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TITLE

DATAPACK PROCESS

PURPOSE

This procedure defines the process for building and verifying the DPS Datapack. The procedure is applicable to both the datapack builder and the verifier.

BACKGROUND

The DPS Datapack is a compilation of flight-specific data used on-console during flights and integrated simulations. Like many other DPS tasks, the process of building and verifying a DPS Datapack has evolved over the years. Currently, the DPS Group Lead assigns both datapack builder and verifier, posting assignments on the flight manning list. In addition, the Group Lead can assign the datapack development tasks to anyone in the group and is not limited to personnel scheduled to support that particular mission.

Assigned personnel are notified of their datapack development responsibilities in ample time to meet the initial datapack due-date. To separate the DPS Datapack due-date from the ILC and first flight-specific integrated simulation, the due-date is based on a Mass Memory Release Schedule.

A new version of the orbiter flight software is released every mission, with one or more flight software drops occurring during each flight cycle. The first version drop is called the BASE release (BA); the second version is referred to as the BASE 2 release (B2); the third drop, the BASE 3 release (B3); and so on.

The PASS and BFS flight software developers (United Space Alliance) are required to deliver FSW products for each flight software release. These FSW products are currently delivered in a CD ROM format. A DPS Datapack is to be built for each flight release. The datapack builder and verifier will develop all datapacks that are required for their assigned flight.

The actual datapack build process utilizes a flight-specific CD ROM product, a network share drive PC-resident executable, and a network share drive PC word macro. In order to build a datapack utilizing the word macro, the datapack developer must input certain flight-specific software 'version data'. A Mass Memory Release Schedule, as illustrated in Figure 1.0-1, serves as the source for such user information, as well as, providing an estimate as to when to expect a CD ROM delivery.




Figure 1.0-2. DPS Datapack development overview (multi-BASE release)

Figure 1.0-2 provides a high-level overview of the datapack (DP) development process, from DP assignments to landing. For illustrative purposes, the overview assumes two flight software drops, a 'BASE' release, and a 'BASE 2' release. If additional flight software drops should occur, the datapack build and verify processes identified for the 'BASE 2' activities would be repeated for the 'BASE 3' release, etc.

PROCEDURE

The datapack document build-procedure is identical, whether it is for the initial BASE release or for a subsequent BASE 2 (BASE 3, etc.) release. For the first flight of a new OI drop, there is an additional verification step in the overall datapack development process. However, this additional step does not actually impact the generation of the DPS Datapack document or any associated MCC command loads.

A. Builder: Obtain a copy of the 'DPS Datapack Checklist' via the datapack template found on the DPS website or in the DF32 DATAPACK folder on the network share drive, and use it to check off milestones throughout the datapack development process. Use the version found on the DPS web-link (or network share drive). The DPS Datapack Checklist illustrated in Figure 1.0-3 may not be the latest version.

- B. Builder: Calculate the required DPS Datapack completion due-date.
 - Locate the Mass Memory Release Schedule posted on the DF32 bulletin board. This schedule, which is updated every week by the Test and Operations (T&O) Board as an FSW product-delivery status sheet, is illustrated via Figure 1.0-1.
 - 2. Observe the BASE release date that corresponds to the specific flight. Add three weeks to this date to calculate when the 'BASE' release datapack should be built, verified, and distributed on the DPS WFCR and WMPSR consoles.
- C. Builder and Verifier: Coordinate the datapack build and verification schedule. An agreement should be established when the builder is to provide the datapack and all required paperwork to the verifier and when the verifier will return the datapack to the builder. Keep in mind that the DP team should allow time to build workstation command loads and associated application files (for example, VP Scaling), and for any potential datapack rework and re-verification of any redlines.
- D. Builder: Three files ('DP.EXE' and two very similar 'dpkmacro' files) located on the share drive in the DF32 "DATAPACK | DPS-PGM" folder will be utilized to generate the required datapack development products. To ensure the latest datapack formats, utilize the word macros to generate the baseline datapack document. If the CD ROM required to build the datapack is not available, contact the DPS CD ROM manager.

The procedure, "ELECTRONIC DATAPACK GENERATION", presented later in this SCP, provides a checklist-type summary required to generate an electronic datapack utilizing current datapack PC programs, input data files, and word macro templates. The datapack builder is encouraged to utilize those procedures and identified PC files to generate the datapack word files.

For the benefit of the <u>first-time</u> datapack builder, the SCP includes two procedures, "USING THE DP PROGRAM" and "USING THE WORD MACRO". Each provides detailed instructions on certain aspects associated with the generation of the required electronic datapack products. The SCP also includes a high-level description of current datapack PC tools, their limitations, and rationale behind the electronic file generation procedures.

- E. Builder: Provide the verifier with a completely built datapack and all the paperwork that the verifier needs to verify the datapack product:
 - 1. Include any hard copies of the flight software listing that were utilized to build the datapack (not just deltas to the BASE datapack), the C&D Annex pages, and any additional required paperwork or forms.
 - 2. For the first flight utilizing a new OI release, provide the verifier with a printout of the Shuttle Software Reconfiguration product in order to verify the BFS fault messages driving the MCC OFS application (see SCP 1.7 for additional details).

- F. Verifier: Verify the datapack product by comparing the datapack pages with respect to the hard copies provided by the DP builder. The verifier has the responsibility to ensure that everything in the datapack package is correct.
- G. Builder: If applicable, implement any corrections/changes noted by the Verifier. Where practical, provide the verifier with the original redlines, as well as, the corrected copy for comparison verification.
- H. Builder and Verifier: Using an iterative approach, repeat steps F and G as necessary until an acceptable datapack product has been completed.
- I. Verifier: Email the SMS Flight Software T&O representative an electronic copy of all V/Ps. The entire DPS Datapack or a sub-set including only the PASS and BFS variable parameters may be sent to the SMS FSW T&O representative.

BASE release V/Ps are required at least one week prior to the ILC, or one week prior to any other datapack due-date. If there were no changes from previous V/P loads, send an email to inform the T&O representative that there were no changes.

- J. Builder: Transfer an electronic copy of the completed DPS Datapack to the DF32 DATAPACK folder located on the network share drive. Email an electronic copy of the verified datapack to the DF32 Website Administrator.
- K. Builder: Build all BASE release datapack MCC command loads and associated files (such as, VP Scaling files) on an MCC workstation (does not have to be a DPS workstation). Even though DPS personnel supporting integrated simulations may build flight-specific command loads, it is the ultimate responsibility of the datapack builder to ensure that workstation command loads match the official paperwork.
- L. Verifier: Verify all MCC workstation DPS command loads and associated files.
- M. Builder and Verifier: Sign the BASE release datapack checklist when complete with all items, and (builder) place a copy in transparent sleeves behind the datapack contents in each datapack binder. Keep the original checklist in the office binder.
- N. Builder: Verify that the order of contents in each datapack binder is as follows: datapack pages, official request forms for flight-specific loads, and the datapack checklist. All of these pages should be placed inside transparent sleeves.

For the initial BASE release datapack, include flight software listing hard copies, C&D Annex pages, and any verification paperwork in the office copy datapack binder. Place all such paperwork at the back of the binder. Transparent sleeves are not required for these items.

O. Builder: Place one datapack binder at each DPS and DPS SPT console and one binder in the office library. The office copy shall also serve as the EMCC copy. These datapack binders should be placed on console prior to the deadline date calculated in step B of this procedure. P. Builder: Periodically tag up with the DPS Flight Lead to ensure the DPS Datapack contents are current. If required, update the datapack and workstation loads and get the verifier to check the updates prior to the next affected integrated sim. If it is impossible to meet this schedule, inform the flight lead of the issue being worked.

After the updates have been completed, place an electronic copy in the previously mentioned DF32 folder on the share drive. In addition, email a copy to the updated datapack to the DF32 Website Administrator. These changes should be noted in the datapack checklist and initialed by both datapack builder and verifier.

ELECTRONIC DATAPACK GENERATION

This section of the SCP outlines a process to generate an electronic datapack word document utilizing PC-resident programs, input data files, and word macro templates. These PC tools and recommended procedure will yield two similar electronic files, which are subsequently merged into a single electronic datapack word file. The document merge action is accomplished using the Microsoft toolbar "Tools" pulldown "Compare and Merge Documents" feature.

It is recommended that the first-time datapack builder take time to read through two procedures, "USING THE DP PROGRAM" and "USING THE WORD MACRO", which provide expanded details relative to generating the required datapack development products. The following procedure assumes the datapack builder is familiar with the information provided by these two procedures.

While not mandatory, it is suggested the first-time datapack builder also take time to read through "DATAPACK PC TOOL ISSUES" at the end of the SCP. The topic provides a discussion of the datapack PC tools, their limitations, and procedural workarounds that have been implemented in the following procedure.

- A. Prior to the actual electronic datapack generation, the datapack builder needs to have acquired certain FSW-build specific information:
 - Flight Number (STS mission ID)
 - BASE Release Number
 - PASS FSW Version
 - BFS FSW Version
 - PASS/BFS OI Version
 - MEDS IDP Version
 - MEDS MDUF Version

The first two data items are utilized by both the DP.EXE executable program and the word macro. If either parameter value does not match information embedded in the CD ROM, the DP.EXE program will abterm. Likewise, the word macro will abterm if those two word macro inputs do not match the file names generated by the DP.EXE program. The datapack builder can confirm the value of those two parameters by noting "VOLUME ID:" information stamped on the CD ROM label.

The remaining five parameters (three FSW-build and two MEDS parameters), while important, could be entered incorrectly, and yet, the word macro will still run to completion. However, the resulting on-console documentation would be in error.

B. Locate a blank, formatted floppy diskette and the appropriate mission-specific CD ROM when ready to initiate the electronic datapack build process. If the desired CD ROM cannot be located, contact the DF32 CD ROM manager.

When ready to begin the actual electronic datapack generation, insert the floppy diskette in an office PC floppy drive. Then, load the CD ROM disk drive and select A-drive on the resulting pop-up window (load/access files in subsequent steps).

- C. Using the 'Windows Explorer' feature, locate the DF32 | DATAPACK | DPS-PGM folder on the network share drive. Open the 'Basic Macro' sub-folder and copy the 'VPLIST.DAT' and 'PDELIST.DAT' files from the S-drive to the A-drive. Then, minimize the window (maximized later to open the 'dpkmacro basic.dot' macro).
- D. Open a "Command Prompt" window; then enter DOS commands at the prompt (>):
 - 1. Start | Programs | Accessories | Command Prompt
 - 2. N:\>s:
 - 3. s:\>cd divisions\df\private\df32\datapack\dps-pgm
 - 4. s:\>DP XXX YY E:\stsXXXYY A:\

Where: XXX = 3-digit 'Flight No.' (e.g., 114 for STS-114)

YY = flight software release version for this particular datapack ('BA' for BASE release, 'B2' for BASE 2 release, etc.)

stsXXXYY = XXX and YY fields as defined above

As a reminder, the datapack builder should have previously confirmed the value of 'XXX' and 'YY' by noting the "VOLUME ID:" data on the CD ROM label.

- E. The 'DP.EXE' program will begin to execute and retrieve appropriate data from the flight software CD ROM. If no problems were encountered, the entire process will take about half a minute, followed by a text message to the DOS window.
 - 1. If no errors were encountered, ignore the DOS message. If errors are indicated, the most probable cause is that one or both of the input data files (VPLIST.DAT and/or PDELIST.DAT) were not copied to the A-drive.
 - 2. Open the text file (XXXYYERR.TXT) located on the A-drive. If "Decompress" errors are indicated, they are indicative of problems finding one or more of the variable parameter addresses. Then, close the text file (no longer required).
 - 3. If errors were detected in either case, the problem will need to be corrected and the procedure repeated. If no problems were noted, minimize the "Command Prompt" window.

- F. Maximize the window previously minimized in Step C ('Basic Macro' sub-folder). Select the 'dpkmacro basic.dot' file. After enabling macros per the window prompt, the document opens and a series of word macro window prompts will be observed.
 - 1. Enter the requested 'FSW-build' data inputs. Update the 'default' values with the correct data as necessary, clicking on the 'OK' button following each data entry.

Do <u>not</u> use the KYBD 'Enter' key when changing default data. Do <u>not</u> click on the 'Cancel' button. Such actions will cause the word macro to abterm or result in corrupted data parameters in the generated datapack file.

- 2. Following all requested data inputs, the word macro will generate a word file, labeled "STS-XXX-YY BASIC.doc" (where XXX and YY as previously defined). Unless the datapack builder deliberately elects to modify the document-store directory path, the resultant document will automatically be stored on the network share drive in a DF32 "aWORK" folder designed to accommodate the two intermediate datapack products. The datapack builder may peruse the document, if desired, or elect to immediately close the file and window.
- G. Next, navigate back to the DF32 share drive DATAPACK | DPS-PGM folder and open the '<u>Delta Macro</u>' sub-folder. Then copy the 'VPLIST.DAT' file to the A-drive (replacing the existing data file). This is a very important step as these two data files represent a different set of variable parameters. The DP.EXE program will abterm unless that precise file name (VPLIST.DAT) is utilized.
- H. Maximize the DOS "Command Prompt" window previously minimized in Step E. Then, press the KYBD 'up arrow' (↑) once, observing that the previously executed DOS command line, 's:\>DP XXX YY E:\stsXXXYY A:\', is echoed. Press the KYBD 'Enter' key to re-initiate the DOS command execution.
- I. The 'DP.EXE' program will again execute and retrieve appropriate data from the flight software CD ROM. The executable will overwrite the previous 'XXXYY' files as new files are generated. If no problems were encountered, the entire process takes about half a minute, followed by a text message to the DOS window.
 - 1. If no errors were encountered, ignore the DOS message. Open the text file (XXXYYERR.TXT) on the A-drive confirm no errors were detected; and then close the text file (no longer required). If any error was indicated, the problem will need to be corrected and the procedure repeated.
 - 2. Assuming success, the DOS "Command Prompt" window and CD ROM are no longer required. The window may now be closed and the CD ROM removed.
- J. Open the word macro (dpkmacro delta.dot) located in the '<u>Delta Macro</u>' folder and repeat the actions in Step F. The <u>only</u> difference is that the resulting word file will be stored in the 'aWORK' directory as an 'STS-XXX-YY DELTA.doc' file rather than as a 'BASIC' file. Once both electronic datapacks have been generated, the floppy disk is no longer required, and it may be removed, if desired.

- K. At this point, both of the intermediate datapack files, "STS-XXX-YY BASIC.doc" and "STS-XXX-YY DELTA.doc" should be located in the 'aWORK' folder on the DF32 share drive (or the folder specified by the datapack builder). For simplicity, the procedure assumes the word files are, in fact, stored in the default 'aWORK' folder.
- L. <u>Merging the Datapack Files</u> -- Using the two datapack files as inputs, a Microsoft Word 'Compare and Merge Documents' feature will be utilized to generate a new datapack word file. Once complete, this document will serve as the 'final electronic datapack' product:
 - 1. Open one of the two newly generated datapack files located in the 'aWORK' folder. Next, on toolbars, click on 'Tools', then click on the 'Compare and Merge Documents' pull-down menu.
 - 2. On the resulting 'Compare and Merge Documents' window, navigate to the network share drive DF32 'aWORK' foder and click on the other file.
 - 3. Then, in the lower right-hand corner, click on the 'Merge' pull-down button and select 'Merge into current document'. The merge feature displays the current document with the merged results of the two intermediate datapack files.
 - 4. Save ('save as' feature) the merged file as a new document "STS-XXX-YY.doc" in the 'aWORK' folder, where 'XXX' and 'YY' correspond to previously defined FSW-build parameters (simply erase the 'BASIC' or 'DELTA' in the file name).
 - 5. Next, on toolbars, select the icon corresponding to 'Accept Change' and click on 'Accept All Changes in Document' pull-down menu. Finally, save the resultant document. This file represents the "generated electronic datapack".

USING THE DP PROGRAM

The intent of this section of the SCP is to provide more detailed information relative to interfacing with the DP.EXE program than was presented in the electronic datapack generation procedure. It is recommended reading for the first-time datapack builder.

Overview -- In order to build the datapack file, it is first necessary to run a PC-resident, executable program located on the network share drive. This program, written in 'C' code, utilizes DOS (Disk Operating System) prompts to read a flight software CD ROM and generate data files on a floppy disk. Later, a word macro will utilize those same generated data files to construct an actual datapack word file.

The DP.EXE program utilizes two data input files, VPLIST.DAT and PDELIST.DAT, in its processing. If either file is not stored on the A-drive, the executable program will abort. The DP.EXE executable first uses the VPLIST.DAT data file to determine what set of variable parameter addresses are to be found, and then the data file is utilized to format each data entry using the VPLIST.DAT inputs. While DP.EXE does not require the PDELIST.DAT data file to locate the PDE addresses, the program does access the data file in order to complete the formatting of the datapack PDE addresses table.

In addition, the VPLIST.DAT data file is also utilized by a word macro to partition the variable parameter file into the desired DSM loads for the electronic datapack word file.

The PDELIST.DAT and VPLIST.DAT data files and the DP.EXE program-generated output data files are, in fact, pure text files even though they are not labeled as such. That is, there are no 'hidden' control characters embedded in any of the data files. However, the two input text files must be labeled as "dot DAT" files since the DP.EXE executable program is hard-coded to look for those precise file names (PDELIST.DAT and VPLIST.DAT). Otherwise, the executable will not be able to complete processing without errors.

If the datapack builder follows the recommended procedure, an 'intermediate' datapack word file will be generated utilizing the two data files as inputs to the DP.EXE program and a word macro-driven datapack template. A second VPLIST.DAT data file will be subsequently utilized to generate a second 'intermediate' datapack, using the DP.EXE executable and word macro. The datapack builder will then utilize a toolbar feature to merge the two intermediate word files into a single electronic datapack word file.

A. The datapack builder will need to acquire the values for two FSW-build delivery parameters prior to utilizing the DP program. These data parameters, 'Flight No.' and 'BASE Release', are referred to in subsequent steps as the 'XXX' and 'YY' fields, respectively. These data parameters may be confirmed by noting the "VOLUME ID:" information on the CD ROM label. Indeed, if either parameter value does not match embedded information on the CD ROM, the 'DP.EXE' executable program is guaranteed to abterm. The two parameters are summarized below:

B. Load the CD ROM and floppy diskette. Next, locate the required data files resident on the network share drive; then copy the required files to the A-drive. Initially, two data files (VPLIST.DAT and PDELIST.DAT) will be copied to the A-drive from a DF32 'Basic Macro' sub-folder. Later, a second VPLIST.DAT data file will be copied to the A-drive, this time from a 'Delta Macro' sub-folder. The DF32 drive directory path for each of the sub-folders is DATAPACK | DPS-PGM.

Each set of data files will be used as inputs to the DP.EXE program to generate output data files ultimately utilized by a word macro to create an electronic datapack word file. By utilizing different VPLIST.DAT data files, the resulting datapacks will reflect different variable parameter loads. However, the resulting datapack word files will be identical, other than the difference in variable parameter content.

C. A DOS command window must now be opened. Then, a series of DOS commands will be entered at the appropriate Command prompt (>). Each prompt requires specific KYBD entries, followed by pressing the 'Enter' key.

While the DOS command capability of a PC is somewhat similar to a workstation's 'X-term' command window, flight controllers rarely utilize DOS features nowadays, and such PC skills may be diminished. Therefore, the following DOS prompts are stated explicitly, much in a "cookbook" fashion.

Note that the required keystrokes are shown "boxed" for easier identification. Incidentally, either 'upper case' or 'lower case' inputs are OK, as the DOS commands are <u>not</u> case-sensitive.

1. To open a DOS command window, click on the following PC menu path:

Start | Programs | Accessories | Command Prompt

2. A 'Command Prompt' window will open with a DOS "N:\>" prompt. Enter the following keystrokes at the DOS prompt (>) to point to the share drive:



- 3. Observe that a DOS prompt "s:\>" will appear.
- 4. The next set of keyboard inputs corresponds to a 'change directory' command, which serves as a pointer identifying the share drive path required to access the datapack executable, 'DP.EXE', located in the DF32 'DATAPACK | DPS-PGM' directory. (Incidentally, 'cd', followed by a space, refers to the DOS command "change directory".) Enter the following keystrokes at the DOS prompt (>):

