QUOTE With reference to our discussions in regard to the situation in the Far East, upon my return to Washington I learned that the Japanese Ambassador had on August 16 approached the Secretary of State with a request for a resumption of the informal conversations which the Ambaschdor and the Secretary of State had been belding directed toward exploring the possibility of reaching a besis for negotiations in regard to a measuful settlement in the Pacific es and that the Secretary of State had in reply confined himself to rereating what he had previously said in regard to the developments in Japan's course of conquest which had led to the descation of those conversations.

The statement I made to him was no less vigorous than and was substantially similar to the statement we had discussed.

The Ambassador renewed the request made by him to the Secretary of State in regard to the resumption of conversations. I replied by reviewing the Japanese Government's settlen in actively pursuing a course of conquest and in inspiring the Japanese press to attack this Government.
