized by law for the retirement of such

bureau chief.—Act May 13, 1908.]

[Same.—The pay and allowances of chiefs of bureaus of the Navy Department shall be the highest shore-duty pay and allowances of the rear admiral of the lower nine; and all officers of the Navy who are now serving or shall hereafter serve as chief of bureau in the Navy Department and are eligible for retirement after thirty years' service, shall have, while on the active list, the rank, title, and emoluments of a chief of bureau, in the same manner as is already provided by statute law for such officers upon retirement by reason of age or length of service, and such officers, after thirty years' service, shall be entitled to and shall receive new commissions in accordance with the rank and title hereby conferred.—Act June 24, 1910.]

[Same.—That the portion of the act entitled "An act making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and eleven, and for other purposes," approved June twenty-fourth, nineteen hundred and ten, which reads as follows:

["The pay and allowances of chiefs of bureaus of the Navy Department shall be the highest shore-duty pay and allowances of the rear admiral of the lower nine, and all officers of the Navy who are now serving or who shall hereafter serve as chief of bureau in the Navy Department, and are eligible for retirement after thirty years' service, shall have, while on the active list, the rank, title, and emoluments of a chief of bureau, in the same manner as is already provided by statute law for such officers upon retirement by reason of age or length of service, and such officers, after thirty years' service, shall be entitled to and shall receive new commissions in accordance with the rank and title hereby conferred," be, and the same is hereby, repealed: Provided, That no officer who has received his commission under the provisions of said act shall be deprived of said commission or the rank, title, and emoluments thereof by virtue of this repeal."—Act August 22, 1912.]

[Same.—And hereafter chiefs of bureaus of the Navy Department, including the Judge Advocate General of the Navy, shall, while so serving, have corresponding rank and shall receive the same pay and allowances as are now or may hereafter be prescribed by or in pursu-

ance of law for chiefs of bureaus of the War Department and the Judge Advocate General of the Army.—Act July

1, 1918.]

[LINE OFFICERS DETAILED UNDER STAFF OFFICERS.— That line officers may be detailed for duty under staff officers in the manufacturing and repair departments of the navy-yards and naval stations, and all laws or parts of laws in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.—Act June 24, 1910.]

[Precedence, Naval Reserve officers.—That when on active duty officers of the Naval Reserve Force shall take precedence among themselves and with other officers of the naval service in their respective grades or ranks according to the dates of their commissions or provisional assignment of rank in the Naval Reserve Force: Provided, That all officers of the Naval Reserve Force of and above the rank of lieutenant commander shall rank with but after officers of the same rank or grade in the United States Navy, except that in time of war or other national emergency such officers of the Naval Reserve Force shall have a date of precedence with officers of the United States Navy as of the date of general mobilization, to be established by the Secretary of the Navy.—Act of July 1, 1918.]

[CIVIL ENGINEER CORPS.—That the appointment of six additional civil engineers is hereby authorized, three to be appointed during the present calendar year, and the other three in the calendar year nineteen hundred

and three.—Act July 1, 1902.]

[Same.—The grades of the active list of the Navy hereinafter designated shall be so increased that there \* \* one additional civil engineer, in all twenty-eight; and twelve assistant civil engineers, of whom six shall have the rank of lieutenant (junior grade) and six the rank of ensign: Provided, That assistant civil engineers, during the first five years after date of appointment, shall receive, per annum, when on duty, one thousand five hundred dollars, when on leave or waiting orders, one thousand dollars; during the second five years after such date, when on duty, one thousand eight hundred dollars, when on leave or waiting orders, one thousand two hundred dollars; and after ten years from such date, when on duty, two thousand one hundred dollars, and when on leave or waiting orders, one thousand four hundred dollars: And provided further, That promotions in the corps of civil engineers shall be after such examination as the Secretary of the Navy may

prescribe.—Act March 3, 1903.]
[Same.—That from and after the passage of this act the allowances of civil engineers and professors of mathematics in the Navy shall be the same as are or may be provided by or in pursuance of law for naval constructors, and the allowances of assistant civil engineers the same as for assistant naval constructors.—Act June 29, 1906.]

[Same.—The total authorized number of commissioned officers of the active list of the following staff corps, exclusive of commissioned warrant officers, shall be based on percentages of the total number of commissioned officers of the active list of the line of the Navy as follows: Corps of Civil Engineers, two per centum; The total number of commissioned officers of the active list of the following mentioned staff corps at any one time, exclusive of commissioned warrant officers. shall be distributed in the various grades of the respective corps as follows:

[Corps of Civil Engineers: One-half civil engineers with the rank of rear admiral to five and one-half civil engineers with the rank of capitan, to fourteen civil engineers with the rank of commander, to eighty civil engineers and assistant civil engineers with the rank below

commander.—Act August 29, 1916.]
[Officers of the Corps of Civil Engineers hereafter appointed shall, from the date of their original appointment, take rank and precedence with Lieutenants (junior

[CHIEF OF BUREAU OF YARDS AND DOCKS.—That the Chief of the Bureau of Yards and Docks shall be selected from the members of the Corps of Civil Engineers of the Navy having not less than seven years' active service.—

Act June 29, 1906.]

[Assistant to Chief of Bureau of Yards and Docks.—Hereafter an officer of the Corps of Civil Engineers may be detailed as assistant to the Chief of the Bureau of Yards and Docks and an officer of the Corps of Naval Constructors as assistant to the Chief of Bureau of Construction and Repair; and, in case of death, resignation, absence, or sickness of the chief of bureau, shall, unless otherwise directed by the President, as provided by section one hundred and seventy-nine of the Revised Statutes, perform the duties of such chief until his successor is appointed or such absence or sickness shall cease; and hereafter an officer of the line of the Navy or Marine Corps.—Act August 29, 1916.]

Sec. 8. That officers of the line in the grades of captain, commander, and lieutenant-commander may, by official application to the Secretary of the Navy, have their names placed on a list which shall be known as the list of "Applicants for voluntary retirement," and when at the end of any fiscal year the average vacancies for the fiscal years subsequent to the passage of this act above the grade of commander have been less than thirteen, above the grade of lieutenant-commander less than twenty, above the grade of lieutenant less than twentynine, and above the grade of lieutenant (junior grade) less than forty, the President may, in the order of the rank of the applicants, place a sufficient number on the retired list with the rank and three-fourths the sea pay of the next higher grade, as now existing, including the grade of commodore, to cause the aforesaid vacancies

for the fiscal year then being considered.

No increased rank or pay on retirement.—That hereafter any officer retired under the provisions of sections eight and nine of the act approved March third, eighteen hundred and ninety-nine, an act to reorganize and increase the efficiency of the personnel of the Navy and Marine Corps of the United States, shall be retired with the rank and three-fourths the sea pay of the grade

from which he is retired.—Act August 22, 1912.]

Sec. 9. That should it be found at the end of any fiscal year that the retirements pursuant to the provisions of law now in force, the voluntary retirements provided for in this act, and casualties are not sufficient to cause the average vacancies enumerated in section eight of this act, the Secretary of the Navy shall, on or about the first day of June, convene a board of five rear-admirals, and shall place at its disposal the service and medical records on file in the Navy Department of all the officers in the grades of captain, commander, lieutenant-commander, and lieutenant. The board shall then select, as soon as practicable after the first day of July, a sufficient number of officers from the before-mentioned grades, as constituted on the thirtieth day of June of that year, to cause the average vacancies enumerated in section eight of this act. Each member of said board shall swear, or affirm, that he will, without prejudice or partiality, and having in view solely the special fitness of officers and the efficiency of the naval service, perform the duties imposed upon him by this act. Its finding, which shall be in writing, signed by all the members, not less than four governing, shall be transmitted to the President. who shall thereupon, by order, make the transfer of such officers to the retired list as are selected by the board: Provided, That not more than five captains, four commanders, four lieutenant-commanders, and two lieutenants are so retired in any one year. The promotions to fill the vacancies thus created shall date from the thirtieth day of June of the current year: And provided further, That any officer retired under the provisions of this section shall be retired with the rank and three-fourths the sea pay of the next higher grade, including the grade of commodore, which is retained on the retired list for this purpose.

[Section 9, Personnel act, Repealed.—Section nine of the naval personnel act of March third, eighteen hundred and ninety-nine, entitled, "An act to reorganize and increase the efficiency of the personnel of the Navy and Marine Corps of the United States," be, and the same is

hereby, repealed.—Act March 3, 1915.]

[Kestoration to active list of retired officers.-That the President be, and he is hereby, authorized, within two years of the date of the approval of this act, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to transfer to the active list of the Navy or Marine Corps any officer who may have been transferred from the active to the retired list of the Navy under the provisions of section nine of said personnel act: Provided, That such officer shall be transferred to the place on the active list which he would have held if he had not been retired and shall be carried as an additional number in the grade to which he may be transferred or at any time thereafter promoted: Provided further, That such officer shall stand a satisfactory physical and professional examination as now prescribed by law: And provided further, That any officer transferred to the active list shall not by the passage of this act be entitled to back pay or allowances of any kind.—Act March 3, 1915.]

[Same.—That the President be, and he is hereby, authorized to appoint the following-named officers now on the retired list of the United States Navy to the grade and rank on the active list of the United States Navy, as

hereinafter provided:

[Commodore Ten Eyck De Witt Veeder, retired, to be a rear admiral on the active list, to take rank next after Rear Admiral Austin M. Knight, United States Navy; Captain Templin Morris Potts, retired, to be a rear admiral on the active list, to take rank next after Rear Admiral William B. Caperton, United States Navy; Captain John Henry Gibbons, retired, to be a captain on the active list, to take rank next after Captain Frank M. Bennett, United States Navy; Captain Frank Kinsey Hill, retired, to be a captain on the active list, to take rank next after Captain Clarence S. Williams, United States Navy; Captain Armistead Rust, retired, to be a captain on the active list, to take rank next after Captain Robert L. Russell, United States Navy; Captain John Gardner Quinby, retired, to be a rear admiral on the active list, to take rank next after Rear Admiral Thomas S. Rodgers, United States Navy; Captain John Morris Ellicott, retired, to be a captain on the active list, to take rank next after Captain Robert B. Higgins, United States Navy; Captain Frank W. Kellogg, retired, to be a captain on the active list to take rank next after Captain Thomas Snowden, United States Navy; Commander Allen M. Cook, retired to be a commander on the active list and to take rank next after Commander John R. Brady, United States Navy; Commander Emmet R. Pollock, retired, to be a commander on the active list, to take rank next after Commander Andre Morton Procter, United States Navy; Captain Washington Irving Chambers, retired, to be a rear admiral on the active list, to take rank next after Rear Admiral Walter McLean, United States Navy; Commander George N. Hayward, retired, to be a captain on the active list to take rank next after Captain Lloyd H. Chandler, United States Navy: Provided, That the aforesaid officers shall establish to the satisfaction of the Secretary of the Navy, by the usual examination prescribed by law, their physical, mental, moral, and professional fitness to perform the duties of the grade on the active list to which they are hereby restored: Provided further, That the aforesaid officers shall be carried as additional numbers in the grade to which they may be appointed under this Act, or at any time thereafter promoted: Provided further, That the aforesaid officers shall not by the passage of this Act be entitled to back pay or allowances of any kind.

The President is hereby authorized, within two years after the approval of this Act, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to transfer to the active list of the Marine Corps or Navy Pay Corps any officer under fifty years of age who may have been transferred from the active list to the retired list of the Marine Corps or Navy Pay Corps by the action of any retiring board for physical disability incurred in the line of duty: Provided, That such officer shall be transferred to the place on the active list which he would have had if he had not been retired, and shall be carried as an additional number in the grade to which he may be transferred or at any time thereafter promoted: Provided further, That such officer shall establish to the satisfaction of the Secretary of the Navy his mental, moral, professional, and physical qualifications to perform the duties on the active list of the grade to which he is transferred.—Act August 29, 1916.]

SEC. 10. That of the naval constructors five shall have the rank of captain, five of commander, and all others that of lieutenant commander or lieutenant. Assistant naval constructors shall have the rank of lieutenant or lieutenant (junior grade). Assistant naval constructors shall be promoted to the grade of naval constructor after not less than eight or more than fourteen years' service as assistant naval constructor: *Provided*, That the whole number of naval constructors and assistant naval constructors on the active list shall not exceed forty in all.

[Increase in Construction Corps.—That, in addition to the number of naval constructors and assistant naval constructors now authorized, the appointment of six assistant naval constructors is hereby authorized, two to be appointed during the present calendar year and the remaining four in the calendar year of nineteen hundred and three.—Act July 1, 1902.]

[Same.—The grades of the active list of the Navy hereinafter designated shall be so increased that there shall be \* \* \* twenty-nine additional naval constructors and assistant naval constructors, in all seventy-five.—Act March 3, 1903.]

[Same.—Officers of the line of the Navy who have had not less than three years' service in the grade of ensign and have taken or are taking satisfactorily a post-graduate course in naval architecture under orders from the

Secretary of the Navy shall be eligible for transfer to the grade of assistant naval constructor: *Provided*, That there shall not be more than five such transfers in any one calendar year and that the total increase in the number of naval constructors and assistant naval constructors by reason of such transfers shall not exceed twenty-

four.—Act March 3, 1915.]

[Same.—The total authorized number of commissioned officers of the active list of the following staff corps, exclusive of commissioned warrant officers, shall be based on percentages of the total number of commissioned officers of the active list of the line of the Navy as follows: \* \* \* Construction Corps, five per centum; \* \* \*. The total number of commissioned officers of the active list of the following mentioned staff corps at any one time, exclusive of commissioned warrant officers, shall be distributed in the various grades of the respective corps as follows: \* \*

[Construction Corps: One-half naval constructors with the rank of rear admiral to eight and one-half naval constructors with the rank of captain, to fourteen naval constructors with the rank of commander, to seventy-seven naval constructors and assistant naval constructors with rank below commander: *Provided*, That vacancies in the Construction Corps shall be filled in the manner now prescribed by law, at such annual rate as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe: *Provided further*, That hereafter ensigns of not less than one year's service as such shall be eligible for transfer to the Construction Corps.—Act August 29, 1916.]

[Duties of Construction Corps.—That officers who now perform engineering duty on shore only and officers of the Construction Corps shall be eligible for any shore duty compatible with their rank and grade to which the Secretary of the Navy may assign them.—Act June 30,

1914.]

SEC. 11. That any officer of the Navy, with a creditable record, who served during the Civil War, shall, when retired, be retired with the rank and three-fourths the

sea pay of the next higher grade.

[RETIREMENT OF MARINE OFFICERS.—That officers of the Marine Corps with creditable records who served during the civil war shall, when retired, be retired in like manner and under the same conditions as provided for officers of the Navy who served during the civil war.—

Act April 27, 1904.]

[Same.—That any officer of the Marine Corps below the grade of brigadier-general who served with credit as an officer or as an enlisted man in the regular or volunteer forces during the civil war prior to April ninth, eighteen hundred and sixty-five, otherwise than as a cadet, and whose name is borne on the official register of the Marine Corps, and who has heretofore been, or may hereafter be, retired on account of wounds or disability incident to the service, or on account of age or after forty years' service, may, in the discretion of the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, be placed on the retired list of the Marine Corps with the rank and retired pay of one grade above that actually held by him at the time of retirement: *Provided*, That this act shall not apply to any officer who received an advance of grade since the date of his retirement or who has been restored to the Marine Corps and placed on the retired list by virtue of the provisions of a special act of Congress.—

Act June 29, 1906.] [RETIREMENT OF OFFICERS BELOW REAR-ADMIRAL.—That any officer of the Navy not above the grade of captain who served with credit as an officer or as an enlisted man in the regular or volunteer forces during the Civil War prior to April ninth, eighteen hundred and sixty-five, otherwise than as a cadet, and whose name is borne on the official register of the Navy, and who has heretofore been, or may hereafter be, retired on account of wounds or disability incident to the service or on account of age or after forty years' service, may, in the discretion of the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, be placed on the retired list of the Navy with the rank and retired pay of one grade above that actually held by him at the time of retirement: Provided, That this act shall not apply to any officer who received an advance of grade at or since the date of his retirement or who has been restored to the Navy and placed on the retired list by virtue of the provisions of a special act of Congress.—Act June 29, 1906.]

[Section 11, Personnel Act, Revived.—The provisions of the act approved June twenty-ninth, nineteen hundred and six, entitled "An act making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and seven, and for other purposes," providing for the retirement in the next higher grade of officers of the navy who served during the civil war, shall not operate to deprive any officer of the navy who has been, or may be, retired, since the passage of that act, of the right to increased rank and pay to which, but for the passage of said act, he would have been entitled.—

Act March 3, 1909.]

[Commissions to retired officers with advanced rank.—That commissioned officers of the Army, Navy, and Marine Corps on the retired list whose rank has been or shall hereafter be advanced by operation of or in accordance with law shall be entitled to and shall receive commissions in accordance with such advanced rank.—Act March 4, 1911.]

[ADVANCEMENT ON ACTIVE LIST FOR WAR SERVICE.— That the advancement in rank of officers of the Navy and Marine Corps, whensoever made, for service rendered during the war with Spain, pursuant, respectively, to the provisions of sections fifteen hundred and six and sixteen hundred and five of the Revised Statutes, shall not interfere with the regular promotion of officers otherwise entitled to promotion, but officers so advanced, by reason of war service, shall, after they are promoted to higher grades, be carried thereafter as addition to the numbers of each grade to which they may at any time be promoted: and each such officer shall hereafter be promoted in due course, contemporaneously with and to take rank next after the officer immediately above him: and all advancements made by reason of war service shall be appropriately so designated upon the official Navy list: Provided, however, That no promotion shall be made to fill a vacancy occasioned by the promotion, retirement, death, resignation, or dismissal of any officer who, at the time of such promotion, retirement, death, resignation, or dismissal, is an additional member of his grade under the foregoing provisions.—Act March 3, 1901.]

Sec. 12. That boatswains, gunners, carpenters, and sailmakers shall after ten years from date of warrant be commissioned chief boatswains, chief gunners, chief carpenters, and chief sailmakers, to rank with, but after, ensign: Provided, That the chief boatswains, chief gunners, chief carpenters, and chief sailmakers shall on promotion have the same pay and allowances as are now allowed a second lieutenant in the Marine Corps: Provided. That the pay of boatswains, gunners, carpenters, and sailmakers shall be the same as that now allowed by law: Provided further, That nothing in this act shall give additional rights to quarters on board ship or to command, and that immediately after the passage of this act boatswains, gunners, carpenters and sailmakers, who have served in the Navy as such for fifteen years, shall be commissioned in accordance with the provisions of this section, and thereafter no warrant officer shall be promoted until he shall have passed an examination before a board of chief boatswains, chief gunners, chief carpenters, and chief sailmakers, in accordance with regulations prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy.

[COMMISSIONED AFTER SIX YEARS FROM DATE OF WAR-RANT.—And boatswains, gunners, carpenters, and sailmakers shall be eligible for appointment as chief boatswains, chief gunners, chief carpenters, and chief sailmakers after six years from date of warrant.—Act April 27, 1904.]

[APPOINTMENTS AS CHIEF MACHINISTS.—The title of warrant machinist is hereby changed to machinist; and all machinists shall, after six years from date of warrant, be commissioned chief machinists, to rank with, but after, ensign, and shall, on promotion, have the same pay and allowances as are allowed chief boatswains, chief gunners, chief carpenters, and chief sailmakers, and no machinist shall be promoted until he shall have passed such examination before a board as the Secretary of the Navy

may prescribe, and no warrant officer, heretofore or hereafter promoted six years from date of warrant, shall suffer a reduction in pay which, but for such promotion, would have been received by him.—Act March 3, 1909.]

[APPOINTMENTS AS CHIEF PHARMACISTS.—That pharmacists shall, after six years from date of warrant, be commissioned chief pharmacists after passing satisfactorily such examination as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe, and shall, on promotion, have the rank, pay, and allowances of chief boatswains.—Act August 22, 1912.]

[Same.—Pharmacists shall, after six years from the date of warrant, be commissioned chief pharmacists after passing satisfactorily such examinations as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe, and shall, when so commissioned, have the same rank, pay, and allowances as now or may hereafter be allowed other commissioned warrant officers: *Provided*, That the pharmacists at present in the service who have served or may hereafter serve six or more years in that grade shall be eligible for promotion to the grade of chief pharmacist upon satisfactorily passing the examinations provided for in this Act.—Act

August 29, 1916.] APPOINTMENTS AS PAY CLERKS AND CHIEF PAY CLERKS.— The title of paymaster's clerk in the United States Navy is hereby changed to pay clerk, and hereafter all pay clerks shall be warranted from acting pay clerks, who shall be appointed from enlisted men in the Navy holding acting or permanent appointments as chief petty officers who have served at least three years as enlisted men, at least two years of which service must have been on board a cruising vessel of the Navy. All appointments as acting pay clerks shall be made by the Secretary of the Navy, and all such appointees, in addition to the qualifications above set forth, must be citizens of the United States. All acting appointments herein provided for shall be made permanent under regulations established by the Secretary of the Navy: Provided, That paymasters' clerks now in the Navy whose total service as such is less than one year and who are citizens of the United States may, upon the passage of this act, be given appointments as acting pay clerks without previous service as enlisted men: Provided further, That paymasters' clerks now in the service and former paymasters' clerks whose appointments have been revoked within six months next preceding the passage of this act, who have had not less than one year's actual service as such, and who are citizens of the United States, may, upon the passage of this act, be warranted as pay clerks without previous service as enlisted men or as acting pay clerks: And provided further, That pay clerks and acting pay clerks shall have the same pay, allowances, and other benefits as are now or may hereafter be allowed other warrant officers and acting warrant officers, respectively.

[That all pay clerks shall, after six years' service as such, be commissioned chief pay clerks and shall on promotion have the rank, pay, and allowances of chief boatswain: Provided, That in computing the six years' service herein provided for credit shall be given for all service in the Navy as pay clerks, acting pay clerks, and paymaster's clerk: Provided further, That paymasters' clerks now in the Navy and former paymasters' clerks whose appointments have been revoked within six months next preceding the passage of this act, who have had not less than six years' actual service as such, and who are citizens of the United States, may, upon the passage of this act, be commissioned as chief pay clerks without previous service as enlisted men, acting pay clerks, or pay clerks.

[That the total number of chief pay clerks, pay clerks, and acting pay clerks allowed by this act shall not exceed one for each two hundred and fifty enlisted men in the United States Navy now or hereafter allowed by law, and such chief pay clerks, pay clerks, and acting pay clerks shall be assigned to duty with pay officers under such rules as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe: Provided, That no person shall be appointed a chief pay clerk, pay clerk, or acting pay clerk under any provisions contained in this act until his physical, mental, moral, and professional qualifications have been satisfactorily established by examination before a board of examining officers appointed by the Secretary of the Navy, from officers of the pay corps when practicable and according to such regulations as he may prescribe: Provided further, That no person shall be appointed a chief pay clerk, pay clerk, or acting pay clerk unless his accumulated previous service in the Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, together with his possible future service prior to attaining the age of sixty-two years, will amount to at least thirty years, except that this proviso shall not apply to such persons as were serving in the Navy as paymasters' clerks during the period from September first, nineteen hundred and thirteen, to October thirty-first, nineteen hundred and thirteen.

[That the limitation as to age contained in section thirteen hundred and seventy-nine of the Revised Statutes of the United States, relating to appointment of assistant paymasters in the United States Navy, shall not apply to chief pay clerks and pay clerks appointed under the provisions of this act, who must be between the ages of twenty-one and thirty-five years at the time of appointment as assistant paymasters in the United States Navy: Provided, That this shall not be construed as giving any preference in said appointment of assistant paymasters to said chief pay clerks and pay clerks except as to the limitation of age.

[That sections thirteen hundred and eighty-six, thirteen hundred and eighty-seven, and thirteen hundred and eighty-eight of the Revised Statutes, and all acts and

parts of acts, so far as they are in conflict with the provisions of this act, be, and the same are hereby, repealed.—

Act March 3, 1915.]

Pay of commissioned warrant officers with cred-ITABLE RECORDS.—Hereafter chief boatswains, chief gunners, chief machinists, chief carpenters, chief sail makers, chief pharmacists, and chief pay clerks, on the active list with creditable records, shall, after six years from date of commission, receive the pay and allowances that are now or may hereafter be allowed a licutenant (junior grade), United States Navy: Provided, That chief boatswains, chief gunners, chief machinists, chief carpenters, chief sail makers, chief pharmacists, and chief pay clerks, on the active list with creditable records, shall, after twelve years from date of commission, receive the pay and allowances that are now or may hereafter be allowed a lieutenant, United States Navy.—Act August **29.** 1916.]

[Increased pay for warrant officers.—The pay of all warrant officers and mates is hereby increased twenty-

five per centum.—Act May 13, 1908.]

[Hereafter the pay of warrant officers while on shore duty during the fourth three years' service shall be \$1,750

per annum.—Act March 4, 1917.]