cd divisions\df\private\df32\datapack\dps-pgm
```

5. An echo prompt will then occur:

"s:\Divisions\DF\Private\DF32\DATAPACK\DPS-PGM>"

6. Next, enter the following character string at the DOS prompt (>). 'DP.EXE' will utilize the input to create the datapack files and store the data on the floppy disk:

DP XXX YY E:\stsXXXYY A:\

Where: DP = the name of the datapack executable program (DP.EXE)

XXX = the 3-digit flight ID (e.g., 114 for STS-114)

- YY = the flight software release version for this particular datapack ('BA' for the BASE release, 'B2' for the BASE 2 release, etc.)
- E:\ = the network drive name and path for the CD ROM containing the FSW data (for most office PCs, this will be E: drive)

stsXXXYY = XXX and YY fields as defined above

A:\ = floppy disk drive where DP.EXE-generated files are to be stored

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Verify that this is the correct version before use

Note that the "XXX YY" item entries are utilized to create labels for files generated on the A-drive. The "stsXXXYY" item entry <u>must</u> match labels on the CD ROM.

Once the DOS inputs are entered, the 'DP.EXE' program will execute and retrieve the appropriate data from the flight software CD ROM. Assuming that no problems were encountered, the entire process takes only about half a minute to complete. If no errors were detected, the program will output text to the DOS window similar to the format illustrated in Figure 1.0-4. If errors were detected, the advisory at the bottom of the text message will identify the number of error conditions encountered.

The DOS output text 'start time' and 'end time' values, which correspond to the local times the files were generated, have no significance and may be ignored. At this point, temporarily minimize (but don't close) the DOS 'Command Prompt' window.

- D. If the DOS message window does indicate that one or more errors were detected, the most likely cause is that one or both of the input data files (VPLIST.DAT and/or PDELIST.DAT) were not copied to the A-drive. Also, if the 'DP.EXE' program is unable to locate a desired variable parameter address, the executable will abterm.
- E. Barring errors, the 'DP.EXE' program will generate a series of five output files, all stored on the A-drive, each utilizing the 'XXXYY' labels in their file names. As previously noted, 'XXX' corresponds to the flight ID and 'YY' identifies the flight software BASE release ('BA', 'B2', etc.) forwhich the datapack is being generated.
 - 1. Four files (XXXYY.SPF, XXXYY.ROL, XXXYY.PDE, and XXXYY.VP) will serve as inputs to a word macro utilized to build and format the electronic datapack document. These files contain detailed data required to generate the datapack Sync Fail Pointers (XXXYY.SPF), Roll-In SPECs (XXXYY.ROL), PDE address listing (XXXYY.PDE), and up to four variable parameter tables (XXXYY.VP).

2. The remaining file (XXXYYERR.TXT) contains a 'health status' message relative to the preceding file generation process. The text file is not utilized in the actual datapack development. The file will contain error messages, if any, for errors detected by the executable program 'DP.EXE'.

For example, error messages will be generated if the specified CD ROM inputs cannot be found, if output files cannot be written, or if decompress errors are detected upon reading the CD ROM. 'Decompress' type errors are generally indicative of problems associated with variable parameters data acquisition.

F. The datapack builder should confirm that no errors were detected during the preceding DP.EXE program execution. Utilize the "Windows Explorer" application to open the just-generated 'XXXYYERR.TXT' file stored on the A-drive. If no errors were detected, the text message, as illustrated in Figure 1.0-5, will be observed:

If an error message in either the XXXYYERR.TXT file or in the Command Prompt window should indicate that a problem was, in fact, detected, then the error condition should be corrected and the entire process repeated.

For additional information on these five files and various known problems with the 'DP.EXE' program, refer to the "DPS Datapack & DPK Macro Certification Folder".

G. At this point, assuming that no errors had occurred during the preceding steps, the datapack builder is ready to utilize a word macro to generate an electronic datapack document using the files stored on the A-drive. Details for using this PC-resident program are provided in the following section. Following the generation of the datapack file, 'DP.EXE' will again be utilized to generate a second datapack file.

USING THE WORD MACRO

The intent of this section of the SCP is to provide more detailed information relative to interfacing with the word macro than was presented in the previous electronic datapack generation procedure. It is recommended reading for the first-time datapack builder.

A. Before performing the datapack build process, it will have been necessary to gather certain FSW-build information from various sources. In addition, to the two data parameters required as inputs to both the word macro and the 'DP.EXE' executable program (i.e., the 'Flight No.' and 'BASE Release'), three additional FSW-build specific parameters and two MEDS software-version parameters are required as data inputs to the word macro. These five parameters are summarized below:

The FSW-build parameters may be found on the Mass Memory Release Schedule, normally posted on the DF32 bulletin board outside the Group Lead office. The MEDS software version data may be found on the Boeing website, "Documents: MEDS White Papers & Misc" (reference the 'FSW Compatibility Matrix').

- B. Overview A network-resident word macro, 'dpkmacro.dot', will be utilized to take the output files on the A-drive, which were generated by the 'DP.EXE' program, and construct a datapack file. If the word template is opened as a "new document", the macro feature should start-up automatically. Then, simply follow the text box prompts that the macro provides you in order to complete the semi-automated portions of the electronic datapack build process.
- C. On a network PC, select the 'dpkmacro.dot' word file located in the share drive DF32 "DATAPACK | DPS-PGM" folder. Either of two approaches, as presented below, will correctly open up the word macro template as a "new document".
 - 1. Open a "Windows Explorer" window, then navigate to the network share drive DF32 "DATAPACK | DPS-PGM" folder. Select the appropriate 'Basic Macro' or 'Delta Macro' sub-folder and open the 'dpkmacro.dot' template.
 - 2. The word macro may be also opened via initially selecting the 'My Computer' icon, then selecting the network share drive path. From this point, navigate to the DF32 "DATAPACK | DPS-PGM" folder. Then, open the appropriate 'Basic Macro' or 'Delta Macro' sub-folder and its corresponding 'dpkmacro.dot' file.
 - 3. Avoid opening the 'dpkmacro' word file via Microsoft Word icon or via the path: 'Start | Programs | Microsoft Word', etc. Either directory path will open the actual word macro document for direct editing, rather than creating a "new document" version of the template. Normally, this is <u>not</u> the desired approach if one is simply interested in building a DPS Datapack document.

If you accidentally do this, the cue is that the macro text box prompts will <u>not</u> be present to direct the user to enter the data inputs required to build the datapack electronic files. Simply close the file and utilize one of the recommended approaches to open the word macro template as a "new document". Also, the file name (Document1.doc) for a new document will be displayed at the top lefthand corner of the Microsoft Word window.

D. When the word macro is opened, a series of input data box prompts will be presented, requesting flight specific data inputs. A typical data box prompt is illustrated in Figure 1.0-6.

For each input box, modify the 'default' value as necessary, clicking on the 'OK' button after the input has been entered. Be careful to observe the following constraints, or the macro will abterm.

Do <u>not</u> use the KYBD 'Enter' key when changing default data. Do <u>not</u> click on the 'Cancel' button. Such actions will cause the word macro to 'abterm' or result in corrupted data parameters in the generated datapack file.

Prompts will occur for each of the following seven data parameters (five FSW-build parameters and two MEDS software version parameters). Input the correct value for the data, updating the input data 'default' value as required:

E. Following the seven data input window prompts, a window prompt will display the desired directory path where the generated datapack file is to be saved. The default location for storing the datapack file is a folder, labeled "aWORK", that is located on the network share drive in our standard DF32 directory. The 'File Save' window prompt is illustrated in Figure 1.0-7.

Unlike the source for data files for the DP.EXE executable program, the datapack builder may elect to enter a different directory path the one specified in the data window prompt. However, the default input defines the recommended document store path. If the default is modified, follow the 'data entry' caution in Step D above.

It should be noted that the word macro does not check the document store directory path for validity. The specified path is assumed to be valid once the 'OK' button is selected. The word macro will then generate the datapack word file irrespective as to whether or not the document-store directory path is valid.

If the datapack builder has elected to change the generated datapack file store location, it is the responsibility of the user to specify a valid directory path. If an invalid path is specified, the subsequent file store will fail and an advisory window will be displayed. When the advisory message is acknowledged, the word macro will 'abterm' and the word macro template will need to be reopened and a new datapack file created. However, the DP.EXE-generated files stored on the A-drive are OK, so the entire procedure does not need to be repeated.

One additional point should be noted. When the word macro is executed, it will overwrite any file with the same name if the newly generated datapack is stored in the folder. To avoid this problem when using the recommended procedure, two different word macros are utilized to generate the 'intermediate' datapack word files. However, these two word macros are identical in every respect except that they are designed to store their resulting datapack word file with a different file name (one is labeled "BASIC" and the other file is labeled "DELTA").

F. Once the datapack builder clicks on the 'OK' button for the "Save File As" window prompt, the word macro will begin to execute. The process should take less than ten seconds to complete, unless problems are encountered. If problems are, in fact, detected, then the word macro will abort. If so, correct the problem and repeat the procedure. Depending upon the problem, this could be no more involved than repeating the word macro. However, if one or more of the 'XXXYY' data files stored on the A-drive are invalid, the entire datapack generation procedure might need to be repeated (i.e., re-running the DP.EXE executable program).

One of the more common procedural errors is to inadvertently accept the 'default' value for one or both of the first two data inputs (Flight Number or BASE Release Number). If the data input (in this case, the 'default' value) does not precisely match the 'XXXYY' value for the data files stored on the A-drive, the word macro is guaranteed to abterm. Simply restart the word macro, and enter the correct inputs.

G. If the word macro runs to completion as expected, then a dialog window will provide feedback on most macro processing, including file errors or other detected problems. The macro tracks the success of each operation, typically reporting the results of the execution as 'GOOD' or 'FAIL' after the macro completes processing. A status of all 'GOOD' results does not necessarily guarantee the contents of the resultant word file to be technically correct. However, it does indicate that no overt problems were detected by the word macro. Figure 1.0-8 illustrates the expected status window display.

If errors occur a 'FAIL' status indicates a detected problem. One exception is in the area of Roll-In Displays. A newly defined Roll-In SPEC (greater than '178') will display a "NOTFOUND" title. The word macro will recognize this and flag the feedback status accordingly. Figure 1.0-9 illustrates the resulting status window display.

H. This essentially completes the generation of the "BASIC" version of the electronic datapack word file. Next, a "DELTA" version of the electronic datapack word file will be generated utilizing these same procedures. Finally, the datapack builder will use a toolbar feature to merge the two intermediate datapack word files. The resulting merged document represents the electronic datapack document.

Because the DP.EXE executable program and dpkmacro are both certified console development products, any electronic datapack file generated using these PC tools and these SCP procedures do NOT require further detailed verification of each data parameter entry. However, the datapack builder will visually inspect the product to ensure no unexplained file dropouts had occurred,

I. At this point the datapack is complete, except for some of the flight-specific data. The BFS VPs, if any, and any flight-specific PASS VPs need to be obtained from the DPS VP Coordinator. The BFS VP addresses may then be located, following the procedure outlined in the last part of Section 1.8.

If these changes are to be permanent changes to all future datapack documents, the DPS datapack manager should be advised so that the appropriate data files (typically, one or both of the VPLIST.DAT data files) or word macro can be updated and recertified for those changes,

Most of the first page Mission Summary information for the datapack, including flight crew assignments, may be obtained from the NASA/JSC Human Spaceflight website, Shuttle 'Future Missions' link. Additional information, including specific mission specialist crew assignments, may also be determined using the FDF "Flight Plan" timeline and/or the "Flight Plan Notes" section at the back of the Flight Plan.

Flight Director information may be obtained from the Flight Director Office website, 'FD Mission Assignments' link. However, not all flight director assignments may be identified by the time the first datapack product is required to support an ILC. DPS Console Manning information is provided by the DPS Group Lead.

DATAPACK PC TOOL ISSUES

This section of the SCP is intended to serve two functions: (1) capture current corporate knowledge relative to the electronic datapack generation process; and (2) provide the first-time datapack builder with an overview of the current datapack development tools and their limitations. Presented with such information, the datapack builder is in an informed position to recognize when the datapack PC tools require future modifications.

A. Background –In addition to the f our standard Ascent, Orbit (GNC and SM), and Entry V/P loads, datapack documentation has seen the addition of specific variable parameter loads to accommodate rendezvous and Station-docked mission phases.

From an electronic datapack generation perspective, it is desirable to include these now standard V/P loads in the electronic datapack template. Unfortunately, this is

not as straight-forward as it might first seem. To better understand the issues, an overview of the electronic datapack product is desirable. There are six essential components that comprise the electronic datapack generation process:

- 1. CD ROM –a USA deliverable, flight-spec ific FSW-listing product. The CD ROM is accessed to acquire FSW data required for the electronic datapack product.
- 2. Floppy diskette –an input/output m edium to support a DOS executable. The executable program is <u>hard-coded</u> to access certain input data files located on the A-drive; as well as, write generated output data files out to the A-drive.
- 3. DP.EXE –an executable pr ogram written in 'C'. This program is hard-coded to access the A-drive to identify both requested FSW data parameters and obtain specific formatting data. The DP.EXE program will then access the CD ROM to acquire specific FSW data, format the parametric data into structured data files, and then write the files out to the A-drive. DP.EXE is permanently resident on the network shared drive in a DF32 directory. More details of this PC tool will be discussed in subsequent paragraphs.
- 4. PDELIST.DAT –a data file accessed by the DP.EXE program in order to format and build a data file utilized to generate the datapack PDE addresses table. PDELIST.DAT is permanently resident on the network shared drive in a DF32 sub-directory. However, the file <u>must</u> be copied to the <u>A-drive</u> on the PC prior to initiating the electronic datapack generation process.
- 5. VPLIST.DAT –a data file accessed by the DP.EXE program in order to format and build a data file utilized in the generation of variable parameters datapack data. In addition, a word macro accesses both the VPLIST.DAT file and the DP.EXE-generated variable parameters data file on the <u>A-drive</u> to format and generate the various V/P tables in the electronic datapack.

In order to accommodate ISS Assembly/Logistical missions, there are two identically labeled versions of the VPLIST.DAT data file. However, the content of each file is unique, defining a different set of variable parameter loads.

Each data file will serve as an input for generating an electronic datapack. Note, however, that the desired file <u>must</u> be copied to the A-drive on the PC prior to initiating the specific electronic datapack process. Furthermore, the DP.EXE program will fail execution unless the file name is precisely 'VPLIST.DAT'.

In order to simplify the electronic datapack generation process and avoid the necessity of manually modifying a file name, the two data files were given identical names and stored on separate DF32 sub-directories on the network share drive.

6. Word macro (dpkmacro.dot) –a Micr osoft word macro designed to generate a 'doc' type word file, which forms the basis for the electronic datapack. The word

macro is, in turn, composed of two elements: (1) a macro program written in WordBasic; and (2) a skeleton document template. Each word macro element is discussed below.

The <u>macro program</u> is designed to utilize user-defined inputs, plus input data files stored on the A-drive (the VPLIST.DAT file and the various data files generated by the DP.EXE program) to format and generate major flight-specific data portions of the electronic datapack. To more efficiently accommodate ISS Assembly/Logistical missions, the generic macro code has been modified slightly in order to allow each of the two macros to generate a uniquely named electronic datapack file. Otherwise, the macros are identical in every respect.

The <u>skeleton word document template</u> controls the basic "look and feel" of the actual datapack product. It can be modified independently of the macro code. Two word macros are utilized to support the electronic datapack generation process. These are 'dpkmacro basic.dot' and 'dpkmacro delta.dot', each permanently resident word files located on the network shared drive in one of two DF32 sub-directories. The actual word template is identical for each of the word macros.

In fact, the only difference between these two macros is a deliberate macro code modification to allow the macros to store their resultant word document with separate file names. This allows the electronic datapack process to utilize two distinct VPLIST.DAT files to generate datapacks with different variable parameters tables. The two uniquely named datapacks are designed to be procedurally merged into one final electronic datapack file. The advantage of this feature will become evident.

B. The previously identified executable program (DP.EXE) is one of the more critical components of the electronic datapack generation process. The program is utilized to capture required flight software parametric data from a CD ROM containing flight specific PASS and BFS FSW listing files. It is designed to access two data files (VPLIST.DAT and PDELIST.DAT) located on the A-drive. The external file inputs serve to support target data identification, processing, and formatting of variable parameter files and PDE address files. The executable also acquires and formats roll-in SPEC and sync fail pointer information based upon hard-coded instructions. In addition, as data files are generated, hard-coded instructions direct the DP.EXE program to write these files to the A-drive.

The current DP.EXE program, which was adapted to a PC-resident format back in the mid-1990's, has several hard-coded features that now limit its ability to generate a 'finished product' electronic datapack. Among these limitations are a maximum of four PASS V/P loads per electronic datapack build; an incomplete list of roll-in SPEC titles; and fixed column-width field limitations for the PDE address data files.

Under normal circumstances, the deficiencies could be corrected by updating the DP.EXE executable code. However, the 'C' source code listing for the program is

no longer available (lost). Thus, the only viable options are (1) to live with the current limitations and procedurally workaround the known problems; or (2) to develop, debug, and certify an entirely new version of the executable program.

In a perfect world, a new 'C' program would be developed and certified, allowing the electronic datapack to be a one-step process. However, the process is <u>not</u> totally broken, and a straightforward procedural workaround does exist. Consequently, a decision was made to live with the current version of the DP.EXE executable program, utilize procedural workarounds to the degree practical, and manually correct any datapack deficiencies not resolved by procedural workarounds.

- C. Various issues that result from hard-coded constraints in the DP.EXE program:
 - 1. The PDE fixed column-width field limitations are very minor and the resulting datapack PDE address table is more than adequate.
 - 2. The DP.EXE program is designed to decode FSW data in module '#PCDR15D' and generate a list of all valid roll-in SPEC numbers. Thus, the SPEC numbers listed in the ROLL-IN DISPLAYS table in the electronic datapack should always be correct. The only deficiencies are associated with the SPEC display titles. An array of roll-in SPEC display titles was hard-coded in the executable. The highest numbered valid SPEC at that time was SPEC 168. Thus, any roll-in above SPEC 168 will be labeled as "NOTFOUND" by DP.EXE (roll-in SPEC number will be correct). However, the word macro code has been modified to correctly label all defined roll-in SPECs up through, and including SPEC 178.

The incomplete list of roll-in SPEC titles was resolved by utilizing the word macro to replace any identified erroneous/missing display titles. However, the macro 'replace' code is not a universal, automatically adapting feature. As new roll-in SPECS are defined, the word macro code would need to be updated to accommodate the new roll-in display title [a DPS datapack manager function].

3. Due to DP.EXE hard-coding constraints, a maximum of four PASS V/P loads can be generated when an electronic datapack is generated. However, the specific content of each variable parameter load is <u>not</u> hard-coded, but rather, is controlled by the content of the VPLIST.DAT located on the A-drive. While less than perfect, this allows the datapack builder to take advantage of this important feature. That is, if the content of VPLIST.DAT is modified, the DP.EXE program will generate a corresponding different data field for the electronic datapack.

This allows the option to generate different datapack word files based upon different versions of VPLIST.DAT data files. The resulting word files can later be merged into a single datapack word file. This approach is utilized to generate the electronic datapack document.

IDENTIFICATION OF ROLL-IN DISPLAYS

PURPOSE

This procedure explains how to determine which displays are roll-in displays for a particular flight software load. The primary procedure for extracting this data to build the DPS datapack is documented in SCP 1.0, Datapack Process.

BACKGROUND

The addresses for the SM roll-in displays are stored in the sixth display format buffer (DFB). This is a CSECT called #PCDR15D for SM 2 and PCDR16D for SM 4. The table containing this data has four halfwords of overhead and then three halfwords of data for each roll-in display. Words 1 and 4 contain the number of roll-in displays defined for that phase. Words 2 and 3 contain the major function (MF) identification (ID) that roll-ins are valid for (only SM). Word 5 starts the data entries for the individual displays. The first word of each group of three is the display number multiplied by 10 and stored in hex format. The second word is the packed four-digit MMU address of the display in the hex format. These four digits contain the MMU file, track, subfile, and block information. The third word is the number of halfwords (storage) in hex that the display takes up on the MMU. The DFB that contains the roll-in addresses is accessed through pointers set up from addresses contained in the applications moding table (AMT) loaded at the time that a new ops is initialized in GPC memory.

PROCEDURE

- A. Access the flight-specific DASS-SM2 file (and/or the DASS-SM4 file, if applicable for a particular flight).
- B. Select the Global option (F7 key) under the Search Menu. Use CSECT name #PCDR15D (or #PCDR16D for SM4) as the search query. Use the Next option (F6 key) under the Search Menu to find the desired occurrences in the Memory Map section (refer to Figure 1.2-1). Use the F8 key to make a frame hard copy for documentation purposes.

Global searches start at the frame currently being accessed. Use the First Page option under the Page Menu to guarantee that the search starts at the beginning of the file.

C. Select the Module _AP101_Addr index under the Search Menu (F4 key) to find the address located in step B. When searching for addresses, define only the last five characters. Select the second entry in the list of search results, and press Go to Page (refer to Figure 1.2-2). Use the F8 key to make a frame hard copy for documentation purposes.

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- D. The fourth halfword in the CSECT defines the number (in hex) of roll-in displays. In the example, 000E hex equals 14 in decimal, which defines the total number of roll-in displays.
- Each subsequent group of three halfwords defines each roll-in. Locate the first word of each group of three. Convert this word from hex to decimal and divide by 10. This process provides the display number. For example, 0294 in hex equals 660 in decimal, divided by 10 equals display number 66.
- F. After the entries for the assigned displays, the table is filled with data entries of 0000, 2420, 007A. This pattern indicates the end of the roll-in display definitions.
- G. Select the Existing Reports option under the File Menu to reestablish the Select Report screen.

FLEX MDM FILE

PURPOSE

This procedure documents how to build the flex MDM file that COMMANDO uses to determine which flex MDMs are valid for a particular flight.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The MDM built-in test equipment (BITE) Read command allows the DPS operator to acquire information to troubleshoot/isolate an MDM problem in flight. The flex MDM file is used by COMMANDO to determine which flex MDMs are valid for a flight. The DPS SDT representative is responsible for creating this file by executing the Shuttle Data Tape program. For flights with flex MDMs, the DPS SDT representative will provide a printout of the Flex file, if applicable, to the datapack builder. An example of this file is shown in Figure 1.3-1.

PROCEDURE

- A. Acquire the printout from the DPS SDT representative.
- B. Log on to an MPSR workstation.
- C. Pull up a development window. Type "cd /users/dps/rw_common/cmdo" at the command line.
- D. Create the file on the workstation by using a text editor, such as vi. The naming convention for the data file containing the flex information is xxxyflx.mdm, where xxx is the flight number and y is the version number (1 = recon version, f = final version). Include the path and filename in the first line of the file. This example is the final version for STS-61.

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SYNC FAIL POINTER ADDRESSES

PURPOSE

This procedure provides an explanation of what kind of information the Sync-Fail Pointer parameter in the variable parameters provides and explains how to find the pointer values for each software release. The primary procedure for extracting this data for the DPS datapack is documented in SCP 1.0, Datapack Process.

BACKGROUND

When a GPC experiences a fail to sync (FTS), FCOS branches to a routine called FCMSFAIL. This routine controls the processing that is required in support of a forced or actual GPC FTS. The return address of the routine that was executing when the FTS condition occurred is stored in GPC memory at a location called FC\$SFAIL (15th H/W). This location, displayed via variable parameter, is the Sync-Fail Pointer Address and enables the console operator to determine which routine was executing prior to entrance into FCMSFAIL and, therefore, gives some insight into the cause of the FTS. The routines that may be running when an FTS occurs are as follows:

CSECT name	<u>Description</u>
FCMCSYNC FCMISYNC FCMISYNC	Common set SSIP sync point (1) All I/O sync points - RS and CS ICC Special branch for normal STBY-HALT (1)
FCMSSYNC	RS SVC sync point

- Notes: (1) A sync pattern of "000" satisfies SSIP sync. Therefore, a GPC showing this pattern (one moded to STBY) will fail at the subsequent ICC I/O sync point.
 - (2) This signature will be observed only if the downlisting GPC is the one with the problem. The actual FTS is at the next sync point following the GPC self-fail.
 - (3) For ICC failures, a "Group 5/Code 0" GPC error will be logged. For ICC checksum failures, a "Group 5/Code 7" GPC error will be logged.

PROCEDURE

- A. Select the flight-specific DASS-SSW file.
- B. Use the Global option (F7 key) under the Search Menu to find the following CSECTs: FCMCSYNC, FCMISYNC, FCMSSYNC, FCMTSYNC, FIOCMPLT, FIOERRLC, and FPMSVC. The first occurrence of these modules is in the Memory Map area. Most likely, they will all appear in the same frame or in two consecutive frames (Figure 1.4-1). Use the F8 key to make frame hard copies for documentation purposes.

Global searches start at the frame currently being accessed. Use the First Page option under the Page Menu to guarantee that the search always starts at the beginning of the file.

- C. Use the Module _AP101_Addr index under the Search Menu (F4) to locate each CSECT in the DASS-SSW (i.e., FCMCSYNC+0000, FCMISYNC+0000, etc.). Use the addresses (last five characters) found in step B as index queries. Select an entry in the list of search results and press Go to Page to view the desired occurrence. If this is not the desired occurrence, select another by using the Search Results (F9 key) under the Search menu.
- D. For each CSECT found in step C, except for FPCSVC, use the Global option (F7) under the Search Menu to find the FCMSFAIL string accompanied by a BAL statement in the previous line. The address to be recorded is the one found in the line following the FCMSFAIL string (Figure 1.4-2). Use the F8 key to make a frame hard copy for documentation purposes.

Keep in mind that FCMISYNC contains two such statements, the first one for I/O Sync Point and the second one for normal STBY-HALT. Use the Next option (F6 key) to view the second occurrence.

- E. For the FPMSVC CSECT found in step C, the user will look for the FPMSVC1 label with a BAL statement in the previous line. In this case, the global search will be performed on string FPMSVC1. The address to be recorded is the one found in the same line where the FPMSVC1 string appears (Figure 1.4-3). Use the F8 key to make a frame hard copy for documentation purposes.
- F. The addresses found for each CSECT above are what the sync-fail pointer will indicate if that CSECT was being processed at the time of the FTS. Notice that the offset into each CSECT will not necessarily remain constant between software releases. Refer to appendix H for extended addressing calculations.
- G. Select the Existing Reports option under the File Menu to reestablish the Select Report screen.

ELECTRONIC FILE TRANSFER APPLICATIONS

PURPOSE

The SDT, PDT, and TMBU database development is done by the respective managers and is not part of the datapack build process. This SCP describes procedures necessary to create the PASS SM and BFS SM FDA databases used by the TMBU program and the SDT and PDT databases used by the SDTPDT program. These programs, BSFTAPE, PASSTAPE, and SDTPDT can be run only in the Consolidated Development Environment (CDE) and can be accessed via DNAV DPS II Tools.

INTERFACES

Four data files containing the BFS and PASS TMBU, SDT, and PDT information are the prod-ucts used in creating the databases. These products are generated by the Reconfiguration Management Division. They are electronically transferred by the Section File Transfer Manager from the Software Production Facility (SPF) to the Ops environment for MCC flight controller use. These files are then ready for processing by the various DPS section software managers. The four input data files are placed in the /users/dps/rw_common/dp directory. The structure of the file names are xxxbfs.y, xxxpass.y, xxxpdt.y, and xxxsdt2.y.

Two of the four input files are used by the PASSTAPE and BFSTAPE programs. The format of these deliverable products are described by the Mass Memory Integration Plan (MIP). Executing PASSTAPE and BFSTAPE generates the three input files required to execute the TMBU program: xxx_sm.y, xxx.eu and xxx_bfs.y, where xxx is the flight identifier (i.e., 071), and y is the reconfiguration identifier (i.e., "1" for recon1 and "f" for final). The PASSTAPE and BFSTAPE programs access the data files of the format xxxpass.y and xxxbfs.y, and the output files are placed in /users/dps/uncert_apps/tmbu-data. A procedure to generate the EU file manually is also included.

The other two input files are used by the SDTPDT program. Executing SDTPDT generates five files. Two files are generated by SDTPDT, xxxySDT and xxxyPDT, and are used only by the SDTPDT program. The third file generated, xxxyflx.mdm, is used by the MDM BITE Read program. The fourth file, xxxy_xxxy.sdt, contains results from use of the program option to compare channelization from flight to flight. Both the third and fourth files are generated from the SDT database. The fifth file, xxxyFDF, is used by various disciplines to verify addresses located in the FDF and is generated from the PDT database. The SDTPDT program accesses /users/dps/rw_common/dp for the data files of the formats xxxsdt2.y and xxxpdt.y. Four output files are placed in /users/dps/rw_common/cmdo directory. The SDTPDT program also requires two additional data files that process the PDT database that do not need to be modified

unless requirements change. These files are located in the /users/dps/rw_common/sdtpdt directory under the names ref_pages.dat and halstat.dat.

Note: The PDT databases are no longer transferred to the CDE directory. However, the capabilities still exist in SDTPDT to process the files if desired.

PROCEDURE

A. PASSTAPE

- 1. Log on to the CDE workstation.
- 2. Execute the PASSTAPE program by choosing PASSTAPE from the DNAV DPS || Tools menu.
- 3. After entering the flight and recon number, the program creates the database.
- 4. See Figure 1.5-1 for a sample run of PASSTAPE.

B. BFSTAPE

- 1. Log on to the CDE workstation.
- 2. Execute the BFSTAPE program by choosing BFSTAPE from the DNAV DPS II Tools menu.
- 3. After entering the flight and recon number, the program creates the database.
- 4. See Figure 1.5-2 for a sample run of BFSTAPE.

C. SDTPDT

- 1. Log on to the CDE workstation.
- 2. Execute the SDTPDT program by choosing SDTPDT from the DNAV DPS II Tools menu. Figure 1.5-3 contains the main menu displayed for SDTPDT.
- 3. To generate the SDT and flex output files, select the Create SDT File option. Enter the OI when prompted for the particular flight.
- 4. To generate the PDT database as well as generate the associated FDF reference pages, select the Create FDF Pages option.
- 5. If a flex file has been created, print out a copy and give to the datapack builder.
- D. EU File

The EU list is now automatically generated by PASSTAPE. This procedure describes how to create the EU list if PASSTAPE is not available.

1. Use the MASTER LISTING portion of the fiche for the applicable flight and recon.

- Look for the EU structure under "Preprocessor Generated Entries" in the APPL.SRC.CSAPDT, APPL.SRC.CS2PDT, and APPL.SRC.CS4PDT application modules (Figure 1.5-4).
- 3. Each declare statement thereafter will have an MSID associated with it. If the declare statement includes "ANA_EU_FDA" or "EU_ENTRY STRUCTURE," then that MSID should be included in the database. When the list no longer includes the "EU_ENTRY STRUCTURE," you are done.
- 4. Figure 1.5-5 shows a partial listing of the EU.043 file. All that is needed for the EU database is the MSID.

SM I/O PROFILE

PURPOSE

The purpose of this SCP is to provide a procedure that will assist the DPS operator in generating an SM INPUT/OUTPUT (I/O) PROFILE for a space shuttle mission. This SCP provides a background of the SM I/O interfaces, addresses the various products needed, contains step-by-step instructions to interpret the SM payload BYPASS BITS definition listing, and illustrates how to integrate the bit definition into the SM BCE BYPASS words. These data are then incorporated into the electronic DPS datapack word file that is generated for every Shuttle mission.

BACKGROUND

Unlike the GNC GPC, the SM GPC interfaces with various I/O devices not used by the flight-critical system. These include payload MDMs (referred to as PL or PF MDMs), flex MDMs (FMDMs), and payload data interleaver (PDI) via the PL data buses; manipulator control interface unit (MCIU) via Launch Bus 1; and the pulse-code modulation master unit (PCMMU) via the IP data bus. Figure 1.6-1 reflects the "typical" SM I/O interfaces.

In addition to the standard PF MDMs, PSP, PDI, and mission-dependent Flex MDMs, it is interesting to note that Figure 1.6-1 illustrates some payload bus LRUs, referred to as SCAs (sequence control assemblies). These deserve some explanation. An SCA is an electronics unit designed to interface directly on the payload data buses in order to provide a command and telemetry interface with an upper stage deployable payload.


These upper stage payloads were longitudinal axis spin-stabilized, two-stage rockets used to place six-to-eight thousand-pound class satellites into synchronous orbit. These payloads were popular commercial payloads prior to the Challenger accident. However, it is unlikely the Shuttle Program will ever again manifest such payloads.

Nonetheless, the FSW still maintains the capability to support such payloads. For that reason, at least in theory, SCAs could be part of the SM I/O profile. Hence, they are illustrated as part of a "typical" SM I/O profile.

One unique aspect about mission-dependent payloads is whether or not such LRU interfaces (PF MDM, FMDM, PDI, MCIU, etc.) are actually active for a mission or not. This is dependent on the flight manifest; consequently, an SM I/O PROFILE needs to be determined on a flight-by-flight basis.

FCOS system software (SSW) was primarily written in an assembly language in which parameter, vector, and array addressing schemes strongly favored the utilization of the Word 0–Word 10 terminology. Our 'I/O Error Monitoring' SCP and the DPS Overview workstation application reflect this terminology since SSW documentation was originally utilized to develop the console documentation.

On the other hand, PASS FSW applications, such as SM, were written exclusively in a HAL/S compiler language in which "0" (zero) is not a legal subscript variable. As such, FSW applications-oriented documentation tends to favor Word 1–Word 11 terminology. With a little mental gymnastics, an individual can convert back and forth between the two terminologies without too much difficulty.

Thus, one can utilize the reference material provided in our DPS Console Handbook SCP 4.2 to better understand the significance of the BCE BYPASS word information presented in the CD ROM's SM/PM Database product.

While not necessarily pertinent to the development of the SM I/O PROFILE product, some additional BCE bypass word background may be useful to the DPS datapack developer. The first three bypass words correspond to SSW (NSP and MTU) or GNC elements associated with bypassable flight critical or SRB I/O transactions. The remaining eight bypass words correspond to elements associated with bypassable payload bus I/O transactions. Of those eight bypass words, only the last seven (Word 5 through Word 11) reflect mission-dependent I/O read elements. Hence, only those seven bypass words are referenced in the SM/PM Database listing.

A PASS G9 GPC can perform cyclic payload bus I/O, as well as, flight critical and SRB MDM I/O. That's why the SM I/O PROFILE may identify G9 mission-dependent bypass elements in addition to SM mission-dependent I/O. However, GNC inflight software is not designed to support any cyclic payload bus I/O.

Likewise, other than NSP and MTU read I/O transactions, SM software is not designed to support any flight critical data bus I/O. Thus, the eleven BCE bypass words are effectively <u>major function dependent</u> inflight, the first three corresponding to GNC, and the remaining eight to SM.

DOCUMENTS/PRODUCTS NEEDED

Flight Requirements Document (FRD) SM/PM DATABASE CD ROM Orbiter Command and Data Annex

PROCEDURE

- A. Refer to the (FRD) for an overview of the requirements for a specific flight. All general cargo arrangements and space shuttle configuration requirements will be outlined including the mission and payload objectives (i.e., ISS/MPLM, ISS/OIU, TDRS/IUS, Spacehab, Spartan, etc.) and the required interfaces, if any (i.e., MDMs, PDI, MCIU, etc.). This information can be most useful in getting a start on the development of the I/O profile summary.
- B. Access the flight-specific PASS | SMPM.DAT file located on the CD ROM. The goal is to access the mission-dependent BYPASS BITS information with respect to the frames defined in Table 1.6-1. The order provided in this table corresponds to the sequential order in which these headers are allocated in the file.
- C. Use the 'Last Page' option on the CD ROM page menu to go to the last page of the file. Then, page upward (backward) until the headers defined in Table 1.6-1 are located. They usually start eight pages before the last page of the file. Generate hard copies of each of the eight BYPASS BITS frames for subsequent reference.

D. Table 1.6-2 defines each field in the BYPASS BITS header line. The data contents in each field designated with an "*" next to them will be used to generate the SM I/O PROFILE product. Refer to Figure 1.6-2 for an example.

- E. Evaluate the ELEM number for each of the required frames. An ELEM number greater than or equal to 105 defines a mission-dependent parameter. Refer to Figure 1.6-2 for an example. A subset of ELEM numbers for Bypass Word 5 is ≥105, so these parameters can be flagged as mission dependent.
- F. Determine the I/O transaction ID for each ELEM number that is greater than or equal to 105. This is derived by determining the bypass word for each ELEM number. Refer to Table 1.6-3 to define the transaction ID associated with each bypass word. Determine the corresponding read element by referencing the MDM, MOD (card), and the Channel fields.

Example: In Figure 1.6-2, ELEM number 105 is associated with Bypass Word 5. According to Table 1.6-3, Bypass Word 5 has a transaction ID equal to 52. The corresponding read element for ELEM 105 is PF1 MDM, Card 01, Channel 00. Take note of the memory configuration in which these parameters are active (i.e., SM2, SM4, or GNC9). Repeat the same procedure for all ELEM \geq 105.

G. To determine which payload is associated with each BTU, refer to the flight-specific Orbiter Command and Data Annex, Tables 2, 12, and 14. Scan each table and compile data on BTU (i.e., PF1 and PF2 MDMs) input and output transactions by identifying the particular PF MDM, the input (i.e., AID, DIL, etc.) and output (i.e., DOL, DOH, etc.) cards and the corresponding channels. Refer to Figure 1.6-3 for an example. Table 18 of the C&D Annex will identify PF MDM serial I/O interfaces.

Example: According to the BYPASS BITS file, ELEM 105 identifies PF1, Card 01, Channel 00 for the SM2 and GNC9 memory configurations. The file also identifies the length of the read transaction equal to 13. Data compiled from Tables 2, 12, and 14 identify input interfaces with PF1 MDM, Card 01, Channels 00 through 12. Notice that the total number of channels per MDM and card must be less than or equal to the length of the read transaction defined in the BYPASS BITS frames.

- H. Organize all the BTU input and output transaction information according to the format as illustrated in Table 1.6-4, which is a part of the DPS datapack template. The transaction IDs for BTU output transactions will default to the following values:
 - 1. 46 and 47 respectively for PF1 and PF2 MDM Discrete Output cards
 - 2. 46 for Flex MDMs using Test Control Sequence (TCS) I/O
 - 3. 52 for PF1 or PF2 MDM low-rate inputs
 - 4. 59 for PF1/PF2 MDMs using table driven/standard serial output
 - 5. 68 or 69 for PL data bus 1,2 and/or Flex MDMs using TCS I/O
 - 6. Indicate which (if any) transaction IDs are applicable for SM2, SM4, or G9.
- I. Compile information with respect to the SM BCE BYPASS WORD PL HI and LO word (refer to table 1.6-4).

Bits 3 through 15 and 19 through 31 for the BCE BYPASS WORD - PL HI and bits 7, 11 through 22, 24, 26, 28, 30, and 31 of the BCE BYPASS WORD - PL LO have been designated to track flight-specific elements.

Furthermore, bits 7, 11, 13, 15, 17, 19, 21, 23, 25, 27, 29, and 31 of the BCE BYPASS WORD - PL LO word (Figure 1.6-4) represent the logical "OR" of flight-specific LO rate read BCE bypass bits for bypass words 4 through 10.






Example: Elements 105, 106, 107, and 108 fall within the bit-2 through 14 range for Bypass Word 5. If any of these bits were bypassed, bit 7 in SM BCE BYPASS WORD - PL LO would be set.

Also, if element 110 were bypassed, the I/O error log would reflect ID=52, EL=110, and the SM BCE BYPASS WORD - PL LO bit 11 would be set.



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TEXT DECODING FOR PASS/BFS FAULT MESSAGES

PURPOSE

This SCP describes a preferred method of obtaining a desired PASS/BFS fault message from the flight-specific software.

PROCEDURE - PASS MAJOR AND MINOR FIELD ID/TEXT

PASS major and minor text messages are no longer required in the DPS datapack; however, the following procedure will remain in the SCP for reference in case a user needs to verify the existence of a specific message.

- A. Access the flight-specific Master Source Listing file.
- B. The goal is to identify a PASS major and minor fault message related to any one of the following system software modules: CDKANNUN (GNC list), CDQANNUN (PL list), CDSANNUN (SSW list), CDTANNUN (SM list), and CDZANNUN (VU list). Use the Ss Src Hal Module index under the Search Menu (F4 key) to find each of the modules. There is no "fool-proof" way to know in advance which module a specific message may reside in. (The user must take a reasonable approach; i.e., a payload-specific message probably resides in CDQANNUN; a PDRS-related message probably resides in SM, etc.) If the message ID does not provide a clue, the user must use a trial and error deductive method of search.

CDQANNUN contains all of the payload-specific major and minor fault messages. The IDs of all the payload-specific fault messages are greater than or equal to 700.

- Note: The final load product contains only deltas from the recon 1 product. Therefore, look for the necessary module in the final load product and, if not found, go to the recon 1 product.
- C. For each one of these modules, the major fault messages are immediately followed by the minor fault messages. The following instructions will define the first file frame where the major fault messages are identified and the last file frame where the minor fault messages are identified for each module.

For any module found as a result of step B, select the Global option (F7 key) under the Search Menu and specify "Major-Structure" as the search string. Use the Next option (F6 key), if necessary, to find the occurrence defining the beginning of the major fault messages (Figure 1.7-1).

Figure 1.7-2 shows an example of the minor fault messages for module CDKANNUN.

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At this point, the user can perform a global search (F7 key) to search for a desired string associated with a given fault message within the above frames (annotated in step C). A user may have to use the Next option (F6 key) to get to the desired data.

- D. Use the F8 key to generate hard copies of the various frames of data applicable to the desired module.
- E. Figures 1.7-1 and 1.7-2 show how to identify the TEXT and ID data. For example, the ID for the major fault message "Illegal Entry" is equal to 100. Notice that IDs will be displayed according to their decimal value.

PROCEDURE - BFS MAJOR AND MINOR FIELD ID/TEXT

BFS major and minor fields must be verified only for new BFS OI releases using the CD ROM against the Shuttle Software Reconfiguration product (provided by Mike Bauman and/or Shirley Sassard or their successor). However, these messages are not required for the datapack.

- A. Use the applicable BFS OI optical fiche product.
- B. Select the Index option (F4 key) under the Search Menu. Use the LOC index to find string 30FD0. Select an entry in the list of Search results and press Go to Page to view the desired occurrence. If this is not the desired occurrence, select another by using the Search Results (F9 Key) under the Search menu. Pay attention to the note enclosed by asterisks at the top of this page. This note defines the BFS Class 2 and Class 3 messages for a particular OI by defining the ERRSET INDICES.

Move downward to determine the last frame containing fault messages data (approximately 13 frames from the first frame). Use the F8 key to print the various frames of data.

Starting with OI-21, the BFS fault message ID range was extended to 1024 to provide for class 2 fault message growth. The 1024 BFS message IDs and their classes are defined as follows:

ID range	<u>Alarm class</u>
000 - 127	2
128 - 831	3
832 - 1032	2

C. The BFS listing contains both the Major and Minor fields together, unlike the PASS. The BFS fault messages are grouped into blocks of 16. These blocks are further divided into Major and Minor fields. Each Major field has up to four corresponding minor fields associated with it. If a Minor field contains a dash (-), it means the field is empty. An example of how to obtain the BFS fault messages is shown in Figure 1.7-3. The four Minor fields corresponding to the major field "R OMS" are: "-", "PC", "TK P", and "GMBL". Recall that the "-" means an empty Minor field, so there are really only three Minor fields. The three messages we have just decoded are as follows:

- 1. R OMS PC
- 2. R OMS TK P
- 3. R OMS GMBL

While searching through the BFS Major/Minor field address tables in Figure 1.7-3, all four Minor fields for a particular Major field may show dashes ("-"). Typically, for these cases, only one of the four potential message IDs is valid. Furthermore, there is no way to identify the valid set from this BFS flight software listing. To determine the correct message ID, refer to Table A.5-1 "BFS CRT Messages" of the PASS/BFS Level C Displays & Control FSSR for the appropriate OI software release (STS 83-0020 Vol 3, Level C, Functional Subsystem Software Requirements, Displays and Controls), which is maintained in the Systems Division Library. However, these IDs will remain the same for every OI release.

- D. The next step is to obtain an ID for each fault message. At the beginning of each block is a message ID range. For our example it is 16 to 31 (Figure 1.7-3). The IDs of the 16 messages in this particular block are numbered from 16 to 31. To get the ID of a specific message, simply count from the beginning of the range until you come to the particular fault message. The IDs of our three messages are:
 - 1. R OMS PC 21
 - 2. R OMS TK P- 22
 - 3. R OMS GMBL 23
- E. Generate a list of messages previously found and obtain a copy of the BFS fault message dataset from Shuttle Software Reconfiguration. Compare these two lists for any discrepancies. The list of OI-X CR's can provide additional information on the creation of new BFS message and/or changes/deletion of a message. If any discrepancies exist from the flight software generated messages (on the CD ROM) and the preexisting BFS fault message dataset obtained from Shuttle Reconfiguration, prepare a list outlining these differences and place it in the mission data pack. Inform the DPS team lead on this matter and circulate a memo to the flight community and Shuttle Software Reconfiguration Management outlining this information. Subsequently, the reconfiguration product **must** be updated electronically (by Shuttle Software Reconfiguration), to reflect this update, prior to flight (and preferably prior to the first simulation using the new OI training load).

VARIABLE PARAMETERS

PURPOSE

This SCP describes the procedure used to look up the addresses for the nominal sets of PASS and BFS variable parameters (VPs) used during the various phases of flight. The primary procedure for extracting this data to build the DPS datapack is documented in SCP 1.0, Datapack Process.

Any scaling parameters needed for a particular VP will be provided by the section which is requesting that slot.

PROCEDURE - PASS VARIABLE PARAMETERS

- A. Access the flight-specific HALSTAT file.
- B. The VP templates may change between OI releases. Also, there may be flightspecific VP requests from the flight controller community. Contact the DPS section VP coordinator to find out if any changes and/or special requests need to be incorporated into the standard templates.
- C. Select the Index option (F4 key) under the Search Menu. Select the HAL_Variable_Name index and specify the various variable parameter HAL names. The search will locate the corresponding HAL names in the Global Symbol Dictionary area.
- D. Select the VP address indicated for the appropriate phase of flight as shown in Figure 1.8-1. Refer to Table 1.8-1 to define the applicable phase.

If the address is not specifically called out, then look for the TEMPLATE OFFSET value. Reference Figure 1.8-2. This value needs to be added to the address for the template HAL name specified. Look up the template HAL name and find its address. Add the offset value to that address.

There is one VP address that cannot be looked up in this way. The "GPC Sync Fail Pointer," FC\$SFAIL (15th H/W), should be looked up as follows:

- 1. Access the DASS-SSW file.
- 2. Use the Global option (F7 key) under the Search Menu and look for the 'FCMSAVE' string. The search will locate the starting address of the FCMSAVE module in the Memory Map area (refer to Figure 1.8-3).
- Select the Index option (F4 key) under the Search Menu. Use the Module_AP101_ADDR index to find the address (last five characters) defined in step 2. Select an entry in the list of search results and press Go to Page to view the desired

occurrence (i.e., FCMSAVE+0000). At this point, use the Global option to find 'FC\$SFAIL' string (refer to Figure 1.8-4).


4. To define the 15th H/W, add decimal (E in hex) to the starting value for FC\$SFAIL.

- E. Deliver the ascent and entry VP addresses to IBM Test and Operations (T&O) Support Group at least one week before the first simulation using that load. IBM T&O will incorporate these addresses into the ascent and entry reset points, so the VPs will be available during ascent and entry sims.
- F. Build the loads in the flight-specific workstation VP file (reference SCP 7.6). Variable parameter loads can be defined as prebuilt or real-time loads. Reference SCP 1.10 - Prebuilt/Real-Time Command Loads to label VP loads accordingly in the workstation.
- G. Select the Existing option under the Reports Menu to re-establish the Report Selection screen.

H. The following table comprises VP load design constraints for all new flights. The VPs listed below must correspond with the slots when building new datapacks/loads. These constraints are to minimize impacts to DPS's 'VP customers' as well as to DPS itself. Several disciplines (DPS, GNC, INCO, RNDZ) have hard-coded specific VP slot MSIDs into their workstation applications assuming their desired variable parameters will always be in those specific slots. These constraints could be restructured if necessary, but only on new-OI boundaries. The customers should be notified well in advance of any changes so they can restructure their applications.

PROCEDURE - BFS VARIABLE PARAMETERS

The purpose of this procedure is to aid the user in looking up GPC addresses (VPs) in the BFS that need to be monitored. The purpose of VPs is to allow the user the flexibility to observe any desired memory location via downlist. For OI-23, the VPs consist of a set of three user definable downlist parameters that may be defined in all memory (BFS) configurations and maintained across all OPS transitions. The parameters are to be initialized to a known memory location and can be individually selected to display any addressable memory location using the variable parameter function. Initialization is to an assembly language variable called "DLINIT" which is set to a hexadecimal pattern "FCFC." The following procedure outlines the necessary steps in locating the computer address and building the VP load.

- A. Locate the BFS OI Build file in the applicable PASS/BFS OI optical fiche product.
- B. Select the Index option (F4 key) under the Search Menu. Use the HAL_Name index to find the particular BFS VPs (Figure 1.8-5). Use the F8 key to hard copy the frame(s) of data.
 - 1. When the HAL names and their respective memory addresses are found, they are documented in the flight-specific datapack.
 - 2. The BFS VP load needs to be built on the workstation (reference SCP 7.7).

PDE ADDRESS LOOKUP

PURPOSE

When a PASS GPC error is encountered, a 'Process Directory Entry' (PDE) address can be used to determine the software module that was being executed at the time of the failure. The Pointer field value (equivalent to a 'PDE' entry) on the DPS Overview workstation application serves to cross-reference GPC error with the PDE listing. The data to perform this on-console check is provided as part of the DPS datapack.

At one time, it was necessary to manually check the PDE address information for every datapack build. However, the electronic datapack generation process, as described via SCP 1.0, is now a certified process. Consequently, it is not necessary for the datapack builder and verifier to manually re-verify the DPS datapack PDE addresses table every datapack build, provided the datapack was generated electronically utilizing the certified DP.EXE executable program and certified word macro.

Nevertheless, it is a matter of corporate knowledge retention that the PDE address information can be manually recreated in the event there is ever a question regarding the validity of the datapack generation process (for example, recertification issues). This SCP serves to support that requirement.

Therefore, the purpose of this SCP is to define the procedure for manually looking up a list of PASS PDE addresses and associated modules for any flight software release.

PROCEDURE

- A. Utilize the following procedure to access the desired DASS (disassembly) file(s): DASSGNC1.DAT, DASSGNC2.DAT, DASSGNC3.DAT, DASSGNC8.DAT, DASSGNC9.DAT, DASSSM2.DAT, DASSSM4.DAT, DASSPL9.DAT and DASSSSW.DAT.
- B. Load the desired CD ROM. Close the resulting window as it is no longer required. Next, start the 'DXR' executable program:
 - 1. Start | MOD Server Menu | MOD-Wide Applications | DXR
 - 2. Then, click on 'File | Open'. On the following pop-up window, click on 'Listing'.
 - 3. A pull-down window will appear; click on the flight-specific folder, and then select the subsequent DASS folder.
- C. Open the DASS folder and select the desired "DASS" file. Then, click on 'Page', select 'Select Page' on the pull-down menu, and then enter page "14". The page presents a part of an array of "FSW modules/starting address" entries (referred to as CSECTs). The complete array makes up a 'MEMORY MAP' for the specified DASS listing being viewed.

Visually scan the MEMORY MAP page for a series of CSECT entries formatted as "#EXXXXX YYYYYY". This is the format utilized to list the PDE address for any PASS FSW module. Figure 1.9-1 illustrates the typical pattern one can expect to observe on the DASS listing page.

If the PDE entries are not present, go back one page and then scan that page for the entries. Due to the way that DASS listings are organized/formatted, the PDE entries will start on either page 13 or 14, and may spill over to page 15 in some instances. Typically, the "GNC" PDE entries will occur on page 14 of the DASS listing, and the "SM", "PL9", and "SSW" entries will fall on page 13.

- D. If hard copies are desired, click on 'File' and then 'Printer Setup' on the pull-down menu. Select 'Landscape'. Finally, click on the 'print icon' to make a hard copy of the displayed page.
- E. From an educational perspective, the "PDE Addresses" table in the DPS datapack provides 'Module', 'OPS', 'Rate', and 'Description' information, as well as the PDE addresses. Note that such information does <u>not</u> change from flight to flight. Only the PDE addresses change as part of the compilation process.

Furthermore, CSECTs found in the DASS SSW file will also be included as a part of the other DASS files. Therefore, they will be labeled with an 'OPS' equal to SSW. For example, RABIDLY is located in GNC 1 and SSW. On the other hand, there will be CSECT modules found in more than one DASS file, but with different addresses specified according to the OPS. Each of these CSECT occurrences will be listed with their individual OPS and addresses. For example, CSECT module HA-HA is applicable for both PL 9 and GNC 9 OPS.

F. Repeat steps C through E for each desired DASS file.

PREBUILT/REAL-TIME COMMAND LOADS

PURPOSE

This procedure documents the difference between prebuilt and real-time command loads built by command applications and explains how to build the data file the Command Server uses to distinguish between the two types of loads.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Command loads built using the command applications are classified as either prebuilt or real-time loads. When deleting loads from the workstation, all loads available for deletion will appear in the window. Blue indicates that a load is prebuilt; red indicates that load is real-time. Prebuilt loads are those loads built prior to a mission as a result of the flight-specific data pack (i.e., VP loads, SCALING loads, DEU EQUIV loads). Real-time loads are those loads built during an actual mission.

Commando application determines which loads are designated as prebuilt loads by looking in a data file that must be created for each flight. This file is simply a list of all DSM numbers for the loads built in the flight-specific datapack and identifies real-time loads as those loads not existing in this file.

PROCEDURES

- A. Log on to a console workstation.
- B. Pull up a development window. Type "cd /users/dps/rw_common/CMDO" at the command line.
- C. The naming convention for the data files containing the DSM numbers of the prebuilt loads is reqlist.vy.xxx, where xxx is the flight number and y is the version number (1 = recon version, f = final version). Create a data file for the current flight by typing "vi reqlist.vf.083" (for example) at the command line.
- D. Type "i" to get into the insert mode. Enter the DSM numbers for the prebuilt loads followed by <RETURN>, one per line. The order of the DSM numbers is not important. An example data file is shown in Figure 1.10-1.
- E. After all DSM numbers have been entered, exit the vi editor and save the data file. This is done by pressing F11 and then typing ":wq <RETURN>."

GPC MEMORY (GMEM) READ/WRITE (R/W) CONSOLE DOCUMENTATION PREPARATION

PURPOSE

The purpose of this procedure is to describe the configuration control process that must be completed for each flight to ensure the correctness of the FDF in order to support GMEM R/Ws.

BACKGROUND

Prior to STS-26 there was no formal configuration control placed on the GMEM R/W FDF to ensure that the proper addresses were printed in the final FDF. The addresses for each GMEM R/W were looked up by several people throughout the Systems Division and submitted to DF32 personnel. This data was then passed on to the appropriate book manager for incorporation into the FDF. While preparing the FDF to support STS-26, several errors were found in the FDF. Hence, procedures similar to the formal configuration control procedures, as presented in this SCP, were developed and put into place. The procedures presented here have evolved as experience has been acquired with these procedures.

DEFINITIONS

There is some terminology that must be understood before moving on. First, there are two degrees of verification that must be undertaken for each flight. Every flight has multiple software releases. Generally, there is one reconfiguration release, RECON 1, and a final release. However, there can be multiple reconfiguration releases for a particular flight. For the reconfiguration releases, Systems Division personnel are responsible only for looking up the GMEM write addresses. This is done to support the use of GMEM write activity in the SMS. For the final flight software, a formal configuration control procedure is used to verify the validity of the addresses for GMEM reads and writes.

For the configuration control procedures outlined below, the following terms will be used

<u>DPS Flight Lead</u> - A DF32/DPS person assigned all flight lead responsibilities for a specific flight.

<u>DF Section Flight Lead</u> - A person within each Systems Division section assigned flight lead responsibilities for a specific flight.

PROCEDURE




Figure 1.11-1. FDF GMEM R/W address/data configuration control

A. GMEM R/W FDF Address Verification for Final Flight Software Releases (Figure 1.11-1)

- 1. Each section Flight Lead verifies the addresses for which he/she is responsible and has another section member double check his/her work.
- 2. DPS Flight Lead verifies GMEM addresses.
- 3. The DF Section Flight Lead collects all FDF redlines and copies of flight software as required.
- 4. The DF Section Flight Lead submits redlines to the appropriate book managers utilizing the Workflow System to inform them of the changes to be made to the FDF. DPS should be selected as a reviewer.
- 5. When the FDF is finally released for each flight, the DF Flight Lead and the DPS Flight Lead will verify the FDF against the submitted changes and the official PASS and BFS documents for each GMEM R/W. For PASS, this document released by USA is called the Release Authorization Document (RAD). For BFS, this document is called the Version Description Document (VDD), which contains a separate Engineering Order (EO) for each BFS GMEM write and is released by Boeing.
- 6. The DPS Flight Lead makes copies of the RADs, VDD/EOs, and the release authorization signoff sheets (RASSs) for each of the sections not on distribution. Moreover, copies should be made for the DPS FCR and MPSR consoles.
- B. Miscellaneous DPS Flight Lead Responsibilities
 - Responsible for negotiating any problems that are found with the NASA RASSs,USA RADs, and/or Boeing EOs. Issues are generally negotiated with SSD personnel or the release managers in DP. See the DPS Directory for more details on specific contacts.
 - 2. Responsible for educating systems division personnel on the policies associated with GMEM R/Ws.
 - 3. Responsible for informing management of problems that may affect GMEM R/W policies/implementation.
- C. GMEM R/W Release Documentation Summary

The documentation that authorizes GMEM R/W activities is released at several levels of authorization. The lowest level of GMEM R/W documentation released is the documents produced by USA and Boeing. These documents explain in detail each GMEM R/W and provide addresses and data to accomplish the GMEM R/W. These documents by themselves are not official. They must be accompanied by a RASS. There are two types of RASSs. First, preflight RASSs are released with the associated RAD, MRAS, or VDD/EO in order for preflight GMEM R/Ws to be officially implemented in the vehicle or test facilities. Approximately 3 days before a scheduled launch, a flight RASS will be issued that authorizes the previously released RASSs.

VERIFYING TMBU PARAMETERS FOR STATION ASSEMBLY FLIGHTS

PURPOSE

This procedure is used to verify that a complete list of parameters are being monitored during station assembly flights.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

For station assembly flights, five displays are used to provide the shuttle crew with International Space Station (ISS) data. These displays have associated caution and warning tones and messages to inform the shuttle crew of ISS status. For each assembly flight, Table Maintenance Block Updates (TMBU) will be uplinked to inhibit ISS parameters monitored by the shuttle to prevent nuisance C&W tones and messages on the shuttle. TMBUs may also be uplinked to enable ISS parameters monitored by the shuttle when appropriate. The Shuttle and Station Flight Controllers Operations Handbook (FCOH) procedure 3.10 will be used to determine which parameters should be inhibited/enabled.

PROCEDURE

- A. Prior to the Integrated Load Checkout (ILC) of each shuttle flight to the ISS, and as part of the DPS datapack process, DPS will be responsible for verifying that Table 3.10-1 in procedure 3.10 in both the Shuttle Flight Controllers Handbook (FCOH) and the Station FCOH contains a complete list of parameters to be monitored.
- B. This table will be verified against the C&D Annex tables 8 and 9 for that particular flight. The parameter and MSID located on these tables should match that of those on Table 3.10-1.
- C. Both the DPS flight lead and the datapack builder will verify the parameters.
- D. In the event that there is a discrepancy between the tables in the C&D Annex and the list of parameters on Table 3.10-1, DPS will identify a shuttle and ISS discipline owner for that parameter and inform them of the discrepancy.
- E. The shuttle owner of the parameter will be responsible for updating the Shuttle and Staion FCOH 3.10 procedures, with changes to Table 3.10-1, as appropriate.
- F. The DPS datapack builder will then build the TMBU for the ADCO and ODIN parameters per FCOH Table 3.10-1.

G. The DPS datapack verifier will ensure that the TMBU is built correctly per FCOH Table 3.10-1.

CHANGE REQUEST (CR) AND DISCREPANCY REPORT (DR) REVIEW AND RESPONSIBILITIES

DESCRIPTION

All changes made to the flight software must go through the Flight Software Intgeration group. Once the affected disciplines of these changes are identified, a flight software representative will generate reports along with evaluation forms and distribute them for review. Each affected discipline will provide a thorough evaluation of the changes. DF has a CR/DR Representative who will distribute the incoming evaluation forms along with the reports for both DF22/DPS and DF24/INCO.

RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. Flight Software Integration Representative
 - The Flight Software Integration representative drops evaluation forms in the CR/DR inbox (located in Bldg 4N, Rm 113) or sends them via e-mail to the CR/DR Coordinator.
 - b) The Flight Software Integration representative also determines which discipline is required to evaluate the review form and will indicate it on the form.
- 2. CR/DR Coordinator
 - a) The CR/DR Coordinator will distribute the incoming CR/DR forms for evaluation to members in the group. These will come either in the form of a hard copy or electronically via email.
 - b) The coordinator will spread the evaluation task among group members as evenly as possible. One criteria that can be used, but is not limited to, is choosing experts in specific systems (PASS, BFS, MEDS, CAU)
 - c) The coordinator will also distribute the CR/DR to flight leads if the CR/DR is flight specific.
 - d) If any flight software issues come out very close to flight, the coordinator will inform the affected flight lead so that they are aware of any issues that may impact the flight.
 - e) Once the CR/DR is completed and returned by the evaluator, the coordinator will log the impacts and return date in a database that will be

accessible to all group members. This will be located in the following location: S:\Divisions\DF\Private\DF22\CRDR

- f) Upon return of the completed evaluation forms, the coordinator will fax the forms over to the flight software integration department or send them electronically.
- g) The coordinator will save all CR/DRs in a binder and in an electronic folder for future reference. These records will be maintained for one year from their completion date.
- h) If DF24/INCO is required to evaluate a CR/DR, the same process above is performed.
- 3. DPS Evaluator
 - a) It is the responsibility of group members to provide a thorough evaluation of DPS impacts for a CR, DR, or program note. This may include calling the originator of the CR/DR for clarification.
 - b) When reviewing a CR/DR several points must be taken into consideration to provide a thorough evaluation. Some things to consider are listed below:
 - i) Does the CR/DR present technical/operational impact?
 - ii) Does the change impact mission success, safety of flight, training, current flight rules, MCC console procedures, or flight data file?
 - iii) Who is affected by the change (Crew, Ground controller)?
 - iv) What facilities are affected (MCC, SAIL, SMS, KSC, other)?
 - v) Are any SPECS or Displays affected?
 - vi) Are any DPS parameters affected by the change?
 - vii) Is the affected parameter downlinked/ downlisted?
 - viii) What flight or OI release is affected by change?
 - ix) Will MCC workstations need to be updated?
 - x) Will the change impact Launch Commit Criterias?
 - xi) Will the SMS model software be impacted?
 - xii) Is a workaround necessary until approval of CR?
 - xiii) Is an OPS Note or Waiver required?
 - c) If recommending an update to a note the evaluator should call the originator of the CR/DR and inform them of the recommendation. In addition, the evaluator should document the recommendation on the evaluation form.

d) It is also the group member's responsibility to inform the DPS group of any major CR/DR that is being worked that may impact flight (ie. Safety of flight, flight readiness, workstation applications, crew procedures, required workarounds, flight rules, crew displays, DPS documentation, etc.)

CD ROM DATA RETRIEVE SYSTEM PROCEDURES

PURPOSE

This SCP defines the capabilities available in the CD ROM Data Retrieve System.

PROCEDURE

- A. CD ROM Loading Procedure
 - 1. Insert the CD ROM. The drives and file servers are located in the DF2 branch office for access in the office and behind the DPS SPT console in the WMPSR for access in the CCC. In the CCC, drive CD 1 is used for the current flight or sim, and drive CD 2 is used for other flight software loads.
 - 2. On the pc, drive D is used to access the ofswin software. This software is hard coded to look at drive E to read from the CD ROM drive.
 - 3. If you need to add a new flight, this is done using the File Manager. Select drive D and double click on the ofswin directory. Then single click on ADDNEWFL.BAT. Under the File menu, select RUN. A window will pop up with ADDNEWFL.BAT selected. Add the flight name after this, using the naming convention of stsxxxyy, where xxx is the three-digit flight number, and yy is r1 or fl for recon 1 or final load. For MAST products, yy will be ec for engineering cycle or fc for flight cycle. The MAST products are used primarily by INCO. After adding the flight name, the box in the window should read ADDNEWFL.BAT stsxxxyy. Click on OK. Adding a new flight has to be done only the first time a new CD is loaded.
 - 4. To run the ofswin software, use File Manager, select the D drive, single click on the ofswin directory, and double click on ofswin.exe to execute the ofswin software. When the login window appears, the user may enter anything for the user name. When this is done, click on OK. This will bring up the System Window. Seven pulldown menus will be displayed to the user that will allow manipulation of flight-specific data. The most useful options, as applicable to the routine analysis of flight software data, will be discussed next.
 - 5. While viewing the files on the CD ROM, if the font is not correct, under Preferences in the ofswin software, select font and select F 6-13 Courier.
- B. File Management
 - 1. <u>Report Menu</u>: This option allows the user to select flight-specific data.
 - a. Cluster option First mandatory step for the user as it allows selection of a particular flight and reconfiguration cycle (i.e., R1, FL, EC, FC). Use the mouse to highlight the desired flight and click on "View Report" box or hit the <ENTER> key. The user is required to select the same flight reflected

on the disk label. All the flight-specific files will be displayed on the Report Selection screen for selection by the user.

Notice that for some optical products, the Report Selection screen will show filenames with a "(SIDE B)" pointer. This indicates that the file is only available on side B of the disk.

- b. Existing option Used to display all filenames available under the selected cluster. The user will select this option when ready to access a file.
- c. Previous option Used to select the previous file relative to the file being accessed at the time. If the file currently being used is the last file identified on the Report Selection screen, then this option will not be available.
- d. Next option Used to select the next file relative to the file being accessed at the time. If the file currently being used is the last file identified on the Report Selection screen, then this option will not be available.
- e. Exit option Used to exit the OFSWIN v2.2a. Press the <ESC> key to exit the OFS panel.
- 2. Edit Menu: This menu is not applicable for optical fiche products due to configuration control restrictions that do not allow files to be edited and/or formatted in any way.
- 3. <u>GoFrame Menu</u>: This menu will allow the user to select a particular frame of data in a file.
 - a. Frame number option Allows the user to jump to a specific frame. The user can specify the particular frame number or move forward/backward relative to the current frame being displayed by using "+"/"-" with a number reflecting the desired shift. Use the status bar (refer to Preferences Menu) to find out the frame being accessed at any particular time.

If an invalid request is defined, the application will automatically jump to the first frame of the file.

- b. First Frame option Allows the user to jump to the first frame of the file.
- c. Last Frame option Allows the user to jump to the last frame of the file.
- d. Page Up option Allows the user to move to the previous frame of the file relative to the frame being accessed at the time. This capability is also available by using the left arrow key in the status bar (refer to the Preferences Menu). This option is not available when processing the first frame of a file.
- e. Page Down option Allows the user to move to the next frame of the file relative to the frame being accessed at the time. This capability is also available by using the right arrow key in the status bar (refer to the

Preferences Menu). This option is not available when processing the last frame of a file.

- f. Set Bookmark option Allows the user to define up to 26 bookmarks per file. When the desired frame is found, access this option. An alphabetical menu will be displayed identifying the bookmark positions available. Select the desired bookmark and hit the OK key. As a result, the selected bookmark will reflect the corresponding frame number.
- g. Go To Bookmark option Allows the user to find a previously defined bookmark. When this option is selected, a listing of all bookmarks is displayed. Select the desired bookmark and hit the OK key. The application will automatically access the corresponding frame.
- 4. <u>Search Menu</u>: This menu provides the user with the capability to find certain data by defining specific search criteria. All occurrences found will appear highlighted in the particular frame if the highlight capability is enabled at the time. As a default, this option is always enabled at the beginning of a session. Use the F3 key to toggle this capability ON and OFF as desired.
 - a. Single option (F4 key) Allows the user to search for specific data within a file. Each file contains a number of indexes to facilitate the search process. All search requests will start from the first frame of data.

The system will annunciate the number of matches found satisfying search specifications. By clicking on the OK box or pressing the <ENTER> key, the application will access the frame where the first occurrence was found. The user will be responsible for looking through the frame(s) to find the highlighted area(s) defining the matching occurrence(s). Using the Next (F6) or Previous option will allow the user to jump to the following occurrence(s) as desired.

In addition to specifying the search query, the user will be able to select the window mode and/or specify a case-sensitive search. The window mode option will display all occurrences in a window format from which the user can select the desired occurrences. If the case-sensitive option is not selected, then all occurrences, caps and noncaps, will be displayed to the user.

Documentation on the implementation of indexes per file can be found in the Users Guides binder on console.

b. Multiple option (F5 key) - Allows the user to execute a search on several files simultaneously as long as they have a common index requirement. All search requests will start from the first frame of each file.

