INTRODUCTION

The STS-12 Crew Activity Plan is the flight data file article that contains the on-orbit timeline. It does not contain the detailed timelines that are covered in the Ascent, Post Insertion, Deorbit Prep, and Entry Checklists. For continuity, the entire flight is shown in the summary level timeline.

This on-orbit timeline satisfies the objectives specified in the Flight Definition and Requirements Directive (Ref. 1).

The flight profile (CIT trajectory data, Ref. 3) used for this Crew Activity Plan is for a launch date and time of March 28, 1984, 17:24 GMT.

The GWM/GTS sites at ~09:05 are questionable; therefore, activities required for a 'Go for Deploy' should not be scheduled over these sites.




Figure 1-1 OVERVIEW

A. FORMAT SYMBOL NOMENCLATURE

1. Overview Timeline

The following letters (a-c) refer to those highlighted in Figure 1-1.

- a. **TIMESCALE** - The time reference used on this format is Mission Elapsed Time (MET) expressed in days and hours. MET is referenced to liftoff, which occurs at 0/00:00:00 (days, hours, minutes, seconds).
- b. **ACTIVITY COLUMN** - This column presents an overview of activities scheduled during the flight. For clarity of presentation, only major activities are presented and activity durations are sometimes lengthened. Abbreviated activity titles can be found in the Abbreviations/Acronyms section of this CAP.
- c. **ORBIT and DAY/NIGHT**
 - 1) **Orbit** - Indicates which orbit the spacecraft is in by numerical sequence. The beginning of an orbit occurs when the Orbiter crosses the Earth's equator going from the southern to the northern hemisphere (ascending node). The succession of orbits is numbered in this column starting with Orbit 1 for launch.
 - 2) **Day/Night** - The orbital day/night intervals are delineated with black bars indicating when the Orbiter is in darkness.

2. Summary Level Timeline (12-Hr Timespan)







Figure 1-2 SUMMARY LEVEL

The following letters (a-g) refer to those highlighted in Figure 1-2.

- a. **TIMESCALES** - Two of the three time references are presented in this section of the summary timeline format. The time references used are Time Ignition minus (TIG), Greenwich Mean Time (GMT), and Mission Elapsed Time (MET). MET is referenced to liftoff, beginning at 0/00:00:00 (days, hours, minutes, seconds). TIG is referenced to the deorbit ignition time and counts down to 0/00:00:00 at ignition on the CRT timer. TIG is only used on the deorbit preparations on entry day.
- b. **CREWMAN (CDR, PLT, MS1, MS2, MS3)** - This is the crewman column of the format, where titles of scheduled activities are shown for the commander (CDR), pilot (PLT), and each mission specialist (MS1, MS2, & MS3) at the appropriate times in the flight.

c. DAY/NIGHT and ORBIT

1) Day/Night - The orbital day/night intervals are delineated with black bars indicating when the Orbiter is in darkness.

2) Orbit - Indicates which orbit the spacecraft is in by numerical sequence. The beginning of an orbit occurs when the Orbiter crosses the Earth's equator going from the southern to the northern hemisphere (ascending node). The succession of orbits is numbered in this column starting with Orbit 1 for launch.

d. GSTDN COVERAGE - The GSTDN communication coverage periods are identified in this area with a horizontal line indicating when communication is available; the GSTDN site is identified to the right of the line.

e. SGLS COVERAGE - The SGLS communication coverage periods are identified in this area with a horizontal line indicating when communication is available; the RTS site is identified to the right of the line.


f. TDRS - The TDRS communication coverage periods are identified in this area with a horizontal line indicating when there is a line-of-sight between TDRS and the Orbiter. These coverage periods have been computed utilizing the assumption that there are two TDRS operating in geosynchronous orbits at 171° west and 41° west longitude and does not account for Orbiter blockage or other attenuation of the KU- or S-Band signal.

g. ATTITUDE - The attitude of the vehicle (-ZLV, IMU, etc.) is shown in this column.





B. CREW

1. The crew will launch with an emergency egress harness restraint over Intravehicular Activity (IVA) clothing. Anti-G suits will be worn by all crewmembers for entry.
2. All crewmembers will launch wearing the Launch/Entry Helmets (LEH). After ascent, the Wireless Communication Control Units (WCCUs) are unstowed and distributed to the crew. Prior to seat ingress on entry day, the WCCUs are stowed, and the LEHs are donned for entry until landing.

C. ORBITER SYSTEMS

1. Communications and Instrumentation
 - a. The Operational Instrumentation (OI) system will nominally be managed from the ground through uplink RTC commands coordinated with the crew.
 - b. There are 13 GSTDN sites available for on-orbit coverage: ORR, GDS, MIL, BDA, HAW, GWM, AGO, ACN, MAD, YAR, BOT, DKR and BUC.
 - c. There are 3 GSTDN sites available for real-time TV: GDS (GDY), MIL (MLX), and HAW.
 - d. There are 2 GSTDN sites available for UHF voice only: YAR and BOT.

- e. There is 1 SGLS site available for on-orbit coverage: IOS.
- f. There are 5 RTS sites available for on-orbit coverage: GTS, HTS, NHS, VTS, & IOS. Only IOS provides Orbiter coverage through the SGLS mode. The other 4 provide payload support.
- g. Ku-Band TDRSS coverage (high data rate) is available approximately 50% of the time while in a -ZLV +XVV attitude.