[Allowances to Warrant officers.—Warrant officers shall receive the same allowances of heat and light as are now or may hereafter be allowed an ensign, United States Navy.—Act August 29, 1916.]

[LEAVE ALLOWED WARRANT OFFICERS.—Warrant officers shall be allowed such leave of absence, with full pay, as is now or may hereafter be allowed other officers of

the United States Navy.—Act August 29, 1916.]
[Ensigns appointed from Warrant Officers.— Whenever, in view of the vacancies in the grade of ensign on July thirtieth of any year unfilled by graduates of the Naval Academy, the Secretary of the Navy shall so recommend, the President may appoint to that grade, as of July thirtieth, from among the boatswains, gunners, or warrant machinists not exceeding six in any one calendar year. No person shall be so appointed who is over thirtyfive years of age; who has served less than six years as a warrant officer; who is not recommended by a commanding officer under whom he has served; nor until he shall have passed such competitive examination as may be prescribed by the Navy Department.—Act March 3, 1901]

And all provisions of law authorizing the distribution among captors of the whole or any portion of the proceeds of vessels, or any property hereafter captured, condemned as prize, or providing for the payment of bounty for the sinking or destruction of vessels of the enemy hereafter occurring in time of war, are hereby repealed: And provided further, That no provision of this act shall operate to reduce the present pay of any commissioned officer now in the Navy; and in any case in which the pay of such an officer would otherwise be reduced he shall continue to receive pay according to existing law: And provided further, That nothing in this act shall operate to increase or reduce the pay of any officer now on the retired list of the Navy.

[Pay of officers on the active list.—Hereafter all commissioned officers of the active list of the Navy shall receive the same pay and allowances according to rank and length of service, and the annual pay of each grade shall be as follows: For Admiral, thirteen thousand five hundred dollars; rear-admiral, first nine, eight thousand dollars; rear-admiral, second nine, or commodore, six thousand dollars; captain, four thousand dollars; commander, three thousand five hundred dollars; lieutenant-commander, three thousand dollars; lieutenant, two thousand four hundred dollars; lieutenant, junior grade, two thousand dollars; ensign, one thousand seven hundred dollars. There shall be allowed and paid to each commissioned officer below the rank of rear-admiral ten

per centum of his current yearly pay for each term of five years service in the Army, Navy, and Marine Corps. The total amount of such increase for length of service shall in no case exceed forty per centum on the yearly pay of the grade as provided by law: Provided. That the annual pay of captain shall not exceed five thousand dollars per annum; of commander, four thousand five hundred dollars per annum; and of lieutenant-commander, four thousand dollars per annum. \* \* \* The pay of midshipmen shall hereafter be six hundred dollars per annum while at the Naval Academy, and one thousand four hundred dollars per annum after graduation from the Naval Academy. The pay of all warrant officers and mates is hereby increased twenty-five per centum. \* \* \* Aids to rear admirals embraced in the nine lower numbers of that grade shall each receive one hundred and fifty dollars additional per annum, and aids to all other rear-admirals, two hundred dollars additional per annum each.—Act May 13, 1908.1

[Same.—The annual pay of an admiral shall be \$10,000,

and of a vice admiral \$9,000.—Act March 3, 1915.]

[Same.—Hereafter the Chief of Naval Operations, while so serving as such Chief of Naval Operations, shall have the rank and title of admiral, to take rank next after The Admiral of the Navy, and shall, while so serving as Chief of Naval Operations, receive the pay of \$10,000 per annum and no allowances. \* \*

[Hereafter pay and allowances of officers in the upper half of the grade or rank of rear admiral, including the staff corps and including staff officers heretofore permanently commissioned with the rank of rear admiral, shall be that now allowed by law for the first nine rear admirals, and the pay and allowances of officers in the lower half of the grade or rank of rear admiral, including the staff corps, shall be that now allowed by law for the second nine rear admirals.

[Hereafter chief boatswains, chief gunners, chief machinists, chief carpenters, chief sail makers, chief pharmacists, and chief pay clerks, on the active list with creditable records, shall, after six years from date of commission, receive the pay and allowances that are now or may hereafter be allowed a lieutenant (junior grade), United States Navy: Provided, That chief boatswains, chief gunners, chief machinists, chief carpenters, chief sail makers, chief pharmacists, and chief pay clerks, on the active list with creditable records, shall, after twelve years from date of commission, receive the pay and allowances that are now or may hereafter be allowed a lieutenant, United States Navy.

[Warrant officers shall receive the same allowances of heat and light as are now or may hereafter be allowed an

ensign, United States Navy.

[Warrant officers shall be allowed such leave of absence, with full pay, as is now or may hereafter be allowed other officers of the United States Navy. \* \* \*

[Nothing contained in this Act shall be construed to reduce the rank, pay, or allowances of any officer of the Navy or Marine Corps as now provided by law. \* \* \*

[Hereafter all commissioned officers of the active list of the Navy shall receive the same pay and allowances according to rank and length of service: *Provided*, That this provision shall not be construed to reduce the pay and allowances of commissioned warrant officers as herein authorized.—Act August 29, 1916.]

[Same.—That all officers of the Navy who, since the third day of March, eighteen hundred and ninety-nine, have been advanced or may hereafter be advanced in grade or rank pursuant to law shall be allowed the pay and allowances of the higher grade or rank from the dates stated in their commissions.—Act March 4, 1913.]

SAME—ADDITIONAL PAY FOR AVIATION DUTY.—That from and after the passage and approval of this act the pay and allowances that are now or may be hereafter fixed by law for officers of the Navy and Marine Corps shall be increased thirty-five per centum for such officers as are now or may hereafter be detailed by the Secretary of the Navy on aviation duty: Provided. That this increase of pay and allowances shall be given to such officers only as are actual flyers of heavier-than-air craft, and while so detailed: Provided further, That no more than thirty officers of the Navy and Marine Corps shall be detailed to aviation service: Provided further, That no officer above the rank of lieutenant commander in the Navy or major in the Marine Corps shall be detailed for actual flying: Provided further, That nothing in this provision shall be construed to increase the total number of officers now in the Navy or Marine Corps.—Act March 4, 1913.]

[Same.—Hereafter officers of the Navy and Marine Corps appointed student naval aviators, while lawfully detailed for duty involving actual flying in air craft, including balloons, dirigibles, and aeroplanes, shall receive the pay and allowances of their rank and service plus thirty-five per centum increase thereof; and those officers who have heretofore qualified, or may hereafter qualify, as naval aviators, under such rules and regulations as have been or may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy, shall, while lawfully detailed for duty involving actual flying in air craft, receive the pay and allowances of their rank and service plus fifty per centum increase thereof.—Act March 3, 1915.]

[The Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to appoint annually for a period of four years, from enlisted men of the naval service, or from citizens of the United States in civil life, not to exceed thirty student flyers for instruction and training in aeronautics who shall receive the same pay and allowances as midshipmen at the United States Naval Academy: \* \*

[Student flyers shall, after receiving a certificate of qualification as an aviator for actual flying in aircraft, rank with midshipmen and shall receive the same pay and allowances as midshipmen, plus fifty per centum

thereof.—Act August 29, 1916.]

[That hereafter the allowances of officers, enlisted men, and student flyers of the naval service shall in no case be increased by reason of the performance of aviation

RANK AND PAY OF CHAPLAINS.—That all chaplains now in the Navy above the grade of lieutenants shall receive the pay and allowances of lieutenant-commander in the Navy according to length of service under the provisions of law for that rank, and all chaplains now in the Navy in the grade of lieutenant shall receive their present sea pay when on shore duty: Provided, That naval chaplains hereafter appointed shall have the rank, pay, and allowances of lieutenant (junior grade) in the Navy until they shall have completed seven years of service, when they shall have the rank, pay, and allowances of lieutenant in the Navy; and lieutenants shall be promoted, whenever vacancies occur, to the grade of lieutenant-commander, which shall consist of five numbers, and when so promoted shall receive the rank, pay, and allowances of lieutenant-commander in the Navy: Provided further, That nothing herein contained shall be held or construed to increase the number of chaplains as now authorized by law or to reduce the rank or pay of any now serving.—Act June 29, 1906.]

[Same.—And that the pay and allowances of chaplains in the Navy shall in no case exceed that provided for

lieutenant-commanders.—Act May 13, 1908.]

[Same.—Of the total number of chaplains and acting chaplains herein authorized ten per centum thereof shall have the rank of captain in the Navy, twenty per centum the rank of commander, twenty per centum the rank of lieutenant commander, and the remainder to have the rank of lieutenants and lieutenants, junior grade.—Act June 30, 1914.]

[Same.—Hereafter all commissioned officers of the active list of the Navy shall receive the same pay and allowances according to rank and length of service: Provided, That this provision shall not be construed to reduce the pay and allowances of commissioned warrant officers as herein authorized.—Act August 29, 1916.]

[Constructive service abolished. -That so much of an act entitled "An act to reorganize and increase the efficiency of the personnel of the Navy and Marine Corps," approved March third, eighteen hundred and ninety-nine, which reads as follows: "and that all offi-

cers, including warrant officers, who have been or may be appointed to the Navy from civil life shall, on the date of appointment, be credited for computing their pay, with five years' service," shall not apply to any person entering the Navy from and after the passage of this act: Provided, That section fourteen hundred and eighty-six of the Revised Statutes shall not apply in the case of officers who enter the Navy after the passage of this act and all such officers shall take precedence when of the same grade according to their respective dates of commission in that grade.—Act March 4, 1913.]

[Same.—That officers shall take rank in each staff corps according to the dates of commission in the several grades, excepting in cases where they have gained or lost num-

bers.—Act August 29, 1916.]

[Pay of officers not reduced.—Section thirteen of the act approved March third, eighteen hundred and ninety-nine, entitled "An act to reorganize and increase the efficiency of the personnel of the Navy and Marine Corps of the United States," is hereby so amended as to provide that nothing therein contained shall operate to reduce the pay which, but for the passage of said act, would have been received by any commissioned officer at the time of its passage or thereafter.—Act June 7, 1900.]

[Same.—Nothing herein shall be construed so as to reduce the pay or allowances now authorized by law for any commissioned, warrant, or appointed officer or any enlisted man of the active or retired lists of the Navy, and all laws inconsistent with this provision are hereby

repealed.—Act May 13, 1908.]

[Same.—Nothing contained in this Act shall be construed to reduce the rank, pay, or allowances of any officer of the Navy or Marine Corps as now provided by

law.—Act August 29, 1916.]

[Par of retired officers.—The pay of all commissioned, warrant, and appointed officers and enlisted men of the Navy now on the retired list shall be based on the pay, as herein provided for, of commissioned, warrant, and appointed officers and enlisted men of corresponding rank and service on the active list; and all pay herein provided shall remain in force until changed by act of Congress.—Act May 13, 1908.]

[Same.—In computing the pay of retired officers of the Navy, the ten per centum additional pay allowed for sea duty or for shore duty beyond the continental limits of the United States shall not be included, and the pay of commodore shall be the same in all respects as that of

rear-admiral, second nine.—Act May 30, 1908.]

[Same.—Hereafter any naval officer on the retired list may, with his consent, in the discretion of the Secretary of the Navy, be ordered to such duty as he may be able to perform at sea or on shore, and while so employed in time of peace shall receive the pay and allowances of an officer of the active list of the same rank: *Provided*, That

[Same. -That any retired chief warrant officer who has been on active duty since August twenty-ninth, nineteen hundred and sixteen, or who may hereafter perform active duty, and whose record is creditable, shall, during such time as he has been or may hereafter be, on active duty, and from the time his service on the active list after date of commission, plus his service on active duty while on the retired list, is equal to six years, receive the pay and allowances that are now, or may hereafter be, allowed a lieutenant (junior grade), United States Navy; and shall, during such time as he has been, or may hereafter be, on active duty, and from the time such total service is equal to twelve years, receive the pay and allowances that are now, or may hereafter be, allowed a lieutenant, United States Navy.

SEC. 2. That any retired warrant officer who has been on active duty since August twenty-ninth, nineteen hundred and sixteen, or who may hereafter perform active duty, and whose record is creditable, shall, during such time as he has been or may hereafter be on active duty, and from the time his service on the active list after date of warrant, plus his service on active duty while on the retired list, is equal to twelve years, receive the pay and allowances that are now or may hereafter be allowed a lieutenant (junior grade), United States Navy; and shall, during such time as he has been or may hereafter be on active duty, and from the time such total service is equal to eighteen years, receive the pay and allowances that are now or may hereafter be allowed a lieutenant, United States Navy.

Act April 10, 1918.]

[Same. That hereafter, during the existence of war or of a national emergency declared by the President to exist, any commissioned or warrant officer of the Navy, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard of the United States on the retired list may, in the discretion of the Secretary of the Navy, be ordered to active duty at sea or on shore; and any retired officer performing such active duty in time of war or national emergency, declared as aforesaid, shall be entitled to promotion on the retired list to the grade or rank, not above that of lieutenant commander in the Navy or major in the Marine Corps or captain in the Coast Guard, and shall thereafter receive the pay and allowances thereof, which his total active service as

an officer both prior and subsequent to retirement, in the manner rendered by him, would have enabled him to attain in due course of promotion had such service been rendered continuously on the active list during the

SAME.—That hereafter, during the existence of war or of a national emergency, declared as aforesaid, any commissioned or warrant officer of the Navy, Marine Corps or Coast Guard of the United States on the retired list, while on active duty, may be temporarily advanced to and commissioned in such higher grade or rank on the retired list, not above that of lieutenant commander in the Navy or major in the Marine Corps or captain in the Coast Guard, as the President may determine, and any officer so advanced shall, while on active duty, be entitled to the same pay and allowances as officers of like grade or rank on the active list: Provided, That any such commissioned or warrant officer who has been so temporarily advanced in grade or rank shall, upon his relief from active duty. or in any case not later than six months after the termination of the war or of the national emergency, declared as aforesaid, revert to the grade or rank on the retired list and to the pay and allowance status which he would have held had he not been so temporarily advanced: Provided further, That nothing in this Act shall operate to reduce the pay and allowances now allowed by law to retired officers.—Act July 1, 1918.]

[Same.—No officer who, after having commanded a fleet in active commission, has been retired for age and whom, in the judgment of the Secretary of the Navy, the public interests make it necessary to retain for a time after said retirement and who is performing active duty as chairman of the executive committee of the General Board, shall, for the period so retained, suffer any reduction in the emoluments he was receiving at the time of his retirement: Provided, That hereafter any retired officer of the naval service who shall be detailed on active duty shall, while so serving, receive the active duty pay and allowances of the grade, not above that of lieutenant commander in the Navy or of major in the Marine Corps, that he would have attained in due course of promotion if he had remained on the active list for a period beyond the date of his retirement equal to the total amount of time during which he has been detailed on active duty since his retirement: Provided, That nothing herein shall be construed to reduce the pay of any retired officer on active duty whose retired pay exceeds the active duty pay and allowances for the grade of lieutenant

commander.—Act August 29, 1916.]

SEC. 14. That upon the passage of this act the Secretary of the Navy shall appoint a board for the examination of men for the position of warrant machinist, one hundred of whom are hereby authorized. The said examination shall be open, first, to all machinists by

trade, of good record in the naval service, and if a sufficient number of machinists from the Navy are not found duly qualified, then any machinist of good character, not above thirty years of age, in civil life shall be eligible for such examination and appointment to fill the remaining vacancies. All subsequent vacancies in the list of warrant machinists shall be filled by competitive examination before a board ordered by the Secretary of the Navy, and open to all machinists by trade who are in the Navy, and machinists of good character, not above thirty years of age, in civil life authorized by the Sercetary of the Navy to appear before said board, and, where candidates from civil life and from the naval service possess equal qualifications, the preference shall be given to those from the naval service.

[Same.—\* \* \* and as many warrant machinists as the President may from time to time deem necessary to appoint, not to exceed twenty in any one year.—Act

[Promotion of machinists and chief machinists.-And all machinists shall, after six years from date of warrant, be commissioned chief machinists, to rank with, but after, ensign, and shall, on promotion, have the same pay and allowances as are allowed chief boatswains, chief gunners, chief carpenters, and chief sailmakers, and no machinist shall be promoted until he shall have passed such examination before a board as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe, and no warrant officer, heretofore or hereafter promoted six years from date of warrant, shall suffer a reduction in pay which, but for such promotion, would have been received by him: Provided, That chief boatswains, chief gunners, and chief machinists shall be eligible for appointment to the grade of ensign under the restrictions imposed by law upon the appointment of boatswains, gunners, and warrant machinists to that grade. - Act March 3, 1909.]

They shall take rank with other warrant officers according to date of appointment

and shall wear such uniform as may be prescribed by the

Navy Department.

That hereafter the term of enlistment of all enlisted men of the Navy shall be four years: Provided, That section fifteen hundred and seventy-three, Revised Statutes be amended to read: "If any enlisted man or apprentice, being honorably discharged, shall reenlist for four years within four months thereafter, he shall, on presenting his honorable discharge or on accounting in a satisfactory manner for its loss, be entitled to pay during the said four months equal to that to which he would have been entitled if he had been employed in actual service; and that any man who has received an honorable discharge from his last term of enlistment, or who has rerecived a recommendation for reenlistment upon the expiration of his last term of service of not less than three years, who reenlists for a term of four years within four months from the date of his discharge, shall receive an increase of one dollar and thirty-six cents per month to the pay prescribed for the rating in which he serves for each consecutive reenlistment."

[Term of enlistment extended.—That the term of enlistment of all enlisted men of the United States Navy other than those who are enlisted during minority shall

be four years.

That the term of enlistment of any enlisted man in the Navy may, by his voluntary written agreement, under such regulations as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy with the approval of the President, be extended for a period of either one, two, three, or four full years from the date of expiration of the then existing four-year term of enlistment, and subsequent to said date such enlisted men as extend the term of enlistment as authorized in this section shall be entitled to and shall receive the same pay and allowances in all respects as though regularly discharged and reenlisted immediately upon expiration of their term of enlistment, and such extension shall not operate to deprive them upon discharge at the termination thereof of any right, privilege, or benefit to which they would be entitled at the expiration of a four-year term of enlistment.—Act August 22, 1912.]

[That enlistments in the Navy and Marine Corps, during such time as the United States may be at war, shall be for four years or for such shorter period or periods as the President may prescribe, or for the period of the present

[DISCHARGE PRIOR TO EXPIRATION OF ENLISTMENT.— That under such regulations as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe, with the approval of the President any enlisted man may be discharged at any time within three months before the expiration of his term of enlistment or extended enlistment without prejudice to any right, privilege, or benefit that he would have received, except pay and allowances for the unexpired period not served, or to which he would thereafter become entitled, had he served his full term of enlistment or extended enlistment: *Provided*, That nothing in this act shall be held to reduce or increase the pay and allowances of enlisted men of the Navy now authorized pursuant to law.—Act August 22,

1912.]

[Furlough of enlisted men.—The Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to grant furlough without pay to enlisted men for a period covering the unexpired portion of their enlistment: *Provided*, That such furlough be granted under the same conditions and in lieu of discharge by purchase or by special order of the department. [APPOINTMENT AS MIDSHIPMEN.—Hereafter in addition

to the appointment of midshipmen to the United States Naval Academy, as now prescribed by law, the President is hereby allowed fifteen appointments annually instead of ten as now prescribed by law, and the Secretary of the Navy is allowed twenty-five appointments annually, instead of fifteen as now prescribed by law, the latter to be appointed from the enlisted men of the Navy who are citizens of the United States, and not more than twenty years of age on the date of entrance to the Naval Academy, and who shall have served not less than one year as enlisted men on the date of entrance: Provided. [Hereafter, in addition to the appointment of midshipmen to the United States Naval Academy, as now prescribed by law, the Secretary of the Navy is allowed one hundred appointments annually, instead of twentyfive as now prescribed by law, to be appointed from the enlisted men of the Navy who are citizens of the United States, and not more than twenty years of age on the date of entrance to the Naval Academy, and who shall have served not less than one year as enlisted men on the date of entrance: Provided, That such appointments shall be made in the order of merit from candidates who have, in competition with each other, passed the mental examination now or hereafter required by law for entrance to the Naval Academy, and who passed the physical examination before entrance under existing laws.—Act March 4, 1917.]

[That hereafter there shall be allowed at the United States Naval Academy five midshipmen for each Senator, Representative, and Delegate in Congress, one for Porto Rico, two for the District of Columbia, fifteen appointed each year at large, and one hundred appointed annually from enlisted men of the Navy, as now au-

thorized by law.
SEC. 2. That all Acts or parts of Acts inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed.

[TO MAKE GOOD TIME LOST ON ACCOUNT OF MISCON-DUCT.—Hereafter no officer or enlisted man in the Navy or Marine Corps in active service who shall be absent from duty on account of injury, sickness, or disease resulting from his own intemperate use of drugs or alcoholic liquors, or other misconduct, shall receive pay for the period of such absence, the time so absent and the cause thereof to be ascertained under such procedure and regulations as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy: Provided, That an enlistment shall not be regarded as complete until the enlisted man shall have made good any time in excess of one day lost on account of injury, sickness, or disease resulting from his own intemperate use of drugs or alcoholic liquors, or other misconduct.—

[ABSENCE WITHOUT LEAVE, PENALTY.—That the President is hereby authorized to drop from the rolls of the Navy or Marine Corps any officer thereof who is absent from duty without leave for a period of three months or more, or who, having been found guilty by the civil authorities of any offense, is finally sentenced to confinement in a State or Federal penitentiary: *Provided*, That no officer so dropped shall be eligible for reappointment.

[Section 1573 R. S. [Same.—That any enlisted man of the Navy or Marine Corps upon the retired list who has been ordered into active service since April sixth, nineteen hundred and seventeen, or who may hereafter be ordered into active service, shall be eligible for promotion and he shall be entitled to the pay and benefits of continuous service of such rank and for such length of time as he is or has been employed in active service, and when relieved of active service shall retain upon the retired list the rank and service held by him at the time of such relief, with the pay and allowances of such rank on the retired list; and the accounting officers of the Treasury are hereby directed to allow in the accounts of any enlisted man of the Navy or Marine Corps who resigned from the retired list in order to reenlist for appointment in a higher grade, the same continuous service pay and the benefits of such rank to which he may have been appointed upon reenlistment, as if his service had been continuous, and any difference in pay from the date of reenlistment shall be credited to his account.—Act July 1, 1918.]

That from and after the date of the approval of this act the active list of the line officers of the United States Marine Corps shall consist of one brigadier-general commandant, five colonels, five lieutenant-colonels, ten majors, sixty captains, sixty first lieutenants and sixty second lieutenants: Provided, That vacancies in all grades in the line created by this section shall be filled as far as possible by promotion by seniority from the line officers on the active list of said Corps: And provided further, That the commissions of officers now in the Marine Corps shall not be vacated by this act: And provided further, That vacancies in the grade of brigadier-general shall be filled by selection from officers on the active list of the Marine Corps not below the grade of

field officer.

[Increase in number of line officers.—That from and after the passage of this act, and in order to further increase the efficiency of the Marine Corps, the following additional officers, \* \* \* to those now provided by law for said corps, are hereby authorized and directed, namely: One colonel, one lieutenant-colonel, five majors, twelve captains, twenty-five first lieutenants, twelve second lieutenants.—Act March 3, 1903.]

[Same.—That from and after the passage of this act, and in order to further increase the efficiency of the United States Marine Corps, the following additional officers, \* \* \* to those now provided by law for said corps are hereby authorized and directed, namely: One major-general commandant, in lieu of the present brigadier-general commandant; one colonel; one lieutenant-colonel; two majors; eighteen captains; seven first lieutenants; fourteen second lieutenants.—Act May 13, 1908.]

[Same.—The rank and title of Major General is hereby created in the Marine Corps, and the President is authorized to nominate, and, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to appoint one Major General, who shall at all times be junior in rank to the Major General Commandant, and also one temporary Major General in the Marine Corps, who shall at all times be junior to the

permanent Major General.—Act July 1, 1918.]

APPOINTMENT OF COMMANDANT FOR FOUR YEARS.—That hereafter when a vacancy shall exist in the position of commandant of the Marine Corps the President may appoint to such position, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, an officer of the Marine Corps on the active list not below the grade of field officer, who shall hold office as such commandant for a term of four years, unless sooner relieved, and who, while so serving, shall have the rank, pay, and allowances of a major general in the Army; and any officer appointed under the provisions of this Act who shall be retired from the position of commandant of the Marine Corps, in accordance with the provisions of sections twelve hundred and fifty-one, sixteen hundred and twenty-two, sixteen hundred and twenty-three, Revised Statutes of the United States. or by reason of age or length of service, shall have the rank and retired pay of a major general; if retired for any other reason, he shall be placed on the retired list of officers of the grade to which he belonged at the time of his retirement: Provided, That an officer serving as commandant shall be carried as an additional number in his grade while so serving, and after his return to duty in his grade until said grade is reduced to the number authorized by law: Provided further, That nothing herein contained shall operate to increase or reduce the total number of officers in the Marine Corps now provided by law.—Act December 19. 1913.