The system will annunciate the number of matches found satisfying search specifications. By clicking in the OK box or pressing the <ENTER> key, the

application will access the frame where the first occurrence was found. The user will be responsible for looking through the frame(s) to find the highlighted area(s) defining the matching occurrence(s). Use of the Next (F6) or Previous option will allow the user to jump to the following occurrence(s) as desired.

In addition to specifying the search query, the user will be able to select the window mode option and/or specify a case-sensitive search. The window mode option will display all occurrences in a window format from which the user can select the desired occurrence. If the case-sensitive option is not selected, then all occurrences, caps and noncaps, will be displayed to the user.

Documentation on the implementation of indexes per file can be found in the User's Guide binder on console.

- c. Query option Allows the user to look for information using a combination of search criteria. Enter the first field by clicking on the down arrow key. This allows the user to select one of the rapid index features. Select the beginning search criteria from the first box. Next move the mouse to the next arrow box and click to select the type of logic for the query search: such as # (number), < (less than), > (greater than), <= (less than or), >= (greater than or). Type the search criteria in the last field. Move down to the next field and repeat the process using another cross-reference index. Repeat the process until all desired cross-reference requirements have been entered.
- d. Previous option Allows the user to access the previous occurrence of a search request. The Previous occurrence logic does not reverse when the reverse search option is selected.
- e. Next option (F6 key) Allows the user to access the next occurrence of a search request. The Next occurrence logic does not reverse when the reverse search option is selected.
- f. Global option (F7 key) This option does not use indexes; rather, it scans the frames for a text match anywhere in a frame. A search will be executed starting in the frame currently being accessed unless the user jumps to the first frame via the GoFrame menu. The search will occur in an incrementing order unless the reverse search option is selected. There is no window option available with global searches.

This type of search is slower than the index searches and, depending on the size of the report and how far the search goes, may take up to several minutes. The user has the capability to cancel the search at any time.

- g. Global Region option Allows the user to specify a particular area to perform global searches. The area is selected by clicking on the right mouse button and shifting it to specify the search area. Basically, this is done by selecting a range of columns on the frame. Although this is still a global search, the total time needed for the query will be reduced given that the search is limited to a smaller area.
- h. Window option Displays the location of all the occurrences resulting from a search request in a window format.
- 5. <u>Preferences Menu</u>: This menu allows the user to change the default viewing/display characteristics.
 - a. Fonts option Allows the user to change the display font in order to facilitate data viewing. The user selects a smaller/larger font size and clicks on ZOOM OUT option to reduce/amplify the whole display. The user will be able to shift the file while maintaining the selected font by clicking on the right key of the mouse.

The ZOOM IN option allows the user to view a selected area of the frame under a selected font. The right mouse button, when being held down, displays an icon representing a corner with a diagonal pointer line. This icon can be used as a floating left page corner and will be positioned in the particular area targeted to be ZOOMed IN. The frame will enlarge to the selected zoom-in font when the right mouse button is released. Clicking on the right mouse button again will zoom out of this option.

The ZOOM option only applies for viewing purposes, not for printing.

- b. Colors option Allows the user to change foreground and background colors for the report area, search hits, and the status bar. The values selected by the user will be maintained in memory such that they will be automatically enabled on future sessions.
- c. Show Coordinates option When selected, allows the user to see the mouse coordinates in the form of "row, column" pixel positions. This is useful when designing forms for use with reports. A checkmark will be displayed by this option when selected. This option is not saved permanently.
- d. Show Status Info option This option functions as a toggle switch. When the user selects the option, the status bar will appear providing frame number information, arrow keys to move between frames and the name of the file currently being accessed. When the option is enabled, a checkmark will be displayed by the option.
- 6. <u>Print Menu</u>: This menu provides various options to generate frame hard copies. Notice that certain files are configured such that the frame number is equal to the page

number plus 1. Be aware of this condition when using the Frame, Range, and Window Hits printing options as it may look like incorrect pages are being printed, when in reality the function is working as expected.

- a. Frame option (F8 key) Allows the user to print a particular frame of data. The user has the capability to cancel a print request in progress.
- b. Range option Allows the user to print several consecutive frames of data. A template will appear requesting the first and last frame numbers defining the region to be printed. The user has capability to cancel a print request in progress.
- c. Window Hits option Allows the user to print the frame(s) where a matching occurrence has been found as applicable to Single and Multiple search options. Keep in mind that if the occurrence extends throughout various frames, this option will only print the first frame of a particular occurrence.
- d. Print to File option Allows the user to direct the printout to a disk file instead of a printer. If this option is selected, a standard DOS text file that can be imported to most word processors or spreadsheet programs should be used. Printing a disk file is an alternative to using the copy to clipboard function. This method, while more difficult, can be used to copy non-Windows programs that cannot read the clipboard or for data communications that send DOS files to other computers.
- 7. <u>Help Menu</u>: This menu provides online help on how to use the optical fiche system.

Topic option - Allows the user to access a Help file explaining the various capabilities available in the system. The user needs only to click on the particular subject of interest.

SECTION 2 DPS CONSOLE MANAGEMENT INFORMATION

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MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTADING (MOU) FOR THE JOINT OWNERSHIP OF THE MODULAR MEMORY UNIT (MMU)

PURPOSE

The Modular Memory Unit will store the Solid State Mass Memory (SSMM) as well as the Solid State Recorders (SSR). Because the MMU will house equipment that belongs to both the Data Processing Systems group and the Intrumentation and Communitcations (INCO) group, DPS and INCO will have joint ownership of the box. This SCP is a memorandum of understanding between the DPS and INCO Group Leads, the DF2 Branch Chief and the DF Division Chief. It contains the power cycle philoshopy and responsibilities of each group should an anomaly occur with the MMU.

DESCRIPTION

Modular Memory Unit (MMU) Description

- 1. The MMU will replace the functions of the mass memory units, and the payload and ops recorders.
- 2. The MMU will be comprised of the Solid State Recorder (SSR), which replaces the functions of the payload and ops recorders, and the Solid State Mass Memory (SSMM), which replaces the functions of the mass memory units.

MMU Ownership

DF has agreed that DPS and INCO will have a "joint" ownership of the box.

Joint Ownership Power Cycle Philosophy

- Powering off or power cycling the MMU will be coordinated between DPS and INCO.
- 1. Any procedure that calls for an MMU power cycle or to be powered off, the crew will need a "Go" from MCC, which will be coordinated by DPS and INCO.
- 2. The only exception to this power cycle philosophy would be in the case of power down procedures. For these cases, the crew does not need a go to power off the MMU.

Power Cycle Responsibilities

- 1. A power cycle will be initiated by the discipline for which the power cycle is needed.
- 2. If the SSMM fails, DPS will initiate the power cycle if needed, after coordinating with INCO.
- 3. If the SSR fails, INCO will initiate the power cycle, after coordinating with DPS.

2.1-1 Verify that this is the correct version before use

IFM Responsibilities

- 1. An IFM of the MMU to recover the SSMM function will be initiated by DPS with INCO's concurrence.
- 2. An IFM of the MMU to recover the SSR function will be initiated by INCO with DPS's concurrence.
- 3. An IFM procedure for the MMU will only be performed to:
 - a. Recover an MMU if the failure is due to the loss of orbiter power.
 - b. Swap a failed MMU with an operational MMU. This will be done only when one MMU hard failed internally and the other MMU failed externally (has bad data path).

CONSOLE CONFIGURATION

PURPOSE

This SCP is designed to help the DPS and DPS SPT console operators prepare the console for simulation and flight operations.

PROCEDURE

A. Digital voice intercommunication subsystem (DVIS)

Plug in headset and select appropriate loops.

B. Workstation log on

The first operator to arrive should log into White FCR-3, located on the left in the FCR.

The DPS operator will also need to log into the White FCR-22, located on the right in the FCR. If the DPS SPT operator is the first to arrive, the DPS operator will also need to perform a shift handover for White FCR-3.

The DPS SPT operator will need to log into White MPSR-6, located in the MPSR.

If you cannot log on because of password problems, Access Control and Audit (ACA) in Bldg. 30S/ Rm 4312 can reset your passwords. For other workstation problems, contact WSS on the WSS CALL loop.

C. Activity selection (Figure 2.2-1)

After logging on, the operator should complete the activity selection. GC can help determine the proper activity to select if you are not sure.

The White FCR-3 console will automatically start the DPS background processes and the ISP Limit Manager. These processes and applications are started on White FCR-3, since it is the more powerful CPU. Starting these processes and applications in the FCR also allows for reduced MPSR or FCR-only operations without any reconfiguration required.

If the FCR operator is sitting at a different console than White FCR-3, the flight controller must manually start the servers using DNAV DPS II Config I DPS INITIALIZE.

D. Limit set selection (Figure 2.2-2)

When the White FCR-3 operator or the operator to select DPS INITIALIZE completes activity selection, the ISP Limit Manager application will automatically start. Select the appropriate limit set and then iconify the window. The ISP Limit Manager must remain running for limit sensing to be performed.

WARNING Starting more than one ISP Limit Manager will give unpredictable results.

E. Applications

Start applications required to monitor the DPS system.





DPS FLIGHT DATA FILE (FDF) MANAGEMENT POLICIES

A. FDF Libraries

The FDF libraries for FCR-3 and FCR-22 (DPS), MPSR-6 (DPS SPT) and MPSR-9 (CDMS) should support all unclassified missions. DPS receives three copies of the flight-specific and all vehicle documents and updates.

The classified FDF (flight-specific updates), if and when required, will be maintained by the section security officer; this will be his/her only duty for FDF maintenance. In his/her absence, the alternate security officer will maintain this classified library.

B. Updates

There are four types of updates

- 1. SIM packs that are generic or flight-specific (will have subsequent PCNs that will incorporate them)
- 2. SIM packs that are SMS unique (no subsequent PCNs)
- 3. PCNs
- 4. Whole book updates

The generic SIM packs will be incorporated into the applicable books, and the SMS-unique SIM packs (in their entirety) will be put in front of their applicable books, instead of incorporating them into the book. The PCNs will, of course, be incorporated per the instructions on the PCN; the book updates (i.e., revisions) will take the place of the current edition, and the entire current book will be recycled.

Regardless of whether the update is a SIM pack, PCN, or entire book update, the updates should be done in chronological sequence to ensure consistency and validity of the FDF.

C. Update History

The update history of a document will be maintained in the front of the document. The update history consists of the SIM pack cover sheets, PCN change record sheets (cover sheet of the PCN), and new covers for the entire book updates. In some cases there may be a SIM pack that completely replaces another SIM pack; please do not remove the replaced SIM packs cover sheet. This cover sheet is the only source the section can use to verify that the SIM pack was indeed incorporated in the first place; this thorough record keeping will greatly aid the section when the book is to be audited for correctness. Once the responsible section member has updated the book in the proper manner, he/she will go to the front cover of the book and write the name of the applicable update, the date of incorporation, and his/her initials (Figure 2.5-1). If previous incorporations have been made, enter the next update underneath the most recent entry. If the update is a new edition, or no previous updates have been performed, start an update log in the form of Figure 2.5-1.

This updating standard does not apply to the office library; see the OFFICE LIBRARY section of this SCP for further information.

D. Timeliness of Updates

The section usually receives updates the day before they are to be used. Therefore, as a rule, attempt to incorporate the updates into the library the date the update is received. Logistically, this may be impossible; if updating the libraries is not possible by the next day, examine the SIM schedule to determine if the update is actually needed. For instance, an update to the Ascent Checklist will probably not be used during an orbit SIM; therefore, immediate incorporation may not be necessary. If the book is necessary, find the SIM team affected and request the team to update the books for you. However, this should not become a regular procedure. Ultimately, each person is responsible for updating the FDF and maintaining the correct status of his/her assigned books.

Prelaunch team is responsible for verifying that all books are the latest version and have the latest PCNs incorporated. This can be verified using the FDF status sheet, which is in the errata package and available using EDP.

E. Flight Specific Books

Flight supplement books are updated based on flight assignments. The flight lead updates the FCR from which the mission will be flown. DPS SPT for the flight lead updates the corresponding MPSR.

Normally, DPS is in the position of having to support multiple missions and training loads simultaneously. This leads to multiple flight supplements to the generic books. Apparently, usage has shown that keeping these in a separate binder(s) for each flight is the best method of organizing the supplements.

F. Office Library

The DPS FDF manager will be the only person responsible for maintaining and updating the office library; he/she will also maintain the update logs for the office

library. The office library will also have the SIM packs incorporated into their applicable books.

The rules that apply for console libraries also apply for the office library with the following exception: flight-specific documents are always kept in a separate binder in the office library.




Figure 2.7-1. STS FDF structure –typical books shown

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DISCREPANCY REPORTING

PURPOSE

The following procedure describes how to write a discrepancy report (DR) for the DPS console positions. This procedure is governed by FCOH SOP 1.7, MCC/SMS PROBLEM REPORTING. DRs should be written for hardware and MCC applications not managed within the DPS section. For DPS section-managed applications that experience problems, use the Change and Problem Report (CPR) Application, SCP 2.6 (TBD).

The form is shown in Figure 2.8-1.

DR FORM PREPARATION

A. ORIGINATOR

Print your name, mail code, and phone number in the upper left-hand corner of the DR form.

B. AR TYPE

Check the D box to indicate that the type is DR. Use this type for all failures identified during the course of normal support activities.

C. Block 1: DATE/LOCAL TIME OF FAILURE

Enter the date and local time when the discrepancy occurred, using the 24-hour clock format.

D. Block 2: PROBLEM IMPACT

CRITICAL: The failure halts or significantly impacts facility operations or functional objectives. The problem is to be corrected immediately.

MAJOR: The failure impacts equipment or software performance. To be fixed as soon as possible.

MINOR: The failure may have a slight impact on equipment or software performance. The problem can be worked around or accepted in the short term. To be fixed as time permits.

E. Block 3: Leave blank (Do not use)

Leave blank (do not use)

DR FORM SUBMITTAL

Turn in the yellow and white copies of the DR form to the GC console. Attach with it any relevant information, including a printout of the System Services display: DNAV Master II Shuttle I GC I CCS/C I 0006:System Service. Make a copy of the entire package and give to the DPS section coordinator. A computer-generated copy of the DR will be mailed to you within 5 days. Another computer-generated copy of the DR will be mailed to you after the DR has been closed.

ANOMALY REPORT PROCESSING

PURPOSE

The purpose of this procedure is to provide the console operator with guidance in the generation and maintenance of anomaly reports in a consistent manner.

OVERVIEW

Anomaly reports written by DPS are included in the MOD Inflight Anomaly Log. This log is the only official problem list to be recognized by the program during flight operations. The lead flight director will maintain accountability for the log until completion of the flightcrew debriefing (approximately 1 week after the flight). Anomalies discovered during this debrief will be added, and the previous entries will be screened/updated to arrive at the final inflight anomaly list. Once this process is complete, DA8 will initiate a memo transferring the log accountability and tracking to the NSTS program. See FCOH Procedure 1.7.1 for more details.

Anomaly reports can be reassigned (i.e., a suspect MDM card turns out to be an RCS jet problem instead) but cannot be withdrawn once submitted. In the event that an entry in the anomaly log turns out to be an explainable condition, the anomaly report will be updated accordingly.

Occasionally other disciplines have failures in their system that may be DPS related, but at the time, cannot be confirmed. For these cases, it is up to the other discipline to write the initial AR. If it is later confirmed that the problem was indeed caused by something in the DPS system, the AR will either be reassigned to DPS, or DPS will submit a new AR.

- A. What constitutes an anomaly
 - 1. H/W failures Any condition that results in a permanent loss of H/W capability. Recovery steps may or may not have been performed; not performing recovery steps should not delay the AR submission.
 - 2. Transients Any condition that was off nominal and is now nominal as a result of crew action or no crew/ground action. No permanent reconfiguration was performed.
 - 3. Unexplained System Responses Any off-nominal H/W or S/W conditions that, at the time, is not expected or is not explained by ops note, systems brief, or any other authoritative document/source.
- B. Customers

There are several different customers who use the AR information. However, not all customers use these reports for the same reasons. The following is a list of the customers and why they need the information.

- Flight director Responsible for overall direction of shuttle flights from SRB ignition until crew egress. Must be aware of any out of the ordinary activities. Detailed technical information not required. Needs to know only the problem, the impacts, and if workarounds exist.
- 2. Other flight controllers Responsible for their own particular system. Need to be aware of failures in other areas that may impact their own system. Detailed information not required. Need to know only the problem and whether or not it impacts their own system.
- 3. Mission management team (MMT) Responsible for near real-time policy decisions whenever operating outside of the standard shuttle operating base. Only high level overview of failure required.
- Customer support room (CSR) personnel Responsible for payload systems. Need to be aware of orbiter failures that impact their payload. Detailed information not required. Needs to know only the failure, if there are any payload impacts, and whether or not any science will be lost.
- 5. MER (both management and engineers) Responsible as technical advisors to the flight control team. Any information that can assist in assessing the failure is desired (i.e., technical detail).
- 6. Project Office personnel Responsible for the shuttle program. Need to be aware of failures that may impact the success of the program. Only high level overview of failure required.

PROCEDURES

- A. When to submit AR to MOIR (formerly known as SPAN)
 - 1. The preferred time is by the anomaly cutoff on the shift during which the problem occurred. Every feasible effort should be made to meet this deadline.
 - 2. If for some reason the AR cannot be completed by the time indicated in step 1, the next priority is for the team on console at the time of the failure to submit it before leaving console.
 - 3. Regardless of workload, the offgoing team must at least have written an electronic draft of the anomaly and leave it for the oncoming team to review and then submit. This is the least desirable option and should be avoided when at all possible.
- B. Initial Copy
 - Either DPS SPT or DPS initiates an electronic AR via the mission information system (MIS), according to the defined standards (see section on form description later in this SCP). If MIS is unavailable and cannot be recovered in a reasonable period of time, hand write the AR.

- 2. The alternate console position (either DPS or DPS SPT) reviews the AR <u>electronically</u> using MIS. If any modifications need to be made, the reviewing position does so electronically.
- 3. Both DPS and DPS SPT print out a copy of the electronic AR and file it in their console binders under the AR section.
- 4. DPS informs MOIR via the SPAN loop that the new AR is ready for MOIR review and processing. DPS also informs MOIR of the temporary control number associated with the report.
- 5. Once MOIR approves the AR, DPS will no longer be able to make any changes without submitting an official revision.
- C. Revisions

The AR should be revised only for technical reasons. Each team has the authority to revise an existing AR, as long as there is technical reason to do so (i.e., correct/clarify erroneous information or include new information). If for any reason conflict arises as to whether or not a revision is needed, the DPS lead has the ultimate authority.

- 1. Either DPS SPT or DPS updates the electronic copy of the AR on MIS, based on the revision protocol defined above. If the person making the updates is different from the person who submitted the original copy, they must add their name to the AUTHOR portion of the form.
- 2. The alternate console position (either DPS or DPS SPT) reviews the AR <u>electronically</u> using MIS. If any modifications need to be made, the reviewing position does so electronically.
- Both DPS and DPS SPT print out a copy of the revised electronic AR and file it in their console binders under the AR section. DO NOT REMOVE PREVIOUS VERSIONS FROM THE BINDER. All versions of DPS inputs are maintained for history purposes.
- 4. DPS informs MOIR via the SPAN loop that the revised AR is ready for MOIR review and processing. DPS also informs MOIR of the temporary control number associated with the revised report.
- 5. Once MOIR approves the anomaly report, DPS will no longer be able to make any further changes without submitting another official revision.

FORM DESCRIPTION (see Figure 2.9-1)

Discipline/No./Rev

The information for this field is generated automatically by the MIS system unless the originator is a subdiscipline (e.g., CDMS is a subdiscipline of DPS). For spacelab

anomalies, this field will need to be changed to CDMS. See the MIS User's Guide (located in the User's Guide binder in the MPSR) on how to do this.

Revision

Select "No" for the initial anomaly report. Select "Yes" for all revisions.

In-Flight Status

Select "Open" or "Closed." The AR should be open only if waiting for additional crew activities or a CHIT response. If the AR is open, the Resolution portion of the form needs to state why it is still open and any planned troubleshooting. If there is not further planned crew involvement in the troubleshooting, the AR should be closed. Just because the AR is closed does not mean it cannot be updated with new information.

Orbiter Impact

Select "Yes" if any orbiter equipment is affected. Explain all impacts under the Impact portion of the form. Note that at least one "Yes" needs to be selected for Orbiter or Payload. It is not acceptable to have "No" for both Orbiter and Payload.

Payload Impact

Select "Yes" if any payloads are affected. If unsure, check with Payloads. Explain all impacts under the impact portion of the form. Note that at least one "Yes" needs to be selected for Orbiter or Payload. It is not acceptable to have "No" for both Orbiter and Payload.

MER Problem No.

DPS does not fill in this portion of the form. MER assigns a tracking number to anomalies that they decide need to be worked postflight. If a number is assigned to a DPS anomaly, MOIR updates the form to include the MER Problem No.

<u>Name</u>

The first initial and last name of the originator should be entered. Any time the AR is revised by somebody else, their name must be added.

<u>GMT/MET</u>

Enter either the GMT or MET that the anomaly occurred. For simulations, use SGMT instead of GMT. The program will automatically calculate the alternate time for the user. Do not enter GMT or MET for revisions, unless correcting the original times. However, the GMT or MET of any additional observations of the original anomaly or related activities should be included in the Description portion of the form.

<u>Title</u>

Enter a brief <u>descriptive</u> title of the problem. Acronyms and abbreviations are acceptable, but define any uncommon ones in the Description portion of the form. remember, no speculation is to be included in the report; therefore, do not include any in the title either.

Description

Write a description paragraph form with English explanations at the flight director level. All technical data (i.e., ID/ELE, Discrete Word A, etc.), if appropriate, should be included in parentheses after the English statement describing the signature.

• Describe the anomaly in concise and technically complete terms. Do not speculate or guess. State the facts only. Just describe what happened and all relevant signatures.

• Include serial numbers of LRUs.

• Since the GMT is already listed above, do not include it here. However, if there was a sequence of events, then GMT should be included to show how the sequence unfolded. Also, if the same anomaly has repeated, include the times of the additional occurrences.

• If a reference is made to instrumentation, include the effected MSIDs.

Impact

Specify the impact to the orbiter, payload, and/or mission success. Include any constraints to operations and flight rule-driven impacts (individual rule number not required). If there is no impact because of redundancy or alternative actions, identify the specific reason why there is not impact.

Resolution

• Specify any actions that have been taken or need to be taken, configuration changes, and workarounds.

- Do not include individual MAL or block numbers. Instead, include an overview of the actions taken.
- If the AR is still open, explain why.
- N/A, if appropriate, is acceptable. An example of this is if nothing has yet been done to troubleshoot the anomaly.

SECTION 3 MISSION/PHASE CHECKLISTS (DPS VS. DPS SPT)

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COMPREHENSIVE MISSION-WIDE DPS RESPONSIBILITIES

PURPOSE

To provide a summary of on-console actions and responsibilities for DPS operators during flight.

DESCRIPTION

This SCP is divided into the following areas:

- DPS operator's data gathering responsibilities
- DPS console log responsibilities
- Other DPS console responsibilities
- A. DPS Operator's Data Gathering Responsibilities

The console operator has several methods available for obtaining data on the vehicle system being monitored: real-time observations of data, ODRC runs, playbacks, hard copies, and crew observations. When a failure occurs, the following can be used to capture data related to the failure:

- 1. Hard copy displays.
- 2. Request relevant data via ODRC runs.
- 3. Perform a telemetry playback, if needed.
- 4. Request a voice playback, if needed, to capture any crew comments.
- 5. Perform a universal digital by accessing DNAV DPS || ISP | Universal Digitals.

Do not limit yourself to one source of data, assuming it will do the job. Use the resources available to ensure that a complete picture of the failure situation is obtained.

- B. DPS Console Log Responsibilities
 - 1. General <u>guidelines</u> for log keeping are given in the FCOH procedure 1.1. Note that logs may be hand written or electronic. Electronic logs are stored on the MODM server V drive (Collectv) under DPS and a flight specific folder. File names are constructed of the flight #, GMT day, and shift (ie. 108_350_orb1_log.doc).

- 2. Each operator must <u>sign</u> the log at the end of his/her shift before handing over. It is also helpful at the beginning of your shift to indicate the team coming on and who is on it.
- 3. FCR operators need to be sure to include <u>orbiter problems</u> or situations outside of the DPS area that affect our operation or the overall timeline. An example would be PL problems that force an early or out-of-sequence deployment. A common problem is mentioning a problem and then never telling what happens to it.
- 4. The FCOH specifies that the <u>header information</u> on each log sheet is to be filled in.
- 5. The FCOH specifies that log entry <u>timetags</u> may be in GMT. For sims, GMT is not the time to use. Use SGMT or MET. Certain phases of flight better lend themselves to one method over another; i.e., ascent. For ascent, it is convenient to reference actions to L/O; therefore, logs are kept in MET. Once the vehicle is safely in orbit, switch back to GMT.
- 6. A log <u>entry</u> should be specific in its description of a problem or event. Specifying that GPC 4 TB is failed does not help a lot. Is it the mode TB or the output TB? If you are confused, ask a team member. Besides reporting what is seen when an entry is made about a particular problem, we also need to log what should have been seen.

Log entries need to go beyond just a report of what is observed. The heart of the matter is the analysis that determines: <u>what does it mean</u>? How is this going to affect what we do? Is any followup activity required for this? Do not fall into the trap of just logging that I/Os have occurred; i.e., the error count has changed, with no explanation of why. Operators need to get in the habit of explaining why I/O errors or GPC errors are logged. If we get a cycle wrap, why did it happen? What module was the problem in (PDE address)? Was payload activity going on that caused the SCA to be powered off and the subsequent error logged? The reason may be obvious; it must be logged for others to reference. The <u>analysis</u> of problems is one of the most important things that a console operator does.

- 7. Log entries, in general, should reflect the ideas/problems being considered and the decision made, along with the reasons for them. An operator can almost never put too much in the log. Better to have too much than not enough.
- 8. If you put down conclusions in the log that later turn out to be wrong, go back later and add comments in the log margins (or opposite page) pointing out that the entry turned out to be wrong. When the shift summary is done at the end of the shift, it is a good idea to review your log for such entries and clean them up.
- C. Other DPS Console Responsibilities
 - 1. <u>Chits</u> are something that we do not worry about, except in long sims and flight. Therefore, chit writing skills can get a little rusty. The important thing to remember is to get the chit written and submitted as soon as possible. The data you get back in the answer to a chit may affect your planning and the operation of the DPS system. When

you write a chit and ask questions, be careful to not limit yourself as to the scope of the data you get back by asking questions that are too specific.

- 2. Remember to backup the SPECS and OFS logs daily.
- 3. <u>Anomaly logs</u> (ref. SCP 2.9) also provide a means of tracking the status of failures. These logs flag problems to groups outside of the immediate FCR area and also advise other FCR operators of problems in the DPS system. This means that the titles of the anomaly report need to convey the problem and not just the symptoms. Rather than the title of "MDM FF1 Failure," a title of "FF1 Transient" would be more descriptive of what happened. The "open/close status" should be approached from the standpoint of whether or not there will be any more activity related to recovery from the problem, not whether or not the original condition has been cleared. Closeout statements should indicate if the problem was transient. If there are any actions to be taken are different from standard operations because this problem has occurred, cover them in the impact statement.
- 4. <u>Shift summaries</u> will be completed by each team (not by each position). The purpose of the log is to provide a summary of the previous shift activities, outline any configuration changes, describe any open work, and document any decisions made. It is up to each team to decide which position will write the handover log; but once it has been completed, each position should put a hard copy in their console binder.

The shift handover log is in an electronic format, and the template is located on the share drive s:\df22\fltinfo.XXX\h_o_logs (XXX=flight #). The name of the template file is handover.doc. (Template also available on MODM V drive under DPS\handover) It is important to call the template up from the correct flight directory. This is because the template has a macro that automatically names the file and saves it in the same directory from which it was opened. When the template is called up, it will ask for several pieces of information. Use of the V drive is preferred because the MODM system has 24 hr support.

After the requested information has been input, the file will be automatically named and saved. The file naming convention is XXX_YY_Z.doc, where XXX = flight number (e.g., 070, 120, or Sim), YY = day of MET (01, 02, 03, etc.), and Z = sequential increment. This naming convention makes it possible for File Manager to list the handover logs in sequential order.

The file is now ready for the shift summary information.

LEAD DPS OPERATOR CHECKLIST

PURPOSE

To provide a summary of actions and responsibilities for the Lead DPS Operator of a given flight.

DESCRIPTION

This SCP defines the roles and responsibilities of the Lead DPS Operator for any given flight. These responsibilities are broken down into the following areas:

- Preflight Program Coordination
- Flight-Specific Rule and Procedure Development
- MCC Workstation Configuration
- Console Products
- DPS Team Coordination
- Realtime Flight Execution
- Postflight Duties

A. Preflight Program Coordination

- 1. Beginning at approximately L-12 months (or as required), ensure DPS representation at flight techniques meetings, flight-specific team tagups, JOPs, etc. for DPS-related discussions. Although support at every meeting may not be required, be sure you are on distribution for agendas, minutes, etc.
- 2. Be aware of current issues being discussed in the various IPT/PRT forums (MEDS Software, GPC/MDM, MMU, etc.) for any impacts to your flight. Coordinate items with the section reps to these panels as needed.
- Be aware of changes to the flight manifest affecting your flight. Although major changes are usually known via team tagups, etc. the SSP will reflect "official" manifest changes in the flight-specific Flight Requirements Document (NSTS 17462 - xxx, where 'xxx' is the flight number). This document will typically go through many revisions over the course of the flight planning process; the latest version can be found on the JSC web (http://sspweb.jsc.nasa.gov/efrd/index.cfm).
- 4. Track vehicle DPS-related hardware problems via Interim Problem Reports (IPRs). These are typically generated by KSC personnel as problems are uncovered during the

vehicle's ground processing flow. The DF TA homepage (http://mod.jsc.nasa.gov/df/dfdiv/shuttleta/index.html) contains links to both the KSC Morning Reports and the IPR databases; the PRT/IPT forums are also a good source of info. Late-breaking IPRs, especially after the FRR timeframe, will be highly visible. As the DPS Lead you may be called upon to represent MOD's position in resolving issues ensure that DF management and your Lead Flight Director are kept in the loop.

- 5. Track software changes DRs, CRs, program notes and waivers, and new OI releases. If required, attend the Flight Software Readiness Review, or at least coordinate issues with the MOD rep to the SASCB (currently David Graham, x34382). As in (4) above, late breaking issues will receive extra attention and it is your responsibility to ensure the appropriate MOD personnel are notified.
- 6. At L 4 weeks, provide inputs for the Flight Readiness Review (FRR) datapack and the Certificate of Flight Readiness (CoFR) to the DF technical assistant (DF TA) for Systems Integration. Inputs for the FRR may be acquired by reading the KSC status reports and contacting the lead KSC DPS or JSC Engineering personnel and if you have been performing the steps above there should be no big surprises.

A Delta FRR will also be generated for issues occurring after the FRR itself. Delta FRR inputs are generally due by L - 3 days.

As part of the CoFR generation, the DPS lead is responsible for reviewing the flightspecific documents and drawings that are routed and maintained by the DF Division librarian; for DPS, this generally entails a cursory inspection of these items to ensure that any impacts/issues are addressed.

Use the format provided by the DF TA to produce both the FRR and the CoFR. Any questions concerning content should be addressed in the "instruct" folder located on the DF share drive (S:\Divisions\DF\Shared\Mission\Shuttle\COFR_FRR\INSTRUCT). Generic templates for these files exist on the TA homepage (http://mod.jsc.nasa.gov/df/dfdiv/shuttleta/index.html); however, the lead can also use the previous flight version as a baseline. As a minimum, entries into the FRR datapack should include the date of occurrence, the Problem Report (PR) or Interim Problem Report (IPR) number, the serial number of the units involved, whether the unit was removed/replaced or will be "flown as is," a brief history of the failure/anomaly, and the impact of this failure/anomaly. Previous flight FRR/CoFRs can also serve as a guideline for items that should be included.

The lead should adhere to the following standard for naming/saving the files (per the DF TA): the DPS inputs to the CoFR should be created in a file called dpscfrxxx.doc; the DPS inputs to the FRR statement should be created in a file called dpsfrrxx.doc; the DPS inputs to the delta FRR statements (if they exist) should be created in a file called dpsdelxxx.doc. The "xxx" refers to the flight number. After creation, these files should be stored in the folder set aside for that flight, also located in the TA subdirectory.

As soon as the CoFR is complete and signed off by the Group Lead and Branch Chief, the lead will send a copy of the signoff sheet to the DF TA (the DF TA will already have the entire CoFR inputs from DPS in electronic form if the lead followed the DF TA's

instructions appropriately). The lead will generate two complete hard copy sets (including the signed CoFR signoff sheet) of the DPS CoFR and FRR inputs; one copy will be placed in the flight binder to be used during flight, and one will be kept in the lead's files. If delta FRR inputs are required, process the inputs per the procedure mentioned above. One copy of the delta FRR should be put in the flight binder and another is kept in the lead's files.

 Verify that PASS GPC dump and/or processing has been tested using SMS or SAIL by L - 2 weeks.

B. Flight-Specific Flight Rule and Procedure Development

- 1. Develop initial (Basic version) flight-specific FDF procedures and Flight Rules as needed and submit to the appropriate book managers (deadlines are usually set in the team meetings).
- 2. Concurrent with the Flight Operations Review (FOR, see (3) below), the DF TA will provide the flight-specific Ascent Switchlist and the Launch Commit Criteria Minimum Equipment Listing (LCC MEL) for review (the review version is usually based on a previous mission of similar design). The Ascent Switchlist (Section 9 of the Ascent Checklist) documents the required configuration of Orbiter switch panels at crew ingress and at launch. DPS-specific inputs include Payload Timing Buffer (PTB), IDP, GPC, and payload-specific configurations.

The MEL is located in appendix H of the LCC; the MEL documents flight equipment and specifies the operational requirement of each item for launch. These may be, and usually are, flight specific; therefore, the lead must determine what these requirements are for his/her assigned flight. Previous similar missions should be used as a guide. The minimum requirements (others may exist) that the lead must address includes the following:

- a. <u>MTU timing signal requirements</u>: these include IRIG-B and frequency divider signals; contact the lead ACO for their requirements.
- b. <u>Aft IDP/MDU/Keyboard requirements</u>: These may or may not be required for launch; check with the lead ACO and/or other lead disciplines for mission usage.
- c. <u>PL MDM requirements</u>: For payloads that have a PL MDM interface, specific card/channel requirements may be reflected in the MEL.

When approaching the lead ACO concerning these requirements, ask specific questions. For example, for the timing signals, determine which signals the payloads are using and what the impact is if the signals are lost (i.e., "Is mission success lost?"). The real question is, "Can the payload community commit to launch if that timing signal is lost?"

3. After the Basic versions of the FDF/Flight Rules are released, review all DPS-related items for accuracy. Any desired changes must be submitted as a DN to be reviewed at the FOR, which occurs no later than L-4 months (but may occur earlier depending on the complexity of the flight - some flights may also have more than one FOR). Instructions for generating DNs will be distributed by the Operations Division (DO) of MOD. Approximately 1 week prior to the FOR, all submitted DNs will be made available for community review and an MOD-only tagup to coordinate the disposition of these DNs may occur. DPS support at this review is generally not mandatory but should be based on the number and extent of the DNs of interest to DPS. Since the individual book managers present the DNs for disposition, coordinate support with them if necessary.

The FOR itself is usually a multi-day event consisting of DN reviews of each flight-specific FDF article, including the Flight Rules. Splinter meetings may also be called to settle outstanding issues and may result in additional DNs, actions, etc. The DPS lead should be aware of the issues being discussed and plan to provide support as needed.

- 4. After the FOR, the DPS lead should verify that all DNs of interest were incorporated correctly in the next releases of the FDF/Flight Rules. Changes required after this point will require a 482 (for the FDF) or a CR (Flight Rules). The lead should track these as required and should coordinate with the book managers to ensure changes are incorporated correctly in simpacks (if required for sims) and/or book revisions.
- 5. Concurrent with flight-specific development, the DPS lead should be aware of any generic flight rule and/or procedure changes which will be implemented on their flight. These changes will generally be approved in the Flight Techniques forums where an implementation plan will be developed.
- 6. Verify Command Handbook procedures. At approximately L-1 month the INCO group will send an email listing the various disciplines' command procedures contained in the Handbook. The DPS Lead should verify that the email lists the latest version of the DPS command procedures.
- 7. Work ascent IDP configuration (coordinate this with the A/E DPS):
 - a. Coordinate with the A/E DPS, crew, and/or trainers to determine the crew's preferred A/E IDP config. Some crews may prefer an "alternate" T-9 IDP config where the BFS is given two forward CRTs and PASS is assigned CRT 4. If this is the case, steps should be added to the Ascent Checklist at the T-9 mark to accomplish this. Likewise, steps to reconfigure back to a more standard config will need to be added to the 'Post OMS-1' section of the checklist. Consult the STS-99 Ascent Checklist for an example of the "alternate" config.

- b. The A/E Flight Director may have a crew tagup to discuss these and other items prior to flight-specific sims. Other A/E DPS topics of interest may include:
 - 1. Do you want to hear Suspect BFS calls (as well as No-Go)?
 - 2. For an Ascent Set Split, will you Engage or go with a PASS Set per the FRs?
 - 3. For a Set Split, will you go with the best pair or only a pair that BFS is Tracking?
 - 4. If there is only IDP 4 interface with a Set Split Pair, do you want to go with it or Engage?
 - 5. How do you work a Set Split (order of Channels, GPCs, and Surf FB desels)?
 - 6. Philosophy for BFS Self Engage?
 - 7. If the BFS Fails, early SM versus re-IPL BFS into GPC 5 or another GPC?
 - 8. Reach and Vis questions What switches can you reach when (suited)? When can you take down a FTS GPC on Ascent?
 - 9. MEDS config, also can discuss signatures where they would be go for an IDP power cycle (optional) and review hands off close to liftoff (optional)
- c. Provide the MEDS Launch Configuration table to the Vehicle Integration and Test Team (VITT) lead for inclusion in the Ascent Checklist. Ideally this should be concurrent with rest of your pre-FOR inputs so that a DN or 482 does not need to be written. An example of the table is shown below:

- C. MCC Workstation Configuration
 - 1. Verify console tool status prior to the ILC.
 - a. Invalid fault summary messages, if any.
 - b. DPS datapack (SCP 1.0). Make sure datapack builder has been informed about any flight-specific loads (VPs, TMBU, etc.).
 - c. RAD and EOs.
 - d. GMEM status/verification sheet.
 - e. TMBU databases build.
 - f. VPs into T&O representative before first sim on load.
 - Be aware of updates to MCC application data files (ELOG, MSKVIEW, etc.) and/or new applications/comps being worked by the DPS group if they will be implemented for your flight. These may be tested during the ILC and subsequent flight-specific sims and must be certified and submitted by L-35 days. Coordinate with the section GA and/or other group members as appropriate.
 - 3. Support the flight-specific ILC with DT counterparts (SCP 6.4). Track resulting issues as required to ensure the load can support the start of flight-specific sims.
 - 4. Tag up with the Group Lead prior to flight to review any applicable SFOC, MCC, and/or discipline-specific console Ops Notes.

D. Console Products

- 1. Coordinate with the section book managers to ensure the console Systems Briefs, SSSH, and SCPs are the latest versions. Known SSSH errors should be documented in the DF Master List (link on <u>http://mod.jsc.nasa.gov/df/dfdiv/</u>).
 - a. Coordinate with the DPS webpage administrator to ensure links to these products are also up to date prior to flight.
 - b. Ensure the EMCC box (located in the Group Lead's office) is also updated.
- Use the FDF Status Sheets (link on <u>http://mod.jsc.nasa.gov/do3/fdf/</u>) to ensure the required updates are on console for sims and flight. Binders containing the flight-specific FDF are located in the FCR and MPSR. Generic FDF should also be checked for updates prior to flight; contact the section reps for the individual books as required.

- Prior to flight, provide binders in the FCR/MPSR for the console logs, hardcopies, anomaly reports, etc. These are usually recycled from previous flights so make sure all previous flight information has been removed. Suggested items to include in the binders:
 - a. DPS personnel phone and pager list (available in the FCR and MPSR).
 - b. Contact list for JSC MER and KSC DPS personnel.
 - c. Copies of console Ops Notes if applicable.
 - d. MCC shift schedule.
 - e. DPS preflight team briefing.
- 4. Verify the FSW CD is available in the MPSR cabinet.
- 5. Verify the flight-specific Data Pack is available in the FCR/MPSR.

E. DPS Team Coordination

- 1. Ensure team is included on all necessary distribution lists (email) for issues.
- Conduct DPS team briefing prior to flight. At the Lead's discretion it may also be advantageous to give a briefing prior to the start of flight-specific sims particularly if a long sim (spanning multiple teams) is part of the template. Briefings should include:
 - a. Flight overview; note special activities of interest to DPS.
 - b. Crew, Flight Director, and DPS team manning.
 - c. FSW OI (include pertinent CRs, user notes, etc.) as well as MCC workstation software version.
 - d. Hardware serial numbers as needed. Use the links from the "DPS Hardware" section of the DPS homepage to acquire this info.
 - e. MER Team shift schedule. The Lead should also ensure the MER has the DPS console shift schedule. The Lead may invite MER team members to the tagup if desired.
- Update the DF Flight Roster located on the share drive (S:\Divisions\DF\Shared\Mission\Mission Manning SSP_ISS).

F. <u>Realtime Flight Execution</u>

- 1. During the course of the flight, the Lead should maintain cognizance of all DPSrelated anomalies, chit traffic, etc. Although all shifts are involved in these issues the Lead should ensure that by flight's end all DPS issues are closed out satisfactorily. Actions for postflight work should be noted.
- Keep management informed as appropriate. Even if the mission is nominal from a DPS perspective an activity report input at the end of the week should summarize activities to date. Off-nominal situations may demand more immediate visibility.

G. Postflight Duties

- 1. Recommended immediate postlanding actions for the entry team:
 - a. Bring back associated reference materials/books back to the office.
 - b. Bring all flight paperwork (logs, hardcopies, etc.) back to the office; leave binders on console.
 - c. Move Flight Rules Annex and Post Insertion to FDF binder for ALL consoles. Move datapack to Post Flights datapack binder for ALL consoles.
- Prepare a quick-look report for DF Systems Issues. As the name implies, this is not a detailed report but a one- or two-page summary of flight issues which is typically given on the first Systems Issues meeting after the flight. The report template can be found on the DF TA homepage (<u>http://mod.jsc.nasa.gov/df/dfdiv/shuttleta/index.html</u>). Once completed, a copy should be saved on the DF32 share drive in the 'Quicklook' folder.
- 3. Complete Flight Director feedback form and ensure other DPS FCR shifts are doing the same. Submit forms to the Group Lead.
- 4. Prepare DPS post mission report and distribute as outlined in SCP 3.7
- 5. Give copies of DPS FRR and delta FRR datapacks to the postflight report book manager for inclusion in each of the postflight report binders.
- 6. Sort and compile logs and data from flight for archives.
 - a. The FCR and MPSR binder material can be combined into a single binder (with appropriate tabs) and placed in the DPS office file cabinet.
 - b. Place level C FSSR in section library for reference.

- 7. Follow up on DPS action items from flight. Actions or issues that affect the next flight should be discussed with that flight's Lead, as they will most likely be reflected in the CoFR/FRR. Issues may also be presented to the Ascent or Orbit Flight Techniques Panels at the panel chair's discretion if in doubt, discuss the matter with the Group Lead..
- 8. Represent DPS at the crew debriefings. The crew will typically have a number of debriefings in the weeks following a flight; the Lead should support the Systems Debrief as it appears on the schedule. Check with the DF TA if you have not received a schedule a few days after landing. Anomaly reports will be dispositioned at debrief so be prepared to discuss and recommend closure actions as needed.
- Submit list of training objectives covered during flight to training records personnel (signed by Group Lead) for any objectives not previously seen by operators.

DPS LAUNCH COMMIT CRITERIA SUMMARY

PURPOSE

This SCP provides a summary of the DPS-related launch commit criteria (LCC) elements. The LCC outlines preplanned decisions designed to minimize the amount of real-time rationalization required when non-nominal situations occur. In general, the LCC become effective at "Go for start of external tank cryogenic loading" (approximately T - 6 hours) and terminates at solid rocket booster (SRB) ignition. Specific terminate time periods for the DPS elements are listed below. Violation of any LCC between T - 5 minutes (counting) (APU start) and SRB ignition without a predetermined, approved, and documented in-place contingency procedure will result in a launch scrub. The preapproved procedures are documented in Shuttle Countdown (Launch Processing System), OMI S0007, vol. 5. Furthermore, we have a Space Shuttle Operational Flight Rule (2-3) that states the following: "No MCC countdown hold will be called after T - 31 seconds." (Ref. Shuttle Launch Commit Criteria and Background.)

The ground launch sequencer (GLS) software will check all of the orbiter critical systems during the countdown and will automatically hold the countdown at specific milestones if there is a problem. The GLS begins at T - 2 hours and terminates at SRB ignition. The specific milestones for the holds are as follows (times shown as minutes/seconds):

- T 9/0 Prior to GLS activation
- T 7/30- Prior to OAA retract
- T 5/0 Prior to APU start
- T 4/0 Prior to purge seq 4
- T 2/55- Prior to ET L0₂ prepress
- T 1/57- Prior to ET LH₂ prepress
- T 0/31- Prior to auto seq start

There is no automatic GLS capability to hold after T - 31 seconds; it must be done manually at KSC (ref. Ground Launch Sequencer Description Document, Launch Countdown).

Critical orbiter system functions are controlled by the redundant set GPCs and associated software during launch countdown, ascent, orbit, entry, and aborts. These functions are referred to as the sequencing subsystem, which is a unique grouping of sequences that are packaged and scheduled during each phase of the mission. The redundant set launch sequencer (RSLS) starts when the GPCs are taken to OPS 101. At T - 31 seconds, the GLS sends a command to the RSLS to take control of the vehicle, which occurs at T - 28 seconds ("Auto Sequence Start") (ref. Redundant Computer Set Logic Flow Diagrams (Sequencing)). See Table 3.3-1 for a brief rationale description for each LCC.

If a single bit error is detected, it is corrected; if a multibit error is detected, the computer goes into the wait state and halts processing. There are other "DPS-related" LCC (such as MM ready and BFS engage discretes) that are monitored for failure indications, but they were not included in this summary since they are hardware-related and FSW does nothing more than D/L the measurements. Obviously, there are numerous other LCC and/or RSLS hold and abort conditions not indicated here (e.g., main engine condition, vent door conditions, etc.).

- Note 1: The PRCB-baselined LCC was modified to add these three I/O error conditions as LCC violations down to T 31 seconds. The probability of these errors is infinitesimal, but if one should occur it is a possible indication of an error in IOP (MSC/BCE) code, much of which is unprotected and does not get compared at the T - 20 dump and compare.
- Note 2: User note for DR 101362 addresses a misleading abort indication; i.e., an MDM failure can be annunciated as a PAD data path fail abort.

ASCENT TIMELINE

PURPOSE

The Ascent Checklist is designed to provide the DPS/DPS SPT ascent operators with an event timeline of the DPS-specific objectives/tasks that are required while in OPS 1. In addition, the checklist contains DPS failure cases and the cues that should be used to determine the failure mode and make the appropriate call. This section may be used pre-sim/flight for a quick review, or even real time to verify that all possible signatures have been examined.

ORBIT RESPONSIBILITIES

PURPOSE

This procedure is intended to provide the DPS on-orbit console operator with an idea of what tasks are expected to be accomplished during the shift. The following is intended to be a minimum list of tasks that might be required to be done on-orbit. This is not intended to be a complete list, nor is it intended to imply that this is all that the on-orbit team may be required to perform. As our flights continue, this list will be updated to reflect any additions or deletions of tasks.

BACKGROUND

The DPS system is the heart of the Space Shuttle data system. This requires the DPS operator to be knowledgeable of all on-orbit operations and to keep track of most data and configuration changes. The exact number of data and configuration changes will vary with the flight requirements. The following is an attempt to list some of the standard things that a DPS operator can be required to do.

DESCRIPTION

A. Time Bias Adjustment (ΔT)

Time error measurement is accomplished via special computations that compare onboard Greenwich mean time (GMT) to a very accurate STDN GMT (±25 microseconds). The computations that DPS SPT adjusts during the orbit timeframe are displayed as MTU2 Δ T, GNC Δ T, and SM Δ T. DPS SPT enters the biases via the workstation and then transmits them to the MOC to take out any comparison errors between the site and onboard GMT. After the G2/S2 set is configured in post-insertion, DPS SPT should zero the MTU2 and GNC delta times on one Tracking and Data Relay Satellite (TDRS), and the SM delta time should be zeroed on the other. Any time pseudo-sync is lost (OPS transitions, telemetry format load (TFL) changes, PCMMU swaps, etc.), the GNC and SM delta times should be "rezeroed" on the appropriate TDRS. This procedure is contained in SCP 6.2. Once the adjustment is made, the value is used by the Δ T computation to compute the Δ error between the ground and onboard GMT.

B. SM Checkpoint

After sufficient uplinking to the vehicle has been accomplished, this information can be saved on the mass memory unit(s) (MMU). This is accomplished by the crew as part of the post-insertion FDF (approx. MET 2:30) and part of the presleep activity (ORB OPS C/L). This procedure writes specific data out to the MMU. This data includes such things as FDA parameters, which are changeable via a TMBU, and the TDRS state vector. However, it does not include the variable parameters (VPs).

The checkpoint is performed to both MMUs, one at a time, starting with MMU 2. After TMBUs are saved on an SM checkpoint, they should be deleted.

C. Variable Parameters

The SM and GNC major functions allow for the input of 10 GPC addresses, which are included as part of the downlist. The contents of these addresses change depending on which phase of flight is operational. The orbit DPS operator should ensure that the on-orbit VP addresses get onboard properly. At times during that orbit shift, other flight controllers may ask DPS for temporary changes to be made to the VP list for various reasons; i.e., COAS, GMEM, etc. The DPS operator should ensure that these changes are incorporated properly, and when no longer required, are deleted and the nominal VPs restored. This procedure is contained in SCP 7.6, PASS Variable Parameters.

D. FCS Checkout

Generally, the day before scheduled entry, the orbiter flight control surfaces are checked to ensure their operability for entry. This procedure is accomplished by transitioning to OPS 8. During this OPS transition and (after the checkout is complete) during the OPS 8 to OPS 2 transition, DPS should monitor the health of the DPS system. Problems such as mass memory read errors should be monitored to assist in successful OPS transitions. If the OPS 8 to OPS 2 transition cannot be accomplished, the G2FD will be used to place the DPS in a more desirable configuration than OPS 8.

E. OFS and SPECS Backups

Daily, during flights, the SPECs and OFS logs need to be saved to provide for a daily backup capability. The backups are to be performed during normal work hours; so the lead will assign this to the team on console during normal work hours for the particular flight. The SPECs log is saved by using DNAV DPS II Tools I SPECS Log Backup. The OFS logs are saved by using the save to file option under the OFS file menu or DNAV DPS II Tools I OFS Log Backup. These logs need to be printed out at the end of the flight by the entry team before leaving console. After that, the logs can be cleared out.

POST-FLIGHT REPORTS

PURPOSE

To provide guidelines for preparation of Shuttle DPS post-flight reports, including:

- A. Post-Flight Report Topics
- B. Timeline for Report Generation
- C. Miscellaneous Topics

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

DPS post-flight reports have evolved over the years, but over time, have become fairly standardized. While DPS post-flight reports contain some general mission information, the focus is to provide detailed information pertinent to the Shuttle DPS subsystem and address problems/issues of historical interest to a DPS flight controller. The post-flight report documents system failures that occurred during a mission and should address the following areas:

- DPS anomalies or failures (document in detail).
- DPS system configurations utilized during the mission.
- DPS-related FDF problems needing corrections or improvements.
- DPS console documentation problems requiring corrections or clarification.
- Problems with flight rules that require updates.
- General mission data.
- Unique timelines or mission configurations.

PROCEDURE

A. Post-Flight Report Topics

This section identifies standard topics and establishes the general post-flight report requirements. The post-flight report format is not meant to constrain or limit the DPS Flight Lead. However, deviating from the general requirements should be coordinated with the DPS Group Lead.

The DPS Flight Lead may identify other types of data that are needed for a specific mission (e.g., track explainable error signatures for new DPS hardware). The DPS Flight Lead is expected to brief other team members prior to the mission to ensure everyone understands any requirements to collect appropriate mission data.

 Front Cover Page - Include STS mission number and title (DPS Post-Flight Report). Although optional, current style is to include the mission patch (for consistency, near top of page, and approximately 3-¼ X 3-¼ image). This is followed by the names of the FCR team members supporting the flight. Only the DPS Flight Lead's signature is required on the original paper copy.

3.7-1 Verify that this is the correct version before use

Historically, paper versions of DPS post-flight reports had included signatures of all FCR console officers. While there was no MOD requirement for this, it was carried forward from STS-1 as a historical precedent.

- 2. <u>Table of Contents</u> Assists the reader in quickly identifying topics of interest.
- 3. <u>Mission Summary</u> Include a general mission overview and a DPS perspective of mission overview. An optional mission daily summary may also be included.
 - (a) A general mission overview includes information as to which orbiter was flown, and at the option of the DPS Flight Lead, the number of missions it has flown. Also, include an overview of the major mission objectives, such as, ISS assembly or logistical missions, crew rotations, EVAs, and any satellite deploy and retrieval operations. The mission overview should also include information relative to any Shuttle launch scrub, mission extension, entry wave off, and the reason for those mission changes.
 - (b) A DPS perspective of the mission should provide a brief summary of DPS in-flight anomalies or DPS funnies, plus any in-flight issues pertinent to the DPS discipline. The intent is to allow the reader to quickly identify whether or not there were DPS issues during the mission.
 - (c) Although optional, the DPS Flight Lead is encouraged to include a brief summary of each day's events. This requires a minimal effort if performed daily during the mission.
- 4. <u>Payload/Mission Objective</u> This is a statement defining the major mission objective and/or major payloads flown on the mission. Sub-sections should be included to provide a brief summary of the primary and secondary payloads. At the very least, the two sections should spell out payload acronyms.

Orbiter payloads tend to drive mission timelines and Execute Package content. A general knowledge of the payloads is helpful in understanding required DPS configurations and failure responses. In addition, a payload may occasionally be impacted by a DPS in-flight failure, or vice versa. If so, a brief description of the payload might provide additional insight into required mission actions.

The DPS Flight Lead may elect to provide a more extensive overview of a major payload, including interesting facts and/or images of the payload. Since secondary payloads rarely drive DPS configurations or require direct DPS interfaces, little benefit is derived by including their detailed descriptions.

Normally, such payload overview information is available well before a mission is scheduled to fly (data may be obtained from JSC and/or KSC PAO websites). Not only does such data provide useful post-flight report information (typically requiring only minor tweaks), the data serves as an informative pre-mission tool for bringing the assigned DPS Flight Control Team (FCT) up to speed.

- 5. <u>Flight Design Profile</u> Include a brief tabulation summarizing various mission design parameters: Orbiter vehicle; launch and landing dates and times; and pre-mission planned and actual mission duration. While optional, planned launch inclination, insertion altitude, and rendezvous altitude may be included.
- 6. <u>Shuttle Crew</u> Include a brief tabulation summarizing Shuttle crewmembers. If the flight crew worked dual shifts while on-orbit, the summary typically identifies both Red and Blue team members. For Shuttle missions supporting ISS crew rotations, the crew summary should note which crewmembers were rotated.
- 7. <u>Flight Control Teams</u> Include a brief tabulation identifying the Shuttle Flight Directors and DPS team members supporting each FCT, including Prelaunch team. Identify Shuttle Lead Flight Director, DPS Flight Lead, and individuals officially assigned as FCR or MPSR OJTs. There is no requirement to identify unassigned OJTs. Identify any DPS FCR or MPSR personnel substitutions during the mission and any MPSR personnel "On Call" for one or more shifts during the mission.
- 8. <u>PASS/BFS/MEDS Software Configuration</u> Include a brief tabulation identifying flight software versions, including MEDS IDP and MDU software, flown on the mission. This data may be found elsewhere, but it is not necessarily readily available. The post-flight report can serve as a useful tool when attempting to track flight software OI releases.
- 9. <u>DPS Mission Statistics</u> Include summaries of PASS and BFS OPS transitions, DPS-related command uplinks, and PASS/BFS GPC errors logged at landing.
 - (a) The OPS transition summary provides a listing of all PASS and BFS OPS transitions, all PASS set expansion and set contraction times, and any GPC freeze dry times. The period of coverage ranges from the prelaunch G9-G1 OPS transition to the post-landing G9 set contraction. Only the GMT start time for the OPS transition is required (DDD/HH:MM:SS).

There is no requirement to track the actual time durations to complete an OPS transition. However, for any anomalous SSMM OPS transition, timing details should be reported in the write-up for the anomaly itself.

During early Shuttle missions, DPS teams maintained a log of the actual times required to complete pre-positioning and OPS overlays. However, such data is no longer tracked since there is no value added to the report.

(b) The uplinks summary attempts to capture the types and total number of DPS-related command loads uplinked, or loads uplinked by DPS on behalf of another discipline (i.e., ISS TMBUs) to the PASS and BFS. Experience has shown that the actual uplink times are rarely needed. If required, the DPS console logs or INCO's MCC uplink command history are available to identify a precise command load uplink time. The DPS FCT serves as a point-of-contact for all DEU Equivalent loads, GMEM loads, and Variable Parameters. A list of these loads is included in the post-flight report. The DPS FCT also serves as the coordinator for all BFS TMBUs uplinked throughout a mission (prelaunch count, Ascent, or Entry timeframes); therefore, a list of those loads is also included.

The prelaunch DOLILU load is not tracked since it is not a DPS command load. Likewise, each individual discipline is responsible for management of their own PASS SM TMBU uplinks. Consequently, for non-ISS missions, the post-flight report has no requirement to track SM TMBU loads.

(c) The PASS/BFS GPC errors summary captures GPC errors logged during post-landing. Although the number and type of errors are listed, there is no requirement to track time-tags associated with either PASS or BFS errors. The post-flight report should identify any error codes, and most probable reason for the occurrence for any unexpected errors. The DPS Flight Lead may want to include all GPC errors, including those that are explained by User/OPS Notes.

Historically, the post-flight report lists the BFS GPC errors at post-landing wheels stop. This captures data occurring only during the Entry timeframe. This is because the BFS GPC error logs are cleared as part of the System Reset function whenever the BFS is brought up from HALT. Consequently, BFS GPC errors occurring during the prelaunch and Ascent timeframes are lost. Traditionally, no attempt has been made to capture such data.

- 10. <u>Flight Items of Interest</u> This is the main section of the post-flight report. It includes a variety of topics such as MCC workstation and DPS applications problems; DPS issues during vehicle turn-around period, prelaunch-count and Ascent timeframe; DPS in-flight anomalies and/or DPS issues; post-landing issues; and a summary of DPS LRUs flown during the mission.
 - (a) Post-Flight Actions and the DF Systems Issues 'Quick Look' are listed in this section and are normally provided as appendices. Although vehicle turnaround issues are covered as part of the Flight Readiness Review (FRR), at the discretion of the DPS Flight Lead, an abbreviated version of DPS FRR and Delta FRR input packages may be included as an appendix.
 - (b) MCC workstation and DPS application problems are documented in this section with a description of the problem, any procedural workarounds, and the associated MCC AR number.
 - (c) Include any issues that occurred during the prelaunch count (especially if it led to a launch scrub), at lift-off, or during the Ascent timeframe. Provide sufficient detail to understand the issue even if it does not directly impact the Shuttle DPS or the DPS flight controller discipline. Identify procedures supported, such as DOLILU (day-of-launch I-Load uplink).

3.7-4 Verify that this is the correct version before use

(d) Write-ups pertaining to DPS in-flight anomalies, issues, or DPS lessons learned should be covered in detail. Reference any IFA numbers and include all information provided in an anomaly report. Present anomaly write-ups in chronological order.

Each write-up should include the GMT time-tag of the occurrence, any crew observations and actions, error log entries, and any fault messages. If the anomaly was likely the result of a DPS hardware problem, include the LRU serial number. Avoid including only hexadecimal error data (provide a brief description of the pertinent data). If the anomaly is explained by an OPS or User Note, then reference the appropriate program note, the occurrence, and anomalous signature.

If the write-up presents a conclusion or most probable cause for the IFA, the use of engineering judgment is certainly acceptable. However, be sure to document your rationale and supporting data.

(e) Most post-landing issues are typically identified by KSC. Their initial vehicle inspection and standard post-landing LRU testing occasionally uncover an anomaly (e.g., an unexpected MDM BITE read signature).

While such information will be covered as part of the vehicle turnaround for that Orbiter's next assigned mission, the post-flight report should provide sufficient detail to document the issue. Often our KSC DPS counterparts can provide useful follow-up information in a timely fashion to support the post-flight report write-up.

- (f) Include a tabular summary of DPS LRUs flown during the mission. Since this information needs to be made available to the FCT prior to the mission, its inclusion in the post-flight report should require little effort.
- 11. <u>Crew Debrief Comments</u> This section of the report is intended to capture pertinent information provided by flight crewmembers during the MER/FCT Debrief. Occasionally, the crew will note something that they did not feel warranted an A/G comment during the mission but could be useful information for upcoming missions.

While reviewing/discussing DPS IFAs, a crewmember will occasionally note additional error signatures or provide personal insights that often help diagnose the problem. Such insights may assist KSC in post-mission troubleshooting.

12. <u>Post-Mission Follow-up</u> - Typically, MER Anomaly paperwork is generated that corresponds to IFAs. KSC will open an Interim Problem Report (IPR) based upon the MER paperwork to formally track subsequent troubleshooting of the issue. KSC will also open an IPR for any anomaly occurring post-landing. KSC follow-up investigation and testing will often yield valuable insights into an IFA. Therefore, it is recommended to document this in the post-flight report.

However, if there's a time delay of more than two months, it may not justify holding up the generation of the post-flight report. In this case, the DPS Flight Lead may choose to modify this section of the report to capture pertinent postmission follow-up issues, testing, or analysis prior to the next mission and note that the issue has not been completely resolved.

Information relative to failed LRUs that are subsequently R&R'd is not normally captured in the write-up covering the post-mission follow-up. Such information will be captured as part of the vehicle turnaround information provided in the FRR for the Orbiter's next mission.

- 13. <u>Appendices</u> This section includes a collection of appendices referenced elsewhere within the post-flight report. They provide pertinent details to the mission or to issues noted during the course of the mission. It is recommended one take time to browse through prior post-flight reports. Once viewed, the various appendix formats should be self-explanatory.
 - (a) Appendix 1: As Worked DPS Shift Schedule

Information presented in this appendix is based upon the FCT schedule, including updated schedules as generated by the Lead Flight Director. It is recommended the on-console team capture any updates in the console log. Otherwise, it becomes difficult to reconstruct the info post-mission.

- (b) Appendix 2: Vehicle-Turnaround IPRs (optional)An abbreviated version of the DPS FRR and Delta FRR inputs.
- (c) Appendix 3: Post-Flight Actions

During most missions, one or more items are identified by a FCT member addressing issues requiring some sort of post-mission follow-up action. These typically involve: (1) documenting lessons learned, correcting technical errors, or clarification of a topic of discussion in DPS console documentation; and (2) correcting procedural errors observed in the FDF.

- (d) Appendix 4: DF/Systems Division Quick Look Report (optional) Captures the DPS Quick Look presentation.
- B. Timeline for Report Generation

The DPS Flight Lead should publish a signed-off post-flight report within five to six weeks after landing. A guideline for the publication schedule is as follows:

1. Ten to twelve working days after landing, the DPS Flight Lead should have a draft copy ready for DPS FCT review. If the formal Crew Debrief has not yet occurred, that section will be TBS. All required Post-Flight Actions should be identified, but due dates and assignees need not be identified. At a minimum, the report should be made available to all FCR console officers and the DPS Group Lead to review and provide comments.

- FCR console officers are allowed up to ten working days to review the draft copy of the report. The purpose of the review is to ensure no big picture details are overlooked and to check for any erroneous/incomplete conclusions. After draft document reviews are completed, the DPS Flight Lead will evaluate all comments/redlines and incorporate as appropriate.
- 3. The DPS Flight Lead will consult the DPS Group Lead for a list of Post-Flight Action assignees and recommended due dates.
- 4. A final version of the post-flight report should be completed within ten working days. A paper original will be generated and signed-off by the DPS Flight Lead. An electronic version of the final report will be made available for posting on the DPS Homepage website.
- C. Miscellaneous Topics
 - <u>Mission Background Information</u> The JSC and KSC PAO websites for manned spaceflight serve as excellent sources for both mission and payload overviews. The mission-specific Flight Requirements Document, Mission Integration Plan, and FDF Flight Plan (the flight plan notes tab) documentation may also serve as a source for such information. A listing of links to obtain pertinent mission background data is provided on the DPS Homepage website.
 - 2. <u>Post-Flight Actions</u> Documented in an Appendix format, the DPS Flight Lead will coordinate assignments and projected completion date with the DPS Group Lead. At the Group Lead's discretion, the DPS Flight Lead may be utilized to track and monitor closeout of the post-flight actions. However, the Group Lead may elect to add such assignments to an overall task list and track completion in that manner.
 - 3. <u>Post-Flight Report Distribution</u> The completed post-flight report will be posted on the DPS Homepage website. Paper copies will also be placed in the DPS Post-Flight Report binders in the MCC: one copy in the WFCR, and one copy in the WMPSR.
 - 4. <u>Report Template</u> DPS has elected not to maintain a formal post-flight report template. The recommended approach is to browse through recent post-flight reports, select one that best seems to fit current the mission, then save a copy of that document for use as a baseline for development of the report.

It should be noted that both reference sources are required to determine the formats identified in this SCP. The Level A CPDS defines parameters in terms of MSIDs and parameter description. The CZ2_COMMON fiche defines parameters in terms of MSIDs and bit location/word copies. (Note that while the compool definition is in the form of "comment cards," it is, nevertheless, under configuration control since such data are interrelated with the downlist definition.) By matching MSIDs, it is possible to correlate parameter description and word/bit locations. Currently, there is no program-deliverable documentation that directly presents the data in the PASS status SCP format.

TITLE

PASS I/O ERROR MONITORING

PURPOSE


This procedure provides appropriate information useful in the real-time analysis of PASS I/O errors available on the DPS Overview application.

DESCRIPTION

The first part of this SCP defines each parameter associated with the I/O error monitoring and attempts to provide guidelines in assessing the I/O error monitoring data. A series of tables provided to permit the user to interpret and correlate the I/O error data (Tables 4.2-1 through 4.2-10) follows.

A. Data Interpretation

The I/O error logs provide the primary source of data available to support I/O error monitoring. The PASS I/O error logging is controlled by the FCOS LEVEL_C_I/O_ERROR_INTERRUPT-HANDLER (FIOERRLC), and updated via the I/O_ERROR_LOG_ROUTINE (FIOLGERR). Each log entry consists of an array of eight halfwords as shown in Figure 4.2-1.

An additional halfword is included as part of the log entry that represents the last (most recent) I/O error for each GPC in the common set. The halfword is used to log the downlist total cumulative count of all I/O errors for the GPC and is displayed on DPS Overview. Upon execution of Item 48 on SPEC 0 (GPC MEMORY), the ERR LOG RESET clears the complete I/O Error Log, GPC error log, and DEU IPL error log, restarts (circular file) Sync Trace logging, and resets the CAM for the major function under which it is performed.

Note: In the event of an IOP hardware error that results in a software HALT condition, the I/O error log data will never be ICC'ed to the downlist GPC prior to the GPC F-T-S. In such a case, the I/O error condition cannot be identified until a memory dump has been executed for the sick GPC.

It should be noted that I/O error monitoring is intended to provide data to answer, "What happened?" rather than, "What do we do?" questions. The I/O error data, however, may be instrumental in assessing the health of the DPS and, thus, influence decisions affecting DPS downmoding and/or bus reconfiguration for both present and subsequent OPS modes.