2. Guidance and Navigation

- a. The Orbiter state vector must be uplinked whenever down track error in the on-board vector becomes greater than 20 nm, but it is usually uplinked when errors are much greater than 5 nm. These are real-time calls.
- b. IMU alignments are scheduled approximately every 12 hours in morning and evening activities and prior to major events requiring low navigation uncertainty.
- c. The on-orbit avionics configuration is listed below. GPC 2 may be shut down during orbit to reduce electrical loads and can be powered when redundancy is required.

3. Environmental Control and Life Support Subsystem (ECLSS)

- a. The Orbiter is launched with CO2 absorber canisters installed.
- b. The four supply water tanks and one waste water tank are loaded for launch with volumes sufficient to meet an orbit 3 launch day deorbit opportunity with PLBDs failed closed. (TK A = 2%, TK B = 100%, TK C = 75%, TK D = 75%, Waste TK = 2%). If waste water production exceeds storage capacity, a real-time call will be made to perform a dump. No dumps are estimated to occur. Potential supply water dumps are scheduled, based upon predicted fuel cell water production. A real-time call will be made prior to each to inform the crew whether a dump is required, and to what level. Tanks A and B will be dumped to a level that will allow the tanks to be full prior to the next daily group of deorbit opportunities.

D. TEXT UPLINK SYSTEM

1. The teleprinter (TPR) will not be carried on the flight.
2. The Text and Graphics System (TAGS) is basically a hard copy machine that operates via telemetry. The system provides the capability to transmit text material, maps, schematics, and photographs to the Orbiter through a two-way Ku-Band link using the TDRS. Transmission time for an 8- x 11-in. page can vary from just over 1 minute to just over 16 minutes, depending on the hard-copy resolution desired. The hard-copier is installed on a dual coldplate in Avionics Bay 3B of the Orbiter.

E. TELEVISION/PHOTOGRAPHY

1. The CCTV system provides 2 color cameras for in-cabin coverage and 4 (color) payload bay TV cameras for coverage of payload activities.
2. The video tape recorder (VTR) is available with 30-min cassettes.
3. 16mm, 35mm, and 70mm camera systems are available.

F. REMOTE MANIPULATOR SYSTEM

The RMS will not be carried on this flight.

G. PAYLOADS

1. TDRS (Tracking and Data Relay Satellite)

The TDRS is a communication satellite that will be launched in the process of assembling the Tracking and Data Relay Satellite System. The system will provide a high-capacity communication and data link with the STS as well as other spacecraft and launch vehicles. The nominal IUS/TDRS deployment opportunity occurs 55 minutes prior to revolution 8D (descending) at ~0/10:01:22 MET (D/HH:MM:SS). Alternate deployment opportunities occur on the subsequent orbit (9D) and the following day (18A).

2. IUS (Inertial Upper Stage)

The IUS is a two-stage, solid-rocket, inertially stabilized upper stage which will place the TDRS in a geosynchronous orbit. The IUS ignites its first stage (SRM-1) for transfer orbit insertion 55 minutes after TDRS/IUS deployment. The second burn (SRM-2) occurs at approximately 6:07 (hr:min) after deployment, resulting in a 0° inclination.

3. CFES (Continuous Flow Electrophoresis System)

This is the first flight for CFES block III. The CFES provides a processing system that continuously segregates a biological sample using a separation process based on the relative motion of charged particles through an electric field (electrophoresis). The payload is located on the Orbiter middeck. A low acceleration level is desired during CFES operations. CFES activation and closeout times are provided in Table 9-2.

4. ADSF (Automatic Directional Solidification Furnace)

The ADSF payload is a furnace facility designed to conduct materials processing experiments. It is located on the Orbiter middeck. The acceleration level should be minimized during ADSF operations. ADSF activation and auto deactivation times are provided in Table 9-3.

5. ARC (Aggregation of Red Blood Cells)

The ARC is a cooperative program with the Government of the Commonwealth of Australia. The payload will collect data on the aggregation of human red blood cells and the viscosity of blood at low flow rates under conditions approaching zero gravity. Since the blood cells have a shelf life of 48 hours, the payload must be activated within 40 hours after the blood is drawn (needs 8 hours of processing time).

The payload is located on the Orbiter middeck. Even though it desires low accelerations, periods of Primary Reaction Control System (PRCS) and Orbital Maneuvering System (OMS) burns are acceptable. ARC activation and closeout times are provided in Table 9-4.

6. MSL (Materials Science Laboratory)

a. MEA (Materials Experiment Assembly) is a self-contained facility that accommodates multidiscipline experiments in the materials processing field. The three MEA experiments must be activated in sequence (MEA 1, followed by MEA 2, followed by MEA 3), and are activated by a single switch on the aft flight deck. These experiments require periods of minimum vehicle-induced G forces (VRCS attitude control is acceptable). The activation times and minimum G periods are listed in Table 9-5.

b. GAS (Get-Away-Special)

The GAS payload (TBD) is a self-contained experiment package that requires minimal crew activity. Gas experiment activation and operation times are provided in Table 9-6 (TBS).