[Number and rank of marine officers.—Hereafter the total number of commissioned officers of the active list of the line and staff of the Marine Corps, exclusive of officers borne on the Navy list as additional numbers, shall be four per centum of the total authorized enlisted strength of the active list of the Marine Corps, exclusive of the Marine Band, and of men under sentence of discharge by court-martial, distributed in the proportion of one officer with rank senior to colonel to four with the rank of colonel, to five with the rank of lieutenant colonel, to fourteen with the rank of major, to thirty-seven with the rank of captain, to thirty-one with the rank of first lieutenant, to thirty-one with the rank of second lieu-\* \* Provided further, That in determintenant: ing the officers with rank senior to colonel there shall be included the officer serving as major general commandant: And provided further, That appointments hereafter made to the position of major general commandant under the provisions of the Act approved December nineteenth, nineteen hundred and thirteen, entitled "An Act to make the tenure of office of the major general commandant of the Marine Corps for a term of four years," shall be made from officers of the active list of the Marine Corps not below the rank of colonel: Provided further, That the officers serving in the senior grade of the Adjutant and Inspector's, Quartermaster's, and Paymaster's Departments shall, while serving therein, have the rank, pay, and allowances of a brigadier general: And provided further, That for the purpose of determining the number of officers in the various ranks as herein provided such staff officers shall be counted as being of the rank of colonel: And further provided, That officers holding permanent appointments in the staff departments shall not be eligible for appointment to the grade of brigadier general of the line as hereinbefore provided.—Act August 29, 1916.]

[Marine warrant officers.—That the warrant grades of marine gunner and quartermaster clerk are hereby established, and the appointment as herein prescribed of twenty marine gunners and twenty quartermaster clerks is hereby authorized. Officers in those grades shall have the rank and receive the pay, allowances and privileges of retirement of warrant officers in the Navy. They shall be appointed from the noncommissioned officers of the Marine Corps and clerks to quartermasters now serving as such and who have performed field services.

ice.—Act August 29, 1916.]

[That the appointment of thirty marine gunners, thirty quartermaster's clerks, and nine clerks to assistant paymasters, additional to the number now prescribed by law \* \* \* is hereby authorized, such appointments to be made in the manner now provided by law.—Act

[That marine gunners and quartermaster clerks of the Marine Corps assigned to foreign shore service shall hereafter be entitled to the same increased compensation and under the same conditions as is now or hereafter allowed by law to commissioned officers of the Marine

[The title of clerks for assistant paymasters is hereby changed to pay clerk, who shall hereafter receive the same pay, allowances, and other benefits now provided by law for clerks for assistant paymasters; and the total number of pay clerks shall not exceed ten for duty in the office of the paymaster, Marine Corps, fifteen for duty in the paymaster's department at large, and one for each assistant paymaster: Provided, That nothing herein contained shall shall be construed to reduce the pay, allowances, or other benefits granted by existing law to any clerk for assistant paymaster now in service.—Act July 1, 1918.]

[Transfer of retired officers to active list.—The President is hereby authorized, within two years after the approval of this Act, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to transfer to the active list of the

Marine Corps or Navy Pay Corps any officer under fifty years of age who may have been transferred from the active list to the retired list of the Marine Corps or Navy Pay Corps by the action of any retiring board for physical disability incurred in the line of duty: Provided, That such officer shall be transferred to the place on the active list which he would have had if he had not been retired, and shall be carried as an additional number in the grade to which he may be transferred or at any time thereafter promoted: Provided further, That such officer shall establish to the satisfaction of the Secretary of the Navy his mental, moral, professional, and physical qualifications to perform the duties on the active list of the grade to which he is transferred.—Act August 29, 1916.]

RETIREMENT FOR CIVIL WAR SERVICE.—That officers of the Marine Corps with creditable records who served during the civil war shall, when retired, be retired in like manner and under the same conditions as provided for officers of the Navy who served during the civil war.—

Act April 27, 1904.]

Same.—That any officer of the Marine Corps below the grade of brigadier-general who served with credit as an officer or as an enlisted man in the regular or volunteer forces during the civil war prior to April ninth, eighteen hundred and sixty-five, otherwise than as a cadet, and whose name is borne on the official register of the Marine Corps, and who has heretofore been, or may hereafter be, retired on account of wounds or disability incident to the service, or on account of age or after forty years' service, may, in the discretion of the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate be placed on the retired list of the Marine Corps with the rank and retired pay of one grade above that actually held by him, at the time of retirement: Provided, That this act shall not apply to any officer who received an advance of grade since the date of his retirement or who has been restored to the Marine Corps and placed on the retired list by virtue of the provisions of a special act of Congress. Act June 29, 1906.1

Sec. 19. That the vacancies existing in said Corps after the promotions and appointments herein provided for shall be filled by the President from time to time, whenever the actual needs of the naval service require it, first, from the graduates of the Naval Academy in the manner now provided by law; or, second, from those who are serving or who have served as second lieutenants in the Marine Corps during the war with Spain; or, third, from meritorious noncommissioned officers of the Marine Corps; or, fourth, from civil life: Provided, That after said vacancies are once filled there shall be no further appointments from civil life.

[FILLING OF VACANCIES.—That the vacancies now existing in the line and the staff departments of the Marine Corps and those created by this act below the grade of

brigadier-general shall be filled, respectively, first by promotion by seniority and then by selection and appointment as now provided by law excepting that vacancies in the grade of second lieutenant shall be filled first, as far as practicable, from graduates of the Naval Academy each year on completing the prescribed course at the Naval Academy, exclusive of the probationary tour of sea service before final graduation, then from meritorious noncommissioned officers and from civil life between the ages of twenty-one and twenty-seven years.—Act March 3, 1903.]

[Same.—That the vacancies now existing in the line and staff departments of the United States Marine Corps and those created by this act shall be filled in the manner

provided by law.—Act May 13, 1908.]

[Same.—That brigadier generals shall be appointed from officers of the Marine Corps senior in rank to lieutenant colonel: Provided further, That the promotion to the grade of brigadier general of any officer now or hereafter carried as an additional number in the grade or with the rank of colonel shall be held to fill a vacancy in

the grade of brigadier general: \* \* \*

[That for the purpose of advancement in rank to and including the grade of colonel, all commissioned officers of the line and staff of the Marine Corps shall be placed on a common list in the order of seniority each would hold had he remained continuously in the line. All advancements in rank to captain, major, lieutenant colonel, and colonel shall, subject to the usual examinations, be made from officers with the next junior respective rank, whether of the line or staff, in the order in which their

names appear on said list.

[Appointees to the grade of second lieutenant, if appointed from civil life, shall be between the ages of twenty and twenty-five years, and before receiving a commission in the Marine Corps, each appointee shall establish to the satisfaction of the Secretary of the Navy his mental, physical, moral, and professional qualifications for such commission: Provided, That the President of the United States be, and hereby is, authorized, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to appoint as second lieutenants on the active list in the United States Marine Corps, to take rank at the foot of the list of second lieutenants as it stands at the date of reinstatement, former officers of the Marine Corps who resigned from the naval service in good standing: Provided, That they shall establish their normal, physical, mental, and professional qualifications to perform the duties of that grade to the satisfaction of the Secretary of the Navy: Provided further, That the Secretary of the Navy, in his discretion, may waive the age limit in favor of the aforesaid former officers of the Marine Corps: Provided further, That the prior service of such officers and the service after reinstatement shall be not less than thirty years before the

That appointments from noncommisage of retirement. sioned officers of the Marine Corps and from civil life shall be for a probationary period of two years and may be revoked at any time during that period by the Secretary of the Navy: Provided further, That the rank of such officers of the same date of appointment among themselves at the end of said probationary period shall, with the approval of the Secretary of the Navy, be determined by the report of a board of Marine officers who shall conduct a competitive professional examination under such rules as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy and the rank of such officers so determined shall be as of date of original appointment with reference to other appointments to the Marine Corps: Provided further, That no midshipman at the United States Naval Academy or cadet at the United States Military Academy who fails to graduate therefrom shall be eligible for appointment as a commissioned officer in the Marine Corps until after the graduation of the class of which he was a member.—Act August 29, 1916.]

SEC. 20. That no person except such officers or former graduates of the Naval Academy as have served in the war with Spain, as hereinbefore provided for, shall be appointed a commissioned officer in the Marine Corps who is under twenty or over thirty years of age; and that no person shall be appointed a commissioned officer in said corps until he shall have passed such examination as may be prescribed by the President of the United States, except graduates of the Naval Academy, as above provided. That the officers of the Marine Corps above the grade of captain, except brigadier-general, shall, before being promoted, be subjected to such physical, mental, and moral examination as is now, or may hereafter be, prescribed by law for other officers of the Marine

[PROMOTION OF MARINE OFFICER PHYSICALLY INCA-PACITATED FOR DUTIES AT SEA.—The provisions of sections fourteen hundred and ninety-three and fourteen hundred and ninety-four of the Revised Statutes of the United States shall apply to the Marine Corps.—Act August 29, 1916.]

[Professional failure of officer examined for promotion.—In lieu of suspension from promotion of any officer of the Marine Corps who hereafter fails to pass a satisfactory professional examination for promotion, or who is now under suspension from promotion by reason of such failure, such officer shall suffer loss of numbers, upon approval of the recommendation of the examining board, in the respective ranks, as follows: Lieutenant colonel, one; major, two; captain, three; first lieutenant, five; second lieutenant, eight: Provided That any such officer shall be reexamined as soon as may be expedient

after the expiration of six months if he in the meantime again becomes due for promotion, and if he does not in the meantime again become due for promotion he shall be reexamined at such time anterior to again becoming due for promotion as may be for the best interests of the service: Provided further, That if any such officer fails to pass a satisfactory professional reexamination he shall be honorably discharged with one year's pay from the Marine Corps.—Act August 29, 1916.]

That the vacancies created by this act in the quartermaster's department of said corps shall be filled, first by promotion according to seniority of the officers in this department, and then by selection from the line officers on the active list of said corps not below the grade of first lieutenant: Provided, That all vacancies hereafter occurring in the staff of the Marine Corps shall be filled first by promotion according to seniority of the officers in their respective departments, and then by selection from officers of the line on the active list, as hereinbefore provided for.

[STAFF OF THE MARINE CORPS.—That from and after the passage of this act, and in order to further increase the efficiency of the Marine Corps, the following additional officers, \* \* \* to those row provided by law for said corps, are hereby authorized and directed, namely: \* \* \* one assistant adjutant and inspector with the rank of lieutenant-colonel, two assistant adjutants and inspectors with the rank of major, one assistant quartermaster, with the rank of lieutenant-colonel, five assistant quartermasters with the rank of captain, one assistant paymaster with the rank of lieutenant-colonel, one assistant paymaster with the rank of captain, \* \* \*: Provided, That the vacancies now existing in the line and the staff departments of the Marine Corps and those created by this act below the grade of brigadier-

general shall be filled, respectively, first by promotion oy seniority and then by selection and appointment as now provided by law, excepting that vacancies in the grade of second lieutenant shall be filled first, as far as practicable, from graduates of the Naval Academy each year on completing the prescribed course at the Naval Academy, exclusive of the probationary tour of sea service before final graduation, then from meritorious noncommissioned officers and from civil life between the ages of twenty-one and twenty-seven years: Provided, That the commissions of officers now in the Marine Corps shall not be vacated by this act: And provided further, That officers selected for appointment to fill vacancies in the grade of field officers in any of the staff departments shall be taken from officers on the active list not below the grade of captain and who have seen not less than seven years' service as commissioned officers in the Marine Corps. And that appointments to the grade of captain in any of the staff departments shall be made from officers on the active list of the Marine Corps not below the grade of first lieutenant.—Act March 3, 1903.]

[Same.—That from and after the passage of this act, and in order to further increase the efficiency of the United States Marine Corps, the following additional officers, \* \* \* those now provided by law for said corps are hereby authorized and directed, namely: \* \* \* one assistant adjutant and inspector, with the rank of lieutenant-colonel; one assistant quartermaster, with the rank of lieutenant-colonel; one assistant quartermaster, with the rank of major, and three assistant quartermasters, with the rank of captain; one assistant paymaster, with the rank of major; one assistant paymaster, with the rank of major; one assistant paymaster,

with the rank of captain; \* \* \*

[That the vacancies now existing in the line and staff departments of the United States Marine Corps and those created by this act shall be filled in the manner

provided by law.—Act May 13, 1908.]

[Same.—That the officers serving in the senior grade of the Adjutant and Inspector's, Quartermaster's, and Paymaster's Departments shall, while serving therein, have the rank, pay, and allowances of a brigadier general: And provided further, That for the purpose of determining the number of officers in the various ranks as herein provided such staff officers shall be counted as being of the rank of colonel: And provided further, That officers holding permanent appointments in the staff departments shall not be eligible for appointment to the grade of brigadier general of the line as hereinbefore provided.

The total commissioned personnel of the active list of the staff departments, whether serving therein under permanent appointments or under temporary detail, as herein provided, shall be eight per centum of the authorized commissioned strength of the Marine Corps, and of this total one-fifth shall constitute the adjutant and inspector's department, one-fifth the paymaster's department, and three-fifths the quartermaster's department.

No further permanent appointments shall be made in any grade in any staff department. Any vacancy hereafter occurring in the lower grade of any staff department shall be filled by the detail of an officer of the line for a period of four years unless sooner relieved; any vacancy hereafter occurring in the upper grade of any staff department shall be filled by the appointment of an officer with the rank of colonel holding a permanent appointment in the staff department in which the vacancy exists, or of some other officer holding a permanent appointment in such staff department in case there be no permanent staff officer with the rank of colonel in that department, or of a colonel of the line in case there be no officer holding a permanent appointment in such staff department. Such appointments shall be made by the President and be for a term of four years, and the officer so appointed shall be recommissioned in the grade to which appointed.

Sec. 23. That the enlisted force of the Marine Corps shall consist of five sergeant majors, one drum major, twenty quartermaster sergeants, seventy-two gunnery ser-



geants with the rank and allowance of the first sergeant, and whose pay shall be thirty-five dollars per month; sixty first sergeants; two hundred and forty sergeants; four hundred and eight corporals; eighty drummers; eighty trumpeters; and four thousand nine hundred and sixty-two privates.

[Same.—That from and after the passage of this act, and in order to further increase the efficiency of the Marine Corps, the following additional \* \* \* non-commissioned officers, drummers, trumpeters, and privates to those now provided by law for said corps, are hereby authorized and directed, namely: \* \* \* one sergeant-major, forty quartermaster-sergeants, twelve first sergeants, sixty-five sergeants, fifty-five corporals, ten drummers, ten trumpeters, and five hundred and twenty-seven privates.—Act March 31, 1903.]

[Same.—That from and after the passage of this act, and in order to further increase the efficiency of the United States Marine Corps, the following additional \* \* noncommissioned officers, drummers, trumpeters, and privates to those now provided by law for said corps are hereby authorized and directed, namely: \* \* \* two sergeant-majors; fifteen quartermaster-sergeants, five of whom are to serve in the pay department; twenty first sergeants; fifty sergeants; one hundred and twenty-five corporals; ten drummers; ten trumpeters; and five hundred and eighteen privates: Provided, That hereafter the number of enlisted men in the United States Marine Corps shall be such as the Congress may from time to time authorize.—Act May 13, 1908.]

[Same.—Pay of enlisted men, active list: Pay of non-commissioned officers, musicians, and privates, as prescribed by law, and for the following additional enlisted men hereby authorized: Four sergeants major, four quartermaster sergeants, twelve first sergeants, four gunnery sergeants, eighteen sergeants, thrity-five corporals, four drummers, four trumpeters, and three hundred and

fifteen privates.—Act August 22, 1912.]

[Same.—That the number of gunnery sergeants heretofore authorized is increased by twenty; that the number of sergeants heretofore authorized is increased by twenty; that the number of corporals heretofore authorized is increased by seventy; and that the number of privates heretofore authorized is decreased by one hundred and ten.—Act March 3, 1915.]

[That the authorized enlisted strength of the active list of the Marine Corps is hereby temporarily increased from seventeen thousand four hundred to seventy-five thousand five hundred, this authorized strength being distributed in the various grades of the enlisted force in the same proportion as those authorized at the date of the approval of this Act: Provided, That not more than twenty-five per centum of the authorized number of privates in the Marine Corps shall have the rank of private, first class, which rank is hereby established in the Marine Corps.—Act July 1, 1918.]

SEC. 24. [Marine Band.—That the band of the United States Marine Corps shall consist of one leader, whose pay and allowances shall be those of a captain in the Marine Corps; one second leader, whose pay shall be \$150 per month and who shall have the allowances of a sergeant major; ten principal musicians, whose pay shall be \$125 per month; twenty-five first-class musicians, whose pay shall be \$100 per month; twenty second-class musicians, whose pay shall be \$85 per month; and ten third-class musicians, whose pay shall be \$70 per month; such musicians of the band to have the allowances of a sergeant and to have no increase in the rates of pay on account of length of service: *Provided*, That a member of the said band shall not, as an individual, furnish music, or accept

an engagement to furnish music, when such furnishing of music places him in competition with any civilian musician or musicians, and shall not accept or receive remuneration for furnishing music except under special circumstances when authorized by the President.—Act August 29, 1916.]

Sec. 25. That the oath of allegiance now provided for the officers and men of the Army and Marine Corps shall be administered hereafter to the officers and men of the

Navv.

SEC. 26. That all acts and parts of acts, so far as they conflict with the provisions of this act, are hereby repealed.

Act of March 3, 1893, authorized the building of one submarine torpedo boat. This was the original Plunger, which was contracted for with the Holland Torpodo Boat Co., March 13, 1895. Act of August 22, 1912, provided for eight submarine torpedo boats in an amount not exceeding \$4.480.000 in the aggregate, and \$1,600,000 is appropriated toward said purpose. Under this act contract was made with the Electric Boat Co. for five submarine boets and with the Lake Torpedo Boat Co. for three boats. Act of March 4, 1913, provided for four submarine torpedo boats in an amount not exceeding \$2,478,368 in the aggregate, and \$1,294,912 appropriated toward said purpose. One of the vessels provided for by this act, No. 49 (L-4) at submarines obtained from the Lake Torpedo Boat Co. at a compensation to the company of \$52,700. Contracts were made with the Electric Boat Co. for the construction of the other three boats, No. 49 (L-9) at \$335,000, No. 50 (L-10) at \$335,000, and No. 51 (L-11) at \$322,000.

Act of June 30, 1914, provided for eight or more submarines in an amount not exceeding \$4,460,000 in the aggregate, and \$1,825,000 appropriated toward said purpose. The appropriation of \$100,000 made in the naval act approved March 4, 1913, for testing and wrecking pontoon for submarines, to be available until expended, is made available until expended for the construction of said eight or more submarines. Contracts were made with the Electric Boat Co. for four of these boats—No. 52, the Schley, now AA-1, (seagoing type), at \$1,350,000, Nos. 53, 54, and 55 (N-1, N-2, and N-3) at \$450,000 each; Nos. 55 to be built by the Fore River Shipbuilding Corporation, Quincy, Mass., as subcontractor.

Contracts were made with the Lake Torpedo Boat Co. for the other four boats, Nos. 55, 57, 58, and 59 (N-4, N-5, N-6, and N-7), at \$427,000 each. All four of these vessels were built at Bridgeport, Coun., by the Lake company itself.

Act of March 3, 1915, provided for two submarines of seagoing type and

Act of March 4, 1917, provides for 20 further coast submarines as follows:

"In addition to the eighteen submarines hereinbefore appropriated for, the Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized and directed to proceed at once to cause to be constructed twenty coast submarines to have a surface displacement of about eight hundred tons each at a cost not to exceed \$1,300,000 each, exclusive of armor and armament, on the most approved lines according to plans and specifications to be provided or adopted by the Secretary of the Navy. The same may be let by contract to private builders or constructed by the Government in navy yards, or both, as may be directed by the Secretary of the Navy. Said twenty submarines shall be constructed on the Pacific coast: Provided, That the cost of construction on the Pacific coast does not exceed the cost of construction on the Atlantic coast plus the cost of transportation from the Atlantic to the Pacific. Eighteen million dollars is hereby appropriated toward the construction of said submarines."

In the act of August 29, 1916, covering the three-year program, there were 58 coast submarines authorized and 9 fleet submarines. This act authorized the beginning of the construction, during the fiscal year 1917, of 30 coast submarines. The act of March 4, 1917, provided for beginning construction, during the fiscal year 1918, of 18 coast submarines, making a total of 48 of the 58 coast submarines, and leaving 10 coast submarines and 9 fleet submarines, which were specifically authorized in the act of July 1, 1918, to be begun by June 30, 1919, under the provision reading as follows:

"Of the vessels authorized to be constructed prior to July 1, 1919, in the "Act making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1917, and for other purposes," approved August 29, 1916, the construction of which has not heretofore specifically been directed to be begu



# [Furnished by the Bureau of Supplies and Accounts, Navy Department.]

The necessity for maximum steaming radius and compact design in boilers with limited combustion spaces requires that special care be exercised in the selection of suitable coals for naval use affoat. An acceptable list of mines known to produce coal which is satisfactory for the purpose is kept, and, in addition to the general characteristics of the mine from which the coal is furnished being known, each delivery must meet the following specifications:

Coal to be best quality steaming semibituminous, run of mine, with at least 40 per cent lump, suitable and acceptable for the uses of the naval service.

Coal must be dry and practically free from state, dirt, sulphur, and other impurities, subject to the usual inspection and test, and must weigh 2,240 pounds per ton, the weight to be determined in a manner satisfactory to the Government.

With reference to the quality of fuel oil and gasoline required for the naval service, the following specifications are furnished:

### FUEL OIL.

(a) Fuel oil shall be a hydrocarbon oil of best quality, free from grit, acid, and (d) Fuel on small be a hydrocarbon oil of best quanty, free from grit, and shall, if required by the Navy Department, be strained by being drawn through filters of wire gauze having 16 meshes to the inch. The clearance through the strainer shall be at least twice the area of the suction pipe, and strainers shall be in duplicate.

(b) The unit of quantity to be the barrel of 42 gallons of 231 cubic inches at a standard temperature of 60° F. For every decrease or increase of temperature of 10° F. (or proportion thereof) from the standard 0.4 or 1 per cent (or prepared percentage) shall

be added or deducted from the measured or gauged quantity for correction.

(c) The flash point shall not be lower than 150° F. as a minimum (Abel or Pennsky-Marten's closed cup) or 175° F. (Tagliabue open cup). In case of oils having a

viscosity greater than 8 Engler at 150° F., the flash point (closed cup) shall not be below the temperature at which the oil has a viscosity of 8 Engler.

(d) Viscosity shall not be greater than 40 Engler at 70° F.
(e) Water and sediment not over 1 per cent. If in excess of 1 per cent, the excess to be subtracted from the volume; or the oil may be rejected.

(f) Sulphur not over 1.5 per cent.

Note.—If the Engler viscosimeter is not available, the Saybolt standard universal viscosimeter may be used. Equivalent viscosities: 8 Engler=300 seconds Saybolt; 40 Engler=1,500 seconds Saybolt.

#### GASOLINE.

Gasoline to be high grade, refined, and free from water and all impurities, and shall have a vapor tension not greater than 10 pounds per square inch at 100° F. temperature, same to be determined in accordance with the current "Rules and Regulations for the Transportation of Explosives and other Dangerous Articles by Freight" as issued by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

A minor must be at least 62 inches tall and weigh 110 pounds, increasing proportionately with age and height.

# THE LOCKS.

There are six double locks in the canal, three pairs in flight at Gatun, with a combined lift of 85 feet; one pair at Pedro Miguel, with a lift of 30½ feet; and two pairs at Miraflores, with a combined lift of 54½ feet at mean tide. The dimensions of all are the same—a usable length of 1,000 feet and a usable width of 110 feet. Each lock is a chamber, with walls and floor of concrete and water-tight gates at each end.

#### OTHER INFORMATION.

No vessel is permitted to enter or pass through the locks under its own power. Electricity is used to tow all vessels into and through the locks and to operate all gates and valves, power being generated by water turbines from the head created by Gatun Lake.

The entire length of the canal from deep water in the Atlantic to deep water in

the Pacific is about 50 miles. Its length on land is about 41 miles.

In passing through from the Atlantic to the Pacific, a vessel enters a channel with a bottom width of 500 feet in Limon Bay, follows this for about 7 miles to Gatun, where it enters a series of three locks in flight and is lifted 85 feet to the level of Gatun Lake. It can sail at full ocean speed through this lake, in a channel varying from 1,000 to 500 feet in width, for a distance of about 24 miles, to Bas Obispo, where it enters the Gaillard Cut. It then sails through the cut, a distance of about 9 miles, in a channel with a bottom width of 300 feet, to Pedro Miguel. There it enters a lock and is lowered 301 feet to a small lake at an elevation of 542 feet above sea level, and sails through this for about 1½ miles, to Miraflores. There it enters two locks in series and is lowered to sea level, passing out into the Pacific through a channel about 8½ miles in length, with a bottom width of 500 feet. The depth of the approach channel in the Atlantic side, where the tidal oscillation does not exceed 1½ feet, is 41 feet at mean tide; and on the Pacific side, where the maximum oscillation is 23 feet, the depth is 45 feet at mean tide.