In the event of a BCE bypass (DPS alerted via event light), I/O error assessment is fairly straightforward in that the GPC software has already taken action in response to repeated input transaction errors (that is, two consecutive I/O errors on the same transaction). In such cases, the primary responsibility of the DPS console position is to alert the MCC of present data and LRU losses; when appropriate, the MCC should be advised in a timely manner of the possibility of degraded capability during subsequent OPS modes. Table 4.2-5 defines each downlisted BCE BYPASS word in terms of input transaction and affected BTU. Should a PROM sequence be bypassed, the specific data loss may be determined via the MDM card channelization tables provided on console.

IOP-detected, timeout errors may provide insight to certain DPS failures. Such timeout signatures are summarized in Table 4.2-7.

In the event of a CRT-annunciated I/O error, it may be necessary to quickly summarize what happened (for example, status to Flight Director). Table 4.2-8 provides a summary of I/O errors versus annunciated message. Note that the following BCE elements may be bypassed within an OPS in which the element exists but without any corresponding fault message annunciation (ref. PASS user note 14403):

- 1. I/O error log parameters
 - Counter Counter represents the algebraic decimal sum of the actual I/O Error Log cumulative counts logged against each GPC.
 - ID Transaction identifier identifies the unique device or transaction corresponding to the failed I/O transfer. A summary and brief description of all I/O device/transaction IDs is presented in Table 4.2-1. (The integer value of ID corresponds to bits 10 to 16 of first fullword of the I/O Error Log entry, Figure 4.2-1.)
 - EL or BCE element number uniquely identifies an LRU of PROM Element sequence that may be bypassed via software action within a particular input device/transaction ID. Table 4.2-2 presents a summary of all BCE elements including OPS availability. For all other I/O log errors, the value is set to zero. (Integer value corresponds to bits 0 to 7 of third halfword of the I/O Error Log entry, Figure 4.2-1.)
 - BCE BCE number identifies the type of I/O error (I/O transaction error, IOP hardware error, or memory-detected errors) summarized in Table 4.2-4. That is, the BCE number acts as a pointer to decode the contents of STAT data. (The integer value corresponds to bits 0 to 4 of first fullword of the I/O Error Log entry, Figure 4.2-1.) The BCE numbers are defined as follows:

1 to 24 - Identifies which BCE (IOP port number) detected a BCE NO-GO. Table 4.2-3 presents a summary of BCE number vs. data bus relationships.

- RWC Residual Word Count which identifies the number of response data words in an input transaction remaining to be processed by a BCE at the time of BCE NO-GO or MSC time-out. (The integer value corresponds to bits 21 to 31 of the first fullword of the I/O error log entry, Figure 4.2-1.) May be useful in isolating on I/O transaction failure to an MDM IOM card level.
- 2. BCE element bypass parameters

I/O errors are logged by FCOS on a device/transaction ID basis. The first I/O error on a BCE element within a device transaction ID causes a commfault to be registered on all the elements of the bus(es) that FCOS determines are in error. A commfault is an I/O transaction error counter value of 1. When two (or more) consecutive I/O transaction failures occur, FCOS logic will cause all erroring BCE elements or BTU segments during the second (or subsequent) I/O transaction to be bypassed (that is, chained out and no longer interrogated/polled during that input transaction). Two points should be noted: (1) FCOS keeps track of which bus(es) were in error by comm-faulting all their BCE element(s) after the initial I/O error condition; (2) once the I/O transaction error counter value reaches two or more, erroring BCE element(s) will be bypassed every I/O transaction until some action causes an error-free I/O transaction.

This action is usually an I/O RESET command. However, if a hard failure has occurred, the bypass will be performed again. It should be noted that not all I/O transactions are bypassable; typically, FCOS bypass logic has been implemented only for the flight-critical, payload, and launch buses. In addition, the SM software has implemented a sort of BCE bypass logic to deal with PCMMU input I/O (P/L data RAM reads) errors. Although such bypasses are accomplished by SM applications software rather than by FCOS, the end result (that is, elimination of source of I/O errors) from a DPS point of view is very similar.

The bypass process is controlled by the LEVEL_C_I/O_ERROR_INTERRUPT HANDLER (FIOERRLC) and updated via the BCE_ELEMENT_BYPASS_PROCESSOR (FCMBCEMD). A brief description of the BCE BYPASS words is presented below.

BCE BYPASS WORDS indicate which BCE elements and BTU segments have been chained out (corresponding bypass bit set) of an input transaction (time delays are inserted to keep the I/O transaction time the same), and can not be reinstated (bypass bit reset error counters set to zero) unless one of the following actions is performed:

- I/O RESET key
- OPS transition (with memory reconfiguration)

- OPS mode recall (with bus reassignment)
- Port moding (on affected string/buses only)

For certain memory configurations, some BCE elements may be initialized permanently bypassed (for that OPS). That is, the above actions will not reinstate those BCE elements.

PASS BCE Three hexadecimal words (WD 0 to WD 2) present the bypass BYPASS status for the GNC GPCs. Table 4.2-5 (A-C) defines each of the GNC BCE BYPASS words. These three words are located on DPS Overview.

WD3 - WD9
 Seven fullwords of memory (WD 3 to WD 9) define the low-rate (1.04 Hz) bypass status for the SM GPC. Table 4.2-6 (A-G) defines each bit of the bypass words. These words are maintained by FCOS. They are not downlisted, however. In order to conserve downlist bandwidth, the mission-dependent bypass bits contained within these bypass words have been logically OR'ed and packed by the SM applications software into one 3-bit PL LO bypass word (Table 4.2-5 (F)) for downlisting. If bypasses occur, and it is not possible to determine precisely what has happened using the downlisted data, the SM variable parameters may be used to look at specific BCE bypass words (WD 3 to WD 9).

The PL HI bypass word (Table 4.2-5 (E)) is one fullword of memory (WD 10) that defines the high-rate (6.25 Hz) bypass status for the SM GPC.

It should be noted that the PASS contains special BCE bypass logic associated with the HFE input transaction (ID=13) MDM RETURN WORD elements. Should any MDM be bypassed, corresponding BCE string type elements for that MDM will also be bypassed for the following input transactions:

This logic is unique for the PASS I/O error monitoring in that errors detected in one transaction can affect the structure of other I/O transactions (via manipulation of bypass delays). The implementation is advantageous in that I/O error processing overhead is reduced, and meaningless BCE STRG fault messages are suppressed.

Since a similar bypass structure across I/O transactions is not employed by the SM flight software, the total loss of a payload MDM (port failure) will result in a series of fault messages:

The I/O ERROR PL1(2) and BCE BYP PL1(2) fault messages will always occur together in S2. In G9, however, only the I/O ERROR PL1(2) fault message will occur for the same MDM port failure. The PSP fault message will also occur in S2 if the PSP is currently being commanded via the affected MDM.

PCMMU-read I/O errors (all noninitial timeout I/O errors during OI/PL RAM data reads) may well result in repeated fault messages due to the low rate at which the BCE bypasses occur.

- Note: Although I/O transactions are generally suspended during OPS transitions, the MTU read (at 1.04 Hz) and the NSP read (at 6.25 Hz) execute across the transition. BCE bypass logic is suppressed during this time, however. Thus, if MTU or NSP I/O transactions should encounter problems during an OPS transition, the I/O errors will be logged at the rate at which they occur.




Figure 4.2-2. PRI/SEC MDM port relationships






PURPOSE

The GPC Error Log (CZ2V_GPC_ERR_LOG) includes the following:

- First five GPC errors
- Last five GPC errors
- Last error in each GPC
- Cumulative error count for each GPC

BACKGROUND

The GPC error log is a prime indicator of problems that can exist within the GPC software and the hardware. The error log is updated and controlled by the Process_Error_Logged (FPMERRLOG). The error log consists of a ten deep stack. The first five entries (slots 1 through 5) are the first five detected GPC errors. These slots remain static until an Error Log Reset (item 48) is performed. After the first five errors have occurred, slots 6 through 10 act as a five deep circular stack of the last five accumulated errors. An item 48 also clears out these slots. Each entry in the circular GPC error log consists of the following (Figure 4.3-1):

Figure 4.3-1. Circular GPC error log

Error group - A 6-bit indication (first two characters of "ERROR" indication) that specifies the group classification of an error.

Error code - A 6-bit indication (last two characters of "ERROR" indication) that specifies the particular error within the error group.

Branch Sector Register (BSR) - A 4-bit indication (first character of "ADDRESS" indicator) used with the error address for extended addressing (see Table 4.3-1).

Address at the time of error - A 16-bit address (last four characters of "ADDRESS" indicator) of the next instruction to be executed when the error occurred. If the most significant bit is a 1, extended addressing is indicated (see Table 4.3-1)

Note: BSR and ADDRESS are available through ODRC and by dumping the GPCs. They are not viewable on DPS Overview.

PDE address - A 16-bit process directory entry (labeled as Pointer/Ptr) that indicates the address of the software module that was running when the error occurred.

Time - A three-halfword indication of the time of occurrence of the error, based on runtime.

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


Figure 4.3-2. DPS overview

The five-deep stack of last GPC errors is viewable on DPS Overview (Figure 4.3-2).

Each entry in the last GPC error log corresponds to the entries in the circular GPC error log (slots 6 through 10), with the addition of the following:

Counter - A decimal counter displaying the cumulative count of errors logged by the indicated GPC. Counter is incremented upon the occurrence of any GPC error and is limited to a maximum value of 32,767. The counter does not roll over to zero upon reaching the maximum error count, thus effectively disabling the DPS critical alarm associated with the occurrence of a GPC error in the affected GPC(s). Each GPC maintains its own cumulative counter and transmits it to all other active GPCs via the ICC data buses. The GNC GPC that is selected as downlister will transmit its last error status and the status of all CS members to the ground for use on the DPS display.

This information is displayed on DPS Overview (Figure 4.3-2).








BFS Status Word 2/Track PASS Status (V98M0590, version OI-30)




BFS Status Word 3 (V98M0600, version OI-30)

TITLE

BFS - I/O ERROR

PURPOSE

To indicate which data are available to support BFS I/O error monitoring, to define the data, and to provide additional data to assist in the assessment of BFS I/O errors.

GENERAL

BFS I/O transaction monitoring (onboard) includes I/O error detection, annunciation, and bypassing of the element, if appropriate. I/O error detection is performed by the IOP. Annunciation and error source elimination are provided by BFS software.

A. I/O Error Logging, Counting, Annunciation, and Bypassing

The annunciation of I/O errors is provided by fault messages and/or entries in the I/O Error Log. While output errors do not generate fault messages, input errors may under certain conditions:

- 1. FC and PL errors are logged/counted on each occurrence and bypassed/annunciated after the second consecutive occurrence. During ascent, note that no 'I/O error' type of annunciation is associated with a bypassed Engine Interface Unit (EIU).
- 2. BFS CRT and DK listen errors are logged, counted, and annunciated on the first occurrence. Thereafter, subsequent errors occurring on the same element are not logged or counted until an error-free I/O transaction resets the inhibit flag for that element.
- 3. IP errors are logged and counted on the first occurrence and annunciated after the second consecutive occurrence. Thereafter, subsequent errors occurring on the same element are not logged or counted until an error-free I/O transaction resets the inhibit flag for that element.

Figure 4.5-1 provides a summary.

B. Flight-Critical and Payload Bus I/O Error Bypasses

FC and PL error source elimination typically occurs after the second consecutive error on the same element and modifies the nominal I/O transaction configuration. The extent of the modification depends on the exact source of the error.

- 1. If a flight-critical bus I/O error represents a failure to receive a PASS HFE listen command, the entire string is downmoded, both BCEs are disabled, and all elements on the string are bypassed. Any condition, in fact, that results in an MSC timeout signature by the BFS will cause the BFS to downmode the affected FC string.
- 2. If the error represents a failed MDM (failed to receive MDM return word), all elements on all input transactions that use the particular MDM are bypassed.
- 3. If the error represents only a partial loss of data, only the failed element is bypassed.

These errors can be caused by a number of failures, including GPC bus control element (BCE) transmitter failures, BFS BCE receiver failures, bus noise, BFS software sync problems, MDM transmitter failures, total MDM failure, and PASS software problems.

In addition, in the disengaged state, the nominal configuration is modified with reference to the 24/MC (25-hz) BFS transfer data that the BFS receives on each PASS aft flight-critical string ("FA buses" only). Any string that provides unreliable BFS transfer data (determined by comparing the data from each of the strings) is downmoded. Using a reliable set of transfer data, the BFS verifies that the PASS and BFS agree on any bypassed elements and upmodes any element that the PASS has reinstated. If the PASS and BFS disagree on the bypass status of any element, the BFS downmodes the entire string (unless the disagreement is such that the PASS has bypassed an element and the BFS has detected an error but has not yet bypassed the element). In the ENGAGED state, modification occurs without reference to the PASS.

C. IOP Failure Detection Processing and Annunciation

It should be noted that the BFS processes and annunciates certain IOP-detected hardware failures/error conditions very differently than the PASS. Such failures/errors are associated with IOP "External 0" (EX0) and "External 1" (EX1) interrupts. The PASS software developer identifies such EX0 and EX1 error conditions as IOP "Level A" and "Level B" errors, and they are logged respectively

as BCE 30 and BCE 29 type I/O errors. Many such errors will cause the affected PASS GPC to enter a software wait state (a Fail-to-Halt condition). The BFS design, on the other hand, has a basic requirement to attempt recovery, if possible. Thus, such IOP failures/errors are handled as BFS GPC errors to use standardized recovery logic, including RESTARTs. Hence, any IOP EX0 or EX1 errors will be logged by the BFS as a GPC error, not an I/O error.

BFS I/O ERROR DATA ANALYSIS

A. Data Available for Error Analysis

BFS I/O error telemetry data is presented on two workstation applications - DPS Overview and DPS Ascent/Entry displays. Such data is summarized below.

B. Data Interpretation

1. BFS GPC hardware status words




Figure 4.5-2. BFS I/O error data

The BFS I/O error data presented on the DPS Overview display represents the most recent entry in the I/O Error Log. The I/O Error Log is a ten-deep pushdown list and is represented by the I/O error data presented on the DPS Ascent/Entry display. Each entry in the I/O Error Log of the BFS is composed of four halfwords. The format is shown in Figure 4.5-2.

Note that while the BFS I/O error log maintains the 10 most recent errors logged, only the 5 most recent I/O errors are actually downlisted. The downlisted BFS I/O error log MSIDs are presented in Table 4.5-1.

Each entry in the I/O Error Log is formatted and labeled for workstation display (refer to step A) as follows:

Cycle corresponds to the hexdecimal representation of the 11 least significant bits of the **major cycle** time (seconds) and the 5-bit **minor cycle** binary count (0-23) in which the I/O error occurred.

The **BCE code number** (hexadecimal) identifies the data lost as a result of the I/O error. Table 4.5-3 provides a cross reference of BCE code number versus BCE element data lost.

The **IOP status register** provides detailed information concerning the source of the I/O error. Table 4.5-4 provides a summary for the BCE status register for BCEs 1-24 and the data necessary to interpret the IOP status register contents.

The **BCE number** (decimal) identifies the BCE that detected the error. It has a range of 1 to 24.

2. I/O error counter (MSID V98J2258C)

A decimal count of total number of I/O errors detected by the BFS is maintained.

3. BFS BCE element bypass words

The BFS element bypass status is maintained in ten halfwords, which are formatted into five fullwords. Table 4.5-5 provides the data necessary to interpret these words.

4. BFS track status (MSID V98M0590P)

While technically a BFS GPC error indication, it is, nevertheless, a potential measure of the health of the BFS/PASS flight-critical I/O interface. In conjunction with BFS I/O error information, I/O problems can be isolated to the BFS or to the PASS redundant set.

C. I/O Error Assessments

While the available BFS I/O error data is useful in monitoring the overall health of the BFS and the identification of BFS I/O hardware problems, its greatest value lies in its use as a tool to rapidly identify the health of the PASS redundant set and the condition of the PASS/BFS interface. That is, BFS element bypassing or BFS flightcritical string downmoding (BFS Track status) in response to PASS failures provides excellent cues to assist the flight controller in rapidly identifying problems at an LRU (MDM or EIU) or with a PASS computer/data bus interface. Because of the unique FC string tracking signatures generated, it is often faster to check BFS tracking/bypass status than it is to sort through PASS I/O error data to determine a PASS GPC problem.

- If a flight-critical string has been downmoded, use the DTEX workstation application as the primary cue to evaluate the BFS/PASS failure signature. BFS GPC error log and BFS I/O error log data should also be used in conjunction with DTEX to confirm the failure. If no string downmode is indicated, or if BFS fault messages point to a nonflight-critical bus I/O error, then use the BFS I/O error information as presented below to assess the error.
- 2. Where applicable, BFS annunciated fault messages are one of the most valuable tools to quickly identify the I/O problem encountered by the BFS GPC. Table 4.5-2 lists the fault messages that may be associated with certain BFS-detected I/O errors.

3. If no BFS fault message has been annunciated, the I/O error was either a transient or the error condition is not supported by fault message annunciation (for example, GPS read errors). In that case, it will be necessary to evaluate the BFS I/O error log data as time permits. The following parameters provide the most useful information.

Element or **I/O ELE** - Identifies the BFS BCE element number corresponding to the I/O error encountered. Table 4.5-3 relates the element number to the type of data affected/lost as a result of the I/O error condition.

It should be noted that whereas the PASS BCE element number uniquely identifies the data type *and* specific LRU affected, the BFS BCE element number uniquely identifies only the data type. The BFS BCE number is required to uniquely identify the specific LRU (EIU, FF or FA MDM, OI MDM, etc.) associated with the I/O error.

BCE - Identifies the data bus/bus control element associated with the detected I/O error. The BCE number is used to identify which LRU was associated with the I/O error.

Status Wd or **Stat** - The IOP Status Register contents assist in identification of the cause of the I/O error. Table 4.5-4 provides the data necessary to decode the Status Word contents corresponding to the I/O error condition.

Counter - The I/O Err Counter provides the total accumulated I/O error count as detected by the BFS GPC.

4. The following parameters provide secondary information that may or may not be useful in further analysis of the I/O error condition.

Cycle - Identifies the least 11 significant bits of the major cycle time (in seconds) and the minor cycle during which the I/O error occurred. The parameter essentially represents a pseudo timetag for error analysis. While well suited for analysis by a BFS programmer/software analyst, it is not particularly well suited for real-time flight operations.

BCE BYP - The BCE bypass words identify the element bypass status associated with the BFS I/O configuration. Table 4.5-5 provides the data necessary to decode the *downlisted* BCE BYP words. It should be noted that the workstation application DTEX provides a dynamic, visual indication of the BFS element bypasses. Therefore, manually decoding the BFS bypass words essentially becomes an academic exercise.

While not an issue from a real-time data monitoring perspective, it should be noted that certain information provided in the BSS PRD (Table 3.1.8.1-1 of reference 1) is not downlisted and, thus, is not presented in Table 4.5-5 of this SCP. For example, bits 16-31 of "BYP WD 5" are not downlisted since IP bus elements are not bypassable.

For OI-25, Bypass Word 5, bit 12 (of most significant 0-15 bits) serves as a *placeholder* for the GPS read transaction (PL1C). In original requirements, GPS read I/O was to be bypassable, but final requirements defined the GPS I/O to be a non-bypassable element. Thus, the bit should never be set in the downlisted BCE BYP word 5 regardless of the health of the GPS data acquisition. The GPS commfault status is downlisted, however, as bit 10 (V98X7212X) of the BFS System Status Word 1 (V98M0560P) (a 0-15 bit packed word). If bit 10 is logic 1, the BFS is incurring continuing problems with the GPS data acquisition; if logic 0, the GPS read I/O is good.

Finally, as a matter of general interest, it should be noted that the BFS has no requirement to monitor or process I/O corresponding to the microwave scanning-beam landing system (MSBLS), the star tracker units (STUs), or the rendezvous radar (RDZ RDR). In the pre-engage state, their commfault status in the PASS/BFS 25-hz transfer data is ignored by the BFS, and no bypass indicators are set or downlisted by the BFS.

In the BFS-engage state, the BFS will automatically set bypass indicators for these elements. In addition, bypass indicators for the EIUs will be set if the BFS-engage occurs in G3. Upon BFS engage initialization, the BFS will initially upmode all other flight-critical bus BCE elements, whether data buses were downmoded or the BCE elements were bypassed.



TITLE

BFS GPC ERROR MONITORING

PURPOSE

This procedure provides appropriate information useful in the real-time analysis of the following BFS GPC errors:

- GPC error codes and recovery
- BSS error trap response

BACKGROUND

The orbiter AP-101S flight computers are designed to respond to various GPC hardware and software detected conditions via a hardware interrupt structure. Due to fundamentally different requirements, the programmed responses to such interrupts differ drastically for the PASS and BFS flight computers. Even for certain "fatal" hardware error conditions, the BFS is programmed to attempt a recovery process, known as a RESTART, in order to accomplish its required tasks.

Certain hardware and software interrupt conditions occur normally and help redirect the BFS processing status; i.e., program counter, supervisory calls, and external 2 interrupts. Other GPC interrupt conditions, however, represent an abnormal hardware or software processing state. In certain instances, "anomalous" conditions may exist that are detectable only by software processing (that is, the condition by itself does not result in an interrupt to the CPU). In either case, the BFS software is designed to log such error conditions and then attempt appropriate software recovery and/or system reconfiguration.

DESCRIPTION


This SCP is divided into the following three areas:

- A. Data interpretation
- B. GPC error assessment
- C. BFS GPC error tables

Section A defines each parameter associated with the BFS GPC error monitoring. Section B provides information to better understand the programmed responses to the detected GPC error condition. Finally, tables are provided in Section C to permit the user to interpret and correlate the specific BFS GPC error data.

A. Data Interpretation

To accommodate the GPC error logging process, the BFS maintains a circular file consisting of the most recent 21 GPC errors detected. Only the five most recent error log entries are downlisted, however. In addition, the BFS maintains and downlists a total GPC error count. It should be noted that such error log data are not available to the crew (except via GMEM reads). Many GPC error conditions result in fault message annunciation to the crew, however. Each GPC error log entry consists of an array of three halfwords generally formatted as indicated in Figure 4.6-1. (Note that certain GPC error codes, specifically 43 through 47, format the H/W1 or H/W2 fields somewhat differently, as described in subsequent paragraphs.) In addition, Figure 4.6-1 provides a summary by MSID for each of the five most recent GPC error logs downlisted by the BFS.

The first halfword provides a "time" pointer as to when the error was logged. (From a software dump analysis perspective, a knowledge of major and minor cycles may be more useful than a GMT or MET timetag in analyzing the GPC error condition.) With certain exceptions, the second halfword and lower 8 bits of the third halfword correspond to selected "old PSW" data from the interrupt preferred storage area (PSA). (These data point to the "next" address to be executed at time interrupt occurred.) The uppermost 8 bits of the third halfword correspond to the GPC error code which uniquely identifies the type of GPC error.

In many instances, the actual GPC error logging function is accomplished by utilization of a generalized BOS subroutine "GLOGERR." In other instances, the error detection software will directly log the GPC error. In either case, however, a BOS subroutine "GLOGERR1" is utilized to locate the correct offset within the circular file.

It should be noted that BFS GPC error logs are initialized/reinitialized by BOS as part of the BFS startup initialization process which is accomplished as part of the "System Reset" function (post IPL and BFS GPC mode transition from HALT to STBY or RUN). Thus, a successful BFS GPC failure recovery utilizing "System Reset" reinitialization will erase error log data potentially useful in analyzing the previous GPC failure. This is significant should a BFS GPC memory dump be required. In cases where the BFS has been moded to the halt state, a BFS HISAM memory dump is the only way to capture the I/O error and GPC error log contents. Attempting to utilize a GPC software memory dump once the BFS has been moded to halt will lose the error log contents, due to the system reset feature.

- 1. GPC Error Log Parameters (GPC Err)
 - Counter BFS GPC ERROR COUNTER represents the algebraic decimal sum of the actual GPC error log cumulative counts logged by the BFS GPC since the last (most recent) "System Reset" initialization.

Error¹ BFS GPC ERROR CODE and BSR/DSR is a packed hexadecimal or GPC Err² halfword corresponding to the third halfword of the downlisted GPC error. Most important from a real-time DPS monitoring standpoint are the two left-hand digits which contain the BFS GPC error code (the GPC error code uniquely identifies the type of error logged).


The two right-hand digits define the branch/data sector register (BSR/DSR) to be used in determining the extended address associated with the interrupt "old PSW" (refer to PTR BFS below).

Pointer¹ BFS GPC ERROR POINTER/ADDRESS provides a hexadecimal display of the second halfword of the downlisted GPC error. Except Addr² as noted below, the parameter corresponds to the first halfword of the "old PSW" from the interrupt PSA (that is, the "next" address to be executed at the time the interrupt occurred). This address in conjunction with the BSR/DSR allows the software analyst to determine the corresponding extended address. Although potentially useful during software analysis (BFS software dump/post-flight analysis), such data is not particularly meaningful from a real-time DPS monitoring standpoint.

Note that for BFS GPC error code 43, the BSR/DSR field is replaced by the BCE number of the affected data bus. Note also that for BFS GPC error codes 44, 45, 46, and 47, the "old PSW" data are not downlisted. Instead, the "PTR BFS" parameter provides detailed information regarding the FC string downmoding as detected by BOS and annunciated by one of these GPC error codes. The hexadecimal halfword is formatted as follows:



Cycle² BFS MAJOR CYCLE/MINOR CYCLE COUNTER is a packed hexadecimal halfword corresponding to the first halfword of the downlisted GPC error. The first 11 binary bits correspond to the 11 least significant bits of the BOS major cycle counter at the time the GPC error was logged. Similarly, the five least significant binary bits of the downlisted parameter correspond to the minor cycle counter (range 0 to 23) when the error was logged.

As part of the "System Reset" initialization, the BFS major cycle counter is reset to a zero value. However, as part of the disengaged I/O initialization processing, the BOS major cycle counter is set equal to the PASS major cycle counter value (PASS/BFS XFER data), provided the BFS can successfully track at least two FC strings. Incidentally, while both PASS and BFS minor cycle counters range from 0 to 23, the relative minor cycle phasing between the PASS and BFS is such that the BFS minor cycle starts 7 milliseconds later than the PASS minor cycle.

B. GPC Error Assessment

It should be noted that real-time BFS GPC error log monitoring is intended to evaluate data only to the extent to answer "What happened?" rather than "What do we do?" type questions. The data, however, may be instrumental in assessing the health of the BFS, which in turn, will influence decisions affecting BFS GO/NO GO calls during ascent/entry and DPS reconfiguration/IFM decisions on-orbit.

Associated with each BFS GPC error is a predetermined software recovery action. From a DPS monitoring perspective, it is important that the operator understand what is implied by each of the various GPC "recovery" actions identified in Table 4.6-1 (GPC Error Codes Summary and Recovery Actions). The "recovery" actions are discussed in subsequent paragraphs.

- 1. Quick-Look Parameters
 - Error¹ Uniquely defines the type of BFS GPC error logged; that is, the basic hardware or software anomaly is identified (refer to Table 4.6-2). Note that the "quick look" should also identify the corresponding "recovery" action for the identified GPC error. In many instances, the software will attempt a RESTART which permits BFS recovery from many (but not all) anomalous hardware or software processing states.

Counter¹ Indicates the current BFS GPC total error count. If the value continues to increment, it signals a potentially nonrecoverable GPC hardware condition or a cyclic computational problem.

Note that the BFS is designed to accommodate a wide range of data inputs. Should the BFS perception of the environment differ radically from reality (bad NAV state, etc.), then computational difficulties can result (typically, program check violations, such as floating-point related exponent overflow or invalid divide - refer to GPC error codes 9A, 9B, and 9C).

2. Secondary Data

Pointer¹ Typically, the parameter points to the "next" address to be executed or at the time of the interrupt (interrupt "old PSW" data). In conjunction Addr² with the BSR/DSR, it allows the software analyst to determine the extended address being executed at the time of the CPU interrupt.

Cycle² Identifies the major and minor cycle counter values at the time the error was logged. In certain instances, the parameter indirectly provides a "timetag" for the GPC error.

While the parameter set selected to comprise the BFS GPC error log entry appears well suited to support software dump analyses, such is not the case from a DPS monitoring perspective. On the other hand, considering the timeframe in which we as DPS operators monitor the BFS operation, it is apparent that we simply do not have the luxury of time to attempt a detailed analysis of each BFS GPC error (even if the GPC error log parameter set were better suited to our needs). Thus, with the possible exception of a GMT (or MET) timetag associated with the logging of the GPC error, the GPC error code generally represents a satisfactory level of data in assessing the BFS problem.

From a DPS monitoring perspective, a GMT/MET timetag associated with each GPC error logged would be most useful in attempting to correlate such error conditions with other Orbiter events. While such data are not directly available for BFS GPC errors, in many instances, a timetag can be readily determined. With many BFS GPC error conditions, the corresponding software recovery actions will include fault message annunciation to the crew. For such cases, the fault message timetag is more than adequate in supporting real-time GPC error analysis.

For those cases in which no fault message is annunciated as a result of the GPC error, the CYCLE BFS counter value may sometimes be used to calculate the time (to within 40 milliseconds) that the error was logged by the BFS. For

the technique to be successful, the occurrence of the GPC error must be known to within a half hour resolution. Recall that the GPC error log major cycle count corresponds to the 11 least significant bits of the BOS major cycle counter. As such, the 11-bit value will repeat every 2048 major cycles. Since each major cycle count corresponds to 960 milliseconds elapsed time and each minor cycle count to 40 milliseconds, one can extrapolate either backward or forward to another BFS GPC error or BFS I/O error in which the CYCLE BFS parameter value can be positively correlated to a fault message GMT (or MET) timetag. The 11-bit major cycle count will wrap around every 2048 counts or 1966.080 seconds (32 minutes:46.080 seconds). The technique is cumbersome and is in no way appropriate during the ascent/entry timeframe. However, on occasion, the DPS flight control team may find the approach useful in the analysis of BFS GPC errors while on-orbit or during precount operations. The ability to correlate events may be vital in assessing the health of the BFS GPC.

3. GPC "Recovery" Terminology

An important aspect of real-time BFS GPC error monitoring is to recognize what type of recovery action is associated with the indicated error condition. The tables that accompany this console procedure include such vital information. An explanation of the various recovery actions is provided below.

RESTART The term refers to both "software-initiated restarts" and "power transient restarts" (GPC error code "2F"). RESTART processing for the two cases differs only in the fault message annunciation text ("GPC BITE" vice "GPC PWR") and in the potential change in BFS inputs resulting from the GPC power transient. In either case, however, the RESTART software processing will perform BFS I/O initialization and minor cycle preparation. An overview of such RESTART activities is provided in Figure 4.6-2.

RESTART processing accomplishes dramatically different BFS I/O initialization (disengaged standalone, or disengaged tracking PASS, or engaged) depending upon BFS input data during the GPC error recovery process. Since a software-initiated restart is unlikely to alter BFS inputs, the BFS state should not change during the RESTART processing. The power transient restart, on the other hand, is unique in that the BFS engage discretes are likely to be reset as a direct result of the power transient to the GPC/BFC hardware. In such cases, a previously engaged BFS could come up in the disengaged state following the RESTART recovery.

CONTINUE The term implies that the GPC recovery is limited to logging the GPC error and returning to the interrupted task at the point of interrupt.

CYCLE Under certain circumstances (typically, BOS GPC error and/or I/O error processing in conjunction with max rate jobs), alternate rate jobs (6.25 Hz) processing may not complete within the allotted 40-millisecond minor cycle. The GPC error logging and subsequent recovery action for such job overloads will depend upon the BFS state at the time of the error. If disengaged and tracking the PASS, then error code "C1" will be logged and a RESTART initiated. If either disengaged standalone or engaged, then error code "C2" will be logged and that minor cycle will be extended to 50 milliseconds. If the alt rate still has not finished by the end of the 10 millisecond a RESTART initiated.

RESTART I/O initialization

- Perform IOP master reset.
- Reinitialize IOP to support DK, FC, PL, and IP data bus I/O.
- Restore BCE programs and reset BCE bypass indicators. (FC and PL bus BCEs configured to MDM port mode status prior to RESTART.)
- Check BFS engage/TERM B discretes to determine BFS state:
 - If engaged:
 - Set BFS state to "engaged"
 - Put FC BCEs in "command" mode
 - If disengaged and standalone prior to RESTART:
 - Set BFS state to "standalone"
 - If disengaged and tracking PASS prior to RESTART, then attempt to resync with PASS:
 - Use PASS XFER data to establish new FC/PL bus port mode status
 - Downmode unsynchronized strings
 - If PASS/BFS resync successful (must track at least 2 FC strings):
 - Set BFS state to "tracking"
 Put synchronized FC BCEs in "listen" mode
 Set BOS major cycle counter to PASS value
 - If PASS/BFS resync not successful,
 - Set BFS state to "standalone"
- Put IP BCE in "command" mode.
- Disable all BCEs that are not in "command" or "listen" modes.
- Enable IOP MIA transmitters for all BCEs in "command" mode.

RESTART Minor Cycle preparation

- Update GMT and MET by amount of elapsed time since RESTART.
- If not in OPS 0, perform selected initialization jobs.
- If BFS state "tracking," wait until PASS minor cycle 23.
- Reinitialize minor cycle parameters such that minor cycle 0 is next.
- Resync downlist collector to minor cycle 0.

- ERROR The term refers to the capability to direct BOS to perform different recovery actions depending on the BFS processing in progress at the time the GPC error condition occurred. For ERROR TRAP recovery, BOS determines whether or not a dispatched job was executing when the error occurred. If not, then BOS initiates a RESTART. If a dispatched job was executing, however, then BOS transfers control to the job's dispatch entry point minus one fullword. (This address will provide the branching necessary to complete the desired recovery actions.)
- ERROR Similar to the above, except that BOS first checks bit 38 of the TRAP* interrupted PSW. If bit 38 = 1 (has nothing to do with the EX3 interrupt), then BOS performs ERROR TRAP recovery as defined above. Otherwise, if bit 38 = 0, then BOS sets the overflow bit in the PSW and returns execution to the interrupted process. Currently, applicable only to BFS GPC error codes "94" (masked), "9A," "9B," and "9C."

It should be noted that ERROR TRAP responses vary depending upon the specific job in execution at the time the BFS GPC error occurred. These recovery responses essentially represent a temporary or permanent termination of the erroring job. An explanation of such ERROR TRAP responses is provided below.

- QUIT The term refers to the manner in which one-shot and some cyclic jobs complete execution. Control is returned to the BOS dispatcher and directs the dispatcher to deactivate the task. (That is, some jobs possess internal logic to decide that they are no longer required.)
- NEXT The term refers to the manner in which most cyclic jobs complete execution. Control is returned to the BOS dispatcher without modification of the task's active status. (That is, although the affected job is terminated for the minor cycle duration, such jobs will continue to remain active on a cyclic basis.

Figure 4.6-3 provides a summary of the Backup System Services (BSS) responses to ERROR TRAP type recovery actions. BFS applications software (GNC, SM, and Sequencing) responses to ERROR TRAP recovery actions, although similar, are not currently included as part of this console procedure.

C. BFS GPC ERROR TABLES

Tables 4.6-1 and 4.6-2 provide a summary of all legal AP-101S BFS GPC error codes currently listed in the OI-25 BSS PRD. Table 4.6-1 provides a highly condensed summary of the BFS GPC error codes and recovery actions ("goodie book" quick reference version). Table 4.6-2 provides an expanded description and potential cause for each identified GPC error code. However, detailed descriptions of some of the MCK type interrupt error codes associated uniquely with the AP-101S development are very high-level due to a lack of available reference documentation. Finally, Table 4.6-3 provides a summary of data bus dependent BFS recovery actions following the detection of GPC error code "43" MIA transmitenable miscompares. A discussion of the significance of this BFS GPC error condition will be presented in subsequent paragraphs.

Although of no major importance from a real-time DPS monitoring perspective, Tables 4.6 1 and 4.6-2 identify the CPU interrupt type associated with BFS GPC error condition. However, the BFS flight software is designed to respond to certain types of interrupts in a standardized fashion regardless of the specific GPC error condition that resulted in the interrupt. Thus, the user may find the data useful in relating the BFS GPC error logging process to the overall interrupt processing structure. Such AP-101S interrupts are identified below.

1. Significance of "Spare" or "Masked" GPC Error Codes

It should be noted that certain BFS GPC error codes identified in Tables 4.6-1 and 4.6-2 as "spare" or "masked," while legal in the sense that the BFS can, in fact, generate such an error code, have no program requirement to support the "error" condition. We should, therefore, never expect to observe the occurrence of such a GPC error. Indeed, the only mechanism leading to the logging of a "spare" or "masked" GPC error is a hardware failure in the IOP or CPU interrupt or interrupt interface logic. While the resultant error does not represent an adverse condition for the AP 101S computer, the BFS may not necessarily ignore the error condition and continue processing. To understand this response, a background overview of both the CPU hardware interrupt structure and BFS GPC error logging process is required.

Certain types of CPU interrupts are characteristic of hardware-detected problems. For example, IOP-generated external interrupts EX0 and EX1 are equivalent to PASS "Level A" and "Level B" errors respectively. Whereas the PASS is designed to get a "sick" GPC out of the set (software halt to avoid divergent processing) and depend upon system redundancy to maintain vehicle control, the BFS is designed to attempt recovery from such errors even though it may, in fact, be a "sick" computer. As a result, the BFS would not care in many instances what specific error condition occurred, but only that a recovery action be attempted. With that approach in mind, a standardized software recovery action and error logging routine was implemented for certain types of CPU interrupt error conditions. In order to identify the specific error condition for subsequent failure analysis, the BFS GPC error logging algorithm incorporates the interrupt register contents and old PSW address into the resultant GPC error code.

Note also that when the interrupt structure was defined for the AP-101S GPC, certain interrupt register bits were reserved to support AP-101B computer interrupts (hardware conditions which no longer had a valid meaning for the AP-101S). Thus, if the failure of one of these spare bits were to cause a CPU interrupt, the BFS would log a corresponding GPC error. Furthermore, a standardized recovery action that corresponds to that type of hardware detected interrupt would then occur. If such failures are associated with spare or unused EX1 interrupt bits, the BFS will respond in dramatic fashion, causing a RESTART software recovery with a GPC BITE annunciation. The BFS GPC error codes for such improbable, but possible, error codes are no longer identified in the BFS Program Requirements documentation (PRD). They have

similarly been removed from this SCP in order to minimize confusion to personnel cross-referencing the documentation.

Note also that certain EX1 (level B) interrupts were defined to support IOPdetected hardware failure modes unique to the AP-101S GPC. A "GPC IOP" fault message was to be used to annunciate such failures. After the delivery of the AP-101S GPCs, the avionics community discovered that certain hardware failures external to the GPC (MDM, EIU, etc., inputs to the GPC with interword gap times between response data words approaching zero) could cause the IOP internal parity check logic to erroneously detect an IOP failure when, in fact, nothing was wrong with the GPC. Nevertheless, the failure had the potential to take the entire PASS set to the halt state. The external failure would also take a nonengaged BFS to the halt state. The bottom line was that a single failure could take out all five GPCs before the BFS could be engaged. In view of this credible failure mode from any number of data bus BTUs, the program elected to permanently disable the AP-101S GPC BCE self-test and IOP data flow internal parity checks in both PASS and BFS (BFS CR # 90130). Note, however, that BFS GPC error codes "08" (DMA timeout) and "09" (DMA queue overflow), should they occur, will still annunciate a "GPC IOP" fault message as well as a "GPC BITE" message (that occurs as a result of the software-initiated RESTART recovery).

The CPU hardware also provides the capability to permanently mask certain machine check, program check, and system interrupts. When masked, system interrupts remain pending while machine check and program check interrupts are ignored. The BFS uses this feature to permanently mask selected fixed-point math operations (program check interrupts) since the software is designed to cope with such problems. Should hardware failures cause one of the masked interrupts to be processed despite masking, the GPC error will be logged (GPC error codes 94, 95, or 99) and the appropriate recovery action would occur (CONTINUE or ERROR TRAP).

2. GPC Error Code "43" Background Information

To appreciate the data summarized in Table 4.6-3, some rather detailed background information is desirable. First, it should be noted that the BFS I/O architectural approach was to utilize, as much as possible, common BCE programs that were designed to function in either pre-engage or post-engage environments. Not only do such compact BCE programs provide coding efficiency (an important consideration with the old AP-101B GPCs), they inherently function as "bus commander" programs or "bus listener" programs simply by using certain BCE instructions that provide conditional branching based upon the state of the associated MIA transit enable discrete (1 = BUS CMDR/0 = BUS LISTENER). Thus, assuming control of FC and DK buses at a BFS engage was considerably simplified by requiring the engage transition software to simply reconfigure the MIA transmitter enable register (via use of a program-controlled output "PCO" command to the IOP).

The second important factor to note is that pre-engage, all FC buses and those DK buses controlled by the PASS use a BCE instruction, known as a WIX or "wait for index," which allows the BFS to monitor the data buses for "BFS listen commands" issued by the PASS redundant set. This feature permits, within certain constraints, the BFS to essentially "synchronize" the BFS I/O with respect to the PASS -- the heart of the BFS "tracking PASS" concept. The WIX instruction tests the MIA transmit enable discrete status to determine if the BCE is in the "listen mode" (XMIT ENA discrete = logic 0) or in the "command mode" (logic 1). If in the "listen mode" (as one would expect for a pre-engage condition), the WIX instruction enters a tight loop monitoring the MIA buffer for a valid "BFS listen command" from the PASS. If the WIX instruction detects that the BCE is in the "command mode," the WIX instruction enters the "wait state." Prior to the OI-22 flight software release, this was paramount to telling the BFS that it "owned" the data bus.

Under normal circumstances, this would be the desired effect since the MIA XMIT ENA discrete would be in the "command mode" state only if the BFS had, in fact, been engaged. What if, however, the XMIT ENA discrete was in the "command mode" state solely as a result of an IOP hardware failure in the MIA transmitter enable register logic? Performing such desktop analysis, Intermetrics Inc., personnel concluded that such IOP hardware failures while pre-engaged would result in erroneous BFS commanding on the affected FC or DK buses, which in turn, could potentially create dual bus commander scenarios leading to possible PASS set breakup (non-universal I/O errors) or vehicle LOC.

To determine if such credible IOP failures in the BFS could indeed affect the PASS in a detrimental fashion, shuttle program management elected to use the SAIL facility to test the theory, and in November 1990, a series of SAIL tests cases were performed. To support such tests, IOP hardware was actually modified to permit MIA XMIT ENA register discretes to be turned ON/OFF via external switches, totally independent of BFS flight software timing. For certain test cases, the actual test results agreed closely with predictions, particularly on the DK buses. However, the test results for several of the FC bus failure cases were totally unexpected. On two of the SAIL runs, there was virtually no indication of dual bus commanders on the flight-critical buses even though multiple buses (FC1 - FC4) were affected. The BFS continued to track the PASS, and the PASS set remained intact. However, all three IMUs went out to lunch, and both PASS and BFS navigation states (state vector) were severely polluted by MECO. The bottom-line summary, as documented in BFS User Note B28597 (effective through OI-21), was that any of the following conditions were possible: BFS NO-GO due to bad NAV state; dual commanders on CRTs; intermittent SSME fail indications; degradation of the PASS NAV state due to erroneous pulse torquing of the IMUs; and non-universal PASS I/O errors that could result in loss of PASS GPC(s) from the redundant set.

Not surprisingly, the avionics community adopted the stance that these were undesirable consequences for such BFS IOP hardware failures. Both KSC and JSC flight control teams were tasked by the shuttle program to monitor for BFS FC or DK MIA transmitter enable fail-on conditions until such time that a BFS software fix could be implemented. BFS flight software CR #90424, which provided for failure detection monitoring and corrective action in the event of IOP transmitter enable discrete hardware failures, was first implemented in the OI-22 flight software release. With onboard monitoring, the flight control teams were relieved of the responsibility of rapid detection of this BFS failure mode.

Summarizing the above discussion, undesired BFS commanding on the FC or DK buses while pre-engaged would occur if IOP hardware failures produced false "command mode" signatures, which were interpreted by the BCE programs using the WIX instruction to mean "we're engaged, the bus(buses) belong to the BFS." Such erroneous BFS output commanding could, in turn, lead to a variety of undesirable to potentially catastrophic dual bus commander failure scenarios.

The software fix was to decouple the WIX instruction from the BFS engaged bus commander function. Since OI-22, if the WIX instruction should detect the "command mode" state, the instruction enters the "wait" state as before. However, the next BCE instruction to be executed is a jump to an illegal BCE instruction ("0000" which corresponds to an out-of-bounds OP code for the IOP microcode), which results in an abnormal termination of the BCE program. The resulting I/O error processing (I/O error code "22" -- BCE instruction error) is designed to terminate all BCE program execution for the affected data bus; that is, kill all I/O on the affected data bus. Thus, BCE code runaways are effectively eliminated via this BCE program modification. Depending on one's perspective, the BCE has been "killed" or the data bus "dropped." For DK buses, this terminates any "DK listen" capability (obviously, a pre-engage function) as long as the CRT remains assigned to the PASS. For FC buses, the affected string is downmoded pre-engage.

It should be emphasized that as a result of the new BCE program mechanization, the FC or DK bus BCE <u>itself</u> detects the MIA XMIT ENA discrete(s) fail-on condition while in the pre-engaged state. The subsequent FC or DK bus downmoding occurs <u>immediately</u> as a direct consequence of the I/O error processing associated with the BCE out-of-bounds (I/O error code "22") failure signature. In addition, the I/O error processing logic sets FDA annunciation "flags" that result in fault message annunciation to alert the crew of actions taken by the BFS: "BCE STRG X PASS" for downmoded flight critical string(s); and "DK XMTR X" for downmoded DK buses. Also, as part of the I/O error processing logic associated with the BCE out-of-bounds failure signature, a special mask word is updated that "alerts" BOS that something is wrong with the affected data bus. This, as we shall see, is to have subtle ramifications as far as IOP BCE hardware failures are concerned.

A requirement of CR #90424 was to provide low-rate, cyclic monitoring of the actual IOP FC and DK transmitter enable discrete status, including a provision to log GPC errors (GPC error code "43") to identify that FC or DK buses have been downmoded (dropped) as a result of BCE program-detected MIA XMIT ENA discrete failures. The specific implementation associated with the cyclic monitoring/error logging requirements was much broader in scope than required by the CR, however. The specific mechanization not only meets the requirements to monitor the FC and DK buses, it provides for monitoring of all 24 data buses (ICC, DK, PL, LDB, FC, MM, and IP data buses). Not only was this approach, perhaps, the most code efficient, it also identified <u>any</u> anomalous condition in the critical IOP transmitter enable register hardware.

The BFS flight software now maintains a running image of the <u>desired state</u> for all 24 data buses. Recall also, that the BFS maintains a special mask word that can be updated by BCE out-of-bounds I/O error processing logic to alert BOS that something is terribly wrong with one (or more) of the BCE programs. Per CR requirements, the BFS reads the IOP's actual MIA XMIT ENA register status once each major cycle (on BFS minor cycle 0). The <u>actual</u> transmitter enable register status is then compared bit-for-bit against the <u>desired</u> status for all 24 BCEs. These results are essentially OR'ed with the <u>special mask word</u> (used to force a miscompare when FC or DK buses are downmoded as a result of detected out-of-bounds conditions). If <u>any</u> miscompare is detected for any data bus, then a GPC error code "43" is logged, including error log data that points to the affected bus (BSR/DSR field is replaced by the BCE number of the affected data bus). The actual BFS GPC error recovery action following the error logging is to CONTINUE.

For non-FC/non-DK buses, "log GPC error and CONTINUE" is a fair assessment of the GPC recovery action for detected miscompares. However, this is not really the case for FC and DK buses for a pre-engage environment. Indeed, from an operational perspective, the "apparent" GPC error code "43" recovery action is to downmode the affected FC string or DK bus if the "BCE out-of-bounds" I/O error processing software and the IOP transmitter enable register monitoring/GPC error "43" logging software are perceived as <u>integrated</u> <u>processes</u>. This is, in fact the net GPC recovery action associated with the GPC error code "43" for these data buses (note that utilization of the "special mask word" does effectively link together these two distinct software logic functions). This can create a certain amount of "apples and oranges" confusion when comparing certain BFS GPC error descriptions in different reference sources. That is, strictly speaking, the GPC recovery action associated with GPC error code "43" is always to CONTINUE regardless of the bus affected. (Often, the GPC error description itself acknowledges that certain actions have occurred, such as string or bus downmode.) However, in a more broad operational sense, the GPC recovery action for FC and DK buses when a GPC error code "43" occurs is to drop/downmode the affected bus. As real-time operations personnel, we need to be sufficiently flexible to deal with either approach, even though it may seem somewhat inconsistent.

By now it would seem safe to assume that this subject has been sufficiently overkilled. Unfortunately, this is not the case, although there is a light at the end of the tunnel. Since the implementation of CR #90424 in OI-22, desktop analysis and computer model simulations of the BFS software by Rockwell-Downey personnel have demonstrated that IOP hardware failures other than IOP transmitter enable register hardware failures can also result in BCE jump out-of-bounds conditions. A variety of failure signatures are possible and are dependent upon the specific IOP hardware failure mode. In many cases, but not all, the BCE jump out-of-bounds error condition resulted in BCE "out-of-bounds" I/O error processing (I/O error code "22"). Recall that this causes the "special mask word" to be updated. This, in turn, will force the IOP transmitter enable register monitor logic to log a GPC error code "43" irrespective of the actual MIA XMIT ENA discrete state. This, by definition, implies an IOP transmitter enable failure when, in fact, there is nothing wrong with that part of the IOP hardware.

What does all of this mean to us? Very little actually, except that IOP hardware failures other than MIA XMIT ENA discrete failures can mimic that particular failure signature. The BFS software has still responded to a potentially severe BCE problem and the action to downmode the affected data bus is the appropriate conservative approach. Only the error description of GPC error code "43" has taken on a somewhat expanded scope. BFS User Note B28681 alludes to this potential for "somewhat misleading" logging of GPC error code "43". Also, Table 4.6-3 attempts to distinguish between MIA transmitter enable failure signatures and BCE jump out-of-bounds signatures.

One final point should be noted. While the BCE program mechanization now physically isolates the BCE "listen mode" WIX'es from the BFS engaged "command mode" outputs BCE program (thus eliminating the potential for BCE code runaway), the BFS engage transition logic is essentially unaffected, except that a separate CPU 'PCO' command is now required to initially start the BFS output I/O BCE program. Furthermore, any FC or DK bus that had been downmoded will automatically be picked up at the BFS engage. This potentially provides maximum control authority of the vehicle. Buses downmoded as a result of MIA transmitter enable discrete failures will be recovered. Buses downmoded as a result of IOP hardware failures that resulted in BCE jump out-of-bounds failure signatures will most likely be downmoded again.

Nevertheless, should a GPC hardware failure actually result in such an unexpected "error" condition, the BFS software is coded to perform the indicated "Recovery action." Note: Certain EX1 hardware interrupts while no longer identified in the BSS PRD, if logged (an unexpected condition) would result in RESTART recovery and a GPC BITE fault message.

• Strictly speaking, "recovery action" associated with GPC errors 43 through 47 is to log GPC error and "CONTINUE." From an integrated BFS software perspective, however, the BFS "recovery action" is to downmode the affected data bus/flight-critical string.

TITLE

BFS GO/NO-GO CRITERIA

PURPOSE

This SCP provides information relevant to monitoring the BFS failure conditions and in determining the BFS failed, no-engage, or suspect status in accordance with flight rules.

A. BFS FAILED

- 1. Loss of forward CRT interface Without any CRT interface, the crew has no insight into the BFS status and no way to interface with it should an engage be needed (rule A7-51.A).
- 2. BFS self-fail light on CAM (when accompanied by loss of CRT interface, loss of BFS RUN discrete at PASS GPCs, and loss of BFS downlist).

Failures other than a failure of the BFS GPC itself could cause the CAM light to illuminate; therefore, a CAM by itself without other supporting indicators is not sufficient to call the BFS failed.

The self-fail light is driven by the BFS to indicate that the BFS software execution is unable to cycle, which allowed the watchdog timer (~3.15 sec) to time out, or two restarts have occurred within two consecutive major cycles (BSS PRD par. 3.1.2.1.9) (MG038101).

- a. The watchdog timer is reset at the beginning of each major cycle (960 ms).
- b. Failure to reset the timer before timeout (-3.15 sec) will allow the GPC selffail latch to be set and the CAM light commanded on.
- c. Two restarts within two consecutive major cycles will immediately turn on the CAM light.
- B. BFS NO-GO for Engage If the hardware will not support engaging the BFS, or after an engage if the BFS will not be able to control the vehicle, it is considered NO-GO for engage.
 - 1. BFS standalone (loss of PASS tracking on all strings) for 10 seconds during ascent and for 45 seconds during entry. If tracking can be recovered, the BFS once again is GO for engage (flight rules A7-51.B. 1. a. and b).

If the flight-critical strings are not tracked by the BFS, it has no sensor data to update the vehicle state vector. In time, the actual state vector and the software-maintained vector will diverge to the point where the BFS will not be able to control the vehicle if the BFS is engaged. The times of 10 and 45 seconds are estimates and not exactly calculated times.

The loss of PASS Tracking ("BCE STRG 1,2,3,4 PASS" fault messages) indicates that the BFS cannot maintain synchronization (track listen commands) and/or disagrees with PASS transfer data (data bus status) for two consecutive minor cycles. Specifically, the message "BCE STRG X PASS" is annunciated when

- a. HFE listen cmd (EIU 1 listen cmd) is not detected within a 5-ms window for two consecutive minor cycles; e.g., PASS goes to software halt.
- b. FF X or FA X listen cmd is not detected for two consecutive minor cycles; e.g., FC 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, or 8 XMIT failure.
- c. PASS transfer data describing PASS status of element bypasses (bypassed or not bypassed) disagrees with BFS element bypass status; i.e., if PASS shows an element bypass, BFS must agree within two consecutive minor cycles. Also, if the BFS GPC has an FC RCVR failure, the BFS will have an element bypassed, but not the PASS.
- d. BFS downmodes all strings when any of the above occurs two consecutive times on more than two strings; i.e., BFS cannot track tracking on only one PASS string. The BFS begins flashing the BFC light on panels F2 and F6 to indicate that BFS is standalone if it has the command of the PL buses. Note: An MSG RESET to BFS will turn this light off.
- Control bus CA1 failure Loss of this bus causes loss of engage discretes to GPCs 3 and 5. If an engage is attempted, the BFS would not respond, but PASS GPCs 1, 2, and 4 would go to software halt. This bus provides power to the hand controller engage drivers in the BFC modules for GPCs 3 and 5 (rule A7-51.B.2).
- 3. Essential bus 3AB failure Loss of this bus precludes any GPC from being selected as the BFS with the panel 06 switches. Also, without this bus, there is no power to provide a select off signal for each PASS GPC. Therefore, if an engage pushbutton is depressed, the PASS GPCs will go to software halt, but the BFS will not respond (rule A7-51.B.3).
- 4. BFS I/O TERM B fails high If this discrete fails high, the BFS cannot be engaged, since one of the conditions for an engage is for the I/O TERM B to be low. The PASS set would still go to software halt if an engage were attempted. Detection of this failure is difficult during the pre-engage state of ascent and entry when this discrete is normally set high. If the I/O TERM A discrete fails high, which is on the same half-hybrid discrete receiver chip, the I/O TERM B signal would be suspect (rule A7-51.B.4).
- 5. BFC CRT select discretes and BFS I/O TERM B all fail low simultaneously -Such a failure is caused by loss of the 5-volt logic power within the BFC module for the BFS GPC. Loss of logic power renders the BFC module inoperative

and, therefore, no BFS engage is possible, although PASS GPCs would still go to software halt if an engage were attempted (rule A7-51.B.5).

- 6. MTU failed while BFS in HALT The BFS must have a valid time in order to be a viable backup to PASS during entry. Without an MTU to furnish a current time, the BFS initializes to a GMT of day 1 and an MET of 0 (BSS PRD MG038101, par. 3.8. 1). The BFS time can be updated through the use of the time update entries on the BFS GPC memory display.
- C. BFS Declared Suspect

The cases listed below cause the BFS to be called suspect rather than failed or NO-GO. These conditions do not guarantee an unengageable BFS or a BFS that definitely cannot control the vehicle. Since the BFS is engaged as a last resort to control the vehicle, the BFS may still be able to function for these cases. A suspect BFS will affect dynamic restring decisions for cases that require a BFS. For the purpose of restringing decisions, a suspect BFS is considered as no BFS.

- 1. BFS to HALT without a PRO to OPS 000 and then back to STBY/RUN Without the proper software cleanup occurring with an OPS 000 PRO, a return to the running state will not necessarily initialize everything properly (user note B04524C) (rule A7-51.C.1).
- BFS re-IPL'd into the same GPC during ascent After failing once and without the proper dump analysis, the integrity of the BFS GPC and the BFS software is in question and is not to be relied on except where there is no other alternative. If the GPC IPLs, it is acceptable to use it for systems monitoring (e.g., PLBD operations) (rule A7-51.C.2). The BFS will be moved into another GPC postinsertion to ensure a good BFS for entry.
- 3. BFS low memory SEC maxed out at 7F or constantly incrementing -This indicates a hard memory location failure. Although a single bit failure in a word can be corrected by the error detection and correction routine, any subsequent second bit error in the word cannot be corrected, and any errors elsewhere in memory cannot be seen once the error counter is maxed out at 7F. Because of the lack of insight into subsequent errors and the inability to know which memory locations are affected, the overall software integrity is in question, and the box is declared suspect (rule A7-51.C.3).
- 4. GPC BITE fault summary message This indicates that the BFS GPC execution encountered a condition requiring a software-initiated restart in an attempt to continue execution (see BSS PRD MG038101, Table 3.1.7-1). The software design/ground rules assume that all GPC errors are momentary and transient, rather than continuous (see Overview PRD MG038100, par. 3.2.4.2.4.1).

Approximately 80 percent of the GPC error types cause either a restart recovery or an error trap recovery, which can result in a restart, depending on the type of job executing when the error is encountered; i.e., dispatched or nondispatched job. The remaining 20 percent continues execution, ignoring the error condition. Restart and error trap recoveries involve the following:

- a. Restart recoveries perform I/O initialization (IOP master reset, tracking PASS or standalone I/O initialization, etc.) and minor cycle preparation (update GMT/MET, set minor cycle counter to zero, set downlist frame counter to zero, etc.).
- b. Error trap recoveries determine if the error condition occurred when a dispatched job was executing.
 - If a dispatched job is executing: Return to job's dispatched entry point minus one full word (usually is an instruction to do the job (e.g., MTU RM, uplink, GNC) next cycle, or quit (discontinue LDB, TFL)).
 - (2) If a dispatched job is not executing: Initiate restart. Some error trap recoveries initiate restart when PSW bit 38 is 1 and continue job execution when bit 38 is 0.
- 5. GPC PWR fault message Annunciation of this message means that the BFS GPC has experienced a power transient. After such an occurrence, the BFS may not function properly if engaged. The BFS executes a power transient restart, which includes an I/O initialization and minor cycle preparation and startup (rule A7-51.C.5).
- 6. BFS I/O TERM B input discrete fails low The I/O TERM B signal starts with the panel 06 GPC output switches and the ESS 3AB power feed. It is processed by the BFC module. Loss of the discrete at the BFS casts doubt on the ability of the BFC to work properly in supporting a BFS engage operation or the panel 06 switches and power to be operating correctly. Therefore, the BFS is declared suspect for this failure (rule A7-51.C.6).
- 7. BFS I/O TERM A input discrete fails high Failure of this discrete by itself would not directly impact the ability of the BFS to be engaged and to control the vehicle. It would only prevent the BFS from commanding the payload buses. It shares a discrete receiver hybrid with the I/O TERM B discrete, however, which does impact BFS engage. If the half-hybrid fails high, the BFS could not be engaged, and the PASS GPCs would go to software halt when the engage button is depressed. Because the normal pre-engaged state of the BFS I/O TERM B is high during ascent and entry, a failure of the discrete to the high state is not immediately evident. If the I/O TERM A fails high, the BFS must be considered suspect until the I/O TERM B can be verified (rule A7-51.C.7). The status of the I/O TERM B discrete may be verified by taking the BFS OUTPUT switch to NORM and checking the I/O TERM B to observe if it goes low.

- D. Other BFS failure items:
 - 1. BCE failed at BFS
 - a. BFS downmodes entire string.
 - b. Nonfailed BCE on downmoded string will be recovered, along with its associated MDM, upon engage. The crew has no insight into which BCE on a string is causing the string downmode. The I/O ERROR log entries provide information on which BCE is at fault. Therefore, the DPS operator should advise the crew which MDM is recovered on an engage.
 - c. If the MDM behind a failed BCE is desired over the other MDM on the same string, a PASS port mode and BFS I/O reset will effectively port mode the BFS. Hence, the MDM initially behind failed BCE will be recovered on engage.
 - d. You can also elect to port mode PASS, not I/O reset BFS, and have the BFS (on engage) be set to use the port opposite the one used by PASS.
 - GNC system items If dual LRU failures occur, the failed LRUs must be deselected by the crew before the BFS can properly control the vehicle. LRU data have commfault flags, but flight control ignores them. Data are Interchangeable Mid-Value Select (IMVS) for computational purposes and can accommodate a dual null failure case, but not other cases without the crew deselecting the failed LRU.




A. Hardware/Software Status Words

This SCP contains the following information to determine status of the DPS multifunction CRT display system, including hardware/software status words, poll header word detail, MCDS displays, "Illegal entry" error conditions, SPEC/DISP allocation, DK listen "item" entries, and DEU load.



Note: Following DEU transmission of this response, bits 13, 19, 21, and 23 of the first data word are reset. Additionally, the count of keystrokes (word 2) and the hardware and software status words are reset.

Bit Description

- 0 Logic 1 Always set to 1.
- 1 <u>IPL has been performed</u> IPL PROM is control of DEU.
- 2 IPL error Error is detected during the parity check of the IPL PROM and the multiplexers. The error can occur as a result of an IPL, or as a result of the periodic IPL circuits error check initiated by DEU resident software.
- 3 IPL circuit check error (Not currently implemented.)
- 4 <u>Symbol generator intensity parity error</u> Parity error is detected on the intensity PROM. The check is performed every time the PROM is activated (i.e., for all symbols). The parity check is not performed when custom intensity is used (custom intensity is not currently being implemented).

- 9 SASTP: Symbol generator analog zero deflection test error Zero test of analog deflection is failed.
- 10 SASTP: Symbol generator analog nonzero deflection test error Nonzero test of analog deflection is failed.
- 11 SASTP: Symbol generator analog pulse test error Pulse has not been detected during an analog pulse test.
- 12 Circle oscillator error Circle repetition rate goes to zero.
- 13 SASTP: Symbol generator analog test error (or of bits 9, 10, 11) One of the failures signified by bits 9, 10, or 11 occurs.
- 14 <u>SASTP: Symbol generator display wrap error</u> DEU software detects a no compare on display data that has been wrapped back into memory. The test and the setting of the bit is under software and (digital test) FCW control. The software repetitively issues a Direct Out Instruction to an R-C timing network to inhibit setting this bit.
- 15 <u>Symbol generator refresh error</u> R-C timer indicates that the refresh is overdue by 18 ms.





- 5 ** <u>DU filament current error</u> Low filament current detected. This circuitry does not monitor the STBY filament warmup current. Also, this bit does not latch in the hardware BITE register. This error requires arming by the SASTP before it will trip the DU BITE flag.
- 6 ** <u>DU temperature error</u> One of the temp sensors on the DU deflection amplifiers (two sensors in each X and Y amplifier) or the voltage control page goes above 125^o C. This bit does not latch in the hardware BITE register, but will trip the DU mechanical flag (does not require arming by the SASTP).



B. Poll Header Word Detail

The poll header word contains useful information not available in the HW/SW status words. The 16-bit word is stripped out of a 28-bit DEU-TO-IOP poll response (bits 9 through 24). Note that a pattern of 370X indicates that the DEU IPL PROM has been loaded and the DEU is expecting a load.

- 3. If GPC target set is altered, it works like an OPS transition. DISPs are cancelled if there is any change in the NBAT (strings, CRTs, MMUs, launch, etc.) since the previous OPS transition/OPS mode recall. If no change, the DISP is retained.
- 4. SPEC/DISP retained only if supported in new major mode.

General Notes

- 1. Active SPEC/DISPs must be cancelled on each CRT they are being viewed on.
- 2. Keyboard ITEM entries apply <u>only</u> to the display currently on a CRT and, therefore, never affect underlying SPECs.
- 3. For PASS system level SPEC allocation, a GPC can support more than one MF at a time. However, the same SPEC cannot be called up in two different MFs for the same GPC. For example, if the MF switch for a GNC CRT is placed in PL and a systems-level SPEC (GPC MEMORY, DPS UTILITY, TIME) is called, the same SPEC can no longer be called on a GNC CRT. The result would be an "ILLEGAL ENTRY" fault message for exceeding the "2 SPEC per MF" limit. To clear the problem, the MF switch for the appropriate CRT must be returned to PL and the SPEC resumed. This scenario does not apply to the BFS.
- 4. For PASS processing of SPECs, an attempt to call a SPEC on a CRT which currently has the same SPEC underlying a DISP will result in "ILLEGAL ENTRY." The DISP must be resumed to get to the SPEC. This scenario does not apply to the BFS.
- F. DK Listen Item Entries

TITLE

MEDS STATUS

PURPOSE

This reference is a collection of information from various MEDS documents for the purpose of providing quick access to commonly used information. This provides a consolidated cross mapping of MEDS errors and system responses / effects along with other useful information extracted from the more detailed MEDS requirements and design documentation. Also included are anomaly procedures which can be used to guide the user through recommended pre-defined actions for a set of pre-defined anomaly conditions.

For more detailed information refer to the appropriate MEDS or Orbiter documentation. The information in this SCP is condensed and assumes the reader is already knowledgeable about MEDS, it's general use, operations, functions, and integration with other Orbiter subsystems that it interfaces to.

DESCRIPTION

This SCP is divided into the following six areas:

- A. Summary of Operations
- B. Display Information and Cross Reference
- C. Functional Problems and Cross Reference
- D. Downlist Information and Cross Reference
- E. Anomaly Procedure
- F. Miscellaneous Reference Information
- A. Summary of Operations
 - 1. Automated Operations
 - a. IDP

Any time the IDP is booting up, it will make up to two attempts to load a software program file. If both attempts have errors and the file was the CURRENT application program file, then the IDP will make up to two attempts to load the DEFAULT program file. Typically the CURRENT program file will be in EEPROM but can be on the MSU (user configurable) and the DEFAULT program file is always on the MSU. If both attempts fail and the file was the Operating System Kernel in EEPROM, then up to two attempts to load the Kernel from the MSU. If all attempts fail to load the

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Kernel or both attempts fail to load the DEFAULT file, the IDP attempts to display the "IDP DEFAULT LOAD FAIL" on the CRT MDU that is connected to it's 1553 data bus.

An IDP continues to attempt communications with MDUs and ADCs at all times. At any time an IDP has communications with an MDU and the MDU is not being commanded, the IDP will automatically attempt to gain commandership of the MDU. An IDP will always send display data, process edgekey inputs and retrieve status and BITE data from an MDU it has commandership of. An IDP will never send display data to or process edgekeys from an MDU it does not have commandership of. An IDP will always retrieve analog data and BITE data from an ADC it has communications with.

For a graphics failure reported by an MDU, the IDP will attempt to blank and regenerate the display format that was on the MDU in an attempt to clear the cause of the graphics error. For displays that are activated by menus below the maintenance menu (in the menu tree hierarchy), the IDP will attempt to regenerate the MEDS System Status display.

For consecutive 1553 data bus communication problems (MEDS I/O ERROR MDUx) or heartbeat failures (PROCESSOR FAIL) an IDP will relinquish commandership of an MDU. This is done in an attempt to allow the MDU to switch ports in case the problem is port or data bus related and the problems may not reoccur if the MDU is operating on another 1553 bus with another IDP. Note that an MDU configured in the MANUAL port configuration mode will not switch since the manual configuration mode intentionally disables automatic port change operations.

For certain FC or DK data bus communication or data handling problems, the IDP may disable the FC or DK data bus interface channel to protect it's operations from the erroneous conditions. This will result in invalid data indications on any displays that utilize the data from the disabled channel. Disabled FC channels can be re-enabled by changing the selected FC bus or power cycling the IDP. Disabled DK channels can be re-enabled by power cycling the IDP.

For errors relating to receiving a keystroke from the Orbiter keyboards via the keyboard interface (DED card), the IDP will not process the keystroke and will provide error information to the user and to the GPC. The IDP will continue to process keystrokes and handles each keystroke separately. The interface to the keyboards is never disabled.

For an MDU edgekey failure, the IDP will display a red X over the associated edgekey legend and disable the edgekey on the MDU. Disabled edgekeys can be regained by power cycling the MDU, except for permanent failures. If a user holds an edgekey in for more than 3 seconds

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the edgekey will be considered failed due to the inability to differentiate this from an actual stuck edgekey failure, however the edgekey can be regained via an MDU power cycle.

For fatal category A errors, the IDP software will allow the watchdog timer to timeout and halt the operation of the processor, thus halting software execution. However the IDP software will attempt to save error information in the VM and MSU error logs and support poll responses from the GPC for up to 1 second in order to allow some error information to get into GPC downlist before halting.

In order to prevent software execution that is unpredictable, the watchdog timer will halt operation of the processor (thus halting software execution) if the software fails to update the watchdog timer periodically.

b. MDU

Any time the MDU is booting up, it will make up to two attempts to load the software from EEPROM. If both attempts fail, then the MDU display remains blank and will not support display operations but will report the load error to the IDP.

For loss of communications on a 1553 data bus port, if the MDU is in AUTO port configuration mode, the MDU will switch ports in an attempt to gain communications and IDP commandership on the other port. The MDU will continue to switch between the both ports until communications and commandership occurs on one of the ports.

For some BITE detected failures (POST/OST) the main processor (R3000) halts all MDU display operations. The MDUF program terminates execution and goes to the Bootstrap Monitor (BSM) causing the display to go blank. This is done to remove any erroneous information that may be displayed. Other BITE detected failures (POST/OST) result in the MDU reporting the error to the IDP and continuing operations.

For errors detected in the graphics processing system of the MDU, the graphics system will be reset and operation of the graphics system is reset and restarted which may result in the blanking and redrawing of the graphics on the display. If the error is a checksum error of the graphics processor (34020) program code, the program will be reloaded by the main processor (R3000) and the graphics system operation is reset and restarted. After two retries to recover the graphics system, the main processor halts all MDU display operations. The MDUF program terminates execution and goes to the Bootstrap Monitor (BSM) causing the display to go blank. This is done to remove any erroneous information that may be displayed

In order to prevent software execution that is unpredictable, the watchdog timer for the main processor will halt operation of the processor (thus halting software execution) if the software fails to update the watchdog timer periodically.

c. ADC

For EDAC detected uncorrectable errors in the RAM, the ADC will reset and restart operations. This will cause a momentary loss of 1553 data bus communications and invalid indications of any display meters using data from the ADC which will last for no more than 2 seconds.

The ADC continuously reads in the analog signal values and provides them to the IDP even if (1) the analog signals are out of range, (2) there are analog channel failures or (3) any non-fatal BITE failure. However, the error information is provided to the IDP and the IDP will not use the data for generating displays while the error conditions exist.

The watchdog timer will reset the processor if the software fails to update the watchdog timer periodically. The reset causes a restart and reinitialization of the ADC in an attempt to recover operations.

2. Errors and Indications That Can Occur During Normal Operations

These are conditions that can occur during normal operations. Be aware that they can also occur due to failures or erroneous conditions which should not be ignored. Care must be taken to assure they are due to normal operations and not due to anomalies which should be investigated and documented.

B. Display Information and Cross Reference

This section provides a cross reference for various information that is displayed on the MEDS display that is an indication of a problem, including MEDS Fault Summary Message (FSM), GPC FSM, text messages that are not a FSM, and nontext indications. Cross reference information is listed as to what may potentially occur and be reported which indicates the underlying cause of the indication. Where multiple pieces of information are listed, it is a list of possibilities, however usually not all of the items will actually occur at the same time.

MEDS FSM are displayed only on one MDU per IDP. Which MDU the IDP displays the messages is based on MDU priority. The message is always displayed on DPS formats no matter which MDUs the DPS format is displayed. If no DPS format is being supported by that IDP, then the MDU which the messages are displayed on is per the following table and it must be an MDU the IDP has commandership of. Note that MEDS message line management can be done from any MDU commanded by the IDP, not just the MDU where the message is displayed.

Status Changes include WORD 1 bits 5-7, WORD 2 and WORD 3 bits 12-15 as a homogeneous set of data (BFS may downlist them as a non-homogeneous set due to a known User Note). Other bits are changed independently of status changes. Status

changes are queued by the IDP and are put into a POLL Response to the GPC one per second in chronological order. Up to 20 status changes can be queued at a time. Thus status changes can be delayed from the time they are queued until they are sent to the GPC and subsequently included in downlist (20 seconds before all 20 are included in POLL Responses and thus downlist). For bits referring to MDU1, MDU2, etc., refer to table above for each IDP.

Other bits in the status words are changed in real time and show the state of the bits at the time the status words are put into a POLL Response. Thus it is possible for these bits to change more than once between the transmission of POLL Responses. These bits will also not be time homogeneous with status changes. For example the LRU BITE failure bits and MDU commanded bits change when they occur but any status changes that may be associated with those events may show up in the status words later when they eventually get taken from the queue.

Status word 1, bit 8, is set for category D and E errors as follows.

E. Anomaly Procedures

This section provides tables of visible / operational conditions and recommended user actions. Depending on whether downlist data is available or not can effect the decision process. When both visible and downlist conditions exist, the recommended actions for both must be considered. This section contains consolidated tables for recommended user actions since many of the visual and/or downlist conditions lead to the same user actions. This information can be utilized in ground facilities, vehicles on the ground or vehicles in flight/on-orbit.

The consolidated procedures take into account the need for immediate actions and delayed actions depending on potential priorities (e.g. flight safety, time required verses time available to perform actions). The consolidated tables are in recommended order to be performed (top to bottom in order per LRU). The first column is a condition to check for, each row provides recommended actions for the defined condition.

Currently there are no identified conditions that would result in the recommendation to perform an IDP, MDU or ADC memory dump or an IDP file patch operation.

TIME MANAGEMENT MONITORING

PURPOSE


To aid the operator with monitoring of MTU hardware, GPC timekeeping performance, and MCC time biases from the DPS and DPS SUPPORT consoles.

GENERAL

- A. For timekeeping reference, MTU hardware status, or GPC time management refer to DPS Overview or DTEX.





Figure 4.10-1. Malfunction procedure sheet (2 of 5)

- B. MTU hardware status information is displayed as 'MTU BITE' (V75M3540P) on DPS Overview. Each bit of the status word is described in Table 4.10-1 and a console malfunction procedure flow for the MTU failures is provided in Figure 4.10-1.
- C. GPC time source information is displayed as 'Time Src' on DPS Overview and as a clock icon on DTEX. The first of the two digits will reflect either an "A" or "C" for accumulator or computer time source; the second digit will be numbers 1 to 3 for an accumulator or 1 to 5 for a computer source. On DPS Overview and DTEX, the source indicates the view of the time sources from the downlisting GPC. This information is downlisted as part of the GPC vote word (see SCP 4.1 and Table 4.10-2).



- Bit Description
- 1 OSC 1 = Oscillator no. 1 is used as the active driver of the MTU.
 - 0 = Oscillator no. 2 is used as the active driver of the MTU. Bits 2 through 15: 0 = Good, 1 = Failed
- 2 OSC 1 Amplitude Fail The voltage output of OSC 1 is <0.8V RMS. This will cause the auto select logic, if switch "MASTER TIMING UNIT OSCILLATOR" is in the AUTO position PNL 06, to switch to OSC 2 if OSC 1 is the driver. Bit 1 will change state to reflect the change in OSC control.
- 3 OSC 2 Amplitude Fail The voltage output of OSC 2 is <0.8V RMS. This will cause the auto select logic, if switch "MASTER TIMING UNIT OSCILLATOR" is in the AUTO position PNL 06, to switch to OSC 1 if OSC 2 is the driver. Bit 1 will change state to reflect the change in OSC control.
- 4 OSC 1/2 Frequency Difference The output frequency of the oscillators are compared with each other and a flag is set if they should drift part by a relative frequency of 0.04 Hz in a 60-second period. This reflects that one of the oscillators is out of spec with a drift rate greater than 1 x 10⁻⁸.
- 5 OSC 1 Temperature Oscillator no. 1 oven temperature has exceeded the design limits of 75° to 85° C. This failure will cause the auto select logic, if switch "MASTER TIMING UNIT OSCILLATOR" is in the AUTO position PNL 06, to switch to OSC 2 if OSC 1 is the driver. Bit 1 will change state to reflect the change in OSC control.
- 6 OSC 2 Temperature Oscillator no. 2 oven temperature has exceeded the design limits of 75° to 85° C. This failure will cause the auto elect logic, if switch "MASTER TIMING UNIT OSCILLATOR" is in the AUTO position PNL 06, to switch to OSC 1 if OSC 2 is the driver. Bit 1 will change state to reflect the change in OSC control.
- 7 <u>Power Supply A</u> Power Supply A output voltage (8 or 16 volts) is out of limits (not within 6.9 to 9.2V or 13.8 to 18.6V). No effect on BTU performance since power supply B is redundant. Power supply is on O13:A cb4, and powered through ESS1BC.
- 8 <u>Power Supply B</u> Power Supply B output voltage (8 or 16 volts) is out of limits (not within 6.9 to 9.2V or 13.8 to 18.6V). No effect on BTU performance since power supply A is redundant. Power supply is on O13:C cb12, and powered through ESS2CA.
- 9 Accumulator No. 1 Fail The output of accumulator no. 1 shift register pair 2 does not coincide with the outputs of accumulators 2 and 3 bit by bit). This may indicate an accumulator 1 problem. If the source selected by GPC is accumulator 1, then MTU RM may occur with the GPC selecting another accumulator.
- 10 Accumulator No. 2 Fail The output of accumulator no. 2 shift register pair 2 does not coincide with the outputs of accumulators 1 and 3 bit by bit). This may indicate an accumulator 2 problem. If the source selected by GPC is accumulator 2, then MTU RM may occur with the GPC selecting another accumulator.
- 11 <u>Accumulator No. 3 Fail</u> The output of accumulator no. 3 shift register pair 2 does not coincide with the outputs of accumulators 1 and 2 bit by bit). This may indicate an accumulator 3 problem. If the source selected by GPC is accumulator 3, then MTU RM may occur with the GPC selecting another accumulator.
- 12 IRIG "B" Difference IRIG "B" format generator outputs are voted bit by bit. If one of three channels for GMT or MET is not the same, then this flag is set. This flag may coincide with bit 9, 10, or 11 being set.
- 13 <u>Frequency Divider 1 Fail</u> The 1 Hz output of the frequency divider package no. 1 is compared to the 1 Hz outputs of frequency dividers no. 2 and no. 3. Both comparisons have to miscompare to set the flag. It is possible to get the flag and still have no effect on the MTU outputs. When it does affect the output, accumulator no. 1 time will vary from the other accumulators, causing bits 9 and 12 to set.
- 14 <u>Frequency Divider 2 Fail</u> The 1 Hz output of the frequency divider package no. 2 is compared to the 1 Hz outputs of frequency dividers no. 1 and no. 3. Both comparisons have to miscompare to set the flag. It is possible to get the flag and still have no effect on the MTU outputs. When it does affect the output, accumulator no. 2 time will vary from the other accumulators, causing bits 10 and 12 to set.
- 15 <u>Frequency Divider 3 Fail</u> The 1 Hz output of the frequency divider package no. 3 is compared to the 1 Hz outputs of frequency dividers no.1 and no. 2. Both comparisons have to miscompare to set the flag. It is possible to get the flag and still have no effect on the MTU outputs. When it does affect the output, accumulator no. 3 time will vary from the other accumulators, causing bits 11 and 12 to set.
- 16 <u>Valid Update Received</u> Occurs when an update other than a reset to the MTU is initiated. The flag represents a valid update (i.e., sync, parity, number of words) was received by the update logic. This flag will remain 1 until coincidence time has been reached (1 to 2 minutes). The change of state from a "1" to a "0" shows that the coincidence time has occurred and the update time has been strobed into the accumulator registers. It remains in this state during all periods except when an update is requested.




Figure 4.10-1. Malfunction procedure sheet (4 of 5)




Figure 4.10-1. Malfunction procedure sheet (5 of 5)

D. Time error measurement is accomplished via special computations in the workstation that compare onboard GMT to a very accurate STDN GMT (±25 microseconds). These computations are made available for display as MTU 1 Δ T, MTU 2 Δ T, GNC Δ T, SM Δ T, OPS 0 Δ T, and BFS Δ T (applications listed in step A). MTU 1 Δ T and MTU 2 Δ T, which are computed from the OI downlinked GMT, are prime for tracking MTU errors and updates. The other Δ T comps are computed from downlisted GMT, which is GPC CLOCKTIME (see Table 4.10-3). CLOCKTIME is not updated by MTU GMT and may not reflect true GMT. Therefore, the GPC GMT parameters should not be considered reliable for tracking true GMT. (Note: GMT updates are not reflected in CLOCKTIME.)

The ΔT computations use a scheme of adjusting downlink and downlist GMT to the start of the STDN's OD data cycle. This normalization provides a repeatable ΔT comp (steady value) for each comp cycle. This procedure is contained in SCP 6.2.

- E. MTU MET is used by the GPCs during initialization to align the GPC MET register with the MTU MET accumulators. After initialization, should the MTU and GPC MET times disagree, both can be reset by selecting SPEC 2 - TIME and executing item 33. (Note: This cannot be done in OPS 1/6 or 3.) MET RESET resets the MET to 0 in both the MTU and the common set GPCs. MET RESET will align both systems so that an MET update can be performed to restore MET time. The GPC does not downlist MTU MET, but computes GPC MET (V91M7475P) by subtracting MET T-0 from GMT. At lift-off, the GMT is entered into MET T-0. It will not change until a GMT/MET update is executed. An MET update changes MET T-0 by the negative of the ∆ update (the opposite for a GMT update).
- F. Oscillator configuration can be monitored on DPS Overview. DPS Overview indicates auto or manual oscillator selection and which oscillator is actually selected. The automatic selection logic will be overridden if the switch is not in the AUTO position.
- G. BFS time source can be found on DPS Overview and DTEX; the source can also be decoded from BFS DISC WD B. Table 4.10-4 is used to explain how to determine the BFS GPC time source from this word.

- I. The GPC uses MTU GMT to correct its GMT clock at 1.04 times per second.
- J. GMT will be initialized in the MTU/GPCs approximately 70 hours prior to launch. A final update will be performed at T-75 minutes.
- K. GMT initialization can be performed when only one GPC is running (simplex OPS) and in OPS 000. Otherwise, the GMT update is constrained to a maximum of ±15 milliseconds. This constraint does not apply to MET updates. (GMT updates are performed in increments no smaller than 1 millisecond).
- L. During on-orbit operations, mission rules call for an update when GMT delta error exceeds ± 100 milliseconds. The rationale for this value is to avoid having to update. Should drift exceed 100 milliseconds, an update will be performed to make a Δ error less than 100 milliseconds. This procedure is contained in SCP 6.2.
- M. With nominal operation of the MTU, the Δ GMT error should not violate the mission rule for any of the expected mission durations. The Δ GMT error that can be expected is demonstrated in the following equations:

This results in a worse case error of 1.1 milliseconds for 1 day, and 6.2 milliseconds for 10 days.

N. MTU and PASS GPC MET will reflect GMT until lift-off, at which time MET will reset to zero (SRB ignition). The PASS GPC computes MET by (MET T-0) from GMT.

The PASS GPCs do not use MTU MET (except for GPC initialization). Onboard mission timers are driven directly by MTU GMT and MTU MET.

- O. The orbiter GMT (OGMT) and orbiter MET (OMET) times that appear in the header of the D/TV displays are MTU times that are downlinked via OI MDMs (OF1 and OF2). The nonvoted OI version of these times serves as a backup and the GPC version as a third backup.
- P. PASS GMT and MET updates can be performed either by the crew via SPEC 2 or by MCC-H uplink using DEU equivalents. This procedure is contained in SCP 6.2 or 7.8. Any update corrects both the GPC and MTU simultaneously. Time management controls are not available in GNC OPS 1/6 and 3. The TIME SPEC can be called in OPS 0 only when the previous memory configuration is contained in the SPEC. Time updates are legal via the SM time controls (SPEC 2) even if the GNC GPCs are in GNC 301. However, all updates should be initiated via a GNC RS GPC to avoid a possible fail to sync for a GMT update or a fail to update for an MET update.
- Q. BFS GMT is initialized to the MTU GMT at BFS transition to OPS 101 and OPS 301 and continues to reflect MTU GMT during these OPS. BFS MET is zeroed at BFS transition to OPS 101 and remains zero until SRB ignition, at which time it will count up. At BFS transition to OPS 301, the BFS GPC will initialize its GMT and MET to the MTU GMT and MET. Once initialized, MTU MET is not used by the BFS GPC. BFS MET correction is derived from the difference of MTU and BFS GPC GMT. With OI-24, the BFS can be updated via item entries on the BFS memory SPEC 0. Updates can be performed only in OPS 0 or OPS 301.
- R. GMT/MET updates are incorporated 1 to 2 minutes after crew/uplink execution. The update waits until the next whole minute is reached and then takes 1 minute after that before performing the update.
- S. The MTU data is a low frequency read element (once per major cycle) and is, thus, only read by PASS once a second. For PASS to bypass the MTU, it must first detect two consecutive errors against it. PASS uses what is known as an I/O transaction error counter for this process. This error counter is zeroed out every time I/O resets, port modes, OPS transitions, or OPS mode recalls are performed. When an I/O Reset is executed, PASS separately upmodes each string. This action takes several seconds to complete since it takes approximately 1 second per string. Once bypassed elements on string 3 are upmoded, both PASS and BFS will be looking for accumulator 3 input data (actual commanding accomplished by PASS string 3 bus commander). After two unsuccessful data acquisition attempts, the BFS will bypass the read element. As for PASS, one unsuccessful read will occur (transaction ID=22 error counter will be incremented to one). However, when string 4 is upmoded, all I/O transaction counters including the MTU read) will be cleared. Thus, two more read cycles will occur before the PASS bypasses MTU accumulator 3. In parallel with all of this I/O activity, the PASS is transferring data to the BFS

every 40 ms. Included in this PASS redundant set transfer data is the PASS BCE element bypass status, which the BFS compares against its own BCE bypass element status and its own element bypass status. Therefore, after the second consecutive read following string 3 upmode, the BFS detects a miscompare between the PASS redundant set transfer data BCE bypass element status and its own element bypass status. Since the MTU accumulator 3 bypass status disagree, the BFS will log a GPC error code 46 and downmode the affected string 3. Reference user notes B05284A and 35211.

This does not happen with higher frequency read elements because PASS will read these elements multiple times in the 1-second timeframe it has to upmode the string and, thus, will bypass the element before BFS can detect there is "disagreement." The crew action is to wait for the upmoding of all strings to complete (10 seconds after the PASS I/O Reset is requested is long enough) and then perform an I/O Reset to BFS to recover string 3.

The potential to drop string 3 in the BFS is not an impact to OPS transitions, since BFS already goes stand-alone per design. There is a small possibility for the BFS to drop string 3 during restrings when tracking PASS. This is because during OPS Mode Recalls, all buses are upmoded simultaneously. Since this type of upmoding is much quicker than that associated with an I/O Reset, the chance of dropping string 3 is significantly reduced.



MODULAR MEMORY UNIT (MMU) SOURCE BUS AND SOLID STATE MASS MEMORY (SSMM) STATUS

DESCRIPTION

This SCP provides quick-reference insight into the MMU Source Bus Status and the SSMM memory status.




Bit Description

- 0 <u>GPC/MMU</u> Selects a GPC as the source of OPS and major function base if the data is available in a GPC. If a GPC cannot be found with the required data, the MMU is selected as the source. The MMU Data Bus is utilized in either case.
- 1 <u>MMU/MMU</u> Selects the MMU via the MMU Data Bus as the source for OPS and major function base. All targeted GPCs will receive the software, and current vehicle data stored in the major function base residing in any targeted GPC will be lost during the OPS transition.
- 2 <u>GPC/LDB</u> Selects a GPC(s) as the source for OPS and major function utilizing the launch data bus as the data bus. If the data is not available from another GPC, the OPS transition will fail.

3 <u>Retry ENA</u> - If set, this indicates that the ops transition logic will automatically retry an overlay if there is an error on the first attempt. Note that this bit is hardcoded on and could be turned off only with a GMEM.





BUS LOSS TABLES

DESCRIPTION

- A. This SCP provides various tabular summaries of orbiter AC and DC electrical bus failure impacts on Shuttle avionics LRUs, including DPS equipment. Both single and double electrical bus failure impacts to DPS MDMs are included.
- B. Orbiter Control Bus Short Confirmation Rationale

The SCP also provides the following discussion of orbiter electrical control bus shorts, including the philosophical rationale behind an EGIL request to the MCC flight control team to assist in the confirmation of control bus shorts.

The orbiter electrical bus distribution system utilizes remote power controller (RPC) and circuit breaker (c/b) devices to isolate and protect against electrical faults. That is, with current overloads due either to electrical bus shorts or orbiter LRU internal shorts, the circuit protection devices are designed to trip. A subsequent crew action is required to reset the RPC or c/b device. This standard electrical bus isolation design works very well, with one notable exception – the orbiter control buses.

Nine control buses (CNTL AB1, AB2, AB3, BC1, BC2, BC3, CA1, CA2, and CA3) support low-current RPC and circuit breaker control signals via panel switches, located primarily on the orbiter flight deck. The control bus wiring is routed from panel to panel, although only three panels (O6, R2, and MA73C) are actually common to all nine control buses. This effective wire-jumpering from panel to panel is referred to as a "daisy chain".

RPCs directly source-feed panels O6 and MA73C, the terminating panels for each daisy chain. Panel R2 serves as the mid-point for a daisy chain and is fed directly by a five-amp fuse, as well as, jumper connections between other panels within each control bus daisy chain.

If a control bus short is suspected, the EGIL flight control discipline will desire the panel number for all equipment impacted. This will help to pinpoint the source of the control bus short on the daisy chain, or help to isolate the problem to control bus current and/or voltage monitoring sensors. Our normal 'goodie book' Console Handbook documentation provides information that allows us to assist EGIL in the task of identifying possible control bus shorts (including panel number).

Due to the overall length of the orbiter control buses (approximately 500 feet long), it is possible to sustain a bus short and still maintain most or all of the equipment functions associated with the affected bus. Each control bus is source-fed by a five-amp fuse at the middle of the bus and by two five-amp RPCs, one at each end of the control bus. At most, only two of these three power-feed sources will trip/blow, depending on the location and severity of the bus short.

The severity of the bus short is a function of the existing load in combination with the naturally occurring resistance at the point of the electrical short. The remaining source will continue to feed the entire bus load to the point of the electrical short. The bus voltage will vary with the length of the control bus to the short and, thus, may or may not be sufficient to drive an RPC (control input ON signal is about 12 V dc) or to look like a bi-level "logic one" (6 to 10 V dc) for DPS or OI telemetry. Consequently, depending on the location of the bus short, equipment functions may or may not be lost.

The RPC and/or fuse in the region of the bus short will normally be tripped/blown because of an electrical short. The remaining control bus feed-source(s) will not trip because of current limiting caused by distributed resistance of the control bus wiring. Without crew action, the remaining power feed(s) will continue to feed the short indefinitely or until the shorted wire burns through (melts).

If left unchecked, two undesirable risks arise. First, if the control bus short occurs in an area where the bus is part of a wire bundle, localized heating at the point of the short could eventually build to levels that cause damage to adjacent wires in the bundle. This could potentially take out many different critical orbiter functions. Second, there exists the demonstrated concern for arc tracking fires, a condition in which the localized heat at the point of the short becomes sufficient to ignite the control bus wiring insulation (Kapton).

This Kapton ignition further destroys the wire insulation in the immediate area of the short, exposing additional wire to the electrical short, which continues to overheat and char insulation adjacent to the short. The net effect of this process is that once ignited, the Kapton insulation will continue to burn somewhat like a fuse, allowing the short to propagate up the bus to the first connector or to the point where the "hot" lead (current feed) and the ground return wires separate.

If the affected control bus is powered off, the electrical-short heat source for a potential arc tracking fire is killed, and destruction of the insulation will cease. If an arc tracking fire has occurred, the insulation will cease burning. However, the wires are still physically in contact with each other (short remains intact).

Should the control bus be repowered, the conditions for an arc tracking fire are restored. Furthermore, because of existing charring and carbonization of the damaged insulation in the area of the short, less heat is now required to start an arc tracking fire than prior to powering off the control bus. That is, the potential for an arc tracking fire is actually greater than before the bus was powered off.

For these reasons, EGIL will instruct the crew to power off the affected control bus as soon as practical. This action will take out redundancy in other control buses, but will not kill those buses unless additional electrical bus problems are present.




PASS LEGAL OPS TRANSITIONS

BFS LEGAL OPS TRANSITIONS





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



Figure 5.15-1. Data bus layouts

(h) Although maximum temperatures were never achieved for this case, unit was powered OFF for cooldown. Temperatures stabilized in 2 hours.

(i) Prior to the loss of forced cooling for this case, unit stabilized 11° F above the maximum allowable Singer MIA mounting surface temperature limit of 196° F (91° C). No further testing was done. Coldplate temperature was 125 ° F, and coolant flowrate was appropriate to maintain a constant coldplate temperature.

(j) Reference Section D for special notes regarding operational limits for the AP101S.

D. Special Note

Based on memo EK5-90-48, the operational limits of the AP101S GPC under conditions which result in reducing cooling have been extended beyond those shown in 5.2.C. The extended limits are essentially a 30-minute increase. The following lists the extended limits:

Loss of forced air cooling (1 ATM)

- Previously operating GPC- 55 minutes
- Cold soak GPC 1.25 hours

Loss of cabin press

- Previously operating GPC- 47 minutes
- Cold soaked GPC 1.25 hours
- Note: Coldsoak time is 3.0 to 3.5 hours, depending on initial conditions; in most situations, two rev's (~3 hours) will suffice. Sleep mode is considered equivalent to a nonoperational soak. The numbers shown above should be used for contingency purposes only.
- E. Avionics Cooling During a GPC IFM

Based on an Orbit Flight Techniques Panel Meeting #60 held on July 1, 1980, the following data were presented regarding avionic cooling when performing an AP-101S IFM.

- 1. With one GPC removed, the other active GPC's cooling capability in the AV bay is reduced 5 to 16 percent depending on which combination exists.
- 2. With anticipated avionics bay temperatures, the maximum outlet temperature of the remaining powered GPC is 115° F. The spec limit is 130° F.
- 3. There are no cooling problems associated with GPC changeout and leaving the GPC powered if the avionics bay temperatures are below 85° F.

This data should also be valid for AP101S machines; therefore, the conclusion is that we can change out GPCs without worrying about GPC cooling.

REACH AND VISIBILITY

PURPOSE

This procedure provides a table of all Data Processing System switches accessible to the commander and pilot in the cockpit during ascent through MECO and entry post-MM304.

BACKGROUND

This data was derived from a reach and visibility study completed by the Systems Division on August 5, 1988, using the STS-26 crew. Even though this data is specific to this crew, it should provide a good basis for determining the crew's capabilities during these phases.

As of 1992, reach and visibility studies are not performed on a flight-to-flight basis if a pilot has flown previously; this study was stopped because experienced pilots and commanders are familiar with their reach and visibility. A study will be performed for new pilots, as required.

Updates will be based on the latest data available since 1992. It is appropriate to point out that, although no official study data were available, the mission specialist designated as no. 2 can assist the commander or pilot with switch location for overhead panels.






Figure 5.24-1. Nominal ascent sensed acceleration



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SECTION 6 SPECIAL DPS CONSOLE OPERATIONS

CONTENTS

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GPC/MMU DUMP GROUND PROCESSING

(Using the FEP and GPC Dump workstation application)

PURPOSE

The purpose of this SCP is to describe the ground processing involved in verifying the contents of the GPC memory configurations and the contents of the mass memory tapes on the shuttle using downlinked data from the vehicle. DEU dumps are not discussed in this SCP. Verification includes the comparison of dumped data with a reference standard readily accessible in a ground computer. The results of the comparisons will be used by the ground personnel to assess the health of the onboard GPC(s) or MMU(s).

This SCP contains the following information:

- General statement of capability
- Procedure for processing dumps
- Description of background data
 - GPC dump application
 - SPF memory compare processing

GENERAL

A. GPC Dumps

The capability exists to dump all or portions of GPC memory. Normal GNC downlist is lost during a dump. Previously, a GPC dump was recorded on the OPS recorders, as well as simultaneously received on the ground if the dump occurred during AOS. If the dump occurred during LOS, the data could then be acquired from the OPS recorders at a later time. Dump data sent via the OPS recorder uses the FM link, thereby allowing the dump without interruption of the real-time data. Once on the ground, the data is held at the remote site for playback until LOS, thus avoiding interference with the real-time data flow from the remote site.

Because we have almost full TDRS coverage, dumps should be performed only during AOS. If there is no other alternative, the procedures for performing an OPS recorder dump can be found in appendix G in the DPS Console Handbook. The OPS recorder procedures are not covered in the Flight Data File; therefore, procedures must be sent to the crew if there is a requirement to perform a GPC dump via the OPS recorders.

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- 1. PASS HISAM and GNC dumps go to toggle buffer 1 in the PCMMU, SM goes to toggle buffer 2, nonprime OPS0/PL9 goes to toggle buffer 4, and BFS/post-IPL HISAM dumps go to toggle buffer 5.
- 2. It is also possible to dump only a portion of GPC memory.

B. MMU Dumps

MMU dumps are initiated onboard using the MASS MEMORY R/W display available as the OPS display in PL9 or SPEC 85 in SM2 and SM4. The SM2 major function permits 2048 16-bit words to be transferred at one time from the MMU through the SM GPC where the data is placed on the SM2 downlist for transmission to the ground. The normal SM2 downlist is replaced while the mass memory dump data is being sent to the ground. In a similar manner, the PL9 major function permits 16,384 16-bit words to be routed at one time through the SM GPC to the ground. Therefore, MMU dumps are limited in size and may result in only a partial dump of a loadblock, not the entire phase. Because of the small SM buffer space, flight rules require that MMU dumps be performed in PL9.

MMU dump procedures are not covered in the Flight Data File; therefore, procedures must be sent to the crew if there is a requirement to perform an MMU dump.

C. Dump Processing and File Transfer

GPC/MMU dumps are processed by the DPS workstation and are then transferred to the Software Production Facility (SPF) to be analyzed by Flight Software (FSW) personnel. There are two domains in the SPF which can perform this processing. The primary domain, as specified in the United Space Alliance PASS FSW Mission Support Plan, is the Software Development Facility (SDF-A). The SPF production domain (PRDS) is available as a backup.




Figure 6.1-1. SPF TCP/IP interfaces for electronic GPC dump delivery

The method of transmitting these dumps to the SPF is via File Transfer Protocol (FTP). There are two distinct paths available for this file transfer. The primary path is through the GPC DUMP Drop Box, which is connected to the OPS LAN firewall. The backup path is through the Computer Development Environment (CDE) LAN, which is also connected to the OPS LAN. Both these paths are connected to the SPF Cisco Router (see Figure 6.1-1 for a diagram of these paths).

Once the dumps are resident on either the Drop Box or the CDE compile 1 or compile 2 servers, they can be retrieved for processing by FSW personnel on the SPF. As long as the primary path is used, the DPS workstation has all the necessary tools to perform the dump transfer. If there is a problem with the primary path and the backup path to the CDE servers must be used, manual intervention by one of the DPS Group Administrators is required. In order to use the backup path, a GA will have to be called in and they will have to copy the dump files from the DPS workstation to the CDE server. The path for these files on the CDE server is

/cde/rw1/mer01/mer/Iramer/GPCDUMP (this is case sensitive). The only drawback to using the CDE is that it is supported only during normal working hours (7 a.m. - 5 p.m., Mon. - Fri.). The system is on line 24 hours a day, but support personnel are available only during these times should any problems be encountered. The CDE does not have any mission support requirements at this time.

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PROCEDURE

- A. For crew to perform a mass memory dump (ref. OI User's Guide)
 - 1. PL9 OPS page (MASS MEMORY R/W)
 - 2. Select MMU to be dumped ITEM 40(41) EXEC
 - 3. Select software to be dumped ITEM 42 + X EXEC,

where X = 1 - PASS Area 1 2 - PASS Area 2 3 - PASS Area 3 4 - BFS 5 - DEU 6 - SSME 7 - TCS Sequence 0 - Text and Graphics

- 4. Select phase to dump ITEM 43 + XXX EXEC
- 5. Select load block to dump ITEM 44 + XXX EXEC
- 6. Start Dump ITEM 52 EXEC

Note: This will cause the downlist format to change to 91.

- B. To perform a real-time memory dump
 - 1. DPS/DPS SPT verifies the TFL compatibility with INCO/INST.
 - 2. DPS/DPS SPT starts the Backup Dump Driver by selecting DPS || APPS | GPC DUMP DRIVER (BACKUP).
 - 3. DPS/DPS SPT monitors the memory dump quality in real time, using the GPC Dump Display. To start the GPC Dump Display, choose DPS II Apps I GPC DUMP DISPLAY from the DNAV menu. The dump display does not have to be opened before the dump begins. If the dump display is opened during or after a dump, the most recent dump files will automatically be opened.
 - 4. When the GPC Dump Display begins receiving dump data, the Dump Data Quality dialog box will appear, and the stop time and quality data (missing/invalid frames and frames with invalid checksums) will update continuously during the dump. *The GPC Dump Display of the first 512 words*

will remain blank until the dump is complete/terminated. Once the dump is complete/terminated, the first 512 words of the dump data will be displayed.

- 5. Once a satisfactory dump is obtained (i.e., no missing/invalid frames or invalid checksums or on the advisement of flight software personnel), DPS/DPS SPT will transfer the dump files (Dump Data and Dump Quality for each dump) to the Software Production Facility (SPF) drop box (see Section D) for offline memory dump processing by flight software personnel.
- 6. Each dump contains two files, a dump file and a dump quality file. The filename of the dump file (e.g., D303143117_93RRGPC2_STS069.prime) will be annunciated as the last advisory message (in Advisory Services, the GPC Dump Advisory Log, and on the GPC Dump Display above the Advisory Log) after dump completion/termination. The quality file for that dump will be the same filename, except starting with a Q vis D. The *.prime filenames were captured by the prime driver and should be used, except in special circumstances. The *.backup files were captured by the backup driver and could be used if workstation problems rendered the prime driver inoperable during the dump.

Notes:

- 1. BFS dumps do not have checksums; therefore, the Invalid Checksum field in the Quality Dialog box will remain blank during these dumps.
- 2. Additional features and advisory message explanations can be found in the GPC Memory Dump Processor User's Guide.
- 3. GPC dumps should not be performed during LOS unless there is no other alternative.
- C. To obtain dump data from the OPS recorder
 - 1. DPS/DPS SPT requests from INCO/INST that the dump data be dumped to the ground.
 - 2. DPS/DPS SPT informs INCO/INST that we will need to have the dump data played back through the playback FEP. INCO/INST will work with TELCOM to set up the playback.
 - 3. To view the playback of the dump data, DPS/DPS SPT need to select the playback telemetry stream on the GPC Dump application. This is done by selecting Stream | PB on the GPC Dump application.
 - 4. At the completion of the dump, DPS/DPS SPT electronically transfers the dump and quality files to the FSW drop box (see Section D).

- D. To obtain offline memory dump processing
 - 1. DPS/DPS SPT generates a CHIT to MER requesting dump analysis. The CHIT should include the dump and quality filenames that will be electronically transferred to the SPF for processing.
 - 2. Choose the "MCC File Transfer" from the DNAV Master II Tools menu to start the XFTP utility. The window on the left will be for the workstation you are using. The computer name (i.e., white-mpsr6) will be above the menu for this window. The window on the right will be the destination workstation.
 - 3. From the menu in the left window, choose "Dir I Change Directory." In the directory field, type in "/users/dps/DATA/GDUMP" and choose OK. A list of dump files that exist in the GPC Dump directory will appear. The filenames beginning with D are dump files, and those beginning with Q are quality files.
 - 4. Select the files to transfer to FSW by single clicking on the files in the left window. Always transfer the Dump and Quality files for each dump. The Prime copy should be used (*.prime). If this file is corrupted, use the Backup files (*.backup) for the transfer.
 - 5. To connect to the FSW dropbox, choose "Connect I Connect to Remote" from the menu above the right window. Select "spf-db" in the Recently Referenced Hosts: list box and type "anonymous" in the user name field (this is in parenthesis next to the host name in the list as a reminder). If "spf-db" selection not available, type "spf-db" in the Hostname field and "anonymous" in the username field. Choose the connect button to connect to the FSW dropbox. Enter your workstation userid in the Type Password field and choose OK.
 - 6. From the right window, choose "Dir | Change Directory" and type /GPC in the Directory: field. Choose OK to change to the GPC Dump Dropbox directory.
 - 7. Click on the >>copy>> button and choose OK from the Verify Dialog box to transfer/copy the selected files to the FSW dropbox. The selected files will appear in the right window when the copy is complete. Note: Files are to be transferred in binary.
 - 8. Notify FSW via SPAN that the files have been transferred to the GPC Dump dropbox.
 - 9. Choose File | Quit from the Xftp menu to close the Xftp utility.
 - Note: As a cleanup, delete all old dump files from the /users/dps/DATA/GDUMP directory after every flight or activity. FSW will archive the files that are transferred to the GPC Dump dropbox for each flight.
- E. Dump transfer path problems

6.1-7 Verify that this is the correct version before use

In the event that a problem is encountered while transmitting a processed GPC/MMU dump, the following steps should be followed.

Primary path failure in connecting to the GPC Dump Drop Box.

- 1. Any problems encountered in connecting to the Drop Box from the DPS workstation should be reported to the MCC Workstation Support (WSS), and a DR should be written.
- 2. The WSS will contact the appropriate OS Support group to have the problem worked in a flight support mode.
- 3. When the problem is resolved, OS Support will notify WSS, who will, in turn, notify DPS.
- 4. If a GPC/MMU dump is waiting to be processed while the Drop Box is down, one of the DPS GA's should be called in to transfer the dump from the DPS workstation to the CDE server. If this path is used, it should be noted on the dump processing request CHIT so that FSW personnel will know which system to retrieve the dump from.

Secondary path failure in connecting to the CDE servers.

- 1. Any problems encountered in connecting to the CDE servers from the DPS workstation should be reported to the CDE Systems Administration desk, and a DR should be written.
- 2. The CDE Systems Administration desk will initiate the necessary steps to have the problem worked. The CDE has no defined mission support requirements and is only supported during normal business hours. If a problem is encountered during off-nominal hours and the primary path is also down, emphasis should be placed on the recovery of the primary path.

FTP COMMAND LINE PROGRAM PROCEDURES

- A. Obtain the Xterm window and go to gdump directory.
 - 1. In the background area, click on the right mouse button to view a submenu. Under the "Applications" option, select Xterm. A xterm window will open.
 - 2. Type: cd /users/dps/DATA/GDUMP <return>. This command will get you to the gdump directory.
 - 3. Type: Is <return>. This will allow you to view all of the files in this directory, including the processed gdump files.
- B. Set up the ftp program for file transfer.
 - 1. Type: ftp spf-db <return>. This command will start the file transfer protocol (ftp) program and bring up the login prompt for the spf-db server.
 - 2. At the login prompt, type in "anonymous" as a username. Hit "enter" or "return" at the password prompt.
 - 3. Type: type binary <return>. This command sets up the ftp program for a binary file transfer. The ftp program will respond with "Type Set to I"
 - 4. To view the directory structure, type: Is <return>. The GPC directory should be listed. Type: cd GPC <return>. This command will change directories to the GPC directory. Type: Is <return>. This command will allow you to view the files located in the spf-db server.
- C. Perform file transfer and exit.
 - Type: mput *.prime <return>. This command will allow you to transfer all gdump files with the ".prime" string in the title to the spf-db server. This command will result in confirmation to transfer each file with the ".prime" string. Answer "y" or "n" as appropriate. No te: The mput command stands for "multiple

put" or transfer of multiple files. For a single file transfer, type: put "filename" <return>.

- 2. Type: Is <return>. This command will allow you view the files located in the spfdb server. Verify that the gdump files that were transferred in the previous step are included in this listing.
- 3. To exit the ftp program, type: quit <return>.
- 4. Close the Xterm window or type: exit <return>.

TIME BIAS ADJUSTMENT (ΔT)

PURPOSE

The purpose of this SCP is to provide procedures to perform time bias adjustments and drift checks. Reference SCP 4.10 and DPS Systems Brief 6.16 for more details on delta time adjustments.

PROCEDURE

- A. Select the Delta-t option under DNAV DPS II Apps menu. The Delta-t application, Figure 6.2-1, should appear.
- B. Select the Delta-t text in the upper left-hand corner of the application. Three options will be listed; Zero Out, Reset, and Exit.

Zero Out - This option allows the operator to zero out the desired $\Delta T(s)$. The deltat's available are MTU-1, MTU-2, GNC, SM BFS, OPS-0, SCOS, ECOS, and ALL. This program automatically calculates the required bias to zero out the $\Delta T(s)$. For documentation purposes, the application subtracts the desired time (i.e., MTU-1) from the adjusted ground receipt time (AGRT) to determine the bias. The ALL option allows the user to zero out all the delta-t's simultaneously.

Reset - This option allows the operator to remove the bias from the desired $\Delta T(s)$. The ALL option allows the user to remove all the biases entered.

Exit - This option allows the operator to exit from the application.

C. Once the appropriate $\Delta T(s)$ is zeroed out, it can be verified on the Delta-t application. Also, the Delta-t application displays the bias used to zero out the $\Delta T(s)$ under the Bias column. This bias(es) should be recorded in the console log.

DELTA-T STANDARDS

The following documents the standards that will be followed for monitoring and zeroing out of all the Delta times ($\Delta T(s)$). These standards do not preclude the teams from zeroing the $\Delta T(s)$ at their discretion whenever necessary as long as the changes are documented in the console log. The teams have the option of using the workstation application RTPLOT to monitor $\Delta T(s)$. The individual operator can use any number of plots (i.e., all $\Delta T(s)$ on one plot, each $\Delta T(s)$ on its own plot) per the operator's preference; FCR and MPSR do not have to be identical as long as the appropriate $\Delta T(s)$ are monitored.

- A. After the final GMT alignment is complete during the prelaunch countdown, the operators will zero out the MTU 1 and MTU 2 Δ . Since these two times are OI driven, these $\Delta T(s)$ should not change with PCMMU-related changes (e.g., OPS transitions, TFL changes, PCMMU swaps) as long as the data path from the orbiter to the MCC remains the same. In other words, if the data is downlisted through a GSTDN site instead of TDRS, the OI driven may change.
- B. After the G9-G1 transition and BFS is tracking PASS in OPS 101, the GNC and BFS $\Delta T(s)$ will be zeroed out. This is usually performed around T 18 minutes.
- C. After the G2/S2 set is configured in block 1 of Postinsertion, the GNC Δ T will be zeroed out on one TDRS, and the SM Δ T will be zeroed out on the other TDRS. Zero out the MTU 1 and MTU 2Δ T(s) if necessary; zero out one on each TDRS. Zeroing out these delta times at the same time for every flight/sim is not critical as

long as the operator documents in the console log when/where the times were zeroed out. Some section members have found that zeroing out the $\Delta T(s)$ at the nodal crossings is effective for monitoring purposes.

- D. Anytime pseudosync is lost (OPS transitions, TFL changes, PCMMU swaps, etc.), the GNC and SM Δ T(s) will be "re-zeroed" out on the appropriate TDRS.
- E. At the Ascent team's discretion, the MTU 1, MTU 2, BFS, and GNC $\Delta T(s)$ can be zeroed out after the handover from the GSTDN site (usually MILA) to TDRS. Because of the uncertainty of the workload of the ascent team, the operators may feel that re-zeroing out of the $\Delta T(s)$ will prevent them from monitoring their data as effectively as possible. A point to be made is that flight rule A7-107, TIME MANAGEMENT, still applies during this timeframe, and accurate monitoring of the $\Delta T(s)$ is required to correctly apply this rule.
- F. At the Entry team's discretion, MTU 1, MTU 2, BFS, and GNC Δ T(s) can be zeroed out after the G2-G3 transition and after the handover from TDRS to GSTDN. The same rationale applies here as in item no. 5.

Values for the $\Delta T(s)$ will be entered according to the procedure in step C. Bias values can be verified using the Delta-t application.

DRIFT CHECKS

Drift checks should be made during the mission to verify performance of the MTU oscillators. This is done via GSTDN sites or the TDRS satellites.

- A. GSTDN drift checks should be taken at sites with high elevation angles. At the point of closest approach to the site (max. elevation), R delay due to slant range is negligible and any error should be due to drift. (Note: At max. slant range, which occurs at AOS/LOS, RF delay is 5 milliseconds for a 150-mile orbit.) TDRS drift checks can be done at any time and have been observed to vary ± 15 milliseconds.
- B. Use NEXT STATION CONTACTS display to monitor when max. elevation occurs and take measurement at this time. A log of measurements should be kept to show any trends in MTU oscillator performance.
- C. Should MTU/GPC drift exceed acceptable limits (Mission Rule allows $\Delta T \le 100$ milliseconds), update GMT per SCP 7.8.
- D. If excessive drift is suspected while on TDRS, request a hand-down to a ground station to verify ∆T drift. A discrepancy between the MTU∆T and the GNC∆T may be explained by a loss of pseudosync (caused by a TFL change). Pseudosync can be reestablished by performing an OPS transitions or an OPS mode recall with a change in the target set. Pseudosync loss has been observed on several flights and has not caused any adverse effects.

ONBOARD FAULT SUMMARY APPLICATION

PURPOSE

This SCP provides the steps to document the procedure for using the OFS application in the MCC.

BACKGROUND

OFS displays a set of scrollable fault message lists that enable the user to track orbiter fault messages. The orbiter fault message lists maintained are PASS and BFS. Incoming fault messages enter at the top of the lists. Users can scroll through the lists and print a range of faults. During ascent, two instances of OFS could be used, one viewing PASS, the other instance viewing BFS. The view option is specific to the user and does not affect all instances in the MCC. DPS flight controllers have some unique capabilities to clear the fault message lists and to alter the source of fault messages by switching downlisters. These unique options selected by DPS affect every instance running in the MCC that are configured to the same flight activity. Only the DPS-unique options are discussed here. For more information on this application, see the DPS User's Guide binder.

PROCEDURE

Select Onboard Fault Summary option under DNAV DPS II Apps menu. An OFS summary message will appear. After acknowledging it, the OFS application, Figure 6.3-1, should appear. Starting OFS using the DPS menu will allow DPS flight controllers to clear messages and to alter downlist selection. Other disciplines start OFS using Global Apps from the Master Menu, which does not allow the DPS-unique capabilities.

To clear a fault message list (only available to DPS flight controllers), select file option, and a pulldown window appears. Select Clear, which brings up another window for determining which fault history log to delete: PASS, BFS, and ALL. After acknowledging the confirmation window, this will clear the corresponding fault message list in every running instance for those that are configured to the same flight activity in the MCC.

To change downlist selection, select Downlister. This allows the DPS flight controller to switch downlisters to match the current downlister configuration onboard the orbiter. Possible downlister choices are GNC, SM, and OPS 0. The Auto Select option is currently unavailable and, therefore, grayed out. Switching downlisters alters which input parameters the computations examine for downlinked fault codes. This option affects every running instance for those who are configured to the same flight activity in the MCC.

DPS INTEGRATED LOAD CHECKOUT (ILC) PROCEDURE

PURPOSE

This SCP provides detailed instructions on conducting an ILC from the DPS console. The manner in which the ILC is performed is left up to the discretion of the team conducting the actual ILC. Only the consoles designated as prime for the mission are checked.

BACKGROUND

An ILC is designed to verify that the various flight software loads, MCC, shuttle mission simulator (SMS), and orbiter flight software are ready to support a particular Space Transportation System (STS) mission and/or flight specific simulation. The flight control team must demonstrate this readiness by a thorough analysis of the MCC tools used for their specific flight control tasks.

An ILC report form/checklist is shown in Figure 6.4-1. This form is used to ensure completion of all ILC activities. As each activity described in the PROCEDURES section is completed, a check is placed next to the activity name. MCC anomaly reports should be officially submitted for any significant hardware and/or software problems, non-conformities, or errors observed during the ILC. At the end of the ILC, the ILC report form and any attachments (H/C's, AR's, etc) should be submitted to the designated DPS lead for the specific flight. Subsequently (if significant problems occur), the flight controller conducting the ILC, the flight lead, and the group lead will determine if the problems incurred should deem the load satisfactory/unsatisfatory for use (from a DPS perspective). The SIMSUP conductucting the sim (looking at the "big picture") may also determine if the load is unsatisfactory for the team, due to significant problems from the various disciplines.

PROCEDURES

- A. Prior to ILC
 - 1. Confirm that the datapack for the flight is complete and on console.
 - 2. Coordinate with the DPS sim monitor to determine any specific malfunctions that need to be exercised during the ILC.
- B. Console Checkout (see also: ILC Report form for list of applications and application's user's guides for more information on specific applications)
 - 1. Log into the workstation and verify that the proper activity can be selected. Configure the console for the activity. Make sure the first operator to configure receives the "Limit Manager" window, makes the appropriate selection, and iconifies it.
 - 2. Call up the appropriate applications for the activity. (See ILC Report form.)

6.4-1 Verify that this is the correct version before use

- 3. Take a hard copy of an application screen.
- C. Command Load Checkout

Send one of each of the following command loads and verify the correct transmission to the command host/server:

1. Variable Parameters

Select the VP application from the DNAV DPS II Command menu. If not available, build an appropriate load (VP loads should be previously built by the data pack builder) and transmit to the command manager. Verify the load. Uplink only where appropriate and verify the success of the uplink.

1a. VP Scaling

Select the VP Scaling application from the DNAV DPS II Apps menu. If not available, build a scaling load (scaling loads should be previously built by the datapack builder) and transmit it to the workstation. Verify that the scaling is appropriately viewable from the Variable Parameters application.

2. GMEM (if available)

Select the GMEM application from the DNAV DPS II Command menu. Build a "dummy" GMEM load and transmit it to the command manager. Verify the load. Do not uplink the GMEM, unless "safe" memory locations have been verified, prior to the ILC, by software experts in building 5 (could cause unexpected computer failure).

3. DEU Equivalent

Select the DEU Equivalent application from the DNAV DPS II Command menu. If not available, build an appropriate load and transmit it to the command manager. Verify the load.

4. MMU Operations

Select the MMU Operations application from the DNAV DPS II Command menu. Build an appropriate load and transmit it to the command manager. Verify the load.

- 5. MDM BITE Read

Select the MDM BITE Read application from the DNAV DPS II Command menu.

Verify that this is the correct version before use

ILC 6.4 Build MDM BITE reads (BSR and BITE 4) and transmit them to the command manager. Verify the loads.

6. Load Manager

Select the Load Manager application from the DNAV DPS II Command menu. Verify proper operations of load deletion and chaining.

7. Fault page change (OFS)

In the instance of OFS/PASS already started, select the downlister to be (GNC/SM/OPS) and observe the validity of the data. Repeat the above two steps to verify appropriate data from each downlister.

8. Time Source Substitution

Coordinate with NIP SUP. See FCOH SOP 8.3.

9. Delta-t's

Select the Delta-t application from the DNAV DPS II Apps menu. Perform zeroing of Δ -t's. Check that the Δ t's were cleared on the Delta-T display.

10. ODRC Request

Select the ODRC application from the DNAV DPS II Global menu. Proceed as usual in making request(s), checking printouts.

- 11. Remove ILC-specific loads from workstation.
- D. Data Checkout
 - 1. If time permits and "DPS Trench" deems applicable, coordinate and perform a software dump of a GPC using the GPC Dump application. See FCOH 4.4-1 and the GPC Dump User's guide.
 - 2. Verify the data on all DPS applications used, as feasible.
- E. Load-specific Checkout
 - 1. Exercise any malfunctions that were noted in step A.2.
 - 2. Coordinate the uplink of any "standard" TMBUs (check with different disciplines for pre-built TMBU's). Insure that the respective discipline is comfortable with the end result (some end-item changes can be monitored and verified). All prelaunch and post-MECO TMBUs that will be needed for the flight must be sent during the load checkout to develop confidence in their correctness. If the actual values for the TMBU will not be known until later, the I-load values will be sent. This will permit verification of the parameter types and IDs.

6.4-3 Verify that this is the correct version before use

F. Additional items

Check the CD-ROM reader and printer capability.

- G. Generation and Submittal of Anomoly Reports (ARs)
 - 1. An MCC AR should be submitted for any facility or non-user-application problems noted during load checkout using the electronic web-based DRTS system (see FCOH SOP 1.14 and/or DPS CHB SCP 2.8). For problems with user applications, notify both the DPS DTR and the DTR of whatever group owns the application.
 - 2. Place a copy of all ARs written in the appropriate FCR and MPSR datapack.

3.A copy of the AR will automatically be E-mailed to the DF32 DTR.

TITLE

GPC MEMORY MAPS

PURPOSE

This SCP outlines the steps required to be able to determine the protection status of any GPC memory location and whether it is located in system software, major function base, or the OPS application software.

DESCRIPTION

In order to determine the status of a GPC memory location, the following are required:

- 1. Mass Memory Unit Program Release Notice (MMU PRN), USA003395 (OIXX) (located on-line only)
- 2. Flight specific CD ROM (PASS, BFS, MMU), containing the Mass Memory Build flight software

First, determine the phase for the OPS overlay, major function base, and system software for the memory configuration under consideration. This can be determined from the PASS Phase Number Summary for Mass Memory Phase Table (Figure 6.5-1), located in the MMU PRN. Be sure that the MMU PRN corresponds to the OI release for the load being used.

The Mass Memory Build Program –Phase Tabl e (Figure 6.5-2), located on the flight specific MMU Build CD ROM, describes all the MMU phase and load blocks, the starting and ending GPC memory address of each load block, and the protection status of each load block.

Because of the multiple overlays of memory that may occur; i.e., a portion of the SSW may be overlayed by the OPS overlay, it is necessary to check the phases in the order opposite of which they were loaded.

To determine the status of a memory location, first determine the phase(s) of the OPS overlay of interest via the phase number summary table (if the overlay has an A and B section, start with the phase for Section B first). Find this phase number in the Mass Memory Build Progam table and determine if the address exists within any of the load blocks. If it does, the location contains code/data belonging to this phase, and the storage status can be read directly from the table (under the "PROTECT STATUS" column). If the address does not exist in the OPS overlay phase, determine the phase of the major function base. Find this phase in the table and determine if the address exists in one of the load blocks. If the address isn't part of the major function base, determine the phase of the system software and then determine if the address exists in that phase. If the address does not exist at the SSW level, this location is not used in this memory configuration.

TITLE

EMERGENCY MISSION CONTROL CENTER (EMCC)

PURPOSE

This SCP provides a summary of the DPS responsibilities in executing the Emergency Mission Control Center (EMCC) procedures during a shuttle mission.

REFERENCES

The EMCC procedures are documented in the Space Shuttle Program Emergency Mission Control Center Activation and Operations Procedure document (ref. 534-CAP-EMCC, dated July 1992) published by the Goddard Space Flight Center in Greenbelt, Maryland.

BACKGROUND

The EMCC is located in the Launch Control Complex (LCC) at Kennedy Space Center (KSC) in Florida. The EMCC requirements were established as a contingency plan to protect against any incident which may jeopardize a space shuttle flight because the JSC Mission Control Center (MCC) cannot support the flight. These requirements were implemented with the philosophy of providing a safe flight termination capability to the primary or secondary landing site. The EMCC serves as a backup to the JSC MCC for Space Shuttle Program (SSP) or shuttle orbit and/or deorbit operations. However, it must be emphasized that the EMCC is in no way supposed to replace the JSC MCC because of its limited capabilities. It is believed that EMCC activation can occur at KSC approximately 6 hours from declaration of requirement for EMCC.

Early in the SSP, EMCC capabilities were very limited in that only crew communications were available. Flight controller support was limited to providing inputs to the crew on system monitoring based on system status reports from the crew itself. The development of the real-time data system (RTDS) as part of the INCO project then provided the SSP with the ability to monitor/process an extremely limited amount of orbiter system data compared to the MCC capabilities. At the time of the RTDS phase of the EMCC, the intent was to provide the crew the ability to consult with the flight controllers (located at NASA White Sands Test Facility ground terminal in New Mexico) on orbiter system management as required. The crew had the necessary Flight Data File (FDF) onboard to perform proper system management, including failure recovery.

At present, the EMCC has been relocated to KSC and uses the existing launch processing system (LPS). Since the purpose of EMCC is to provide the ability to terminate a space shuttle flight safely, the EMCC will be initially manned by flight controllers with deorbit/entry experience (the ascent/entry team for the particular flight if available). Depending on the on-orbit stay time after loss of the MCC, additional flight controllers may be needed at KSC for support of the flight.

DESCRIPTION

For each space shuttle flight, the ascent/entry FCR operator will serve as the EMCC operator in case of necessary activation. In the event that this person is not available, any other FCR operator assigned to the flight may be required to support EMCC activation. Therefore, it is the responsibility of all FCR operators assigned to the flight to familiarize themselves with the guidelines and procedures of the EMCC as contained in the 534-EMC-CAP document.

The LPS is flexible enough to allow for most monitoring capabilities required to support orbiter systems. However, payload activity (i.e., CDMS) will not be supported at the EMCC and, therefore, no documentation in these areas will be available.

A summary of the DPS EMCC guidelines is as follows:

- A. Review the three DPS EMCC binders which contain the DPS Console Handbook, the DPS Systems Brief, and the DPS EMCC Data Book. These binders are located to the left of the FDF in room 1010. The EMCC Data Book contains the following:
 - 1. The EMCC Activation and Operations Procedure, 534-CAP-EMCC.
 - 2. MRAS: A copy of the RASS for the PASS preflight approved and verified GMEMs.
 - 3. EO's: A copy of the RASS's for the BFS preflight approved and verified GMEMs.
 - 4. A copy of the MDM Channelization sheets.
 - 5. A copy of the DPS directory.
 - 6. Copies of the DPS SSSH systems drawings.


It is the responsibility of the DPS EMCC person to ensure that all the documentation is up to date for each flight. The person supporting the EMCC is responsible for transporting these binders to KSC. Other documentation, such as the mission FDF and Flight Rules, is the responsibility of the Flight Director's office and ground controller (GC).

- B. The office copy of the DPS Datapack will also need to be transported to KSC by the person supporting the EMCC.
- C. Review the LPS procedures. In the event of EMCC activation, personnel from KSC will be present to assist in the operation of the consoles and to answer any questions regarding the system.
- D. The EMCC operator will be provided a headset upon arrival at KSC.

EMCC ACTIVATION

The timeline below shows the expected sequence of events. Keep in mind that this example assumes the EMCC operator has prepared his/her personal items (one small soft-sided gym bag containing toiletries and a change of clothes, not to exceed 12 lb) ahead of time and is easily reached via telephone/beeper.



*These times are estimates only. Contact MCC for exact times.

EMCC OPERATION

The DPS operator deployed on the EMCC team will be operating in a very different environment. Thus, the following section contains some reminders and hints regarding the EMCC environment in which the DPS operator will be expected to operate.

- A. The EMCC does support command capability. See Section 4.10 of the 534-CAP-EMCC document for details. Commands must be entered by hex word.
- B. FDF books will be taken care of already; don't worry about them.
- C. The LCC uses a reconfigurable voice loop system. The console to be used by DPS will be set up in the following manner. Loops can be repatched by technicians upon request. KSC will supply headsets, and any additional information can be found in Section 3.4 of the 534-CAP-EMCC document.

D. There are several DPS-related displays available at KSC. A printer located at each console provides quick generation of hardcopies when required. There is also the capability to select specific MSIDs and to view them individually or in a group (DMON option). Personnel from KSC will be available to assist with display activation and operation.

TITLE

VCR RECORD/PLAYBACK PROCEDURES

PURPOSE

This procedure provides the ability to record and/or playback flight data.

PROCEDURE

A. Record

WARNING

Recording Sim data will use a significant amount of disk space allotted to DPS. Coordinate recording sessions with the group administrator (GA) to ensure that enough disk space is available for resultant files.

- 1. Login (Use a backroom console position).
 - a. Select the activity for the current sim activity. When selecting the activity not the type; i.e. SIM, MIS, or TST.
 - b. Configure the MCC workstation as you normally would, starting all relevant DPS applications. Verify that sim data is displayed.
- 2. Start the VCR application (DPS DNAV || Global Apps | Telemetry VCR)
 - a. Define the record file (File | Select File / Device.).
 - i. Select the dps/VCR-DATA directory and hit the Filter button. Specify the new file name in the "Enter filename" field at the end of the display directory path, and select OK.
 - b. Configure VCR (Stream | Select Stream)
 - i. Select "PTM" for standard downlist data or "NDM" for Gdump/DOLILU data stream.
 - ii. Select "RT" for Data type
 - iii. Under "Other Options" verify that the program and activity type match those noted in step 1.a.

- iv. Select OK
- v. Select OK
- 3. Record simulation data
 - a. Press record button "REC" and verify that Cycle & Time fields begin to increment. Verify that the time stamp matches the sim time.
 - b. Press Stop button to stop data recording.
- 4. Quit Telemetry VCR application (File | Quit).
- 5. Use the VCR playback procedures to play recorded data.

When recorded files are no longer needed, coordinate with the GA to archive the recorded data files on a cd-rom disk. This will free up the allotted disk space for other DPS VCR activities and prevent the inadvertent deletion of important VCR files.

B. Playback

- 1. Login (Use a backroom console position).
 - Select an activity that does not have the same flight number as the current sim activity. When selecting the activity not the type; i.e. SIM, MIS, or TST.
 - b. Using Autopanal (DPS DNAV || Global Apps | Autopanel) deregister DPS affiliations by selecting one DPS affiliation with the right mouse button, and selecting "Deregister Affiliation". In the menu, select Refresh | Now. Note any remaining DPS affiliations and repeat as necessary. (Note: DO NOT DEREGISTER any other affiliation types).
- 2. Start VCR application (DPS DNAV || Global Apps | Telemetry VCR)
 - a. Select file (File | Select File / Device.).
 - i. Under the dps/VCR-DATA directory select a VCR data file. The following files are examples of VCR data files:

- MedsILC1.record
- MedsILC3.record
- MedsAsc1998-06-18-Run3
- b. Configure VCR (Stream | Select Stream)
 - i. Select "PTM" for standard downlist data or "NDM" for Gdump/DOLILU data stream. (It is important to match the data stream for the specified file selected in step 2.a.i).
 - ii. Select "RT" for Data type.
 - iii. Under "Other Options" verify that the program and activity type match those in step 1.a.
 - iv. Select OK
 - v. Select OK
- c. Press the play button and verify that Cycle and Time fields start to increment.
- 3. Start local DPS Servers (DPS DNAV || Config | Initialize DPS)
 - a. Select "yes" at the Alert Popup window. Note: Allow several minutes for all servers to start up.
- 4. Start DPS applications as you normally would.

TITLE

PROCEDURE FOR EARLY SM ACTIVATION

PURPOSE

To provide a procedure to obtain an alternative method of opening the Payload Bay Doors in case of a BFS failure.

BACKGROUND

In a situation where the FES has failed and the BFS is unavailable (failed) to open the Payload Bay Doors, the SM GPC may be utilized. The following procedure will bring up an SM GPC prior to its normal activation during Post Insertion. Since running PASS OPS 1 and SM OPS 2 is not a certified configuration, we would only activate the SM early for a time critical situation. Current procedures have us attempt to recover the BFS by re-IPLing the BFS function into the same GPC. However, in the case that the BFS is unrecoverable there may not be enough time to do this as well as re-IPL the BFS into another GPC. In this case you may choose to bring up an early SM or try an initial re-IPL of the BFS into another GPC.

TITLE

COMMAND LOAD GUIDE AND LOAD MANAGER APPLICATION (Command Server)

PURPOSE

This procedure presents an overview of the uplink command services used by DPS. In addition, this procedure provides detailed guidelines for using the Load Manager software application.

RESTRICTIONS/CONSTRAINTS CMD CR# <u>Baseline</u> Date: <u>09/30/98</u>

Restrictions and constraints are noted in the SCP of the specific command load. Additionally, pertinent information for all command loads will be appropriately logged upon uplink in order to maintain tracking information and configuration control.

DPS UPLINK COMMANDING

A. Orbiter Two-Stage Uplink Command Overview

All DPS uplink commands are classified as Orbiter two-stage uplink load commands. A two-stage command is uplinked from the MCC and is stored in a two-stage buffer in the onboard software. The contents of the two-stage buffer are executed only when the onboard software receives an EXEC command from the MCC. The EXEC command will be uplinked after the command load has been successfully downlinked by the Orbiter and verified by the MCC. The MCC will compare the contents of the two-stage buffer with the original command load and issue the EXEC command only if the contents of the two-stage buffer and the command load are identical.

Each two-stage command consists of 1 to 33 forty eight-bit command words. The first 16 bits of each command word are supplied by the MCC uplink software and are described below. The remaining 32 bits (divided into two 16-bit half words) are specific to the function of the command and are described in the SCP of the specific command load. The onboard software stores the initial 16 bits of the first command word and both 16-bit half-words of each remaining command word up to a maximum of 67 half words (i.e., 33 command words) in the two-stage buffer. The first 16 bits of all but the first command word are discarded by the onboard software. The 67 half words actually used by the onboard software to process the command are identical to the command words exhibited in the MCC on the Command Data Words display. Note that the first command word displayed is incomplete because the MCC uplink software does not complete these 16 bits until the command is uplinked. For further information on Orbiter uplink commanding and command load composition, reference the Downlist/Uplink Software Requirements document (CPDS - SS-P-0002-140).

The first 16 bits of each 48 bit command word are identical and have the following format:

Bits 1-3	Vehicle ID (see description below)
Bits 4-7	Major Function (see description below)
Bits 8-14	OP Code specific for each load type
Bit 15	Set to 1 if first command word
*Bit 16	Set to 1 if last command word

* Uplink software shall not process the two-stage buffer upon receipt of the bufferexecute command unless the last command word indicator has been received for the load residing in the two-stage buffer. An attempt to execute the two-stage buffer without the last command word indicator shall be rejected and an error indicator shall be set.

B. Orbiter Uplink Command Access Controls

The crew has two methods of controlling ground uplink commands: the uplink block switch on panel C3 and the uplink control logic on SPEC 1 (DPS UTILITY). The uplink block switch is a three-position switch: The 'NSP BLOCK' position blocks all commands at the NSP. The 'GPC BLOCK' position blocks all commands at the GPC, and the 'ENABLE' position allows all commands to be processed. The uplink control logic on SPEC 1 is controlled by three item numbers as long as the uplink block switch is in the 'ENABLE' position: AUTO (ITEM 35) allows all commands to be processed when AOS and no commands to be processed when LOS, ENA (ITEM 36) allows all commands to be processed both LOS and AOS, and INH (ITEM 37) inhibits all PASS commands (BFS commands will be processed). During ascent and entry, the crew can control uplink command access by selecting the ENABLE switch position when AOS and the GPC BLOCK position when LOS. During orbit operations, the uplink block switch is placed in the ENABLE position, ITEM 35 (AUTO) is selected on SPEC 1, and the SM software site-in-view flag is allowed to control uplink command access for AOS-LOS. This information is relayed to the other GPCs in the common set over the ICC buses. If the SM GPC fails during LOS when in this configuration, no PASS commands will be processed. The crew must call up SPEC 1 on a GNC GPC and select ENA (ITEM 36) to correct the situation. During simulation startup, when data are forced during LOS to complete initialization, ITEM 36 (ENA) must be selected on SPEC 1 with the uplink block switch in ENABLE before commands will be processed onboard.

GENERAL COMMAND LOAD BUILD INFORMATION

The following table lists each type of command load or command function for which DPS is responsible. Included in the table are the DSM Numbers used for each load; the Command Application used to build the load and verify the Directive; and the OPS that support the uplink of the load. See the appropriate command SCP in Section 7 for detailed information regarding a specific command load.

Command legality tables in the PASS and BFS are based on Memory Configuration and OPS, respectively. Therefore, the resident OPS software determines the legality of uplink OP Codes in a PASS OPS 0 GPC. For example, the GMEM OP Code is not legal in an OPS 0 GPC with G3 resident.

COMMAND LOAD VERIFICATION AND MANAGEMENT

Each individual command load is uniquely built using specific instructions provided in the applicable SCP based on the command function. Each load is verified via command server feedback information built into the program application logic and provided at the bottom of the each command display. Detailed verification procedures for each load type/function can be found in corresponding verification procedure in the corresponding SCP.

The following applications are useful when building and uplinking DPS command loads and are described in subsequent sections.

LOAD MANAGER

The Load Manager command application provides the capability to manage DPS Command Loads using operations such as 'Delete', 'Copy', 'Chain' and 'Unchain'. DPS command loads built using Variable Parameters, DEU Equivalent, GMEM, MDM BITE Read, MMU OPS, and Spacelab command loads are available for load management.

When started, Load Manager will default to the flight that was selected during activity selection. Load Manager will default to 'XXX' if an Activity was not selected. The flight version is either 'recon 1' or 'final' and isderived from the 'flightlist' file. Load Manager will default to the 'final' version if both 'recon 1' and 'final' versions exist for a flight in the 'flightlist' file. The flight can always be changed using Load Manager's 'Modify Flight List' option (described below). The 'flightlist' file resides in the path:

/users/dps/rw_common/cmdo and is limited to a twenty flight maximum. The format of the 'flightlist' file is: 'XXX Y', where XXX is the flight number (i.e., 075), and Y is the version (i.e., '1' - recon 1, or 'f' - final or one-cycle-to-flight).

A. Primary Display

<u>File</u> - a pulldown menu that contains an Exit option that closes the Load Manager application.

Help - a pulldown menu that contains a Help file.

<u>Modify Flight List</u> - a button that activates Add, Delete, and Modify flight list functions.

File Manager - a button that activates Copy and Delete file management services.

<u>Delete Load (CMDSVR)</u> - a button that activates a Delete Load from Command Server function. This button will be disabled if no DPS/CDMS command loads exist in the command server.

<u>Chain/Unchain Loads</u> - a button that activates command load chaining and Unchaining functions. This button will be disabled if no DPS command loads exist in the command server.

<u>Advisory Window</u> - displays user messages. In addition, this window displays the actual command text of a load sent to the command server. The maximum number of messages that can be displayed is 500. A scroll bar allows for scrolling of messages. The oldest message is removed from the list when the limit is reached. The right mouse button can be used to activate a pulldown menu that contains a Clear List option. Selection of 'Clear List' will clear the advisory area of all user messages. There is no capability to save advisory messages.

B. Modify Flight List

The Modify Flight List function provides the capability to add, delete, or modify flights in the 'flightlist' file. The 'flightlist' file is used by all DPS command applications (i.e., Variable Parameters, DEU Equivalent, GMEM, etc.) to maintain the association between flights and DPS command loads.

Adding a Flight - 1) select the Add button, 2) type the flight in the text box in the correct format, 3) Select the OK button to add the flight to the flightlist file and close the Modify Flight List window. The scroll bar may have to be used to view the flight. The correct format for the flight is 'XXX Y', where XXX is the flight number (i.e., 075), and Y is the version (i.e., '1' - recon 1, or 'f' - final or one-cycle-to-flight).

<u>Deleting a Flight</u> - 1) select the flight in the list, 2) select the Delete button, 3) select the OK button to delete the flight from the 'flightlist' file and close the Modify Flight List window.

<u>Modifying a Flight</u> - 1) select the flight in the list, 2) delete the flight from the list, 3) add the flight back in the list in the text box with the desired nomenclature and click the OK button to add it.

Exiting the Modify Flight List Function - selecting the Cancel button will cancel any operation and close the Modify Flight List window.

C. File Manager

The File Manager function provides the capability to delete DPS command load files from the workstation and copy DPS command load files from one flight to another.

The default flight displayed in the 'From' list is always the currently selected activity. The default flight displayed in the 'To' list is generally the first flight in the *flightlist* file. However, if the currently selected activity is last in the *flightlist* file, the default flight displayed for the 'To' list will be the previous flight in the *flightlist* file.

Files in the 'From' list that are preceded with an asterisk are prebuilt commands. For a command to be marked as prebuilt, it must be listed in the *reqlist.y.xxx* file. Prebuilt commands are generally VPs and DEU Equivalents that are supported for every flight.