Vessels' tolls have been changed from time to time since 1894, when the maximum

rate of 13 francs (\$2.51) per ton net register was put in force.

The Suez Canal Co. decided to increase the tolls, on and after October 5, 1916, to the extent of 50 centimes per ton, making the rate for laden ships 7.25 francs, and for ships in ballast 4.75 francs a ton.

After January 1, 1898, the canal tolls for vessels in ballast was 8.50 francs.

The maritime movement of the Suez Canal during 1917 totaled 2,353 transits, representing a net total of 8,368,918 tons. In comparison to 1916 these figures show a decrease of 757 transits or 3,956,429 tons, a 32.10 per cent decrease from the previous year. Compared to 1913, the latest year during which normal conditions prevailed, the 1917 figures show a decrease of 58.23 per cent. Categorical details as to classes of vessels are as follows:

A point worthy of notice is the increase in transits and tonnage of Government and Government chartered vessels owing to war measures. It is no longer possible to determine, as in the past, when Government vessels were distinctly separate from merchant vessels, the general commercial trend in canal transits.

The number of vessels transiting the canal in 1917 which drew the maximum of 30 feet was only one-sixth of 1 per cent of the total number of ships passing through,

while in 1913, 50 per cent of vessels transiting drew over 27 feet 1½ inches.

The average time of transit has steadily increased since 1913. The average transit time for 1913, which was 16 hours 19 minutes, increased to 19 hours 12 minutes in 1916, and averaged in 1917, 18 hours 10 minutes. The increase in time of transit is due to regulations imposed by the military authorities, and delays at the new military canal port of Kantara.

The total number of passengers passing through the canal during 1917 amounted to 142,313, against 283,030 for 1916 and 282,235 for 1913.

The increase in toll charges for 1917 compensated to a certain degree for the dimi-

The increase in toll charges for 1917 compensated to a certain degree for the diminution in number of transits. The charge of \$0.193 made in 1916 was again increased by \$0.241 per ton in 1917. The said increase was put into effect in two installments, namely, \$0.096 from January 1, 1917, on, and \$0.144 from July 1, 1917, on, the total increase thus being \$0.434 per ton. This brought the toll charge up to 8 francs 50 centimes, or \$1.64, an increase of 36 per cent over prewar tolls.

Maintenance work comprising dredging and bank excavation work amounted to 2,917,104 cubic yards, as compared to 3,373,052 cubic yards in 1916. Of the 1917 total, 1,184,473 cubic yards were dredged at Port Said, representing a saving in dredging in that harbor of 1,382,626 cubic yards over 1916. Dredging in the canal, on the other hand, showed an increase of 946,689 cubic yards. The lengthening of the ietty is solely responsible for the saving in dredging at Port Said. This may be the jetty is solely responsible for the saving in dredging at Port Said. This may be seen by the following figures, showing that in 1913, 4,394,300 cubic meters (5,747,492 cubic yards), while in 1917 the amount has decreased to 905,600 cubic meters (1,184,472 cubic yards).

Improvements continued in the shape of the prolonging of the western jetty at Port Said and the usual canal dredging. The benefit derived from the construction of the jetty in question has become more and more apparent, and all future lengthening will now be continued at a slower pace, owing to the increase in the prices of construction materials. Certain new quarries in the vicinity of the canal are being

used to advantage in this respect.

A feature of the canal is the military depot at Kantara (between Ismalia and Port Said). Three bridges for military purposes have been constructed there, thus linking Egypt and Palestine by railway and road.

8. Midshipmen.—'The pay of midshipmen shall hereafter be six hundred dollars per annum while at the Naval Academy and one thousand four hundred dollars per annum after graduation from the Naval Academy." (Act May 13, 1908.)

(a) Midshipmen on sea duty or shore duty beyond the continental limits of the United States are not entitled to the 10 per cent additional pay allowed by act of May 13, 1908, to commissioned officers of the Navy for such duty. (Comp. Dec., June 13, 1908.)

Midshipmen are entitled to one ration, or to commutation therefor, at all times.

9. Acting assistant surgeons.—An acting assistant surgeon appointed by authority of the act of May 4, 1898 (30 Stat., 380), is entitled to the same pay and allowances as an assistant surgeon of like length of service. (Reversing all Comptroller's decisions and decision of the Court of Claims, Jan. 29, 1906, relative to compensation of acting

assistant surgeons.) (Dec. of Supreme Court, Apr. 1, 1912.)

(a) Rations.—Acting assistant surgeons when attached to and doing duty aboard a seagoing vessel are entitled to rations or commutation therefor. (Comp. Dec., June 8,

1909; June 10, 1912.)

(b) An acting assistant surgeon discharged from the service and ordered to his home is entitled to mileage at the rate of 4 cents per mile for the travel so performed. (Navy personnel act Mar. 3, 1899 (30 Stat., 1004); Army appropriation act Mar. 2 (31 Stat., 895, 902) and decision of the Supreme Court, No. 177, Plummer v. United

States.) (Comp. Dec., Apr. 29, 1912.)
10. Pay, longevity.—"There shall be allowed and paid to each commissioned officer below the rank of rear admiral ten per centum of his current yearly pay for each term of five years' service in the Army, Navy, and Marine Corps. The total amount of such increase for length of service shall in no case exceed forty per centum on the yearly pay of the grade as provided by law: Provided, That the annual pay of captain shall not exceed five thousand dollars per annum; of commander four thousand five hundred dollars per annum; and of lieutenant commander four thousand dollars per annum." (Act May 13, 1908.)

(a) All officers appointed to the active list of the Navy from civil life on or prior to March 3, 1913, receive, for purposes of pay, a credit of five years' constructive service; those appointed since March 3, 1913, do not receive this credit.

(b) In computing the pay of midshipmen, those appointed on or prior to March 3, 1913, receive credit for service at the Naval Academy; those appointed since March 3, 1913, do not receive this credit.

(c) In computing longevity pay, active duty in the Naval Reserve Force is counted. (Comp. Dec., Oct. 16, 1917.)

(d) An officer of the former Engineer Corps of the Navy who performed sufficient active duty subsequent to retirement to have constructively promoted him to the grade

of lieutenant is entitled under act of August 29, 1916, to the pay and allowances of that grade while on active duty. (Comp. Dec., Aug. 17, 1917.)

11. Pay, increase for sea and foreign duty.—"All officers on sea duty and all officers on shore duty beyond the continental limits of the United States shall while so serving receive ten per centum additional of their salaries and increase as above provided, and such increase shall commence from the date of reporting for duty on board ship

or the date of sailing from the United States for shore duty beyond the seas or to join a ship in foreign waters." (Act May 13, 1908.)

(a) This provision applies only to commissioned officers receiving pay at rates provided by act May 13, 1908 (Comp. Dec., June 13, 1908), except that rear admirals, while serving in command (or second in command) of a fleet, do not receive 10 per cent

(b) Commissioned officers attached to and doing duty aboard receiving ships are entitled to the additional 10 per cent for sea service. (Comp. Dec., July 13, 1908.)

(d) The law makes no provision for 10 per cent increase in naval officers' pay while

traveling from shore duty beyond seas to join a vessel in foreign waters, or vice versa.

(e) Commissioned officers on duty at the Naval Academy ordered to "special temporary duty" on a vessel for practice cruise with midshipmen are entitled to the 10

(f) An officer quartered and performing paramount duty on a receiving ship is entitled to 10 per cent additional. (Comp. Dec., Nov. 22, 1911.)

(g) An officer detached from shore duty and ordered to take passage on a specified date for duty beyond seas is, during the interim, entitled to shore duty pay. (Comp. Dec., Feb. 14, 1912.)

(h) Officer attached to and doing duty on board submarine, although living ashore, is entitled to 10 per cent additional for sea duty. (Comp. Dec., Jan. 12, 1916.)

(i) An officer detached from shore duty beyond seas and ordered home continues to be entitled to the additional 10 per cent of his pay until his arrival in the United States. (Decision of the Court of Claims, Feb. 13, 1911.)

(i) Officers of the Navy while serving on shore duty beyond seas are entitled while on leave taken abroad to 10 per cent additional pay provided for such duty. (Comp.

Dec., Mar. 29, 1913.)

(k) An officer detached from shore duty beyond seas and ordered to his home, with permission to delay en route, is entitled to the 10 per cent increase authorized by the act of May 13, 1908, until his return to the United States. (Dec. of Court of Claims,

31159, Apr. 14, 1913.)
(I) Naval officers are entitled to the 10 per cent additional for shore duty beyond seas while on duty in the Canal Zone, Panama, Hawaii, and Porto Rico. (Comp. Dec.,

July 23, 1915.)



(m) An officer ordered from shore duty beyond seas to temporary duty in the United States is not entitled to 10 per cent additional during the period of temporary duty. (Comp. Dec., Jan. 17, 1916.)

(n) An officer ordered from foreign shore duty to duty on board a vessel in United States port is entitled to 10 per cent additional to date of return to the United States.

(Comp. Dec., Nov. 20, 1916.)

(o) An officer detached from one sea duty and under orders to proceed and proceeding to another sea duty is not entitled to the 10 per cent additional pay provided for

sea service. (Comp. Dec., Jan. 10, 1914.)
(p) An officer of the Navy is not entitled to 10 per cent increase of pay while returning from sea duty in foreign waters to the United States either to shore duty therein

or under orders to join another ship in home waters. (Comp. Dec., July 22, 1913.)

(a) Commissioned officers on sea duty ordered to hospital for treatment without orders granting sick leave or detaching them from duty are entitled to a continuance of 10 per cent additional pay received for sea duty. (Comp. Dec., May 15, 1909.)

(r) An officer attached to a seagoing vessel while on special temporary duty away from his ship under orders expressly imposing upon him the continued discharge of his sea duties is entitled to the 10 per cent additional pay received for sea duty. (Comp. Dec., Jan. 20, 1910.)

(s) An officer attached to a seagoing vessel while on special temporary duty away from his ship under orders which do not have the effect of detaching him from his sea duties is entitled to the 10 per cent additional pay received for sea duty. (Comp. Dec., Feb. 23, 1910.)

(t) An officer detached from sea duty beyond seas and directed to proceed to his home is not entitled to the 10 per cent increase in pay while so en route. The right to the 10 per cent additional pay for sea service ceases on the date of the officer's detachment. (Comp. Dec., June 30, 1911.)

(u) An officer temporarily absent from sea duty and performing duty ashore under orders practically relieving him from all duty aboard his ship is not entitled to the additional 10 per cent while performing such shore duty. (Comp. Dec., June 30, 1909;

see also Comp. Dec., Nov. 26, 1909.)

(v) An officer who reports for duty on board a vessel of the Navy the second day following his detachment from another vessel is not entitled to the 10 per cent additional pay for sea duty for the one day when he was neither in the status of an officer on sea duty nor of an officer detailed for shore duty beyond seas. (Comp. Dec., Apr. 23, 1910.)

(w) An officer of the Navy ordered to embark on board a naval vessel for duty with a marine expedition and who is not regularly attached to said vessel is not entitled to the 10 per cent additional for sea duty while taking passage thereon. (Comp.

Dec., Apr. 9, 1915.)

(x) An officer detached from a ship in foreign waters and ordered to duty at a foreign station is not entitled to 10 per cent additional for sea duty while en route to his new duty on board a Government vessel. (Comp. Dec., June 30, 1916.)

(y) An officer ordered to settle his accounts on board the vessel from which he was detached is not entitled to sea pay for period of such settlement. (Comp. Dec.,

July 27, 1916.)
12. Pay, aviation duty.—"Hereafter officers of the Navy and Marine Corps appointed student naval aviators, while lawfully detailed for duty involving actual flying in aircraft, including balloons, dirigibles, and aeroplanes, shall receive the pay and allowances of their rank and service plus thirty-five per centum increase thereof; and those officers who have heretofore qualified, or may hereafter qualify, as naval aviators, under such rules and regulations as have been or may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy, shall, while lawfully detailed for duty involving actual flying in aircraft, receive the pay and allowances of their rank and service plus fifty per centum increase thereof. Hereafter enlisted men of the Navy or Marine Corps, while detailed for duty involving actual flying in aircraft, shall receive the pay and the permanent additions thereto, including allowances, of their rating and service or rank and service, as the case may be, plus fifty per centum increase thereof: Provided. nor shall any officer in the Navy senior in rank to commander nor any officer in the Marine Corps senior in rank to major receive any increase in pay or allowances by reason of such detail or duty." (Act May 3, 1915.) "That hereafter the allowances of officers, enlisted men, and student flyers of the naval service shall in no case

be increased by reason of the performance of aviation duty." (Act July 1, 1918.)
(a) The term "pay and allowances" as used in the act of March 4, 1913, providing an increase of 35 per cent to officers of the Navy detailed for aviation duty, includes

mileage. (Comp. Dec., May 9, 1913.)

(b) An officer detailed for aviation duty is entitled to the increased pay authorized by the act of March 4, 1913, from the date of the issuance to him of orders for such duty he was engaged in actual flying when the orders were issued. (Comp. Dec., Apr. 14, 1913.)

(c) Officers properly detailed for aviation duty and who while on duty are actual flyers of heavier-than-air craft are entitled to the increased pay provided by law while on authorized leave of absence. (Comp. Dec., Aug. 14, 1914; Jan. 4, 1916.)

(d) Student flyers for instruction and training in aeronautics shall receive the same pay and allowances as a midshipman at the Naval Academy. (Act. Aug. 29, 1916.)

(e) Student flyers shall, after receiving certificate of qualification as an aviator for actual flying in aircraft, rank with midshipmen and shall receive the same pay and allowances as midshipmen plus 50 per cent thereof. (Act Aug. 29, 1916.)

(f) An officer of the Navy detailed as a student aviator who, due to circumstances beyond his control, is prevented during a certain period from performing duty involving actual flying is not entitled for the period in question to the additional pay (35

per cent) provided for such duty. (Comp. Dec., Aug. 8, 1917.)

(g) In computing additional pay allowed enlisted men on duty involving actual flying in aircraft, the flat base increase provided by act of May 22, 1917, is not to be (Comp. Dec., Aug. 23, 1917. included.

13. Aeronautic section, Naval Militia (act Mar. 3, 1915).—Officers and enlisted men of the aeronautic sections of Naval Militia are entitled to increased pay while engaged in actual service or instruction with aircraft involving actual flying. (Comp. Dec.,

Nov. 7, 1916.)

14. Leave pay.—All commissioned officers receive while on leave the full pay of their grade as established by the act of May 13, 1908, for leave authorized by statute; and fer leave in excess of "statutory leave," one-half such full pay, or in the case of officers commissioned prior to May 13, 1908, the rate of leave pay in effect prior to that date, if greater. (Op. Atty. Gen., Apr. 5, 1909; Comp. Dec., Apr. 16, 1909; May 26, 1909; act May 13, 1908.)

(a) Officers on leave of absence from sea duty are not while on such leave entitled

(a) Officers on leave of absence from sea duty are not while on such leave entitled

to the 10 per cent additional pay. (Comp. Dec., Apr. 24, 1909.)

(b) In computing the leave allowance for graduates of the Naval Academy credit should not be given for service prior to date of commission. (Comp. Dec., June 25, 1913.)

15. Pay, sick.—All commissioned officers of the Navy other than those whose pay is fixed by section 1556, Revised Statutes, suffer no change in pay on account of absence due to sickness or wounds or when lawfully absent from duty, with the exception of the 10 per cent increase of pay for sea duty. (N. R. 4411.)

(a) Commissioned officers on sea duty ordered to a hospital for treatment without orders detaching them from duty are entitled to a continuance of 10 per cent addi-

tional pay received for sea duty. (Comp. Dec., May 15, 1909.)

 (b) Absence from duty, officer, due to own misconduct, etc., see full text under "Pay, enlisted men—Navy—General provisions," paragraph 8.
 16. Pay on furlough.—Officers on furlough shall receive only one-half of the pay to which they would have been entitled if on leave of absence. (Sec. 1557, R. S.) (N. R. 4413.)

17. Pay, absent without leave.—"When absent without leave all officers forfeit pay and allowances during such absence, unless the absence is excused as unavoidable.

(N. R. 4411.)

18. Pay, traveling.—"Officers proceeding to and from their stations under orders are entitled to pay as on duty, provided there is no unnecessary delay on their part." (N. R. 4407-2.)

19. Pay, suspended from duty.—"An officer suspended from duty by sentence of court-martial shall receive the pay to which he would be entitled if waiting orders,

unless otherwise provided in the sentence." (N. R. 4410-3).

20. Commencement of pay, ensign.—Pay as ensign does not begin until date of qualification and acceptance of commission, provided commission is not issued within six months after graduation; if commission is issued and accepted prior to six months from date of graduation, he shall be allowed pay of ensign from date he takes rank as stated in his commission. (Comp. Dec., June 28, 1910.)

(a) An officer suspended from promotion is not entitled under the provision of the act of March 4, 1913 (37 Stat., 892), to the pay of the higher grade when commissioned therein until the date of the first vacancy occurring, when the grade is limited, sub-

(b) An officer suspended from promotion by reason of failure to qualify in examinations therefor and who subsequently qualifies and is promoted is not entitled to the pay and allowances of the higher rank until the date of qualification as fixed by his

21. Pay, when advanced in grade or rank.—(a) That all officers of the Navy who, since the 3d day of March, 1899, have been advanced or may hereafter be advanced in grade or rank pursuant to law shall be allowed the pay and allowances of the higher grade or rank from the dates stated in their commissions. (Naval appropriation act approved Mar. 4, 1913.)

(b) An officer advanced from one rank to another within the same grade is entitled to the pay of the advanced rank on the date on which he attains the higher rank, provided that the Senate shall consent to the advancement as of date on which he

reached the higher rank. (Comp. Dec., Apr. 22 and 30, 1910.)

22. Hospital fund.—Twenty cents a month is deducted from the pay of each person of the Navy and Marine Corps, active and retired, to be applied to the Naval ospital fund. (Sec. 4808, R. S.)

24. Medical Reserve Corps.—That a Medical Reserve Corps, to be a constituent part of the Medical Department of the Navy, is hereby established under the same provisions in all respects (except as may be necessary to adapt the said provisions to the Navy) as those providing a Medical Reserve Corps for the Army, and as set forth in the act to increase the efficiency of the Medical Department of the United States Army,

approved April 23, 1908.

26. Officers for engineering duties only (act Aug. 29, 1916).—(For full text of this act see General Order No. 231, p. 11.)

#### PAY OF RETIRED OFFICERS.

1. Proportion of active duty pay not affected by act of May 13, 1908.—The laws as to retirement and the proportion of active duty pay to be allowed after retirement remain as before the passage of the act of May 13, 1908. (Comp. Dec., Oct. 16, 1908.)

2. Retirement after thirty years' service.—"When an officer of the Navy has been

thirty years in the service he may, upon his own application, in the discretion of the President, be retired from active service and placed upon the retired list with three-fourths of the highest pay of his grade." (Act May 13, 1908.)

3. Rates, base.—"The pay of all commissioned, warrant, and appointed officers and

enlisted men of the Navy now on the retired list shall be based on the pay, as herein provided for, of commissioned, warrant, and appointed officers and enlisted men of corresponding rank and service on the active list." (Act May 13, 1908.)

4. Ten per cent additional not allowed.—"In computing the pay of retired officers of the Navy, the 10 per cent additional pay allowed for sea service or shore duty beyond seas shall not be included." (General deficiency act, May 30, 1908; see Comp.

Dec., June 26, 1908.)

5. Civil War service.—"Any officer of the Navy with a creditable record who served during the Civil War shall, when retired, be retired with the rank and three-fourths of the sea pay of the next higher grade." (Act Mar. 3, 1899, sec. 11.)

6. Rates of pay.—Officers on the retired list receive (according to the way in which they are retired) either three-fourths or one-half of the sea pay of the grade or rank which they held at the time of their retirement, or one-half the leave pay of such rank or grade, which is "furlough pay." (Sec. 1588, R. S.; see Comp. Dec., Aug. 13, 1908; Oct. 16, 1908; see par. 3, supra.)

7. Active duty.—Hereafter any naval officer on the retired list may, with his consent,

in the discretion of the Secretary of the Navy, be ordered to such duty as he may be able to perform at sea or on shore. (Act Aug. 22, 1912.) "Provided, That hereafter any retired officer of the naval service who shall be detailed on active duty shall, while so serving, receive the active duty pay and allowances of the grade, not above that of lieutenant commander in the Navy or major in the Marine Corps, that he would have attained in due course of promotion if he had remained on the active list for a period beyond the date of his retirement equal to the total amount of time during which he has been detailed on active duty since his retirement: Provided, That



nothing herein shall be construed to reduce the pay of any retired officer on active duty whose retired pay exceeds the active duty pay and allowances for the grade of lieutenant commander." (Act Aug. 29, 1916.)

(a) Notice of dissolution of the court on which a retired officer was ordered is sufficient to terminate his assignment to active duty under that order. (Comp. Dec.,

Sept. 29, 1910.)

(b) A retired officer of the Navy detached from duty and ordered to report to a naval hospital for treatment is not, while being treated therein, performing active duty within the meaning of the act of June 7, 1900 (31 Stat., 703), and is not entitled under said act to active duty pay while undergoing treatment in the hospital and while returning to his home after being discharged therefrom. (Comp. Dec., Dec. 21, 1910.)
(c) A retired officer of the Navy ordered to active duty is entitled to active duty

pay from the date he leaves his home under orders, provided he travels to duty by the usually traveled route, which need not be the shortest as regards time.

(d) For pay for constructive promotion by reason of service performed on active duty after retirement, see "Longevity," paragraph 9.

1. Pay.—A warrant officer temporarily commissioned whose pay as a warrant officer is higher than when commissioned is entitled to the higher pay, including rations. (Comp. Dec., Oct. 20, 1917.)
2. Leave.—(a) A warrant officer ordered home and granted leave is not entitled to

duty pay while traveling to his home. (Comp. Dec., Apr. 13, 1810.)

(b) "Warrant officers shall be allowed such leave of absence, with full pay, as is now or may hereafter be allowed other officers of the United States Navy." (Act Aug. 29, 1916.)

6. Rations officers.—All officers of the Navy, except commissioned officers of the line, medical and pay corps, chaplains, and commissioned warrant officers, are entitled to a ration or commutation therefor at the rate of 30 cents per day while attached to and doing duty aboard a seagoing vessel of the Navy. Midshipmen are entitled to the ration or commutation therefor at all times. (See Comp. Dec., July 13, 1908; Apr. 23, 1909; naval appropriation act, Mar. 3, 1909.)

(a) The accounts of officers subsisted by the general mess of a vessel while serving temporarily on shore should be checked with the cost of the rations issued, as shown by the actual issues to crew and marines during the period covered by their subsist-

ence. (Comp. Dec., Feb. 18, 1910.)

(b) Officers attached to and doing duty on a receiving ship are not entitled to the commutation for rations allowed while at sea or attached to a seagoing vessel. (Comp. Dec., Aug. 25, 1910.)



7. Mates, pay and allowances.—Mates occupy the status of both "officers of the Navy and enlisted men." (Op. Atty. Gen., Oct. 15, 1907.)

Mates are entitled to the honorable-discharge gratuity, the travel allowance of 4 cents per mile allowed enlisted men upon discharge, and additional pay when designated as Navy mail clerks, under the same conditions as enlisted men; but they are not entitled to continuous-service pay, additional pay for good-conduct medals, or other compensation heretofore fixed by the President. (Comp. Dec., Jan. 28, 1908; Oct. 2, 1908.) They are entitled to commutation of quarters under the same conditions as warrant officers, but are not entitled to heat and light allowance. They are entitled to rations or commutation therefor when attached to and doing duty aboard a seagoing vessel, a receiving ship, or a ship in ordinary at a navy yard. (12 Comp. Dec., 728.)
A mate, rated as such subsequent to August 1, 1894, who was retired upon applica-

tion to the President and after 30 years' service, is entitled, in computing his pay, to 75 per cent of the pay he was receiving at the time of his retirement and, in addition.

#### ALLOWANCES, OFFICERS: QUARTERS, HEAT, AND LIGHT.

1. Commutation of quarters.—(a) Commissioned officers of the Navy on shore duty where there are no public quarters for their accommodation, or where quarters have not been hired for their use, are entitled to commutation of quarters at the rate of \$12 per month for each room to which their rank entitles them, as shown in Art. 4513-(7), N. R.

(b) Warrant officers and mates are each entitled under above conditions to commu-

tation of quarters for two rooms.