<u>Copying Command Loads from One Flight to Another</u> - 1) select a flight in the 'From' menu, 2) select a flight in the 'To'menu, 3) select the command load file(s) to be copied in the 'From' list, 4) select the 'Copy' button, 5) Answer 'Yes' when prompted to confirm the copy operation.

Note: Flight Software addresses are not copied for PASS and BFS VPs. However, command attributes for other DPS Command Applications (DEU Equivalent, MDM BITE Read, GMEM, and TMBU) are copied in their entirety.

Exiting the File Manager Operation - Selecting the Done button will exit the File Manager Operation.

D. Delete Load (CMDSVR)

The Delete Load (CMDSVR) function provides the capability to delete DPS command loads form the Command Server. This function will be disabled if no DPS command loads exist in the Command Server.

<u>Deleting Load(s) from Command Server</u> - 1) select the desired DSM from the list or type in the first few digits of the DSM number and select filter to narrow down the list and then select the desired DSM 2) select the 'Delete' button, 3) answer yes when prompted to confirm the delete operation.

Exiting the Delete Command Operation - select the 'Done' button will exit the delete comand operation.

Note: Loads displayed in the list that are preceded with an asterisk are prebuilt commands. For a command to be marked as prebuilt, it must be listed in the *reqlist.y.xxx* file. Prebuilt commands are generally VPs and DEU Equivalents that are supported for every flight.

E. Chain/Unchain Loads

The Chain/Unchain Loads function provides the capability to chain (group) together a series of up to ten DPS command loads for automatic sequential uplink. When uplinking chained loads, only the first DSM number in the sequence has to be entered for uplink by INCO, all of the other loads in the sequence will be uplinked automatically in the order they are chained. This function also provides the capability to unchain loads that have been previously chained. Chain/Unchain will be disabled if no DPS command loads exist in the Command Server. Whenever uplinking chained loads, you must inform INCO that the loads are chained.

<u>Chaining Command Loads</u> - 1) enter the first three digits of the DSM load class in the text box, 2) select the 'OK' button, 3) select the command load(s) you wish to unchain in the Unchain window, 4) select the 'Chain' button, 5) answer yes when prompted to verify the chain operation. The chained loads will appear in the Chain window.

<u>Unchaining Command Loads</u> - 1) enter the first three digits of the DSM load class in the text box, 2) select the 'OK' button, 3) select the command load(s) you wish to unchain in the Chain window, 4) select the 'Unchain' button, 5) answer yes when prompted to confirm the unchain operation.

<u>Clearing The Load Class</u> - selecting the 'Clear' button will clear the selected load class. The load class can also be cleared by backspacing over the digits.

CMD NDX - provides a sequential number for reference to each command event.

GMT Start/Complete - shows the starting and ending GMT of the event.

MF - indicates a designated software major function or GPC ID destination of the command uplink (SM, GNC, or BFS).

DSM - DSM number of the command load being uplinked.

Command Title - itle of the uplinked command.

COMP Result - provides completion status of the command event, which will be COMP, TSLO, DREJ, TMRJ, or SAFE.

- A. COMP a two-stage buffer compare complete with no error.
- B. TSLO a two-stage load was transmitted while the two-stage buffer was busy processing a previous load. Operator must clear the buffer before continuing.
- C. DREJ a data reject has occurred. This can happen when the uplink and downlink do not compare for a specific load (first word must compare).
- D. TMRJ a telemetry reject has occurred. This can happen when no telemetry downlink is available to compare against uplinked load (e.g., load sent at LOS or TFL does not have required downlist).
- E. SAFE an attempt was made to uplink a safed load.

CAP - shows the site capability status. This will be VAL, GDR, NVL or N/A.

- MF A specific major function or GPC indicator in the MF/GPC column restricts the load from being sent to any other major function or GPC. A zero in this column allows the load to be sent to any major function/GPC. In general, loads built real time should show a zero in this column.

This display no longer displays the chaining status of each load in the inventory. However, the user can refer to the CHAINED LOAD INVENTORY display, which will display the DSM group (XXX) and each sequence number (YY) included in the chain (if applicable).




Figure 7.1G-11. Command Data Words Application

# TITLE

GMEM READ/WRITE IMPLEMENTATION (Command Server)

#### PURPOSE

To provide the DPS and DPS SPT operators with the information necessary to process any GPC Memory (GMEM) read or write request.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

Contiguous and scatter GMEM writes are legal in all BFS memory configurations and in some PASS configurations (see RESTRICTIONS/CONSTRAINTS A.1). Each contiguous load is limited to 64 addresses, whereas each scatter load is limited to 32 addresses. Alternate methods of changing GPC memory include DEU equivalent writes (available in all PASS memory configurations - see SCP 7.3) and crew keyboard inputs to SPEC 0 (both PASS and BFS).

The following three options are available when altering the GPC main memory via a contiguous or scatter load:

For DATA areas of memory only

A. Bit Set

All bit positions in the uplink data word (mask word) that are set to 1 will be set to 1 onboard; all other positions are unaffected.

B. Bit reset

All bit positions in the uplink data word (mask word) that are set to 1 will be set to 0 onboard; all other positions are unaffected.

- For DATA or CODE areas of memory
- C. Load

The onboard data will be replaced bit for bit with the uplinked data half word. Note that this is the only option which can be used for changing areas of code.

The contents of a contiguous GMEM write must be located in the same sector of memory. A scatter GMEM write can be implemented across boundaries of sectors 0/1, 2/3, etc., but is not done for reasons of consistency. That is, contiguous and scatter GMEM writes are both built without crossing sector address boundaries. The technical reason why contiguous loads are built in this manner is due to the way in which command words (CW) 2 and 3 are built. CW 2 contains the Most Significant Bit (MSB) of the starting address for the GMEM. CW 3 and all subsequent command words contain the lower 16 bits of the GMEM write address. Hence, GMEM writes cannot

cross boundaries where the MSB of the GMEM write address would change (refer to Downlist/Uplink CPDS, Section 6).

A Release Authorization Document (RAD) is the official paperwork which authorizes the use of a PASS GMEM write. An Engineering Order (EO) is the equivalent, but for a BFS GMEM write. For a preflight approved and verified GMEM, a Release Authorization Signature Sheet (RASS) will be attached to the front of the GMEM paperwork stating that the GMEM has been approved by the Shuttle Avionics Software Control Board (SASCB). The paperwork for all preflight approved and verified GMEMs will be placed on console in the DPS Datapack binder prior to each flight.

IF THE NEED FOR A GMEM ARISES DURING FLIGHT, UNITED SPACE ALLIANCE (PASS)/BOEING (BFS) WILL PROVIDE A COPY OF THE RAD/EO TO THE MCC VIA A CHIT. FOR THESE TYPES OF GMEMS, THERE WILL NOT BE A RASS.

The policy for implementation of GMEM writes was initially established for STS-1. The policy which was adopted at that time is outlined in two memos. The first memo was written by DF22/ Darrell Stamper for the Systems Division Chief, M.P. Frank, on March 23, 1981. The second memo was approved by the Orbiter Avionics Systems Manager, Arnold D. Aldrich, on April 6, 1981. The substance of these memos was incorporated into Flight Rules A2.1.3-12 and A7.1.3-6.

On May 19, 1988, a memo from WA/R.W. Moorehead substantially modified the GMEM write implementation process. This memo affected Flight Rule A7.1.3-6 and the preflight-approved GMEM Section 3.3.3 of the FCOH.

C. Vehicle, LRU/Hardware Version Constraints

- D. Time Constraints, Crew Coordination Requirements
  - 1. Crew should be cognizant of GMEM write use and avoid keyboard entries and switch throws where practical. Time constraint varies with each GMEM write but most are not time critical.
  - 2. The preferred method of GMEM implementation is ground uplink. However, if the GMEM is part of a verified procedure contained in the crew's books, it is acceptable to allow the crew to implement the GMEM via keyboard entry.

E. Hazard/Safety Implications

GMEMs transmitted to the Command Server should be safed when not in use and deleted when no longer needed to prevent inadvertent uplink. To safe loads, refer to FCOH 3.1.4. To delete loads, reference the Load Manager Users Guide, SCP7.1.

- F. Other Requirements
  - 1. If a GPC is IPL'ed, it will lose all previous GMEM write updates unless the original GMEM was applied to the mass memory.
  - 2. An OPS transition will overwrite a GMEM applied to an OPS overlay.
  - 3. A major function reassignment will overwrite a GMEM applied to a major function base.
  - 4. The only way to overwrite a GMEM applied to system software is via a backout GMEM or an IPL. In general, a GMEM write to system software should be sent to all major functions GNC, SM, PL/OPS 0, and any freeze dried computers.
  - 5. A GMEM write to protected memory locations will also require a change to the affected load block checksum. The new checksum value must be requested at the same time that the needed write operation is submitted. The following two areas of concern must be addressed:
    - a. If the change is being made to applications in the GNC major function base (MFB) or OPS overlay and the checksum is not updated, an attempt to add a subsequent GPC to the redundant set will cause the new GPC to fail the MFB or OPS overlay transaction.
    - b. If the change is being made to the systems software, a newly IPL'ed GPC must also receive the code and checksum change in order to be compatible with the operating common set.
  - 6. All GMEM write procedures must have completed a software development level verification and a crew procedural verification before the write procedure can be implemented. Verification may be performed preflight or real time depending on the status of the memory write procedure.
  - 7. For BFS GMEMs, BFS must be tracking PASS.
  - 8. A PASS GMEM can be performed on addresses 00000-7FFFF. BFS GMEM addresses are currently restricted to 00000-3FFFF. BFS will have upper address GMEM capability implemented in the future.

#### **PROCEDURE - GMEM READ**

- A. The FCOH procedure 3.3.3 on GPC Memory Read/Writes explains how to coordinate a real-time GMEM <u>read</u> with other flight controllers using the R/T Memory Read Worksheets.
- B. Requesting discipline fills out the R/T Memory Read Worksheet (see FORMS R/T Memory Read Worksheet) in triplicate.
- C. The requesting discipline sends the original and one copy of the form to DPS SPT and retains the other.
- D. DPS SPT verifies the form and coordinates any changes with the requesting discipline as required.
- E. If more than six locations are to be read out, DPS SPT will recommend that either a variable parameter request (SCP 7.6 and 7.7) or a GPC dump (SCP 6.1) be done. The reason for this is that there are only six locations on SPEC 0 that can be used at one time. It may be more efficient use of the crew's time to pursue the alternative methods.
- F. DPS SPT prepares an electronic flight note to be eventually routed (FD, CAPCOM, FAO, requesting discipline, DPS, and DPS SPT) via the MOD MCCPC application explaining the purpose of the GMEM read, the desired results, the memory locations, whether any scaling/conversion is required, and specific item entries on SPEC 0.
- G. DPS SPT notifies DPS of the existence of the flight note and forwards a copy of the associated R/T Memory Read Worksheet to DPS for review.
- H. DPS reviews the work, provides any additional inputs and initiates the flight note to FD, CAPCOM, FAO, and the requesting discipline.
- I. DPS and the requesting discipline coordinate with FD an appropriate time to perform the GMEM read.
- J. If crew interface is desired for implementation of the GMEM, DPS and DPS SPT verify that CAPCOM reads up the correct information and then records what the crew reads back down for the memory location values.
- K. Otherwise, DPS coordinates the uplink of the GMEM with INCO upon the Flight Directors approval.

# **PROCEDURE - PREFLIGHT APPROVED GMEM WRITE**

#### CAUTION

This procedure is SAFETY CRITICAL. The improper address value or data code bit specification can cause improper operation of the DPS system that could be a potential hazard to personnel and equipment.

- A. DPS and the requesting discipline compare the present conditions with those conditions listed in the RAD for PASS or the EO for BFS. These will be contained in the DPS Datapack binder on console for reference.
- B. If the present conditions are not the same as those outlined in the MRAS or EO, then the GMEM is considered a real-time GMEM and not preflight-approved. Go to the PROCEDURE REAL-TIME GMEM WRITE for processing of real-time GMEMs. The following are examples of conditions which will require recertification:
  - 1. The GMEM write is to be used in any GPC memory configuration to which any memory alteration procedure has already been invoked and is still active (i.e., another GMEM has already been implemented).
  - 2. A hardware failure has occurred, other than the conditions explicitly defined in the original GMEM request, which impacts the area for which the GMEM is being implemented.
  - 3. The same GMEM write has been entered once and has not been nullified by an approved backout technique. Examples of approved backout techniques are OPS transitions, changing the major function, re-IPL'ing the GPC, implementing an approved and verified GMEM write which cancels the initial GMEM, etc.
  - 4. The original GMEM write request contained specific numerical values as data entries, and a change in the data values is necessary, or if numerical values are necessary data entries and none were specified in the original write request.
- C. Although preflight-approved GMEMs have already been verified, they will be reverified prior to uplinking if there is time to do so. It is the DPS section's philosophy to only prebuild GMEMs which are considered time critical. If the GMEM is not time critical, it more than likely will not be prebuilt.

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- D. For noncritical timeframes, the requesting discipline will initiate a CHIT requesting that the preflight-approved GMEM be reverified prior to uplink. The CHIT should contain the appropriate MRAS (PASS) or EO (BFS) number.
- E. The procedure for implementing a GMEM is: (1) verify that the contents of the memory locations to be changed are as expected via a variable parameter request, a GPC dump, or by crew readout, (2) implement the GMEM, and (3) verify that the contents of the memory addresses have changed to their desired value. A VP will be used if the memory locations are in sector 0 or 1 and if there are less than 10 locations. A partial GPC dump will be done if the first and last memory addresses are within 511 (decimal) of each other. If none of these apply, a full GPC dump will have to be done.
- F. DPS SPT builds the GMEM load and associated VP load using the GMEM application according to the specifications contained in the MRAS or EO and transmits the load to the Command Server (see BUILD LOAD section). They will also build the VP load (see SCP 7.6) if required and send it to the Command Server as well. DPS SPT will safe all loads per FCOH procedure 3.1.
  - 1. Code addresses are protected and data addresses (data, bit set, and bit reset options) are unprotected; i.e for data, bit set or bit reset options, uprotected should be selected. Likewise for the code option, protected should be selected.
  - 2. For contiguous loads, bit set and bit reset operations are limited by uplink software to one address. However, multiple bit set or bit reset options can be accomplished to sequential addresses using the scatter option.
  - 3. Only the load option can be used for changes to code (protected memory).
  - 4. For GMEMs that are one-half word in length, either a scatter or contiguous GMEM load can be utilized.
- G. DPS and the requesting discipline will then verify the loads in the Command Server using the bottom portion of the GMEM application. See the section on Verification of GMEM Loads for further details.
- H. Once load verification is complete, the requesting discipline will send a flight note to FD, CAPCOM, FAO, DPS, and INCO requesting uplink of the GMEM. If this is a non-time critical GMEM, this action will be delayed until the GMEM has been successfully reverified. The flight note should contain intent, rationale, method of implementation, the DSM number and the GPC/MF as a minimum.

- I. On FD GO, DPS SPT will unsafe the required loads and then DPS will coordinate with INCO on the INCO loop the uplink of the GMEM and a VP, if necessary. DPS will tell INCO the DSM number, the GPC/MF, and that FD has given a GO. If more than one load is required, DPS will give INCO an individual GO on each load. DPS SPT will monitor this conversation and verify all information is correct.
- J. DPS and DPS SPT will verify that all loads were sent to the right GPC/MF and that they successfully made it onboard by using the Command Tracking application.
- K. DPS informs FD and the requesting discipline that the GMEM is onboard.
- L. The requesting discipline is responsible for verifying that the GMEM was successful and will notify FD accordingly.
- M. As soon as practical after uplink, DPS informs MER that the GMEM has been implemented.
- N. If there was no time to reverify the preflight-approved GMEM, then the requesting discipline will initiate a CHIT after the uplink of the GMEM is complete to formally document what was done and why.

### **PROCEDURE - REAL-TIME GMEM WRITE**

#### CAUTION

This procedure is SAFETY CRITICAL. The improper address value or data code bit specification can cause improper operation of the DPS system that could be a potential hazard to personnel and equipment.

- A. Any GMEM that has not been verified preflight is considered a real-time GMEM and must be verified prior to uplink. This includes any preflight-approved GMEMs which do not exactly meet the conditions outlined in the MRAS (PASS) or EO (BFS).
- B. The requesting discipline fills out one set of the R/T Memory Write Worksheet (see FORMS REAL-TIME MEMORY WRITE) along with a CHIT. Separate forms should be submitted if similar GMEM writes are desired to both PASS and BFS.


C. DPS verifies that the forms are filled out correctly and coordinates any changes with the requesting discipline if necessary. DPS also fills in Section VII, Applicable Configurations. Examples of applicable configurations are:

D. If the use of any special memory configurations is required to implement the GMEM, DPS generates a procedure to accommodate such actions using the known write operation restrictions defined in the CHIT. This procedure should contain information on any necessary OPS transitions, the write operation itself, and with the direct assistance of the initiator, any necessary subsystem actions.

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#### SHUTTLE OPS DPS/JSC-18819

- E. DPS returns the original copy of the worksheets to the requesting discipline and keeps two copies (one for DPS and one for DPS SPT).
- F. The requesting discipline submits the worksheets along with a CHIT to MER requesting that the GMEM be developed and verified.
- G. Once the GMEM has been developed and verified, MOIR will send copies of the CHIT authorizing the GMEM as well as the actual RASS to the requesting discipline, DPS, and DPS SPT.
- H. The procedure for implementing GMEMs is: (1) verify that the contents of the memory locations to be changed are as expected via a variable parameter request, a GPC dump, or by crew read out, (2) implement the GMEM, and (3) verify that the contents of the memory addresses have changed to their desired value. A VP will be used if the memory locations are in sector 0 or 1 and if there are less that 10 locations. A partial GPC dump will be done if the first and last memory addresses are within 511 (decimal) of each other (the display shows 512 contiguous memory addresses). If none of these apply, a full GPC dump will have to be done.
- DPS SPT builds the GMEM load using the GMEM application according to the specifications contained in the CHIT and transmits the load to the Command Server (see BUILD LOAD section). They will also build the VP load (see SCP 7.6) if required and send it to the Command Server as well. DPS SPT will safe all loads per FCOH procedure 3.1.
  - 1. Code addresses are protected and data addresses are unprotected; i.e., for load, bit set or bit reset options, unprotected should be selected. Likewise, for the code option, protected should be selected.
  - 2. For contiguous loads, bit set and bit reset operations are limited by uplink software to one address. However, multiple bit set or bit reset options can be accomplished to sequential addresses using the scatter option.
  - 3. Only the load option can be used for changes to code (protected memory).
- J. DPS and the requesting discipline will then verify the loads in the Command Server using the bottom portion of the GMEM application. See the section on Verification of GMEM Loads for further details.
- K. DPS and the requesting discipline, with the assistance of FAO, generate the required crew procedures necessary to make the GMEM execute correctly.
- L. The requesting discipline will provide a flight note to FD, CAPCOM, DPS, FAO, and INCO stating the objective of the GMEM and the method of implementation. The flight note should contain the DSM number and GPC/MF as a minimum.

- M. On FD GO, DPS will coordinate with INCO on the INCO loop the uplink of the GMEM and VP, if necessary. DPS will tell INCO the DSM number, the major function, and that FD has given a GO. If more than one load is required, DPS will give INCO an individual GO on each load. DPS SPT will monitor this conversation and verify all information is correct.
- N. DPS and DPS SPT will verify that all loads were sent to the right GPC and that they successfully made it onboard by using the Command Tracking display.
- O. DPS informs FD and the requesting discipline that the GMEM is onboard.
- P. The requesting discipline is responsible for verifying that the GMEM was completed and will notify the FD accordingly.
- Q. As soon as practical after uplink, DPS informs MER that the GMEM has been implemented.

# **BUILD LOADS**

A. Start the GMEM application by selecting Command->Command Server->GMEM on the DPS DNAV. The initial screen for GMEM is shown in Figure 7.2G-1. Verify that the flight number and recon match the activity to which your workstation is configured. The application will initialize ready to build a new GMEM and will default to a Contiguous, PASS, Data, and Load type of GMEM. The DSM field will initialize to the next available DSM and will only scroll through available (not previously used) DSMs. The main window consists of four panes. From top to bottom they are: Header Area (non-editable information and application-generated area), Editing Area (editable information, user-generated), Verification Area (noneditable information, application and Command Server generated), and the Advisory Area (non-editable information, application and Command Server generated). Both nominal and off-nominal messages will appear in the Advisory Area. The mouse, the tab key or the enter key can be used to traverse through the Editing Area.

- B. If you are building a new GMEM that matches the default initial mode you can proceed with entering the data, otherwise select File->New and continue making selections in the cascading menus that match the type of GMEM you are building. When selecting Code or Data, if Code is selected, then Load will be the only option available. However, if Data is selected, then the user must select either Load, Bit Set, or Bit Reset. Refer to the Background Information section of this procedure, page 7.2-1, for the definition of these terms.
- C. A suggested DSM number is automatically chosen either use the defaulted DSM number or select another DSM number by using the arrow keys next to the DSM number in the Header Area.

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- D. Enter an appropriate title (i.e., GNC_GMEM_RGA4, SM_GMEM_RMS, etc.).
- E. For contiguous GMEMs, enter the starting address. All sequential addresses will automatically appear in the Addr locations of the Edit Area. For scatter GMEMs, after entering the starting address, the addresses will not automatically appear. For both contiguous and scatter, the sector number is automatically calculated and is not editable. VPs are only valid if the address is in sector 0 or 1. If a VP is desired, choose an available DSM by using the arrow keys. If 'None' is selected, the Slot field is not active for entry. Enter the Addr, Data and Slot as required.
- F. Save the load by selecting File->Save. This step is required before the load is sent to the Command Server.
- G. Transmit the command to the command server by selecting Send under the Command menu. If the DSM has already been sent to the Command Server, the program will not allow you to resend it. A message will appear notifying you that if you wish to resend a load with this DSM number, the load must be deleted in the Command Server first.
- H. Printout the command by selecting the Print option on the File menu and then once the cross-hair mouse pointer appears on the screen, place the mouse pointer over the GMEM application and depress the left mouse button. The extra step of selecting the window with the mouse pointer is necessary because the GMEM application uses the X-Window screen print utility for printouts. There is not a separate capability to print the advisories only; if the advisory list is longer than is visible in the window, multiple prints will be necessary.
- I. Exit the GMEM application by selecting the File->Exit menu option. A warning message will appear if you have unsaved data.

The bottom portion of the GMEM application (Figure 7.2G-2) is used to verify GMEM loads and is referred to as the verification area. Immediately after the load is sent to the Command Server, it will appear in the verification area. Additional GMEM loads in the command server can be viewed by scrolling to the desired DSM using the up and down arrow keys next to the DSM field of the verification area. The up/down arrows in the verification area are not active unless the GMEM application is in the Verify mode. To put the application in the Verify mode, select Verify under the Command menu. The items that must be verified are:

- A. **OP CODE** is always equal to 01 for CONTIGUOUS or 02 for SCATTER loads.
- B. NO OF WORDS(SETS) must equal the total number of DATA words that follow for Contiguous loads or the total number of Sets of ADDR DATA pairs that follow for SCATTER loads.
- C. **MF** must equal No_MF for GMEM loads. The MF is automatically built into data word one based on the MF selected by INCO at the time of uplink.

- D. LOAD(SET)(RESET) must equal the Operation specified in the build.
- E. **PROTECTED(UNPROTECT)** will be Protected for Data Type CODE and Unprotect for Data Type DATA.
- F. **INITIAL ADDR** must equal the Starting Address for Contiguous loads. This field does not exist for Scatter loads.
- G. DATA must equal the contiguous data values specified for Contiguous loads.
- H. ADDRESS DATA must equal the Addr and Data values specified for Scatter loads.
- I. For GMEMs using Variable Parameters refer to SCP 7.6 PASS VARIABLE PARAMETERS or SCP 7.7 PASS VARIABLE PARAMETERS for verification.

The actual hex data words to be uplinked do not have to be verified but they can be if so desired by using the Command Data Words (CDW) application. For more information on starting and understanding the Command Data Words Application refer to SCP 7.1. Interpretation of the individual bits in the command words is as follows. For additional information on the bit definitions refer to the Space Shuttle Computer Program Development Specification (CPDS) SS Downlist/Uplink Software Requirements (SS-P-0002-140).

For contiguous loads, each data word (both even and odd) is a single command word to be patched into memory sequentially from the starting address as specified in data word 3.

For scatter loads, all even-numbered data words 4 to 66 are the extended address of memory to be changed. See SCP appendix H, Absolute Address Conversion to Extended Address, if you need to determine the extended address from the given absolute address. All odd numbered data words 5 to 67 are single data words to be patched into the memory address in the previous even-numbered data word.

#### FORMS - R/T MEMORY READ WORKSHEET

A. Two options are available for display format, Hex or Engineering Units. If engineering units are selected, then the Scaling and Conversion blocks must be filled out as well. Only a single scaling and conversion value can be selected for a readout at a time. Therefore, if different scaling and/or conversion factors are required, then a separate set of forms for each one will be required. An expected value of the memory location also needs to be included on the form. (see Figure 7.2.-4)

# FORMS - R/T MEMORY WRITE WORKSHEET

The R/T MEMORY WRITE WORK WORKSHEET is available as a DF Form on the JSCMODM server.

A. BLOCK I (see Figure 7.2-5)

GMEM TYPE is selected from (code load, data load, bit set, or bit reset). For code areas of memory, which are protected, only code load can be selected. Either bit set, bit reset, or data load can be done to data areas of memory.

MEMORY AREA is either systems software, major function base, or OPS overlay. If OPS overlay is selected the requesting discipline must define in Section III which OPS is desired. This section is only for PASS GMEMs.

DESIRED IMPLEMENTATION can be either via uplink or crew keyboard input. Uplink is the preferred method (Flight Rule A7-16) and should be selected if at all possible.

B. BLOCK II (Figure 7.2G-3)

MEMORY SECTOR is required to help determine method of implementation. If the memory locations are in multiple sectors, then check each appropriate sector. The exact memory locations will be defined in Section IV.

C. BLOCK III (Figure 7.2G-3)

OPS DESIRED is required if the GMEM is OPS dependent. If a specific OPS is not required, do not fill out this section.

D. BLOCK IV (Figure 7.2G-3)

OBJECTIVE of why the GMEM is required. Explain what problem has occurred that requires a GMEM as well as how the GMEM will solve this problem.

E. BLOCK V (Figure 7.2G-3)

OPERATIONAL CONSTRAINTS/REQUIREMENTS - The requesting discipline should define the necessary actions to set up the appropriate subsystem

configuration and software steps to accept the effects of the GMEM. Any limitations, restrictions, or peculiarities which can constrain the GMEM should be listed. The following is a list of possible constraints which should be considered:

- Define the mission interval that the results of this write operation are to be in effect within the GPC(s). Identify by major mode, flight events, duration in time, or by other significant software activities such as burns, etc.
- Is there any special flight environment (i.e., zero g, RNDZ tracking) required for the results of the GMEM to be observed?
- Are there any software configurations which must be avoided while the effects of this GMEM are active in the GPC(s)?
- Are there any crew procedures/activities (i.e., OPS transitions, switch settings, etc.) which must be performed in order for this GMEM to be effective?
- Are there any future crew procedures/activities which could interfere with the intent of this GMEM?
- When should this GMEM be backed out?
- If crew input is preferred over uplink, explain why and provide list of exact keystrokes required.
- F. BLOCK VI (Figure 7.2G-3)

S/W NAME is the HAL-S or assembly name as defined in program listings.

PARAMETER name (i.e., RGA 4, IMU 2 X AXIS SCALE FACTOR).

ADDRESS - The 5-digit hexadecimal location in memory. See DPS Console Handbook Appendix H, Extended Address Conversion, if required.

DESIRED is what the value of the address will be after the write is completed. If a bit set or reset is selected, this column will contain the mask word instead. The mask word is a four-digit HEX word that defines which bit locations within a 16-bit memory word that are to be manipulated.

In order to accomplish this, bits 0, 1, 2, 5, and 6 must be set to a 1 in the mask word (i.e., mask word = E600). This could also be done by a load of F711, but a bit set or bit reset operation allows single bit manipulation where the state of the adjacent bits may not be known. All bits must be known to do a load.

INITIAL ACTUAL is the current contents of the memory location before the GMEM is implemented.

FINAL ACTUAL is what the memory location will show after the GMEM is implemented. Note that for a code or data load this value will equal the value in the desired column. Whereas, for a bit set or reset this value will most likely be different from the mask word.

G. BLOCK VII (Figure 7.2G-6)

APPLICABLE CONFIGURATIONS will not be filled out by the requesting discipline. It is up to DPS and DPS SPT to fill out this area. List any possible DPS system configurations which may be in effect once the GMEM is onboard.

This procedure is governed by FCOH SOP 3.1 and SOP 3.3 and is not to be changed in real time without review and approval of the Flight Director or changed premission without review and approval at the FOIG.

- D. Time Constraints, Crew Coordination Requirements
  - 1. DEU equivalent loads should avoid containing item entries which must be uplinked at a specific time or within a specific time interval.
  - 2. The crew should be informed of upcoming DEU equivalent use and instructed not to use the associated IDP/CRT. However, there are no constraints utilizing the associated IDP to drive subsystem or flight instrument displays.
  - 3. Do not call up a SPEC on an active IDP without crew coordination. If during crew sleep, do not call up the desired SPEC until required and then RESUME it as soon as practical.
- E. Hazard/Safety Implications

# **CAUTION**

The following is a list of possible conditions which could be hazardous to equipment or personnel.

- 1. Extreme care must be taken when building this command load because no syntax checks are performed by the Command Server, and limited syntax checks are performed by the onboard software (reference PASS user note 55006).
- 2. If a DEU equivalent command is sent to a GPC which is not communicating with the IDP specified in the command (i.e., not assigned), that GPC may still process the command which in turn may lead to undesirable results (reference PASS User Note 36329).
- 3. DEU equivalent loads will not be used to perform OPS transitions, OPS mode recalls, or MM transitions except for the contingency G1 to G9 transition required for MPS safing (following a pad abort).
- 4. Loads will not be chained because the successful execution of a load may not be verified before subsequent commands are executed.
- F. Other Requirements/Information
  - 1. DEU equivalent commanding during crew sleep will not be performed until all of the following requirements have been met. (See the flight specific annex for any additional flight unique constraints.)
    - a. Confirmed period of AOS and good comm through scheduled completion of the load.

- b. The MCC must be able to verify all DEU equivalent loads via methods other than scratchpad line response.
- c. If a series of loads are planned, the impact of not completing all uplinks must be evaluated and considered to be an acceptable risk.
- d. Need for crew alert SPCs has been evaluated by the MCC.
- 2. For DEU equivalent commanding during crew sleep, the MCC may or may not want to verify the functionality of the planned uplinks prior to crew sleep.
- 3. The Command Server restricts the following keystrokes from being in DEU equivalent loads: FAULT SUMM, SYS SUMM, MSG RESET, ACK, GPC/CRT, and CLEAR.
- 4. DEU equivalent loads should not be sent to a deassigned IDP, or to an IDP assigned via the BFC CRT SEL switch. DEU equivalent loads can be sent to a powered off IDP as long as the IDP is still assigned.
- 5. A DEU equivalent load is limited to 30 keystrokes because of a Command Server restriction, and not an onboard restriction.
- 6. DEU equivalent loads are valid following a failed OPS transition or freeze dry attempt.
- 7. An active downlist from the destination GPC or MF must be available for the Command Server to verify the uplink and to subsequently send the buffer execute command.
- 8. Load destination may be an individual GPC (if not an RS member), all GPCs, or a major function (GNC, SM, PL). Most DEU equivalent scenarios will involve uplinking to either the GNC or SM major function.
- 9. INCO controls the destination and IDP number via command panel inputs on the INCO/INST console when the load is uplinked.
- 10. The DEU equivalent load's built-in major function, the destination (entered by INCO), and the IDP number (also entered by INCO) must all be compatible; e.g., if SM is specified with GPC 4 and IDP 2 as the destination, then GPC 4 must be SM driving IDP 2. If this is violated the GPC will annunciate an 'ILLEGAL ENTRY' indication.
- 11. For an OPS 0 GPC(s), the payload major function destination will not work. Only a GPC ID type destination will work if the OPS 0 GPC is not an RS member. The all GPC destination would work, but OPS Note 43987 recommends against its use for RS of OPS 0.
- 12. If a DEU equivalent load is sent to an IDP that is powered off, the IDP status words will go to all zeros and remain all zeros until the IDP is powered on. When the IDP is powered on, the status words will be updated in the poll response. If a DEU equivalent is sent to an IDP that is powered on, the status words will go to all zeros when the command is processed by the GPC and then return to real values on the next poll response.

13. If an IDP that is powered off is reassigned, that IDP is not available for DEU Equivalent uplinks. Reassignment could be via the GPC/CRT key or via the BFC switch moving the IDP to/from the BFS. Attempting to uplink to such an IDP will result in an 'ILLEGAL ENTRY' flag being downlisted. An IDP in such a lockout condition may be identified through a software array CZ2V_MF_OLD that may be viewed by placing the array member of interest in a variable parameter slot. This is a four-word array, one for each IDP. If the content of the word for the IDP in question is FFFF, this IDP is locked out from receiving DEU equivalent uplinks. This condition will not clear until good polling resumes between the GPC and IDP. Normal values for this parameter would be 0000 for PL MF, 0001 for GNC MF, and 0002 for SM MF.

# **PROCEDURE - NON MANEUVERS**

- A. The responsible console position completes a DEU Equivalent Form (Figure 7.3G-1, and available electronically via the DF32 Home Page) and submits it to DPS. See the section on Filling Out the DEU Equivalent Form for further details.
- B. DPS/DPS SPT review the form for completeness and adequacy of information, and completes the form accordingly. This may include adding any necessary "SPEC XXX PRO" or "RESUME" commands to the form as needed.
- C. DPS/DPS SPT build the required command load(s) using the DEU Equivalent application, transmits the loads to the Command Server, and safes them. See the section on Building DEU Equivalent Loads for further details.
- D. DPS provides the requesting discipline with a completed form.
- E. DPS, DPS SPT and the requesting discipline verify the load(s) in the Command Server using the bottom half of the DEU Equivalent build display. See the section on Verification of DEU Equivalent Loads for further details.
- F. After the load(s) are verified in the Command Server, DPS submits a flight note (with the completed form attached) to FD.
- G. Once FD gives a GO, CAPCOM, if necessary, informs the crew of the pending uplink and instructs them to avoid all keyboard entries on the targeted IDP until DEU equivalent uplink is complete. If a downlister or TFL change is required, DPS coordinates appropriately with FD and INCO.

- H. DPS coordinates the actual uplink with INCO on the FD loop (Note: the FD may decide to relegate this coordination to the INCO loop). INCO requires that DPS provide the <u>DSM number</u>, <u>destination</u> (GPC ID or MF ID), <u>target IDP number</u>, and <u>that a GO from FD has been given</u>. If the DEU equivalent consists of multiple loads, DPS is also required to give INCO a separate 'GO' for each specific load.
- I. After INCO reads back the information, DPS/DPS SPT verify the success of the uplink on the Command Track display and informs the requesting discipline that the DEU equivalent load is onboard.
- J. The requesting discipline verifies that the DEU equivalent uplink was successful via methods other than scratchpad line response. (Due to timing limitations of the downlist rates and the DK polling rates, the actual entries on the scratch pad line may not be seen for an IDP that is powered on). Scratchpad line entries should be seen for an IDP that is powered off.

# **PROCEDURE - ATTITUDE MANEUVERS**

- A. FAO/PTG develops the planned timeline and desired attitudes well enough in advance to allow ample time for the loads to be built and verified (24 hours is desired, but depending on the specific case, may be less).
  - For pre-flight approved maneuver plans, FAO/PTG will develop the baseline plan for pre-flight approval by DPS, INCO, GNC, FD, ACO/PAYLOADS, and the requesting discipline. During the flight, FAO/PTG will develop the specific planned attitude timeline (including bailout attitudes as required) for flight night (FN) X during the planning shift for FN X-1 (the night prior to the FN that requires the maneuvers). The specific timeline for maneuvers planned for FN 1 will be developed prelaunch, if possible.
- B. FAO/PTG completes a DEU Equivalent Form (fig. 7.3-1G, and available electronically via the DF32 Home Page) and submits it to DPS, GNC, INCO, ACO/PAYLOADS and the requesting discipline. See the section on Filling Out the DEU Equivalent Form for further details. Once FAO/PTG submits the baseline plan, DPS will be responsible for any required updates and redistribution.
- C. DPS/DPS SPT review the form for completeness and adequacy of information, and completes the form accordingly. This may include adding any necessary "SPEC XXX PRO" or "RESUME" commands to the form as needed.
- D. In parallel with the work DPS is doing, GNC and INCO evaluate the planned timeline and attitudes for technical correctness, comm coverage, crew alert SPC requirements, etc. as they do for any other type of maneuver. Any changes will be coordinated with FAO/PTG, ACO/PAYLOADS, and the requesting discipline. Once

coordinated, DPS/DPS SPT will incorporate the changes on the DEU Equivalent Form.

- E. DPS/DPS SPT build the required command loads using the DEU equivalent workstation application, transmits the loads to the Command Server, and safes them. See the section on Building DEU Equivalent Loads for further details.
- F. DPS provides a completed form to FAO/PTG, GNC, INCO, ACO/PAYLOADS, and the requesting discipline.
- G. DPS, DPS SPT, PTG, and GNC verify the loads in the Command Server using the bottom half of the DEU Equivalent build display. See the section on Verification of DEU Equivalent Loads for further details.
- H. Once all affected disciplines have completed their responsibilities outlined above, DPS submits a flight note (with the completed form attached) to FD.
  - 1. For pre-flight approved FN X DEU maneuver plans, the Orbit 2 shift will typically review/approve the plan and uplink it, along with the bailout attitude, to the crew prior to crew sleep on the night the plan is to be executed.
- I. Once FD gives a 'GO', CAPCOM, if necessary, informs the crew of the pending uplink and instructs them to avoid keyboard entries to the targeted IDP until DEU equivalent uplink is complete. If a downlister or TFL change is required, DPS coordinates appropriately with FD and INCO.
- J. DPS coordinates the actual uplink with INCO on the FD loop. INCO requires that DPS provide the <u>DSM number</u>, <u>destination</u> (GPC ID or MF ID), <u>target IDP number</u>, and <u>that a GO from FD has been given</u>. DPS must give INCO a separate 'GO' for each specific load.
- K. After INCO reads back the information on the FD loop, DPS/DPS SPT verify the success of the uplink on the Command Track display.
- L. For each load, GNC, FAO, and DPS give a 'GO' on the FD loop after having verified the success of the previous load using methods other than scratchpad line response. Additionally, FD gives a separate 'GO' prior to initiating any actual maneuver (i.e., ITEM 18, 19, or 20 on UNIV PTG).
- M. If part of a series of maneuvers, prior to the MET of the next sequence DPS will acquire a GO from FD to proceed.

# CLEANUP

A. DEU equivalent loads will be deleted from the Command Server if not planned to be used again.

B. DEU equivalent loads will be safed in the Command Server when not in use. See FCOH SOP 3.1.4 for details on safing.



#### FILLING OUT THE DEU EQUIVALENT FORM (Figure 7.3G-1)

- A. Discipline and Originator The FCOH acronym for the console position represented and the name of the requester.
- B. Flight ID Specify numeric flight number.
- C. Date and Mission GMT Specify calendar date and GMT at the time of request. If this is a pre-mission request (i.e., prior to prelaunch console manning), GMT is not required.
- B. PASS Major Function Specify which major function will be affected by the DEU equivalents. DEU equivalents are not legal in BFS.
- C. PASS Major Mode The major mode which is to be present (e.g., GNC 201; the major function is GNC, and the major mode here is 201).
- D. Requested Uplink Time The desired uplink time or cueing mission event at which the user needs the DEU equivalent to be completed.
- E. Rationale / Objective Explain what the DEU equivalent is intended to do (e.g., update master timing unit (MTU) MET; perform a dump which will be used in troubleshooting, etc.).
- F. Lines 1 through 15 For each individual load, the requester should fill out the desired uplink GMT or MET (if applicable), the three- or four-digit SPEC number or major mode page to which the DEU equivalent is to be sent, and the keystroke groups in the manner they would be performed by a crew member. Thus, the requester must have a complete and syntactically correct keyboard statement. The maximum number of keystrokes which can be uplinked is 30. For example, a single keystroke would be "1," "OPS," or "ITEM." The Comments column should be used to clarify what the particular load is doing (i.e., loads an attitude, executes a maneuver, deselects an LRU, etc.).
- G. GMT Form Received/Approval By (DPS completes) Self-explanatory.
- H. Target IDP (**DPS completes**) IDP number to which the DEU equivalent is to be sent.
- I. DSM No. (**DPS completes**) Each individual command load is assigned a specific DSM number in accordance with the appropriate format.
- J. Title (**DPS completes**) Title to which each specific DEU load is given.

- A. Start the DEU Equivalent application by selecting Command->Command Server->DEU Eq on the DPS DNAV. The DEU Equivalent application is shown in Figure 7.3G-2.
- B. Select File->New and GNC or SM as appropriate.
- C. The program displays the next available DSM number. If desired the user can select a different DSM number (201XX, where XX is 01 50).
- D. Enter a descriptive title in the Title text box. The title assigned usually includes the keyboard input for that DEU equivalent command.

- E. Use the graphical keypad in the DEU Equivalent application to enter the desired keystrokes. Use the 'Clear' key of the keypad to back up and erase any erroneous entries. Long sets of keystrokes will wrap around the scratch pad line window to the next line. If you enter too many items, you will not be able to place the terminator keystroke at the end of the entry. If this happens use the Clear key to shorten the scratchpad line, thus allowing room for the terminator key.
- F. Save the command by selecting File->Save and then send the load to the Command Server by selecting the Command->Send. The load must be saved before it can be transmitted to the Command Server.

### **VERIFICATION OF DEU EQUIVALENT LOADS**

The bottom half of the DEU Equivalent build page is used to verify DEU equivalent loads. Immediately after the load is sent to the Command Server, it will appear on the bottom half of the display (verification area). Additional DEU Equivalent loads in the command server can be viewed by scrolling to the desired DSM using the up and down arrow keys next to the DSM field of the verification area. The up/down arrows in the verification area are not active unless DEU Equivalent is in the 'Verify' mode. To put the application in the 'Verify' mode, select Command->Verify. The items that must be verified are:

- A. OP CODE is always equal to '05'.
- B. **NO OF KEYS** must equal the total number of keyboard pad entries entered.
- C. **MF** must equal the desired major function (GNC, SM, PL).
- D. **KEYSTROKES** match those requested on the DEU equivalent form.
- E. Verify that keystrokes are syntactically correct.
  - 1. Verify individual item entries are valid for the desired SPEC.
  - 2. Verify all ITEM entries are terminated by an EXEC.
  - 3. Verify all SPEC requests and OPS series are terminated by a PRO and that they only use three digits for the OPS MODE number.

The actual hex data words to be uplinked do not have to be verified but they can be if so desired by using the Command Data Words (CDW) application. For more information on starting and understanding the Command Data Words Application refer to SCP 7.1G.

F. Interpretation of the individual bits in the command words is as follows. For additional information on the bit definitions, refer to the Space Shuttle Computer Program Development Specification (CPDS) SS Downlist/Uplink Software Requirements (SS-P-0002-140).

MMU OPS (READ/MERGE/WRITE, COMPARE, DUMP) (Command Server)

# PURPOSE

This procedure contains the instructions for DPS to build MMU command loads. The MMU read, merge, and write loads are used to change the data on the MMUs, perform MMU 1 and MMU 2 compares, and perform MMU dumps. These loads are legal only in PASS S2, S4, and PL9. These MMU loads are not valid via BFS uplink; however, BFS software can be patched on the MMU in S2, S4, or PL9 if necessary.

The capability exists to read and/or write data to and from the orbiter mass memory unit (MMU) in MMU blocks of 512 words. Therefore, whenever it is necessary to modify the contents of the MMU, a minimum of 512 words must be read from the MMU and subsequently written back to the MMU. Thus, additional capabilities exist to facilitate the operation of writing less than 512 words to the MMU. These capabilities are reflected in the following procedures. The write to the MMU is accomplished in the following manner: 512 words are read into the modification buffer. The data to be patched (<512 words) is "merged" into the data within the mod buffer (overwriting only the data to be patched with new data). The new set of 512 words is then written from the mod buffer to the MMU. The same block is then read from the MMU into another buffer, and the two buffers are compared for a verification of a "good" write. The read, merge, and write commands are contained in separate command loads. To date an MMU patch has never been performed in flight.

# **RESTRICTIONS/CONSTRAINTS**

D. Time Constraints And Crew Coordination Requirements

The crew should not use the MMUs (SM checkpoints, roll-in displays, TFL/DFL changes, OPS transitions) while these loads are being uplinked and processed onboard.

E. Hazard/Safety Implications

Although procedures for MMU patch uplink capability exist, this feature currently is prohibited by STS Operations Flight Rules (JSC-12820, Flight Rule A7.1.3-6E). Improper application of this procedure could pollute the MMU contents in real time because of lack of appropriate time to permit verification and testing.

F. Other Requirements

Only contiguous patches can be included in a specific uplink load; i.e., separate merge loads must be built for "scatter" patches. If the patch or dump is  $\leq$  2048 words, then either an SM GPC or PL9 GPC can be utilized to perform the patch or dump. If a patch or dump is > 2048 words, only a PL9 GPC can be utilized. Note that a crewmember can use the MASS MEMORY R/W display (SPEC 85) to perform a MMU scatter patch.

# PROCEDURE

Permission for any MMU modifications must be authorized by the Flight Director and other appropriate management per FCOH SOP 3.3.2. Recommendations for such

operations must be coordinated between the DPS Officer, SPAN, and the MER and requires an official MAR (CHIT). DPS, SPAN, and the MER jointly develop software patch requirements. The MER coordinates patch generation with SAIL or SPF (see FCOH 3.3.2). The patch details can be provided in a memorandum utilizing the Universal Patch Format (UPF) listing with the necessary authorization clearly indicated. The official MMU patch is provided to DPS via a paper copy of the UPF listing . Downey personnel are usually given the task of writing the UPF listing. SPF UPF tapes are no longer utilized.

For MMU patches and any single operation:

A. DPS builds the patch via the MMU Ops application. Due to inability for transferring MMU patches via UPF tapes, DPS will build the MMU patches via a paper copy of the UPF formatted memo regardless of the size of the patch.

- B. Command Server processing converts this information to uplink load format that is displayed on the bottom portion of the MMU Ops display.
- C. DPS/DPS SPT verify the MMU command load contents via a comparison of the MMU load paperwork and the MMU Ops display.

- D. DPS and INCO coordinate the uplink of the required loads to the orbiter.
  - 1. DPS generates a flight note for all command load uplinks (submit to INCO and FD).
  - 2. DPS obtains a GO for command uplink from the flight director.
  - 3. If required, the loads are unsafed in the Command Server.
  - 4. DPS coordinates command uplink with INCO.
    - DPS gives a separate GO for each load and INCO uplinks the load on DPS GO
    - DPS reads major function and DSM number(s) to INCO
    - INCO provides a read back of all information to verify proper communication
  - 5. DPS/DPS Support verifies uplink using the Command Tracking application.
- E. Only a single MMU should be patched until after verification of a successful patch.

FSW BUILD NUMBER/MM BUILD NUMBER (MM VER on UPF) - These numbers are provided in decimal via the UPF listing and are placed on each patch. These numbers are compared to the version number placed on the MM tape as part of the MM build process. Each command within a read/merge/write operation must contain the same MM version numbers.

PHASE BLOCK/LOAD BLOCK - These entries are provided in decimal. Once converted to binary, if bits 33 to 48 of Command Word 2 are set to zero for a read command, the GPC will retrieve from Revision/Patch log from the MMU. Otherwise, the identified phase/load block shall be retrieved. Each read/merge/write command within a patch operation must contain the same phase/load block. For compare and dump operations, the phase and load block will not be available as it is for patch operations. Hence, the following information is provided as a guide.

LOAD BLOCK OFFSET - Used for merge commanding only. LOAD BLOCK OFF-SET is a decimal input that specifies the point in the load block to start incorporating the patch. Range is 0 to 16382 (decimal) for PL9 and 0 to 2046 (decimal) for SM2 and SM4. The first word in a load block is defined as an offset of zero.

LOAD WORDS (01 - 60) - This is the data to be written onto the MMU provided in hexidecimal. There is a maximum of 60 words per load. Only 20 of the 60 words are visible on the MMU Ops display at a given time. Use the vertical scroll bar to view the remainder of the MMU load words.

- B. Load Descriptions
  - 1. Read/merge/write loads

Read/merge/write loads should be sent to both MMUs; hence, a set of read/merge/write loads for each MMU must be generated using the information on the UPF listing and/or on the patch memorandum. These loads are legal only in S2, S4, and PL9. It should be noted that these loads have not been utilized up through STS-91 and will have extremely high visibility in the operational environment if ever uplinked.

FCOH SOP 3.3.2 explains the coordination involved for a real-time MMU patch.

When an MMU read load is processed, the GPC ships the requested data from the MMU into the SM common buffer. The merge load is then processed, and the patch data is "merged" with the data (modifies the pertinent data) in the common buffer. The write load is then processed, writing the merged data back to the MMU.

2. Compare Loads

If a compare of the data on MMU 1 and on MMU 2 is desired, the DPS/DPS Support operator must determine the parameters without using the UPF listing.

Immediately following the dump load process by SM 2/4 or PL9 GPC, the data will be shipped to the ground via SM or PL downlist. The DPS/DPS Support operator should check with INCO/INST to ensure that the telemetry format load (TFL) will support such a dump. The dump data can be viewed via the GPC DUMP application.

## **VERIFICATION OF MMU LOADS**

A. MMU OPS Command Verification

For MMU OPS command verification. The load must be saved on the workstation and subsequently sent to the command server. Once in the command server, it can be verified via the bottom portion of the appropriate MMU Read, MMU Write, MMU Merge, MMU Compare, or MMU dump application window. If all of the values in the bottom window match the values input in the top half of the window, the load is accurate. In addition, all DPS operators are responsible to ensure that the information utilized for building the load matches the UPF listing. Not all of the fields are valid for every load. Only verify the fields that are applicable to the type of MMU OPS command being verified.

- 1. TITLE: (User defined)
- 2. MMU ID: Targeted MMU for command (1 or 2)
- 3. PATCH ID: See PATCH ID number on UPF.

The PATCH ID should match exactly what is indicated in the UPF listing. For instance, if the PATCH ID on the UPF is 1026, the PATCH ID word should also be 1026; these values are both in hex.

4. FSW ID: Reflects flight S/W ID; see FSW system number on UPF.

## B. Command Server Word/Bit Definitions

If bit level verification of the command procedure is required, utilize the Command Data Words application. The Command Data Words application can be found under the Global Apps/Command Server/TELCOM/Prime menu for verification. Verify utilizing the following bit definitions:


The following information describes how to decode and verify the MMU ID, PATCH ID, MMU BUILD, and PHASE/BLOCK words on the MMU read/write/merge MSKs or Command Data Words Application. The decoding for the two additional command words on the MMU merge MSKs (namely, BLOCK OFFSET, and NO WORDS) are also included. Words 08 - 67 on the MMU command on the Command Data Words application merge window are the contents of the merged data and should match the CONTENTS words on the UPF.

For a merge load, CW 1's MM ID (bit 23) will remain zero because the onboard merge software was coded to not care about this bit. Only the read and write software utilize this bit. From a historical perspective, this unexpected condition resulted because IBM wrote both the onboard and the ground software; knowing the implementation of both, IBM optimized the code accordingly. Although you expect the dump option (bit 21) and the compare option (bit 22) to be zero for a merge operation, it should be noted that these bits are also not considered by the onboard merge software.



The PATCH ID should match exactly what is indicated in the UPF listing. For instance, if the PATCH ID on the UPF is 1026, the PATCH ID word should also be 1026; these values are both in hex.





Phase number: In hex, matches phase number on the UPF.


Load block number: In hex, matches load block number on the UPF.

5. BLOCK OFFSET (defined in bits 17-32 of CW 3)



Block offset: In hex, this number specifies the point in the load block to start incorporating the patch. Range is 0 to  $16382_{10}$  for PL 9, and 0 to  $2046_{10}$  for SM 2/4 (the first word in a load block is defined as an offset of zero). This number matches the offset number on the UPF.

#### 6. NO WORDS (defined in bits 33-48 of CW 3)



Number of words: In hex, this is the number of patch data words within the merge load; this number matches the NUMBER value on the UPF. The total number of words in an uplink load shall not exceed the size of the two-stage buffer.

## COMMAND SERVER CLEAN UP

After completion and verification of the MMU command load operations and if not expected to be used again, all associated loads should be deleted from the Command Server by DPS/DPS SPT.

- E. Hazard/Safety Implications
  - 1. Flight controllers occasionally use VPs to aid them in assessing the health of their systems, verification of the VP addresses are critical.
- F. Other Requirements
  - 1. VP addresses are stored in systems software in each GPC. When changing downlisters, the VPs seen on the ground reflect the new downlist GPC image.
  - 2. All GPCs in a Redundant Set (RS) will receive a VP update. However, a GPC added to the RS after a VP update will not have the update resident.
  - 3. An IPL'd GPC has fill data in the VP slots (C6C6).
  - 4. Only addresses in memory sectors 0 and 1 (i.e., five-digit addresses with a leading digit of zero) can be put into the VP downlist.
  - 5. Chaining loads will cause all loads in the chain to go to the same major function.

## DESCRIPTION

Each major function has an array of 10 half words dedicated to the variable downlist. Each entry in the array is a 16-bit memory address. The contents of these addresses will be downlisted for MCC consideration. Because the address is only 16 bits, only memory locations in sectors 0 and 1 can be accessed through the variable downlist.

The individual VP slots are not all downlisted in the same frame. Slots 1 and 8 are downlisted in frame 7. Slots 2 and 7 are in frame 8; 3 and 6 in frame 11; and slots 4 and 5 in frame 10. VP slot 9 is in frame 6, and slot 10 is in frame 5. The above is true for GNC, SM, and Ops 0. Consideration might be given to keep very dynamic data grouped together to ensure a time homogenous sample. That is, a 32-bit parameter could use slots 7 and 8 to ensure that all the data is in the same downlink frame.


The 10-element VP array exists in two places in GPC memory: in the downlist compool for downlisting and in the display area of SPEC 1 for display purposes. Both of these locations exist in systems software. Therefore, VP addresses are carried forward across OPS transitions. The addresses themselves may reference a location in systems software, major function base, or OPS overlay. Although the address itself does not change with an OPS transition, the parameter that the address is referencing may change.

The VPs are not initialized by systems software. This means the address in a VP slot must be manually changed in one of two ways: via uplink or via crew inputs to SPEC 1.

The DPS console position has the authority to allocate the 10 VP slots among the MCC disciplines, as necessary.

For further information on crew and MCC displays as well as details on VP scaling, see the Displays and Variable Parameter Scaling sections at the end of this SCP.

**PROCEDURE** (For additional information, see FCOH 4.8.)



- A. DPS/DPS SPT receive **three copies** of the Variable Parameter Display Request form (Figure 7.6-1) from the requesting discipline.
- B. It is the requesting discipline's responsibility to provide any required scaling coefficients. If work load permits, DPS SPT can provide some assistance.
- C. DPS and DPS SPT notify each other that a VP is in work on DPS MPSR.
- D. Verify address in the memory map and/or global symbol dictionary (refer to SCP 1.8 for more information). Only addresses in memory sector 0 and 1 (i.e., four hex digits) can be VP'd.
- E. DPS and DPS SPT determine which VP slot(s) to use. Coordinate with other users and/or Flight to resolve competition for use of VP slots.

*Note: All slots may be used to scale floating point numbers.

- F. DPS SPT completes the VP form (Figure 7.6G-1) with the following information:
  - 1. Slot number(s)
  - 2. Title

- G. Build and verify the VP load
  - 1. Start the Variable Parameters application by selecting Command->Variable Parameter on the DPS DNAV. The Variable Parameter application is shown in Figure 7.6G-2.
  - 2. When started, the Variable Parameter application will automatically select the flight ID for the activity that was selected during activity selection. If the flight selected is not the desired flight, change it via the File->Change Flight pull down menu.

If the desired DSM number does not appear, you may type it in. - H. If the slots needed for the new parameter are currently in use, notify the appropriate disciplines that the data in those slots will no longer be valid.
- I. Transmit VP load to the command server by selecting Send on the Command menu.

DPS and DPS SPT verify the load by using the bottom half of the Variable Parameter application. Immediately after the load is sent to the Command server, it will appear on the bottom portion of the display (verification area). Additional VP loads in the command server can be viewed by scrolling to the desired DSM using the up and down arrow keys next to the DSM field of the verification area. The up/down arrows in the verification area are not active unless the Variable Parameters application is in the Verify mode. To put the application in the Verify mode, select Command->Verify.

Verify that the addresses are correct and that they are listed under the appropriate VP slot number. Although not required, the actual hex data words to be uplinked can be verified by using the Command Data Words (CDW) application. For more information on starting and understanding the Command Data Words Application refer to SCP 7.1G. Interpretation of the individual bits in the command words is as follows. For additional information on the bit definitions refer to the Space Shuttle Computer Program Development Specification (CPDS) SS Downlist/Uplink Software Requirements (SS-P-0002-140).

- J. Generate and distribute a Flight Note to INCO and FLIGHT DIRECTOR specifying:
  - 1. PASS VP
  - 2. DSM number
  - 3. Major function
  - 4. Rationale for load
- K. DPS get a GO from Flight to uplink the VP. If the load had been previously safed, then unsafe the load.

DPS coordinates uplink with INCO for prelaunch VPs, and VPs associated with GMEMs. Otherwise, DPS SPT coordinates uplink with INST.

During coordination, inform INCO/INST that a GO has been given by the Flight Director, provide the load type (VP), DSM number (230xx), and major function (SM, GNC) and require a readback for verification.

- L. Verify that the uplink completed successfully and went to the correct major function by monitoring the Command Tracking application. For more information on starting and understanding the Command Tracking application refer to SCP 7.1G. Also monitor the appropriate loop for uplink verification from INCO/INST.
- M. Build VP scaling for required slot(s).
  - 1. Start the Variable Parameter (VP) Scaling application selecting VP scaling from the Apps menu on the DPS DNAV. The VP Scaling application is shown in Figure 7.6G-3.
  - 2. If a file that contains the desired scaling already exists, retrieve and transmit it to the appropriate major function:
    - a. Select Open under the File menu and a file selection dialog will appear.
    - b. Select the desired file, then select OK (or double click on the file name).
    - c. After verifying the data, select Transmit under the File pulldown menu, then select the desired major function.

- A. If the VP load will not be used again, delete it from the command server but leave on the workstation.
- B. If the VP load might be used again, safe the load (refer to FCOH 3.1.4) and leave it in the command server.

#### DISPLAYS

A. DPS UTILITY SPEC - SPEC 1

The crew may change the VPs via inputs to the DPS UTILITY SPEC (items 25-34 on SPEC 1).

The VAR PARAM ID LIST on SPEC 1 displays the ten 16-bit memory addresses used for variable downlist. It does not display the contents of the memory locations. However, the crew can view the contents of any memory location via SPEC 0.

B. VARIABLE PARAMETERS View Screen

The 10 variable parameters for GNC, SM, and OPS 0 are output to a single display (Figure 7.6-3G). The MSIDs used to downlist each VP slot are listed in Table 7.6-1G. The variable parameters display is found by selecting Apps on the DPS DNAV, then by selecting the VP Scaling application. It can also be found by using the Master DNAV menu; Master/Shuttle/DPS/Real-Time (Data from DPS)/VP Scaling. The Variable Parameters view screen displays the raw VP data, description, conversion type, the VPs being converted, K values, biases, and the engineering units (EUs) for each of the 10 variable parameters. This information is displayed for each major function by selecting the desired major function under the View pulldown menu.

- 1. Raw VPs The raw hexadeciamal values downlisted for each slot. The four-digit hex values shown represent the contents of the memory addresses that were either uplinked or input (via SPEC 1) by the crew. Refer to Table 7.6G-1 for the corresponding MSIDs.
- 2. Nomenclature This is the description of the variable parameter. This is typically used to indicate which VP is in which slot. This is input using the VP Scaling Input screen.
- 3. Conversion Type/VP Slot Inputs Delineates which type of conversion is performed on the parameters listed in the VP Slots Input column. The choices are: none, signed integer, unsigned integer, 32-bit floating point number, or 64-bit floating point number. When a selection is made in the Conversion Type column, the VP Scaling application automatically indicates how many slots are required to perform the scaling. These columns will be highlighted white; the user will select which VP slots hold the raw hex data to be scaled.
  - a. None No scaling will be performed; therefore, the data in the Engineering Units column of the display will show 0.0000E+00(zero). No slots in the VP Slot Inputs column will be highlighted.
  - b. Signed or unsigned integer Two VP slot selections are required to do a 32-bit conversion. The two rightmost columns on the VP Slot Inputs section of the VP input screen will automatically be highlighted white. Of these two columns, the leftmost represents the most significant data bits (MSDBs) of

the parameter to be scaled, and the rightmost represents the least significant data bits (LSDBs). Note: If the parameter to be scaled is 16 bits instead of 32 bits long, in the rightmost highlighted column, select the parameter slot to be scaled, and select "none" in the leftmost column.

- c. Thirty-two-bit floating point number Two VP slots are required to do the conversion. The two leftmost columns in the VP Slot Inputs section of the VP input screen will automatically be highlighted white. Of those two columns, the leftmost represents the MSBs of the parameter to be scaled, and the right one represents the LSBs.
- d. Sixty-four-bit floating point number Four VP slots are required to do the conversion. All four slots in the VP Slot Inputs section of the VP input screen will automatically be highlighted white. The leftmost column represents the MSBs, and the rightmost column represents the LSBs.

See the Variable Parameter Scaling section of this SCP for more details on selecting the conversion type.

4. K(A₁) and Bias (A₀) - Constants, input by DPS/DPS SPT via the VP input screen in the VP Scaling application. These constants are initialized to zero by the VP Scaling application and are used to compute an EU using the equation:

 $EUs = K^*$  (variable parameter value) + Bias

K - Constant that defines the slope of the calibration curve for each VP slot

Bias - Constant that defines the Y-intercept of the calibration curve for each VP slot

5. EUs - Floating point value of the downlisted parameter displayed in scientific notation. The scaling factors K and bias help to convert hex values into EUs.

## VARIABLE PARAMETER SCALING

A. Description

Scaling is a method of converting raw hexadecimal VP values into EUs. This task is accomplished by the VP Scaling application computation, using a K and bias input from DPS/DPS SPT with the results being displayed on the VP Scaling application View screen. Not all VPs require scaling (discretes, for example). This section describes how to select appropriate slots for a VP and how to determine the correct K and bias input to the Variable Parameter Scaling application.

- Note: The bit numbering convention for this section has bit 0 as the most significant bit and bit 1 as the next most significant bit, etc.
- B. Selecting Appropriate Slots for VPs

VPs of any type can be put in any slot in any order whether scaling is required or not. Therefore, the restriction that forced floating point numbers to be in slots 7 and 8 or 9 and 10 is no longer a concern.

C. Scaling/Conversion Types

- 1. Signed Integer A signed integer that is either 16 or 32 bits long can be scaled using this conversion type.
  - a. If the parameter is a 16-bit word, after selecting Signed Integer as the conversion type, the VP Scaling application will automatically highlight two columns in the VP Slots Input section of the input screen. The way to indicate that it is a 16-bit parameter (vice a 32-bit parameter) is to select "none" in the leftmost highlighted column of the input screen, and select the VP slot to be scaled in the rightmost.

Sixteen-bit words that can be scaled using this conversion type must have the following word format:

The sign bit is 1 for negative numbers and zero for positive numbers. It is important to note that negative numbers are expected to be in 2's complement.

b. If the parameter is a 32-bit word, the VP Scaling application will require two VP slots to be selected. Note: these slots do not have to be consecutive (i.e., slots 5 and 6 for example; they could be slots 2 and 8), nor do they have to be in any particular order (i.e., slot 8 could hold the most significant bits, and slot 2 could hold the least significant bits). Enter the first halfword address into the leftmost highlighted column and the second halfword address into the rightmost.

Thirty-two-bit words that can be scaled using this conversion type must have the following word format:

The sign bit is 1 for negative numbers and zero for positive numbers. It is important to note that negative numbers are expected to be in 2's complement.

Note that not all signed integer values can be scaled using this conversion type. For instance, halfword fixed-point overflow (FXU) data types have an overflow indicator in bit 1. Even though this is an integer data type, it is incompatible with the computation.

- 2. Unsigned Integer An integer data type that does not have a sign bit imbedded in the word can be converted using this conversion type. The parameter to be scaled can be either a 16- or 32-bit word.
  - a. If the parameter is a 16-bit word after selecting Unsigned Integer as the conversion type, the VP Scaling application will automatically highlight two columns in the VP Slots Input section of the input screen. The way to indicate that it is a 16-bit parameter (vice a 32-bit parameter) is to select "none" in the leftmost highlighted column of the input screen, and select the VP slot to be scaled in the rightmost.

Sixteen-bit words that can be scaled using this conversion type must have the following word format:

- * MSDB and LSDB are the most and least significant data bits, respectively.
- b. If the parameter is a 32-bit word, the VP Scaling applications will require two VP slots to be selected. Note: these slots do not have to be consecutive (i.e., slots 5 and 6 for example; they could be slots 2 and 8), nor do they have to be in any particular order (i.e., slot 8 could hold the most significant bits, and slot 2 could hold the least significant bits). Enter the first half word address into the leftmost highlighted column and the second half word address into the rightmost.

Thirty-two-bit words that can be scaled using this conversion type must have the following word format:

3. Thirty-Two-Bit Floating Point - Words that are 32 bits long and in IBM floating point format can be scaled, using this conversion type. For the number to be interpreted correctly, the high-order bits (0-15) must be in the leftmost of the two highlighted columns, and the next most high-order bits (16-31) must be in the rightmost highlighted column.

Floating point numbers that are less than 32 bits long, such as half word precision floating point (HLP), cannot be scaled since they do not fill up the entire format. Some floating point parameters larger than 32 bits, but less than 64 bits, can be scaled using the conversion type by having the high-order 32 bits in the two slots allowed. Since the additional bits beyond 31 are used to increase the size of the fraction, the larger floating point numbers still meet the format described below. Some precision will be lost if these parameters are

scaled, but for most cases, it will be negligible. Refer to the Data Types section to determine if a given data type can be scaled.

Thirty-two bit words that can be scaled using the conversion type must have the following word format:

The sign bit is 1 for negative numbers and zero for positive numbers. The exponent, which represents a power of 16, is derived by subtracting 64 from the characteristic. Therefore, the range of the exponent is -64 to +63. The fraction is a binary number less than 1 with the binary floating point to the left of the high-order digit (between bits 7 and 8).

4. Sixty-Four-Bit Floating Point - Words that are 64 bits long and in IBM floating point format can be scaled using this conversion type. For the number to be interpreted correctly, the high-order bits (0-15) must be in the leftmost of the two highlighted columns, and the next most high order bits (16-31) must be in the rightmost highlighted column, and so on for all four VP Slot Inputs columns on the VP Scaling Input display.

Thirty-two-bit words that can be scaled using this conversion type must have the following word format:

The sign bit is 1 for negative numbers and zero for positive numbers. The exponent, which represents a power of 16, is derived by subtracting 64 from the characteristic. Therefore, the range of the exponent is -64 to +63. The fraction is a binary number less than 1 with the binary floating point to the left of the high-order digit (between bits 7 and 8).

D. Determining Correct K and bias

The Variable Parameter Scaling application converts a VP into an EU using the equation

EU = K * Variable-Parameter + bias

where K and bias are Variable Parameter Scaling application constant input by DPS/DPS SPT which represent the slope and Y-intercept, respectively, of a linear equation. With the proper selection of K and bias, it is possible to calibrate and/or convert the units of a given VP. For example, calibrating a voltage into a temperature or converting radians to degrees. In its simplest form, with K = 1 and bias = 0, the Variable Parameter Scaling application simply scales the VPs as integers or floats (depending on their slot) and displays the corresponding value as a base 10 float with no calibration.

Calculating the correct K and bias is not a straightforward task since there are several factors to consider. This section does not attempt to provide instructions for every potential scaling situation since the number of possibilities are endless, but rather provides a list of items to consider when selecting a K and bias.

A. Is the parameter contained in at least one downlist format?

If so, SCAP can be used to obtain the parameter data type, calibration curve, length, and start bit. If the parameter is not in at least one downlist format, then this information will not be available from SCAP, and you will have to rely on the requesting discipline or the MER for scaling information.

B. Does the parameter have a calibration curve?

Calibration curves are in the form  $A_0 + A_1X + A_2X^2 \dots A_nX^n$ . If the parameter is available in at least one downlist format, the coefficients of this equation can be obtained by using SCAP. If a parameter has a calibration curve, then K= A₁ and bias = A₀.

C. In what unit does the requesting discipline want the parameter?

If the value is being calibrated to units other than what the requesting discipline wants, then the K and bias will have to be changed accordingly. For example, if the parameter is calibrated in degrees and the user wants radians, then you will have to multiply K by 0.01745.

D. How long (in bits) is the parameter and where in the 16-bit VP slot is the parameter embedded?

If the parameter is an integer value less than 16 bits, it may still be possible to scale it if the value is signed with negative values in 2's complement, is located in the high-order (bits 0-n) bits of the VP, and has trailing zeroes in the remaining low-order bits. For example, if the parameter is only 12 bits long but is contained in bits 0-11 of the VP, then the scaled VP will appear too large unless the magnitude bits are shifted to the right by 4 bits. This can be accomplished by setting the K value to 0.0625 (1/2⁴). One way to determine where a parameter is embedded with a 16-bit addressable area is to find out its start bit. This information is available through SCAP if the parameter has trailing zeroes may require information from the MER.

E. Data Types

Since a parameter can have peculiar characteristics with respect to how it is stored in GPC memory, it is helpful to know more than if a parameter is an integer or float. The data types listed here are downlist data types and may or may not reflect how a particular parameter is stored in GPC memory. The types are applicable only to parameters which are available in at least one downlist format and can be helpful in determining how to interpret a VP slot but do not necessarily guarantee that contents of the VP will conform to these standards. This is because parameters can be stored in GPC memory in one fashion and then packed together for downlist purposes in another. For example, the BFS GPC discrete word B contains two bits dedicated to showing which time source the GPC is using. However, if you use a VP to downlist the contents of GPC memory which contain the discrete word B, it will not contain the time source information since these bits are packed into the discrete word B for downlist purposes only. The ability to determine if a particular parameter is downlisted in the same fashion as it is used by GPC software applications is not readily available to DPS. The scaling recommendations listed after each data type assume that the downlist data types matches the format of how the parameter is stored in GPC memory.