(c) An officer in receipt of commutation of quarters is entitled to same while temporarily absent on duty in the field. (Comp. Dec., Oct. 20, 1910.)

(d) A retired officer ordered to active duty whose orders do not specify where the shore duty on which he was to be employed should be performed, and who has selected his home as his station for the purpose of such duty, is entitled to commutation of quarters, notwithstanding that he reported by letter instead of in person. (Comp. Dec., Apr. 14, 1910.)

(e) An officer on duty at a station where public quarters are available is not entitled to commutation of quarters even though he can not be assigned the full number of

rooms to which his rank entitles him. (Comp. Dec., Oct. 31, 1913.)

(f) An officer ordered to duty with the Navy rifle team and furnished a tent for quarters while on such duty is not entitled to commutation of quarters. (Comp. Dec., Aug. 15, 1914.)

(g) An officer attached to a vessel at a submarine base for whom there are no quarters on board, or on shore, is not entitled to receive pay for quarters on shore, or have

quarters hired for him. (Comp. Dec., Aug. 16, 1916.)

(h) Authorization by the Secretary of the Navy to hire quarters for the use of officers does not authorize delegation of that authority to the officers themselves. Quarters so hired preclude payment of commutation to the officers assigned to them. (Comp.

Dec., Feb. 2, 1917.)

(i) Where a ship is permanently detached from receiving ship duty and no other (i) Where a ship is permanently detached from receiving officers assigned ship is designated to take her place, it has the effect of detaching officers assigned to receiving ship duty on that vessel (and who are not a part of the ship's complement) and placing them on shore duty. If such detachment is permanent, said officers are entitled to commutation of quarters if not furnished quarters in kind. If detachment from receiving ship under circumstances outlined is only temporary, officer must provide his own quarters. (Comp. Dec., July 3, 1917; Aug. 28, 1917.)

(j) See "(n)" under "Allowance, heat and light."

2. Allowance, heat and light.—Hereafter heat and light actually necessary for the

Allowance, heat and light.—Hereafter heat and light actually necessary for the authorized allowance of quarters for officers and enlisted men shall be furnished at

the expense of the United States under such regulations as the Secretary of War may prescribe. (Army appropriation act approved Mar. 2, 1907; Art. 4514, N. R.)

(a) Allowances for heat and light to officers occupying public quarters and quarters other than public will be as provided by General Orders No. 115 of August 18, 1914; No. 131 of January 20, 1915; No. 136 of February 25, 1915; No. 152 of July 1, 1915; and No. 208 of April 22, 1916.

(b) A officer who is excitated Concernment quarters furnished with heat and light

(b) An officer who is assigned Government quarters furnished with heat and light, but who prefers not to occupy them and lives elsewhere, is not entitled to reimbursement for the expenses of heat and light in the quarters he chooses to occupy in preference to those assigned him by the Government. (Comp. Dec., Feb. 18, 1910.)

(c) An officer taking his meals only at a place where he certifies it is impracticable to furnish fuel in kind, but occupying quarters which it is practicable for the Government to heat, is not allowed a credit of the money value, but is entitled to fuel in kind for the quarters occupied. (Comp. Dec., Oct. 8, 1910.)

(d) An officer maintaining two residences as quarters during the same period is not entitled to have heat and light supplied to both at Government expense during said period even though his accumulated allowances should not be exceeded. (Comp.

Dec., May 27, 1910.)

(e) Officers attached to seagoing vessels are not entitled to commutation of quarters or heat and light allowance while on temporary special duty away from their ships under orders expressly imposing a continuation of their sea duties. (Comp. Dec., Dec. 20, 1909.)

(f) Midshipmen are not entitled to commutation of quarters or to allowances for

heat and light.

(q) Mates are not entitled to heat and light allowances. (Comp. Dec., Nov. 21, 1907.)

(h) Officers attached to vessels in commission compelled to live on shore are entitled to expenses incurred for hire of quarters, heat, and light not to exceed authorized allowance, if approved by the department. (Comp. Dec., Nov. 22, 1911.)

(i) An acting assistant surgeon is entitled to the pay and allowance (quarters, heat, and light) allowed assistant surgeons in the Navy. (See decision of the Supreme Court in the Plummer case, Bureau Memoranda No. 134, p. 2031.)

(j) Where an officer occupies quarters other than public he is not entitled to greater heat and light allowances than those prescribed for the number of rooms actually occupied by him, regardless of the number which he is entitled to occupy. (Comp.

Dec., July 31, 1913; Aug. 15, 1913; Sept. 21, 1917.)

If an officer's quarters at his permanent station are actually occupied, during his absence on leave, by his family or persons dependent upon him for support (and evidence of such fact accompany the voucher), payment of the heat and light allowance for such quarters during such period is authorized; but if said quarters are not so occupied, the officer is entitled to no heat or light allowances for the period of his absence on leave. (Comp. Dec., Aug. 15, 1913.)

(k) Where quarters occupied by an officer consist of a greater number of rooms

than his rank entitles him to, payment for heat and light is authorized, provided the amounts consumed do not exceed the respective maximum amounts allowed for the number of rooms to which the rank of said officer entitles him. (Comp. Dec.,

Sept. 6, 1913.)

(l) In computing the number of rooms for which an officer is entitled to heat and

light allowances, only rooms actually and exclusively occupied by him as quarters can be counted, and bathroom, storerooms, halls, etc., and rooms used in common with other guests or tenants can not be included. (Comp. Dec., Sept. 6, 1913.)

(m) Where two officers jointly and exclusively occupy four rooms as quarters, their heat and light allowances should be computed upon the same basis as if they each exclusively occupied two rooms as quarters. Rooms exclusively occupied by two or more efficers antilled to best and light allowances are not "rooms used in common with more officers entitled to heat and light allowances are not "rooms used in common with other guests or tenants." (Comp. Dec., Oct. 22, 1913.)

(n) An officer temporarily on duty in the United States away from his station beyond seas where he occupied private quarters continues to be entitled to enjoyment of commutation of quarters but not to commutation of heat and light unless his quarters continued to be occupied by his family or dependents. (Comp. Dec., Jan. 17, 1916.)

(o) An officer receiving commutation of quarters is not entitled to order fuel for

personal use under any Government contract. (Comp. Dec., Mar. 9, 1916.)

(p) A commissioned warrant officer on shore duty after 6 and 12 years from date of commission is not entitled to increased allowance for heat and light prior to the receipt by him of an official written certification that his record is creditable as prescribed by G. O. 247. (Comp. Dec., May 15, 1917.)

## GENERAL PROVISIONS.

1. Increase provided by act of May 13, 1908, and May 22, 1917.—"The pay of all active and retired enlisted men of the Navy is hereby increased 10 per centum." (Act May 13, 1908.)

May 13, 1908.)

"Szc. 15. That commencing June first, nineteen hundred and seventeen, and continuing until not later than six months after the termination of the present war, all enlisted men of the Navy of the United States in active service whose base pay does not exceed \$21 per month shall receive an increase of \$15 per month; those whose

base pay is over \$21 and does not exceed \$24 per month, an increase of \$12 per month; those whose base pay is over \$24 and less than \$45 per month, an increase of \$8 per month; and those whose base pay is \$45 or more per month, an increase of \$6 per month: Provided, That the increases of pay herein authorized shall not enter into the computation of continuous-service pay." (Act May 22, 1917.)

The additional base pay for enlisted men authorized by act May 22, 1917, for the duration of the war, applies to the base pay of the rate stripped of any additions by percentage or otherwise. (Comp. Dec., May 26, 1917.)

2. Increase of 10 per cent, act May 13, 1908, computation of.—"The 10 per cent increase of pay provided for enlisted men of the Navy by the act of May 13, 1908, is computed on the base pay plus permanent additions, such as extra pay for continuous service, good-conduct medals, etc.; transient additions, which require a special detail, such as gun pointers, messmen, etc., do not enter into the computation for this increase." (Comp. Dec., May 27, 1908.)

3. Pay not reduced by act May 13, 1908.—"Nothing herein shall be construed so as to reduce the pay or allowances now authorized by law for any commissioned, warrant,

3. Pay not reduced by act. May 13, 1908.—"Nothing herein shall be construed so as to reduce the pay or allowances now authorized by law for any commissioned, warrant, or appointed officer or any enlisted man of the active or retired lists of the Navy, and all laws inconsistent with this provision are hereby repealed." (Act May 13, 1908.)

4. Hospital Corps.—"The pay, allowances, and emoluments of the enlisted men of the Hospital Corps shall be the same as are now, or may hereafter be, allowed for respective corresponding ratings \* \* \* in the seamen branch of the Navy." (Act

Aug. 29, 1916.)

5. Hospital fund.—Twenty cents per month is deducted from the pay of each enlisted man of the Navy, to be applied to the fund for naval hospitals. (Sec. 4808, R. S.) The hospital fund for transferred members of the Fleet Naval Reserve is

n. s.) The nospital fund for transferred members of the Fleet Naval Reserve is deducted from their retainer pay by the Navy disbursing officer in Washington even when such members are on active duty. (S. and A. Memo. 197, p. 4297.)
6. Furloughed.—Enlisted men of the Navy furloughed without pay under act of Aug. 29, 1916, upon being recalled to duty resume the pay and rate held by them when placed on furlough. (Comp. Dec., June 12, 1917.)
7. Retired pay.—"The pay of all \* \* \* enlisted men of the Navy now on the retired list shall be based on the pay, as herein provided for, of \* \* \* enlisted men of corresponding rank and service on the active list; and all ray herein provided men of corresponding rank and service on the active list; and all pay herein provided shall remain in force until changed by act of Congress." (Act of May 13, 1908.)

(a) An enlisted man on the retired list is entitled to the full amount of 75 cents a month for each good-conduct medal held in addition to 75 per cent of the pay of which he was in receipt at the date of retirement. (Comp. Dec., Oct. 27, 1902; Dec. 11, 1902; May 14, 1909.)

(b) An enlisted man retired subsequent to June 1, 1917 (and during the continuance of the present war), does not have the flat base increase provided by act May 22,

1917, included in the computation of his retired pay. (Comp. Dec., Aug. 16, 1917.) 8. Deposits.—(a) Enlisted men of the Navy upon being temporarily warranted or

commissioned under act May 22, 1917, are entitled to be paid any deposits to their credit. (Comp. Dec., Sept. 22, 1917.)

(b) Deposits made by enlisted men of the Naval Reserve Force, Marine Corps Reserve, Naval Militia, and National Naval Volunteers, while on active duty should be repaid with interest (if entitled to any) on date of detachment from said active

duty. (Comp. Dec., July 3, 1917.)

9. Absence due to own misconduct, etc.—"Hereafter no officer or enlisted man in the Navy or Marine Corps in active service who shall be absent from duty on account of sickness or disease resulting from his own intemperate use of drugs or alcoholic liquors, or other misconduct, shall receive pay for the period of such absence, the time so absent and the cause thereof to be ascertained under such procedure and regulations as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy: Provided, That an enlistment shall not be regarded as complete until the enlisted man shall have made good any time in excess of one day lost on account of sickness or disease resulting from his own intemperate use of drugs or alcoholic liquors, or other misconduct." (Act Aug. 29, 1916.)

## PERMANENT ADDITIONS TO PAY.

10. Rations.—"All enlisted men in the Navy attached to any United States vessel or station and doing duty thereon shall be allowed a ration or commutation thereof." (Art. 4517-(4) N. R.) "Rations of enlisted men shall be commuted only upon the written order of the commanding officer." (Art. 4517–(7), N. R.) "The ration is not pay and shall not be commuted in advance." (Art. 4460, N. R.) The commuted value of a ration shall not exceed 40 cents. (See G. O. 338.) Sections 1580 and 1581 "The ration is of the Revised Statutes enumerate the components of the Navy ration. In the case of G. C. M. prisoners the Secretary of the Navy is authorized to commute their rations, not to exceed 30 cents each, depending on the locality of the prison. (Act Mar. 4, 1917.) (See par. 20 under "Transient additions to pay.")

11. Continuous-service pay.—Any man who has received an honorable discharge

from his last term of enlistment, or who has received a recommendation for reenlistment upon the expiration of his last term of enlistment, who reenlists for a term of four years within four months from the date of his discharge, shall receive an increase of \$1,36 per month to the pay prescribed for the rating in which he serves for each successive reenlistment, and an extension of the period of enlistment, aggregating four years, shall be held and considered as equivalent to continuous service with respect to all rights, privileges, and benefits granted for such service pursuant to law. (Art. 4427–(23), N. R.)

"Any former member of class one of the United States Naval Reserve, established by Act of Mar. 3, 1915, \* \* \* who shall have reenlisted in the Navy prior to May 1, 1917, shall be held and considered to have reenlisted within four months from the date of discharge from the Navy for the purpose of continuous-service pay." (Act

Mar. 4, 1917.)

(a) An enlisted man of the Navy who, on being dishonorably discharged, is recommended for reenlistment, is entitled, upon reenlistment, to additional pay for continuous service but not to the additional pay under General Order No. 34. (Comp. Dec., Aug. 31, 1914.)

(b) An enlisted man of the Navy who reenlists exactly four months from date of

discharge is entitled to continuous-service pay. (Comp. Dec., Nov. 13, 1914.)

12. Recalistments subsequent to November 27, 1906.—To provide adequate compensation for trained men, the regular pay for each rating in the Navy shall be increased \$5 per month during the second period of service, and a further sum of \$3 per month during each and every subsequent period of service; but only enlisted men who are citizens of the United States, and whose second and subsequent periods of service each follow next after service in the Navy that was terminated by reason of expiration of enlistment, shall receive the benefits of the increased pay named herein. In the cases of men who are or were finally discharged from the Navy by reason of expiration of enlistment, the first enlistment on or after November 27, 1906, shall be considered the second period of service which shall carry with it the increased pay provided by this paragraph; except that men discharged on recommendations of boards of medical survey shall, if they reenter the service, be given credit for any previous periods of service in the Navy which were terminated by reason of expiration of enlistment. (Executive order, Nov. 27, 1906.) (General Order No. 34, Nov. 28, 1906; Art. R-4427 (25), N. R., 1913.)

(a) The risk of making payments to enlisted men of the Navy under "General Order No. 34" rests solely upon the officer making them. It is incumbent upon an officer (of the Pay Corps) to satisfy himself as to the sufficiency of the evidence of citizenship presented and it is his right to refuse to make such payment unless, in his

judgment, such evidence is legally sufficient. (Comp. Dec., Dec. 10, 1912.)

(b) The fact that an enlisted man holds a permanent appointment as a petty officer is strong prima facie evidence of citizenship, and in the absence of facts brought home to any officer of the Pay ('orps before making payment contradicting such presumption of citizenship, he will be protected in making payment. (Comp. Dec., Apr. 28, 1913.)

13. Chief petty officers, permanent appointment.—All chief petty officers of the Navy, including chief water tenders, who shall receive permanent appointments after qualifying therefor, shall be paid at the rate of \$70 a month. (Art. 4427 (18), N. R., 1913.)

(a) An appointment, either permanent or acting, can not be made retroactive to give pay before the appointment is actually made, except by statutory authority. (Comp. Dec., Aug. 8, 1913, and Oct. 30, 1913.)

(b) A boiler maker issued an acting appointment as chief water tender in the Navy is paid the pay of the latter rate, provided the man was not in the service on the date the rate of chief water tender was established, namely June 26, 1903. (Comp. Dec., July 10, 1917.)

(c) Retired chief petty officers recalled into active service under act Aug. 29, 1916, are entitled to the same pay as men of the same rate and like length of service on the active list. If given a new permanent appointment, however, it does not carry with it the pay and allowances of the rating to which appointed. (Comp. Dec., July 28,

14. Seamen gunners' certificates, etc.—Mon who have successfully completed a prescribed course of instruction for seamen gunners or petty officers may be given, by the

Bureau of Navigation, a certificate to that effect, which shall entitle them to receive \$2 per month in addition to the pay of the rating in which they are serving; such certificates to continue in force only during the enlistments in which the men were respectively graduated, unless renewed by reenlistment for four years within four months from date of honorable discharge. Men holding certificates as seamen gunners are entitled to the pay prescribed for said rating and are entitled to reenlist at any time as such at the base rate of \$26 per month; but if given any other rating than that of seaman gunner the holder of a seaman gunner's certificate shall not receive additional pay therefor unless in continuous service. (Art. 4427 (8), N. R. 1913.)

(a) An enlisted man of the Navy who holds a certificate from the Seaman Gunner's

School at Washington and one from the Seaman Gunner's School at Newport is entitled to additional pay for only one of such certificates. (Comp. Dec., Dec. 3, 1914.)

(b) An enlisted man of the Navy who holds certificates of graduation from two separate and distinct classes of instruction for which \$2 per month additional is provided by Executive order is entitled to the \$2 per month additional for each of the two certificates. (Comp. Dec., Apr. 26, 1915.)

15. Certificate of qualification.—Stewards and cooks in the messmen branch who are citizens of the United States and who hold or may receive certificates of qualifi-

cation as stewards or cooks shall receive \$5 per month additional to the pay of their rating while holding such certificate, such additional pay to be of a permanent char-

rating while holding such certificate, such additional pay to be of a permanent character as regular pay. (Executive order, Jan. 28, 1908; Art. 4427 (32-a), N. R., 1913.)

(a) The additional pay authorized for a steward or cook holding a certificate of qualification is no part of the pay he was in receipt of at the time of retirement within the meaning of the act of March 2, 1907. (Comp. Dec., Apr. 14, 1914.)

16. Good-conduct medals.—Each enlisted man of the Navy shall receive 75 cents per month, in addition to the pay of his rating, for each good-conduct medal, pin, or bar which he may heretofore have been, or shall hereafter be, awarded. The date of the award of a good-conduct medal pin, or har shall be the date of the holder's of the award of a good-conduct medal, pin, or bar shall be the date of the holder's discharge by reason of the expiration of the enlistment for which the medal, pin, or bar is given, the allowance of 75 cents per month to be reckoned from said date of award. (Art. 4427 (9), N. R., 1913. See Comp. Dec., Sept. 29, 1906.) (See also Art. N. R. 3664—1-2-3.)

(a) A holder of a good-conduct medal for service in the Marine Corps is entitled to be credited with pay for the medal on enlistment in the Navy. (Comp. Dec., Dec.

2, 1913.)

(b) A man granted a good-conduct medal for a four-year period of service, which he has extended for one year, is not entitled to pay for the medal for the year of extension. (Comp. Dec., Feb. 17, 1916.)

#### TRANSIENT ADDITIONS TO PAY.

17. Seamen in charge of hold.—Seamen in charge of holds shall receive \$5 per month

in addition to their pay. (Art. 4427 (12), N. R., 1913.)
18. Corswains of steam launches, etc.—Coxswains detailed as coxswains of boats propelled by machinery, or as coxswains to commanders in chief, shall receive \$5 per

month in addition to their pay. (Art. 4427 (10), N. R., 1913.)

(a) The additional pay allowed for this duty is no part of the pay of the rating of coxswain and should not be included in computing the pay of a coxswain on the

retired list. (Comp. Dec., May 27, 1914.)
(b) Additional pay continues even when boats are separated from their ship, provided details remain in effect. (Comp. Dec., May 31, 1917.)
19. Petty officers, allowance in lieu of quarters and rations.—Petty officers of the Navy, performing duty which deprives them of quarters and their rations or commutation thereof, shall receive \$9 per month in addition to the pay of their rating. (Art. 4427 (6), N. R., 1913.)

20. Subsistence, temporary duty ashore.—Subsistence furnished to enlisted men aattched to ships of the Navy, when unavoidably detained on shore under orders. or absent by authority for one day or more from the ship to which attached. shall be charged to appropriation "Provisions, Navy." During the time of such subsistence their rations shall be stopped on board ship and no credit for commutation therefor shall be given. (Art. 4427 (7), N. R., 1913.)

(a) When such authorized absence is for less than one day, and ration is not checked on pay roll, cost of subsistence shall be paid on public bill, under appropriation "Pay, miscellaneous." (Art. 4427 (7), N. R., 1913. See Comp. Dec., Dec. 9, 1907.)

(b) "1. Beginning January 1, 1918, at stations where quarters are not available for all enlisted men attached, and for enlisted men on detached duty from vessels and stations, subsistence is authorized as follows:

(a) For all persons on recruiting duty, inspection duty, or on detached duty in Alaska, two dollars (\$2) per day.
(b) For all chief petty officers on duty at shore stations or on detached duty from vessels or shore stations and for whom no suitable quarters are available, one dollar and fifty cents (\$1.50) per day.

(c) For all persons other than chief petty officers, on duty at shore stations or on detached duty from vessels or shore stations, for whom no suitable quarters are available, one dollar and twenty-five cents (\$1.25) per day.

(d) For all enlisted or enrolled persons on detached duty at stations at which there are facilities for messing together and at which the total number of men does not exceed forty, one dollar (\$1) per day.

(e) For all enlisted or enrolled persons on detached duty at stations at which there are facilities for messing together and at which the total number of men is

there are facilities for messing together and at which the total number of men is

there are facilities for messing together and at which the total number of men is greater than forty and less than one hundred, seventy-five cents (\$0.75) per day. (Bu. Nav. Circular letter No. 45-17, Dec. 10, 1917-N6L.)

(c) Men of the Regular Navy (or of the Naval Coast Defense Reserve), on duty entitling them to subsistence, "while unavoidably detained or absent from vessels to which attached under orders," or "on detached duty," may be credited on the pay roll with the per diem rate of subsistence previously established by the Navy Department. When such credit is made, subsistence ration must be stopped on board ship and no commutation thereof be given. (Comp. Dec., Mar. 23, 1917.) This does not apply to absence with or without leave. This does not apply to absence with or without leave.

21. Divers, service as.—Enlisted men of the Navy, not under instruction or diving for practice, shall, when employed in submarine diving, receive extra compensation therefor, to be charged to the bureau for which the service is performed, at the rate of \$1.20 per hour for the active time so employed under water. (Art. 4427 (33), N. R.,

1913.)

22. Duty in fireroom, seamen and seamen second class.—Seamen and seamen second class detailed for duty as firemen shall receive in addition to the pay of their ratings extra pay at the rate of 33 cents per day for the time so employed. (Sec. 1570, R. S.; Art. 4427 (16), N. R., 1913.)

(a) A native seaman or native ordinary seaman of the Insular Force who is detailed to perform duty as fireman is entitled to extra compensation at the rate of 33 cents per

day while so employed. (Comp. Dec., Aug. 13, 1910.)

23. Gun captains.—Enlisted men of the Navy regularly detailed by the commanding officer of a vessel as gun captains, except at secondary battery guns, shall receive, in addition to the pay of their respective rating, \$5 per month, which in the case of men holding certificates as gun captains, or of graduation from the gun-captain class, petty officers' school, shall include the \$2 per month to which such certificates entitle them. (General Order No. 137, July 25, 1903; Art. 4427, par. (20), N. R., 1913.)

(a) A gunner's mate detailed for duty as gun captain of an intermediate gun on a vessel of the gunboat class is entitled to the additional pay provided for such duty.

(Comp. Dec., Jan. 14, 1915.)

(b) A seaman gunner graduate detailed as a gun captain receives pay for both. (Comp. Dec., May 5, 1916.)

24. Gun pointers.—After October 1, 1903 (Executive order, July 25, 1903), enlisted men of the Navy, after having qualified as gun pointers, and who are regularly detailed as gun pointers by the commanding officer of the vessel, shall receive monthly, in addition to the pay of their respective ratings, extra pay as follows: Heavy gun pointers (for guns of 8-inch caliber or larger), first class, \$10; second class, \$6. Intermediate gun pointers (for guns from 4-inch to 7-inch, inclusive), first class, \$8; second class, \$4. Secondary gun pointers (for guns from 1-pounder to 3-inch, inclusive), first class, \$4; second class, \$2.

(a) Extra pay shall be allowed a gun pointer during such time only as he remains qualified, and only while he is regularly detailed as a gun pointer at a gun of the class at which he qualified. (Art. 4427 (19), N. R., 1913, and General Order No. 57,

Dec. 9, 1907.)

An officer in command of an enlisted force of the Navy aboard a merchant ship might well be considered as the commanding officer within the meaning of \* \* \* General Order" [No. 137, dated July 25, 1903]. (Comp. Dec., Dec. 28, 1917.)

25. Jacks-of-the-dust, lamplighters, etc.—Seamen second class detailed as jacks-ofthe-dust, or as lamplighters, shall receive \$5 per month in addition to their pay. (Art.

4427 (13), N. R., 1913.)

(a) A seaman second class detailed as jack-of-the-dust is entitled to the additional

compensation while so detailed, even if on leave. (Comp. Dec., Aug. 17, 1905.)