1. Downlist Start Bit (TC 02)

A two-digit number defining the data start bit in the downlinked data stream. The range value is 00 to 07. OI/DFI/MDM data in the MDM bits 8-15 are downlink word N+1, where word N is the 8-bit downlinked word assigned to the MDM parent word and to the first 8 bits of the imbedded signals. Also the EIU 60 kbs and ET OI measurements are assigned to this field.

There should be no reason to scale these parameters.

2. Analog MDM Bipolar (AMB)

A 10-bit bipolar signal (may vary from 0 up to +5.11 volts or from 0 to -5.12 volts). Negative parameters (bit 0 = 1) have a magnitude in the 2's complement form.

Bit 0 designates sign: 0 = Positive, 1 = Negative Bit 1-9 are data bits Bit 1 is most significant data bit for positive numbers Bit 9 is most significant data bit

To scale these parameters, use slot 1-6. Set  $K = A_1 / 64$  and bias =  $A_0$  if a cal curve exists or set K = 0.015625 and bias = 0.0 if no cal curve exists.

3. Analog MDM Unipolar (AMU)

A 10-bit unipolar signal (may vary from 0 up to +5.11 volts).

Bit 0 designates sign; but in the case of unipolar signals, it is always positive. Bit 1 designates the MSB. (Bits 1-9 are data bits.) Bit 9 designates the LSB.

Set K =  $A_1$  / 64 and bias =  $A_0$  if a cal curve exists or set K = 0.015625 and bias = 0.0 if no cal curve exists.

4. Binary Coded Decimal (BCD)

A 4-bit signal that defines a decimal number in accordance with the following codes. There should be no reason to scale these parameters.

6. Binary Discrete (BD)

A VP that utilizes one binary bit, either 1 or 0. The location of the parameter within the 16-bit word is specified by the start bit. There should be no reason to scale these parameters.

7. Packed Bit String, Mixed Data (BMD)


A contiguous bit string that contains various information. The start bit will be from 0 to 63. The number of bits will be from 2 to 64. Not scalable.

8. Bit String, Magnitude, and Sign (BMS)

A parameter that contains a sign bit and 1 to 63 magnitude bits. The MSB is the bit immediately to the right of the start bit. The start bit defines the location of the sign bit within the parent word. The start bit may designate any individual any individual bit within the parent bit as the sign bit. Parameter length (number of bits) specifies the length of the parameter including the sign bit.

Bit XX = sign: 0 = Positive, 1 = NegativeWhere: XX 00-63 If sign is negative, the magnitude is **not** in 2's complement form. Bit XX + 1 designates the MSB

Example: start bit is bit 7



These parameters are not scalable since the negative values are not in 2's complement.

9. Packed Bit String, Signed (BSS)

The most significant data bits will be the bit following the sign bit; a parameter that contains a sign bit and 1 to 63 magnitude bits. The start bit will specify the location of the sign bit within the parent word. Parameter length (number of bits) will specify the length of the parameter including the sign bit.

Bit XX = sign: 0 = Positive, 1 = NegativeWhere: XX 00-63 If sign is negative, the magnitude is in 2's complement form. Bit XX + 1 designates the MSB

Refer to paragraph C.3 of the Variable Parameter Scaling section for scaling information.

10. Packed Bit String, Unsigned (BSU)

Parameter that contains 2 to 63 magnitude bits. The start bit will specify the location of the MSB within the parent word. The number of bits will specify the

length of the parameter from 02 to 64. Refer to paragraph C.3 of the Variable Parameter Scaling section for scaling information.

11. Double Word, Mixed Data (DMD)

A 48-bit word that contains various information. It may also be referred to as a 48-bit parent word that contains one or more imbedded signals of less than 48 bits parameter length. Refer to paragraph C.3 of the Variable Parameter Scaling section for scaling information.

12. Double Precision Floating Point (DPF 64 bits)

A floating-point number consisting of an unsigned characteristic and a signed fraction. The quantity expressed by this number is the product of the fraction, and the number 16 raised to the power of the exponent.

Bit 0 designates the sign of the fraction: 0 = Positive, 1 = Negative

Bits 1-7 designate the characteristic. A binary number with a range of 0 through 127. The exponent is derived by subtracting 64 from the characteristic. Therefore, the range of the exponent is -64 through +63.

Bits 8-63 designate the fraction. A binary number less than 1 with the binary point to the left of the high-order digit (between bits 7 and 8).

Set  $K = A_1$  and bias =  $A_0$  if a cal curve exists or set K = 1.0 and bias = 0.0 if no cal curve exists.

13. Digital Uplink Command (DUC)

Identifies a digital uplink command as defined by an MSID and unique digital encoded data. Not known if these parameters are scalable.

14. Extended Word, Mixed Data (EMD)

A 64-bit word that contains various information. It may also be referred to as a 64-bit parent word that contains one or more imbedded signals of less than 64 bits parameter length. Refer to paragraph C.3 of the Variable Parameter Scaling section for scaling information.

15. Extended Precision Floating Point (EPL 48 bits)

A floating-point number consisting of an unsigned characteristic and a signed fraction. The quantity expressed by this number is the product of the fraction, and the number 16 raised to the power of the exponent.

Bit 0 designates the sign of the fraction: 0 = Positive, 1 = Negative

Bits 1-7 designate the characteristic-A binary number with a range of 0 through 127. The exponent is derived by subtracting 64 from the characteristic. Therefore, the range of the exponent is -64 through +63.

Bits 8-47 designate the fraction-A binary number less than 1 with the binary point to the left of the high-order digit (between bits 7 and 8).

Set  $K = A_1$  and bias =  $A_0$  if a cal curve exists or set K = 1.0 and bias = 0.0 if no cal curve exists. The low-order 16 bits will be truncated but these are precision bits only and the effect should be negligible.

16. Frequency Modulated (FM)

FM data is derived from analog signals that are frequency modulated in the frequency division multiplexer (FDM) and recorded on a wideband recorder. Frequency responses of 500 Hz, 2 KHz, and 8 KHz are available. Not known whether or not these parameters are scalable.

17. Full Word, Mixed Data (FMD)

A 32-bit word that contains various information. It may also be referred to as a 32-bit parent word that contains one or more imbedded signals of less than 32 bits parameter length. Refer to paragraph C.3 of the Variable Parameter Scaling section for scaling information.

18. Full Word, Fixed Point, Signed (FXS)

A 32-bit word containing a signed, fixed-point number of 32 bits parameter length.

- Bit 0 designates sign: 0 = Positive, 1 = NegativeIf sign is negative, the magnitude is in the 2's complement form.
- Bit 1 designates the MSB.
- Bit 31 designates the LSB.
- 19. Full Word, Fixed Point, Unsigned (FXU)

A 32-bit word containing an unsigned, fixed-point number of 32 bits parameter length.

Bit 1 designates the MSB.

Bit 31 designates the LSB.

20. Half Word, Fixed Point Overflow, Signed (HFS)

A 16-bit word containing a sign bit, an overflow bit, and 10 magnitude bits. This data type is very rare. The overflow bit indicates if the value for the parameter has become too large. When the overflow bit equals 1, the data becomes inaccurate and attempts should be made to return the overflow bit to a value of 0.

Bit 0 designates the sign bit: 0 = Positive, 1 = NegativeBit 1 designates the overflow bit: 0 = No overflow, 1 = OverflowBit 2 designates the MSB. Bit 11 designates the LSB.

***Bits 2-11 are magnitude only: the sign bit indicates polarity.

These parameters are not scalable because of the overflow bit.

21. Half Word, Mixed Data (HMD)

A 16-bit word that contains various information. It may also be referred to as a 16-bit parent word that contains one or more imbedded signals of less than 16 bits parameter length. Refer to paragraph C.3 of the Variable Parameter Scaling section for scaling information.

22. Half Word, Magnitude and Sign (HMS)

A 16-bit word containing a sign bit and 15 magnitude bits.

Bit 0 designates sign: 0 = Positive, 1 = Negative Bit 1 designates the MSB. Bit 15 designates the LSB.

To scale these parameters, use any of slots 1-6. Set  $K = A_1$  and bias =  $A_0$  if a cal curve exists or set K = 1.0 and bias = 0.0 if no cal curve exists.

#### 23. Half Word, Precision Floating Point (HPL 16 bits)

A floating-point number consisting of an unsigned characteristic and a signed fraction. The quantity expressed by this number is the product of the fraction, and the number 16 raised to the power of the exponent.

Bit 0 designates the sign of the fraction: 0 = Positive, 1 = Negative

Bits 1-7 designate the characteristic-A binary number with a range of 0 through 127. The exponent is derived by subtracting 64 from the characteristic. Therefore, the range of the exponent is -64 through +63.

Bits 8-15 designate the fraction-A binary number less than 1 with the binary point to the left of the high-order digit (between bits 7 and 8).

These parameters are not scalable since the Varibale Parameter Scaling application computation requires floating-point numbers to be at least 32 bits in length.

24. Half Word, Fixed Point, Signed (HXS)

A 16-bit word containing a signed, fixed-point number of 16 bits parameter length. Bits 1-15 designate magnitude.

- Bit 0 designates sign: 0 = Positive, 1 = Negative If sign is negative, the magnitude is in the 2's complement form.
- Bit 1 designates the MSB.

Bit 15 designates the LSB.

To scale these parameters, use any of slots 1-6. Set  $K = A_1$  and bias =  $A_0$  if a cal curve exists or set K = 1.0 and bias = 0.0 if no cal curve exists.

25. Half Word, Fixed Point, Unsigned (HXU)

A 16-bit word containing a signed, fixed-point number of 16 bits parameter length.

Bit 1 designates the MSB. Bit 15 designates the LSB.

Set  $K = A_1$  and bias =  $A_0$  if a cal curve exists or set K = 1.0 and bias = 0.0 if no cal curve exists.

26. Quarter Word, Mixed Data (QMD)

An 8-bit word that contains various information. It may also be referred to as an 8-bit parent word that contains one or more imbedded signals of less than 8 bits parameter length. Refer to paragraph C.3 of the Variable Parameter Scaling section for scaling information.

27. Single Precision Floating Point (SPL)

A floating-point number consisting of an unsigned characteristic (or exponent) and a signed fraction. The quantity expressed by this number is the product of the fraction, and the number 16 raised to the power of the exponent.

Bit 0 designates the sign of the fraction: 0 = Positive, 1 = Negative

Bits 1-7 designate the characteristic-A binary number with a range of 0 through 127. The exponent is derived by subtracting 64 from the characteristic. Therefore, the range of the exponent is -64 through +63.

Bits 8-31 designate the fraction-A binary number less than 1 with the binary point to the left of the high-order digit (between bits 7 and 8).

Set  $K = A_1$  and bias =  $A_0$  if a cal curve exists or set K = 1.0 and bias = 0.0 if no cal curve exists.

28. Variable Data (VAR)

A 16-bit parameter that is utilized to downlist multiplexed data or data with variable content. These are the VPs. There should never be a reason to downlist the VPs in the VP slots and thus no reason to scale parameters of this type.

29. EBCDIC Character Data (CHE)

Measurements contain 8 bits of EBCDIC. Character data measurements are sub-measurements (associated with parent/grandparent measurements) which can be assembled to define message text from the character data string. These parameters are not known to be scaleable.

30. European ASCII Character Data (CHU)

Measurements contains 8 bits of European ASCII. Character data measurements are sub-measurements (associated with parent/grandparent measurements) which can be assembled to define message text from the character data string. These parameters are not known to be scaleable.

BFS VARIABLE PARAMETERS (Command Server)

## PURPOSE

The BFS VP load consists of three user definable downlist parameters which provide the capability to downlist the contents of any memory location across all memory configurations. It is maintained across OPS transitions. This gives the ground controllers more insight into BFS, and allows pre- and post-verification of memory writes. The parameters are initialized to a known memory location by an assembly language variable called DLINIT, and set to the pattern FCFC.

The MSIDs associated with the three slots located on MSK 1302 and 1350 are:

- Slot 1: V98U1280C
- Slot 2: V98U1281C
- Slot 3: V98U1282C

The four-digit hex values shown in the downlist represent the contents of the memory addresses that were uplinked.

The BFS VP uses the generic command load. For all flights prior to OI-23, only one VP can be sent at a time (reference BFS DR number 106173). For OI-23 and subs, one, two, or three VPs can be uplinked with a single command. The BFS VP cannot be scaled like the PASS VP. This SCP describes coordinating a BFS VP for uplink, building a BFS VP load using the Variable Parameters application and interpreting the load once it has been sent to the command server. The BFS VP requires coordination between six MCC console positions: DPS, DPS SPT, the FCR/MPSR requesting the uplink, FLIGHT DIRECTOR, COMMAND, and INCO.

## **RESTRICTIONS/CONSTRAINTS**

#### CAUTION

This procedure is governed by FCOH procedures 3.1, 3.2.2, 3.2.2.1, and 4.10, and is not to be changed in real time without review and approval of the Flight Director or changed premission without review and approval at the FOIG.

D. Time Constraints, Crew Coordination Requirements

Uplink after BFS is active post-OPS 101 transition during prelaunch or during OPS 3 for entry.

E. Hazard/Safety Implications

Orbiter generic command loads have the capability of uplinking any command sequence and are inherently hazardous. Acceptance by the command server or vehicle requires only a valid OP Code, and by design, there are no command server or onboard restrictions on the executable bit pattern in the command string. **Uplink of an incorrect bit pattern can have unpredictable results, including loss of BFS, unexpected alarms, and corruption/loss of onboard systems.** 

F. Other Requirements

Use of C99 Orbiter Universal Load menu from Megadata or MED Emulation is prohibited. Use of the C99 is via workstation application program only.

BFS is required to track PASS because the load is uplinked through the NSP that is commanded by the PASS computer.

## PROCEDURES

A. Building a BFS VP

#### WARNING

This operation utilizes an orbiter universal load (C99). Uplink of an incorrect bit pattern can have unpredictable results, including loss of BFS, unexpected alarms, and corruption/loss of onboard systems.

#### CAUTION

The use of the TELCOM Generic Command Load application to generate this load is prohibited. Workstation application software specifically designed to build BFS VPs is required.

- 1. DPS/DPS SPT receives **three copies** of the Variable Parameter Display Request form (Figure 7.6G-1) from the requesting discipline and determine criticality.
- 2. DPS SPT notifies DPS that a VP is in work on DPS MPSR loop.
- 3. DPS SPT verifies address in the BFS Listings section of the flight software (optical disk) under the HALSTAT section (reference SCP 1.8).

# CAUTION Coordinate with the appropriate discipline if their VP slot will be replaced with a new BFS VP. If this coordination is not performed, the discipline may begin troubleshooting erroneous data.

- 4. DPS coordinates with originator which slot to use.
- 5. DPS SPT completes the VP form with the following information:
  - a. Slot number, Title, DSM number, and Signature
  - b. Send one copy to DPS for verification.
  - c. Upon DPS verification, send one copy to the originator.
- 6. Build the VP.
  - a. Start the Variable Parameters application by selecting Command->Command Server->Variable Parameter on the DPS DNAV. The Variable Parameter application is shown in Figure 7.7G-1.

- b. Upon initialization, the Variable Parameter application will select the flight ID for the activity that was selected during activity selection. If the flight selected is not the desired flight, change it via the File->Change Flight pull down menu.
- c. To build a new VP, select new from the File menu and then select BFS. The next available DSM number will be automatically selected. If the desired DSM number does not appear, you may type it in. If a modification to an existing load is desired, select File->Open and then, using the arrow buttons next to the DSM number, select the DSM number of the load you wish to modify.
- d. Input the appropriate fields (Figure 7.7G-1): Rqst, Address, Description and HAL Name. The address must be within the range 0- 3FFFF, the DSM number must be within the range 19901-19925

B. Load Build Coordination

To send the load to the command server, perform the following steps:

1. Obtain Flight Director approval to enable generic commanding.

2.	Have COMMAND enable generic commanding on the workstation. Provide	]
	COMMAND with the following information over the COMMAND Loop:	

- a. OP Code 37
- b. Terminal/Position Auth ID DPS
- c. Destination Node Name FCR = WF3 or WF22 MPSR = WM6 or WM9
- 3. Send the load to the command server by selecting Send under the Command menu.
- 4. Verify the load using the bottom portion of the Variable Parameters application, Figure 7.7G-1. See Command Load Verification Section C.
- 5. Have COMMAND disable op code 37 and generic commanding.
- C. Verifying a BFS VP
  - DPS and DPS SPT verify the load by using the bottom half of the Variable Parameter application. Immediately after the load is sent to the Command server, it will appear on the bottom portion of the display (verification area). Additional VP loads in the command server can be viewed by scrolling to the desired DSM using the up and down arrow keys next to the DSM field of the verification area. The up/down arrows in the verification area are not active unless the Variable Parameters application is in the Verify mode. To put the application in the Verify mode, select Command->Verify.

Verify that the addresses are correct and that they are listed under the appropriate VP slot number.

Verify the DSM number range is between 19901 and 19925.

Verify that the OP CODE is 37 (hex).

Verify the MF is **BFCS**.

Verify that the title is correct.

Verify the load is safed in the command server, indicated by "Safed" in the field next to the GMT Gen.

Although not required, the actual hex data words to be uplinked can be verified by using the Command Data Words (CDW) application. For more information on starting and understanding the Command Data Words Application refer to SCP 7.1G. Interpretation of the individual bits in the command words is shown in the following sections. For additional information on the bit definitions refer to the Space Shuttle Computer Program Development Specification (CPDS) SS Downlist/Uplink Software Requirements (SS-P-0002-140).

2. Command Data Word 01 - contains the vehicle ID, MF, and Op Code. Bits 1 through 16 are formatted as follows:

a. Vehicle ID

The Veh ID will show zeros in the command server, and the vehicle ID is inserted upon uplink. However, the load sent to the command server must process and include the correct vehicle ID so the command server can place the load in the correct load storage array for the particular vehicle.

b. Major function

A four-bit code that identifies major function to which the command is addressed. Verify this field is for the BFS major function - **1010**.

c. Op code

A seven-bit code that identifies the type of command. Verify the BFS VP Op Code - **0110111** (37 hex).

d. FCW and LCW

A two-bit code that identifies the command word as the first, intermediate, or last command in a chained command string. Verify that these bits are 10, indicating the first command word in a multiword command.

3. Command Data Words 02 and 03 - Bits 17 through 48 are formatted as follows:

Bits 17 - 24	Bits 25 - 28	Bits 29 - 48
Spare	VP Slot	Addr

a. Bits 17-24: Spare

Verify these eight bits contain **0**.

b. Bits 25-28: VP Slot

Four-bit code which represents the ID of the slot the VP will be displayed. Verify correct slot:

VP Slot 1 - 0001 VP Slot 2 - 0010 VP Slot 3 - 0011

c. Bits 29-48: Address

Verify the correct memory address. The possible format range is 00000 to FFFFF. However, the valid **range for the BFS memory is 0-3FFFF**. Since this is a generic command load any address is valid but only addresses in the range 0-3FFFF are allowed by the Variable Parameters application.

- d. Command Data Words 04, 05, 06, 07 The Command Data Words 04/05 and 06/07 pairs are formatted the same as the Command Data Words 02/03 pair.
- D. Uplink Coordination

Note: If uplinking a prebuilt BFS VP, *refer to Procedures under B, Load Build Coordination, page 7.7G-5.* Load build coordination must be done prior to this procedure.

- 1. DPS generates a Flight Note to the Flight Director and INCO identifying the DSM number and the desired major function.
- 2. Obtain Flight Director approval for command uplink.
- 3. DPS SPT calls COMMAND on the COMMAND loop to unsafe the command.
- 4. DPS coordinates with INCO/INST on INCO/INST COORD loop to uplink the command. (Standard coordination shall include reading the DSM number, the MF, and that the Flight Director has given a GO for uplink, as well as a read back by INCO (or INST) of the information for verbal verification.)
- 5. DPS (or DPS SPT) should monitor the Command Tracking application to verify a successful uplink. Verify that the load is uplinked to the BFS major function. For more information on starting and understanding the Command Tracking application refer to SCP 7.1G.
- 6. DPS/DPS SPT informs the requester their BFS VP is onboard.
- 7. Once the command is uplinked, DPS SPT calls COMMAND to safe the load in the command server. If the command is no longer required, the load will be deleted from the command server.

#### **CAUTION**

- 1. Crew should be cognizant of DEU-equivalent use and avoid associated DEU/CRT access.
- 2. SPEC 2 TIME will have to be up on an active CRT.
- 3. Unless the update is being performed to a simplex GPC in OPS 0, the maximum update that can be implemented at one time is 15 milliseconds. No limit exists for an update to a simplex GPC in OPS 0.

E. Hazard/Safety Implications

## WARNING

- Do not perform the following actions until the update is complete. Violating these restrictions could cause GPCs to fail and/or fault to internal time. These restrictions apply if the update is performed by the crew, or if the update is performed via uplink. Note that once the update is initiated via item 32 on SPEC 2 TIME, the update can take up to 2 minutes to complete.
  - a. OPS transitions or mode recalls
  - b. I/O resets
  - c. GPC output switch changes
  - d. Manual accumulator selection
- 2. Do not chain the required DEU-equivalent loads together; chaining invalid or incorrect DEU equivalent loads can cause unpredictable results.
- F. Other Requirements

MTU GMT updates may only be performed if the error exceeds 100 milliseconds or MTU year-end rollover occurs. This limitation is defined and documented in Flight Rule 7-33, TIME MANAGEMENT. No programmatic limitations exist on MTU MET updates; MET updates may be performed at anytime contingent upon Flight Director's approval and according to the flight control team's requirements.

#### PROCEDURE

- A. MTU/GPC Update When Error Exceeds 100 Milliseconds
  - 1. GMT update via crew input

DPS should prepare **four** copies (DPS, DPS SPT, FD, and CAPCOM) of a Flight Note detailing crew actions. In general, crew actions are as follows:

- a. GNC SPEC 2 PRO.
- b. ITEM 27 + .015 EXEC or ITEM 27 .015 EXEC (depending on which way the error is).
- c. ITEM 32 EXEC (update can take up to 2 minutes).

Do not perform the following actions until the update is complete:

2. GMT update via uplink

DPS/DPS SPT will build, verify, and coordinate the uplink of DEU-equivalent loads in accordance with DPS SCP 7.3, DEU EQUIVALENT LOADS, and FCOH SOP 3.3.1, DEU EQUIVALENT COMMANDS.

- B. GMT/MET Recovery From MTU and GPC Powerdown
  - 1. Power up the MTU.
    - Notes: a. MTU oscillators should be stable enough to support GPC time management after an hour warmup.
      - b. At powerup, the MTU will reflect a GMT of 1 day and an MET of zero. Upon powerup of the MTU, BSR bits 9, 10, 11, and 12 will be unpredictable until the MTU is initialized by resetting GMT and MET.
  - 2. Power up and mode a single GPC to RUN.
    - Notes: a. The selected GPC's overlay must contain the TIME SPEC 2. If no GPC has this SPEC, an IPL will be necessary.
      - b. The following GPC time management logic occurs during initialization.

MTU GMT  $\rightarrow$  GPC MET MTU GMT - MTU MET  $\rightarrow$  MET REF GPC GMT - MET REF  $\rightarrow$  GPC MET

result: GPC MET = MTU MET (Note: This logic syncs GPC and MTU MET.)

3.  $\triangle$ GMT update is displayed as MTU 1  $\triangle$ T (MTU 2  $\triangle$ T) on MSK 1301 DPS 1- GNC/BFS.

- 4. Execute initial GMT update using the following procedure to the single GPC in OPS 0:
- a. SPEC 2 PRO
  - b. ITEM 24 + DDD + HH + MM + SS.SSS EXEC
  - c. ITEM 32 EXEC

Note: Update can take up to 2 minutes. There is no 15-msec limit for a single GPC in OPS 0

#### WARNING

Do not perform any actions or keyboard inputs until the update is complete.

The following logic occurs:

GPC GMT +  $\triangle$ GMT UPDATE  $\rightarrow$  GPC GMT and MTU GMT GPC GMT  $\rightarrow$  MET REF (GPC MET = 0) GPC reset to MTU MET counter (MTU MET = GPC MET = 0)

  - 2. The Flight Rules require the MTU to be reinitialized to the incorrect GPC GMT.

- c. ITEM 32 EXEC
- 3. MET update via uplink

DPS/DPS SPT will build, verify, and coordinate the uplink of DEU-equivalent loads in accordance with DPS SCP 7.3, DEU-EQUIVALENT LOADS, and FCOH SOP 3.3.1, DEU EQUIVALENT COMMANDS.

DAY OF LAUNCH I-LOAD UPDATE (Command Server)

## PURPOSE

This SCP outlines the activities that take place during the Day Of Launch I-Load update for the Guidance Polynomial Update procedure and specifies activities of interest to the DPS Officer. This procedure is written to supplement the GPO procedure in the Flight Control Operations Handbook (FCOH). Refer to SOP 3.2.4.1, DOLILU II.

## **RESTRICTIONS/CONSTRAINTS**

### CAUTION

This procedure is governed by FCOH 3.2.4.1 and is not to be changed in real time without review and approval of the Flight Director or changed premission without review and approval at the FOIG.

## GENERAL

This procedure normally takes place approximately 1.5 hours before launch and is titled Launch Polynomial Update in S0007 Launch Countdown Operational Maintenance Instruction (OMI), volumes I and II.

## PROCEDURE

This procedure is general in nature and may vary in the actual OMI.

- A. GPO prebuilds and verifies the approved alternate I-loads. The loads will be authorized via Release Authorization for Signature Sheet (RASS).
- B. The Mission Management Team (MMT) makes the decision to load an alternate set of I-loads.
- C. To display and process GPC Dump data, DPS will use the GPC Dump workstation application. Other disciplines can access the GPC Dump display off the master DNAV Master || Shuttle | DPS | Real-Time (data from DPS) | GPC Dump Display. See SCP 6.1, GPC/MMU Dump - Ground Processing, for more information on GPC dumps.
- D. GPO coordinates the uplink of the approved set of alternate set of I-loads to the PASS G9 set with INCO. Since STS-27, the load is uplinked in the manual mode and verified by INCO, Guidance, and the MER. Once the load is verified in the buffer, INCO switches to AUTO mode and executes the two-stage buffer.

E. KSC performs a DEU-equivalent software dump. The starting address for the dump is the first address of CGGS_T_GMTLO_REF, which is GMT of lift-off with the desired I-loads following.

These parameters are in HALSTAT and the dump extends for at least 50 frames.

These addresses are also defined in the RASS. DPS maintains a copy of the RAD/RASS containing the address on console. KSC will perform an alternate yaw or an alternate pitch dump only if those I-loads were changed via uplink.

- F. Once the dump is performed, DPS SPT views the dump quality report on the GPC Dump workstation application. DPS SPT informs DPS.
- G. DPS reports the results of the quality of the dump to the Flight Director on the FLIGHT voice loop. The dump will be reaccomplished as necessary to verify a valid dump (this assumes an MCC dump processing problem because of a momentary loss of data).
- H. GPO and MER verifies the contents of the software dump using the GPC Dump workstation application.
- I. DPS should maintain hard copies of the GPC Dump application display.
- J. Later in the countdown, a PASS/BFS One Shot Transfer is performed which, among other things, transfers the new I-loads from the PASS to the BFS.
- K. The alternate I-loads may be changed after the OPS 1 transition by going back to OPS 9, uplinking the new I-loads, transitioning back to OPS 1, and then dumping the I-loads.

## TITLE

MDM BITE READ VARIABLE PARAMETER DECODING

### PURPOSE

This section of the SCP provides information needed to decode and, possibly, interpret the contents of the TLM data associated with the MDM uplink BITE Read. Since the procedure does not deal specifically with command load build, load verification, or uplink coordination, there is no requirement to maintain this section under formal configuration control.

### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

In the event of a hard failure (MDM port or I/O module), the MDM may be physically unable to support the BITE Read I/O request. In such cases, the GPC(s) performing the MDM BITE Read will log a single I/O error (I/O transaction ID 27 thru 34 for flight critical MDM's, ID 46 or 47 for payload MDM's or for flex pairs, and ID 68 or 69 for single flex MDM's). There are no bypass bits set and no fault messages annunciated (totally transparent to the flight crew).

For initial timeout (ITO) signatures, the VP contents will be "0000" hex for each response word since the two-halfword BITE read buffer is cleared prior to the actual I/O request. If a V-bit error signature (actually, any SEV bit) is observed, the MDM has detected a problem while performing the BITE read (essentially confirming a hard-failure condition). If two response data words are expected and the error is detected on the first RDW, the IOP will terminate the BCE program before any data is moved to the input buffer. Also, the second RDW will "fall in the bit bucket." Thus, no response data will be stored in the BITE Read buffer and the VP contents will be "0000" hex for each response word. If the first RDW is successful but the second RDW has a V-bit error, then the first VP slot will contain some data, but not necessarily the expected pattern. The second VP slot will be "0000" since no data was transferred to the input buffer. The residual word count can be used if it is unclear what's going on.

It should be noted that the SMS has no requirement to model the MDM BITE capability. Even though the flight software can support MDM BITE Reads, the MDM model responds with one and only one RDW, the contents of which have no correlation to expected data (VP contents will normally be "0000" hex). If the expected number of RDWs is two, then an I/O error will be logged. For simulation purposes, ignore the I/O error and "go" with the green card signature.

## PROCEDURE

A. BSR Read Option

.

The BSR Read command will return only one response word (one VP slot). The BSR hexadecimal data format is summarized below (MSB is bit 1, of 1 to 15 bits):

Note that the BITE Status Register (BSR) is cleared ("0000" hexadecimal) at both MDM power-up (also, bit 1 is set) and upon completion of a BSR Read. However, reading the BSR on one MDM port does not affect the contents of the BSR on the other port (they are totally uncoupled). Any bits set in the BSR may have occurred at any time since the MDM was last power cycled or the BSR was most recently read. Since there is no time-tagging associated with the setting of the bits, it may or may not be possible to correlate the occurrence of a BSR bit-set action with an observed MDM anomaly. Note also that a successful BSR Read or BITE 4 Read will *not* set the "Good BITE Test" bit.

It may be possible to detect certain hard-failures by performing back-to-back MDM BSR reads. The first BSR Read command is primarily intended to initialize the BSR, although the contents on that first read may also provide valuable data. The suspect hardware is then exercised, followed by a second BSR Read command to determine if a hardware problem is, in fact, indicated.

The following provides a description of each bit of the 16-bit BSR:

Bit 1 **Power Applied/Power Interrupt** - This bit is set in only two instances: during the powerup sequence and 100 microseconds prior to MDM shutdown. This bit indicates that all analog and discrete outputs have been, or about to be, reset to 0 VDC.

Note that whenever an MDM is powered on or power cycled, the BSR's power interrupt bit for each MDM port will be set and remain set until a BSR read. The first BSR read on an MDM port since the poweron condition should nominally indicate an "8000" hex value. The BSR power interrupt bit is reset upon completion of the BSR read. Any subsequent BSR read should nominally indicate a "0000" hex value.

- Bit 2 **Incoming Data Error** This bit indicates that an incoming data bus command word or command data word was detected to have an error. The error is either an invalid Manchester format, a bit-count error, or a bad parity. Also, an expected command data word with an invalid MDM address, an invalid Manchester format, bit-count error, bad parity, or incorrect "101" check pattern will set this bit.
- Bit 3 **Operation Requested on a Nonexistent Channel** This bit is set when a nonexistent I/O channel is addressed. The data will continue to be processed. For MDM response words, the V-Bit reflects that the data word is invalid on a word-by-word basis. If this error occurs, bit 4 is also set (Unable to Transfer Data To/From IOM).
- Bit 4 **Unable to Transfer Data To/From IOM** This bit is set when the I/O module fails to reply to the SCU with a "data transferred (operation completed)" signal. However, the data is still processed. For the MDM response words, the V-Bit is reset (logical 0) to reflect that an error was detected on a word-by-word basis.

A description of each bit of the 16-bit BSR is continued below:

- Bit 5 **Too Many Words in Last Message** This bit is set if more words were received in a message than specified by the command word. The extra data words are ignored and the MDM waits to receive a new command.
- Bit 6 **Last Command Not Completed** This bit is set when a new command is received before the previous command was completed. Processing of the old command is terminated and the new command is processed.
- Bit 7 **Simultaneous Execution on Primary and Backup Data Bus** -This bit is set if both SCUs attempt to operate simultaneously (i.e., a command word is received by one SCU while the other SCU is "busy"). This condition will cause an immediate, temporary, halt of both SCUs until either SCU receives a new command.
- Bit 8 **Illegal Mode Commanded** This bit is set if an illegal or ambiguous mode has been commanded: accessing a "mode" field identified as "spare", receiving command data words without a command word, the SCU PROM program attempting to execute both input and output operations in the same program, incompatibility between the mode control and the module address fields, or addressing a module classed as "not present" or "spare."

- Bit 9 Internal Error Detected This bit is set in four instances: when the SCU has detected a parity error for any of the 512-word block of the sequence memory PROM; an unexpected "IOM Reply" (IOM reply line is a logical 1 prior to the "channel present" time slot); an unexpected "A/D Reply" (A/D reply line is a logical 1 prior to the "data transferred (operation completed)" time slot); or the SCU In Bus "check bits" contain an invalid pattern.
- Bit 10 **Gap Time Error** This bit is set when the detected interword gap time between either the command word and the first command data word or between command data words is outside the acceptable limits:

gap time < 4 microseconds or gap time > 10 microseconds.

- Bit 11 **Successful BITE Completion** This bit indicates the commanded SCU BITE test, the A/D Converter BITE test, or the MDM Power Supply BITE test was executed successfully (G9 testing).
- Bits 12 **BITE Test** This field indicates progression through a specified
- throug MDM BITE test, which is not performed in flight. The field is applicable only for SCU, power supply, and A/D BITE tests (G9 testing). At all other times, these bits stay reset (logical 0) and physically reside in the Register File.
- B. BITE 4 Read Option

The number of response data words (RDW's), either one or two, for the BITE 4 Read command is dependent on the card chosen for the BITE test. If two response words are returned, two consecutive VP slots are required. The workstation logic will not permit slot 10 to be selected (for the first RDW) since the onboard software does not wrap the second RDW to VP slot 1.

Raw BITE 4 Read data acquired from analog input modules (AIS or AID) or analog output modules (AOD) are encoded in PCM counts in a two's complement format and will require conversion to engineering units to determine whether or not the the analog channel is valid. A procedure to accomplish the required conversion will be provided in subsequent paragraphs.

Raw BITE 4 Read data acquired from discrete input modules (DIL or DIH), from Tacan modules (TAC), and from serial input/output modules (SIO) will be manually compared against a set of predetermined, expected hexadecimal patterns. If the actual response data is in agreement with the expected patterns, then it is reasonably certain that any suspect parameter interfaces are the result of failures external to the MDM.

Raw BITE 4 Read data from discrete output modules (DOL or DOH) should actually correspond to the theoretical MDM bilevel discrete command patterns. However,

since such command patterns may actually vary from instant to instant, it will be necessary to capture an image of the GPC command "set mask," as well as the BITE 4 response data.

The following sections either provide information with which the acquired MDM BITE 4 Read data may be compared, or an approach to calculate the results for comparison against a reference value.

1. Discrete Input Low/Discrete Input High (DIL/DIH)

The DIL and DIH cards provide two response words for the BITE 4 test. A fixed set of inputs are generated within the IOM when it is chosen for the BITE 4 Read. Note that the actual bilevel discrete inputs are electronically switched out of the discrete receiver circuits during the time the BITE patterns are generated. Thus, a predetermined BITE bit-pattern, totally independent of the instantaneous inputs is possible. By design, the resultant inputs are dependent on the channel selected as illustrated in Table 7.10B-1. These 16 bits are sent back to the GPC in the first MDM response word. The original test inputs are then "inverted" and sent back to the GPC in the second response word. The nominal variable parameter data is shown in Table 7.10B-2.

If the downlisted discrete input card BITE 4 response data does not agree with the expected patterns, then either the MDM has sustained a BITE circuit failure, or there is a failure at the bilevel receiver, the 18-bit parallel to serial shift register, or possibly the channel select logic. Since the BITE 4 Read was most likely performed to isolate a bilevel discrete parameter problem, it is a safe bet the BITE circuitry is OK. Unless power cycling clears up the problem, the input parameter is lost for the duration of the mission. In any event, the MDM is a good candidate for R&R postlanding. 2. Analog Input Differential/Analog Single-Ended (AID/AIS)

The AID/AIS cards provide two response words for the BITE 4 test. The first response word is formed by algebraically adding a "Reference BITE Voltage" to ½of the actual instantaneous input signal . Rescaling of the actual analog input is accomplished via modification of the input receiver scaling and feedback resistors. The Reference BITE Voltage is either approximately +2 V dc or -2 V dc, dependent on the analog channel selected. Table 7.10B-3 provides BITE voltage for each AID/AIS channel. This data is sent back to the GPC in the first MDM response word.

The second response word corresponds to the actual input analog signal. Note that each analog input receiver uses an RC filter to block the high frequency noise (>40 Hz) component in the input signal. Therefore, even a dynamically changing analog signal will not change sufficiently to affect the BITE Read results since the two RDW's are read so closely together (within 34 microseconds of each other).

An inherent assumption associated with the analog input card BITE test capability is that the input signal associated with the channel to be tested is within the conversion range of the A/D Converter; that is, from -5.12 V dc to +5.11 V dc. While an analog input receiver can handle input voltages far in excess of these values, the A/D Converter is limited in its conversion to a magnitude of 5.12 V dc. This is because the A/D converter design uses only a sign ( $\pm$ ) bit plus 9 data bits (least significant bit corresponding to 10 millivolts dc) to express the digitized voltage. If the actual analog differential input voltage magnitude is greater than 5.12 V dc (AID line-to-line input, AIS line to analog ground), the A/D converter will effectively "clip" the input at the maximum magnitude (+5.11 V dc or -5.12 V dc) due to the 10-bit conversion design limit requirements of the A/D converter logic.

While it is not intuitively obvious at first glance, this condition, should it occur, will invalidate the analog input card BITE test. This factor should always be kept in mind when assessing the results of a BITE 4 Read to an AIS or AID card. This is not meant to imply the BITE test is of no value, but only that one

should not jump to conclusions should the actual BITE 4 Read calculations compare poorly with the predicted value.

This is best illustrated via an example. Assume the input signal is *hard-failed* at +6.00 V dc and that the BITE Reference Voltage for the affected analog channel is +2.00 V dc. The first BITE measurement corresponds to the algebraic sum of the BITE Reference Voltage plus ½ of the input signal:

RDW 1 =  $[+2.00 \text{ V dc} + \frac{1}{2} (+6.00 \text{ V dc})] = +5.00 \text{ V dc}$ 

This value is well within the conversion range of the A/D converter. The second BITE measurement corresponds to the actual analog input signal, +6.00 V dc. However, conversion by the A/D converter will "clip" (or limit) the resultant value to +5.11 V dc. That is, the closest value the A/D converter can approximate the input within the 10-bit digitial conversion limitations:

RDW 2 = +5.11 V dc

Now, when the input data is manipulated according to our equation, one obtains the following calculated BITE Reference Voltage:

BITE Reference Voltage = [RDW 1 - (1/2 RDW 2)]

 $= [+5.00 \text{ V dc} - \frac{1}{2} (+5.11 \text{ V dc})] = +2.45 \text{ V dc}.$ 

This calculated value miscompares with the actual value of +2.00 V dc by a whopping 22.5 percent! This results from nonlinearities introduced into the BITE equations due to analog input signals that fail outside the conversion range of the A/D converter.

As previously stated, the BITE 4 Read data acquired from an analog input module (AIS or AID) is encoded in PCM counts in a two's complement format, and, thus, will require conversion to engineering units to determine whether or not the analog channel is valid. There are various ways to convert the raw hex data to engineering units (EU). Most certainly, the easiest way is to let the Variable Parameter application do the dirty work. Otherwise, the conversion will have to be performed the old-fashioned way; that is, manually. It is assumed the console operator will utilize the Variable Parameter application because of its relative ease and less chance for error in the conversion from hexadecimal to EU. However, for illustrative purposes, as well as, retention of corporate knowledge, the manual calculation approach is also presented in this SCP. In the following pages, several manual approaches will be presented that illustrate the conversion of raw hex data to EU.

# Semi-Automatic Calculation of BITE Voltage (Variable Parameters application):

As previously stated, the BITE 4 Read data acquired from an analog input module (AIS or AID) is encoded in PCM counts in a two's complement format, and, thus, will require conversion to engineering units in order to determine whether or not the analog channel is valid. The easiest way is to let the Variable Parameters application perform the conversions.

While the following procedure is not fully automated, the difficult conversion of raw hex data from two's complement format to signed (plus or minus) decimal values is performed automatically by the application. By performing a manual two-step process of entering scaling (K value and bias value), the analog "BITE Reference Voltage" will be obtained.

Recall the following: RDW 1 = [(BITE Ref Voltage) + ½ (Actual Analog Value)] RDW 2 = [Actual Analog Value]

Since these response words are raw MDM parameters, they represent 16-bit words of which the ten left-hand bits are expressed in a two's complement format the most significant bit is the sign bit (logical 0 = "+" and logical 1 = "-") and the next 9 bits are data in "powers of two" representation, with the least significant data bit (LSB) scaled at 10 millivolts DC]. The remaining least significant six bits of the 16-bit response word are simply filler bits required to satisfy data bus transmission format standards. Think of them as being formatted essentially in a "PCM count * 64" type notation (much like BFS TMBU FDA limits). Since the Variable Parameter application will convert them as a whole number, it will be necessary to divide the resultant application-converted value by "64" decimal to convert to "PCM counts". Next, since the LSB has a weighting of 10-millivolts DC (10 mV dc) per "PCM count", it will also be necessary to further rescale by [(10 mV dc per PCM count]. For the Variable Parameter application, this is accomplished by entering the desired "K Value" to the MOC.

Observe now that if we were to also rescale RDW 2 by a value of "minus ½" then the resultant application's engineering units value for RDW 2 would correspond to a value of [-½" (Actual Analog Value)]. Furthermore, if that value, once known, is subsequently added as a "bias value" to the converted value of RDW 1, then the resultant Variable Parameter application's EU value would correspond to the "BITE Ref Voltage", which is the end-item value one is attempting to calculate. The above discussion is summarized below.

a. Initially, enter the following information for VP scaling:

RDW 1: K value = [1/64 * 1/100] = 1/6400 = +0.00015625

RDW 1: bias value = 0

RDW 2: K value =  $[(-\frac{1}{2}*(1/64*1/100)]$ =  $[-\frac{1}{2}*(1/6400] = -1/12800 = -0.000078125$ 

RDW 2: bias value = 0

b. Once the BITE 4 Read load is uplinked, values corresponding to RDW 1 and RDW 2 will be displayed in engineering units on Variable Parameter application. Next, change RDW 1 "bias value" to equal the RDW 2 "EU value". The resultant RDW 1 "EU value" will then represent the computed BITE voltage.

#### Manual Calculation of BITE Voltage:

With the EU scaling capability associated with the "Variable Parameter" application, there is little need for the console operator to manually compute analog input card BITE 4 test results. It was decided, however, that this SCP should retain such information in case one wishes to exercise the capability. For example, the manual calculation of analog BITE voltage will be required anytime the Variable Parameter application software undergoes recertification testing. It could also be required as an exercise for DPS Support console certification. In any event, the SCP shall serve as a repository for corporate knowledge for the subject.

The following procedure assumes the availability of a PC running under Microsoft windows. The windows "scientific calculator" will be utilized to perform any necessary two's complement conversions and hex-to-decimal conversions, as well as, arithematic manipulations of the resultant decimal data. All of these conversions can be done by hand, but it obviously takes much, much longer to reach the final results.

- a. Call up "ACCESSORIES", double click on "Calculator," and select View option "scientific."
- b. Next, determine if either, or both of the raw hex VP analog response words are "negative." If the first hex digit is in the range "0" through "7," then the value is positive (MSB = 0) and no two's complement conversion is required (in fact, you will not get the correct results if you do complement the value). If the first hex digit is in the range "8" through "F," then the value is negative (MSB = 1) and a two's complement conversion *must* be performed. To maintain the "signed" (±) nature of the hexadecimal data, the following procedure is recommended:

If raw hex data is "positive" (first hex digit is in the range of "0" and "7"), perform steps a through c (below). Otherwise, raw hex data is "negative" (first hex digit is in the range of "8" and "F"), perform steps a through d :

- a. Select "Hex" and "Dword" display options, and then enter the raw hex value.
- b. Now, select "Dec" option to convert the intermediate results to a signed decimal.
- c. Next, divide by 64 (decimal) to convert to PCM counts (somewhat similar to what we do when manually calculating BFS TMBU limits). Finally, multiply the PCM count by "0.010" (scaling is 10 millivolts per PCM count) to convert to V dc.
- d. Subtract 10.24 (decimal).

Finally, using the "signed" ( $\pm$ ) converted voltage measurements, calculate the analog BITE Reference Voltage (nominally, +2 V dc or -2 V dc) using the following equation:

BITE Reference Voltage = (Response Word 1) minus ¹/₂ (Response Word 2)

FYI: If one desires to convert a "negative" hex value by hand, the following approach is suggested. Express the hex data as a 16-bit binary string. Then complement the binary string bit-for-bit. This is known as the one's complement of the value. Probably, the least confusing approach is to express the resultant 16-bit binary string as a hexadecimal number. Now, add a hex one "1" to the hex number and ignore any overflow to the "fifth" most significant hex digit. Consider the following examples:

"DC80" hex converts to a "1101 1100 1000 0000" binary string pattern. The one's complement is "0010 0011 0111 1111" which equals "237F" hex. The hexadecimal sum of "237F" plus "1" (that is, "0001" hex) is equal to "2380" hex.

Keep in mind that this is actually *"minus" 2380 hex*, and when converted to decimal should be expressed as a negative algebraic number (otherwise, you're not going to get the correct results).

#### Analog Input Card (AID or AIS) BITE Voltage Calculations:

A couple of examples of manual calculations are provided below. The first example is a hypothetical case that illustrates the "classical hand calculation" approach using positive hex data. This approach may be used if no calculator exists to convert from hexadecimal to decimal. The second example actually resulted from an STS-68 MDM BITE Read test and assumes the availability of a PC running in Microsoft windows.

Analog Input Differential (AID) Example No. 1:

#### Equations

RDW 1 = BITE signal +  $\frac{1}{2}$  (actual value) RDW 2 = Actual value

#### Given

FF2, Card 14 (AID), Channel 04 "Actual" input value = 5 V dc (Note: "Actual" value arbitrarily chosen for this example.)

#### Calculations

FF2 Card 14 is an AID card. Channel 04 will have a -2 V dc BITE signal added in RDW 1. VP downlist will show the following:

VP 1 = RDW 1 = "0C80" hex VP 2 = RDW 2 = "7D00" hex

Convert RDW 1 to engineering units:

RDW 1 = "0C80" = 0000 1100 1000 0000 binary = 3200 in decimal

Remember, because this is an MDM parameter, the pertinent data is in the first 10 bits. The last 6 bits are fillers so the GPC can store the information in 16-bit half words. Therefore, the decimal value must be divided by 64.

RDW 1 (PCM) = 3200/64 = 50 PCM counts, where each PCM count = 10 mV dc RDW 1 (EU) =  $50 \times 10 = 500$  mV dc = 0.5 V dc

RDW 2 = "7D00" = 0111 1101 0000 0000 binary = 32000 in decimal RDW 2 (PCM) = 32000/64 = 500 PCM counts, where each PCM count = 10 mV dc RDW 2 (EU) = 500 * 10 = 5000 mVDC = 5.0 V dc

Therefore:

RDW 1 = BITE signal + ½ (RDW 2) 0.5 V dc = BITE signal + ½ (5.0 V dc) 0.5 V dc = BITE signal + 2.5 V dc

Thus, BITE signal = 0.5 V dc - 2.5 V dc = -2.0 V dc

Analog Single-Ended Input (AIS) Example #2:

During STS-68, a PROP vernier jet parameter (MSID V42T2525C) failed erratically causing RCS jet RM to downmode the verniers, a significant operational hit to the mission. The problem was ultimately corrected by a real-time GMEM. From a DPS perspective, it was unclear if the problem was external to the MDM (PROP transducer) or the result of a single analog input channel failure. While the end result was the same on orbit (GMEM was required), isolation of the failure could potentially be significant to KSC turnaround operations should the failure have cleared once the orbiter was on the ground.

The failed parameter was channelized via MDM FA1, Card 14 (AIS), Channel 07 (Left RCS Jet L5D Oxidizer Injection Temperature indication).

VP slots 9 and 10 were selected to support the BITE 4 Read to this analog interface, since they were essentially "unused VP slots" in the GNC downlist. While convenient, their choice prohibited use of the MSK 1352 special comp to convert the raw hex data to engineering units. Such constraints, of course, no longer apply in the CCC environment with the availability of the "Variable Parameters" application.

The resultant MDM BITE 4 Read command load yielded the following raw hex data:

VP slot 9: "DC80" hex, corresponding to RDW 1 VP slot 10: "1D00" hex, corresponding to RDW 2

#### **Calculations:**

- a. By inspection, it was determined that RDW 1 was "negative" and, thus, required a two's complement conversion. Since RDW 2 was "positive", conversion was not required.
- b. Using the PC "scientific calculator" (*Hex* and *Dword* options), RDW 1 was converted to volts as indicated below:

"DC80" minus "10000" equals "FFFFDC80" (intermediate value). The *Dec* option was selected and the intermediate value was converted to "-9088" decimal. This value, in turn was divided by 64 decimal to yield "-142" (in PCM counts). Further scaling by multiplying this result by "0.010" yielded a final value of "-1.42 VDC" for RDW 1.

c. Using the PC "scientific calculator" (*Hex* and *Dword* options), RDW 2 was converted to volts as indicated below:

"1D00" was entered. The *Dec* option was selected and the intermediate value was converted to "7424" decimal. This value, in turn was divided by 64 decimal to yield "116" (PCM counts). Further scaling by multiplying this

result by "0.010" yielded a final value of "1.16 V dc" for RDW 2. Likewise, multiplying by "0.50" yielded a value of 0.58 V dc for 1/2 RDW 2.

d. Using these results in the equation to calculate the BITE Reference Voltage:

BITE Reference Voltage: "-1.42 V dc" minus "0.58 V dc" equals "-2.00 V dc"

Per Table 7.10B-3, the expected BITE Reference Voltage for "Channel 07" of an analog input card (either AIS or AID) is a "-2 V dc." Since the actual calculated BITE Reference Voltage was in close agreement with the predicted value, it was concluded that the MDM was, in fact, performing properly and the failure was indeed external to the MDM (a PROP transducer failure).

3. Analog Output Differential (AOD)

The AOD card provides one response word for the BITE 4 test. The actual output voltage is sent back to the GPC in one MDM response word. Therefore, the nominal value must be known as a voltage or the actual commanded value must be known. This may be accomplished by using the standard Variable Parameters capability (prior to the uplink of the MDM BITE Read command) to monitor the contents of the PASS GNC (or SM) output compool that corresponds to the desired analog command channel. Once the data is obtained:

- a. Convert the hex data into its decimal equivalent.
- b. Divide the decimal equivalent by 64 to obtain the PCM count.
- c. Multiply the PCM count by 10 mV dc.

Remember, as with analog inputs, if the raw hexadecimal data is observed to be "negative" (that is, the most significant hex digit is "8" through "F"), then it will be necessary to perform a "two's complement conversion" prior to converting the raw hex value to its decimal equivalent.

#### Analog Output BITE Voltage Calculations:

An example of a manual calculation for a hypothetical AOD card follows:

#### Given:

FF2, Card 08 (AOD), Channel 01

"Actual" output = 3.0 V dc (Note: "Actual" value arbitrarily chosen for this example.)

Measured input value also = 3.0 V dc

#### **Calculations:**

FF2 Card 08 is an AOD card. VP Downlist will show the following:

VP = RDW = "4B00" hex

Convert RDW to engineering units:

RDW = "4B00" = 0100 1011 0000 0000 binary = 19200 in decimal

Remember, because this is an MDM analog parameter, the pertinent data is in the first 10 bits. The last 6 bits are fillers so that the GPC can store the information as 16-bit half words. Therefore, the decimal value must be divided by 64.

RDW (PCM) = 19200/64 = 300 PCM counts, where each PCM count = 10 mVDC

RDW (EU) = 300 * 10 = 3000 mVDC = 3.0 VDC

The Variable Parameter application may be used to calculate the AOD channel value in EUs:

Response word K value = 1/64 * A1Response word bias value = A0

Where A0 and A1 are the cal coefficients in the standard linear equation:

EU = A0 + A1 * (PCM)

The responsible discipline will be required to provide such data or the DPS discipline will be unable to effectively troubleshoot the affected AOD channel.

4. Discrete Output Low/Discrete Output High (DOL/DOH)

The DOL and DOH cards provide one response word for the BITE 4 test. The actual discrete output for the entire channel is sent back to the GPC in one MDM response word. Therefore, the nominal value of the desired bilevel discrete (or discretes) must be known. The data is downlisted in hex, where the MSB is bit 0. As an added note, it is possible to use standard VPs to look at GPC output compool Set Mask and Reset Mask words to determine "command status." (Reference MDM channelization HFE output transaction overview or SM payload MDM I/O transaction overview to cross reference HAL names.)

5. Serial Input/Output (SIO)

The SIO card generates two response words for the BITE 4 test. A fixed binary test pattern of "1010101010101010" is generated in the IOM. This pattern is sent back to the GPC in RDW 1. A second fixed pattern is then generated, "0101010101010101". This pattern makes up RDW 2. The nominal VP patterns are as follows:

RDW 1 = "AAAA" hex RDW 2 = "5555" hex

Each BITE pattern is converted to a Manchester II format and transmitted on the dedicated serial I/O data bus for that channel. Simultaneously, the input receiver interface (party-line receiver) is enabled and the Manchester-encoded signal on the serial I/O data bus is subsequently decoded and transmitted by the SIO module back to the GPC via the MDM sequence control unit. During the BITE 4 test, the message and word discrete drivers are not enabled. Thus, the LRU will be unaware (hence, unaffected) of the serial digital "data" on the serial I/O data bus.

If the input decoder logic does not detect any response, it will result in an E-bit error signature for that response word. If this occurs on the first response word, no input data will be stored in the BITE Read input buffer. If the error occurs on the second response data word, only the first pattern (nominally "AAAA" hex) will be downlisted. The second VP slot will be "0000" hex since the input buffer is cleared prior to the actual I/O transaction.

It is important to note that the MDM BITE 4 test for SIO cards does <u>not</u> check the discrete line drivers (MSG IN, MSG OUT, and Word Discrete) for any of the LRU interfaces. Thus, the SIO card interface with an LRU can be failed at the MDM, and the BITE 4 test will still complete successfully. In fact, SIO card failure history indicates discrete line driver failures to be the most likely failure mode. To date, there is not sufficient failure history on EMDM's to indicate whether or not they will exhibit the same failure patterns.

6. TACAN (TAC or TRA)

The TACAN card provides one response word for the BITE 4 test. A fixed test pattern is generated in the IOM. This test pattern is somewhat dependent on the channel selected. That is, for channels 00-06, the binary pattern is "10101001101010," and channel 07 is "1010xxx110101010," where the "x's" are don't care bits. The generated test pattern is sent back to the GPC and downlisted in hex. The nominal VP patterns are as follows:

Channels 00-06 - "A9AA" hex Channel 07 - "AxAA" hex, where x is a odd hex number

MDM BITE READ LOADS (Command Server)

## PURPOSE

This SCP provides information necessary to implement an Uplink MDM built-in test equipment (BITE) Read command load. Since this command uses generic commanding, the build capability is available only via the MDM BITE Read application.

This SCP is partitioned into two sections: Section 7.10G provides all steps required to build, verify, and provide uplink coordination of an MDM BITE Read command load, and is under configuration control; Section 7.10B provides information to decode and interpret the resultant telemetry data associated with the uplinked MDM BITE Read load.

It should be emphasized that *if* the suspect MDM avionics input or output signals are very dynamic, the likelihood of trapping the signal is remote. Examples are: PASS commands that are essentially short duration pulses (such as RCS jet commands) or high rate toggling of a suspect input parameter. Thus, even though the MDM BITE circuitry and the workstation software will support uplink MDM BITE Read loads, the uncertainty in interpreting the results of such BITE reads effectively causes such activity to be a useless exercise, unless the anomalous condition is actually present at the instant the MDM BITE test is performed. Such factors should be well understood prior to committing to the MDM BITE 4 Read process.

## **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

The MDM BITE Read command allows the DPS operator to acquire information to troubleshoot/isolate an MDM problem in flight. This additional information may assist in the post flight analysis and potential MDM removal and replacement actions. There are two types of MDM BITE Read commands:

- A. BITE Status Register (BSR) Read: Allows the operator to read the BSR contents to determine if an internal MDM problem had been detected by the MDM's BITE circuitry.
- B. BITE 4 Read: Allows the operator to read any single input/output module (IOM) channel to test the channel's performance. (The results may help exonerate a suspect MDM.)

For both options, the requested data is downlisted via a variable parameter (VP), which is assigned as part of the command load format. Therefore, a separate VP load is not required in conjunction with this command load. Note, however, that this automatic downlist option may be inhibited if it is inconvenient to allocate any VP slots at the time the MDM BITE Read is to be performed. (For example, all VP slots are being used to support a specific GNC, FDO, or payload monitoring activity.)

Since the uplink MDM BITE Read feature was designed to support a contingency situation, the use of VPs instead of dedicated downlist words help to minimize the impacts to a limited downlist bandwidth, particularly the low data rate TFLs.

The MDM I/O corresponding to the desired uplink BITE Read command is essentially "one-shot" in nature. That is, there is only one attempt to acquire the data for each uplink command, whether successful or not. The associated variable parameter logic, on the other hand, will downlist the contents of the "BITE Read data input buffer" indefinitely.

The MDM BITE Read software is designed such that the data input buffer consists of *only* two halfwords. This is important to remember when multiple BITE Read command loads are to be issued to the same major function (whether to same or different MDMs). The software is designed to initialize (or clear) each buffer halfword to "0000" hexadecimal prior to attempting to acquire the desired input data. Thus, any BITE data from previous uplink BITE Reads to that same major function will be overwritten, whether or not the actual BITE data acquisition is successful. For this reason, there is no advantage in assigning different variable parameter slots for each command load.

While the MDM Uplink BITE Read capability is supported in all OPS, the feature would not normally be used during dynamic flight. For certain memory configurations, such as, MC1 (GNC 1/6), MC3 (GNC 3), MC6 (PL 9), and MC9 (GNC 9), the capability is intended primarily to support postlanding or ground checkout operations.

Depending upon the card type and channel address of the I/O module selected during an MDM BITE 4 Read, the contents of the response data (RDW's) may or may not correspond to a pre-determined pattern, independent of the actual I/O associated with that I/O card. For example, the nominal data patterns for discrete input cards (DIL or DIH) and serial I/O cards (SIO) are predictable. While analog input cards (AID or AIS) employ BITE circuitry that utilizes the raw analog inputs in the response data, the net effect is that such dynamic data is factored out in the BITE results, provided the raw analog input data is within the quantization range of the A/D Converter (-5.12 VDC to +5.11 VDC). Thus, even the calculated BITE reference voltages for analog input cards are predictable. The net effect for all of the above input type cards (analog, discrete, and serial I/O) is that the MDM BITE Read response data is generally sufficient to analyze the problem at hand.

This is not true, however, for analog output (AOD) and discrete output (DOL and DOH) cards. A design requirement for all MDMs requires that BITE circuitry not alter any MDM outputs. Thus, MDM BITE 4 Read command loads to any AOD, DOL, or DOH type card will correspond only a read of the actual channel output at the instant the channel is read. Thus, for the flight controller to correctly analyze the contents of the response data, knowledge of the commanded outputs is necessary.

This may be accomplished in a variety of ways. First, the affected discipline will frequently know what the PASS applications software is commanding (via downlist telemetry). If not, an alternate approach is to read the contents of the GNC (or SM) Output Compool buffers associated with the affected MDM card and channel (see PASS Variable Parameters, Section 7.6G). For AOD type cards, a single halfword will

correspond to the desired analog output channel. For DOL or DOH type cards, two separate halfwords will correspond to the desired bilevel discrete output channel - the "Reset Mask" and the "Set Mask" words.

The difficult part of this activity is to correctly identify the corresponding GPC memory addresses for the desired MDM output parameter. It is recommended that the MDM channelization "overviews" be used to derive the corresponding flight software HAL Name (remember there are multiple copies in the flight software, one per like MDM). Once identified, it should not be too difficult for the flight controller to determine the desired addresses using the Flight Software CD ROM.

Finally, it should be noted that the desired output compool locations should be monitored at the instant the uplink MDM BITE Read occurs. As a result, such VP loads should be uplinked (and downlisted VP contents confirmed as expected) prior to uplinking the actual MDM BITE 4 Read command load.

One final point should be reemphasized, although such a decision should have been made prior to committing to the MDM BITE 4 Read process. When analog or discrete outputs are very dynamic, or the PASS commands are short duration pulses, the likelihood of trapping the signal is very remote (for example, RCS jet commanding, unless the crewman is known to be commanding a hot fire test at the very instant the load is uplinked, which requires precise crew-MCC coordination). Thus, even though the MDM BITE circuitry and the workstation software will support such MDM BITE 4 Read loads, the uncertainity of the results of the BITE Reads essentially cause such activity to be a useless exercise.

E. Hazard/Safety Implications

MDM BITE command loads alter only selected PASS GPC VP contents and essentially use MDM single-stage commands to read MDM BITE status (MDM outputs and inputs are not affected by these command loads). The flight software is insensitive to MDM BITE Read loads to the point that a load could be erroneously uplinked to the wrong major function without any impacts whatsoever to that flight software, other than altering the contents of the VP slot specified by the command load. If this were to occur, it may be necessary to re-uplink the desired VP load, however, no GPC software dumps are required, and it is not necessary to re-IPL the affected GPC.

- F. Other Requirements
  - Immediate, back-to-back MDM BITE Read requests, such as chained loads, to the same major function (MF) should be procedurally avoided because a subsequent load will overwrite the first load. The buffer is cleared when the command is sent. This situation could cause a loss of data and/or misinterpretation of the results (each GPC within the MF maintains a single two-halfword I/O buffer to store all MDM BITE Read inputs). Once the BITE data has been captured on the ground, there are no constraints in uplinking

additional BITE Read commands to the same MF, provided, of course, they are not back-to-back uplinks.

- 2. The MCC should be cognizant of when MDM BITE Read loads are uplinked, since in theory they could cause a jitter in the cyclic input I/O during the BITE data acquisition. In certain situations, this jitter could cause a single-occurrence GPC error (i.e., a cycle wrap "02 0D' hex). While this is not in itself a cause for concern, it is recommended that these uplink command loads be used during relatively quiescent time periods. Examples of non-quiescent times are ascent/entry, rendezvous (applicable to flight critical MDM BITE Read loads while PASS GNC set in "target track" mode), and deploys (applicable to payload MDM BITE Read loads).
- If an MDM or I/O module is bypassed by the flight software, BITE Reads to that 3. MDM may or may not be successful. Since the BITE Read capability is totally uncoupled with the BCE Element Bypass feature, it is unnecessary to request an I/O RESET prior to executing the BITE Read command. However, if a particular MDM port (PRI or SEC) is to be tested, then the crew needs to have selected that interface via port moding prior to uplinking the command load. This is particularly true of BSR Reads, since each MDM sequence control unit (SCU) contains its own BITE status register, and there is no cross coupling of the BSRs. If the interface between an SCU and an I/O module is suspect, then the BITE 4 Read must be performed via the corresponding MDM port. If, however, a channel on an I/O module is suspect, then the BITE 4 Read may normally be performed on either MDM port (analog input and analog output cards could be port-sensitive, however). Finally, if the affected MDM port or I/O module is, in fact, hard-failed, then issuing the MDM BITE Read command will result in an I/O error (single error logged), which is transparent to the flightcrew.
- 4. Whenever an MDM is powered on or power cycled, the BSR's "power interrupt bit" on each MDM port will be set and remain set until that specific BSR is read. The first BSR read on an MDM port since the power-on condition should nominally indicate an "8000' hex value.

## PROCEDURES

#### <u>WARNING</u>

This operation utilizes a generic command load. Uplink of an incorrect bit pattern can have unpredictable results, including loss of PASS, loss of vehicle control, unexpected alarms, and corruption/loss of onboard systems.

It should be noted that the MDM BITE Read command load utilizes the generic command load capability. The MDM BITE Read application's software incorporates logic to avoid selection of invalid MDM addresses, invalid I/O card and channel address combinations, and invalid transfer counts. Since there was a deliberate "no requirement" for the flight software to provide such checks in order to simplify the onboard mechanization, the burden for such checks was intended to be a ground workstation software function. However, the worst possible condition that could result from an inadvertent uplink of a command with an invalid MDM address or an invalid MDM I/O card and channel address combination is a nuisance GPC error or I/O error.

Indeed, the only critical parameter associated with use of the generic command capability is the uplink OP code ("2C" hex or "0101100" binary). This uplink OP code is hard coded in the MDM BITE Read workstation software, thus, the console operator cannot enter any other OP code.

Furthermore, as an additional safeguard, the COMMAND console will enable only the requested uplink OP code at the time the generic command capability is enabled.

- A. Building MDM BITE Read Command Loads
  - Start the MDM BITE Read (MBR) application by selecting Command->Command Server->MDM BITE Read on the DPS DNAV. MBR is shown in Figure 7.10G-1.
  - 2. When started, the MDM BITE Read application will automatically select the flight ID for the activity that was selected during activity selection. If the flight ID or recon selected is not the one desired, change it via the File->Change Flight pull down menu.

- 3. For new loads, select File->New and then either MDM BSR or MDM BITE 4. The next available DSM number will be automatically selected. If the desired DSM number does not appear, you may type it in. To modify an existing load, select File->Open and then, using the arrow buttons next to the DSM number, select the DSM number of the load you wish to modify.
- 4. If performing a BSR Read:
  - a. Using the MDM option button menu, select the MDM you wish to perform the BSR Read on. The menu contains options for selecting Flight Critical, Payload, and Flex MDMs. If no Flex MDM data is manifested, Flex MDMs will not be displayed as an available option.

#### 7.10G-7 Verify that this is the correct version before use

b. Using the VP Slot option button menu, select the VP Slot to be used for downlisting the BSR Read results. BSR Reads acquire only a single response data word (RDW) for downlisting and thus only one VP slot is required. Select inhibit for the VP Slot if you do not want to use the VPs to downlist the results. If the VP Slot option is inhibited, a separate VP load must be built to obtain the BSR Read information. The flight software HAL name of the location in memory that will contain the results is CDJB_BITE_IO_IN.

#### CAUTION

Coordinate with the appropriate discipline if their VP slot will be used for the MDM BITE Read. If this coordination is not performed, the discipline may begin troubleshooting erroneous data.

An appropriate title for the command will be automatically chosen according to the parameters selected.

- 5. If performing a BITE 4 Read:
  - a. Using the MDM, Card and Channel option buttons, select the MDM, card and channel you wish to perform the BITE 4 Read on. The menu contains options for selecting Flight Critical, Payload, and Flex MDMs. If no Flex MDM data is manifested, Flex MDMs will not be displayed as an available option.
  - b. Using the VP Slot option button menu, select the starting VP Slot to be used for downlisting the BSR Read results.

#### CAUTION

Coordinate with the appropriate discipline if their VP slot will be used for the MDM BITE Read. If this coordination is not performed, the discipline may begin troubleshooting erroneous data.

Depending upon the type of I/O module to be tested, the BITE 4 Read will acquire either one or two response data words (RDWs). AOD, DOL, DOH and TAC modules acquire one RDW. AID, AIS, DIL, DIH and SIO modules acquire two RDWs. Reference Table 7.10G-1 for the number of response words acquired for each card and channel.

The workstation application will not allow the selection of VP slot 10 if the BITE 4 Read command will return two response data words. Select inhibit for the VP Slot if you do not want to use the VPs to downlist the results. If the VP Slot option is inhibited, a separate VP load must be built to obtain the BSR Read information. The flight software HAL name of the location in memory that will contain the results is CDJB_BITE_IO_IN.

The raw BITE 4 Read data acquired from discrete modules (DOL or DOH and DIL or DIH), from Tacan modules (TAC), and from serial input/output modules (SIO) will be manually compared against expected hexadecimal patterns (and manually decoded if the actual BITE data does not agree with expected patterns). Thus, there is no requirement to convert to engineering units.

The raw BITE 4 Read data acquired from analog modules (AOD, AIS, or AID) are encoded in PCM counts in a two's complement format and will require conversion to engineering units to determine whether or not the analog channel is valid.

An appropriate title for the command will be automatically chosen according to the parameters selected.

6. Save the load on the workstation by selecting File->Save.

Notes: Regardless of MDM type (FF, FA, PF, or Flex), an invalid I/O card or channel address specification will result in a PASS-detected I/O error (V-BIT). Also, an invalid XFER COUNT specificiation will result in one of the following conditions: A loss of BITE 4 Read data (second RDW gets "bit-bucketed"); or a PASS-detected I/O error (timeout waiting for a nonexistent second RDW).

A conscious decision was made in the design requirements stage to place the burden for error checks on the ground workstation software. The workstation MDM BITE Read applications does, in fact, provide such error checks to prevent the generation of command loads with invalid MDM address specification and card type/channel address configurations.

Flex MDMs are physically different as compared to "regular" orbiter MDMs in several respects. First, only an I/O card address specification in the range of 00-07 is valid for Flex MDMs. Second, the card type is mission-dependent, since I/O card configuration is field-reconfigurable. Allowable Flex MDM card type and associated channel range and number of RDW's are identified below. Note that Flex MDM's may use a unique I/O module, referred to as a "Pulsed Output Card" (POH). However, since no useful information can generally be derived from a BITE 4 Read to this type of card, the workstation MDM BITE 4 Read software does *not* implement any logic to test a POH card.

The OP Code Status application may be monitored to check the enabled/ disabled OP code status for all authorized generic command loads. For more information on starting or interpreting the OP Code Status application refer to SCP 7.1G.

- 3. Send the load to the command server by selecting Send on the Command menu.
- 4. Have COMMAND disable generic command capability for your workstation.
- C. Verifying MDM BITE Read Commands

The bottom portion of the MDM BITE Read application, referred to as the verification area, is used to verify MDM BITE Read loads (Figure 7.10G-2). Immediately after the load is sent to the command server, it will appear in the verification area. Additional MDM BITE Read loads in the command server can be viewed by scrolling to the desired DSM using the up and down arrow keys next to the DSM field of the verification area. The up/down arrows in the verification area are not active unless MDM BITE Read is in the Verify mode. To put the application in the Verify mode, select Command->Verify.

- 6. **NO of WORDS = 3** This is the total number of words in the load. For BITE 4 READs, this number will always be 3.
- 7. **Type = B4R** Indicates type of BITE read.
- 8. MDM Indicates the MDM that the B4R load will check.
- 9. **CARD** Indicates the card that the B4R will check
- 10. **Channel** Indicates the channel that the B4R will check
- 11. **Response Words** indicates whether 1 or 2 responses are expected. Verify that this matches Table 7.10G-1.

12. VP Slot - Indicates the VP slots selected to view the response.

The actual hex data words to be uplinked do not have to be verified but they can be if so desired by using the Command Data Words (CDW) application. For more information on starting and understanding the Command Data Words Application refer to SCP 7.1G. Interpretation of the individual bits in the command words is as follows. For additional information on the bit definitions refer to the Space Shuttle Computer Program Development Specification (CPDS) SS Downlist/Uplink Software Requirements (SS-P-0002-140).Command Load Verification

### 1. Command Data Word 01

- a. Vehicle ID Bits 1-3:
- b. **Major Function Bits 4-7:** These bits identify the major function to which this command will be sent.

GNC - 0111 (Primarily for FC MDMs) SM - 1000 (Primarily for PL and Flex MDMs)

- c. OP Code Bits 8-14: These bits identify the type of uplink command. For the MDM BITE Read, both BSR and BITE 4 options, the OP Code is "0101100" ("2C" hexadecimal). [This is how the flight software determines that the two-stage uplink command is an "MDM BITE Read" type command load.]
- d. **FCW and LCW Bits 15 and 16**: These bits together indicate a singlestage command word or the first, intermediate, and last command words in a two-stage command. These bits will not be set when looking at the command in the command server. They will be added at the time of uplink and will be a binary "11" (decimal 3) to indicate that this is both the first and last command word of the command.
- 2. **Command Data Word 02** Identifies whether this is a "BSR Read" option or a "BITE 4 Read" option.
  - a. "BSR Read" Option

Bits 17-25 = 111111111, indicating the BSR Read is being requested.

Bits 26-32 indicate the MDM being addressed. See Table 7.10G-2 for the list of MDM uplink address numbers.

b. "BITE 4 Read" Option

Bits 17-20 identify the I/O module where the desired BITE data is to be read. See Table 7.10G-1 for the available cards.

Bits 21-25 identify the desired channel for which the BITE 4 Read is to be performed. See Table 7.10G-1 for the valid channel ranges for each IOM.

Bits 26-32 indicate the MDM being addressed. See Table 7.10G-2 for the list of MDM uplink address numbers.

NOTES: ^a Flex MDMs are mission dependent. Note that a Flex MDM will represent a "valid option" by the workstation software only if the MDM is a part of the payload manifest for a specific shuttle flight.

- ^b Although LF1, LA1, and LM1 are legal from a flight software perspective, workstation software treats them as "illegal" for this OP code. Since these MDMs are powered off in flight, issuance of either MDM BITE 4 Read or MDM BSR Read commands to them would always result in a PASS GPC-detected I/O error (Initial T/O).
- 3. **Command Data Word 03** Identifies the number of response words expected and the VP slot specified (first slot if two consecutive slots are required).

Bit 33 identifies the number of response words expected. A value of "0" indicates only one response word is expected, whereas, "1" indicates two response words. (Note that the uplink MDM BITE Read will always return at least one response word. Therefore, bit 33 identifies the number of *additional* response words expected.)

Bits 34-44 are spare bits that are forced to zeros.

Bits 45-48 identify the VP slot selected. If the auto VP downlist capability is inhibited, these bits will be all zeros.

## D. Uplinking MDM BITE Read Command Loads

- 1. DPS generates a Flight Note to the Flight Director, CAPCOM, FAO, and INCO identifying the DSM number and the desired major function.
- 2. DPS obtains Flight Director approval for command uplink.
- 3. DPS SPT calls COMMAND on the COMMAND loop to unsafe the command (see FCOH 3.1.4 on how to unsafe loads).
- 4. DPS coordinates with INCO on INCO loop to uplink the command.

Standard coordination shall include: reading the DSM number, the MF, and a confirmation that the Flight Director has given a 'GO' for uplink, as well as a read-back by INCO of the information for verification.

- 5. While the MDM BITE Reads have no critical timing or sequencing constraints, DPS (or DPS SPT) should monitor the Command Track application to verify the uplink in the event the MDM BITE Read is unsuccessful and an I/O error ensues. For more information on starting or interpreting the Command Track application refer to SCP 7.1G.
- 6. Once the command is uplinked, DPS SPT calls COMMAND to safe the load in the command server. If the command is no longer required, the load will be deleted from the command server.

#### E. Variable Parameter Decoding

Once the MDM BITE Read command load has been uplinked, the next step is to assess the acquired BITE Read data. SCP 7.10B provides information for decoding the contents of the variable parameters supporting the BITE Read function.

SM TABLE MAINTENANCE OPERATIONS (Command Server)

## PURPOSE

The Table Maintenance Block Update (TMBU) command load is used by the MCC to update fault detection and annunciation (FDA) analog parameter limits, discrete values, and special constant values in the BFS SM and PASS SM FDA tables. During on-orbit PASS SM operations, the TMBU uplink provides ground access to the same FDA capabilities provided to the crew via SPEC 60 (Table Maintenance). Since no such SPEC exists in the BFS, a BFS TMBU provides the only access to FDA other than a change request (CR) to the software tape build process.

A TMBU request is initiated by the responsible MCC position in order to manipulate parameter limits, constant values, noise filters, enable/inhibit parameters, and update select cal coefficients. These updates may be required to provide consumables leak detection, to accommodate erratic/failed subsystem behavior or sensor shifts, to implement late requirements defined by CR, or to initialize onboard comps. The DPS SPT position has the responsibility for coordination of TMBU operations in a backup capacity only. If the discipline desiring to build/transmit a TMBU cannot do so due to equipment failure (LAN, W/S, etc.), then DPS SPT will process the TMBU.

## **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

The TMBU load is a 2-stage command load which uplinks a maximum of 10 table maintenance data set changes. Each data set is composed of a parameter ID, a data set type, and the desired new value. Figure 7.11G-1 reflects the TMBU request form (a similar form is automatically generated by the TMBU program if it is used). Figure 7.11G-2 shows the TMBU application form and verification window when the load is sent to the Generic Command Server (GCS) The data that is actually uplinked is the portion of the form in the lower right-hand box of the TMBU form. The data set type is an 8-bit integer field, the parameter ID is a 24-bit integer field, and the new value is a 64-bit double-precision floating-point field. Each data set, therefore, is six 16-bit words.

The actual hex data words uplinked do not have to be verified, but they can be by using the Command Data Words (CDW) application. For more information on starting and understanding the Command Data Words application refer to SCP 7.1G.

A TMBU load can be sent to the PASS or BFS, but the software designs are different and, consequently, the loads are different. PASS SM TMBUs are saved on the MMU each time a checkpoint is completed by the crew.

- D. Time Constraints, Crew Coordination Requirements
  - 1. TMBUs are generally non-time-critical. However, there is the potential for mission/payload-dependent, time-critical TMBUs.
  - 2. A TMBU REJECT will result if PASS SPEC 60 (SM TABLE MAINT) is active at the time a PASS SM TMBU is uplinked. An active SPEC 60 can be detected via downlisted (variable parameter) data.
- E. Hazard/Safety Implications

Fuel cell valve purge could be hazardous if uplinked wrong. Other implications to uplinking an incorrect TMBU could be setting off an immediate alarm or setting the limits such that a true out-of-limits condition would not be annunciated and, therefore, would be missed.

- F. Other Requirements
  - 1. Separate forms are required for SM and BFS TMBUs.
  - 2. Each discipline has an allocated group of DSM numbers to use. These are documented in the FCOH TMBU procedure (SOP. 3.3.1).


### PASS TMBU

A. Data Set Type

The data set type is a two-digit decimal number which defines the update as a constant, an enable/inhibit, a noise filter, or one of eight FDA limit changes (Table 7.11G-1). By referring to the PASS SM SPEC 60 (Figure 7.11G-3), it is seen that these codes correspond to item numbers on that display.

1. Alert Limit Sets

Alert limit sets correspond to SM alert indications (class 3 alerts as well as some class 0 and class 4 alerts) and can be used to modify both analog high and low limit annunciation points, in addition to bi-level discrete values.

Alert limit set parameters are preconditioned, which means that one of up to three sets of limits can be selected for use depending upon the conditions present; i.e., if the APU is in high speed, use limit set 1; if it is not in high speed, use limit set 2. Three limit sets are available for conditional FDA processing.

2. Backup Caution and Warning

Backup caution and warning (BU C&W) limits correspond to software C&W (class 2 alert). BU C&W does not support multiple limit sets as alert limit sets do, but does support both high- and low-limit annunciation points and bi-level discretes.

3. Discretes

Both alert limit sets and BU C&W support bilevel discretes. The discrete is changed using the low limit option, with the undesired state being entered, such that the appropriate alarm annunciates when the current state changes to the undesired FDA state.

4. Noise Filters

Both alert and BU C&W support noise filters. A noise filter specifies how many consecutive measurements must be out of limits before FDA will annunciate the out-of-limit condition. The possible range of noise filter values is from 1 to 15, with 2 being the nominal I-loaded value.

5. Inhibit/Enable

Individual alert or BU C&W parameters can be inhibited or enabled via the TMBU function. This function is equivalent to taking a parameter lower limit off-scale low and the upper limit off-scale high (a new value of 1.0 should be entered when doing an enable or inhibit).

6. Constants

Constants are values that are used for purposes such as computations and special processes. A constant does not have a corresponding alarm class as do alert limit sets and BU C&W.

B. Parameter ID

In SM OPS 2, the parameter ID is formed from the MSID (MML number) by converting the first alphabetic field to a one-digit decimal number (see Table 7.11G - 2) and dropping subsequent alphabetic fields.

C. New value

The new value is the new desired value of the limit or constant specified. This value must not exceed the software range of that parameter as specified by the calculated off-scale high and low values. PASS parameters with first order (linear) positively sloped cal curves are uplinked in EUs and stored in PCM counts. Nonlinear or negatively sloped cal curve parameters and constants are uplinked and stored in EUs.

Enable/inhibits require a value of 1.0 be entered for the new value. All other dataset types use the desired value specified on the TMBU form.

The calibration curve for each transducer reflects the relationship between the physical measurement (temp, pressure) and the voltage provided to the MDM by the signal conditioner. The MDM generates an integer called PCM count that corresponds to an analog measurement. The conversion of PCM to EU is given by the equation below, where  $A_0$ ,  $A_1$ ,  $A_2$ , and  $A_3$  are the coefficients of the cal curve. Usually, this equation is no more than third order.

$$EU = A_0 + A_1 (PCM) + A_2 (PCM)^2 + A_3 (PCM)^3$$


The cal curve for each transducer and the associated parameters is located in the SM/PM Database Information Listing (DBIL) (Figure 7.11G-4).

### TMBU REJECT

The primary indicator available in the MCC to monitor PASS TMBU operations is the TMBU reject word (V92J0660C) in both latching and nonlatching forms. Whenever the value of the word is greater than zero, the TMBU REJECT event light is illuminated on the DPS C&W application. The light is reset as soon as a valid TMBU load is received. A TMBU RUN discrete (V92X0661X) is also available in the downlink but it is not currently believed to be useful. It is set to 1 while SM is processing the uplink. See Table

7.11G-3 for the meaning of the TMBU reject word.

Monitoring the parameter CSTB-CONTROL-FLAGS via the SM variable parameter downlist can prevent a TMBU REJECT that results from SPEC 60 being active or underlying. Within the CSTB-CONTROL-FLAGS is a flag CSTB-TM-SPEC-ACTIVE that is set if SPEC 60 is active. As shown in Table 7.11G-4, if the first digit of the hex value is a 2, 3, A, or B, then SPEC 60 is active and a TMBU should not be sent.



## **BFS TMBU**

The BFS TMBU design is different. The PASS SM TMBU design was made to take advantage of programming already in place to support the PASS SM Table Maintenance SPEC. The SM FDA design allowed use of a parameter ID to identify the FDA parameter, as well as an indexing system into the scaling process, so that a new limit could be entered as an EU value and then automatically back-scaled to PCM count that is the storage format of most limits. The BFS, on the other hand, had no such related processing. First, the parameter ID, instead of being MML derived, represents an offset in one of seven tables. Also, there is no EU to PCM conversion capability in the BFS. All new values are input for uplink in the format in which they are stored. This means that all FDA limits must be input in a specialized decimal PCM count form, which is uplinked in the double-precision floating point format. Lastly, the data set type will indicate which of the seven tables contain the value being updated. The following items illustrate the details of this structure.

The BFS TMBU design also differs from PASS in that parameter inhibit/enable is not available. Comprehensive verification of table maintenance activities may be performed with a main memory dump or variable parameter downlink.

#### A. Dataset Type

The dataset type indicates in which of seven tables the value of interest is located (see Table 7.11G-5).

## B. Parameter ID

The parameter ID for a BFS parameter is a decimal number that represents the offset (index) into the appropriate table (array) of limit, constant, or discrete values. The parameter type (integer, scalar, etc.) determines the format of its ID based upon how many halfwords are required to store its limit value in the array. See Table 7.11G-6 for these definitions. Specifically, a parameter which occupies one 16-bit halfword will have an ID created by decimally adding the array offset to 1114112 (1114112 decimal is equivalent to 110000 hex). The parameter type is apparent from the 11 in the left two places (11XXXX), where XXXX is the array offset. Parameters which occupy a full word (32-bit floating point) are represented by an ID that is the direct array offset (since the offset is implicitly added to 0000000, which can be thought of as the decimal equivalent to 00XXXX hex).

#### C. New Value

- 1. Discretes (1 or 0) are stored as 16-bit integer 1 or 0 value and may be entered into the uplink system as 1 or 0.
- 2. Analog FDA limits (nonpayload) are stored in PCM * 64 format. The GPC left-justifies the 10-bit parameter (9 bits plus sign) in a 16-bit word. This shift-left is accomplished by multiplying the PCM value by 64. Since BFS FDA processing of integers directly converts the uplink double-precision floating-point value to the integer format, the uplinked value must be multiplied by 64 prior to uplink.

FDA parameters are received from an MDM as 10-bit binary numbers that are left-justified within a 16-bit word. In order to save GPC processing, the values are not right-justified; i.e., divided by 64. Therefore, ground-initiated changes have to be uplinked as PCM x 64.

The following formula, derived from the cal curve equation, is used for linear analog parameters to convert the desired EU value to PCM counts:

$$\frac{\text{PCM} = (\text{Desired value} - A_0)}{A_1 \times 64}$$

The A1 coefficient must also be multiplied by 64. The value of  $A_1$  (which is the value that is listed on the fiche) is predivided by 64. When BFS displays a parameter on a CRT, the PCM counts must be converted to EU. Since PCM is stored as PCM x 64, predivision of the  $A_1$  coefficients has the effect of dividing PCM by 64. Therefore, the PCM count is adjusted to the correct value without an additional division operation.

This PCM value must be rounded to a whole PCM count before multiplying by 64. This ensures that the remaining 6 bits (least significant) are all zero. The rule for rounding is for an upper limit, round down to the next integer; for a lower limit, round up to the next integer.

Linear analog parameters are set off-scale high (OSH) by using OSH = +32,704 PCM counts or off-scale low (OSL) by using OSL = -32,768 PCM counts (see Table 7.11G-7).



- 3. Analog nonlinear parameters are handled the same way as linear parameters, except that the increased complexity of trying to solve a cubic equation for PCM has been done already and the PCM versus EU values are given in tabular form in the back of the DBIL. For a lower limit, select the PCM count value that corresponds to the EU value just above the desired EU value. For an upper limit, select the PCM count value that corresponds to the EU value that corresponds to the EU value that corresponds to the EU value.
- 4. Analog constants are most often stored as single-precision floating-point values and are entered into the uplink system in EUs; some are stored as integers.
- D. Payload Parameters

BFS software release 09.21 (STS-9) introduced a new module, PYLD_APP_FUNC, which performs downlist processing, FDA, and scaling for display for up to 50 payload-dependent parameters. The parameters are restricted to two types: discretes and linear analogs, whose limit values are contained in either the upper limit table (data type 251) or low limit table (data type 250).

Since only 25 halfwords of the BFS downlist are allocated to payloads, this dictates the possible combination of analog and discrete parameters. An analog equals 1 halfword, and 16 discretes equal 1 halfword. Therefore, maximum content could be 50 discretes (although 400 discretes could be packed into 25 H/Ws) or 25 analogs, or some combination thereof that does not exceed 50 parameters (TMBU storage locations) or 25 halfwords.

This module differs from other BFS FDA processing. The analog limits are stored in PCM counts (not PCM * 64) since the 10-bit parameter has already been shifted right 6 bits. The off-scale range, however, is still -512/+511 PCM counts.

1. Payload parameters which are processed by PYLD_APP_FUNC are already shifted right and are stored in PCM counts (not PCM *64). Therefore, it is not necessary to multiply the rounded PCM value by 64 prior to uplink. The new value for uplink is calculated using the following equation.

$$\frac{\text{PCM} = (\text{Desired value} - A_0)}{A_1}$$

- 2. The A1 coefficient is not predivided by 64; therefore, multiplication by 64 is not required. The same rounding technique (used for non-payload parameters) is used, and the whole PCM value is then uplinked.
- 3. The cal curve for each transducer and the associated parameters is located in the BFS TMBU TABLES (Figure 7.11G-5). In most cases, these cal curves are identical to the identical parameter in PASS.

#### **PRIMARY PROCEDURE**

Note: DPS/DPS SPT will not process PASS SM TMBUs and BFS real-time TMBUs unless the individual users experience workstation failures (see BACKUP PROCEDURE).

This procedure is to be followed for all PASS SM TMBUs (including SM initialization TMBUs) and BFS real-time TMBUs. DPS handles coordination for BFS prelaunch, MECO +5 and entry initialization. However, DPS is not required to verify these loads against flight software.

DPS-coordinated TMBUs are performed over SSR CONF. The procedure that the requester should follow in order to process a TMBU is as follows:

- A. After the user has identified the need for a TMBU, the user will invoke the TMBU program on the user's workstation, build the load, transmit the load and verify the load in the GCS. If the requester has questions concerning the program's function, DPS/DPS SPT is responsible for supporting their questions. If a discrepancy report (DR) condition exists, the requester is to fill out a DR documenting the problem, and the DR will eventually be sent back to the DPS office for resolution.
- B. After the discipline's FCR operator has verified the load and signed off on the forms, the user distributes copies of the completed forms as follows:

If the TMBU is for PASS SM or for real-time BFS:

- Two copies for self (FCR and MPSR)
- One copy to SPAN MGR after uplink

If the TMBU is for BFS prelaunch, BFS MECO +5, or BFS entry initialization:

- Two copies for self (FCR and MPSR)
- Three copies to DPS or DPS SPT who will in turn distribute them as follows:
  - One copy to SPAN MGR after uplink
  - One copy to DPS
  - One copy to DPS SPT
- C. DPS-coordinated TMBUs are the BFS TMBUs that are uplinked at prelaunch, MECO +5, and entry initialization. If more than one TMBU will be required for any of these phases, DPS SPT will chain them together.
- D. The appropriate FCR operator will obtain a GO from the FD to uplink the TMBU(s).

- E. The requesting discipline (or DPS/DPS SPT for DPS-coordinated TMBUs) will contact INCO/INST over the INCO/INST COORD loop and provide them with the DSM number, the MF, and state that they have a GO from the FD. INCO/INST will then read back the information for verification and uplink the TMBU.
- F. INCO or INST will inform the requester (or DPS/DPS SPT for DPS coordinated TMBUs) that the TMBU is onboard. The F/C is responsible for verifying that the load was successfully uplinked to the appropriate system (PASS or BFS) by monitoring the Command Tracking application.
- G. The requesting discipline (or DPS/DPS SPT for DPS-coordinated TMBUs) records the uplink time of the load on the TMBU request form. This time can be found on the Command Tracking application next to the BUFFER EXECUTE command for the particular TMBU. The requester (or DPS/DPS SPT for DPS-coordinated TMBUs) will then forward a copy of the TMBU request form to the SPAN Manager.

**CLEANUP** (for DPS coordinated TMBUs only)

- A. If the TMBU will not be used again, delete it from the GCS.
- B. If the TMBU might be used again, safe the load (refer to FCOH 3.1.4) in the GCS.

COMMAND LOAD CHAINING/UNCHAINING (Command Server)

## PURPOSE

This procedure outlines the steps required to "chain" (or group) a series of loads together for automatic and quick sequential uplink. This technique allows 10 loads to be sequentially uplinked with the onboard two-stage buffer executed automatically after a compare on each load. Steps to unchain a series of loads are also described.

Chained commanding should be reserved for those operations requiring no crew coordination or integration from the first command to the last.

- F. Other Requirements
  - 1. The first three digits of each DSM number contained within the same chain must be the same (i.e., 123XX, 123XY, 123XZ is valid; but 123XX, 201XX, ... is not valid).
  - 2. All loads within the same chain must be targeted for the same major function. Failure to adhere to this criteria may cause a load to be uplinked to the wrong MF.
  - 3. Chained loads must be unchained in the command server before they can be deleted from the command server via the Load Manager application.
  - 4. Chained loads will be uplinked in the order in which they are specified in the chain (regardless of the numerical sequence).
  - 5. In order to modify an existing chained load (add a new load/delete an intermediate load), the existing load must first be totally unchained.

### PROCEDURE

- A. Load Chaining Workstation Option
  - 1. Transmit each load that is to be placed in the chain to the command server. For example, if variable parameter loads 23001 and 23002 were to be placed in a chain, they would each be transmitted to the command server separately.


*Figure 7.12G-1.* Load Manager Chain/Unchain Dialog

  - 2. Once all of the desired loads are verified to be correct in the command server, start the Load Manager, if it is not already running, and select the Chain/Unchain function (see Figure 7.12G-1). For more information on starting or using the Load Manager application, refer to SCP 7.1G. The detailed procedures for verification of individual command loads are covered in dedicated SCPs for each type of command load and therefore not contained in this SCP.

- 3. Enter the first three digits of the DSMs to be chained and select OK. The first three digits of all loads within any chain must be the same. A list of DSM's residing in the command server that match the three digits will be displayed.
- 4. Select the DSMs to be chained from the displayed list.
- 5. Transmit the chain to the command server by selecting the CHAIN button. If no DSMs are selected for chaining then the CHAIN button will be insensitive.
- 6. Use the Command Inventory application (Figure 7.12G-2) or the or Chained Load Inventory application (Figure 7.12G-3) to verify that the loads are chained correctly in the command server displays.

7. The actual uplink procedures for the chain are not contained in this SCP but in the dedicated SCP for each particular load type. If the loads are not to be uplinked immediately, they shall be safed in the command server per FCOH SOP 3.1.4.

- B. Unchaining Loads
  - 1. To unchain a group of chained loads, select the CHAIN/UNCHAIN option from the LOAD MANAGER application (Figure 7.12G-2).
  - 2. Enter the first three digits of the DSM's to be unchained in the "Load Class" field and then select OK. A list of loads matching the entered load class which are chained in the GCS will be displayed.

#### PURPOSE

The purpose of this SCP is to document the standard DVIS panel configurations that the DPS and DPS SUPPORT are to use during flights and simulations. This SCP also documents certain policies governing the use of these DVIS panels.

#### **BASIC INFORMATION**


- A. For details on how to operate/adjust parameters on the DVIS panels, refer to the DVIS User's Guide located on console (see References section).
- B. The DIAL CALL loops are used to contact another operator via the panel unique position ID of each DVIS panel. The following table lists the position IDs for all of the DPS/DPS SUPPORT/CDMS consoles:

MPSR	Left Right	4263 4264
CDMS	Left Right	4267 4268

All loops that are selected on DVIS panels that are logged on to position IDs 4225 and 4226 are recorded; conversations on the MOCR DPS/CDMS 1 and MOCR DPS/CDMS 2 loops are <u>always</u> recorded. Therefore, please invoke proper loop protocol whenever possible.

- C. DVIS pages 1 through 5 are designated for series 1 loops, and pages 5 through 10 are designated for series 2 loops.
- D. In order to maintain consistency and standards, operators are <u>not</u> to reconfigure pages 1 through 4 and pages 6 through 9.
- E. Pages 1 and 6 are the NOMINAL pages; i.e., these pages are configured for the loops that DPS/DPS SUPPORT use most often during flights/sims.
- F. Pages 2 and 7 are the DIAGNOSTICS pages; these pages are configured for the loops that DPS/DPS SUPPORT use for various diagnostic tasks (e.g., GPC dump monitoring, workstation problems, and console/room hardware problems).

- G. Pages 3 and 8 are replicas of page 1 and 6 and are to be used during shuttle and station assembly simulations.
- H. Pages 4 and 9 are the PRELAUNCH pages; these pages are configured for the loops used most often during the prelaunch timeframe.
- Pages 5 and 10 have been configured for the basic loops only (e.g., FD, A/Gs, DPS MPSR, MOCR DPS/CDMS). Pages 5 and 10 are used by individuals who wish to configure their own unique DVIS panels or in those extremely rare instances when an operator needs to configure a DVIS panel to access a DVIS loop that is not on one of the existing configured pages (pages 1 through 4 and 6 through 9). Only the bottom three rows on pages 5 and 10 can be reconfigured.
- J. <u>Personal Access Business eXchange (PABX) extension for the second floor</u> DPS/CDMS consoles is 35681.
- K. All vertical DVIS panels are eight rows by three columns. All horizontal DVIS panels are four rows by six columns. To determine what loops are in what position on the horizontal panels, take the bottom four rows of the vertical panel and append them to the end of the top four rows of the vertical panel as outlined below



L. The "P" in the upper right-hand corner of each DVIS loop means that this particular loop is protected.

#### **DVIS-KEY RECONFIGURATION PROCEDURE**

- (1) Select "PAGE" with DVIS key to be modified.
- (2) Press "CONFIGURE" key, then select DVIS key to be reconfigured [a Key Pad (12key, 3X4 matrix) will pop up on DVIS screen].
- (3) Press "PRIME DIR" key (the keypad '8' key):

If there has been no prior key reconfiguration since DVIS was signed-on, a 'menu' display will pop up. This includes "CANCEL" and "SET LIST MODE" keys at the top right-hand corner, and "LIST START POINT", "SELECT PARTITION", "SELECT ALPHA LIST", and "SELECT NUMERIC LIST" keys at the lower right-hand side of the display.

If a key has been configured, the previously selected 'alpha' or 'numeric' list will pop up.

- (4) Press "SELECT PARTITION" key [a list will show up with the following 'options' "MCC" (the default case), "SMS", "SSC", and "SST"].
- (5) Select "MCC" for a list of 'Shuttle' loops; or select "SSC" for a list of 'Space Station' loops. Then press the "ENTER" key at the bottom of the matrix.
- (6) Next, press the "SELECT ALPHA LIST" key (or, if preferred, the "SELECT NUMERIC LIST" key), followed by the "ENTER" key [a listing of DVIS Comm Loops will pop up].
- (7) Scroll thru list using "PAGE FWD" key (or "PAGE BACK key as required) until desired DVIS loop appears. Use 'up' and 'down' arrows to highlight the desired DVIS loop.
- (8) Next, select the desired monitor and/or talk/listen mode key "SELECT M", "SELECT HM", "SELECT TL", or "SELECT TLM" key [the Keypad (the 12-key, 3X4 matrix) will pop up].
- (9) Press the "ENTER" key. This completes the DVIS key reconfiguration.
- (10) If no further DVIS reconfiguration is required, press the highlighted "CONFIGURE" key. Otherwise, select the next appropriate "PAGE" and DVIS key to be reconfigured, and repeat procedure.
  - On PAGE to be reconfigured:
  - (1) CONFIGURE, then desired key
  - (2) PRIME DIR (the keypad '8' key)
  - (3) SELECT PARTITION
  - (4) Highlight 'MCC' (Shuttle loops) or 'SSC' (Station loops), then ENTER
  - (5) SELECT ALPHA LIST, then ENTER
  - (6) Scroll thru list and highlight desired DVIS loop

This guide describes format overlays previously used by the DPS FCR and DPS support consoles. This SCP is being retained only as a reference.

#### DESCRIPTION

A. Each format contains the nomenclature and MSID, which is laid out in its position on the overlay. In the bottom left corner of each position is the color of the overlay (A-amber, B-blue, G-green, R-red, and W-white). The bottom right corner contains information pertaining to the logic driving the light (L-latched and R-reversed).

#### B. Console Configuration

The following figure shows the recommended formats to be used during the appropriate phases of flight.

#### TITLE

#### DPS APPLICATIONS/DISPLAYS

#### GENERAL

This information is supplemental to the DPS W/S S/W User's Guides. It does not provide instruction on how to use the applications, but rather information on the data displayed by DPS Overview, DTEX, and OFS.

#### DPS Overview (please also see DPS overview User's Guide)

DPS Overview (DPS OV) replaces information previously displayed on a variety of DPS MSKs. It is one of the primary applications used to monitor the DPS system (Figure B-1).

The application consists of a single window with three different views, one for each of the PASS GPC downlists (GNC, SM, and OPS-0). The appearance of each view is the same, but the telemetry used to drive major portions of the application are different, depending on which downlister has been selected. Blocks 1, 2, and 5 in Figure B-1 are the areas of the display that are affected by the choice of downlister selection.

In many cases, the user can obtain the MSID that is driving a displayed value by double clicking the mouse on the displayed value. The MSID, its nomenclature, and the timetag of when the value last changed (including reacquisition of telemetry after data dropouts) are displayed in the area marked Block 10 on Figure B-1, at the bottom of the application's display window.

Data on the display is highlighted (bright white box) when it changes. This highlighting currently also takes place when data is lost and reacquired, which can cause a great deal of highlighting during periods of ratty comm. An "S" is used to indicate static data, a "D" to indicate dead data (not being downlisted), and an "M" to indicate missing data. Data that is static is changed to a light blue color as opposed to the nominal white. For example, when returning from an LOS, the displayed data will be highlighted, changed to white in color, and the "S" will be removed.

#### Block 1 (upper left box), affected by downlister selection)

Mode: RUN, STBY

CPU %: Percentage of time for which the GPC's CPU was active over the most recent 4-second cycle. This is an indication of the GPC mode. The following are typical display values:

- 45-80 Normal GNC ops or, with failed votes against GPC, shows F-T-S GPC. Note that SM ops may be lower than this, unless utilization is high.

Time Src: Accumulator or internal time used by GPC (e.g., Ax = accumulator x, where x = 1, 2, or 3; Cx = internal time, where x = 1, 2, 3, 4, 5).

Disc A/B: The discrete A and B words contain information about the status of the GPCs, MMUs, BFC CRT SEL switch (also in CRT Select row, below), etc. This information is represented by discretes (SCP 4.1). The information available in these words is also available in other areas of DPS applications.

STBY, RUN: Available on DPS OV, Block 1. MM1/2 IPL, MM1/2 BUSY: Available in DPS OV MMU box, Block 5. I/O Term B: Available on DTEX (shows up red if off nominal). BFS Eng 1/2/3: Available on DTEX (shows up red if off nominal). BFC CRT: Available on DPS OV, Block 1.

Soft Err: Four-digit hex field that contains the accumulative count of errors detected by error detection and correction code; upper two digits are counter for lower memory, lower two digits are counter for upper memory (SCP 4.1).

CRT Sel: Shows the position of the BFC CRT Select switch when the switch is ON.

Xmt Ena 1/2: Shows whether the GPC data bus transmitters are on or off (SCP 4.1).

Bus Msk 1/2: The bus mask words are similar in presentation to the Xmit Ena words; however, masking a bus neutralizes it, blocking transmission and preventing the GPC from listening on that bus. When a GPC fails sync with the redundant set, the buses it commands are masked by the other RS GPCs. Also, when a DEU has a GNC commander and an SM commander, the DK bus will be masked by the GPC whose major function base does not match the MF switch setting (SCP 4.1).

**Note:** The bits in the Xmit Ena words are set (1) to indicate transmitters, but a set bit in the Bus Mask word indicates *inhibited* transmission <u>and</u> reception.

#### GPC Error section (see also SCP 4.3)

Counter: Cumulative decimal counter for each GPC's error log.

Error: The error group (first two characters) and error code (last two characters).

Pointer: Points to memory address in GPC where error occurred (PDE address).

Time: GMT at which error occurred.

#### I/O Error section (see also SCP 4.2)

Counter: Decimal sum of the actual I/O error log cumulative counts logged against each GPC.

ID/Ele: ID is the unique device/transaction corresponding to the failed I/O transaction. Element is the BCE Element number that uniquely identifies an LRU that may be bypassed via software action within a particular input transaction.

BCE: BCE number that identifies the type of I/O error (I/O transaction error, IOP hardware error, or mass memory detected errors).

Status Wd: STATUS word or IOP status register that provides detailed data pertinent to the failed I/O transaction.

Time: GMT at which the I/O error was logged.

#### Block 2 (lower left - partially affected by downlister selection)

#### I/O Error 5 deep stack

This listing contains the last five I/O errors logged. It shows the ID, EL, BCE, and Status Word information available in Block 1; it also contains the OP code and RWC (residual word count) for each error. The stack is driven by the current user-selected PASS downlist.

#### GPC Error 5 deep stack

This section contains the last five GPC errors logged. It shows the error group, error code, pointer, and GMT of error, as also displayed in Block 1.

#### Scratch Pad Line

This portion of the display is a compilation of information received from the downlist PASS GPCs. It is driven by the *ospl* comp, which also drives the scratch pad line portion of the SPECS application. It presents data from all the active PASS-assigned DEUs. The BFS-assigned DEUs will show their most recent PASS assignments with a static indication.

DEU number (1-4): The PASS-assigned DEU driving that line of the display.

Scratch Pad line (text field): This field is an image of the keystrokes sent to the GPC by the DEU. It will be an image of the scratch pad line on the associated CRT, with the exception that erroneous keystrokes that result in the "ERR" message will not be seen on the ground display. The "POLL FAIL" message will also not be displayed on the ground display. However, an "I" will appear to the left of the DISP column if an "illegal entry" message is received on that CRT.

IE: will show "I" in the field if an illegal entry message was received by the crew on that CRT. Clears when crew clears the message onboard.

DISP: A four-digit field identifying the OPS, SPEC, or DISP being presented on the respective CRT.

#### B-4

MF: Identifies the major function of the GPC to which the respective DEU is assigned (may be GNC, SM, or PL). It may display OP0 for those DEUs that are assigned to a GPC that has been moded to OPS-0. This field does not necessarily reflect the position of the CRT MAJ FUNC switch.

SW: Represents the position of the CRT MAJ FUNC switch (GNC, SM, PL).

H/W1, H/W2, S/W: Represent the hardware and software BITE words (SCP 4.8).

Poll Hdr: Contains additional information not available in the H/W or S/W words (SCP 4.8).

Power: Indicates whether the CRT is powered on or not.

#### Block 3 (upper right of center, VPs)

This section shows the raw data currently being downlisted in each of the VP slots. (SCPs 7.6, 7.7). Note that this data has not been converted to EU. To view scaled data, use the VP DPS application.

#### Block 4 (upper right corner, TIMES)

OGMT: Orbiter GMT. The time source for this time is selectable, and the time is fed through the ground MSID M50Q0027HP. The initial default source (no failures) is MTU-1 Voted GMT, which is taken from MSID V75W3504D. For more information on time source substitution, see FCOH SOP 8.3.

OMET: Orbiter MET. The time source for this time is selectable, and the time is fed through the ground MSID M50Q0030HP. The initial default source (no failures) is MTU-1 MET, which is taken from MSID V75W3514D. For more information on time source substitution, see FCOH SOP 8.3.

Lift-off: GMT of lift-off.

SM CHKPT: MET of last SM checkpoint.

#### Block 5 (middle right of center, MMUs affected by downlister selection)

Each piece of information is displayed for MMU 1 and MMU 2. STAT A: Status word A (SCP 4.10). STAT B: Status word B (SCP 4.10).

BUSY: Shows the ID of any GPC currently attempting use of the MMU.

IPL: Shows the ID of any GPC currently attempting to use the MMU for IPL.

#### Block 6 (lower middle right of center, MDM BITE)

SM Cm Buff: Shows whether the SM Comm Buffer is busy or idle.

#### B-5

Source Bus: Represents source of overlays (GPC, MMU, LDB) (SCP 4.10).

MDM BITE: Represents the flight-critical MDM's A/D BITE status word (SCP 4.2).

MTU BITE: Status word of the Master Timing Unit (SCP 4.9).

OSC: Represents which oscillator the MTU is using and whether the oscillator was auto selected or manually selected.

L DDU PWR/R DDU PWR: Indicates power supply (A, B, C) on or off.

#### Block 7 (far right second block down, PASS BCE BYPASS)

Word 0/1/2: Indicates what elements are bypassed (SCP 4.2).

SM BYPASS PL High/Low: The PCMMU payload high and low rate bypass word downlisted by the SM GPC that represents a summary of the PCMMU BCE bypasses maintained by the SM applications software.

#### Block 8 (far right middle, RS, CS)

Redundant/Common Set: Indicates which GPCs are currently in the redundant and common sets. This information is also available through color coding on the DTEX application display: CS boxes are white (BFS stays white even when off), and RS boxes are light blue.

BFS Track: Which PASS strings the BFS is tracking.

GNC/BFS Ops: Which OPS the GPCs are currently in.

Stringing: The current stringing configuration of the GPCs. This information is also available on DTEX as the GPC ID on top of each string. The first four digits are the GPC commanders of FC strings (1-4, which represent FC pairs FC1/5, FC2/6, FC3/7, FC4/8, respectively); the fifth digit is the GPC commanding the PL buses; the sixth is the GPC commanding LDB buses (1 and 2). (LDB1/2 can be strung separately. This will be reflected in the next version of DPS Overview.)

NBAT - G1: The G1 NBAT that was loaded, not necessarily what was invoked.

NBAT - G3: The G3 NBAT that was loaded, not necessarily what was invoked.

G3 Archive: Indicates which GPCs have a G3 archive; 1/2/3 indicates archive was taken from that area (1/2/3) on the MMU; 0 indicates archive is not loaded in that GPC.

PCMMU Select: Indicates which Pulse Code Modulation Master Unit is in use (SCP 4.2).

#### Block 9 (far right lower, CAM matrix)

Indications of GPC fail votes occur here. Both U-fail and I-fail votes are displayed with a red "X!".

#### Block 10 (bottom of display, bar with MSID information)

This is where information on MSIDs that drive some of the displayed values is displayed when the user double clicks on the value field. The information provided includes MSID, nomenclature, and the last time of update. The update times will include time of reacquisition from data dropouts and AOS; users should be aware of those factors in using the "last updated" time.




Figure B-2. DTEX –top level page

#### DTEX (DPS Real-Time Expert) (please see DTEX User's Guide)

DTEX provides a graphical representation of the DPS system and its current state (Figure B-2). There is a single top-level display and several low-level displays that are available on demand. Some of the information presented by DTEX is available in the DPS Overview application as well, but is presented by DTEX in a graphical, rather than numerical, fashion. DTEX was developed using a commercial off-the-shelf product called G2[™] and requires a program called G2isp that serves as an interface with the ISP servers.

#### General User Notes

The buttons in the upper right corner of the display allow the user to perform some display management functions. The ACK button, discussed in the LRU section that follows, allows the user to acknowledge recognized failures to improve subsequent failure recognition. The "F" button sizes DTEX to fit the entire monitor on which it is being displayed. The "3/4" button sizes DTEX to 3/4 of the monitor size. Selecting "3/4" requires the user to resize the window border. Moving from 3/4 to full size also requires the user to resize the window border. Size changes may necessitate moving the DTEX window position on the monitor as well. Most users will not need the ISP button. The ISP button provides information to experienced users on the interface between the DTEX application and its server. The "X" button terminates the DTEX application.

Telemetry status indicators (s and d) are provided in multiple locations on the display, including the GMT/MET clocks, OI/GN/SM/BFS/OPS0 format IDs, GPC IDs, and LRUs.

**Description of Displays and Features** 

#### Power

The absence of power is generically indicated by a lightning bolt icon immediately next to/on top of the affected equipment. A lightning bolt icon is not used for GPCs since they have three RPC power indications. The loss of each individual power source for a GPC is indicated by a label placed just below the affected GPC. The label consists of RPC with the letter(s) A, B, C, depending on which RPCs show no power. If the RPC label is not present, the GPC has good power on all three RPCs.

#### <u>GPCs</u>

The GPC icons show various information on the GPCs, including common/redundant set membership, time source, I/O Term A/B, and GNC major mode. Redundant set membership is indicated by a light blue GPC box and common set membership by a white box. Note that the BFS box stays white even when that GPC is powered off. Time source is indicated by the circular clock icon inside each GPC box (e.g., A1 means the GPC is on accumulator 1 time Cx where x = 1/2/3/4/5 means the GPC is on computer time of the given GPC ID). GNC major mode is indicated to the right of the clock icon within the GPC box of the GNC GPCs. The major mode is also displayed for the BFS machine but not for SM. An SM indicator is displayed, but as the only mode

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used for SM is 201, the major mode is not displayed. The GPC acting as downlister is indicated by an antenna below the GPC box.

#### <u>LRUs</u>

Each bypassable element is shown using a schematic layout at the bottom of the top level display. Bypassable elements turn red whenever they are bypassed by PASS. BFS bypass is indicated by a yellow "bfs" label placed immediately to the left of the bypassed element. Bypassed elements can be subdued by selecting the ACK button at the upper right corner of the top level display. Selecting the ACK button changes the existing PASS and BFS bypass indications, which annunciate red to dim gray. This allows any subsequent bypasses, which will annunciate red, to be more readily apparent. Bypassed LRUs also have a dot to the left of the name of the LRU. Some LRUs have lower level displays that provide additional information. Those LRUs have a double arrow indicator to the right of the LRU name.

#### <u>CRTs</u>

Each CRT is shown using a computer terminal icon. The icons are animated and move to the top of the PASS GPC that is commanding them. The CRT(s) assigned to BFS will be visible on top of the BFS GPC, while a "shadow CRT" will be visible on top of the underlying PASS GPC commander of that same CRT. An active CRT will have a label of the form CRT-n. A "shadow CRT" will have a label of the form CRT_n. For example, given a nominal ascent configuration, the CRT3 icon will sit atop GPC5, and a "shadow" CRT3 will sit atop GPC3, indicating that GPC3 will assume control of CRT3 if the BFC CRT DISPLAY switch is turned off. If no GPC is commanding a CRT, the icon will move to a neutral area at the far right of the display. A detailed telemetry display is available for each CRT by clicking the mouse on the desired CRT icon.

#### I/O Term B

DTEX is coded such that it can determine whether the I/O Term B is in a nominal situation. It uses reverse logic for the SM and BFS GPCs and positive logic for all other GPCs. In other words, nominally the I/O Term B will not show for the SM machine even though it is set. The TERM B indicator will appear under the SM GPC if the I/O Term B goes low (the off-nominal status). If the I/O Term B (or A) for a GNC GPC became set, DTEX would show the appropriate indicator, as that is considered off-nominal status.

#### Stringing

DTEX provides a quick visual cue of stringing for FC1-8 (strings 1-4), PL1&2, and LDB 1 and 2. DTEX also shows (in a small box directly under the ID of the commanding GPC) whether the string is on primary (P) or secondary (S) ports. DTEX also has supplemental logic to determine whether the FC is down at the GPC or at the MDM and to display the result of that logic in the MDM box. At present, certain timing situations exist that have the possibility of disrupting the logic and showing the wrong result, so

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operators are urged to confirm where the FC is down on another display (DPS OV) before making a call.

#### <u>MMUs</u>

MMUs have two indications: power and activity. The poweroff signature (lightning bolt) is the same as that for the other LRUs. Activity is demonstrated by the slow movement of the reel-to-reel tape heads within the MMU icon when the MMU is busy. This is a helpful cue for crew usage or failure recognition.

#### CRT status (Figure B-3)

The "CRT-x STATUS" low-level display provides insight into the health and activity of a particular CRT. It is reached by double-clicking the left mouse button on the appropriate CRT icon. The H/W1, H/W2, DEU S/W, and Poll Header Word are broken down into bits and decoded, facilitating quicker problem recognition and easier analysis. There is logic in place to turn a bit box red if the bit is off-nominal. Detailed subpages of the H/W1, H/W2, and S/W words are available by double clicking on the "book" appearing under the appropriate title (see Figure(s) B-3). The display management functions in the upper corner perform the same function as the ones in the upper right corner of the DTEX upper-level display (see General User Notes), with the exception that 'X' closes the lower-level display but does not terminate DTEX. The "up arrow" box in the subpages moves the view up one level of displays.

#### OFS (Onboard Fault Summary) (please see OFS User's Guide)

OFS provides a scrollable history list of Orbiter and Spacelab fault messages, as well as real-time annunciation of fault messages. The user may select PASS, BFS, or Spacelab views of fault messages. The views are mutually exclusive; i.e., to view PASS and BFS messages simultaneously, the user must run two instances of OFS (same for GNC and SM). OFS is intended to replace the fault area on MSK 1301, as well as the FAULT display on MSK 1305-1314 and MSK 1300. In the BFS view, OFS replaces the respective BFS MSKs.

The Spacelab view contains Spacelab faults only. PASS faults can be obtained by running a separate instance of OFS and selecting PASS view.

Each line of the PASS OFS display will contain:

where


# signifies that the message is the #th message received since the log was cleared.

**text** is the decoded error message (e.g., I/O ERROR CRT 2). **GPC** is the GPC annunciating the message. **Time (GMT)** is the time the fault was annunciated.

The BFS OFS display is the same, except the annunciating GPC is not specified, as it is understood to be BFS.


**Note**: The DPS operator has control of downlister changes (GNC/SM/OPS-0) for all MCC. If other disciplines want to see the change of downlister on their instance of OFS, they must be connected to the DPS server and not running locally. (See the OFS User's Guide for more detail on running locally, and why it is not the first choice for non-DPS disciplines.)

The DPS operator also has control of fault history log clears for all of MCC. (See the OFS User's Guide for more detail on clearing the log.) The log, unless cleared, will retain the faults from the last use of OFS on the same activity; (e.g., STS-69 sim on Wednesday may show faults from STS-69 sim on previous Monday unless the log is cleared.) For sims, it is suggested that the log be cleared prior to run start. For flights, log clearing will be handled in the prelaunch time frame, and procedures will instruct the DPS operator on when to perform this action. During flights, backups of the OFS logs will be made by one of the FC team shifts (lead discretion) on a daily basis.

### PURPOSE

This SCP represents a comprehensive listing of MCC special computations used by the DPS applications. This SCP describes two basic types of DPS special computations:

- DPS Console Critical Alarms Special computations that drive an audible Caution and Warning tone/alarm
- DPS Special Comps The remaining group of special computations which alone do not drive an audible alarm, but may drive a visual (displayed) output

### DESCRIPTION

A. Critical alarms

An audible alarm will be sounded for 3 seconds when a "critical event" light is driven. There will be no alarm unless a critical out-of-limits condition is detected. There are five events in dps_cw that annunciate a tone. Following are the MSIDs associated with each event on dps_cw that drives the tone.

The alarm will only be sounded once, regardless of how many critical lights are driven in a given output cycle. If a critical light is driven while the alarm is still being sounded because of a critical light in a previous cycle, the alarm length will not be extended. When lights are extinguished by the manual reset procedure and then are illuminated because the out-of-limits or event condition still exists, the alarm will not be sounded.



### TITLE

TEXT DECODING FOR PASS/BFS FAULT MESSAGES

### PURPOSE

To explain how to obtain the error message data from flight software deliverable CD ROM products for each mission. It also covers how to decode the error message from the bit structure contained in the PCMMU telemetry data.

PASS fault messages are defined in the following software modules available on compact disk.

- A. CDK-ANNUN (GNC list)
- B. CDQ-ANNUN (PL list)
- C. CDS-ANNUN (SSW list)
- D. CDT-ANNUN (SM list)
- E. CDZ-ANNUN (VU list)

BFS fault messages are defined in the FAULT software module.

Detailed instructions for locating PASS/BFS fault messages can be found in SCP 1.7.

Within these modules, two-line entries for each message contain the following data (see example in SCP 1.7):


- A. Sequential listing (numerically; e.g., #1, #2, #3, etc.)
- B. Major field text
- C. Message code number
- D. Text structure in hex for 14-ASCII title length

A separate field list follows the major field segment containing similar data as described for the major fields (see example in SCP 1.7).

### BACKGROUND

### A. PASS FAULT DISPLAY PROCESSING

1. PASS Message Format



A 32-bit word will be downlisted for each message.

Bits 1-5 correspond to GPCs 1-5, and identify the source of a fault. For example, if bit 3 is set, GPC 3 is the one which detected the fault. Multiple bits can be set.

Bits 6-16 hex represent a decimal number which is the minor field ID.

Bits 17-32 hex represent a decimal number which is the major field ID.

The message IDs and corresponding text are predefined and stored in the MCC.

2. PASS Time Format (GMT)

Each fault summary message shall be timetagged with a 32-bit measurement. The timetags are composed of two 16-bit words; one with a least significant bit (LSB) of 30 minutes and the other with an LSB of 32.768 milliseconds, GMT.


4. MCC PASS Message Output

Computation numbers are provided to enable display of information from the special comps onto any workstation application. Only the five most recent fault message lines from the special display will be available to other displays.

- a. Data set selection: OFS_PASS_Downlister is a three-character text output that indicates which downlist (GNC, SM, or OPS-00) is the selected source of fault summary data.
- b. Major field and minor field text

Message 1: OFS_PASS_FSM_Msg_1 2: OFS_PASS_FSM_Msg_2 3: OFS_PASS_FSM_Msg_3 4: OFS_PASS_FSM_Msg_4 5: OFS_PASS_FSM_Msg_5

The major field text has a maximum of 14 characters, and the minor field text has a maximum of 4 characters, for a total of 18. Two spaces will be left blank between the fields. One computation symbol is necessary for display of 20 characters, as illustrated.



c. GPC fault source: This is a five-character field associated with each message which will display the number (1-5) of each GPC which detected a particular fault.

5. MCC PASS Fault Display Logic

The GNC, SM, and OPS-00 downlists all contain fault summary parameters and timetags. The data from each set have unique measurement numbers, but are otherwise identical in structure. The MCC will be initialized to process the GNC downlist.

An indication of which downlist is selected for processing is based on the setting of OFS_PASS_Downlister.

It is required to reconstruct the 1000 most recent fault summary display messages for OFS display. Inputs will be GPC downlist parameters which describe the five most recent messages, plus timetags which will give time of fault occurrence. A given timetag will be in GMT. Fault data are loaded in the downlisted parameters so as to form a pushdown list. The message 1 slots and the associated timetag always contain data pertaining to the most recent message. Each succeeding message will be loaded in the message 1 slots, and previous data in those slots will be pushed down to the message 2 slots, and so on.

The message description parameter will contain the following information:

- a. Major Field ID Identifies an alphanumeric message with a maximum length of 14 characters.
- b. Minor Field ID Identifies alphanumeric text with a maximum of four characters.
- c. Source ID Indicates the number of the GPC which detected the fault. If other GPC's subsequently detect the same fault, their numbers will also be indicated.


Each fault message for OFS display shall occupy one line composed of major field text, minor field text, a number from 1 to 5 for each GPC which detected the fault, and a timetag. The major field text will be placed in the first 14 spaces on the left. Two spaces will be skipped, then the minor field text will be placed in the next four spaces.

Initially, the message lines on OFS will be blank. Each new fault message will be placed on the top line. As each new message is added, older messages will be pushed down on the display.

For any downlisted PASS IDs not found in the fault message text tables, there is a requirement to drive the PASS FAULT display with the following message text: "INVALID - XXXYY," where XXX is the decimal equivalent of the downlisted major field ID, and YY is the decimal equivalent of the downlisted minor field ID. The timetag of this message in normal scaled form will also be displayed. The console operator then would solve the code and determine the message text. This provides more flexibility in that it allows message texts not tabled in the MCC to be displayed in a coded form.

### B. BFS FAULT DISPLAY PROCESSING

1. BFS Message Format



The message ID is a number which is right-justified in bits 6-16. It identifies a text message. The message ID's and corresponding text are predefined and stored in the MCC.

2. BFS Time Format (MET)

There are five lines reserved for time format.

The timetags are 32 bits long. They are scaled with a least significant bit value of 32.768 milliseconds.

5. BFS Fault Display Logic

It is required to reconstruct and save the 1000 most recent fault messages for output on OFS. The most recent five messages will be received in the BFS downlist, in the same pushdown list arrangement described earlier. A given timetag will be in MET. Only three messages will be received in low bit rate formats, but processing will continue, using these three messages.


Each fault message for OFS display shall occupy one line, composed of message text and timetag. the first part of the text (14 characters maximum) is called the major field. The second part (four characters maximum) is called the minor field. Allowing 2 spaces between the major and minor fields makes a total field length of 20 spaces which are required for display of the text.


Initially, the message lines on the OFS will be blank. Each new fault message will be placed on the top line. As each new message is added, older messages will be pushed down.

For any downlisted BFS IDs not found in the fault message text tables, there is a requirement to drive to the BFS FAULT display the following message text: "INVALID - ZZZ," where ZZZ is the decimal equivalent of the downlisted threedigit ID. The timetag of this message in normal scaled form will also be displayed. The console operator then would solve the code and determine the message text. This allows more flexibility in that it allows undefined MCC message texts to be displayed in a coded form.


Because of the long lead time required to define fault message tests and IDs in the MCC, and because payload-unique fault messages change each flight, there is a set of payload fault messages that are not defined in the MCC and will appear as "INVALID-XXXXXX," where XXXXXX is the major and minor field IDs. It is up to the POCC and the Payloads Officer to decode and interpret them, though the DPS officer may be called upon to assist.


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

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# TITLE

ABSOLUTE ADDRESS CONVERSION TO EXTENDED ADDRESS

# PURPOSE

To assist the DPS operator in converting absolute CPU memory addresses to extended CPU memory addresses by providing the background necessary to interpret the address conversion table.

# BACKGROUND

For certain applications, it is necessary to convert the five-digit absolute CPU memory address to a four-digit address. This process is described in detail in the book referenced at the end of this appendix. Here, it is only necessary to understand the address map and the need for extended addressing.

The CPU absolute memory addresses for the AP101S GPC's range from 00000 to 7FFFF. This range is divided into 15 sectors as follows:

SECTOR 0	0000 - 7FFF	SECTOR 8	40000 - 47FFF
SECTOR 1	8000 - FFFF	SECTOR 9	48000 - 4FFFF
SECTOR 2	10000 - 17FFF	SECTOR 10	50000 - 57FFF
SECTOR 3	18000 - 1FFFF	SECTOR 11	58000 - 5FFFF
SECTOR 4	20000 - 27FFF	SECTOR 12	60000 - 67FFF
SECTOR 5	28000 - 2FFFF	SECTOR 13	68000 - 6FFFF

As shown, only sectors 1 and 0 contain four-digit memory addresses. Therefore, due to the size of the CPU address registers, sectors 2 through 15 must be accessed using a four-digit extended address along with a one-digit branch sector register (BSR). The extended address can be derived from the absolute address by using the following table to replace the first two digits of the absolute address with the corresponding digit to arrive at the extended address for sectors 2 through 15 only:

# TITLE

UNIVERSAL PATCH FORMAT

# PURPOSE

To aid in the decoding of the universal patch format (UPF).

# BACKGROUND

The UPF is utilized for passing patches between the various facilities and the software processing facility (SPF). The format basis is either self-documenting cards which can be printed or card images placed on tape by SSD personnel. The format is geared to communicate patch contents only, and each facility is required to provide the appropriate interactive LDB or uplink commands to accomplish the update. The UPF patchset does not include a change to the mass memory load block checksum (the last halfword in the load block). The checksum is obtained from Loral personnel.

# DESCRIPTION

Below is a complete description of each UPF line entry. The data which is important to DPS SPT has been highlighted. Note in the example that leading zeros for all numerical data must be included. Moreover, the data shown in the example data column corresponds to the first five lines of Figure I-1. Some of the information may or may not be used by a facility; however, any facility can use the format, including the MCC.

There are as many "E" lines as necessary to specify the contents associated with a given offset. The contents are in contiguous locations, and leading zeros within the contents must be specified. The line numbers for "D" and "E" lines are incremented by one for each line, starting with line 00004.

For example, if three contiguous areas (a,b,c) are to be patched (same load block, system ID, and patch ID), the line sequence would appear as A (00001), B (00002), C (00003), D (00004), E (00005), E 2(00006), E 3(00007), E 4(00008), D (00009), E (00010), E 2(00011), E 3(00012), D (00013), E (00014), E 2(00015), E 3(00016), E 4(00017). The second subscript of the "E" lines indicates the number of content lines in each contiguous area. The number in parentheses represents the line number which increments sequentially.

If load block, system ID, or patch ID is required to be different, the sequence is started fresh with line "A." Line numbers always start over with line "A."

Figure I-1 is an example of a UPF worksheet. The example has four separate patch sets identified by four separate "A" lines. The first patch set has 3 "E" lines containing 13 contiguous halfwords to be patched beginning at the offset identified in the "D" line. The second set patches one halfword in a different phase/LB. The third patch set has two patches with the same phase/LB defined on line C. Each patch contains two contiguous halfwords, but each patch has a different offset specified on the "D" lines. The fourth patch set contains one patch of two contiguous halfwords.

This format shall be utilized for passing patches (sometimes the UPF sheet is accompanied by a UPF tape) between the various facilities and the SDL. The format is geared to PASS patch contents only, and each facility is required to provide the appropriate uplink commands to accomplish the update. The format is also geared such that inputs can be derived for input via GPC MEMORY SPEC, MASS MEMORY READ/WRITE SPEC, UPLINK G MEM, or MMU READ/MERGE/WRITE. The SDL must resolve and add the main memory address and store protect status to the information

NUMBER SYSTEM CONVERSIONS

# PURPOSE

To aid in dealing with number systems.

# INTRODUCTION

Any positive number system can be defined by its base (radix). The base is the number of unique symbols that can occupy a position in the number system. As an example, the decimal system has a base of 10 because the symbols (numbers in this case) 0, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 can occupy a position in the number system. In the binary system, there are two symbols, 0 and 1, that can occupy a position. In the hexadecimal system, symbols 0, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, A, B, C, D, E, and F can occupy a position; therefore, it is a base 16 system. In converting from binary or hexadecimal to decimal, the symbol represents a coefficient, and its position in the number represents the exponent of the base. Examples of this are given below.

# NUMBER SYSTEMS

A. Decimal number system

Given a decimal number of 159, state it as a function of its base. The number 159 can be restated as 100 plus 50 plus 9, or  $1^{*}(10^{2}) + 5^{*}(10^{1}) + 9^{*}(10^{0}) = 159$ .

B. Binary number system

Given the binary number 1011, convert it to decimal.

 $1^{*}(2^{3}) + 0^{*}(2^{2}) + 1^{*}(2^{1}) + 1^{*}(2^{0}) = 11$ 

Given the binary numbers 0 through 15, convert to hexadecimal numbers. See Table J-1.

# D. ADDITION IN HEXADECIMAL

To add two hexadecimal numbers, use a method comparable to decimal addition.

Example:	6800
	+ 63D
	6E3D

In this case, you need only remember that hex 8 plus 6 equals hex E with no carry.

Example: <u>6E88</u> + 1D3 For the first column, hex 8 is added to hex 3 giving HEX B.

If necessary, you may convert both numbers to decimal, add them, and convert back to hex. Thus, hex 8 plus hex 3 is decimal 8 plus decimal 3. This is equal to decimal 11, which is hex B.

For the second column, a carry is involved:

### 1 6E88 <u>+ 1D3</u> 5B

Converting to decimal, it is 8 plus 13 equals 21. Converting to hex, the result is 15 (hex 10 has a value of 16; hex 5 has a value of 5: 16 + 5 = 21). So, 5 is written below the second column and 1 is carried to the third column. For the third column, it is 1 plus E plus 1 resulting in another carry:

### 1 6E88 <u>+ 1D3</u> 05B

Hex E is decimal 14 plus 1 plus 1 is 16. Since 16 is hex 10, the 1 is carried.

The fourth column is simply 6 plus 1, so the problem is complete as follows:

6E88
+ 1D3
705B

E. Subtraction in hexadecimal

There are a couple of ways of subtracting one hex number from another, but the most efficient way is to do it in the same way you would do decimal subtraction:

Example: 689A <u>-6800</u> 9A

Start with the right column of digits and move left. Hex 0 from hex A is hex A; hex 0 from hex 9 is hex 9; hex 68 from hex 68 is 0.

Example: 5C3C -4D88 The first column is hex C minus hex 8. With practice, you will eventually learn the hex subtraction tables and immediately know that the answer is hex 4. At the start, however, you will probably find it easiest to convert both values to decimal, subtract, and convert the result back to hex. Thus, hex C is decimal 12; hex 8 is decimal 8; 12 minus 8 is decimal 4; and decimal 4 is hex 4.

For the second column of digit, you must "borrow," since 8 can't be subtracted from 3:

#### 5C3C -4D88 4

To borrow, you reduce the digit to the left by 1, and increase the number being subtracted from by hex 10. Thus, the second column becomes hex 13 minus hex 8. Since hex 13 is the same as hex 10 (decimal 16) plus 3, the decimal value of hex 13 is 19. Then, 19 minus 8 is 11. Converting back to hex, decimal 11 equals hex B.

The third column again involves borrowing:

### B 5/3C <u>-4D88</u> B4

Since 1 was borrowed from C, the problem is hex B minus hex D, which can't be done. After borrowing, it becomes hex 1B minus hex D. Converting to decimal, it is 27 (16 + 11) minus 13 equals 14. Converting back to hex, The result is E. Since the fourth column has been borrowed from, it now has a value of 4.

# 4B //3C <u>-4D88</u> 0EB4

Hex 4 minus hex 4 is 0, so the final result is hex 0EB4.

# F. BINARY TO HEX CONVERSION

For conversions from binary to hexadecimal or from binary to octal, we simply separate the binary bits into groups of four for hexadecimal and into groups of three for octal. After grouping the bits for hexadecimal conversion, start with the rightmost "ON" bit of each 4-bit field, adding the weight of each "ON" bit as a power of 2 as you move to the left of each 4-bit field. To acquire the weight of each "ON" binary bit let its position in the 4-bit field represent the exponent of the base, and let the symbol represent the coefficient. (In binary, the symbol will always be 1 or 0.)

Example

**POWERDOWN SUMMARIES** 

# PURPOSE

This procedure provides a summary of DPS configurations during the various powerdown procedures. It also provides an overview of the vehicle cooling systems.

### BACKGROUND

The powerdown procedures are contingency procedures used to cope with system failures that cause loss of some cooling capability or loss of some power production. These procedures are located in the flight data file in the following places:

- 1. Cue Cards
- 2. Pocket Checklists (always section 10)
- 3. Contingency Deorbit Prep Book
- 4. Deorbit Prep Book (Contingency Deltas Section)
- 5. Systems AOA

The air revitalization system (ARS) circulates the air and heat in the cabin environment. Water loops, fans, and cold plates are the primary components of the ARS, as shown in Figure K-1. There are two separate water loops, but normally only one is active at a time. The heat accumulated in the active water loop is passed on to the freon loops in the ATCS via a heat exchanger.


The active thermal control system (ATCS) removes heat from the water loops and the fuel cells, as well as cold-plated equipment located in the mid-body or the aft section of the vehicle. Figure K-2 shows an overview of the ATCS. There are two freon coolant loops that allow for the redistribution of heat. The primary heat sources are the water loops, fuel cells, and aft and mid-body cold plates. The primary heat sinks are as follows:

RADIATOR PANELS

The Freon loops pass through the radiators for heat removal. There are normally 8 panels; however, 6 panels are used for the Spacelab configuration. The forward two panels deploy away from the payload bay doors, so they radiate heat from both sides of the panel.

GROUND SUPPORT EQUIPMENT (GSE)

Orbiter heat is rejected to a ground freon loop through the GSE heat exchanger. The GSE service lines go to the T-0 umbilical panel, and are disconnected at liftoff.

Figure K-1. Air revitalization system (ARS)




Figure K-2. Active thermal control system

• FLASH EVAPORATOR SYSTEM (FES)

The FES consists of two evaporators contained in one envelope. The hi-load evap removes larger amounts of heat, while the topping evap provides finer control of the freon temperature. The FES operates by spraying water which quickly vaporizes into the core, removing heat from the surrounding core during the state change. The FES works in low pressures, above 100,000 feet.

• AMMONIA BOILER SYSTEM (ABS)

There are two complete ammonia systems. The ABS operates by evaporating liquid anhydrous ammonia and dumping the vapor overboard. The ABS only works in gravity, below 100,000 feet.

• O₂ RESTRICTORS and HYDRAULIC HEAT EXCHANGER

Cryogenic oxygen is warmed via the O₂ restrictors, and the hydraulic fluid is warmed via the hydraulic heat exchanger.

Each of the above heat sinks are used at different times and in different combinations during the various phases of flight. Figure K-3 shows a timeline of when the various heat sinks are used.

# DESCRIPTION

This section provides a summary of the concerns, flight data file usage, and DPS configurations for each of the major powerdowns. The configuration summaries are intended to provide an overview that conveys the overall philosophy of the powerdown. Exact procedures and steps can be found in the referenced flight data file. Powerdown descriptions are provided for each of the following subjects.

- Loss of two Freon loops
- Loss of two water loops
- Loss of two fuel cells
- Loss of cabin pressure
- Loss of FES
- Loss of two cabin fans
- Loss of AV bay air conditioning
- AV bay fires

### LOSS OF TWO FREON LOOPS

#### CONCERNS:

Loss of both freon coolant loops results in the loss of all cooling to the vehicle, which, in turn, results in the flooding of all three fuel cells and the overheating of critical equipment.

The primary concern is the survival of the fuel cells. The fuel cells will overheat resulting in a reactant crossover due to loosening of the tie rods that hold the fuel cell stack together. This can occur within as few as 6 minutes, according to the SODB. The SODB also states that, within 110 amp-hours, the reactant sites will be covered with water. The fuel cells will probably last longer with continuous purges. How much longer is not known, but the EECOM's estimate 50 to 100 minutes (1:40).

Also of major concern is the overheating of critical equipment. All freon cooled equipment, including the water loops, will lose cooling. Water and air cooled equipment will receive degraded cooling as the water loops and air heat up.




Figure K-4. Loss of Two Freon Loops (RTLS/TAL)




Figure K-5. Loss of Two Freon Loops (AOA)




Figure K-6. Loss of Two Freon Loops (Post-OMS 2)




Figure K-7. Loss of Two Freon Loops (Orbit)




Figure K-8. Loss of Two Freon Loops (Entry, Pre-304)




Figure K-9. Loss of Two Freon Loops (Entry, Post-304)

# LOSS OF TWO WATER LOOPS

#### CONCERNS:

Loss of both water loops results in the loss of cooling to the cabin, which, in turn, results in the overheating of critical equipment. The water loops provide cooling to avionics bays and the cabin, both directly via coldplates and indirectly by cooling recirculated air. The primary concern is to prevent overheating of the GPC's. Equipment should be powered down to reduce the thermal load.

The thermal analysis shows that the cabin environment can adversely affect crew performance, as temperatures can reach over 100 degrees Fahrenheit and humidity can reach 100 percent. Therefore, there is a major concern for crew health as well.




Figure K-10. Loss of Two H₂O Loops (AOA, TIG < 15 min)




Figure K-11. Loss of Two H₂O Loops (AOA, TIG > 15 min)




Figure K-12. Loss of Two H₂O Loops (Post-OMS 2, Rev 2)




Figure K-13. Loss of Two H₂O Loops (Post-OMS 2)




Figure K-14. Loss of Two H₂O Loops (Orbit, TIG < 2.5 hr)




Figure K-15. Loss of Two H₂O Loops (Orbit, TIG > 2.5 hr)




Figure K-16. Loss of Two  $H_2O$  Loops (Entry, TIG < 45 min)

# TITLE

LOSS OF TWO FUEL CELLS

### CONCERNS:

A powerdown is required to conserve the power from the remaining good fuel cell. (There are no thermal concerns.) The remaining fuel cell can supply enough power during orbit, but the entry phase requires more equipment. The entry phase puts more of a load on the fuel cell, and could cause undervoltages on some equipment. We attempt to avoid undervoltages by powering off certain equipment (such as av bay fans) for a short time during times of peak power loads (such as when the vent doors move, landing aids turned on, etc.).

For all cases, except entry, the entry flight phase is performed with 3 main buses powered. For the entry case, only 2 main buses are powered due to lack of time for a more extensive powerdown and reconfiguration.




Figure K-17. Loss of Two Fuel Cells (RTLS/TAL)




Figure K-18. Loss of Two Fuel Cells (Rev 2/3)




Figure K-19. Loss of Two Fuel Cells (Orbit, 1.5 hr < TIG < 4 hr)




Figure K-20. Loss of Two Fuel Cells (Orbit, TIG < 4 hr)




Figure K-21. Loss of Two Fuel Cells (Entry, Pre-304)




Figure K-22. Loss of Two Fuel Cells (Entry, Post-304)

# TITLE

LOSS OF CABIN PRESSURE

### CONCERNS:

The two primary concerns associated with a cabin pressure leak are depletion of breathing oxygen for the crew and loss of gas for thermal control of the air-cooled equipment. A human being cannot survive at low atmospheric pressures. (A human being is predicted to survive only a short time in air pressure as low as 3.5 psia.) Therefore, an abort site is chosen such that the cabin pressure is predicted to stay at 8 psia.

On ascent, an abort decision is made based on the change in pressure (dp/dt). Depending on the value of the dp/dt, an AOA, RTLS, TAL, or late TAL may be required. Once on orbit, the decision to deorbit is based on how long the remaining nitrogen supply can support the leak. Based on nitrogen supply and TIG time, a PLS, ELS, or bailout is chosen.

As cabin pressure drops, the air that is flowing must be colder to remove the same amount of heat. This results in degraded cooling to air cooled equipment. A powerdown is required to help offload the amount of heat poured into the air. However, the thermal analysis results for a 4-psia cabin indicated that all 5 GPCs may be left powered.




Figure K-23. Loss of Cabin Pressure (Ascent, AOA, or Rev 2/3)




Figure K-24. Loss of Cabin Pressure (Orbit, TIG < 2 hr 40 min)




Figure K-25. Loss of Cabin Pressure (Orbit, TIG > 2 hr 40 min)




Figure K-26. Loss of Cabin Pressure (Entry)

# LOSS OF FES

# CONCERNS:

The flash evaporator system (FES) is used during ascent and entry to provide systems cooling between approximately 120,000 feet and orbit when the payload bay doors can be opened. On orbit, the FES is used only to keep thermal spikes within limits, while the primary thermal control is provided by the radiators.

When the FES is lost, thermal loads must be reduced during periods when the FES is used. On orbit, heat removal of the radiators allows for normal on-orbit power levels. Prior to deorbit, the radiators are cold soaked alternately. This technique allows the radiators to act as a heat sink until the ammonia boiler system (ABS) is activated at entry interface (EI). The ABS cannot be activated sooner, because it was not designed to operate in zero G. However, the quality of the cold soak is reduced due to the fact that the rads are still cooling the Orbiter during the cold soak. Therefore, a powerdown is performed prior to payload bay door closing.




Figure K-27. Loss of FES (Ascent)




Figure K-28. Loss of FES (Deorb Prep)




Figure K-29. Loss of FES (Entry)

# TITLE

LOSS OF TWO CABIN FANS

### CONCERNS:

Loss of both cabin fans results in the loss of cooling to air-cooled equipment in the cabin and to the crew. It is important to expedite the powerdown of air-cooled equipment in the cabin. The CRT's and DEU's are the major heat sources in the cabin, besides the crew.

Thermal analysis of this case indicated three major areas of concern:

- 1. IMU operation The IMU cooling air loop is predicted to remove heat from the cabin causing significant condensation on the IMU heat exchanger.
- 2. Carbon dioxide concentration The CO₂ concentration is predicted to climb above the maximum acceptable level in the orbit case.
- 3. Crew health The cabin temperature and humidity reach an intolerable level in the orbit case, and a marginal level in the Rev 3 case.

Cabin depressurization/repressurization cycles, cabin purges, and cool, dry oxygen to the crew via helmets are three techniques that are used to improve the cabin environment.





Figure K-30. Loss of Cabin Fans (Rev 2/3)

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Figure K-31. Loss of Cabin Fans (Orbit)




Figure K-32. Loss of Cabin Fans (Entry)

### LOSS OF AV BAY AIR COOLING

#### CONCERNS:

Loss of both AV bay fans in one avionics bay requires powering down GPC's and some navigational equipment in that bay. If the fans in that bay cannot be recovered, entry will be performed with the air-cooled equipment in that bay remaining off.

Flight Rule 2-200 states that, for AV bays 1 or 2, deorbit may be delayed up to 24 hours, if necessary, to attempt recovery of AV bay cooling (IFM) and to reconfigure DPS for entry. For AV bay 3, deorbit may be delayed up to one orbit, if needed, to reconfigure DPS.




Figure K-33. Loss of AV Bay 1 Cooling (Ascent)




Figure K-34. Loss of AV Bay 2 Cooling (Ascent)




Figure K-35. Loss of AV Bay 3A Cooling (Ascent)




Figure K-36. Loss of AV Bay 1 Cooling (Orbit, TIG > 2 hr)




Figure K-37. Loss of AV Bay 3A Cooling (Orbit, TIG > 2 hr)




Figure K-38. Loss of AV Bay 2 Cooling (Orbit, TIG > 2 hr)




Figure K-39. Loss of AV Bay 1 Cooling (Deorbit Prep, 5 min < TIG < 2 hr)




Figure K-40. Loss of AV Bay 2 Cooling (Deorbit Prep, 5 min < TIG < 2 hr)




Figure K-41. Loss of AV Bay 3A Cooling (Deorbit Prep, 5 min < TIG < 2 hr)




Figure K-42. Loss of AV Bay 1 Cooling (Entry, TIG < 5 min)




Figure K-43. Loss of AV Bay 2 Cooling (Entry, TIG < 5 min)




Figure K-44. Loss of AV Bay 3A Cooling (Entry, TIG < 5 min)

## TITLE

**AV BAY FIRES** 

## CONCERNS

When a fire is confirmed to have occurred in an avionics bay (AV bay), to the degree that is practical, all electrical equipment in that AV bay will be powered off. While it is not possible (in a practical sense) to isolate ac and dc electrical power distribution and control/essential buses, virtually all of the avionics and orbiter system LRUs can be powered off providing the crew is not constrained by reach/visibility restrictions of dynamic flight.

DPS impacts include powering off any GPCs, MDMs, and MMUs that might reside in the affected AV bay. Because the extent of fire damage cannot be assessed until a physical inspection of the AV bay occurs (during vehicle turnaround activities), as a precaution, this equipment will remain off for the duration of the flight. Per flight rules, we are PLS due to the AV bay fire. If other DPS failures make us less and 3 of 5 GPCs, less than 3 of 4 FF MDMs, or less than 1 of 2 PF MDMs, EECOM may be GO to repower one of the corresponding LRUs in the affected AV bay, as there is no longer single-fault tolerance.

Note that AV bay fire powerdown procedures are applicable to AV bays 1, 2, and 3A only. Since there are no AV bay fans or smoke detectors in AV bay 3B, the crew would have to detect smoke disseminating from the AV bay. It would then be treated as cabin fire, using a hand-held fire extinguisher to combat the smoke source. EECOM would then request assistance in determining off equipment in AV bay 3B. DPS is impacted since the MTU is located in that AV bay. MTU power is provided by essential bus power via circuit breakers located on panel O13:A and O13:C.

Similarly, the aft compartment AV bays 4, 5, and 6 have no smoke detection capability since all equipment for those AV bays is designed to operate in the vacuum of space (cold-plate cooling). Thus, no AV bay 4, 5, or 6 fire powerdown procedures exist.




Figure K-45. AV Bay 1 Fire (Ascent)




Figure K-46. AV Bay 2 Fire (Ascent)




Figure K-47. AV Bay 3A Fire (Ascent)




Figure K-48. AV Bay 1 Fire (Orbit or Deorbit Prep)




Figure K-49. AV Bay 2 Fire (Orbit or Deorbit Prep)




Figure K-50. AV Bay 3A Fire (Orbit or Deorbit Prep)




Figure K-51. AV Bay 1(2, 3) Fire (Entry)