26. Navy mail clerks.—Enlisted men of the Navy or Marine Corps designated as Navy mail clerks shall receive, in addition to the monthly pay of their rating, the following compensation for their services: On board vessels having a complement of 650 or more officers and men. \$30 per month; on board receiving ships, \$25 per month; on board vessels and in torpedo flotillas having a complement of 250 or more, and less than 650 officers and men, \$25 per month; on board vessels and in torpedo flotillas having a complement of 125 or more and less than 250 officers and men, \$20 per month; on board vessels having a complement of 35 or more and less than 125 officers and men, \$10 a month. (Art. 4427 (31), N. R.; Art. 5401 (5) N. I.)

(a) The additional pay as Navy mail clerk is not dependent upon the filing of a bond.

(Comp. Dec., Mar. 1, 1910.)

(b) Navy pay clerks are entitled to the additional compensation therefor only while in performance of this special duty, and are not entitled to the additional pay if absent from the vessel under treatment in hospital ashore or on leave of absence. (Comp. Dec., Mar. 16, 1909, and Apr. 4, 1910.)

(c) Navy mail clerks are entitled to additional compensation from date of designation by the Postmaster General, provided they enter upon their duties on or prior to such

date and take the required oath of office subsequent to designation and prior to separation from the position. (Comp. Dec., Oct. 19, 1909.)

(d) A Navy mail clerk or assistant mail clerk is entitled to the additional pay from the date on which he begins to perform the duty by order of his commanding officer, even though the oath of office is not executed until a subsequent date. (Comp. Dec., Sept. 23, 1914.)

(e) Inadvertence on the part of the Post Office Department in designating an enlisted man as Navy mail clerk instead of as assistant mail clerk does not entitle the man to the pay of the former, even though he executed bond as such. (Comp. Dec., July 18.

1917.)

- (f) Assistant Navy mail clerks.—Enlisted men designated as assistant Navy mail clerks receive \$15 per month in addition to the pay of their rating. (Act June 27, 1908; Gen. Ords., Nos. 74, June 27, 1908; 79, Nov. 18, 1908; Art. 4427 (31-c), N. R.; Art. 5401 (5), N. I.)
  - (g) Mates eligible as mail clerks.—(For mates as mail clerks, see Note 6, p. 359.)
     (h) The appointment of an assistant mail clerk for duty on a flagship is not revoked

by reason of the temporary transfer of the flag to another vessel.

An assistant mail clerk is not entitled to the additional pay provided for assistant mail clerks for postal duties performed on board a vessel other than the one for which he was designated. (Comp. Dec., Feb. 8, 1912.)

27. Messmen.—Enlisted men detailed as messmen shall, while so acting. except

when assigned as reliefs during the temporary absence of the regular messmen, receive extra compensation at the rate of \$5 per month. (Art. 4427 (14), N. R., 1913.)

(a) Mess attendants are not entitled to additional compensation allowed other

enlisted men detailed as messmen. (Comp. Dec., Apr. 11, 1908.)

(b) Enlisted men detailed as crew messmen are not entitled to the extra pay provided for such detail while on authorized leave of absence. (Comp. Dec., Apr. 28, 1910.)

(c) Additional pay as messmen should be included in amount forfeited under a

court-martial sentence. (Comp. Dec., May 7, 1917.)
28. Signalmen.—Enlisted men regularly detailed as signalmen shall receive the following extra compensation in addition to the monthly pay of their rating: Signalmen, first class, \$3; signalmen, second class, \$2; signalmen, third class, \$1. 4427 (17), N. R., 1913.)

29. Service on submarines.—All enlisted men of the Navy shall receive \$5 per month in addition to their pay while serving on board of submarine vessels of the Navy. Besides the \$5 per month extra pay allowed them for submarine service, enlisted men serving with submarine torpedo boats, and having been reported by their commanding officers to the Navy Department as qualified for submarine torpedo boat work, shall receive \$1 additional pay for each day during any part of which they shall have been submerged in a submarine boat while under way; but such further additional pay shall not exceed \$15 in any one calendar month. To be eligible for recommendation by their commanding officers as "qualified for submarine torpedo boat work," in order to receive the benefits of this paragraph, men must fulfill the requirement prescribed by the Bureau of Navigation. (Art. 4427 (11), N. R., 1913.)

(a) An enlisted man of the Navy detailed for duty in connection with the fitting out

of a submarine and for duty on board that vessel when completed, is not, prior to the

acceptance of that vessel by the Government, entitled to the additional pay of \$5 per

month provided for such duty. (Comp. Dec., Jan. 26, 1912.)

(b) An enlisted man on duty on board a submarine in commission in ordinary is entitled to additional pay provided for submarine duty. (Comp. Dec., Aug. 9, 1916.)

(c) Enlisted men, attached to and serving on board a submarine, although quartered

and messed on shore, are entitled to \$5 additional pay provided by G. O. No. 20 of

January 1, 1901. (Comp. Dec., Jan. 12, 1916.)

30. Ship's tailor and tailor's helper.—Any enlisted man of the Navy detailed to perform the duties of "ship's tailor on board of a vessel having a complement of 600 men or more exclusive of marines, shall receive \$20 per month in addition to the monthly pay of his rating; on a vessel having a complement of from 300 to 600 men, exclusive of marines, \$15 per month in addition to the monthly pay of his rating; on a vessel having a complement of less than 300 men and not less than 100 men, exclusive of marines, \$10 per month in addition to the monthly pay of his rating. Any enlisted man of the Navy detailed as "tailor's helper" on board of a vessel having a complement of 600 men or more, exclusive of marines, shall receive \$10 per month in addition to the monthly pay of his rating; but the total pay of an enlisted man detailed to perform the duties of "ship's tailor" shall not exceed \$50 per month, and of "tailor's helper" shall not exceed \$40 per month. (General Order No. 186, June 5, 1905; Comp. Dec., Aug. 11, 1908; Art. 4427 (21), N. R., 1913.)

(a) An enlisted man detailed as "ship's tailor" is entitled to the additional pay

as such while on leave or on temporary duty ashore, provided that no one was detailed to perform the duties of "ship's tailor" during his absence. (Comp. Dec., June 30,

1909, and Mar. 29, 1910.)

(b) An enlisted man serving as "ship's tailor" or "tailor's helper" is entitled to the flat base increase provided by act May 22, 1917, regardless of whether or not he was

receiving the maximum pay allowed by the regulations. (Comp. Dec., June 25, 1917.)
(c) There is no authority for the payment of additional compensation to "ship's

tailor or "tailor's helper" at shore stations. (Comp. Dec., 28, 1917.)

31. Detained after expiration of enlistment.—Enlisted men affect detained beyond their regular term of enlistment until the return to the United States of the vessel to which they belong, under the provisions of section 1422 of the Revised Statutes, shall receive for the time during which they are so detained an addition of one-fourth of their former pay, computed on the total pay which they are entitled to receive; but if an enlisted man be retained in the service after the expiration of his enlistment at his own request, he is not entitled to the one-fourth additional pay. In order to sustain a charge for such additional payment, the supply officer must produce, upon the settlement of his account, a certificate from the commanding officer that the persons to whom such additional compensation has been allowed did reenlist as aforesaid or were detained by such commanding officer under the provisions of the said section. (Art. 4427 (15), N. R., 1913.)

(a) An enlisted man returned from the Asiatic station for discharge, whose term of

enlistment expired while on board an Army transport en route to the United States, is not entitled to one-fourth additional pay, under section 1422, Revised Statutes, as that statute does not provide for such a status. (Comp. Dec., July 22, 1913.)

(b) An enlisted man of the Navy whose enlistment expires while the ship on which he is serving is in foreign waters and who is sent home as soon as practicable is not entitled to one-fourth additional pay even though he is required to perform duty on the vessel while en route to the United States. (Com. Dec., Aug. 18, 1915.)

(c) An enlisted man on board a ship in foreign waters who agrees, at expiration of

his enlistment, to remain on the ship until her return home and 30 days thereafter and who waives claim to one-fourth additional pay, is nevertheless entitled to the additional pay during the period of retention provided his service were needed. (Comp. Dec., Oct. 19, 1916.)

(d) An enlisted man on foreign sea duty who is under treatment in a hospital when his enlistment expires, and who upon his discharge from treatment is not sent home

by first available transport but is ordered to duty on board a receiving ship, is entitled to one-fourth additional for the period retained. (Comp. Dec., Jan. 6, 1917.)

(e) See paragraph 8 relative to time to be made good due to absence, own misconduct.

32. Honorable discharge gratuity.—That the term of enlistment of all enlisted men of the United States Navy other than those who are enlisted during minority shall be four years.

That the term of enlistment of any enlisted man in the Navy may, by his voluntary written agreement, under such regulations as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy with the approval of the President, be extended for a period of either one

two, three, or four full years from the date of expiration of the then existing four-year term of enlistmenti and subsequent to said date such enlisted men as extend the term of enlistment as authorized in this section shall be entitled to and shall receive the same pay and allowances in all respects as though regularly discharged and reenlisted immediately upon expiration of their term of enlistment, and such extension shall not operate to deprive them upon discharge at the termination thereof of any right, privilege, or benefit to which they would be entitled at the expiration of a four-year

term of enlistment.

That section 1573 of the Revised Statutes of the United States as amended by section 16 of an act entitled "An act to reorganize and increase the efficiency of the personnel of the Navy and Marine Corps of the United States," approved March 3, 1899, be, and the same is hereby, amended to read as follows: "If any enlisted man or apprentice, being honorably discharged, shall reenlist for four years within four months thereafter, being honorably discharged, shall reenlist for four years within four months thereafter, being honorably discharged or on accounting in a satisfactory. he shall, on presenting his honorable discharge or on accounting in a satisfactory manner for its loss, be entitled to a gratuity of four months' pay equal in amount to that which he would have received if he had been employed in actual service: Provided, That any enlisted man in the Navy whose term of enlistment has been extended for an aggregate of four years shall, after the expiration of the preceding four-year term of enlistment upon which the extension is made and if otherwise entitled to an honorable discharge, be paid the gratuity above provided: And provided, That any man who has received an honorable discharge from his last term of enlistment, or who has received a recommendation for reenlistment upon the expiration of his last term of enlistment, who reenlists for a term of four years within four months from the date of his discharge shall receive an increase of \$1.36 per month to the pay prescribed for the rating in which he serves for each successive reenlistment: And provided further, That an extension of the period of enlistment as hereinbefore authorized, aggregating four years, shall be held and considered as equivalent to continuous service with respect to all rights, privileges, and benefits granted for such service pursuant to law.'3 (Act Aug. 22, 1912.)

(a) The honorable discharge gratuity is computed at the rate of base pay plus permanent additions thereto, but not including transient additions which require a special detail, such as gun pointer, messman, etc. (Comp. Dec., Mar. 27, 1903; June 19,

1906.)

(b) An enlisted man who extends his enlistment for one year in accordance with the provision authorizing the extension of terms of enlistment which appear in the act making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1913, approved August 22, 1912, is entitled to the continuous service pay of \$1.36 per month authorized by section 1573, Revised Statutes, but is not entitled to the payment of the four months' gratuity pay, since the payment of this gratuity is limited to those whose terms of enlistment are extended for an aggregate of four years. (Comp.

Dec., Oct. 11, 1912.)
"Provided, That men who have enrolled in the Fleet Naval Reserve within four months of the date of their discharge from the regular naval service shall, upon reenlistment in the regular naval service within four months of the date of discharge from the Fleet Naval Reserve, be entitled to the same gratuity and additional pay as if they had reenlisted in the regular naval service within four months of discharge

(Act Aug. 29, 1916.)

(c) An enlisted man who enrolls in the Naval Coast Defense Reserve within four months after honorable discharge from the Navy, and during such enrollment reports for active duty in time of war, is not entitled to honorable discharge gratuity, as it is not a gratuity which a corresponding enlisted man of the Navy would get for service in a current enlistment; but he would be entitled to citizenship (G. O. 34) and C. S. C. pay under the same conditions as a corresponding enlisted man of the Navy. (Comp. Dec., May 31, 1917.)

(d) A man who reenlists in the Navy within four months after honorable discharge from an extended enlistment is entitled to the four months' gratuity computed at the same rate as that he was receiving at the time of his actual discharge. (Comp.

Dec., May 26, 1917.)

(e) In computing honorable discharge gratuity, the flat base increase authorized by act of May 22, 1917, is not included. (Comp. Dec., June 15, 1917.)

33. Clothing bounty.—All enlisted men of the Navy shall receive, on first enlistment, outfits amounting in value as follows: Samoans and such men of the messman branch as are not required to possess complete outfits, not to exceed \$20; men of the Insular Force, not to exceed \$30; all other enlisted men, not to exceed \$60. Commanding officers shall direct which of the above amounts is to be allowed in each case of first enlistment, the outfit for "all other enlisted men" to be issued in accordance with the provisions of the Uniform Regulations. (Art. R-4427 (29), N. R., 1913.)

Any man who is discharged during the first six months of a first enlistment for any cause other than disability incurred in the line of duty shall have checked against his accounts prior to discharge the cost of such portion of outfit allowed on first enlistment as he may have drawn. (Art. R-4427 (29), N. R., 1913.)

(a) In connection with clothing bounty the "first enlistment" refers to the first

enlistment in the Navy and has no reference to a previous enlistment in some other

branch of the military service. (Comp. Dec., Mar. 27, 1914.)
(b) Where a man is discharged prior to expiration of enlistment, refunds value of clothing outfit received, and subsequently reenlists, he is entitled to outfit not exceed-

ing \$60. (Comp. Dec., July 29, 1916.)

(c) An enlisted man who, upon being furloughed, is required to refund value of clothing outfit is, upon being recalled to active service, entitled to clothing allowance

of not to exceed \$60 during his entire first enlistment. (Comp. Dec., Sept. 29, 1916.)
34. Credits, prizes.—Gunnery (N. I., 4886); small arm (see "The landing force").
35. Credits, gratuity for heroism.—(See N. R. 3661-1-2.)
36. Travel allowance on discharge.—(1) Men enlisted within the continental limits of the United States and discharged by reason of expiration of enlistment or extended enlistment within three months before the expiration thereof as provided in Article P. 3601 (1) at a place theorie next the place of their enlistment while the furnished at R-3601 (1) at a place therein not the place of their enlistment shall be furnished at the time of discharge, in lieu of transportation and subsistence, travel allowance of 4 cents per mile from the place of discharge to the place of enlistment. (Art. 3606

(1), N. R.)
(2) Men enlisted outside the continental limits of the United States and discharged
(2) Men enlisted outside the continental limits of the United States and discharged within said limits, by reason of expiration, or within three months before the expiration, of enlistment, or extended enlistment, shall be furnished at the time of discharge, in lieu of transportation and subsistence, travel allowance of 4 cents per mile from the place of discharge to the port in the United States nearest the place of discharge from which a regular line of steamships carrying passengers departs for the place of enlistment or for the port nearest thereto. (Art. 3606 (2), N. R.)

(3) Men enlisted within the continental limits of the United States and discharged outside said limits by reason of expiration, or within three months before the expiration, of enlistment, or extended enlistment, shall be furnished at the time of such discharge, travel allowance at the rate of 4 cents per mile to the place of enlistment, from the port in the United States nearest the place of enlistment at which arrives a regular line of steamships carrying passengers from the place of discharge or from the port nearest thereto. (Art. 3606 (3), N. R.)

(4) Men discharged by medical survey, if residents of the United States or of the

insular possessions of the United States, shall at the time of their discharge be furnished transportation to their homes, with subsistence and transfers en route, or cash in lieu thereof. (Art. 3606 (6), N. R., 1913.)

(a) An enlisted man of the Navy who extends his enlistment is not entitled to travel allowance at the expiration of the four-year period for which he originally enlisted. He is entitled to travel allowance on discharge by termination of enlistment, as extended, from place of discharge to place of original enlistment. (Comp. Dec.,

May 28, 1914.)
37. Chief petty officers detailed as instructors of apprentice seamen.—Chief petty officers detailed as instructors of apprentice seamen at naval stations who qualify as instructors by examination shall receive hereafter, in addition to their pay, the sum of \$10 per month while so detailed, such pay to be considered extra pay for special duty. Chief petty officers must be citizens of the United States and serving under continuous service in order to be eligible for examination for detail as instructors of apprentice seamen at naval stations. They must also qualify in accordance with the requirements prescribed by the Bureau of Navigation. (General Order No. 34, Nov. 28, 1906; Art. 4427 (26), N. R., 1913.)

(a) Chief petty officers receiving extra compensation of \$10 per month for duty as instructors of apprentice seamen are entitled to the additional pay for the time while they are on leave or absent undergoing examination for promotion to warrant officers: Provided, Their details are unrevoked and details were not made to supply their

places while absent. (Comp. Dec., Nov. 12, 1910.)

(b) A chief yeoman in the Naval Reserve Force, detailed for duty as instructor of apprentice seamen at a naval training station, is not entitled to the additional pay for this duty unless he has previously qualified by examination for such duty. (Comp.

Dec., Sept. 24, 1917.)

38. Apprentice chief petty officers.—Apprentice seamen detailed as apprentice chief petty officers, apprentice petty officers, first, second, or third class, in connection with the instruction of apprentice seamen at naval stations, shall receive hereafter, in addition to their pay, the sum of \$2.50, \$2, \$1.50, and \$1 each per month, respectively, while so detailed; such pay to be considered extra pay for special duty. The complement of apprentice seamen authorized at each naval station as apprentice petty officers shall be four (one in each rating) for each 75 apprentice seamen under training at the station. (General Order No. 34, Nov. 28, 1906; Art. 4427 (27), N. R., 1913.)

Enlisted men in the Insular Force are entitled to clothing bounty on first enlistment and to one-fourth additional pay for detention beyond expiration of enlistment. (Comp. Dec., Oct. 6, 1905.)

A native seaman, or seaman "second class," while detailed and performing the duty of "fireman" on board a vessel of war is entitled to extra compensation of 33 cents a day. (Comp. Dec., Aug. 13, 1910.)

A coxewain of the insular force detailed for duty as coxewain of a boat propelled by machinery is not entitled to additional pay. (Comp. Dec., Apr. 19, 1913.)

1. "The Nurse Corps (female) of the United States Navy is hereby established, and shall consist of one superintendent, to be appointed by the Secretary of the Navy, who shall be a graduate of a hospital training school having a course of instruction of not less than two years, whose term of office may be terminated at his discretion, and of as many chief nurses, nurses, and reserve nurses as may be needed: Provided, That all nurses in the Nurse Corps shall be appointed or removed by the Surgeon General with the approval of the Secretary of the Navy, and that they shall be graduates of hospital training schools having a course of instruction not less than two years. The appointment of superintendent, chief nurses, nurses, and reserve nurses shall be subject to an examination as to their professional, moral, mental, and physical fitness, and that they shall be eligible for duty at naval hospitals and on board of hospital and ambulance ships and for such special duty as may be deemed necessary by the Surgeon General of the Navy. Reserve nurses may be assigned to active duty when the necessities of the service demand, and when on such duty shall receive the pay and allowances of nurses: Provided, That they shall receive no compensation except when on active duty. The superintendent, chief nurses, and nurses shall respectively receive the same pay, allowances, emoluments, and privileges as are now or may hereafter be provided by or in pursuance of law for the Nurse Corps (female) of the Army." (Act May 13, 1908. See also Art. 4428, N. R., 1913.)

2. Accounts.—Upon original entry into the service of a member of the Nurse Corps

2. Accounts.—Upon original entry into the service of a member of the Nurse Corps (female), the officer taking up the account will require a copy of the nurse's appointment, or, if in reserve, a certificate of her enrollment, as the case may be, showing thereon over the proper signature the date on which oath was accomplished, and in addition a duplicate copy of her orders to duty. Upon transfer, copies of her accounts and duplicate copies of her orders will be furnished as vouchers to substantiate the pay roll. (S. and A. Memo. 195, p. 4237.)

3. Pay, assigned as chief nurse.—A nurse assigned to duty as chief nurse is entitled to \$30 per month in addition to her pay as nurse. (Wrt. R-4428 (3) and Gen. Ord. No. 65, May 4, 1910.)

(a) A chief nurse of the Female Nurse Corps of the Navy assigned to duty at a naval hospital is not entitled to pay as such chief nurse while traveling to her place of duty. (Comp. Dec. May 7, 1910.)

4. Commutation of rations.—Nurses who subsist themselves shall be credited with commutation of rations at following rates: If on duty, 40 cents per day; if on leave with pay, 25 cents per day. (See Comp. Dec. 21, 1912.)

(a) A member of the Nurse Corps (female) on detached duty where subsistence is

not furnished by the Government, is entitled to commuted rations at the rate of \$1

per day. (S. and A. Memo. 201, p. 4425.)

(b) The expense of board and lodging procured for members of the Nurse Corps (female) detailed to duty at a hospital, there being no accommodations available at such hospital for them, is a proper charge against the United States. (Comp. Dec.,

Sept. 11, 1917.)

- 5. Commutation of quarters.—Members of the Nurse Corps (female) of the Navy will be allowed \$24 per month in lieu of quarters, when not occupying Government quarters, which amount will be credited on the pay roll upon the certificate of the senior officer at the hospital or station where members of said Nurse Corps may be serving that application for, and no assignment of quarters has been made, and that Government quarters are not available. (Act June 24, 1910, as amended by act June 15, (Art. 4513 (10), N. R.)
- 6. Commutation of heat and light.—Members of the Nurse Corps (female) on active duty and at a place where no Government quarters are provided are entitled to commutation of heat and light for rooms actually occupied, not exceeding two and according to the zone rates in which they are on duty. (Comp. Dec., Nov. 24, 1917.)
  7. Hospital fund.—Nurses shall be checked 20 cents a month for the hospital fund.

(Art. 4428 (5), N. R., 1913.)

8. Foreign service pay.—Nurses are entitled to \$10 a month extra pay when serving beyond the limits of the States comprising the Union and the Territories of the United States contiguous thereto (except Cuba, Porto Rico, and Hawaii); said additional pay to commence on date of sailing from the United States under orders to foreign

duty. (Comp. Dec., Apr. 12, 1911.)

(a) While on duty at a foreign station a nurse is, while on authorized leave, entitled to additional pay provided for such duty. (Comp. Dec., Jan. 25, 1916.)

9. Leave.—Nurses are entitled to cumulative leave of absence with pay at the rate of 30 days for each calendar year of service in said corps. (Art. 4428 (7), N. R.)

10. Allowances of superintendent.—The superintendent shall be entitled to the

- same allowances, when on duty, as other members of the Nurse Corps. (Art. 4428 (8), N. R.)
- 11. Longevity.—Members of the Nurse Corps (female) of the Navy are entitled to credit, from and after approval of the act of March 23, 1910, for prior service in the Nurse Corps (female) of the Army. (Comp. Dec., July 22, 1910.)

  (a) Service in the Army as contract nurse before the Female Nurse Corps of the

Army was established can not be credited in computing service for the increased pay

authorized by act of March 23, 1910. (Comp. Dec., Oct. 31, 1910.)

12. Traveling allowances.—As members of the Nurse Corps (female) of the Navy are entitled to the same traveling allowances as the members of the Nurse Corps (female) of the Army, the Army Regulations (prescribing classes of expenses and maximum amounts allowed therefor for Army nurses when traveling under orders) must be held to apply to the members of the Nurse Corps (female) of the Navy when traveling under orders. (Comp. Dec., July 9, 1913.)

#### PAY AND ALLOWANCES OF NAVAL RESERVE FORCE.

## [Act of Aug. 29, 1916.]

1. The Naval Reserve Force is divided into six classes, designated as follows:

First. The Fleet Naval Reserve. Second. The Naval Reserve. Third. The Naval Auxiliary Reserve. Fourth. The Naval Coast Defense Reserve. Fifth. The Volunteer Naval Reserve. Sixth. Naval Reserve Flying Corps.

2. Retainer pay.—This pay is paid to members by the Government in return for their obligation to serve in the Navy in time of war or national emergency. Until a member has been confirmed in his rank or rating he will be paid retainer pay at the rate of \$12 per annum. This pay "shall be in addition to any pay to which a member may be entitled by reason of active service." While performing active service a member shall receive the full pay of his rank or rating. After confirmation in rank or rating retainer pay shall be as stated under each class. Members of the Vol-

unteer Naval Reserve do not receive retainer pay or clothing.

(a) An enlisted man who enrolled in the former Naval Reserve within four months after his discharge from the Navy, and who was serving therein on August 29, 1916 (date of approval of Naval Reserve Force enactment), and who prior to July 1, 1917, enrolls in the Fleet Naval Reserve, is considered to have therein enrolled within

enrolls in the Fleet Navar Reserve, is considered to have therein enrolled within four months of his discharge from the Navy and therefore entitled to 25 per cent increase in retainer pay. (Comp. Dec., Sept. 29, 1917.)

3. Retainer pay, reenrollment.—Members who reenroll for four years within four months after discharge from previous enrollment, and who have performed, during preceding enrollment, the minimum amount of active service, shall for each such enrollment receive an increase of 25 per cent of their base retainer pay. Members who have completed 20 years' service in the Naval Reserve Force, and who during that period performed the required active service, upon their own application will be retired, and at such retirement will be paid a cash gratuity equal to the total

amount of their retainer pay during their last enrollment.

4. Clothing.—Members of the Naval Reserve Force shall, upon first reporting for active service for training during each enrollment, be credited with a uniform gratuity of \$50 for officers and \$30 for men. Upon reporting for active service in time fof war or national emergency the uniform gratuity shall be \$150 for officers and \$60 bor men or the difference between these amounts and any amounts that may have meen credited as a uniform gratuity during the current enrollment. If, however, a member severs his connection with the service, without compulsion on the part of the Government, before the term for which he has enrolled has expired, "the amount

"That the uniform gratuity for the members, other than officers, of each class of the Naval Reserve Force shall be the same as that prescribed for enlisted men of the Navy, but in time of peace the Secretary of the Navy shall prescribe the portion of the clothing gratuity to be issued to such members, other than officers, of the Naval

Reserve Force." (Act July 1, 1918.)

"That no part of the clothing gratuity credited to members of the Naval Reserve Force shall be deducted from their accounts where said members accept or have accepted temporary appointments in the Navy in time of war or other national emergency." (Act July 1, 1918.)

#### CLASS 1.-FLEET NAVAL RESERVE.

5. Membership.—(a) "All former officers of the United States naval service, includ-

ing midshipmen, who have left the service under honorable conditions;

(b) "Citizens of the United States who have been, or may be entitled to be, honorably discharged from the naval service after not less than one four-year term of enlistment or after a term of enlistment during minority, and who shall have enrolled in the Naval Reserve Force shall be eligible for membership in the Fleet Naval

(c) By transfer from the naval service enlisted men at the expiration of an enlist-

ment completing sixteen years' naval service;

(d) And by transfer from the naval service enlisted men "with twenty or more

years' naval service."

6. Pay, allowances, etc., of "former officers" (par. 4a).—"The annual retainer pay of officers of the Fleet Naval Reserve within four months of termination of last naval service or reenrollment in the Fleet Naval Reserve within four months from date of termination of last enrollment; Clothing: Allowances as stated under Naval Reserve Force, paragraph 3.

(a) An officer of the Pay Corps, Fleet Naval Reserve, is entitled when computing his pay for active service to credit for five years' constructive service acquired in former service as an officer of the Regular Navy. (Comp. Dec., Sept. 18, 1917.)

"Citizens" (par. 4b). Retainer pay of \$12 per annum until confirmed in their rank or rating; after confirmation, members with less than eight years' naval service receive pay at rate of \$50 per annum, members with more than eight and less than twelve years' naval service receive pay at the rate of \$72 per annum, members with more than twelve years' naval service receive pay at the rate of \$100 per annum—except that men who fail to perform during an enrollment three months' active service in the Navy will be paid on next reenrollment pay at rate of but \$12 per annum until such time as they shall have completed three months' active service; Clothing: Allow-

ances as stated under Naval Reserve Force, paragraph 3.

Sixteen-year service men (par. 4c). One-third of "the base pay they were receiving at the close of their last naval service plus all permanent additions thereto," increased by 10 per cent if "credited with extraordinary heroism in the line of duty;" Clothing: Allowances as stated under Naval Reserve Force, paragraph 3. Retirement: Upon completing thirty years' service (including naval and fleet naval reserve service) members may, upon their own request "be placed on the retired list of the Navy with the pay they were then receiving plus the allowances to which enlisted men of the same

rating are entitled on retirement after thirty years' naval service."

Twenty-year service men (par. 4d). One-half of the "base pay they were receiving at the close of their last naval service plus all permanent additions thereto," increased by 10 per cent if "credited with extraordinary heroism in the line of duty or whose average marks in conduct for twenty years or more shall not be less than ninety-five per centum of the maximum;" Clothing: Allowances stated under Naval Reserve Force, paragraph 3. Retirement: "Upon their own request, upon completing thirty years' service including naval and fleet naval reserve service, be placed on the retired list of the Navy with the pay they were then receiving plus the allowances to which enlisted men of the same rating are entitled on retirement after thirty years' naval service.

(a) A transferred member of the Fleet Naval Reserve of over 20 years' service is entitled to but one 10 per cent increase of his retainer pay for extraordinary heroism

or conduct marks. (Comp. Dec., June 2, 1917.)

(b) Members of the Fleet Naval Reserve are entitled to active-service pay while on active duty for training on board ship and when employed in authorized travel to and from such active duty. When detached from active duty and sent to hospital, they are not entitled to active service pay thereafter except for time necessary to travel to their homes. (Comp. Dec., Feb. 3, 1917.)

(c) Officers and men of the Fleet Naval Reserve, during active service in time of

war, are entitled to pay while in hospital under the same circumstances and subject to the same limitations as would apply to officers and men of the Regular Navy.

(Comp. Dec., May 22, 1917.)
7. Hospital fund.—The hospital fund of transferred members of the Fleet Naval Reserve is deducted from their retainer pay. (S. and A. Memo. 197, p. 4297.)

8. Travel allowance.—"No member shall be entitled to travel allowance unless the period of such active service is for not less than one month, or unless specifically provided for by such regulations as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy.

9. Penalties.—"Any pay which may be due any member of the Fleet Naval Reserve shall be forieited when so ordered by the Secretary of the Navy upon the failure, under such conditions as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy, of such man to report for inspection."

(a) A chief quartermaster or a chief commissary steward transferred to Fleet Naval Reserve is entitled to retainer pay from date of transfer at rate of one-half base pay

plus all permanent additions. (Comp. Dec., Sept. 22, 1916.)

#### CLASS 2 .-- NAVAL RESERVE.

10. Pay, retainer.—Before confirmation, \$12 per annum; after confirmation in rank or rating, "two months' base pay of the corresponding rank or rating in the Navy." 11. Clothing allowance.—See paragraph 3 under Naval Reserve Force.

### CLASS 3 .- NAVAL AUXILIARY RESERVE.

12. Pay, retainer.—Before confirmation, \$12 per annum; "after confirmation in rank or rating \* \* \* for officers: One month's base pay of the corresponding rank in the Navy; and for men: Two months' base pay of the corresponding rating in the Navy.''

13. Pay, active duty.—While on active duty a member will receive the full pay of

his rank or rating.

(a) Officers of the Naval Auxiliary Reserve are not entitled to longevity increase of pay for services rendered in the Naval Auxiliary service in a civil capacity, when computing their pay for service in the Navy. (Comp. Dec., June 27, 1917.) 14. Clothing allowance.—See paragraph 3 under Naval Reserve Force.

#### CLASS 4 .- NAVAL COAST DEFENSE RESERVE.

15. Pay, retainer.—Before confirmation, \$12 per annum; after confirmation in rank rating, "two months' base pay of the corresponding rank or rating in the Navy." or rating, "two months' base pay of the corresponding rank or rating in 16. Clothing allowance.—See paragraph 3 under Naval Reserve Force.

17. Subsistence.—Enlisted men of the Naval Coast Defense Reserve on detached duty are entitled to be furnished with subsistence in kind, or in lieu of this to such per diem rate as the department may have previously fixed. (Comp. Dec., Mar. 23, 1917.)

#### CLASS 5 .-- VOLUNTEER NAVAL RESERVE.

18. Members of this class are eligible for membership in any one of the other classes of the Naval Reserve Force and obligate themselves to serve in the Navy in any one of said classes without retainer pay and uniform gratuity in time of peace.

(a) In time of war officers of Volunteer Naval Reserve on active duty are entitled

to uniform gratuity of \$150 for a full term enrollment. (Comp. Dec., Aug. 7, 1917.,

#### CLASS 6 .- NAVAL RESERVE FLYING CORPS.

19. Pay, retainer.—Before confirmation, \$12 per annum; after confirmation in rank or rating, "two months' base pay of the corresponding rank or rating in the Navy." 20. Clothing allowance.—See paragraph 3 under Naval Reserve Force.

## NAVAL MILITIA AND NATIONAL NAVAL VOLUNTEERS.

# PAY AND ALLOWANCES (NAVAL MILITIA).

Officers of the Naval Militia when on active duty receive the same pay as officers of corresponding grades of the Navy and Marine Corps. (Act Aug. 29, 1916.)
Enlisted men of the Naval Militia during periods of active duty are "entitled to the same pay as enlisted men of corresponding rate or rank of the Navy or Marine Corps." (Act Aug. 29, 1916.)

#### PAY AND ALLOWANCES (NATIONAL NAVAL VOLUNTEERS).

"That every person enrolled in said Volunteers shall, from the date of the call of the President, and during the continuance of his active service under said call, stand relieved from all duty as a member of the Naval Militia, and shall, during said period, have in said Volunteers all the authority and obligations of a person of similar rank, grade, or rate in the United States Navy or Marine Corps, shall be governed by the laws and regulations for the government of the Navy, and shall, during his time of active service, be entitled to the same pay and allowances as are, or may be hereafter, provided by law for a person of similar rank, grade, or rate in the United States Navy and Marine Corps, respectively." (Act Aug. 29, 1916.)

## COAST GUARD.

## [For text of act, see p. 36, G. O. 231.]

 Pay and allowances.—(a) Commissioned officers of the Coast Guard when operating with the Navy in time of war do not receive the 10 per cent provided for officers

of the Navy on sea duty. (Comp. Dec., June 19, 1917.)

(b) Warrant officers, petty officers, and enlisted men of the Coast Guard, during the continuance of the war (in accordance with act approved May 22, 1917) receive the same rate of pay as prescribed for corresponding grades or ratings and length of service in the Navy. (Comp. Dec., June 19, 1917.)

(c) The pay of warrant officers and enlisted men of the Coast Guard when the latter

service is operating with the Navy, is the pay of the service which is greatest. (Comp.

Dec., Dec. 1, 1917.)

(d) Coast Guard General Orders Nos. 17 and 19, relative to supplies, proposals, vouchers, and pay for Coast Guard units, while acting as a part of the Navy, are printed in full on pages 4324, 4325, 4326 of S. and A. Memo. 198.

(e) The enlisted personnel of Coast Guard, Naval Reserve Force, Naval Militia, and National Naval Volunteers while on active duty with the Navy are entitled to flat base increase of pay provided by act of May 22, 1917, for the same period during which enlisted men of the regular Navy are so entitled. (Comp. Dec., June 27, 1917.)

(f) Enlisted men of the Coast Guard serving on board cutters having the required complement of officers and men and who may be designated Navy mail clerks or assistant Navy mail clerks in the manner prescribed for the Navy are while performing such duty entitled to the additional compensation for such duty, payable from "Pay and allowances" of the Coast Guard. (Comp. Dec., June 26, 1917.)

# COAST AND GEODETIC SURVEY (ACT MAY 22, 1917).

"Nothing in this act shall reduce the total amount of pay and allowances they [members of Coast and Geodetic Survey] were receiving at the time of transfer. While actually employed in active service under direct orders of the Department members of the Coast and Geodetic Survey shall receive the benefit of all provisions of laws relating to disability incurred in line of duty or loss of life." (Act May 22, 1917.)

(a) Travel expense, as well as pay and cost of subsistence, incurred on or since September 24, 1917, by the personnel of the Coast and Geodetic Survey, is payable by the department to which such personnel was transferred and so continues until the personnel is returned to the Coast and Geodetic Survey by lawful authority.

(Comp. Dec., Oct. 18, 1917.)

2. Pay, longevity.—(a) "There shall be allowed and paid to each commissioned officer below the rank of brigadier general, including chaplains and others having assimilated rank and pay, ten per centum of their current yearly pay for each term of five years' service." (Sec. 1262, R. S.)

(b) "The total amount of such increase for length of service shall in no case exceed

forty per centum on the yearly pay of the grade as provided by law." (Sec. 1263, R. S.)

(c) "In no case shall the pay of a colonel exceed five thousand dollars a year, the

pay of a lieutenant colonel exceed four thousand five hundred dollars a year, or the pay of a major exceed four thousand dollars a year." Sec. 1267, R. S., as amended by the act of May 11, 1908.)



(b) Longevity pay of officers is computed from date of acceptance of appointment; and includes all service in the Army, Navy, or Marine Corps.

3. Pay, on leave.—(a) "Officers when absent on account of sickness (except as provided in par. 4 below) or wounds, or lawfully absent from duty and waiting provided in par. 4 below) or wounds, or lawfully absent from duty and waiting orders, shall receive full pay; when absent with leave, for other causes, full pay during such absence not exceeding in the aggregate thirty days in one year, and half pay during such absence exceeding thirty days in one year. When absent without leave, they shall forfeit all pay during such absence, unless the absence is excused as unavoidable." (Sec. 1265, R. S.)

(b) "In the discretion of the Secretary of War, leave of absence without deduction of pay and allowances may be extended to four months if taken only once in four years." (Act July 29, 1876; 19 Stat., 102.)

4. Pay while absent, sick.—No officer or enlisted man absent from duty on account of sickness or disease resulting from his own interpretate use of drugs alcoholice.

of sickness or disease resulting from his own intemperate use of drugs, alcoholic liquors, or other misconduct shall receive pay for such period of absence. (Acts

Apr. 27, 1914; Aug. 29, 1916.)

5. Pay, additional, for foreign service.—(a) "Provided, That hereafter the pay proper of all officers serving beyond the limits of the States comprising the Union and the Territories of the United States contiguous thereto shall be increased ten per centum over and above the rates of pay proper as fixed by law for time of peace, and the time of such service shall be counted from the date of departure from said States to the date of return thereto." (Both dates inclusive; see 13 Comp., 632.) (Act Mar. 2, 1901; 31 Stat., 903.) (See also act of Mar. 3, 1901; 31 Stat., 1108; and Army act of June 30, 1902.)

(b) By the act of June 12, 1906 (34 Stat., 247), officers serving in Porto Rico and Hawaii are excepted from the provisions of the above act (13 Comp., 33). This

does not include the Marine Corps; see note below, case of Vulte v. United States.

(c) "Increase of pay for service beyond the limits of the States comprising the Union and the Territories of the United States contiguous thereto shall be as now provided by law." (Act May 11, 1908.) The provisions of this act are construed to continue the limitation imposed by the act of June 12, 1906, above, as to Porto Rico and Hawaii. (Comp. Dec., June 2, 1908.)

An officer or enlisted man of the Marine Corps serving in Porto Rico since the act.

An officer or enlisted man of the Marine Corps serving in Porto Rico since the act of March 2, 1901 (31 Stat., 903), is respectively entitled to 10 and 20 per cent increase of pay for such service, as well as during the outward and return voyages. (Court of Claims of the United States No. 30481 (decided Apr. 1, 1912), Nelson P. Vulte v. United States.) Under this decision officers and men of the Marine Corps continued to be entitled to 10 and 20 per cent increase while serving in Canal Zone, Panama, Hawaii, or Porto Rico until the act of August 24, 1912, quoted in (f) below.

(d) The 10 per cent increase for foreign service is computed on base pay and permanent additions only. (Sup. Ct., Mar. 13, 1905; Mills Dec. and Compts. Dec., May 19 and June 4, 1915; 21 Compt. 811 and 848, respy.)

(Under the above, foreign-service pay of officers should be computed on base and

longevity pay only.)

(e) Officers and men of a marine battalion on shore duty, who are not specifically detached from this duty but are embarked on a transport for passage for special temporary expeditionary duty beyond seas, are, while in such status, entitled to foreign-service pay. (See also Comp. Dec., Nov. 7, 1911; p. 1912, Bu. Memo. No. 129.) (Comp. Dec., Mar. 22, 1912.)

(f) "Provided, That hereafter the laws allowing increase of pay to officers and orbited non-first ferrier service shall not apply to complete the Carel Zone, Parameter.

enlisted men for foreign service shall not apply to service in the Canal Zone, Panama, or Hawaii or Porto Rico." (Act of Aug. 24, 1912, 37 Stat., 576.)

(g) When officers and men are assigned to shore duty abroad they become entitled to the additional pay when they start upon that duty. When the orders to shore duty abroad are given before departure from the United States the pay begins upon departure, but when given abroad the pay begins upon landing. The officers are entitled to traveling expenses (mess bill) from the time of departure to time of arrival at objective point. (Comp. Dec., June 5, 1914; Bu. Memo. 160, p. 3253.)

(h) "Provided further, That marine gunners and quartermaster clerks of the Marine Corps assigned on foreign shore service shall be entitled to the same increased compensation and under the same conditions as is now or hereafter allowed by law to

commissioned officers of the Marine Corps." (Act. Mar. 4, 1917, 39 Stat., 1188.)
(i) Sea pay: Provided, That the increased compensation as now fixed by law for the Marine Corps for foreign shore service shall hereafter be paid to the officers and enlisted men of that corps while on sea duty, in the same manner and under the same conditions as is provided by the act approved May 13, 1908, for officers of the Navy. (Act Mar. 3, 1915.) Officers or men are not entitled to sea pay under this

act while in confinement awaiting or undergoing trial (Compts. Dec., Aug. 24, 1915; Bu. Memo. 174, p. 3766), nor while on leave or furlough (see Comp. Dec., June 8; 1915, Memo. 172, p. 3703). Entitled to sea pay for duty performed at sea under orders though not formally or technically attacked to the vessel as part of her complement (see 22 Compt., 271).

6. Pay for providing mounts.—(a) "In case any officer below the grade of major, required to be mounted, provides himself with suitable mounts at his own expense; he shall receive an addition to his pay of \$150 per annum if he provides one mount; and \$200 per annum if he provides two mounts." (Act May 11, 1908.)

(b) Officers required by regulations or orders from proper authority to be mounted may obtain the additional pay for providing such mounts in the following manner: By filing with the first voucher (N. M. C. 426) on which credit is claimed duplicate copies of their orders requiring them to be mounted, together with proper certificates from their commanding officer that the mount, or mounts, are in all respects suitable for the military service and conform to the standards for mounts prescribed by proper authority (citing authority). Subsequent vouchers need only refer to the original authority and the first voucher with which such authority is filed.

(c) An officer of the Marine Corps required to be mounted, and who provides himself with a suitable mount at his own expense, is, while temporarily detached from the station where his mount is kept, entitled to mounted pay so long as his mount is actually and exclusively owned and kept for his use in the military service. (Comp.

Dec., Apr. 19, 1912.)
7. Pay, aviation duty.—(a) That from and after the passage and approval of this act the pay and allowances that are now or may be hereafter fixed by law for officers of the Navy and Marine Corps shall be increased thirty-five per centum for such officers as are now or may hereafter be detailed by the Secretary of the Navy on aviation duty: Provided, That this increase of pay and allowances shall be given to such officers only as are actual flyers of heavier-than-air craft, and while so detailed: Provided only as are actual nyers of neavier-than-air crait, and while so destailed: Provided further, That no more than thirty officers of the Navy and Marine Corps shall be detailed to aviation service: Provided further, That no officer above the rank of lieutenant commander in the Navy or major in the Marine Corps shall be detailed for actual flying. (Act of Mar. 4, 1913.)

(b) Hereafter officers of the Navy and Marine Corps appointed student naval aviators, while lawfully detailed for duty involving actual flying in air craft, including

balloons, dirigibles, and aeroplanes, shall receive the pay and allowances of their rank and service plus thirty-five per centum increase thereof; and those officers who have heretofore qualified, or may hereafter qualify, as naval aviators, under such rules shall, while lawfully detailed for duty involving actual flying in air craft, receive the pay and allowances of their rank and service plus fifty per centum increase thereof: Provided, That not more than a yearly average of forty-eight officers and ninety-six enlisted men of the Navy and twelve officers and twenty-four enlisted men of the Marine Corps, detailed for duty involving actual flying in air craft, shall receive any increase in pay while on duty involving actual flying in air craft, nor shall any officer in the Navy senior in rank to commander, nor any officer in the Marine Corps senior in rank to major, receive any increase in pay or allowances by reason of such detail

or duty.

(c) The act approved August 29, 1916, provides that the number of officers detailed to duty in air craft involving actual flying in any one year shall be in accordance with the requirements of the air service as determined by the Secretary of the Navy: Provided, That the officers so detailed from the line of the Navy and from the Marine Corps shall not exceed the total number herein prescribed for the Naval Flying Corps. The officers detailed and the enlisted men of the Naval Flying Corps shall receive the same pay and allowances that are now provided by law for officers and enlisted men of the same grade or rank and rating in the Navy and Marine Corps detailed to duty

with air craft involving actual flying.

(d) The act approved August 29, 1916, provides that nothing in this act shall be so construed as to prevent the detail of officers and enlisted men of other branches of the Navy as student aviators or student airmen in such numbers as the needs of the service may require. Such officers and enlisted men, while detailed as student aviators and student airmen involving actual flying in air craft, shall receive the same pay and allowances that are now provided by law for officers and enlisted men of the same grade or rank and rating in the Navy detailed for duty with air craft.

(c) This increase applies to base and longevity pay and to all allowances except those furnished in kind. Mileage is an allowance within the meaning of this law. (19 Comp., 649.) Not computed on sea or foreign service pay. (See 22 Comp., p. 11.) Entitled to increase while on leave. (See Comp. Dec., Bu. Memo., 162, p. 3333.)

8. Pay, retired officers.—(a) "Officers retired from active service shall receive seventyfive per centum of the pay of the rank upon which they are retired." (R. S., 1274.)

(b) "The commissioned officers of the Marine Corps shall be retired in like cases, in the same manner, and with the same relative conditions in all respects as are provided for officers of the Army \* \* \*." (R. S., 1622.)

(c) Officers below the grade of lieutenant colonel assigned to active duty are entitled,

while so assigned, to receive the full pay and allowances of their respective grades, but retired officers above the grade of major, assigned to active duty, receive only the full retired pay of their grade, except that a colonel or lieutenant colonel, assigned

the full retired pay of their grade, except that a colonel or lieutenant colonel, assigned to active duty, shall receive the same pay and allowances as a retired major would receive under a similar assignment. (Act of June 12, 1906.)

The act approved August 29, 1916, provides that hereafter any retired officer of the naval service who shall be detailed on active duty shall, while so serving, receive the active duty pay and allowances of the grade, not above that of lieutenant commander in the Navy or of major in the Marine Corps, that he would have attained in due course of promotion if he had remained on the active list for a period beyond the date of his retirement equal to the total amount of time during which he has been detailed on active duty since his retirement. Provided That nothing horning shall be construed. active duty since his retirement: Provided, That nothing herein shall be construed to reduce the pay of any retired officer on active duty whose retired pay exceeds the

to reduce the pay of any retired officer on active duty whose retired pay exceeds the active duty pay and allowances for the grade of lieutenant commander.

(d) "Provided, That assignments which have been or may hereafter be made of retired officers of the Army to active duty as acting quartermasters shall be regarded as assignments to staff duties not involving service with troops within the meaning of the act of Congress approved April twenty-third, nineteen hundred and four."

(e) "Provided further, That hereafter any retired officer of the Army who has been detailed to active duty, and who has, since his retirement, served on active detail, shall be entitled to increases of longevity pay to be computed as provided by existing statute for the computation of longevity pay for the time of his service before retirement and on active detail since his retirement." (Act May 12, 1917, 40 Stat., 48.) (See 23 Comp., 715.) (See 23 Comp., 715.)

9. Death gratuity—officers.—(a) Payment of death gratuity to widow, children, or dependent relative of an officer of the active list is authorized under the same con-

ditions as officers of the Navy. (See par. 4, "General remarks.")

(b) "The laws providing for gratuity or payments in the event of death in the service and existing pension laws shall not be applicable after the enactment of this amendment to persons now in or hereafter entering the military or naval service, or such law shall have heretofore accrued." (Sec. 312, act of Oct. 6, 1917.)

10. Hospital fund.—(a) Twenty cents per month is deducted from the pay of each person of the Navy and Marine Corps, active and retired, to be applied to the naval hospital fund. (R. S., 1614.)

(b) Officers, active or retired, admitted to naval, Army, marine, or other hospitals, where the expenses are paid by the United States, are checked the value of one Navy ration (40 cents) per day to be credited to the naval hospital fund. (R. S., 4812, and Arts. R. 4521 and R. 4532, Navy Reg., 1913.) (Act Oct. 6, 1917; Bu. Memo. 200, p. 4390.)

ALLOWANCES-OFFICERS MARINE CORPS.

11. Mileage and traveling expenses—without troops.—(a) Officers of all grades, whether active or retired, are allowed mileage at the rate of 8 cents per mile for travel under competent orders on duty without troops in the United States, and to actual and necessary expenses for such travel abroad, or for repeated travel in the United States. (See act of June 10, 1896 (29 Stat., 376), act of Aug. 5, 1882 (22 Stat., 286), and 8 Comp. Dec., 123, as to mileage and travel abroad, and act July 1, 1902, and Art. 4495 (5) and (6), Navy Reg., 1913, as to repeated travel.)

(b) Travel with troops.—For travel on duty with troops, transportation only is allowed officers for all travel in the United States, the home waters thereof, and for

travel in the Philippine Archipelago, the Hawaiian Archipelago, and between the United States and Alaska; but for all other sea travel (except when regularly attached to vessels of the Navy for duty) on duty with troops actual expenses only, not including

any shore expenses at port of embarkation or debarkation. (Army act June 12, 1906; Comp. Dec., Nov. 9, 1906—case of Maj. Myers.)

12. Commutation of quarters.—(a) "Where there are public quarters belonging to the United States, officers may be furnished with quarters in kind, in such public quarters, and not elsewhere, by the Quartermaster's Department, assigning to the officers of each grade, respectively, such number of rooms as is stated in the following table: table:

"Provided, That hereafter at places where there are no public quarters available commutation for the authorized allowance therefor shall be paid to commissioned officers \* \* and pay clerks at the rate of \$12 per room per month;" \* \* (see Army act Mar. 4, 1915).

13. Allowance, heat and light.—"Hereafter heat and light actually necessary for the authorized allowance of quarters for officers and enlisted men shall be furnished at the expense of the United States under such regulations as the Secretary of War may prescribe." (Army act Mar. 2, 1907.) By the act of March 4, 1915, commutation of heat and light is authorized in the cases of officers occupying quarters other than public. In this connection see Marine Corps Orders No. 33 (Series 1915).

14. Leader of band—Pay and allowances.—"The leader of the United States Marine Band shall have the pay and allowances of a captain." (Act Aug. 29, 1916.)

15. For allowances of marine gunners and quartermaster clerks see Navy pay tables and "Remarks" concerning warrant officers.

#### PAY IN GENERAL.

1. Pay assimilated with Army.—(a) \* \* \* "The enlisted men of the Marine Corps shall be entitled to receive the same pay and bounty for reenlisting as are or may be provided by or in pursuance of law for \* \* \* enlisted men of like grades in the Infantry of the Army." (R. S., 1612.)

(b) "No officer or enlisted man absent from duty on account of sickness or disease

resulting from his own intemperate use of drugs, alcoholic liquors, or other misconduct shall receive pay for such period of absence." (Acts of Apr. 27, 1914, and Aug. 29

1916.)

(c) Sergeant majors and quartermaster sergeants are entitled to the pay of regimental sergeant majors and regimental quartermaster sergeants, United States Army, respec-

tively. (6 Comp. Dec., 599.)
(d) That the pay of drum major shall be the same as that now established, or that may be hereafter established, for first sergeants in the Marine Corps of the same length

of service. (Naval appropriation act, approved July 26, 1894.)

(e) Gunnery sergeants have the rank and allowances, including continuous service pay, of a first sergeant and pay at the rate of \$45 per month. (Act of Aug. 22, 1912.)

(f) The pay of members of the United States Marine Band is fixed by the act of August

29, 1916. By this act the leader of the band is given the pay and allowances of a captain, the second leader is given the allowances of a sergeant major, and the musicians

the allowances of a sergeant.

(g) Bounty for reenlistment.—"That hereafter any private soldier, musician, or trumpeter honorably discharged at the termination of his first enlistment period who reenlists within three months of the date of said discharge shall, upon such reenlistreenists within three months of the date of said discharge shair, upon such reenistment, receive an amount equal to three months' pay at the rate he was receiving at the time of his discharge." (Act May 11, 1908.) Three months' pay includes all pay a man was receiving at the time of his discharge. (Comp. Dec., June 8 and 11, 1908.) Drummers in the Marine Corps are also entitled to receive the three months' pay provided in the act of May 11, 1908. (Comp. Dec., Jan. 28, 1909.) War pay, act of May 18, 1917, to be included in computing bounty. (Comp. Dec., Dec., 13, 1917.)

(h) That sections 1280, 1281, and 1284 of the Revised Statutes be, and are hereby, repealed. \* \* \* (Act May 11, 1908.)

(i) That nothing herein contained shall be construed so as to reduce the pay or allowances now authorized by law for any officer or enlisted man of the Army, and all laws or parts of laws inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed. (Act May 11, 1908.)

An enlisted man of the Marine Corps detained beyond the expiration of his enlistment to await trial by court-martial and who is acquitted is entitled only to his regular pay while so held. (Comp. Dec., Apr. 9, 1912.)

(j) Death gratuity.—Payment of death gratuity to widow, children, or dependent

relative of enlisted men of the active list is authorized under the same conditions as in the case of officers of the Marine Corps. (See par. 4, "General remarks.")

(k) Travel pay.—The national-defense act, approved June 3, 1916, provides that on and after July 1, 1916, an enlisted man when discharged from the service, except by way of punishment for an offense, shall receive 31 cents per mile from the place of his discharge to the place of his acceptance for enlistment, enrollment, or original muster into the service, at his option: *Provided*, That for sea travel on discharge, transportation and subsistence only shall be furnished to enlisted men.

Enlisted men discharged on account of fraudulent enlistment, desertion, by purchase, for own convenience, or while in the hands of the civil authorities are not

entitled to travel allowance under the above law.

(l) Hospital fund.—Twenty cents per month will continue to be deducted from the above rates, as usual, for the naval hospital fund.

#### PAY-CONTINUOUS SERVICE.

2. (a) "Hereafter any soldier honorably discharged at the termination of an enlistment period, who reenlists within three months thereafter, shall be entitled to continuous-service pay as herein provided, which shall be in addition to the initial pay provided for in this act and shall be as follows, namely: For those whose initial pay as provided herein is \$36 or more, an increase of \$4 monthly pay for and during the second enlistment, and a further increase of \$4 for and during each subsequent enlistment up to and including the seventh enlistment. For those whose initial pay as provided for herein is \$18, \$21, \$24, or \$30, an increase of \$3 monthly pay for and during the second enlistment, and a further increase of \$3 for and during each subsequent enlistment up to and including the seventh, after which the pay shall remain as in the seventh enlistment. For those whose initial pay as provided herein is \$15 and \$16

an increase of \$3 monthly pay for and during the second and third enlistments each and a further increase of \$1 for and during each subsequent enlistment up to and including the seventh, after which pay shall remain as in the seventh enlistment: Provided, That hereafter any soldier honorably discharged at the termination of his first or any succeeding enlistment period who reenlists after the expiration of three months shall be regarded as in his second enlistment; that an enlistment shall not be regarded as complete until the soldier shall have made good any time lost during an enlistment period by unauthorized absences exceeding one day, but any soldier who receives an honorable discharge for the convenience of the Government after having served more than half of his enlistment shall be considered as having served an enlistment period within the meaning of this act; that the present enlistment period of men now in service shall be determined by the number of years' continuous service they have had at the date of the approval of this act, under existing laws, counting three years to an enlistment, and the former service entitling an enlisted man to reenlisted pay under existing laws shall be counted as one enlistment period." (Army act, May 11, 1908.) By the act of August 24, 1912, it is provided "That for all enlistments hereafter accomplished under the provisions of this act four years shall be counted as an enlistment period in computing continuous-service pay." For application of this law to the Marine Corps, see Comptroller's Decisions, September 4, 1913, Bureau Memoranda, No. 150, page 2758. "The national-defense act of June 3, 1916, provides that for all enlistments accomplished after November 1, 1916, three years shall be counted as an enlistment period in computing continuous-service pay."

(b) The only method which will place the enlisted men of the Army and Marine Corps on as nearly an equal footing as possible and give effect to section 1612 of the Revised Statutes as far as possible in connection with the requirements of the act of May 11, 1908, above, is to hold that a new enlistment period for men of the Marine Corps begins after a continuous service of three years without regard to discharge and reenlistment, except that the men must remain continuously in the service. (Comp.

Dec., Aug. 8, 1908.)

(c) In computing continuous service of marines for purpose of pay, only service in the Army and Marine Corps is counted. In counting Marine Corps service it is prescribed under the act of May 11, 1908, and the decision of the comptroller of August 8, 1908, above mentioned, to count three years to an enlistment for all continuous service (except the time a soldier is held in service beyond the expiration of his enlistment subsequent to the act of May 11, 1908, and as otherwise provided in said act—see Comp. Dec., Oct. 9, 1909, case of Sergt. West, and Oct. 28, 1909, case of Pvt. Daly), whether prior or subsequent to May 11, 1908, and in addition thereto to count one enlistment period for former service entitling the soldier to reenlistment (class 3) pay. Army service prior to May 11, 1908, is also counted on the same basis; but in counting Army service subsequent to May 11, 1908, for a man who has enlisted in the Marine Corps from the Army, such Army service should be counted on the basis of a full enlistment period, except as otherwise provided, with an honorable discharge and reenlistment within the proper time, i. e., an Army soldier is entitled upon enlisting in the Marine Corps to receive the same pay as he would have received if he had reenlisted in the Army. (Comp. Dec., Aug. 8, 1908; Army Pay Manual, 582, note 2, and Comp. Dec., June 28, 1909, case Bobolsky.)

(d) The provisions of the act of May 11, 1908, above mentioned, apply to soldiers

(d) The provisions of the act of May 11, 1908, above mentioned, apply to soldiers reenlisting after May 11, 1908, who were honorably discharged at the termination of an enlistment period prior to the passage of said act, as well as to soldiers so reenlisting who were honorably discharged after the passage of said act. (Comp., June 11, 1908.)
(c) A soldier who reenters the service on or after May 12, 1908, after having remained

(c) A soldier who reenters the service on or after May 12, 1908, after having remained out more than three months, is entitled to the pay of the second enlistment; but a soldier who completed one or more enlistments that did not entitle him to reenlistment pay, and reentered the service on or before May 11, 1908, having remained out over three months, is not entitled to credit for his former service.

(f) An enlistment shall not be regarded as complete until the soldier shall have made good any time in excess of one day lost by unauthorized absences, or on account of disease resulting from his own intemperate use of drugs or alcoholic liquors or other misconduct, or while in confinement awaiting trial or disposition of his case if the trial results in conviction, or while in confinement under sentence. (Act. Apr. 27, 1914.)

(g) The second leader of the Marine Band is entitled to the continuous-service pay of a regimental sergeant major. The first and second class musicians of the band are not allowed continuous-service pay. (See sec. 24, personnel act, Mar. 3, 1899, 5 Comp., 745, and Comp. Dec., June 30, 1908.)

(h) The continuous service of retired enlisted men is counted in the same manner as is provided for counting the past services of men on the active list. (Comp. Dec.,

June 26, 1908.)

(i) Service in the Army of less than one-half of the regular enlistment period and terminated by the purchase of discharge should not be included in determining, as far as pay is concerned, the date upon which a subsequent enlistment period is to

begin. (Comp. Dec., Mar. 20, 1912.)

(j) Enlisted men of the Marine Corps reenlisting after remaining out of the service over three months are required to make up time lost in the preceding enlistment before becoming entitled to pay as in second enlistment. (Comp. Dec., Feb. 4, 1918.)

#### FOREIGN-SERVICE PAY.

3. (a) "The pay proper of all enlisted men serving beyond the limits of the State comprising the Union and the Territories of the United States contiguous thereto shalf be increased twenty per centum over and above the rates of pay proper as fixed by law for time of peace, and the time of such Service shall be counted from the date of departure from the said States to the date of return thereto" (both dates inclusive). (Act Mar. 2, 1901, 31 Stat., 903. See also act of Mar. 3, 1901, 31 Stat., 1108, and Army act of June 30, 1902.)

By the act of June 12, 1906 (34 Stat., 247), enlisted men serving in Porto Rico and Hawaii are excepted from the foregoing act of March 2, 1901. (13 Comp. Dec., 33, July 21, 1906). This does not apply to the Marine Corps and enlisted men of the Marine Corps continued to be entitled to foreign-service pay for service in the Canal Zone, Panama, Hawaii, and Porto Rico, under the decision of the Court of Claims in the case of Nelson P. Vulte v. United States, until the passage of the act of August 24,

1912, quoted below:

"That increase of pay for service beyond the limits of the States comprising the Union and the Territories of the United States contiguous thereto shall be as now provided by law." (Act May 11, 1908.) The effect of this provision is to continue the limitation imposed by the act of June 12, 1906, as to pay for service in Porto Rico and Hawaii. (Comp. Dec., June 2, 1908.) "Provided, That hereafter the laws allowing in-

crease of pay to officers and enlisted men for foreign-service shall not apply to service in the Canal Zone, Panama, or Hawaii or Porto Rico." (Act. Aug. 24, 1912; 37 Stat., 576.)

(b) "The term 'pay proper' means compensation which may properly be designated as 'pay' as distinguished from allowances." (Sup. Ct., Mar. 13, 1905.) But by the comptroller's decision of May 19, 1915 (21 Comp., p. 811) foreign-service pay is computed on base pay, pay for continuous service, and pay for good-conduct medals only.

(c) Enlisted men transferred from ships to foreign shore stations for the purpose of transfer to the United States or for treatment in hospital, if subsequently returned to ship, are not entitled to twenty per centum increase pay during the time ashoreor

while en route to the United States.

(d) Sea pay: Provided, That the increased compensation as now fixed by law for the Marine Corps for foreign shore service shall hereafter be paid to the officers and enlisted men of that corps while on sea duty, in the same manner and under the same conditions as is provided by the act approved May thirteenth, nineteen hundred and eight, for officers of the Navy. (Act Mar. 3, 1915.) Officers and enlisted men are not entitled to sea pay under this act while in confinement awaiting or undergoing trial (Comp. Dec., Aug. 24, 1915, Bu. Memo. 174, p. 3766), nor while on leave or furlough. (See Comp. Dec., June 8, 1915, Bu. Memo. 172, p. 3703.)

## PAY, AVIATION DUTY.

4. (a) Hereafter enlisted men of the Navy or Marine Corps, while detailed for duty involving actual flying in air craft, shall receive the pay, and the permanent additions thereto, including allowances, of their rating and service, or rank and service, as the case may be, plus fifty per centum increase thereof. (Act Mar. 3, 1915.) This increase is computed on base pay, pay for good-conduct medals, and continuous-service pay only; but not computed on sea or foreign-service pay. (See 22 Comp., p. 11.) Men are entitled to increase while on furlough. (See Bu. Memo. 162, p. 3333.)

(b) The officers detailed and the enlisted men of the Naval Flying Corps shall receive the same pay and allowances that are now provided by law for officers and enlisted men of the same grade or rank and rating in the Navy and Marine Corps detailed to duty with air craft involving actual flying. (Act Aug. 29, 1916.)

(c) Nothing in this act shall be so construed as to prevent the detail of officers and enlisted men of other branches of the Navy as student aviators or student airmen in such numbers as the needs of the service may require. Such officers and enlisted men, while detailed as student aviators and student airmen involving actual flying in air craft, shall receive the same pay and allowances that are now provided by law for officers and enlisted men of the same grade or rank and rating in the Navy detailed for duty with air craft.

#### ADDITIONAL PAY FOR SPECIAL SERVICE.

5. (a) Mess sergeant.—The Army act of May 11, 1908, provides that mess sergeants shall receive \$6 per month in addition to their pay. (Comp. Dec., June 30, 1908.)

(b) Cooks.—Privates regularly detailed as cooks shall receive, in addition to the pay otherwise allowed by law, the following: First-class cooks, \$10 per month; secondclass cooks, \$8 per month; third-class cooks, \$7 per month; and fourth-class cooks, \$5

per month. (Act Mar. 2, 1907.)

(c) Gun pointers, messmen, gun captains, mail clerks, signalmen, and holders of good-(c) Gun pointers, messmen, gun captains, mail clerks, signalmen, and holders of good-conduct medals, pins, or bars.—All enlisted men of the United States Marine Corps regularly detailed as gun pointers, Navy mail clerks, gun captains, messmen, or signalmen, or holding good-conduct medals, pins, or bars, shall receive the same extra compensation, in addition to their monthly pay, as is now or may hereafter be allowed enlisted men of the Navy. Enlisted men of the Marine Corps regularly detailed as messmen, whether for duty affoat or ashore, may be paid additional compensation as provided for enlisted men of the Navy. (R., 4427.) Under the act of May 13, 1908, enlisted men of the Marine Corps are entitled to 10 per cent increase of pay upon each enlisted men of the Marine Corps are entitled to 10 per cent increase of pay upon each good-conduct medal, pin, or bar held by them. (Comp. Dec., Jan. 19, 1910.)

For particulars as to allowance and detail of mess sergeants, cooks, and messmen,

see Marine Corps Orders.

"Provided, That the provisions of the act of May 27, 1908 (35 Stat, 417, 418), as amended by the act of August 24, 1912 (37 Stat., 560), are hereby extended to authorize the Name of May 27, 1908 (35 Stat, 417, 418), as amended by the act of August 24, 1912 (37 Stat., 560), are hereby extended to authorize the designation of enlisted men of the Navy or Marine Corps as Navy mail clerks and assistant Navy mail clerks with expeditionary forces on shore." (Act Mar. 4, 1917, 39 Stat., 1188.)

(d) Expert riflemen, sharpshooters, and marksmen.—"Enlisted men now qualified or hereafter qualifying as expert riflemen shall receive, in addition to their pay, \$5 per

month; those qualifying as sharpshooters, \$3 per month, and those qualifying as marksmen, \$2 per month." (Army act, May 11, 1908.)

(e) Marine Band for playing at White House and public grounds.—Members of the Marine Band are allowed \$4 per month in addition to the rates of pay as given above for playing at the White House and public grounds. (Act of Aug. 18, 1856.)

(b) Retainer pay is in addition pay for active service.
(c) Retainer pay is payable only on condition that members make such reports as may be required by the Secretary of the Navy.
(d) All members who enroll within three months from the date of their last naval service or reenroll for four years within three months from the date of the termination of their last enrollment shall receive 25 per cent increase on their base retainer pay, provided they have performed the required active service.

(e) Three months' active service under each enrollment is required. This may

be taken in one or more periods.

(f) Retainer pay is paid annually or at shorter intervals, as the Secretary of the Navy may direct. The Secretary of the Navy has prescribed that enrolled officers and men of the Fleet Marine Corps Reserve shall be paid quarterly by check by a disbursing officer of the Marine Corps.

(g) In addition to retainer pay all members are, while in active service, entitled to the same pay, allowances, gratuities, etc., as officers and men of the regular service.

(h) All enrolled members are, upon first reporting for active service for training during each enrollment, entitled to credit with a uniform gratuity of \$50 for officers and \$30 for men. Upon reporting for active service in time of war the uniform gratuity is \$150 for officers and \$60 for men, less any amounts previously credited during current enrollment. Should any member voluntarily sever his connection with the service, the amount of this gratuity so credited shall be deducted from any pay due him. Clothing gratuity for men is credited by the Quartermaster Department (see par. 921 et seq., System of Accountability, U. S. M. C.) Class 1 (c) and class 1 (d) do not receive a uniform gratuity. Officers of the Marine Corps Reserve on first reporting for active duty for training, or in time of war, will be paid the proper uniform gratuity on their first pay voucher rendered after so reporting, in accordance with paragraph 283 (14) (b) and (c) of Marine Corps Orders No. 13 (Series In this connection see comptroller's decision, March 13, 1917.

(i) Members employed in other branches of service, except military service, may receive the pay and allowances incident thereto in addition to their retainer pay.

(j) Retainer pay is \$12 per annum for all reenrolled members who on any previous enrollment failed to perform 3 months' active service, until 3 months' active service is completed.

(k) No member shall be entitled to travel allowance (i. e., Government transportation and subsistence in the case of a man or mileage in the case of an officer) unless the period of such active service (the prescribed three months) is for not less than one month, or unless specifically provided for by such regulations as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy

(1) Enrolled members who have completed 20 years in the reserve, who have performed the required active service, shall, upon their own application, be retired, and on retirement receive a cash gratuity equal to the total retainer pay during last term

of enrollment.

(m) All enrolled members may, in time of peace, or when no national emergency exists, be discharged upon request upon reimbursing the Government for any clothing gratuity that may have been furnished them during their current enrollment.

(n) Men enrolling within three months of the date of discharge from the regular service who reenlist in the regular service within 3 months of the date of discharge

from the Fleet Reserve are entitled to gratuity and continuous service pay.

(o) Enrolled members are not subject to the laws and regulations for the government of the Navy, except while in active service. While engaged in actual service for training, or when called to service in time of war or national emergency, their accounts for such service will be carried in the same manner as enlisted men of the regular service, and deduction at the rate of 20 cents per month made for hospital fund under the provisions of section 1614, Revised Statutes. (Comp. Dec., Dec. 27, 1916.)

(p) All the above notes are based on the provisions of the act of August 29, 1916.

The text is greatly abbreviated and in case of doubt the original act should be

consulted.

II. Retainer pay—Enlisted men voluntarily transferred to the Fleet Marine Corps Reserve—Class 1 (c) and Class 1 (d)—

1. Class 1 (c).—Men transferred to the reserve list on the expiration of a term of enlistment, after completing 16 years of honorable naval service, shall be paid a retainer pay at the rate of one-third of the base pay they were receiving at the close of their last naval service plus the total of all permanent additions thereto. (See act of Aug. 29, 1916; and Comp. Dec. of Sept. 22, 1916—23 Comp., p. 190.)

2. Class 1 (d).—Men transferred to the reserve list after completing 20 or more years of naval service shall be paid a retainer at the rate of one-half of the base pay they were receiving at the close of their last naval service plus the total of all permanent

additions thereto. (23 Comp., p. 190.)

Notes.—(a) The retainer pay of class 1 (c) and class 1 (d) shall be increased 10 per cent for all men credited with extraordinary heroism in the line of duty, or in the case of class 1 (d) the retainer pay is increased 10 per cent for those whose average marks in conduct for 20 years or more shall not be less than 95 per cent of the maximum.

(b) The pay of any member of the Fleet Marine Corps Reserve shall be forfeited when so ordered by the Secretary of the Navy upon the failure, under such conditions as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy, of such men to report for inspection.

(c) Members who have established their qualifications by examination may be given warrants as marine gunners, quartermaster clerks, clerks for assistant paymasters, or second lieutenants. This does not deprive them of the pay, allowances, or gratuities to which they would otherwise be entitled.

(d) Members of this class may be retired upon their own request after completing 30 years of service, including all naval and Fleet Marine Corps Reserve service, and when so retired they receive the same pay they were receiving when retired, plus the allowances to which retired enlisted men of the regular Marine Corps are entitled.

(e) Members of this class are continued in the reserve until discharged or retired,

and are subject to the laws and regulations for the government of the Navy.

(f) Members of class 1 (c) and class 1 (d) do not receive uniform gratuity.

(g) Members of class 1 (c) and class 1 (d) will be paid monthly by check.

(h) Paragraphs (b), (c), (g), (i), and (k), under notes regarding enrolled members, class 1 (a) and class 1 (b), are also applicable to transferred members class 1 (c) and class 1 (d) of the Marine Corps Reserve.

(i) Hospital fund at the rate of 20 cents per month will be deducted from the retainer pay of transferred members, class 1 (c) and class 1 (d), of the Marine Corps Reserve, at all times. (Comp. Dec., Dec. 27, 1916.)

(j) The accounts of members of this class while engaged in actual service for training, or when called to service in time of war or national emergency, will be carried in the same manner as enlisted men of the regular service, but deduction at the rate of 20 cents per month for hospital fund will not be made from active duty pay as this is to be deducted from the retainer pay at all times. (Comp. Dec., Dec. 27, 1916.)

III. Retainer pay—Class 2, Marine Corps Reserve A-

1. Class 2 (a).—Officers; provisional. Annual retainer pay of \$12.

2. Class 2 (b).—Officers; confirmed. Annual retainer pay of two months' base pay of the corresponding rank in the Marine Corps.

3. Class 2 (c).—Enlisted men; provisional. Annual retainer pay of \$12.
4. Class 2 (d).—Enlisted men; confirmed. Annual retainer pay of two months' base pay of the corresponding rank in the Marine Corps.

IV. Retainer pay, class 4—Marine Corps Reserve B, is the same in all respects as Class 2, Marine Corps Reserve A.

V. Retainer pay, Marine Corps Reserve Flying Corps, class 5 (a), (b), (c), and (d), is the same in all respects as class 2A; and class 5 (e) and (f) is the same as class 1 (c) and (d), respectively. Members of the last two classes do not receive uniform gratuity. Notes.—(a) The minimum active service required of members of the Marine

Corps Reserve to qualify for confirmation in their rank or rating shall be three months. (b) All notes in the pay table under "Enrolled Members Fleet Marine Corps Reserve, class 1 (a) and class 1 (b)," except note (n), are applicable to members of the Marine

Corps Reserve A and B, and the Marine Corps Reserve Flying Corps, class 2, 4, and 5,

VI. Class 6.—The Volunteer Marine Corps Reserve obligate themselves to serve without retainer pay and uniform gratuity in time of peace. When called to service in time of war or emergency they will become entitled to uniform gratuity as provided for the class in which serving during such time. When on active duty the pay is the same as that of the corresponding rank in the Marine Corps.

In all cases active service pay commences on day of reporting and ceases on date of

detachment, both dates inclusive.
